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'O say can she sing!' Carly Brooke, 14-year-old Beech Grove resident, grows her singing career with her sights set on Nashville

Carly Brooke Lancaster first took the competition stage at 8 years old at the Marion County Fairgrounds. Singing 'Down in Mississippi' by Sugarland, she won first place and moved on to compete at the Indiana State Fair.

Now a 14-year-old freshman at Roncalli High School, Carly is a paid performer at both the Marion County and Indiana State Fairs. She will perform at the state fair on opening weekend, Aug. 6, 2 to 5:30 p.m.

Carly said she has been singing since she could talk.

"My parents always told me that I'd be three years old, singing Gretchen Wilson in the bathroom," she said. "It all started from there. I just knew that was exactly what I wanted to do."

She received her first guitar at four years old, but said she didn't get started playing until she was closer to seven or eight, when she started singing publically as well.

"We always tell this story that she was going to compete at the Marion County Fair at 8 years old," said Carly's mom, Stacey Lancaster. "We were in the front room. She was about to practice for her Sugarland song. I said, if you would win, you would then have to go to the state fair and perform. All the winners of the county fairs go against each other at the state fair. She had these big brown eyes and was just looking at me. When she won at Marion County and the tears were just flying, I've never seen someone more appreciative of what she has been dealt so far."

Carly has won the Marion County Fair competition four times. She earned third place at the Indiana State Fair. She began singing monthly at Teddy's Burger Joint, 222 W. Southport Rd., Indianapolis, at age 11. Her brother, Cole, a recent Roncalli graduate, began playing bass guitar for her three years ago. Summer is typically their busiest season.

Carly sings under her first and middle name, Carly Brooke. She describes her music as country, bluesy, with a little bit of rock.

"I really like the classic country as well. It's a little bit of everything. I love singing Johnny Cash – *Folsom Prison Blues*. My brother gets to chime in on that one with me."

August 2015, Carly received the opportunity to sing the National Anthem for the Indianapolis Colts.

"It was just amazing," Carly said. "It was one of those things that I just knew was a high point in my career so far. It secured that this is exactly what I wanted to do. There were more people watching than I thought. They told me about 10 minutes before I went on that it would be broadcast live on TV in Indianapolis and Chicago since the game was against the Bears."

Since then, she said she has had offers to sing at many local restaurants. She has begun singing monthly at the Stacked Pickle on Southport Road and Hops & Fire in Greenwood. She also performs annually at the Beech Grove Fall Festival. She travels to Nashville, Tenn. every couple of months, singing at places such as the Opry Mills Mall

or Tootsie's Orchid Lounge.

When she's not performing, Carly maintains her high grades. She previously attended Holy Name Catholic School, where she was involved in the drama club last year. She played Sandy in the musical, *Grease*. She says she looks forward trying theater at Roncalli.

Carly stopped taking lessons a few years ago, and is mostly self-taught. She has learned how to play the ukulele, mandolin, piano and electric guitar.

"She's always on her guitar, always singing," Stacey said. "There's not a day that goes by that she's not doing something... Nothing makes me prouder than when I can sit back and let others take in her talent. She's very driven. I'll be shocked if she doesn't pursue this to the fullest one day."

The Lancaster family plans to move next summer to Tennessee, where the family enjoys the warmer weather and Cole wants to attend

college at Middle Tennessee State. Carly said she loves performing in Nashville, and would welcome the idea of being in a city with like-minded people who appreciate music.

"It's a different element when you take her and place her in

her zone," Stacey said. "The goal is next year to make the big move, but never forget home. We want her to still perform here in Beech Grove. Her little hometown of Beech Grove has kept her very out there – the parade every year and the fall festival since she was eight. We get shocked every year at how much it progresses."

At the moment, she is in the process of writing her first EP (extended play, or small album).

"I'm trying to figure out what my style/sound is. I can have it officially known that I'm a songwriter and get that out there... I just love being creative. I love writing and seeing the different chord progressions, the feeling you get when you're given a gift like that and you can share it with people. It's a general love for music. I love people's reactions when I am able to sing for them."

COMMON COUNCIL**

Meeting, August 1

■ **What happened:** Ordinance 16-43 went up for a public hearing and passed second reading.

■ **What it means:** Ordinance 16-43 states that the use of consumer fireworks is prohibited within Greenwood city limits except between 5 p.m. and 2 hours after sunset June 4- July 11, between 10 a.m. and midnight July 4, and 10 a.m. Dec. 31 and 1 a.m. Jan. 1.

