

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Brian Butler: Beech Grove firefighter helps build department's new fire engine to arrive this spring

BEHIND the BADGE

The Beech Grove Fire Department has been planning for a new fire engine for nearly two years. Brian Butler said serving on a committee of firemen to research and build

this new truck is the most fun he's had since he began working for the department, as it's not an opportunity many firefighters receive.

The truck replaces the department's current engine, which they received in 2002.

"I'm really excited about the new truck," he said. "It's coming in May or April. Chief Cheshire and Chief Pierce approached us, gave us the budget constraints and said try to come up with the best apparatus you can and stay within budget. It was pretty tough... When we built this truck, we wanted to keep it simple. It's wellsuited for our needs. We put together a lot of things we really wanted and felt necessary. It's going to be a simple

truck but we wanted to keep it ergonomically friendly. We wanted it to have the best safety features."

Butler is from Wabash, Ind., graduating from Warsaw Community High School in 1993. He enlisted in the Marine Corps, serving four years. When he returned to Indiana in '97, he became an EMT, then a paramedic. He was hired to the Greenfield Fire Department in 2001 where they sent him to fire school. He joined the Beech Grove Fire Department in 2003, becoming an engineer at Station 57 on Churchman Avenue a couple years ago.

Butler resides in New Palestine with his wife, Dawn, and daughter, Emily.

What was your inspiration to become a firefighter?

I started off at 12 years old, my stepgrandfather and stepdad were firefighters from an early age. I was in the Marine Corps for three years and my brother got involved fire service. I was always intrigued by it from an early age.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

It's helping people out. We all say the same thing. We all got into it to help people. We see people at their worst, when they're sick or have a tragedy. The most gratifying thing is trying to help them out, reassure them and try to be a helping hand when they call us.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

I get frustrated when people call us and

take advantage of us. We go on runs to help people and some people take us for granted. They abuse the system from time-to-time. The other day, we got a call from people that basically just wanted a ride downtown to go to Wheeler Mission... It's taxing on the system, too, because there could be someone else that really needs our services and has to wait.



I have a six-year-old daughter and I love spending time with her. Now that she's in kindergarten, I don't get to spend as much time with her. This past holiday we had a lot of fun together.

We took her to Build-A-Bear, Monkey Joes. I like spending time with family on my days off. In spring, summer, fall I enjoy working around the house, making the lawn look good. I also enjoy doing long-range competition shooting, where I shoot 800 to 900 yards. I'm getting ready to start my second year. I'm reloading all the ammo for it right now.



Professionally, I love being a chauffeur in the engine. I'm always trying to maintain my education... Personally, I'm always striving to be a better father to my daughter. I'm always trying to instill things my parents and grand-parents instilled in me which is maintain a positive attitude, teaching her respect. I also have the best wife in the world and I try to be a good husband for her... I'm also trying to go to church more.

What would you have done if you hadn't of became a firefighter?

I probably would have stayed in the Marine Corps. When I got out, my goal was to go to school and be an officer in the Marine Corps.



Meeting, Jan. 4

- What happened? Resolution #1-2016 was tabled. Resolutions 2 and 3 were approved.
- What it means: Resolution 2 confirms the appointments of Dawn Whalen, Diana Hendricks and Julie Weaver to the Board of Zoning Appeals for 2016.

Resolution 3 is the encumbrance of funds to purchase a fire engine: this was done because the construction of the truck was not completed in 2015, and the funds needed to be carried over.

- What's next? Beech Grove Fire Department will receive a new fire engine in April.
- What happened? Ordinances 1 and 2-2016 were approved on first reading.
- What it means: Ordinance 1 would adjust rates for ambulance responses outside of the city of Beech Grove. "It is a revenue source for the city that is essential," said Clerk-Treasurer Dan McMillan. "It helps us buy the equipment that we use."

Ordinance 2 relates to food vehicles and food cart licensing. Vendors must purchase a license annually, unless they operate on private property or "under a master vendor" such as the Fall Festival.

■ What's next? The ordinances will undergo second reading at the Feb. 1 council meeting.





Outlook

Beech Grove, Greenwood and Southport mayors discuss upcoming changes to infrastructure, business and what they look forward to in 2016

There is an energy that comes with a new year, especially after a local election. Many elected officials have already participated in their first public meetings for 2016. Others will soon. No matter the city, these officials have sworn to abide by the law and do what's best for their communities. Southside mayors have big plans for the coming four years, with infrastructure and business at the top of the list.

Beech Grove

As Beech Grove Mayor Dennis Buckley spoke to community leaders and city resi-

dents at a swearing in ceremony for elected officials on Jan. 1, he promised to keep the city council busy in the next four years. A lot was done in his first term, but there's still a lot left to do.

