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Increasing crime has become a possession of sorts

The reports regarding crime in Indianapolis for 2015 are staggering....

Fox News 59 states that Indianapolis is ranked in the top ten cities for murder, with it and Houston, Texas rising in these statistics from the years 2013 and 2014. In 2015 the Circle City, that you and I call home, culminated with 135 murders and 151 homicides. 409 victims sustained non-fatal shootings. Public Safety Director Troy Riggs states that approximately 44 percent of victims—and suspects—are between the ages of 15 to 24 years old. Ninety-two percent of homicide suspects have a criminal past, while 83 percent of homicide victims also have this past moniker.

People, please! Have we returned to the days of the Wild West?

Indianapolis SWAT teams are getting a workout. New Mayor Joe Hogsett, along with Riggs and IMPD Chief Rick Hite, have a plan that will concentrate on heavier patrols in six hot zones of the city. Hoggset's view on managing crime differs from that of former Mayor Greg Ballard. Yet...will it be enough?

For Mayor Ballard, try as he might, it escalated into a situation beyond his control. We are dealing with the basic tenants of evil here, with mean and nasty folks who have no regard for the sanctity of life. Are these trolls just a product of their environment or up-bringing? Some would claim that it is, which

I think is just a wash to explain away the unexplainable. It's become a possession of sorts—paranormal—or however you want to phrase it; and there's no easy fix for that.

Will the addition of more officers and increased patrols solve the problem? 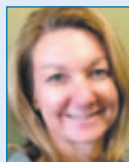

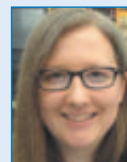
Q: If you could go away for the rest of the winter where would you go if time, money and other responsibilities weren't issues?

Greenwood Mayor Mark W. Myers delivered his fifth State of the City address to a crowd of nearly 300 business leaders, community advocates and Greenwood citizens on Feb. 19. The event was hosted by the Greater Greenwood Chamber of Commerce. Highlights of Myers' speech included financial achievements such as offering a transparent and balanced budget with operating funds above a 50 percent reserve, an increase in economic development and the success of the city's six TIF districts, upcoming projects such as downtown revitalization and the \$2.5 million renovations to the Greenwood Community Center, an increase in public safety and a continued focus of improvements to city parks and trails. The students competed against one another in the Dow Indianapolis South You Be the Chemist Challenge® – an academic question-and-answer competition created by the Chemical Educational Foundation (CEF). The Dow Indianapolis South Challenge aims to engage grade 6-8 students in chemistry through a dynamic event that partners industry members with schools and organizations in the communities in which they operate.

The Indianapolis South local-level portion of the Challenge, held at the University of Indianapolis, was sponsored by Dow AgroSciences. Avoiding the extinction of cursive

A few years back, Indiana lawmakers – in all of their infinite wisdom – voted to remove the teaching of cursive writing to our school-aged children. A direct result of the high-stake testing that each school faces. What could be removed from curriculum that wasn't on the "test?" The answer was cursive. The repercussions are starting show. While some school districts maintained the teaching of cursive, many of our local schools did not. It is disturbing to see a fifth grade student who cannot sign his name on a piece of paper. What will happen when this youngster grows up and goes to sign a legal document and has to print his name? Perhaps even more disturbing is the idea that there are children out there who are unable to read the documents on which this country, the greatest country in the world, was founded. As unpleasant and outlandish as it is that some our children are not taught cursive, there is still hope. It is the responsibility now of parents to teach their children to write and read cursive. Yes, it will take a little bit of time and sacrifice on our parts; however, the outcome will be worth it. Children cannot learn everything in school, so it is up to us. They are, after all, our children. It is imperative that the young people of the Southside learn this basic fundamental of manuscript writing. Go to any local teacher supply store or any place of the like, and pick up a tablet of paper for your child. No electronics, no technology. Just pen and paper. Take 10 minutes a day and teach this simple skill.

