

University Heights hosts special August meeting

MEETING - A lot has happened on parking in the University Heights Neighborhood Association area since its July meeting. So much that UHNA will hold a special meeting Aug. 25, 7pm at the UIndy Alumni House for a vote of the members to accelerate the process. Joseph Krebsbach, Deputy Chief at IFD, provided an evaluation of roadway access for safety vehicles in the UH neighborhood. He and others from engine 23 reviewed the streets and made the following recommendations to ensure access in case of fire or injury: Matthews Ave., Castle Ave. to Lawrence Ave. - parking should be prohibited on both sides of Matthews Ave. due to the narrow width of the street through this area; Edwards Ave., Shelby St. to State Ave. – parking be limited to the side of street opposite of fire hydrants; Mills Ave. and Markwood Ave., Bowman Ave. to Matthews Ave. - parking be limited to side of street opposite of fire hydrants. By-laws require that UHNA asks neighbors for a vote to support the parking changes.



Getting down in the rain

WAMMfest celebrates its 8th annual wine, art, microbrew and music festival

Raincoats and umbrellas were sported throughout Craig Park on Aug. 20 as people gathered to celebrate the 8th annual WAMMfest by the Sertoma Club of Greenwood.

"All things considered with the weather, the turnout is really good," said Nathan Huelsebusch of Taxman Brewing, who has attended for three years now. "The music, the community feel, being able to interact with your neighbors is always fun."

Rain did have an effect on the crowds, said the event's marketing chair, Christian Maslowski. The 3,500 attendees were about half of what WAMMfest saw last year.

"We were pleased with how steady the crowds were, although it was raining off and on throughout the day," Maslowski said. "People still came. Our vendors were still pleased. We never had to cancel any of the music performances, just a short delay during one of them. It was a very smooth-sailing day. If it were not for the rain, we are confident we would have as strong as an event attendance wise as we did last year."

New this year, WAMMfest added large screens to show the audience what was happening on state, and reconfigured the lawn for more dancing room. There were more arts booths and breweries than ever before.

"If you came, you got to see, taste and learn more this year than you ever had before," Maslowski said. "Interestingly, because the crowds were smaller, those that came had more one-on-one time with our artists and with our wineries, breweries and restaurants. That's great because folks that like microbreweries and craft wine like to talk to the makers, we like to learn how it's made."

The volunteer-run festival uses all of its net proceeds to contribute back to the community to support youth, individuals and community organizations.

Training Chief for Greenwood Fire Department serves the only city he's ever lived

Bryan Johns says there is nothing better than being able to serve - especially when it's his own hometown.

Johns graduated from Greenwood Community High School in 1990. He worked for Local 20 Sheet Metal for two years prior to working at Ford Motor Company. He was hired to the Greenwood Fire Department part time in 2004, then full time in 2005.

"It was the best move I ever made," Johns said. "Working in a factory, I started in production and took my apprenticeship test. I had hit the pinnacle of my career there. Granted you would keep honing your profession, but there was no room for growth or movement. I've been here 12 years now. When you get bored in one area, you can take classes, get trained in a different part of the trade here, go a different avenue."

In 2013, Johns was promoted to lieutenant. He became division chief of training in 2015. He also is part of Indiana Task Force 1, serving as a rescue specialist for the FEMA search and rescue team.

What was your inspiration to become a firefighter?

I was on the Emergency Response Team at the Ford Indianapolis Plant and we would go to Eastern Michigan University every year to compete against all the Ford plants from around the country. One year they had an industrial fire training trailer. I remember going inside in full gear and on air and thinking to myself this would be an awesome career. I came back that year, took my Fire I/II class and started with GFD part time.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

Every day I get to serve the citizens of the only city where I have ever lived. Unless you have been a public servant, it's hard to explain to people how rewarding it is to help others during their worst times. As the training chief, my most gratifying moment was this year. I was listening on the radio to our crews attempting to make a quick rescue of a trapped child in an upstairs bedroom. Our crews put into practice something we had taught multiple times over the last year. They did a textbook rescue that gave the child its best chance of survival.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

I have two part-time training lieutenants. We are in charge of making sure 100+ members are fully trained and ready to perform at their best at all times. You cannot just turn the switch off every night when you leave the office. This job is always on your mind and your crew's safety is always on your mind. It's hard to balance time here and at home.

