Last week's article, "Pennies, cat food and sunflower seeds," required communication. Sharon Kinder and I exchanged emails prior to the article. The article struck a nerve for some. Her story is a continuing example

of those 'gray' areas that come out of left field, leaving folks scratching their head. What is going on with this paranormal thing?

In one of our last emails, Sharon, mentioning present home, and house in Kentucky. asked:

"I've been surprised about you This house may be haunted, or perhaps it's the people having activity in inside of the house. that house since

it isn't as old as what I think of as a typical haunted house. Are all houses with spirits considered to be haunted? I find your articles on the house in KY very interesting and would like to hear more about it in the future. It would be interesting to read about spirits in houses that don't fit the 'norm'- did someone die in that house, can spirits follow someone and move in, or ?? I don't consider my house haunted just because I'm certain that my late husband's spirit has visited. I guess I connect the word 'haunted' with something negative. So many unexplained things! So fascinating!"

I replied in usual long winded fashion:

"There is no age of houses that can be 'haunted.' I've investigated houses in brand new subdivisions that have activity (which leads me to think it might be that particular parcel of ground). Like you, I don't like the moniker of "Haunted" because it denotes negativity. And a broad term.... Houses can be haunted, but so can people; and not encompassing anything paranormal. It could be addiction (drugs or alcohol), past childhood traumas, or a mental state requiring medication."

"Our house is an enigma. We coexist because Laura and I don't feel threatened. From talking

We have experienced lights turning on; doors and windows opening; shadow movement; the sudden odor of grandmotherly perfume; and a female voice greeting "Hello" when I arrive home. Is it the original owner? I have no idea."

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# Time to vote: Make it count



# High School seniors should start preparing now for college and beyond

It's the time of year when most collegeseeking students are finding out if they've been accepted into their school of choice and Senioritis starts to set in, but are students fully prepared to take the next step to college and beyond? Not according to edu-

cation experts, who say there are still critical steps students must take during the remainder of their senior year to successfully prepare for college, including how to pay for their college education.

New research from the National Honor Societies reveals a top concern for college-seeking students is how they will finance their education. According to the survey statistics, half

of students surveyed worry they will be unable to pay for their college education. Further, almost 1 in 3 students report their parents are counting on scholarships to help pay for higher education, and nearly 4 in 10 students say they need help figuring out how to apply for scholarships.

There are just a few months left until graduation, but it is not too late (and, of course, never too early for students not graduating this year) to start preparing for college and understanding their financial options. The following tips from the National Honor Societies can help students and parents navigate the often-complex process of college funding:

• Consider Your Own Resources. This can include parent income, student income, gifts from relatives or starting savings accounts,

such as the 529 plan.

• Get Financial Aid. This can include needbased aid or merit-based aid. Need-based aid is available when families can prove they need the money, which can be done by completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as soon as possible after January 1 each year. Merit-based aid is most commonly awarded through scholarships,

but could also include institutional grants offered by colleges and universities.

• Reduce Costs. Taking steps like earning college credit by successfully completing Advanced Placement (AP) and dual enrollment coursework may cut the amount of time and money needed to earn a degree. AP exams are just around the corner, occurring the first two weeks of May. It's

not too late for students to buckle down and begin studying.

As an educator, I see first-hand how stressful the financial aspect of college can be for students and parents. With the right resources and information, though, students can begin taking action now to prepare for college, career and a lifetime of success. # Ann Stickford, of Franklin Township, finds hope after nearly 10 years of Primary Immunodeficiency disorder

The average person with Primary Immunodeficiency (PI), a disorder where a person's immune system is missing or doesn't function properly, can go 12.4 years living with the symptoms before getting diagnosed. For Franklin

Township resident and business owner, Ann Stickford, it took nearly 10 years.

Ann is owner and president of Five Point Kennels in Franklin Township and volunteers at St. Augustine Home. Her husband, Kevin is an IMPD K-9 officer. Ann has two children, Ashley and Sam Reed, and a 17-month-old granddaughter. Her PI journey began in 2006 when she unexpectedly underwent a surgery that caused her a lot of pain.

"My health started to decline rapidly," she said. "I caught everything

possible. My husband would joke that he needed to find a bubble to put me in to keep me from getting sick. I felt like I embodied Murphy's Law of Illnesses. I would get a hangnail and it would turn into an infection. Over the next years there were lots of trips to the hospital."

