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May's Brownsburg Relay for Life to unite community in cancer fight

The largest fundraising event in Hendricks County,

the Brownsburg Relay For Life, will take place this year on May 21-22, from 9:30 a.m. Saturday to 12:30 a.m. Sunday, at the Brownsburg Town Hall, 61 N. Green St.

The American Cancer Society's Relay for Life unites communities across the globe to celebrate people who have battled cancer, remember loved ones lost, and help fund cancer research. At community gatherings, teams and individuals camp out at a school, park or fairground and take turns walking or running around a track or path.

As of mid-April, 27 teams and 371 participants have raised \$47,705 toward their team totals for the Brownsburg Relay for Life. The hope is to raise more than \$120,000 through this year's event and fundraising season.

Attendance is free for this family-friendly event. The celebration will include games, bounce house, dunk tank, fire truck, lots of

entertainment and activities for 15 straight hours.

"Games" is this year's theme, so each team will have a game-themed booth set up with items for sale, fun activities, food and more, and will take turns walking around the track during the event to support their efforts.

In addition, the event will feature several ways to honor cancer survivors and their caregivers, including a pampering area, a special survivor lap and Survivor Dinner, sponsored by Scotty's Brewhouse, Brownsburg.

A special luminaria ceremony will take place at

10 p.m. Participants will line the track with luminaries (sacks lit from within) representing those who are fighting or who have lost their fight with cancer.

Several local businesses have sponsored the event directly, through team sponsorships, event hosting or in-kind donations. Brownsburg schools students also get involved with fundraising, and last year 16 school/youth teams raised nearly \$75,000 for the event, more than half of the total funds raised. At the Relay, teachers and administrators will be in the dunk tank throughout the day.

Brownsburg West Middle School "West Warriors" Relay for Life team builds their Chain of Hope, and it's still growing. For this year's Relay, each team was challenged to create a Chain of Hope by writing on strips of paper inspiring messages for cancer survivors or the names of people they are supporting in fighting cancer. The goal is to have a chain long enough to completely encircle the Relay track at the Town Hall the day of the event. Teams are competing for the longest chain of Hope, with the winner receiving funds toward their team goal. The Chain of Hope is a common activity throughout the world for Relay For Life.

Despite rainy weather, Danville commu-

nity officials broke ground for the Jack Willard Community Park on April 21. The "Pocket Park" which will be built at the corner of Main and Kentucky streets, adjacent to Danville Fire Department headquarters is being built through the fundraising efforts of the Rotary Club of Danville. To date, the club has raised \$77,000 of the \$97,000 needed. The Town of Danville has contributed \$10,000. The Park is expected to be completed by September. Willard was Danville's Fire Chief. Coincidently, his son, Jack Jr. was in attendance. He was in town for the FDIC International Fire Fighter's Convention in Indianapolis. Jack Jr. is fire chief for Chena Goldstream Fire and Recue, Fairbanks, Alaska.

Pursuing his passion

Corporal Steven Sentany left corporate America to serve Brownsburg residents

BEHIND THE BADGE

Life experiences and working in the corporate world has given Corporal Steven Sentany a greater ap-

preciation for his job at the Brownsburg Police Department. After graduating from college and working in the corporate world for 10 years, Sentany knew he wanted more.

"I grew up watching my parents serve in their careers and I always thought police work was a noble profession where I could serve," explained Sentany.

2004 was a big year for Corporal Sentany. He was hired by the Brownsburg Police Department where he worked in the field doing on the job training. In 2005, he was sent to the Police Academy and this past year was promoted to corporal. Sentany is married and has three children. He enjoys exercising, especially crossfit.

What does your normal day consist of?

On a normal day, I usually begin my work day by marking on duty at 5:45 a.m. My day consists of taking runs from our Hendricks County Communications Center (police dispatch). I get sent to take various types of reports, accidents, lockouts, investigate suspicious people or situations, and business/residential alarms. In addition, a large part of my job is being proactive in the community. This consists of driving

through neighborhoods, making traffic stops, doing
security checks at
various businesses, and getting
out of my car and
meeting members of the community. My work
day usually ends
at 6 p.m.