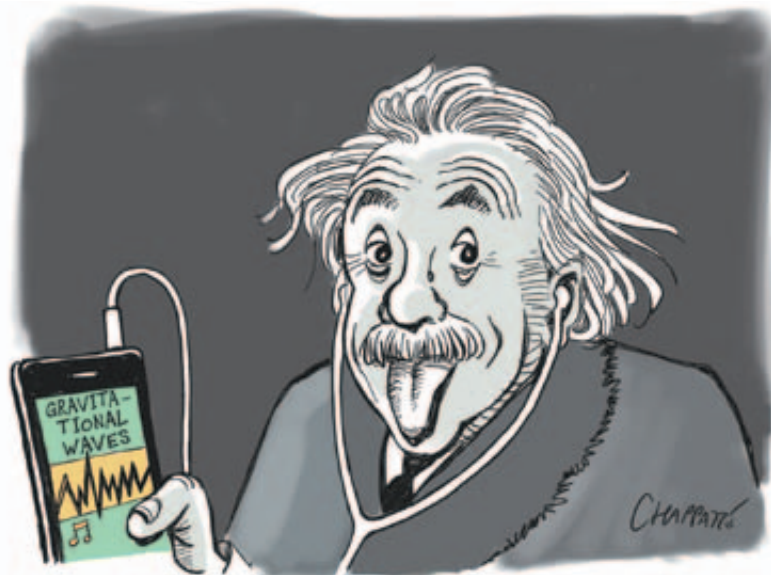

Dropping a (heart) bomb

**Restore Old Town
Greenwood and Girl Scout
troop show love for Polk Place
and preservation**

Supporters of the effort to preserve the James T. and Laura Polk Memorial Community House convened on Feb. 21 for a heart bombing of the structure on South Madison Street in Greenwood. Heart bombings are intended to raise community awareness of historic buildings. Opened in 1920, the Community House had an auditorium, a gymnasium, and a pool. The facility has been the home of civic clubs, a movie theater, an amateur theatrical troupe, and for a time, the offices of municipal government. Members of Restore Old Town Greenwood were joined by a few members of Junior Girl Scout Troop 211 as they made and decorated hearts from construction paper. The group then hiked to the steps of the Community House to bomb the building with affection. The Girl Scouts' participation was another step toward earning the Bronze Award, which signifies completion of service projects.

Chance to DANCE

Girls who may not otherwise attend prom this year due to the high expense will have a selection of four to five hundred dresses, shoes, jewelry, evening bags and wraps to choose from on March 5.

Project Prom, founded by Beech Grove resident and business owner Kim Browning, gives high school girls financial relief so they can attend an event most dream about.

"It just feels so good to see the look on the girls' faces," Browning said, "the look of relief when they find the perfect dress and all of the accessories to go with it, to let them enjoy their prom and not have to worry about the financial aspect of it."

Browning is originally from Shelby County, graduating from Triton Central High School. While attending Ball State University for journalism, she began cutting hair to make money. A year later she left Ball State to attend cosmetology school. She was part-owner for 10 Supercuts salons in the Indianapolis area before opening her own business. She had moved to Beech Grove in 1983, opening The Vault at 700 Main St. in Beech Grove in 2006.

"The Vault is a very interesting place," Browning said. "It's housed in about a 100-year-old bank building and still has the original vault... It's a very laid-back, no drama type of place. I started with just myself in 2006. I wanted to have a place that I could do everything I love under one roof: doing hair, Mary Kay makeup, vintage clothes and antique jewelry. As the business grew, I just started adding people. We have eight chairs in the salon; we currently have seven stylists."

Browning will celebrate the 10-year anniversary of The Vault in May, and said she hopes to host a block party and fashion show to showcase the hairstylists' work. Browning said after all these years, hair is still her number one passion. She continues to have fun in the business every day, laughing together with the stylists while they support one another and their clientele.

"When you're looking for a new hairstylist, it's kind of like going on a blind date," Browning said. "You have expectations, you're nervous and excited. Sometimes your expectations are met, sometimes they're not. So if someone is coming to The Vault for the first time, we try to find out about the person, their personality, lifestyle, hairstyle they have in mind and try to match them up with

the stylist that is the best fit for their 'first date.'"

A few years before opening The Vault, Browning said she was cutting a girl's hair and asked if she was going to prom.

"She said 'no, I can't afford to go,'" she said. "I have sons so it didn't occur to me how expensive it is to go to prom these days. I started asking my friends who have daughters, 'what do you do with your prom dresses?' I started collecting prom dresses, jewelry. I started collecting things that were still good and people could use."

Browning began Project Prom by asking high school counselors if they knew of girls who might need a dress, starting with Triton Central then Beech Grove. They helped nine girls in the first year.

"Now we help all the high schools in the Indianapolis area," she said. "The most girls we outfitted one year was 75. That was four years ago. Since then, other people have started doing similar things, so now the need is spread out through different groups."