Ann had more than 10 doctors and additional specialists treating her for symptoms she had at the time, but no one connected the dots. In March 2015, she said things got more serious. She woke up with what she thought was the flu and her mother encouraged her to go to the hospital. She decided to rest it off. A day later, she could barely move and spent the next week in the hospital.

"Even though my other family members were there, my mom was the one really pushing, saying 'something is wrong with her, her immune system is not working, what can we do," Ann said.

That's when she was sent to an immunologist for the first time. After a series of bloodwork and tests, she received the diagnosis.

"I was very frustrated and scared," Ann said. "I felt like something was wrong that they were not catching. My friends thought I needed to take better care of myself. My family was worried and frustrated. It was causing a lot of stress on them. It was crazy. You start wondering what's really wrong with you that this happens. This is something that is a chronic illness that I will live

with the rest of my life. I know now why I was catching everything that was going around, why I was getting sick all of the time."

There are more than 300 diseases associated with PI, so no one case is alike and treatment varies. Ann was prescribed Hy-Qvia infusions in October, a treatment in which she can do herself once a month.

"Since I've started, I've been getting sick a lot less," she said. "It's given me back time to do the things I want to do. I have not had a hospital stay which has been amazing

for me. (Before,) I had stopped working at the boarding kennel. I love to travel and have been able to get out more. The best thing is, now having a diagnosis, there was that fear of the unknown the whole time. You're going from doctor to doctor and feel like you're not getting answers to your questions. I have hope that I actually can enjoy this life, manage the disease, live my life and not have that fear of where I was a year ago in March."

April 22 – 29 is World PI Week. Since her diagnosis, Ann has attended workshops and networked with other families that have been in similar situations, helping to raise awareness of the disorder and the struggle of going so long without a diagnosis. # Greenwood Fire Dept. battalion chief continues his education to further his leadership skills

Being able to go out and serve is why all firefighters go into the line of work, said Greenwood Fire Department Battalion Chief, Brad Coy.

"We're getting busier and busier," Brad said. "The city is growing. We did over 6,000 runs last year. That opportunity to serve is greater every day... I always enjoy coming to work because it's not a normal, routine job. You never know what challenges will be presented to you."

Brad graduated from Edinburg High School, then Franklin College in 1995. He and his wife, Angela, met in college, where they are still involved. Brad returns periodically to teach in the athletic department. He and Angela reside in Franklin with their son, Nicholas.

Brad was hired to the Greenwood Fire Department part time in 1998 and full time in 2003. He has worked at almost every station and promoted through the ranks, now serving as a battalion chief. He also oversees the special operations division, dive extrication and hazardous materials.

## What was your inspiration to become a firefighter?

My father was a volunteer firefighter in our hometown. I remember running around all of the fire trucks as a 5-years-old. While I was in college, my best friend joined the fire department as a volunteer and he recruited me. I was working in another career when I decided to try out for Greenwood.

#### What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

Anytime that I get a chance to train some of our guys and see them put that to use is gratifying. On a run standpoint, one that stands out, we had a man involved in a car accident on I-65 in the winter. He had been ejected from the vehicle. He was face-first in the snow. Our crews gave him the best care we could. A month later he walked in the fire house to say thank you.

## What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

As a battalion chief, when you have to manage and lead 26 different personalities and individuals every day can be a challenge. From a response standpoint, any time you see someone at their worst, suffering with their family, that's challenging every time we go out.

#### What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

I'm an outdoors guy. I'm always outside this time of year. When I can, I love to fish. I love to read. I have several books I'm trying to catch up on. I'm married and have a son. When we can we like to travel and see new places.

#### What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

Personally, I am getting ready to fulfill one of those. I'm about to get my Masters in organizational leadership from Indiana Wesleyan University... I'm a lifelong learner. In 2010, I went through Leadership Johnson County. That gave me a new look on leadership. I want to continue my education professionally, especially in this position, and try to be as good of a battalion chief as I can.

## What would you have done if you hadn't become a firefighter?

My degree is in biology and athletic training. I was a certified athletic trainer when I got this job.

# Kassie Smithey helps raise money child abuse awareness program in Owen County after unsettling news story

When Kassie L. Smithey first heard the story of Shaynlyn Ammerman, the little girl in Owen County who was killed after being sexually abused in March, she couldn't shake it.

"I said I need to try and do something," Kassie said. "I'm from Owen County. I went to school with the little girls' mother. I didn't have a relationship with her, but my parents live close to where her murderer lives. That had a big impact on me... I started to do my own research about child sexual abuse. I came across the Darkness to Light Website (d2l.org). Their programs include community initiatives, self-development. I realized how uneducated I was myself about prevention."