■ **What's next:** Ordinance 16-43 will go into effect.

In brief:

Kayleigh Carlin, a member of the City of Greenwood's finance department, addressed the council about Greenwood's Find It/Fix It campaign. The campaign strives to improve the water quality in the City of Greenwood. It aims to correct illegal sump pumps and downspouts within the city. "This is clean water that doesn't need to be treated, but is entering the system," stated attorney Krista Taggart. "We are sending all that clean water to be treated when it doesn't necessarily have to be." By fixing this issue the cost for treating the water will be lowered.

CITY COUNCIL**

Meeting, August 1

■ **What happened:** Ordinances 13, 15 and 16 were approved on second reading. Ordinance 14 was approved on third and final reading.

■ **What it means:** Ordinance 13 establishes fees for building permits. The council previously formed a committee to research the topic further. The committee amended the ordinance, changing the suggested fees.

Ordinance 14 would prohibit door-to-door sales and sales of second-hand goods, with exemptions such as protection of religious and political speech.

Ordinance 15 has to do with fee structures in the City Court. There were fines that were too small to act as a deterrent to violators. The fees were already set by the city in previous ordi-

nances.

Ordinance 16 repeals an old ordinance pertaining to massage parlors. The ordinance was rewritten to pertain to massage therapy, requiring these businesses to obtain a yearly license and be subject to inspection. There are three massage therapy businesses in Beech Grove.

Ordinance 17 appropriates funds for the city to do additional paving projects this year. The city will apply for these funds to be matched by the Indiana Department of Environmental Management.

■ **What happened:** Ordinances 18, 19 and 20 were introduced and approved on first reading.

■ **What it means:** Ordinance 18 prohibits parking on Adelaide Street from Butler east to the dead end, on Butler Avenue from Elmwood north to the high school parking lot, and on Park Emerson from Emerson Avenue to Butler.

Ordinance 19 states stop signs will be placed at the Adelaide and Butler intersection, Butler and Park Emerson intersection and Feeder Drive at Butler.

Ordinance 20 establishes guidelines for social media sites belonging to city entities such as the police department, fire department and parks department. Recently, the police and city Facebook pages after a lawsuit alleging the plaintiffs' first amendment rights were violated when comments were removed. The city page will not be restored. The guidelines state that comments on these social media sites will be monitored. Comments will be removed if they are deemed unrelated to the page, obscenities, reveals personal information, containing fighting words, fraud, defamation, solicitation and more.

■ **What's next:** These ordinances will undergo second reading at the Tuesday, Sept. 6 council meeting.

Patrolling the streets of the Southeast District, IMPD officer Jamie Guilfooy says there's not a lot of downtime – and that's something he enjoys.

"There are a lot of people with need out there, that need us to be out there," he said. "There are a lot of good people in these neighborhoods who have been here a long time. We try to get to know them. The neighborhood they knew 10, 20, 30 years ago isn't the same neighborhood they know now. It's nice to give them peace. Fountain Square is making a comeback, though."

Guilfooy grew up in Irvington, attending Our Lady of the Lord Catholic School and graduating from Scecina Memorial High School. He attended the College of Mount St. Joseph in Cincinnati before transferring to Indiana University Purdue University Indianapolis. He still resides in Irvington, with two daughters, Leah and Cara.

Guilfooy was hired to the Indianapolis Police Department in 1998. He served three years on the South District before moving to the Southeast District as a narcotics detective in 2001. He joined the Metro Drug Task Force in 2007. In 2010, he returned to the IMPD Southeast District, patrolling the same area where he first started his career.

drug addicts, a lot of homelessness. It breaks my heart, especially the homeless people who don't have anything. You do what you can, throw them a water or I gave a guy a shirt a couple weeks ago. It's sad to see the people who have to live like that. They're struggling for food every day. Then the thing at the center of all police officers is the heroin epidemic. People are overdosing on it every day. It's destroying lives and families.

What was your inspiration to become a police officer?