Buckley said the city's main priorities should be public safety, infrastructure, quality of life issues and increasing the city's assessed value.

The first city council meeting of 2016 was held on Jan. 4. An ordinance was intro-

duced proposing an increase in rates for out-of-city calls for ambulance service. The fire department will receive a new fire engine in April. Two firefighters will retire this year and the city will replace them and add one more. Two police officers will retire; the city plans to replace them and

add two. In 2013 the city placed a police officer in Beech Grove High School, and they are now looking into adding another at the middle school.

The city paved a lot of roads the past four years, and Buckley said they still have a list of roads to be done. The Churchman Avenue sidewalk project was designed to be constructed in 2018, but that date has been pushed up to 2017.

Beech Grove became a CLEAN community in 2015, adding city-wide recycling, paper shredding and more. Buckley said they

will continue those environmentally-friendly efforts while continuing to focus on other quality of life issues such as the construction of a greenway projected for 2020 and alternate modes of transportation.

Blue Indy has 100 charging stations for electric cars in Indianapolis and looking to add 100 more in Marion County. Mayor Buckley has been meeting with the group, which has expressed a desire to place two stations in the city.

Buckley said he has met with Beech Grove school Superintendent Dr. Paul Kaiser for the past four years, discussing the importance of Beech Grove having a pre-k pro-

ram.

"That's something over the next four years I want to work on to help the school get implemented," Buckley said. "We have to teach these young children age 3 – 4 the difference between right and wrong."

Buckley said the city has been meeting regularly with Community Health Network which is looking to construct an office building in the city.

He said Franciscan St. Francis Health, which closed its hospital on Albany Street in

2012, plans to move approximately 300 staff members back into the medical arch building. They will remodel floors seven to 11 and add a new HVAC system to floor

"The biggest challenge I had the first four years was St. Francis," he said. "There were four

groups interested and all fell through. That property, I can't get my hands around. I sent them a letter that it would be our recommendation that you tear it down."

Buckley said that this will be his final term as mayor, and he is looking forward to what the team of city leaders can accomplish by working together.

"I want the city's best days to be five to 10 years from now," he said.

Greenwood

Going into his second term, Greenwood Mayor Mark Myers said the city is excited about 2016. While there aren't as many large-scale projects for the coming year, Greenwood residents can look forward to changes in infrastructure, more high-quality businesses and the creation of a master plan

for the betterment of the entire downtown area.

In his first term as mayor, Myers said they are proud of the creation and opening of Freedom Springs. He said there were surveys that said the city would lose a lot of money by opening the aquatics park. However, even with the cold summer weather in 2015, the center profited \$300,000.

"I can hardly wait to see what this summer brings," he said. "It's a huge ad-

dition for the city. When you talk to businesses, show them our aquatics facility while they are looking at relocating and where they want their employees to be."

The opening of the I-65 Worthsville Road interchange was a success, he

said. The interchange, in the works since 2012, opened November 2015. The city also constructed its first three roundabouts to relieve rush hour traffic.

Myers said, overall, relocating the city building was one of their biggest accomplishments.

"It's no longer like you're going into a dungeon where the floors creek and you can hear people walking above you," he said. "It's amazing the difference it has on people's opinions of Greenwood. They see us as being very progressive. It changed everyone's attitudes - the employees, too. You can see and sense the happiness that everyone has and it still carries on."

Myers said the city is entering 2016 in a good place financially, having presented budgets the past three years that were cash positive.

The city will see a lot of infrastructure improvements this year, including street repair and a \$30 million sewer project taking care of the west side of the city and into the Center Grove area. The storm water department will work on a masterplan to stop flooding issues.

For public safety, the city will hire three

additional police officers and firefighters and purchase a new fire engine and rescue squad.

The Downtown Façade Project will begin in 2016. Greenwood was awarded a grant in 2015 to improve its historic commercial properties. Twenty-two of the 33 eligible buildings will have some type of restoration work done. The city is conducting a traffic survey, looking to reroute some of the downtown traffic and widen sidewalks to make


the area more walkable.

The city has made an arrangement with the Greenwood Community School Corporation to purchase the Greenwood Middle School building on South Madison Avenue. The corporation is constructing a new middle school on Averitt Road,

scheduled for completion for the 2017-18 school year. Knowing that, Myers said the city plans to create a larger masterplan for the downtown area by the end of 2016, incorporating the school property and Old City Park. He would like to see two to threestory buildings constructed on the school property, with restaurants and other businesses on the bottom with apartments and condos on top.