Darkness to Light's programs raise awareness of the prevalence and consequences of child sexual abuse by educating adults about prevention.

Kassie shared her thoughts with her husband, Adam Smithey, who owns Smithey Counseling Services in Greenwood. They

decided to start a Facebook awareness campaign, and began a fundraising page at youcaring.com/the-community-of-owen-county-549828. The goal is raise \$20,000 to set up a grant for child sexual abuse awareness through the Owen County Community Foundation. This would allow for people to be trained as facilitators, who could train residents and stakeholders of the community about abuse.

"It's a big dream, but it's one that I strive for is to eradicate child sexual abuse in general," she said. "Realistically, we hope to drastically reduce those numbers."


#### Greenwood's Dan Nichols celebrates 75th birthday

# TIME & TRANSLATION

It took two years from the time her father left Burma for Htoo Thu, her mother and two brothers to join him in America. When she finally got the call that her family would all move to the U.S., she said she was so excited.

"I thought it would be perfect," she said. "I will see my dad. I thought our family would be happy and not struggle. I thought I would learn the language quickly, in a month, and be able to go to school and have fun... I knew it would be different from my lifestyle in Myanmar, Burma. I pictured a perfect world, but seeing all of the refugees here struggling, kids at school, getting jobs, it wasn't perfect. When I got here, I couldn't speak English in a month, of course. When we first got here, my mom and dad were a little financially unstable. Every aspect wasn't as easy as I thought it would be."

Htoo arrived in the U.S. on April 1, 2011 as an eighth grader, attending St. Mark Catholic School. The summer before her freshman year at Roncalli High School, she met Mike Newton who volunteered with the St. Vincent de Paul Society. He brought items Htoo's family could use, such as a dining room table.

"When he would come, there would be moms coming out of their apartment and asking for items," Htoo said. "That's when I started knowing there are families like mine in need of basic things. When a Burmese family comes into the country, they have nothing. They need mattresses, tables, furniture. (Newton) comes in with a trailer and every one comes out. He's like a Santa Claus."

Mister Mike, as Htoo calls him, can't speak Burmese so she offered to translate.

"She just jumped right in," Newton said. "She is a super outgoing person, and it was easy to work with her. She saw the potential to help some of the people in her community. She offered to help when I needed help. The need for a translator was great... I would do some home visits to where you actually go in and see what the needs were. She jumped at the opportunity to do that. Then we would take families to the St. Vincent de Paul distribution center and she would volunteer to go with me there. She would act as a translator and work at the distribution center, too. It got to the point I really came to rely on her to help with the clients."

Htoo said why she started volunteering isn't something she ever thought about – it was instinct. She also translates for Burmese families at St. Mark and Roncalli schools and goes with her friends to help at the food pantry at

St. Vincent de Paul.

Through her four years at Roncalli, she's earned more than 600 service hours.

"I feel like I need to do something to lessen one burden, one worry," Htoo said. "If they get a mattress donated, they don't have to pay for that anymore. They can sleep nicely and not on the floor. Mr. Mike inspired me. He doesn't get anything out of this except for people smiling at him, thanking him. If he can do it, then why not me? I just want to help them."

To which Newton says, "It's a two way street. She's an inspiration to me as well. She helps motivate me. I know she's busy. Whenever I needed her to help, she'll do it if at all possible. She says that I inspire her, but I think it's probably more the other way. She just has a great, pleasant personality. She's like a ray of sunshine when she enters a room."

For her work in the community, Catholic Charities in the Archdiocese of Indianapolis named Htoo a 2016 Spirit of Service Youth Award. She was honored in a ceremony on April 27.

"I was thrilled to hear about it,"

Htoo said. "I don't even deserve this.

There are so many people who deserve this award. To nominate me as the winner, I am very thankful. I am very blessed."

Htoo said she doesn't volunteer as much this year, as she works two part-time jobs. She is an after-care worker at St. Mark Catholic School

Monday through Friday and works at Valle Vista Golf & Conference Center for events on the weekends. She plans to attend Marion University in the fall where she will study biology, with a goal of becoming a doctor.

It's been five years since Htoo and her family came to the U.S. Although the experience has been different from the dreams she had while in Burma, she said she has made it her home. She said she has learned a lot through her volunteer work and helping improve the lives of others like her.

