Southside woman still haunted by 50-year-old photo

In September of 1966 Beverly Wagner pulled out her Polaroid Camera and snapped some photos on the Southside of Indianapolis. One of those photos still leaves her mystified, almost 50 years later.

The Beatle's Eleanor Rigby and Yellow Submarine, and Donovan's Season of the Witch rolled lazily across the airwaves of downtown Indianapolis station WIFE as the month of September inched towards colder weather. The then 29 year old decided to do what any mother would do— record her son's ninth birthday celebration. However, one photo was not expected, revealing something totally unrelated to what was happening that day—a man on a horse!

The photos that day were taken at the home. Man on a horse? There was no prior Wild West show or a horse... only a series of photos centered on Beverly's house.

The #6 photo has a horse present in the center, with the figure of a man upon it. There is a shadow of the horse and rider (wearing a hat) on the left. This was not a photo that one would expect to pop out of a Polaroid on a son's birthday or any day for that matter. Beverly explains:

erly explains:

"I'm missing the first photo of the series, but #2 and #3 were in the backyard for my oldest son's birthday party. #4 was my father-in-law. #5 was a friend, her son, and me taken in my living room. #6 was the the horse. #7 was taken outside on my front porch with friend and my two boys." #7 is strange, with fuzziness from top to bottom to the right of these figures on the porch.

When this picture ejected from the camera, it shook her up. So much so that she has held onto it after all these years. Beverly feels the photo is a scene from a former time in the Southside area; an imprint of the past. There have been photos over the years depicting events and characters from the past, having no relevance to the time photos were actually taken. Beverly moved from the house in 1969. After losing her husband two years ago she relocated from Muncie back to Indianapolis and still on the south side, not far from her former address. Beverly states:

"Over the years I have experienced things

that couldn't really be explained—no proof—but I felt them, and always believed there is a lot more in this world than any of us really know about."

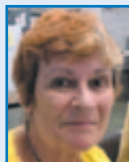
Q: What is the one thing you would most like to change about your Southside community?

Celebrating centennial

Henrietta Lawrence, retired St. Marks Catholic School teacher, turns 100 years old

The year 1915: baseball player Babe Ruth hit his first career home run, Einstein formulated his theory of general relativity, battles were taking place overseas during WWI, Ford produced its 1 millionth automobile and Theodore W Richards is the first American to win a Nobel Prize in chemistry. Locally, Southside resident Henrietta Lawrence was born on Aug. 12, 1915.

"I'm very happy that I've lived this long because I'm very well," Henrietta said. "I'm happy to be able to be around my friends and family."

Henrietta was born in Lafayette. She enrolled at Purdue University, concentrating in home economics, where she met her husband, Robert H. Lawrence, now deceased. When Robert enlisted in the Navy during WWII, the two of them moved away from home, residing in New York for a while. Henrietta said it was a happy day when her husband came out of the service and could spend his time at home. They had three children, Robert H. (Butch) Lawrence Jr., Marry Ellen (Krudy) Lawrence and Terrance W. Lawrence (deceased).

They moved to the Southside of Indianapolis in 1948. Henrietta lived near St. Mark Catholic Church from 1956 to 2007. She taught third, fourth and fifth grades and substituted for more than 25 years until she was 77. She was named Teacher of the Year twice.

"I enjoyed the children mostly," Henrietta said. "I enjoyed the whole thing."

Henrietta has eight grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren. She currently resides at St. Paul Hermitage where she enjoys playing bridge and reading.

She plans to spend her birthday this weekend with family and friends. Anyone wishing to send her a card or letter may send them to: Henrietta Lawrence, 501 N. 17th Ave., Room 149A, Beech Grove, IN. 46107.

Franklin Township plans to rebalance

The Franklin Township Community School Corporation announced that its Task Force, formed in 2013 to create a plan for rebalancing enrollment for the 2016-17 school year, will soon host informative community meetings. The Board of Education voted to reopen Acton Elementary School, which will make seven schools in the district for the 2016 year. The move was made to reduce overcrowding. Middle Schools are also at capacity, and enrollment projections show continued growth. The task force created a blog, ftrebalancing.blogspot.com, in an effort to keep the community informed on this process.