Gershman Partners will invest \$90 million into the construction of Greenwood Town Center, with higher-end restaurants and shops, at County Line Road near the I-65 interchange. Construction is expected to start late summer and the center to open early 2017.

With a growing city, Myers said the biggest challenge is maintaining a balanced budget and continue to provide the same high-qual-

ity services. He said he will lobby the state for a food and beverage tax for Greenwood. A bill proposing the tax has been introduced to the legislature in previous years, and voted down.

"We are trying to find ways to have more businesses come to Greenwood," Myers said, "especially the office professionals and light industrial which is some of the higher paying jobs and will benefit our tax base and our residents."

Southport

Southport Mayor Russell McClure has worked in and around the Indianapolis city government for well over 20 years. Serving his first term as mayor, he said he hopes to bring that experience to Southport, find-

ing ways the city can operate more efficiently and effectively and recruiting talented residents to contribute.

"The greatest strength of any city is the people," he said. "Being our greatest strength, we need to reach out to them and say what do you want? ... One of the first things I'll be doing is a letter out to residents; get their feedback on what they'd like to see Southport do for them and who would like to be involved.

There are a lot of residents that would be good assets to the city. People are more likely to be involved if they know they are able to contribute directly to a process."

McClure has a Bachelor's degree in biology from Ball State University and a Master's degree in city planning from

the Indiana University School of Public and Environmental Affairs. He previously worked for Indianapolis with the Department of Metropolitan Development and has worked with Indianapolis Public Schools for 12 years now doing district-wide planning and preventative maintenance projects.

McClure and his family have lived in Southport for 17 years.

"Over the years I've seen a marked decline in the quality and quantity of the commercial areas," he said. "It was always a concern of mine. I wanted to get involved to reverse that trend, to stop the loss of quality business."

McClure served as president on the board for the Southport Parks Department for a year and a half. At the same time, he was elected president to the newly-formed Southport Redevelopment Commission in 2012. He decided to serve exclusively on the RDC. In the last three years, the for-

mer Gerdt Building has been sold to Randy Faulkner & Associates, the former post office has been sold, and Partnership for Affordable Housing is finishing a deal to construct affordable apartments for senior citizens and for retail use.

"It's like an iceberg," he said. "All the work we have going on now is only 10 percent of what has happened... We wanted to make Southport a destination city within Marion County. We wanted to attract new businesses of a high quality. We want to make the city a more walkable city."

McClure ran as an independent in the November election, winning over incumbent Mayor Jesse Testruth.

"I'm mostly looking forward to getting into the business of the city," he said. "It's

something I've always enjoyed doing. I'm looking forward to getting started. There's a lot more we want to accomplish. There is more the citizens can bring to us. There is a lot we can do to make Southport better."

McClure has been working on making necessary appointments to boards and committees within the city. He said he would also like to create a public relations committee, bringing in more people who can collaborate on how best to market the city.



Long term, Mc-Clure said he wants to work with Perry Township School

Corporation to include more students in learning how government works, why it works that way and what the government can and cannot do. He aims to look into historical preservation of buildings within Southport. He said there isn't a lot, but what they do have is worth protecting.

Through his first term, he said he will continue working on the commercial district to get more businesses to Southport.

"The challenge we've always had is finding funds for what we want and need to do," he said. "That's the biggest hurdle we want to overcome. I'll be working closely with the city planner and engineer to get as much grant money from any source."

Greenwood's Haley Howard makes university Highest Honors

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Puppy love

Jeff Udrasols relocates Meridian Veterinary Clinic & Hospital to larger, more modern building in Greenwood

When working with animals, every day is different; from the first visit with a young puppy to needing to remove an item from the stomach of a dog that swallowed something it shouldn't have.

That's what owner Jeff Udrasols says makes the job fun at Meridian Veterinary Clinic & Hospital. The clinic recently relocated to a new building in Greenwood, giving it space to grow with twice the square footage as before.

"I enjoy seeing people every day, meeting their new pet," Udrasols said. "My favorite is that first exam. There is a lot of positive energy. People are very excited when they get a new puppy. We want to bottle that little bit of happiness."

Udrasols was born in Indianapolis, growing up in the Lebanon area. His family had a traditional small farm, 50 acres of tillable land with corn and soybean plus cows, sheep, chickens and other animals. After graduation, he attended Purdue University where he studied animal science and later completed veterinary school in 2000.

"As a kid, I always wanted to know what made things work, why this did that," he said. "The field of medicine was fascinating. My draw was always to animals."