What was your inspiration to become a police officer?

I think like most people who enter this profession it is always to fulfill a need to help others and to help those who cannot help themselves. After graduating from college, I worked in corporate America for several years. I had always wanted to be a police officer since I was a little kid. It wasn't until later in life that I decided it was time to pursue my passion for a career in law enforcement. I was hired in 2004 by the Brownsburg Police Department. I truly enjoy my job and feel very fortunate to serve the citizens of Brownsburg.

What has been one of your most favorite moments on the job?

There have been many great moments in my law enforcement career. It is very difficult to name a favorite. So I will have to say that working with my fellow officers on a daily basis is always filled with many favorite moments. My days are always so different ... there are never two days that are alike. I work alongside some of the best men and women in law enforcement.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

I think one of the most challenging aspects of my job is seeing people struggle. Whether it is an adult or child, it is always hard to see someone in a situation they cannot get out of. As an officer, you always want to help people. That goes back to one of the reasons most of us became police officers.

What are your future goals?

My professional goals are to always better myself as a well-rounded police officer. I do this by continually training and educating myself. I am a general instructor for the Brownsburg Police Department. In addition to general instruction, I also instruct in evasive vehicle operations, fire arms, and vehicle stops. I am currently in the process of obtaining a certification as a Senior Instructor through the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy (ILEA.) After completing my Senior Instructor certification, my ultimate goal is to become a Master Instructor. This

would be a great accolade as there are only a handful of Master Instructors in the State of Indiana.

If it weren't for Brad Born, there would be

no Mayberry in the Midwest Festival. The owner, along with his wife, Christine, of the Mayberry Cafe in Danville chose the theme for his restaurant on a lark 25 years ago this year.

"It's his favorite TV show," Christine said.
"He always wanted to live in Mayberry.
That's the truth of it."

Add televisions running the Andy Griffith Show continuously, a themed menu offering favorites of the show's characters, and a classic Ford Galaxie repainted as a police car and the rest is history.

Five years ago, serious talks began about a festival honoring the small-town feel of Danville and its similar feel to the fictional Mayberry. Three years ago, the first Mayberry in the Midwest Festival kicked off with a rousing success. The first festival was a moment Brad will always remember.

"I was working in the kitchen, I put my head out and I saw the trolley pull up and all these people get out," he recalled, "And that gave me goosebumps."

For Christine, she loves the parade.

"Especially at the end, when the Danville High School band is playing the Mayberry song as they come up the street," she said. "That was like being at a wedding. I was boo-hooing. It was sweet to see it all come together."

Last year, fans from 22 states attended the festival.

This year, the Mayberry in the Midwest Festival is expecting an even larger turnout and there are plenty of new events to entertain all.

Christine hesitated bringing up the festival idea for years for fear it would look self-

serving, but it is the busiest weekend for not only all Danville restaurants but other merchants as well.

"We're hoping between the music and the car shows and arts and crafts vendors, (the festival) will continue on its own," Christine said. "Mayberry, like our restaurant, might be just a fun little hook that will get you here."

It's difficult to count a mob, but Mayberry served 1,000 customers each day of the festival which maxed out the 150-seat res-

taurant.

Again, this year, original cast member Maggie Peterson Mancuso, who played Charlene Darling will be in attendance.
Also, Dixie Griffith, Andy Griffith's daughter, will be on hand at the festival.

Tribute artists will swarm the historic courthouse square with renditions of favorite characters. There will be Barney, Floyd, Goober, Gomer, Ernest T. Bass, Howard Sprague, Otis, and, of course, Aunt Bee.

Last year's winner of the Aunt Bee Look-a-like Contest, Jeanette Kleiber continues to represent the festival on television and will appear again this year.

"She's a part of the show," Christine said. Undertakings of this

size are a study of coordination. The Borns are particularly grateful for the Danville Town Council, the Danville Public Works Department, and Rex and Sharon Dugan who were the first year sponsors of the event, even though they were working on a deal to sell the Chevrolet dealership in Avon.