"Resetting the boundaries of an elementary school is not only a very unpopular process, but it is vital to the future success of our students," the blog states in a post on Aug. 11. "Learning in an overcrowded classroom is not conducive to success."

The school corporation will hold two community information meetings later this month. We firmly believe good schools create good communities, and it's great to see Franklin Township making such efforts to inform the community in this planning process. We encourage all residents and community stakeholders to join one of these meetings to learn more first-hand information about Franklin Township schools. The meetings are Aug. 25, 9:30 a.m. and Aug. 27, 6:30 p.m., both at the high school. There will be a community town hall meeting on Sept. 8 or 10 – to be announced. We look forward to hearing more about changes to come in Franklin Township!

Branden Throgmorton Greenwood firefighter looks forward to making a difference in the community

BEHIND the BADGE

Branden Throgmorton says he knew from a young age that he wanted to be a helper in the community.

"It is an opportunity to make a difference in people's lives," he said. "I look at it as bad things will happen regardless if we're here or not. It's an opportunity to make the most of those situations, or make them a little more bearable on the community that's affected by them."

Throgmorton grew up in Beech Grove, where his parents Gary and Toni still reside. He was homeschooled. He started taking EMT classes in 2009 and continued earning certifications that he needed to become a firefighter. He worked for Wishard Ambulance Service during that time. In 2012 he was hired full-time to the Franklin Fire Department. He was hired to the Greenwood Fire Department, serving at Station 91 on Main Street, in July 2014.

Throgmorton and his wife, Markie, reside in Franklin. Markie is a conservation officer in Johnson County, and he says her understanding of law enforcement has helped in the challenges of the job.

"My family has been very supportive of this opportunity, this career," he said. "If it wasn't for them pushing me along, there were probably a lot of times it would be easy to give up."

What was your inspiration to become a firefighter?

I grew up around public safety. My dad was a police officer for Indianapolis. I got that experience of being in a public safety family. At different public events, I'd get to look at the fire engines and see that side of things and see what the firehouse side was like... There's a lot of things that keep the work going day to day, but it's pretty neat to

be the light in a dark situation sometimes. You can make a difference when it really matters in someone's life.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

Delivering a baby, as nerve-racking as it was. That was Christmas of 2012. The lieutenant I worked with at the time had been in the fire service for 24 years and had never done that. It's kind of a rare thing, to get to deliver a baby.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

This job's pretty mentally challenging. There's a lot you have to see. A lot of the times people don't call us on their best day ever. They expect us to have the training, have the physical strength and mental ability to bring answers to their problems. It's hard not to bring that home with you.

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

Hunting, fishing, camping. I try to work on a lot of household projects and physical fitness on my days off. I run with my wife quite a bit.

What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

Professionally, to keep getting better at the job that I do. I finished paramedic class last year so that was a big accomplishment. My wife and I got married about three months ago. We're hoping to start a family eventually.

What would you have done if you hadn't of become a firefighter?

Something outdoors; a hunting guide or something like that would be exciting.

To be real Frank

Center Grove High School history teacher John Frank travels through Asia and Europe for curriculum development

John Frank spent 16 days in Japan this summer, focusing on peace education and how the Japanese teach about WWII. As part of a program funded through the Five Colleges Center in Massachusetts, Frank, who is an American history teacher for Center Grove High School, was there to help other teachers develop curriculum for their own classrooms.

"These kinds of experiences, I can take something which is cut and dry and make it more tangible," Frank said.

Frank, who is originally from South Bend, resides in the Center Grove area with his wife, Debra. He has two children. He taught at Greenwood Middle School before coming to Center Grove High School, where he's been for 28 years.