"I (have) grown so much, spiritually, and I have matured more," Htoo said. "I have learned a lot about life. Everyone struggles. Even one thing, one donation, can make someone's day."

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# Race for Senate

#### Republicans Jefferson Shreve and Jack Sandlin campaign for a senate seat in District 36, which serves most of the Southside

State Senate district 36 represents portions of downtown Indianapolis, Perry Township and northern Johnson County, with nearly 132,000 residents. As incumbent Brent Waltz campaigns for a seat in congress, four candidates are vying for the vacancy: democrats Sean Gorman and Jesse Kharbanda and republicans Jack Sandlin and Jefferson Shreve. As Sandlin and Shreve both reside on the Southside. The Southside Times has chosen to allow readers to learn more about the two candidates and their backgrounds. Kharbanda is also featured in the election guide. Gorman could not be reached as of The Southside Times publication deadline.



Jack Sandlin was born and raised on the Southside, the Greenwood side of County Line Road where his dad bought a house big enough for the family. Sandlin has seven siblings. He graduated from Greenwood Community High School before going into the army, serving a tour in Vietnam. He later utilized the GI Bill to earn a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from University of Indianapolis and an MBA at Indiana Wesleyan University. He and his wife, Lydia, have been married for 41 years, living in the same house in Perry Township since 1983. Their daughter and grandchildren live across the street.

Sandlin made his career policing, specializing in white collar investigations. He retired as deputy chief of investigations.

"I had an interest in politics early in my policing career," Sandlin said. "When a young guy named Steve Goldsmith decided to run for county prosecutor, I met Steve, liked his skillset and volunteered for his campaign. But I really stayed outside of politics in my policing career."

For the last 20 years, Sandlin has owned Jack Sandlin & Associates, a law firm involved in fraud examination, private investigation and security consulting. Sandlin has served on the Perry Township Fire Department Merit Board and was elected two terms as the Perry Township Trustee.

"At that time, we had a fire department," he said. "I was able to utilize the business information I learned in college and as a law firm administrator. It's awesome to be able to serve people in your community. In eight budget sessions, I went through and increased the personnel in our fire department



#### **Sandlin:**

Greatest strength as a leader: The ability to bring diverse folks together and have conversations. In law enforcement, there was a lot of skepticism among agencies. That's why I was a team leader because I could work across the aisles, with a variety of agencies, and get people to focus on the mission. I still try to do that.

Greatest in your district: The thing that strikes me in this district is how much different there is from the North to the South. People love the amenities in Center Township: Bankers Life, Lucas Oil, White River State Park... We need to work toward maintaining a good, vibrant community. I want to be a partner in being able to bring them tools out of the legislature that will help them. The strength in the community is the diversity from the north end to the south, with great schools.

and did that without raising taxes."

Sandlin was elected by the caucus to the Indianapolis City-County Council in 2010 and recently won reelection in November, going into his second term this year. He is involved with the administration and finance committee which oversees the budget aspects for Indianapolis, public works committee and has done work with the public safety committee.

Sandlin announced his run for State Senate in September.

"I was at a senate hearing listening to a presentation," Sandlin said. "Governor Daniels had made a deal on an issue a few years

#### **Shreve:**

prior. This issue had come back up before the legislature. A state senator said 'well, when does the current legislature have a responsibility to honor the commitment of a previous government or legislature?' That struck me at the time. That's the problem in government. People have an expectation of trust in elected officials. I think that statements like that erode that trust. I thought if I ever have an opportunity, I want to make sure I never do what this guy just said. When you make an informed decision and promise to the taxpayers, you need to live by that unless there are extreme circumstances."

So when he heard that Senator Brent

Waltz would run for the 9th congressional district, leaving his senate seat open, Sandlin spoke with him and put his hat in the game.

"There are some things at the state level that I think I can make an informed decision on," he said.

Sandlin said his priorities would include:

Pre-K Education: "In Indianapolis, we address the issue of pre-k education. Mayor Ballard brought in a pilot program that is not sustainable. There is a lot of data that says pre-k has value going forward. The information that I've looked at shows we have a potential of seeing an increased quality, but it's long-term. I think it's worth the investment. As a parent, I think the best thing you can give a child is a good education. Let's give kids an opportunity for a good start."

Public safety: "Finding funding for police and fire around the state has to be a priority. We are seeing a proliferation of drugs and violent crime around the state. State government has set up some things that incentivize silos of information. I want to bring that conversation to the senate and see if we can change the game. We have to figure out a way to enhance law enforcement communication so that we get across these jurisdictional lines."