Despite all the hoopla of the weekend, Brad says his favorite event is after the weekend when all the tribute artists gather at the Mayberry Cafe for some food. No costumes, no acts, just friends gathering.

Avon's youth stay active through AJAA

The Avon Optimist Club was established in 1959 as a local chapter of Optimist International. With the slogan "A Friend of Youth," the Optimists are always looking for new programs which benefit the children of their community. Although few written records from that period survive, it is reported that the Optimist Club established the first youth baseball league in Avon in the early 1960s. By the spring of 1963, the Avon

Junior Baseball Association was formed with a board that consisted mainly of parents of the young baseball players. Land was leased from the Muncy family to be developed into playing fields and the program continued to grow.

In 1970, the name of the organization was changed to Avon Junior Athletic Association (AJAA) and incorporated as a not-for-profit entity with new bylaws which required board members to be selected each year from parents of the young athlete participants.

Also in 1970, the AJAA purchased 8.26 acres of land near the intersection of county roads 625 East and 100 South to be developed into permanent sports fields. In 1974, the first phase of the existing concession building was constructed with mostly donated materials and volunteer labor. As the community grew, adjacent parcels of land were added and additional improvements were constructed.

AJAA now offers 7 sports which serve 3200 children from age 4 to high school seniors, and games are played not only at the main sports field but at various locations throughout Washington Township.

In July of 2014, Amanda Babinec was hired by AJAA to become its first full time executive director. The budget of AJAA is supported by user fees; each young person pays about \$100 to participate in sports programs. Also fundraisers and corporate sponsorships have become a significant source of revenue. Champion Chevrolet was recently added as a major donor and corporate sponsor.

Without a doubt, the hard work and dedication of all the volunteer coaches, managers, and board members of the AJAA through recent decades have greatly contributed to the quality of life for families in Avon.

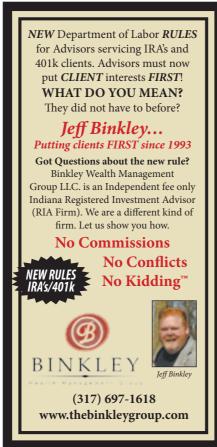

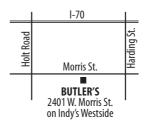

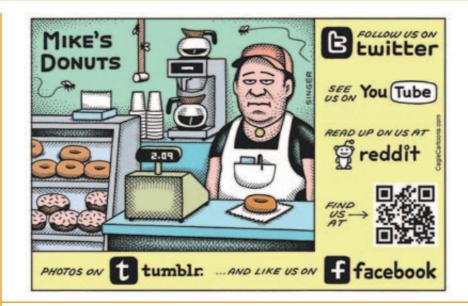

Myths of marriage

All relationships have stories, some

of mythological proportions.

Shelly and Todd were considering separation. "I don't think either of us is happy anymore," said Todd. "Shelly feels like she's not important. And I try. I feel like she's important, but I never seem to get it right for her."

I asked them to give me an example. "I told Todd I felt like he never has time for me and I wanted him to plan an evening for us," said Shelly. "I thought this would be an easy way to feel like he was thinking about me."

"But what happened is I planned the wrong evening," said Todd.

"He took me to a baseball game!" exclaimed Shelly. "That's not thinking about me!"

"See," said Todd exhaling. "It's just never right."

Shelly grew up in a family with eight siblings. Her parents were working and had little time or attention to give. She recalled a Christmas when she received a Barbie doll, though she was the one who wanted a chess set. She didn't want to be ungrateful, but she didn't feel anyone thought much about her specifically. Todd grew up

constantly criticized by his father. He recalled his high school basketball team winning sectionals; Todd was high scorer for the game. "All the way home, all dad could do was talk about the shots I missed," said Todd. "I was devastated."

Shelly and Todd had some difficult work to do. The wounds from childhood were surfacing in their relationship with a new force – a mythological force – and threatening to destroy their marriage.