Frank took his first trip to Asia in 1992 as a teacher learning to develop curriculum. He received a Lilly Endowment grant which allowed him to travel to Europe. In 2002, he took another trip through the East Asian Studies Department at Indiana University. The department needed a Curriculum Consultant, a teacher who helps others develop lessons. He did that from 2003 to 2010. He worked with Five College Center in 2013 and 2015.

"With my background experience, it really helped me assist teachers, what is likely to work and what's not, length and appropriate level of subject matter for different grades and ages," Frank said.

Teachers range from elementary to high school levels, in all fields and all areas of the U.S. This summer, there were 50 applicants for 10 spots.

"It's been professionally rewarding and inspirational to be around a lot of great teachers every summer," he said.

Through his teaching career and through his personal vacations, Frank said that he's been to all 50 U.S. states, along with multiple countries in Europe and Asia. He's visited Hiroshima and Nagasaki multiple times, having been to both this summer, and said each time they get the opportunity to listen to the stories of survivors of the atomic bomb dropped during WWII, many times about the innocent lives that were lost as a result of modern warfare. He said that he enjoys being able to bring home and show his students objects that relate to their lessons, giving students a sense of being there as it makes history more realistic for them.

"I couldn't do all of this traveling on my own," Frank said. "These opportunities have come along and I've been very appreciative and thankful."

Frank said he's been able to bring a lot of lessons back to Center Grove. Things he can't use, he passes along to other teachers.

"It was helpful in supporting Japanese language (classes) here," Frank said. "Now that that's phased out, we've started a program on Chinese language. It's given me some connections and background to be helpful in fostering these programs... I'm awfully glad we're now offering Chinese. China is the largest economy in the world. In China today, there are as more people in school as there are people in the US. The Size of china is soaring. Our community, our school needs to be more globally oriented."

Frank said he is looking into another Japanese summer tour next year, but that will depend on funding. He said if he does go, his goal is to visit Taiwan for the first time. He said that he's thankful not only for the opportunities that he's had to travel and help other teachers, but for the support he gets at home from his school system and family. He said that he could never do it without his wife, Debra, who is a retired Franklin Central math teacher.

"After being gone a lot, every time I come back to Greenwood, Indiana, it's very nice," Frank said. "I have sup-

portive parents here in this community. It's a good school system. It's good to come back."

Getting to know John...

- I'm the archivist of our school. I keep a collection of records that goes back to the start of our school in 1884. I try to preserve everything. So many people in White River Township have moved in from somewhere else. So I think it's really important to give the kids in the community a sense of the past here and have them recognize the distinguished moments in the past here.
- I love being a grandfather. I have four granddaughters and one grandchild on the way.
- I have really enjoyed hiking and walking over the years. I've done a lot of that while in Asia and Europe.
- Favorite Asian travel destination: Hong Kong. It's a very interesting place to visit: very pretty, very global, very dynamic.