Infrastructure: "I can't tell you the needs just in Marion County. I'm anticipating that you can multiply that around the state... I also ask, who's controlling the quality? We need to improve our infrastructure and make sure we have quality controlled programs in place."

#### **★** Jefferson Shreve ★

Jefferson Shreve was raised on the Southside of Indianapolis, graduating from Indianapolis Public Schools. He earned his Bachelor's degree at Indiana University and MBA at Purdue University. He and his wife, Mary, reside on the Southside near the University of Indianapolis, in the house his grandparents bought more than 60 years ago.

While majoring in political science at IU, he spent his junior year in Washington D.C. interning on Capitol Hill and taking classes. When he returned to Indianapolis, he began volunteering for campaigns of republican office holders such as Senator Richard Lugar and Governor Mitch Daniels. At the same time, the last two years of his undergrad, he worked during the summer with an Indianapolis shopping center developer, learning the industry.

Shreve started Storage Express in 1992, when he was just out of college. As the sole owner, he has grown that one self-storage facility to where it is today, with 90 locations in five states, primarily in Indiana.

Shreve got more involved in Perry Township as a precinct committeeman several years ago, then vice board chairman in Perry Township. In 2013, He was elected in by the caucus to serve on the Indianapolis City-County Council. He decided not to run for reelection to focus his campaign for state

"I think I can be good at this work," Shreve said. "I understand some of the big picture things that the general assembly will deal with when they go to craft the budget. More specifically, we have a big budget that the general assembly crafts every two years. The biggest slices are education, healthcare and infrastructure. I believe I can add debate to the process because I know from experience each one of those three slices."

Shreve said his priorities include maintaining a fiscally-sound budget for the state of Indiana.

"The job title is law maker," he said. "My personal view is we have plenty of laws. I don't want to spend most of my time crafting new legislation. I want to focus my energy on crafting a fiscally sound budget for our state that reflects the priorities of this district and of the broader state."

He continued, "I want to ensure that our fiscal house is in order and that Indiana maintains its AAA credit rating. Keeping that rating really saves tax payers an incredible amount of money. I want to advocate for this district first and foremost, and work hard to improve a fiscally prudent budget for our district and our state. I want to ensure that our region and our state remain competitive with all of our neighboring states."

Education funding entails a large portion of the state's budget, and it is a topic that Shreve said he is passionate about. Shreve is the immediate past president of the IU Alumni Association, on the IU Foundation Board, serves on the Purdue President's

Council and has served in other areas of the universities. He is a board member of the Indiana Chamber of Commerce, serving on the education committee.

"I'm a product of Indianapolis Public Schools and I think that is noteworthy," he said. "The biggest part of our state's budget that the general assembly has to wrestle with every budget session is public school funding. K-12 funding is half of our state's budget. When you add in higher (education) funding, that's another 12 or 13 percent. Being a product of the system is helpful when you have to make funding decisions for public education in our state."

He continued, "Our unemployment levels are low. It's not all about jobs, jobs, jobs. It's about good jobs. It's important to have quality jobs and compensation rate. Are you doing things from a state government standpoint to ensure that young people coming into the workforce are prepared to earn good wages? If we're going to spend well more than half of our states resources on education, are we spending it on ways that can prepare them to earn good, solid wages in growing industries?"

The second largest portion of spending in the budget is healthcare, with which Shreve said he has experience serving on board of directors, executive and finance committee of the IU Health Bloomington Hospital Systems. His business experience has given him the experience in infrastructure, as he has made his living building across Indiana and the surrounding states.

"I'm running to represent this district centered on the Southside of Indianapolis," he said. "I know this part of the state best, because it is home. But I know the other areas of the state because it's where I spent time to grow my business. Having a small business background is helpful and having a business background beyond one location in the state is really helpful in the general assembly. I have to advocate for this district first, but I have an appreciation for the rest of Indiana."







## Cardiac arrest patient thanks Southside emergency responders

Josh Sand, 32, and his fiancé Emily Williams stopped by Indianapolis Fire Department fire station 23, 1108 E. Thompson Rd., to meet with the firefighters and paramedics who saved his life on April 9. IFD Firefighter/Paramedic Kristi Hamblin explains that Josh and Emily were in their car on their way home from McDonalds when Josh began to have seizure like activity. Emily who was driving and only 300 yards from their house - pulled into the driveway and called 911. She reported to dispatchers that Josh was not breathing. Fire side Dispatchers instructed her to remove him from the car and establish CPR. Emily pulled Josh out of the car - onto the driveway - removed the food from his mouth and began compressions. Her sister -also at the house - began to assist. Engine 23, Engine 35 and Medic 23 arrived on scene within minutes.