Udrasols graduated on a Saturday and began working at Meridian Veterinary Clinic & Hospital the following Monday. His family moved to Greenwood, a place he said they felt would be perfect to raise a family. After 10 years working for the clinic, the opportunity came up for him to be both a doctor and business owner, something he'd always wanted to do. He took ownership of the clinic on Jan. 2, 2010.

Udrasols stays active in the community through involvement with his oldest son's boy scout troop, starting a three-year rotation with the executive board of the Indiana Veterinary Medical Association and serving his fifth term as president of the Kiwanis Club of Perry Township.

The veterinary clinic has continued to evolve through the years, adopting new technology and ways of caring for its patients.

"It's the change of time," Udrasols said. "We have slightly modernized the family-doctor feel. We added elements of a more contemporary practice: computerized medical records, digital radiography, more advanced anesthetics, improved patient care."

After 52 years in business, Meridian Veterinary Clinic has gotten a makeover. As the clinic continues to grow, Udrasols said it would not have been cost effective to renovate the previous facility. It was relocated along the same road, State Road 135, from Perry Township in Indianapolis to Greenwood at the corner of Fry Road.

Udrasols said the business continues to see a year-over-year increase in its percentage of clients, both returning and new families. He said he looks forward to maintaining the business so it can have 50 years of memories at its new location.

"Every day is a new experience," Udrasols said. "I tell the staff that if you don't learn something new every day, you're not doing your day right. It can be simple to the most complex things, but I try to learn something new every day: whether I hear a new technique, a new medicine or a new way of doing things."

Excel in education

The Excel Center offers adults an opportunity to pursue their high school diploma through its Southside learning center

Adults looking to return to school and earn their high school diploma can face a number of obstacles. The Excel Center, a nonprofit operated by Goodwill Education Initiatives, Inc., aims to help adults achieve their goal by eliminating those hurdles

The Excel Center has five locations in Indianapolis, opening its Southside, University Heights-area school in August. The center provides a structured learning environment for adults to earn a Core 40 high school diploma. It is an accelerated program, with an eight-week term being the equivalent of an academic year. The students have access to free childcare, transportation support and, beginning January, free mental health counseling.

"The one thing I can ask of people is just to be a cheerleader for someone who is taking that courageous step to earn a high school diploma," said Erika Haskins, school director. "All the support that we can give individuals that are going back to earn a diploma is really helpful."

Haskins earned

her first teaching job as a math teacher for the Excel Center, and grew within the organization. She opened a school in Richmond in 2013 and now the Southside location. She said the Southside is her favorite community so far. It is culturally diverse in terms of language, backgrounds and ethnicity. It has been flooded with support from the community, especially the University of Indianapolis which sends students to help in a number

Haskins said some students only need a couple of credits to earn their diploma while others have never stepped into a high school. The program is different for each student. Their success is shown by the eight students that already completed the program by December, with more to come in May.

"I am thrilled to watch the other 42 graduates walk across the stage in May and get high-paying jobs that fill employers needs here on the Southside," she said, "and also attract other employers because we've raised the education and skill level of the workforce down here."

Why did you open this business?

Being a part of the family of Goodwill of Central Indiana, it's our mission to empower people through education and preparation for gainful employment. We had five Excel Centers in Marion County. This was an area of the city we were not reaching well. In the 46227 area, there were 10,000 adults reporting that they did not have a high school diploma. That indicated there was a need for an Excel Center here.

What did you do to prepare for opening vour business?

There is a lot of strategic work behind the scenes, gaining support of community

members and transitioning into hiring the right people. We put a lot of time into meeting our community members and getting students, door-to-door cruitment.

Someone that is lacking a diploma. They may or may not have a GED. An individual who thrives

in our environment is adaptable, courageous and has a vision for something radically different for their future.

How do you plan to be successful?



Above the dirt and muck

Thirty years ago this month, a national tragedy occurred. Seven people died in an explosion aboard the US Space Shuttle Challenger. The event is remembered today largely for the brief speech that American President Ronald Reagan gave that night and still ranks as one of the best speeches of the late twentieth century.

Another part of the Challenger story, though, seems forgotten.

Peter Jennings was the ABC News anchorman who hosted the television network's coverage of the memorial later that week. He was no friend of Reagan's. They were very much opposites with their political views.

Throughout the memorial service, Jennings maintained the professionalism for which he was famous at the time. He narrated in clear voice and calm tones. But at a particular moment, something happened. He described Ronald and Nancy Reagan moving down the line of surviving family members. Spouses, parents, children. Reagan spoke to or embraced each. It was clear that every man, woman, and child along that front row shared their grief with Reagan and

he, in turn, showed his love toward them.