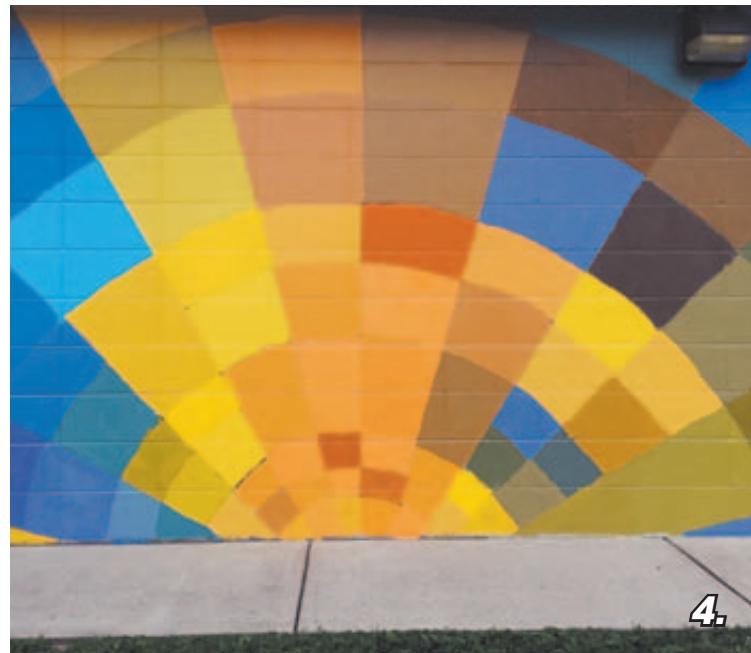

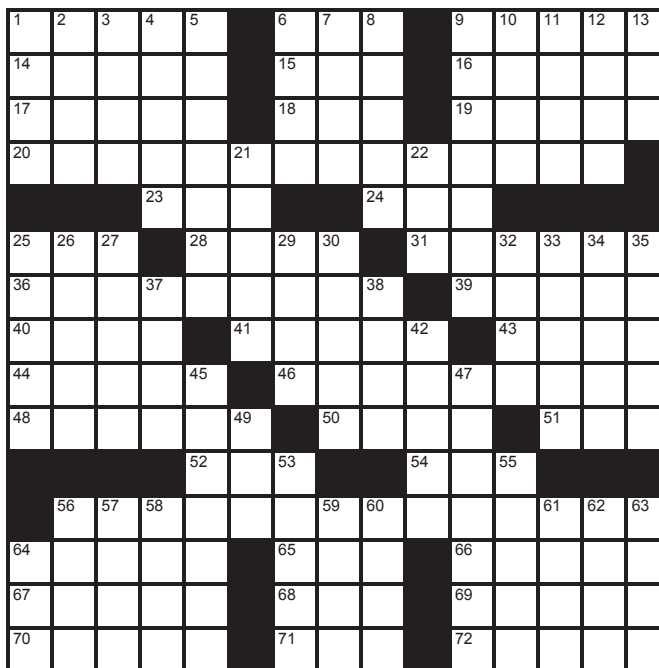

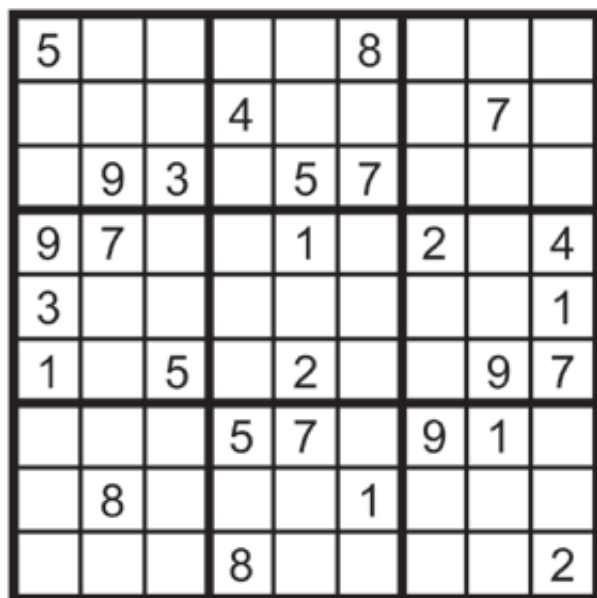

Question: "I have a co-worker who regularly uses 'aid' and 'aide' interchangeably, and it drives me crazy. Can you address this topic?"

Answer: I not only can, but will, dear reader!

"Aid" and "aide" are only a single letter apart, they sound the same and they have related meanings – so confusing them doesn't seem such an extraordinary thing.

Both words come to English by way of French, although "aid" traces its roots back to the Latin verb *ajduvare* — to be of use, be profitable, or to help, aid, encourage. "Aide" is actually the more modern of the two: it originated in the 1770s as *aide-de-campe*. A quick look at our friend the dictionary tells us an *aide-de-campe* was a military officer assigned to be an assistant to a senior officer. Thanks, Mr. Dictionary!

While that's interesting and all (if you happen to be a huge grammar nerd), it doesn't help us learn to use them without a bit of boiling down. So let's get boiling.

The number one thing to remember when distinguishing between these two words is that an "aide" is a person. So if you're referring to a helpful someone, call them an "aide."