I was never the person that wanted to be a police officer. My brother was hired by IPD in 1996 and I had an uncle on the department. It was something I started getting interested in because they were both police officers. The more I looked into it, coming out and doing ride alongs with them, the more I realized it interested me and was something I could be good at.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

There's many. Mainly it's when you can make somebody's day a little better. Usually when people call us, they're having a pretty bad day. If you can give them any relief or help them in any way that makes them feel better, give them a shoulder to cry on if you need to, that's the best thing you can do as a police officer.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

I work in the Fountain Square, Twin Aire and Christian Park area; a lot of what I see is

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

I enjoy being a father. I have two girls, five and seven. I spend most of my time with them. I'm a sports guy. I enjoy football, going to Colts games, Pacer games. I love golfing. I enjoy hanging out with my friends when we all have time. My closest friends are people I grew up with; we're very tight.

What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

I enjoy what I'm doing now, working the street, working with veteran officers and young officers that are coming out. I don't have any specific goals in mind. I like to be out here, be a good officer, teach these young officers how to do things the right way and let them know I'm someone they can lean on.

What would you have done if you hadn't become a police officer?

I had a lot of jobs before I was a police officer. I never enjoyed any of them. Probably something in public safety – a firefighter.

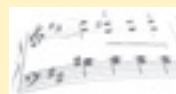

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Sharing in life's abundance

Zoë Facility Services will soon reach its 15th anniversary, and owners Greg and Nickole Huffman said they expect business to grow by 100 percent next year and continue getting bigger.

Not wanting to lose sight of what the company is about, Zoë has launched a partnership with the African Hospitality Institute, celebrating with a gala on Aug. 27, to raise funds for this school that provides job training to students in Uganda.

"We are so thankful for the last 15 years and what we have learned, who we have met, and the amazing businesses we have served in Johnson and surrounding counties," Nickole said. "As we look back and are thankful for what we have accomplished thus far, we are eager to look ahead and see what can be accomplished in the next 15."

Before going into business, Greg attended Indiana University, getting a job after college cleaning apartment hallways and office buildings to pay off his debt. He then joined Youth With a Mission (YWAM), and became involved with ministries in downtown Indianapolis. He met Nickole through those missions and they later married, now residing in the Center Grove area.

A carpenter by trade, Greg learned in his and Nickole's first year of marriage that he would be laid off. He decided to incorporate his own company, calling it Zoë Cleaning Services. Zoë stands for the Greek word for "life." In the Bible, John 10:10 states "I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full."

"The way we read it in English is that you might have an abundant life," Greg said. "It's about a life of purpose, understanding, meaning and freedom... Right off the bat, I thought this business was a way to put some kids from youth group to work and work alongside them."

The layoff didn't last long, so Greg went back to work while running Zoë Cleaning Services as more of a small business in which he was self-employed. It earned enough income to pay the bills and help youth find work. They cleaned apartment hallways, some residential, small office buildings and most of the work was done for major camp and retreat facilities in central and southern Indiana.

In 2008, Greg and Nickole had their first of two children. There had been a lot of growing success with the business, but Greg said he felt like he wasn't doing what he wanted between work, the business, home and his ministries.

"I started going through the idea that what if I could run my own business and not be self-employed?" Greg said, "I had some good ideas. Then the flood happened in 2008. We lost our house, our office and a lot of our equipment. I had this idea that we could either ride this wave out or we could sink. I asked my wife to take on the flood insurance; we divided and conquered... Right after that, I got rid of 30 percent of our business. I knew I needed time to build something different. We rented a condo in Greenwood/Whiteland. It was small. But I was able to focus on family and work. We grew 64 percent over what I got rid of in 2008, in 09. I was at the beginning stages of learning what it was going to be to run a business."

The name was changed to Zoë Facility Services, and is now the largest, privately-owned commercial cleaning company in Johnson County. Greg said business has grown on average 60 percent every year since 2009. There are currently 50 employees.

"We intentionally slowed down last year because we realized we didn't have the processes in place to make this as successful as it has been for the long term," Greg said. "We're there and we're ready to do that, so we brought on our first full time sales department; all our business had come from word of mouth."

Through the changes, Greg and Nickole still wanted the focus of the company to remain about "life."

Nickole said a couple of years ago, she read a book called *Love Does* by Bob Goff, who is active in social justice issues. He had started a school in Uganda.

"In the back of his book, he puts his phone number," Nickole said. "After reading this book, I was highly inspired. I called him. He answered, which I couldn't believe. He said 'I'm going to Uganda in a few weeks, you should come with me.' I spoke with Greg and said 'do you think we could go?' Within six months, I planned a trip for our family of four. We were in Uganda for 10 days and did a lot of work. We didn't call it a mission trip. We called it our adventure. On the way to the school, we were told to stay at AHI."