It is important to ask ourselves what is the story we are telling ourselves about our ourselves, our partner, our relationship. Identify the myth and begin to look for exceptions. It takes practice. Make a list of the times in your relationship that defy the myth. Look for qualities that refute the myth. Intentionally craft a new myth that will strengthen your relationship rather than erode it.

Sports drinks: Good or bad?

workout, replenish

three to eight fluid ounces of water every 15 - 20 minutes, according to the American College of Sports Medicine. Athletes typically do this with either water or sports drinks. Does it matter how you hydrate?

"Someone who is very active athletically may use sports drinks to replenish nutrients back into their system, but someone who is overweight or exercising casually might just be adding unnecessary calories by choosing a sports drink," says Ty Loghmani, registered dietitian at IU Health West. "It really depends on each person's needs and goals."

Advantages of sports drinks: Sports drinks contain carbohydrates, minerals and electrolytes used to replenish what's lost when you sweat and exert yourself during rigorous exercise. Drinking these beverages during workouts lasting longer than an hour provides carbs for muscle fuel and electrolytes lost in sweat to maintain fluid balance in the body, promote the uptake of fluid in your intestines, and improve hydration.

Flavored sports drinks tend to appeal to athletes looking for refreshment that tastes good. Some people simply want to replen-

ish with something tastier than water and the flavors may entice some people to drink

Disadvantages of sports drinks:Along with flavor of sports drinks comes sugar. Some drinks contain as much sugar as a soft drink. Studies have shown that sports drinks can cause tooth decay on par with that of sodas.

While the calories in sports drinks may provide a boost to the endurance athlete, they can be needless calories to the casual consumer or someone exercising less than 60 minutes. In particular, children are discouraged from using sports drinks. The American Academy of pediatrics suggests most children engaging in routine physical activity stick with water.

"We still recommend that adults drink 8-10 glasses of water each day," says Loghmani.

Whichever option you choose, drinking before and after exercise are also important factors in maintaining proper hydration levels.

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Weight loss supplements?

Being overweight has profound implications on our health. As a result, many people in-

terested in losing weight look for the "easy" button. The cold, hard truth is that losing weight is hard work and sustaining weight loss is sometimes harder than the initial loss. Weight loss supplements are so popular to manufacture because they bring in big profits. However, if users aren't careful, they may be spending hard earned money on weight loss products that are unsafe and don't impact weight loss.

Before we detail various weight loss supplements, their claims and effectiveness, I encourage all readers to examine their diet and activity patterns. Usually, weight loss is within our power if we better manage what we eat, the quantities we eat and increase the amount we move every day. Here are details on two specific supplements.

Ephedra Sinica (Ma Huang)... is an herb, but it has adverse health effects. People using Ephedra often experience rapid heart rates and sometimes experience neurologic and psychiatric consequences. These health effects prompted the United States to ban Ephedra in 2004, but since the weight loss

supplement industry is largely unregulated, Ephedra is still found in weight loss supplements. If you see Ephedra or Ma Huang on a label, do not purchase or use this product.

Chromium... is an essential element and is necessary for each of us to metabolize fats and carbohydrates. Chromium as a weight loss supplement is purported to improve the action of insulin, reduce food cravings and increase metabolic rate. You will see this advertised as Chromium Picolinate. Research has shown very small differences in weight loss favoring chromium over placebos. More studies are needed before this should be used as a valid and significant weight loss supplement. Reducing 100 calories a day would probably give you more immediate and lasting weight loss effects compared to using chromium.

Danville runner feels like 'rock star' at Boston Marathon

Tim Whicker started running about seven years ago. He would run after milking cows on the farm he owns with his brother and before his job as owner of Electric Plus Inc. in Danville. This spring, he ran his first Boston Marathon, an experience he said is like no other race.

And he's run quite few: three Monumental Marathons and three 500 Mini-Marathons in Indianapolis.

Whicker characterized his first Indy marathon as "tough." He said that he was really hurting the last five miles.