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

Spending time with my wife and four kids, camping with the BSA Troop 266 and backpacking the Appalachian Trail. In the last three years, I have finished 1/4 of the 2,200

What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

When I hired in, I always said I wanted to be a leader in our organization. I have surpassed what I thought would be possible in 12 years. I will continue to strive to make sure our crews have the best training and I will continue to work as hard as I can to make sure they have the most up-to-date information to keep them safe during their careers here at GFD. Personally, I want to finish the Appalachian Trail by the age of 50 - so I have six more years.

What would you have done if you hadn't become a firefighter?

I was a plumber/pipe fitter at Ford Motor Company Indianapolis plant prior to GFD. I would have continued with them, but not here in Indianapolis. My family would have had to move to Chicago or Dearborn and we did not want to relocate with five generations of family here in Greenwood.

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In Good Company

Joe Cook will direct his final production, 10 years after co-founding Garfield Shakespeare Company

In the 10 years since Joe Cook cofounded Garfield Shakespeare Company, he's never sat out of a show. He's either directed or produced every play or musical, put on free for its audiences. He'll be handing down the reigns after the late summer production.

"People who don't know how these things all happen would be amazed if they followed me around, how much work is done during a show," he said. "I've loved it... I had my 75th birthday this year. We have a board with some younger people on it who I hope are going to be around. It's just time for me to turn this over."

It seemed fitting, Cook said, that his last production with Garfield Shakespeare Company will be Romeo & Juliet - one of his favorites to direct (the other favorite is Taming of the Shrew). Romeo & Juliet began Aug. 19 and 20, and will continue Aug. 26 and 27, Sept. 2 and 3 at 8 p.m. at the Garfield Park amphitheater. It is a 2 hour, 20 minute show and maintains a fast pace with no long scene changes.

'There's something about *Romeo & Juliet*," he said. "It's the play that has everything. For the first two and a half acts it plays like a comedy. It's a really fun show then it turns serious. It has the drama."

Cook is a retired teacher. He taught for nearly 40 years, primarily at Ben Davis High School.

"I was one of those people that taught 24/7," he said. "I was at school all day and took stacks of papers home and worked all evening. I needed something in my life that took me from the job. That turned out to be community theater."

He resided in Danville at the time. A lady was starting a community theatre group and had a call out for actors for Fiddler on the Roof.

"That was the one that got the bug," Cook said. "From that point on, for four years, I generally did six shows a year, backto-back. I worked largely in Hendricks County and Central Indiana where there were theaters I could audition."

After acting in many productions, he began directing. He was instrumental in helping revive Hendricks Civic Theater in the early 1980s. He helped begin Spotlight Players in the late '80s, which started in Danville and moved to North Salem, Ind., before he stepped down. Spotlight Players relocated again to Beech Grove and is currently in Lawrence. Both Hendricks Civic Theater and Spotlight Players are still in op-

"Along the line, I got interested in Shakespeare," Cook said. "I always had been, but it wasn't the theater I had been doing. I looked around. At that time, there wasn't a lot of Shakespeare being done in Indiana."

He moved to the Garfield Park South neighborhood in 2004.

"I had come to Garfield Park in the '80s and '90s because there was a Shakespeare in the Park program going on here," Cook said. "They did some good stuff but they had faded away. By 2004, when I moved into the neighborhood, there had not been much theatre happening here for about 10 years. The amphitheater was being used for concerts, but no theater. I came trudging over here one day and talked to the lady who was at that time in charge of (the Arts Center), Robin Williams. I asked what I would have to do to bring a new Shakespeare company into Garfield Park. She about fell off her chair. She said, would you believe the number one question I have had from people is 'are you going to bring Shakespeare back to Garfield Park?"

It took a couple of years, but Cook finally directed a show called Shakespeare's Lovers with a scene from each Shakespearean play. He was asked to direct Taming of the Shrew for Our Town Players in Franklin. It was such a success, that it was brought to Garfield Park for the first full production by Garfield Shakespeare Company, cofounded by Cook and his partner, Bradley Jones.

Jones has done most of the costume design since the theater company was founded, and will also step down after Romeo & Juliet concludes.