AHI is a school run by Maggie Josiah for 18 to 20-year-old students, teaching them hospitality skills. The first year, the students have classes and the second year they intern unpaid. The Huffman's stayed in the guest house where students can practice their skills.

Employment rate in this school is 100 percent in an area where the unemployment rate is 80 percent. Nickole went to visit AHI a second time with friends. Recently, they asked Maggie of the school's needs, and have organized a way to fund some of them.

"We spent the last couple of years really establishing who we are and what our brand is, trying to figure out how to let our employees know that," Greg said. "We saw a challenge of how do we show employees that the work they do with their hands can help other people? ... One thing we wanted to do is give them something that the company clearly falls behind."

The gala, Life Beyond Clean, Life Beyond Borders: A Zoë Celebration Gala, is Aug. 27, 6 p.m. at Sanctuary on Penn, 701 N. Pennsylvania St., Indianapolis. It is black tie optional. Greg, Nickole and a couple of Zoë employees traveled to Uganda together in July, bringing back local art and items for a silent auction at the event. The goal is to raise \$30,000 to help fund the school and its needs. For more information, visit beyond-clean.com/gala.

"To see the vision of what Zoë is supposed to be like actually coming to fruition, seeing the positive impact on the employees, the community and places around the world is really neat," Nickole said.

Balanced efforts

One risk of relying exclusively on organic search traffic is that small changes in rankings can make a hefty impact on sales. How you approach the effort to grow visibility matters.

With brick & mortar, businesses traffic patterns are predictable. Street traffic seldom appears or disappears without advance notice. But, suppose you have a website that's plugging along with a steady stream of traffic as your site floats around the #3 position in Google's organic (free) results for relevant keywords. Knowing that your sales volume could be better with higher positions, you get quotes from digital marketing agencies and hire the one with the lowest bid. Weeks later you check your email and gasp as you see several times more orders than usual. It's working!

You add staff, invest in equipment, lease more space and watch the business grow a nice profit.

Then, one day your Inbox isn't packed with order notifications. The eerie calm in the office is deafening. You test your order forms. They work fine. A peek into your campaign's analytics reveals that keyword searches that once listed your site #1 now put yours somewhere near the bottom of the page, down in "no click" land.

Deeper analysis could reveal outdated techniques, shortcuts that cut corners and worked only briefly before backfiring. Or, maybe Google ran an update. Whatever the cause, such a decline puts jobs at risk and can take months of costly work to recover, especially if the previously impressive positions were gained by cheap tactics.

How to reduce the volatility risk:

1. Beware of cheap SEO bids. Holding onto organic rankings takes a lot of work. Taking shortcuts due to squeezed budgets get penalized.
2. Organic efforts usually yield the best returns in the long run, but paid search is immediate, predictable, and keeps traffic flowing even if organic rankings slip.
3. Offline ads bring customers and may boost rankings while helping to boost rankings.

Zip City offers indoor zipline, trampolines, laser tag, rock climbing, soccer and more in Perry Township

When Scott Weiner first walked into the building at 6650 Bluff Road in Perry Township, he says it only took him a couple of seconds to decide he was going to buy it. Nothing could be more fitting for the image he had in his head for his business, Zip City.

The 60,000 square foot building is now home to a 250-foot zipline, trampolines, soccer field rock climbing wall, laser tag and more. There is a concession stand that serves high-quality food, beverages and beer and wine.

"I think this is the crown jewel," Weiner said. "If I build any more, I don't think anything will be better for this. The building needed so little work and had so much to offer. It was a miracle. It was the perfect fit."

This is Weiner's third Zip City facility, and the largest. He has plans to continue to grow the business on the 10-acre property, with a possible water park with near-vertical speed slides and rope course outside – in a couple of years.

"It's a great idea," said manager, Randy Cobb. He and his wife have been in sports management for 32 years. "The Southside desperately needed something like this. There has been a lot of places come and go over the years. We don't plan on being one of those places. We have a lot of fun things for the kids."

Having opened in July, Zip City will celebrate its grand opening on Sept. 29. Zip City in Indianapolis is now open Tuesday through Thursday, 3:45 – 8 p.m.; Friday 3:45 – 10 p.m.; Saturday 12 – 9 p.m.; and Sunday 12 – 6 p.m.