His next Monumental Marathon went better, and he posted a time good enough to qualify for Boston. The trouble was, it came in November and the sign-up deadline for Boston was September. Finally, 2016 was his year.

Despite his training and experience in all these other races, Whicker found the Boston course challenging. With his wife and parents looking on, he made it to the finish in 3 hours and 28 minutes. but, he said, that was not as fast as he had hoped for. He began to struggle at about mile 22.

"After I finished, if you'd asked me if I'd do it again, I'd have said no way. But now I'm back home and starting to feeling cocky again. I survived, and I think I'd like to do it

He wants to post a time he'll feel better about. Besides, it was an exciting and fun experience.

"Nothing compares to the Boston Mara-



thon," Whicker said. "It's their Indy 500. In Indy, even if we don't go to the race, we go to someone's house to cook out and listen to the race on the radio. In Boston, they cook out and go watch the race.

"Boston makes you feel like a rock star," Whicker reported. "You run through all these small towns, and people line the road cheering us on, handing out oranges and bananas, popsicles and water to runners and slapping high-fives with us as we go by. Multiply our Mini by five and you have Boston."

The only drawback he noted was that Bostonians also cheer for the New England Patriots.

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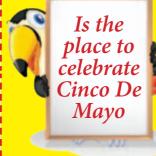

1862 victory over France at the Battle of Puebla during the Franco-Mexican War (1861-1867). It's another great excuse for a party so fix the margaritas and make this easy dish to celebrate!

Ingredients:

1 lb. cooked shredded chicken meat (white or dark meat, whichever you like!) You can salt and pepper the chicken. bake it for 30 to 45 minute to and internal temperature of 165 F, or use rotisserie cooked chicken from the deli department.



- 1 tsp kosher salt
- 1 tsp cumin
- 1 tsp chili powder
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1 avocado, sliced
- 2 to 4 oz. chopped jalapenos
- 15 oz. canned black beans
- 8 corn tortillas
- 2 cups shredded Queso Quesadilla cheese
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar Jack cheese
- ¼ cup chopped fresh cilantro
- · 2 limes cut into wedges, chili powder

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

Mix these ingredients in a bowl: Chicken, salt, cumin, garlic powder, chopped jalapenos, black beans and 1 cup of the Oueso Ouesadilla cheese. In a casserole dish pour 4 oz of the enchilada sauce into the bottom. Put a scoop of chicken mixture in each tortilla, roll it and put them in the casserole dish. Cover with more enchilada sauce and the remaining cheese. Bake to internal temperature of 150 degrees F (20 or 25 minutes.) Serve with chopped cilantro, sliced avocado and lime wedges. Enjoy!

- The customer should ask for a copy of the Contractors bond before contacts are signed.

Insured:

- Contractors should carry general liability insurance.
- All subcontractors should be insured.
- The customer should ask for a copy of the Contractors insurance before contracts are signed.

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Love one another

"This is the message that you have heard from the beginning,

that we should love one another." (1 John 3:11, ESV)

The Apostle John had a lot to say about "love." His short letter—the First Epistle of John—mentions love more than any other book in the New Testament. With one exception. The Fourth Gospel—also written by John—is the only book in the New Testament that mentions "love" more than his first epistle. It is no wonder John has been called, "The Apostle of Love."

The Christian message to love is not an easy one to hear, however. As John tells us, "This is the message..., that we should love one another." This is a calling to relationships of Christlike love, not just loving actions.

We often hear mantras like "Pay it forward" and "Commit random acts of kindness." Those are wonderful sentiments, as far as they go. But true love is expressed in commitment, not just nice deeds. The greatest act of love was, the Apostle tells us, the sacrifice of Christ who "laid down his life for us" (1 John 3:16). Jesus came to restore

people to a right relationship with God, and he calls us to right relationships with "one another." That is a high calling.

In a culture that is being strained by political divisions, racial and religious tensions, and other stresses and conflicts — now as much as ever, the message needs to be heard. Christ's message for his disciples is to love God and to strengthen families and communities with selfless love for "one another."

