Teaching Taekwondo

Local resident becomes 'master instructor'

On October 21st, Center Grove resident Rose Myers, co-owner of Pilsung ATA (American Taekwondo Association) Martial Arts in Greenwood, was named to the high honor of "Master Instructor." After over 20 years of fine tuning her martial arts abilities, reaching the sixth degree of black belt, and a full year of vigorous preparation, Myers was invited to the ATA Martial Arts headquarters in Little Rock, Arkansas. There she attended a special ceremony where she advanced, finally reaching this major milestone. In the wake of receiving this honor, Myers has reflected on the beginning of her journey in Taekwondo, and the winding path it has been to get her where she is today.

Myers was a senior pursuing her environmental engineering degree at the University of Dayton, when she witnessed a woman nearly become a victim of sexual assault outside of her home. The next day, Myers went to work at the Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, just outside of Fairborn, Ohio, where she began talking about the incident to one of her coworkers who happened to be a certified Taekwondo instructor.

"I told my coworker I refused to be a victim and I wanted to learn how to defend myself." Rose recalled. "I told him I was not jumping around or making any crazy noises. I wanted to make sure a person with bad intentions thought twice before touching me."

In 1996, Myers began training on the base, and soon after graduation began training with her husband Brian Myers, in a formal ATA school in Seymour, Indiana. In 2000, as a 1st degree black belt, Rose began training under Master Instructor Jay Martin to become a certified instructor, which she obtained in 2003.

In 2003, the Myers vacated their engineer salaries to start their Taekwondo school, Pilsung ATA Martial Arts. Pilsung's mission states that they are dedicated to changing the lives of their students one person at a time through education and coaching. They strive to provide a safe, comfortable and welcoming atmosphere for all students and family members to partake in where they will develop the confidence to live their best life.

Brian, 4th degree black belt, is also an instructor at Pilsung, while focusing a lot of his attention on the business side of the studio. He believes Taekwondo offers a program that follows an individual throughout their life, as opposed to other physical activities that often see children phased out by the school system.

"Many people you encounter speak highly of the values they learned through more traditional sports and that is great," Brian explained. "However, I think an amazing aspect of Taekwondo is the total lifelong holistic journey an individual experiences both in fitness and personal development."

Achieving the rank of sixth degree blackbelt does not entitle one to an invitation to become master instructor. Rose was 1 of 50 nationwide in her class. Her dedication to excellence is exemplified by the way she runs her gym and dedication to mastery of the arts. Rose wishes more people understood the value behind the personal development that happens in ATA classes,

"Yes, we punch and kick. We teach self defense and as you heard from my origin story, that's very important. I especially want my young ladies to be empowered to protect themselves. Nobody should be a victim. Most importantly, the physical art provides something fun for the kids to learn while they are really working on important life skills," Rose said. "Especially during these times of the pandemic, we had to work hard to get kids to make eye contact and to talk. When kids stop talking and interacting you see interpersonal skills get away."

Pilsung teaches "Songahm Taekwondo". Songahm translates to "Pine, Tree, and Rock." According to the ATA, Songham represents, "Evergreen strength year round, long life and a symbol of unchanging human loyalty"

In 2020, Myers was given the honor of her sixth degree black belt and extended the invitation to begin pursuing the title of Master Instructor. Over the last 12 months, Rose was given monthly projects that included books to read paired with writing assignments, an essay on what unique aspect she

brings to Taekwondo (Rose also teaches Yoga), and papers about the 7 pillars of ATA and what they mean to the her (Respect, Loyalty, Knowledge, Gratitude Honor, Humility and Nobility).


Rose recalls the most significant milestones on her journey towards reaching Master Instructor as the 1st through sixth degree black belts she obtained.

"In the martial arts every blackbelt past the first degree is a major milestone. Many set a goal of achieving blackbelt and never actually get to wear it after they get it in a ceremony. There have been times when I tested I did not "change" (advance) to the next belt," Rose said. "When I think some others may have given up, I saw this as an opportunity for growth." Rose continued "Most people don't consider a failure a milestone but it afforded me the opportunity to learn martial arts deeper and in turn better help my students."

The next rank for Rose will be to earn her seventh degree blackbelt. Once this is attained, she becomes eligible to be invited to pursue the title Senior Master Instructor. Rose is already in a very exclusive group, and with hard work and perseverance the sky's the limit to what she may achieve.






Marching Trojans compete at Lucas Oil





Center Grove senior defender Riley Williams has made a big difference in the Center Grove High School girls soccer team's defensive prowess.

"Riley has been awesome for the CG girls soccer program since Day 1, a consummate center back," Center Grove coach Mike Bishop said. "She is the type of player who never lets the moment in games be bigger than herself. She worked incredibly hard for herself and her teammates. She was a solid player who you could count on for 80 minutes no matter the opponent. I've coached a long time, and I've had the pleasure of coaching some very good players. She has been the most consistent high performing

player I've coached.