Here, Weiner shares more about the business:

Why did you open this business?

I began in Cleveland. I bought land for some real estate before the 2008 crash. We were going to build a shopping center in 2007. In 2008 that was not a good idea. I was sitting on this land and saw the trampoline parks popping up. I didn't want to compete with them. I got the idea for indoor zipline. It flew into my head one day. I was dumbfounded that this didn't exist.

What did you do to prepare for opening your business?

I opened two previous businesses. In Indianapolis – this building I found on the web for sale. It was huge and pristine and needed a small makeover, carpeting, paint, redo the bathrooms, new lighting, cosmetic stuff. We took out all of the basketball courts and put in everything you see on the web site. We put in a soccer field and maintained our soccer leagues.

Who is your ideal customer/client?

The core age group is 5 to 15, however, I have seen little three year olds go down the zipline with absolutely no fear. You need to be 30 pounds. I've also seen a 90-year-old man do this... Moms do this, everybody. But the core is 5 – 15.

How do you plan to be successful?

We offer Knocker Soccer, soccer, trampoline, rock wall, laser tag and zip line. We can package them. We'll do two hours of unlimited, go bonkers, crazy and do everything you want for \$21.95. The whole key to success is being able to package things, multiple events together, and charge a lower fee.

What would we be surprised to learn about you or your company?

Between the three facilities, I have five full-time people and almost 200 part-time people. It's much easier to run than you would think. I only really have to delegate with five people and not 200. The way it's set up, we have incredible management. Once it gets going, it almost runs itself, if you have the right people running it and I do.

Bad Moms... Funniest, best comedy of 2016

Being a parent has to be the most challenging job title that one can assume. Children require an excessive amount of attention, patience and financial resources. The constant pressures and obligations of parenthood could likely drive even the sanest person to their breaking point. For those attempting to go at that parenting thing alone or with little help from the other individual, children could easily be seen as a massive burden. However, most parents are likely to say children are a blessing. The new film *Bad Moms* is about those times when parenthood pushes even the best of parents to their breaking points.

Bad Moms is the story of Amy (Mila Kunis) who, because of the pressures of her job, being a mother and her marriage, always seems to be running behind. Finally pushed to the brink due to her crumbling marriage and the mean, overbearing PTA president (Christina Applegate), Amy decides to quit trying. Joining her in being a bad mom are Kiki (Kristen Bell) and Carla (Kathryn Hahn). Together the three moms indulge their every desire, skipping out on work, partying like college students, and neglecting a number of their motherly duties. However, even though disregarding their responsibilities proves to be freeing initially, it doesn’t bring about long lasting happiness.

After a relatively slow start with minimal laughs, once the film gets going the laughs and jokes keep coming at a pretty regular pace. Thanks in large part to the hysterical and scene-stealing performance of Kathryn Hahn; *Bad Moms* is elevated to more than just another comedy. Mila Kunis and even Kristen Bell, provide a few laughs, however it’s Hahn who outshines both of them with her willingness to try just about anything.

While *Bad Moms* has more jokes hit than miss, the storyline often falls into cliché territory. At times the film feels like a more grown up, and much more profane *Mean Girls*. Amy, Kiki, and Carla team up against Gwendolyn and her two cohorts, in a winner takes all brawl of pranks and underhanded tricks. It’s the biggest and most apparent flaw of the film.

Bad Moms is a raunchy R-rated comedy written and directed by two of the men behind *The Hangover* films. However, it’s easily funnier than any of the three *Hangover* movies. Despite a storyline that is a tad bit cliché, *Bad Moms* still manages to be the best comedy of 2016 thus far. 3.5 out of 5.