CPR was administered for approximately 1 hour. The patient would regain a pulse and lose the pulse just as fast as it came back. After 30 min of ACLS protocol, they decided to go ahead and transport the patient and continue CPR. Both fire crews and Medic crews jumped aboard the ambulance and transported the patient to St. Francis. Josh who is still in the throes of recovery was so appreciative of the crews efforts and has no recollection of that day. The quick response by Emily to activate the 911 system, clear his airway of food and establish CPR gave Josh the best chance at survival.

# The Huntsman: Winter's War... bland and forgettable

Indiana heads to the polls in a couple weeks. However, political season has been in full swing for some time. You've likely

been inundated with political ads espousing the character and accomplishments of one candidate, while tearing down his or her opponent, often in the very same ad. Those running also usually have cute, catchy slogans used to impart a picture-perfect, almost fairy tale-like world scenario of the change to come, if that candidate is elected. While candidates

continue to sell voters visions of fantasy, a film based on an actual fairy tale, *The Huntsman: Winter's War*, recently hit theaters.

The Huntsman: Winter's War follows 2012's Snow White and the Huntsman. While some of the same characters appear in both films, The Huntsman: Winter's War is not technically a sequel. Instead of Snow White, this film focuses its attention on the relationship between two sisters, Ravenna (Charlize Theron) and Freya (Emily Blunt) and the events that follow after one undergoes an unforeseen tragedy. Any who disobey the queen's lone command faces death. Through a series of unfortunate and actionfilled events, Sara and The Huntsman battle against an evil force, not only looking to conquer and destroy love, but everything else along as well.

The Huntsman: Winter's War is another in a popular trend as of late, the live action fairy tale film. Attempting to capitalize on

this latest Hollywood craze is the film's biggest downfall. The story and honestly, the entire film do nothing to differentiate itself from the crowd of other such films. Instead, it's an extremely forgettable film complete with a straightforward, boring story with predictable twists and turns. On several occasions the film feels like an ex-

## Ch, ch, ch, chia

Chia is more than a fuzzy, green pet. The ancient seed was the Aztecs main source of sustenance, clothing, and energy. After the

Spanish bullied and pillaged Latin America, chia seeds became taboo under new rule. History suggests it was an important food crop for the Aztecs. It's remained in regular use in its native countries, but was largely unknown in North America until 30 years ago. The small black or white seeds come from a flowering plant in the mint family native to Central America.

Providentially. the super-food has made a comeback. Under the

scepter of rapidly increasing diabetes rates, scientists believe chia seeds have great benefits for diabetics. Chia seeds speed-bump how fast our temples convert carbohydrates into simple sugars. They contain the mineral manganese, important for bone health, and help the holy temple use biotin and thiamin. One serving of chia, or 28 grams, has 30 percent of your recommended intake of the mineral manganese. Chia brims with coloncleansing fiber too. The holy temple cannot

produce enough Omega Fatty Acids so we must obtain omegas through food. If you're not a fisheater, omegas can be difficult to get. Chia seeds pack omega-3s and 6's.

Chia seeds have three to six times more calcium than milk per serving. With women suffering from osteoporosis and today's dairy farm gulags where milkers are pumped full of chemicals and hormones, chia's an important nutrient for strong bones. Chia antioxidants defend against can-

cer by counteracting free radicals and oxidation that damages cells and genetic material. The powerful little seed is a complete vegetarian protein source with all essential amino acids such as leucine, lysine, isoleucine, methionine, threonine, valine, tryptophan, and phenylalanine.

It's recommended to consume two daily doses of about 20 g each (1.5 ounces total).

Nutty flavored chia seeds can be eaten raw, soaked in fruit juice (in Mexico, they call this "chia fresca"). Add to smoothies, cereals, soups, porridges, puddings or baked goods. Soaking the seeds gives them a gelatinous texture, allowing them to be mixed with cereal or baked dishes. Sandi and I toss them on salads, stir-fry, and into our nightly smoothie. They make an ideal addition to baked goods including breads, cakes and biscuits. Even our doggies get some daily and if you ask my neighbors, they are prolific.

Chia is at the least a silly gift, and at the most, a superfood. Ch, ch, ch choose good