A coachable impact player in defense? Those are hard to come by."

Quiet by nature, Williams has gradually become more vocal

> The Trojans finished 10-2-6, losing in the sectional semifi-

nals to Columbus North on penalty kicks. The game was tied 1-1 in regulation. Center Grove

had eight shutouts and gave up 12 total goals.

"I took a lot of pride knowing we played some of the best teams in the state and held them to only scoring a few goals," she said. "I feel like I improved as a leader and by the end of the season I felt like I was someone people would come up to if they needed to talk about anything. I also improved my soccer skills because I was so determined to do well in my final soccer season."

Williams started playing soccer when she was 4 years old.

"I tried basketball, softball, and gymnastics," Williams said. "I focused on soccer in fifth grade because I enjoyed it the most."

Williams has always been a defender.

"Once the ball gets to me, I am in the last line of players so us defenders cant let them get by us or they have a chance of scoring," Williams said. "When I was younger, I wanted the attention offensive players get when they score, but I soon realized defense is as important as them."

One thing apparent was that many these names you would link to self-defense for our military are companies now owned in part or entirety by China. I'm sure that when things were set up, firewalls were put up between what the US would use and what would China use. I could go on and on but you get the picture.

Which gets me to the central theme of Indiana. I know that we are doing an awful lot of "non-smokestack" ventures in our state. I know we're also doing a tremendous amount of warehousing in our state. The question one has to ask Is what else can an aggressive state like Indiana produce inside our borders to lessen our countries dependence on international and sometimes hostile trade partners.

The next time Hoosier business people venture in the big box stores and see shelves near empty, we should ask ourselves, "What here can I produce to make money for my family and to hire fellow Hoosiers and to lessen our dependence on foreign soils". Maybe in so doing, at least we can "get what we need."

"Cloud Cuckoo Land" by Pulitzer
Prize-winning author Anthony Doerr is a
complex and thought-provoking novel.
Doerr weaves together three story arcs
that seem to be separate stories but
connect through books, stories, and libraries. First, Konstance is a teen living in
the future on a spaceship traveling to a
planet that can support human life after
Earth is no longer able to. Second, Zeno
and Seymour live in present-day Idaho.
Finally, Omeir and Anna lived in Constantinople during the 1400s.

Despite its unusual name, "Cloud Cuckoo Land" is an ancient Greek story that every character interacts with throughout the different narratives. Anna discovers the book in an abandoned monastery in Constantinople. It leads her on a journey escaping the siege of Constantinople. She meets

Omeir, a boy trying to go home after fighting for the Ottoman Empire against his will. Seymour, a young man, striving to protect the environment at all costs, and Zeno, an older man who directs a children's play called "Cloud Cuckoo Land" in the local library, clash in a way that will change their lives forever.

"Cloud Cuckoo Land is a sweeping work of fiction at over 600 pages. Yet, he paints a vivid picture of each character's world, making it authentic and compelling. Recommend for fans of "Cloud Atlas" by David Mitchell, "Smoke" by Dan Vyleta, and "The Fifth Season" by N. K. Jemisin.

Recently my wife, Sandy, and I attended a Pastor's and Wives retreat at a resort outside of Phoenix. We've been married almost forty years, but it was good to get away from the busyness of life and reconnect. One day, while the wives were having a separate session from their pastor husband's, there was an opportunity to share a personal prayer request. One woman asked if the other wives would pray for her to find a friend. Her husband led a large church in a western state, and yet the pressing need of her heart was a friend. That didn't surprise me for two reasons. First, being a pastor's wife, like being a pastor, can be a lonely life whether the church is large or small because it can be hard to find a friend who wants nothing more than to simply be your friend. Second, one of the most common things I have heard from people for years, besides "The music is too loud" (chuckle), is, "I don't have any friends." This absence of friendship is alarming because loneliness can be costly. Medical researchers and social scientists have pointed out that a strong link exists between friendship and well-being. People with close friends tend to have better health, are more fulfilled, and live longer. Here's an example. The

village of Roseto, Pennsylvania, contains a close-knit community of Italian immigrants who frequently stop to chat on the street, visit with one another, and even cook for each other in their backyards. Researchers have studied this village and shown that people end up living longer if they stay in Roseto than if they move away. They've even begun to call this "The Roseto Effect." So, here's what I'd like everyone reading this devotion to do. First, would you pray for this pastor's wife to find a friend? I'm not going to tell you her name, but I will tell you she has red hair. Pause right now and ask God to send a friend into the life of that red-headed pastor's wife out west. Second, make the commitment to be a friend to someone in need. Proverbs 17:17 says, A friend loves at all times, and a brother is born for a time of adversity. Who wouldn't want a friend like that? We are surrounded by lonely people every day, but each of us can be a difference-maker by simply being a friend.

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
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