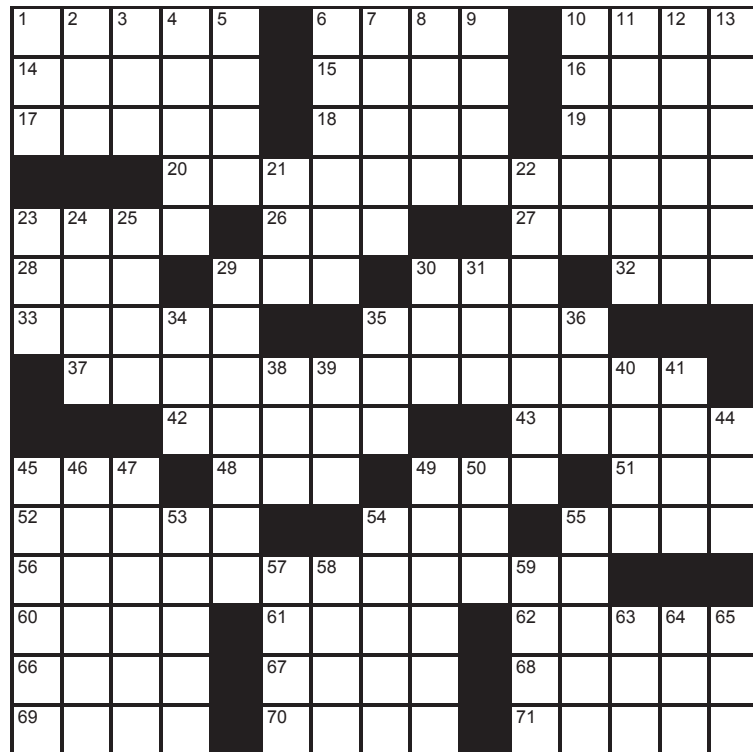

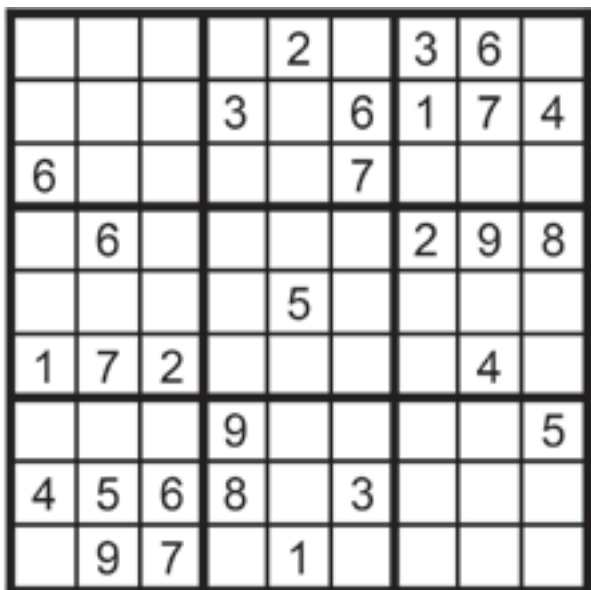

Meet your meat

NUTRITION

It's summertime and the grillin' is prolific. Sizzling hamburgers on white bread bun are summer icons in the pantheon of American sandwiches. There's no substitute for a juicy grilled hamburger, but change can be a good thing when done for righteous reasons; like reaching your highest potential.

In a populace of die-hard meat eaters, the hardest thing to admit is that your favorite foods might be the source of your ill health and obesity problems. Meat consumption in the US has declined. If you are cutting back on meat, and many are, please continue.

Mintel Global Marketing statistics report Americans are stepping away from the meat counter. The main reason: health. They are cutting back on animal fat and cholesterol. John's Hopkin's School of Public Health say rising costs and environmental concerns reduce meat consumption. According to the Department of Agriculture, it's not just the weak economy; it's for improved health and animal rights too. NY Times columnist Mark Bittman observes, "There's a real long-term trend here. Beef consumption has been in decline for about 20 years; the drop in chicken is even more dramatic, over the last five years or so; pork also has been steadily slipping."

Why is this happening? The Daily Livestock Report blames, "Rising meat prices in the US. As countries like China and India get richer, they're eating more meat, which



drives up U.S. exports and making beef, pork, and chicken more expensive here at home."

Grilling? Raise the grill so burgers don't burn. A Consumer Reports News study warns that charred meat increases cancer risk: "People who regularly eat burned or charred red meat have a whopping 60 percent higher risk of pancreatic cancer." According to data presented at the American Association for Cancer Research 100th Annual Meeting 2009, researchers said well done and very well done meats cooked by frying, grilling, or barbecuing can form carcinogens which do not form when meat is baked or stewed. "We found that those who preferred very well-done steak were almost 60 percent more likely to get pancreatic cancer."

Meat has "zero" fiber, antioxidants, phytochemicals, and helpful nutrients, and it contains high concentrations of potential carcinogens, which may increase your temple's risk of developing many kinds of cancer. On the other hand, vegetarian diets and diets rich in high-fiber plant foods such as whole grains, legumes, vegetables, and fruits offer disease protection. What's it going be?