Browning said in the beginning, she and a friend would load dresses into a van and take them to the high schools. A few years later, girls could come to her salon and pick out dresses. It grew to be too big, so she partnered with Flanner & Buchanan Community Life Center, which gives use of its ballroom for the event and provides storage for remaining clothing. Dresses are organized by size and color, allowing girls to come in and easily find what they want.

"I like to help people," Browning said. "I've done all sorts of things to help people over the years but this is by far the biggest."

This year's event is March 5, 10 a.m. – 2 p.m. at Flanner & Buchanan Community Life Center in Indianapolis. They are still accepting recipients of the outfits and volunteers for the day. Girls can RSVP to brownink1@aol.com or by calling The Vault at (317) 784-4000.

Browning said she looks forward to "seeing the smiles on the girls' faces. Sometimes they can't believe people are doing this for a complete stranger. People that donate the dresses will never see the girl that chooses the dress but the dress gets to have another life, a second chance on the dance floor. Seeing the girls get to receive these acts of kindness from complete stranger, it's planting seeds that hopefully will help them want to pay it forward in the future."

Ian McLaughlin**Johnson County deputy experiences the positive impact of law enforcement and works to spread that even further**

Seeing the positive impact that law enforcement officials can have on a community, Ian McLaughlin said he was inspired at a young age to pursue that career field.

McLaughlin grew up in Greenwood, graduating from Greenwood Community High School. He studied criminal justice and psychology at Indiana University, spending a year participating in the cadet program there before entering the law enforcement academy in Bloomington. In his senior year, he worked part time as a police officer with the IU police department.

After college, McLaughlin served as a reserve officer with the Johnson County Sheriff's Department for a year before getting hired as a deputy in September 2012.

"I've been here three and a half years now," he said. "I feel like I learn something new every day. You can talk to someone that's been here 15 years and they say the same thing. I got into this at a young age, 21. I went into the academy early. (This career) teaches you responsibility and always doing what's right."

McLaughlin helps with accident investigation for the department and is on the SWAT team. He is on the advisory board for Central Nine Career Center's criminal justice program which allows high school students to receive credit hours for taking classes focused on law enforcement.

He and his wife, Lindsey, reside in Greenwood.

What was your inspiration to go into law enforcement?

I come from a family of law enforcement. My dad was a police officer. I looked up to him my whole life. He was a D.A.R.E. officer for about 20 years. Wherever we would go out in public, I remember seeing him having a positive impact on kids.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

There was an incident that I got to help with, along with a couple other deputies: a couple from New York was visiting Indianapolis. An elderly gentleman wandered off from his wife and ended up in Johnson County. We got to help reunite him with his wife while they were out of town, during a difficult situation for them.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

Seeing people at their worst – some of the calls we go on you know the person is probably just a good person in a bad situation and we have to help them through that.

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

I spend a lot of time away from work at the gym and with my wife and my dog. I have a really close-knit family so I spend a lot of time with them and with friends.

What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

I would like to work my way up in the sheriff's department. The process of moving up in the department is something that takes time. Personally, I'm about to have my first kid next month. I just want to be a good father and raise a good son.

What would you have done if you hadn't become a police officer?

I started out in Bloomington, in the business field. I enjoy technology so I would have gone into that field.

■ **What happened?** Ordinance 16-09 passed first reading. Ordinance 16-04, 16-05 and 16-08 passed second reading. New Business Ordinance 16-10 passed first reading, Ordinance 16-11 was briefly discussed but not voted on and New Business Ordinance 16-12 was suspended for further discussion.

■ **What it means:** Ordinance 16-10 restricts dumpster trash pick-up from commercial areas that are adjacent to residential areas to the hours of 7 a.m. to 9 p.m.

Ordinance 16-11 clarifies the application of summer rates for sanitary sewer customers. Ordinance 16-12 ratifies the existence of Fund 045 to be paid to the Police Department, Parks Department and Street Department. The fund would be closed after all funds are suspended.

■ **What's next?** All Ordinances will move forward and go into effect. Ordinance 16-11 and 16-12 will be revisited.