"Aid," on the other hand, can be either a noun or a verb. As a noun, "aid" refers to help as an abstract object (ex. I was able to enjoy the musical thanks to my hearing aid.). As a verb, "aid" is the action of helping (ex. Calling Crime Stoppers may aid the police in catching criminals.).

And... that's it. Keep this one simple and you won't have any more problems with it. That's all for now, folks!

Ricki and the Flash... Streep shines despite bland story

As much as January and February are known as terrible times to visit the local theater, the month of August has also picked up a similar reputation. The kids begin heading back into the classroom, most of the summer blockbusters have already hit theaters, and the films that do come out in August are generally lacking. While the first weekend in August saw yet another Marvel film open in theaters, another film starring a seemingly perennial Oscar nominee also opened. *Ricki and the Flash*, featuring Meryl Streep, hit theaters.

Ricki and the Flash is the story of about a mother who essentially abandoned her family to achieve her dream of rock-n-roll stardom. Unfortunately for Ricki, her plan of making millions and playing sold out arenas didn't pan out. Instead, Ricki spends her evenings singing lead vocals on classic rock tunes in an old run down Los Angeles bar. Her days consist of working as a cashier at an organic supermarket.

One day, out of the blue, Ricki receives call from a familiar number, but chooses to ignore it. The unwanted calls keep coming and Ricki continues to ignore them until for some unexplainable reason, she decides to answer. It's her ex-husband informing Ricki their daughter is in a terrible place mentally. Ricki is quickly on the next plane to Indiana

to help nurse her daughter back to a better mental state. Of course, Ricki doesn't receive the warmest of welcomes from her daughter or her two other children.

Throughout the film, we're treated to several entire classic rock songs as Ricki and her band, the Flash, churn out the tunes. Unlike the music, for a fair chunk of the film, the script is pretty one-note. It continually makes notice of the fact that Ricki doesn't fit in with her family. They are a sophisticated, upper class group and she is not. The story just kind of moves along aimlessly, without any real twists or turns, to its predictable conclusion.

While the script feels uninspired, the acting for the most part, is as well. Everyone just plays this cardboard cutouts of characters we've seen dozens of times. Streep is the only one who has any life in the entire cast. She carries this film and is the only thing that salvages *Ricki and the Flash*.

Even with a bland script, Meryl Streep shows why she's received such acclaim throughout the years. While she won't be nominated for an Oscar for her performance, she is still the only reason to catch this film. 3 out of 5.

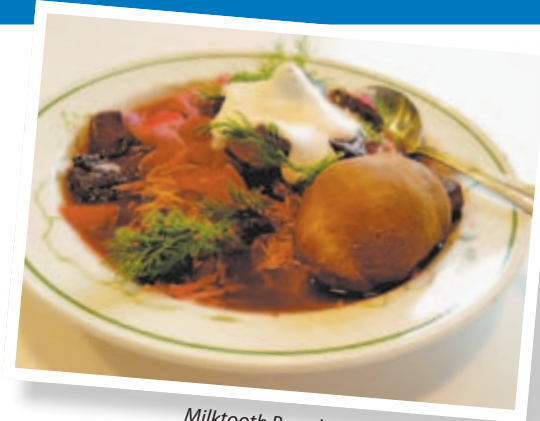

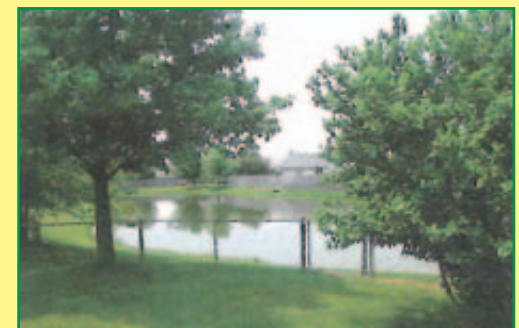

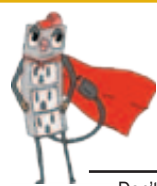