Random acts of care for strangers near and far is also very important. But "hit and run" deeds of love are a lot easier than sustained investments to nurture strong homes and communities. Let us pray for God's grace to help us grow in Christlike sacrifice to "love one another."

Spice up your taste buds

WINE & DINE

I place spicy wines (a wine with aromas and/or flavors that evoke

the impression of spice, pepper, or allspice) in several categories: herbal whites, spicy whites, herbal reds, and spicy reds.

Herbal whites: Sauvignon Blanc and Seyval Blanc. Both herbal type wines with scents of green bell pepper, anise, cilantro, coriander, cumin, fennel, mint, oregano, and tea leaves.

Spicy white: Gewurztraminer and Traminette. Both demonstrate floral spices of allspice, anise, cinnamon, clove, coriander, fennel, ginger, nutmeg, white and black pepper, and herbal tea. Food pairings for these spicy white wines include herbal dishes mirroring the vegetal tones in those foods and spicy ethnic foods of the Orient, India, Mexico, Caribbean, and Thailand.

Herbal reds: various Bordelais wines. Cabernet Sauvignon is the spiciest. Spice flavors detected in Cabernet Sauvignon are anise, green bell pepper, cinnamon, clove, dill eucalyptus, fennel, marjoram, mint, nutmeg, oregano, black pepper, rosemary, and thyme. The mildly spicy red wines are also herbal in type. Foods that fit into this group are spicy, peppery foods.

Spicy reds: varieties associated with Rhone, Spanish, and Italian areas. Spice flavors detected in most of these wines are anise, green bell pepper, cayenne, cinnamon, clove, dill, eucalyptus, fennel, marjoram, mint, nutmeg, black olive, oregano, black pepper, white pepper, rosemary, and thyme. The food pairing here is more obvious: New Orleans food, Thai food, Chinese, and good old barbeque.

Wine is a food, and wines are best enjoyed with food. There are tricks that can help to get the pairing correct. Use a wine that has inherent spiciness from the grape itself. Select a wine that has some to moderate sweetness as the sweetness will deflect excessive spice and make it tolerable. Therefore, using your own gauge of sweetness versus spice, you can choose the wine that will complement the food as well as to avoid horrors of excessive heat. When the dish is over-the-top hot, pair it with beer.

Pet peeves in grammar

peeves about frequent grammar errors I see and would love for you to clear them up for either me or the rest of the world. Here they are.

- 1. An apostrophe "s" after a last name. Example: "The Smith's are here. I don't know what the Smiths own that are here, but the suspense is killing me.
- 2. A cents symbol after a price that has already been given the decimal point to symbolize cents. Example: .69¢ (instead of \$0.69). I don't know how you divide a penny into 69/100ths but I'd be willing to round up to a full penny when purchasing that pack of gum.

Answer: Thanks for writing in, and your kind words, Marcy. Normally I wouldn't do several questions in one column, but these annoy me too, so I think we can knock them

out quickly.

Apostrophes do not make words plural (except when they do). I've written a previous column about this, but a refresher is always useful. An apostrophe-"s" after a noun makes it possessive, not plural, in almost all circumstances. A notable exception is making lowercase letters plural (i.e. "Mind your p's and q's").

Cents get a dollar sign and a decimal OR a cents sign. You could write \$0.75, or 75¢, or even, I suppose, 75 cents, and all would be equally correct. But .75¢ would suggest you are talking about fractions of a cent, which is probably best left to bankers and gas station price boards. On the whole, I'd recommend sticking with the dollar sign, since most keyboards don't even have a ¢-sign anymore.

China. And fear.

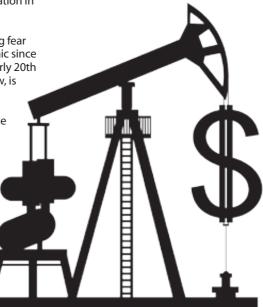

Tolerance and compassion. I need lots of both

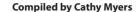
and those that offer it to me, help me grow exponentially.