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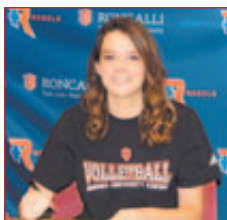
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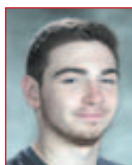
Lundy signs commits to volleyball at IU-Kokomo

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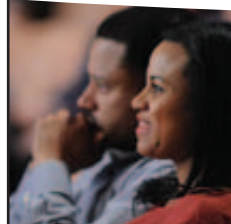

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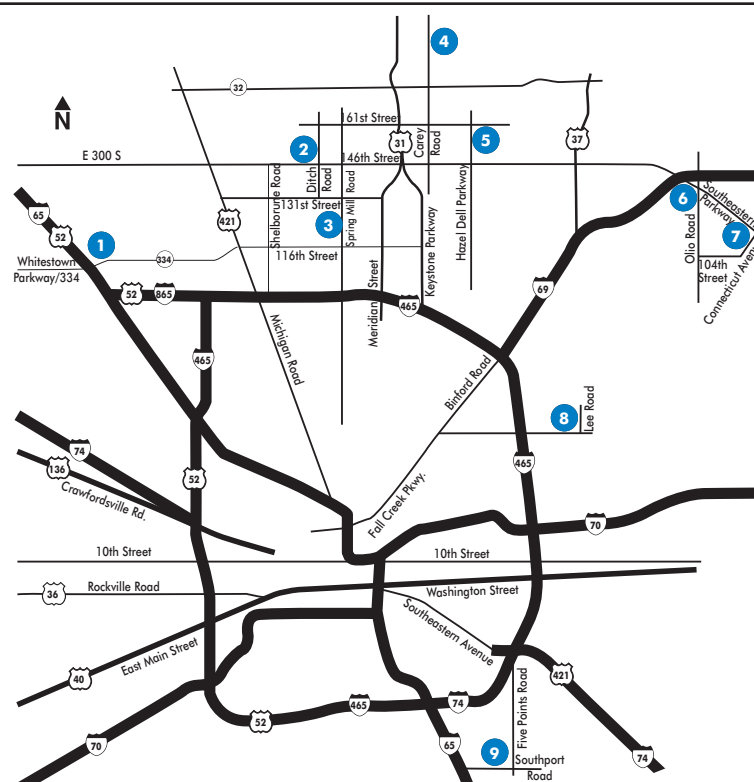

Eddie the Eagle... Very, very average

Finding something positive in a world that, at times, seems filled with negativity can often be a difficult task. Just turn on an evening news broadcast and you're likely to hear about the city's latest deadly shooting, the horrible treatment of an innocent child or some other news item that will leave you in a state of utter disbelief. Now, thanks to the pervasive nature of social media, snarky and mean-spirited comments are with us on the go. One new film, *Eddie The Eagle*, is a movie that tries to cut through all the seemingly endless barrage of pessimism and ugliness with something a lot more positive.

Eddie The Eagle is the story of British ski jumper Eddie Edwards. Edwards' story is one of the little engine that could with many more obstacles along the way. Since Edwards was a child he's longed to be an Olympian. Unfortunately, he began life at a great disadvantage; one of his legs required the use of a brace in order to walk. Quickly after overcoming this setback, Edwards takes up skiing, but finds out the deck is stacked against him once again for a number of reasons. Then he learns about the dangerous sport of ski jumping and after nearly killing himself, Edwards finally gets himself a coach, Bronson Peary (Hugh Jackman). What follows lands Edwards in the Olympic record books.



As mentioned earlier, *Eddie The Eagle* is a feel-good story about a character with a heart of gold. However, the problem is the story itself. There is nothing that differentiates it from any other film about an underdog up against insurmountable odds. While the story is enjoyable for anybody with a heart, the story is still incredibly been-there-done-that.

In addition to the story, the characters aren't exactly groundbreaking either. Both of the main characters, Eddie and Bronson, are written in very cookie-cutter fashion. Eddie is the lovable underdog everyone is openly rooting for, hoping he achieves his ultimate goal. Bronson is a hard-drinking, callous guy who, you find out later, let his ego and arrogance get in the way of his talent for ski jumping as a young man.

Eddie The Eagle is a film with a nice message and manages to be enjoyable even with several obvious clichés. However, it plays it way too safe, never taking any chances. The film is forgettable, and you're unlikely to remember seeing it minutes after leaving the theater. 2.5 out 5.