Since that first play, in partnership with Indy Parks, Cook has either directed or produced two shows a year in Garfield Park. A spring production is held in the Garfield Park Arts Center. The late summer production is in the amphitheater.

"We're here for two purposes: to give people a chance to act or participate in classic theater... and we're introducing not only Shakespeare but theater in general to a large number of people who have never seen a play before," Cook said. "We perform on a free admission basis. We have families that could not afford to go to a theatre... There was a little girl we heard on the way out saying to her parents, 'wasn't that wonderful; that was like a movie. but it was real people!' That's why we do it."

While Garfield Shakespeare Company has mostly hosted Shakespeare's productions, it has deviated. Three years ago, they saw a record au- Joe Cook dience of 800 people at the final performance of Camelot, which was done as a full-scale broadway musical with an orchestra.

Garfield Shakespeare Company has had a nice following over the years, Cook said, though he'd like to see audiences continue to grow. The productions continue to be offered at no charge and operate with all-volunteer crew and donations given.

"I'm very proud we've been able to build this for the community," Cook said.

Cook has no concrete plans for what he will do after he stops directing.

"Î've been saying I won't be involved in something else the-

atrical," Cook said. "Bradley laughs at me. My son laughs at me. Theater has been my life for about 40 years. I'd like to use my time to do something new and different. I can't say right now what that will be. I could be content to stay home, read my books, watch my videos but that probably won't last long. I don't know where you'll hear of me popping up next."



Door-to-door solicitation and peddling is prohibited

Recently our City Council passed an ordinance that prohibits door-to-door solicitation and peddling; this also includes food sales in area neighborhoods and dropping off handout materials. This ordinance was introduced after receiving many complaints about interruptions from citizens and the fact that people prefer not to answer their doors anymore to unfamiliar faces.

There are certain groups that are exempt from this ordinance. These groups include political parties and candidates running for elected office (although most wish they were), not-for-profit organizations and utility companies.

This ordinance takes effect on Sept. 1. Should you encounter door-to-door sales, or anyone knocking on your door asking to sell you food products from their vehicle please contact the police at 327-3811. War Dogs... nice, enjoyable late summer surprise

As the old saying goes, "the only things you can count on in life are death and tax-

es." While the conclusion of one's life and the government confiscating a percentage of your income are inevitabilities, there are perhaps others things that could make that unfortunate list. Some of those other unavoidable aspects of life include horrendous presidential candidates, and television news keeping a continual and steady focus on the most negative facets of

our society. Another one unlikely to disappear from our lives anytime soon is conflict. Why not learn to live with them, and even profit of them? The new film War Dogs takes that idea and runs with it.

War Dogs is a film based on the true story of David Packouz and Efraim Diveroli, two 20-somethings who won a \$300 million defense contract from the Pentagon. Thanks to an ever-present narration, we learn that David (Miles Teller) is a lot like most people in their 20s. He's directionless, unsure what to do with his life and has his fair share of problems. Soon after learning that he and his girlfriend are expecting, David runs into an old buddy, Efraim (Jonah Hill).

The foul-mouthed and shady Efraim is in the business of supplying guns and ammunition to armies around the world and he's looking to expand. After much prodding, Efraim eventually convinces David to join the gun-running business. While proving to be insanely profitable, their business venture doesn't quite turn out as they'd hoped. They are quickly delivering weapons to some of the most dangerous places on Earth and become the unlikely targets of massive govern-

ment investigation.

While War Dogs does puts forth an interesting tale of guns, greed and mistrust, it's fairly predictable. The two men experience a meteoric rise in the world of gun-running, going from one-bedroom apartments to multiple Miami penthouse suites and porches. However, as quickly as their empire rises, it all comes crashing down. There are a few surprises here and

there, but for the most part, the story is pretty standard faire.

Without a doubt the film's biggest strengths are it's two talented leads. Miles Teller is good in nearly everything in which he appears, but Jonah Hill is the real scenestealer. He's tremendously enjoyable as the cocky, arrogant and greedy Efraim, who always has an answer (usually the wrong one) for every situation. He outshines the alwaysgood Teller significantly.

War Dogs, isn't likely to make any top 10 lists for the year, but it's still a nice late summer surprise with two strong lead performances. 3.5 out of 5.