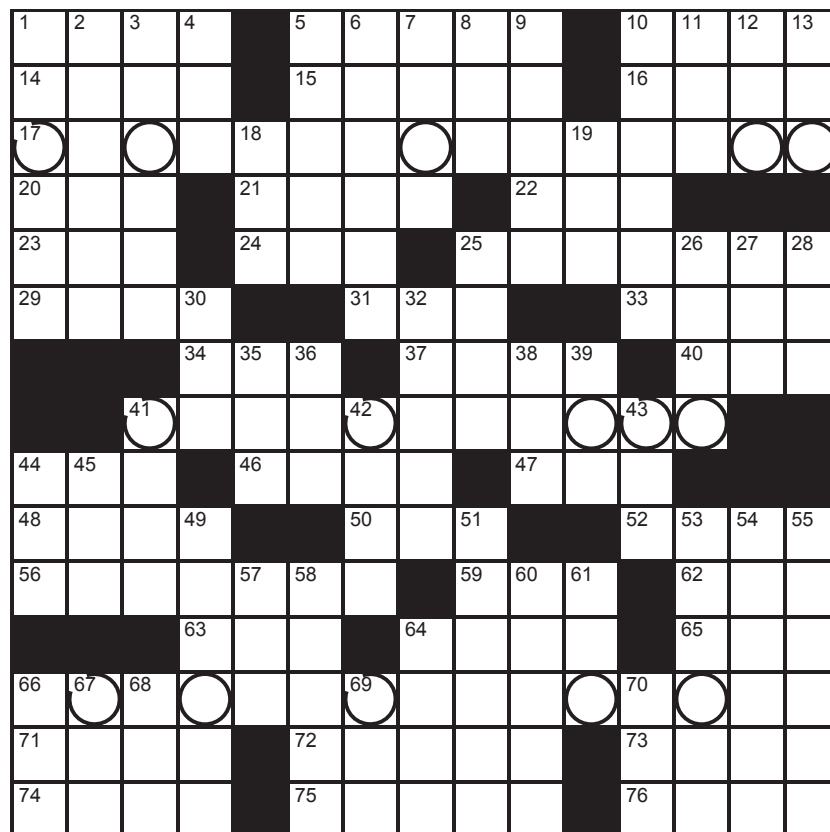

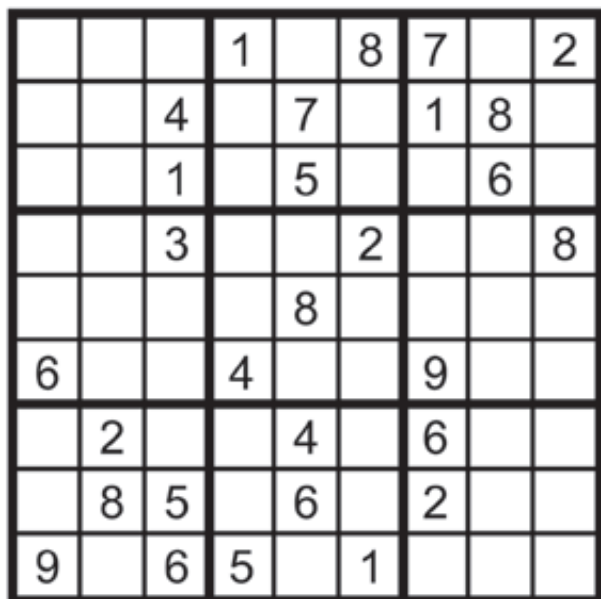

That would be nature's way of communicating with you. Your temple is red-flagging, "This food-like product does not belong in my belly!" Alas, we're too distracted by modern life and iPhones to hear the cosmic whispers.

New research supports processed food may be the cause of your ugly mood. How you feel this instant is the outcome of your last meal. Food is as powerful as a pharma drug. When food enters your biochemist, both good and bad reactions can occur within 45 minutes. Your temple has a PhD and naturally knows to receive real honest to goodness nutrition from the Celestial Apothecary. When you abuse it dead processed food, it reacts negatively. 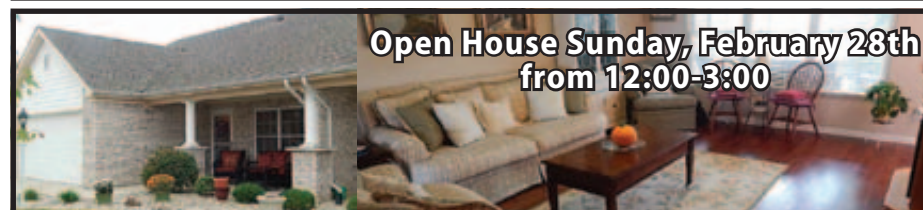

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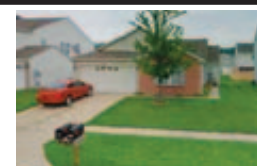