Jennings said, "We have seen it before - at Fort Campbell, Ky – just a couple of months ago - where the President's mere presence - "at this instant, Jennings's voice started to waver, his emotions welled up, tears formed in his eyes. He paused in silence, struggling to regain control of himself. A few minutes later, Jennings asserted, "it is more as we have seen before than the simple power of the presidency, President and Mrs. Reagan seem to give a gift of warmth...'

The political partisanship didn't matter. Jennings, in those stirring seconds, revealed the grasp that Reagan's actions had on him and, by extension, millions of other Americans. A leader and a follower went above and beyond the dirt and muck of the day.

Dannemiller brothers reopen True Value Hardware in Bargersville

Two Southside brothers rang in the New Year in a most satisfying way: with a set of keys to open their brand new hardware store in Bargersville 20 months after they closed its predecessor.

Jeff and Greg Dannemiller opened their new Dannemiller True Value Hardware on Dec. 14, in an 8,400 square feet building at 2991 Southgrove Blvd. in Bargersville. The store is more than double the original 4,000 square foot building that was at 300 S. State Rd. 135 where an Aldi store now stands.

The Dannemiller name has long been tied to the hardware business as Jeff and Greg's parents David & Helen established Dannemiller True Value Hardware in February 1972 on SR 135.

"Since the beginning in 1972, Greg and I were involved in the business," said Jeff adding that both he and his younger brother graduated from Perry Meridian High School and Purdue University.

After Jeff graduated from Purdue in 1985, he went to work full time at the business and added a lawn and garden service center. Greg started his own construction company building custom homes in the Lafayette

area and in 1993 returned to the Southside. He rejoined his brother while their parents transitioned out of the business and retired in the late 1990s.

Space and traffic on SR 135 near Main Street became an issue and in 2005 they expanded to Madison Avenue near Southport Road with Dannemiller Southport Lawn & Power, which focused on power equipment sales and service. In 2013, they worked to sell the property.

"We simply were running out of space there and it was very difficult for contractors to get in and out of that location," said Jeff, noting that when they closed the State Road 135 property in March 2014 they moved the staff and business to the Southport location.

The new store is part of the Southgrove Landing development that will add apartments and retail shops to the current businesses: Flap Jacks, Adamson's Karate, and Las Chalupas Mexican Restaurant.

"We know that growth is coming to that area," said Greg. "The economy is getting stronger and we feel that we are in a good position to do well."

Talents that drive engagement

- Relationship Builders: I like to call this type of leader a situational leader. He individualizes his coaching and management to each individual and task. He finds ways to reach his team one-on-one creating a strong bond.

My heart breaks watching school children wait for the yellow morning school bus outside my Fountain Square home, eating toaster pastries chased with Mountain Dew. Drop the "Poop Tart" and no one will get hurt. They are child abuse; should be banished and indulgent parents spanked. It's not real food and they compromise sweet children's ability to grow, learn and be healthy. It's no secret why we're so sick, fat, malnourished and unfulfilled.

Uninformed or indolent Mom and Dad: stop the insanity! If this is how parents today show love and concern over their children's welfare something must change or we're in big time trouble. That's not the way for precious growing kids to start their day. You are feeding your children for a time that no longer exists. Evolve; awaken and stop the insanity. Considering the potential consequences of malnutrition during childhood, parents have a heavenly decreed responsibility to nurture their loving children's health and intellect. Poor diet during childhood can have lasting consequences for little bodies and minds. If you consider today's convenient breakfast foods wholesome, gag, you really must wake up.

Have we gone bonkers: maybe?: "Although the determinants of mental health are complex, the emerging and compelling evidence for nutrition as a crucial factor in the high prevalence and impendence of mental disorders suggests diet is as important to psychiatry as it is to cardiology, endocrinology and gastroenterology." (Lancet Psychiatry 2-2015) Your diet positively or negatively influences mental health and growth just as it does heart disease cancer and diabetes.

"Breakfast is strongly recommended as part of a healthy diet because it is associated with healthier macro- and micronutrient intakes, BMI and lifestyle. Breakfast is also widely promoted to improve cognitive function and academic performance, leading to the provision of breakfast initiatives by public health bodies." (A. Hoyland, Nutrition Research Reviews)

Your relationship with food says something about your relationship with your children. 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Concussion... preachy film

Anyone who has ever played in a pickup game at the local basketball court or partici-

pated in batting practice knows injuries are a common occurrence when it comes to the world of sports. However, the likelihood of sustaining a serious or life-altering injury is far higher in some sports than others. Of all the sports, football is probably the most violent, with hockey coming in a close second. Although, some might argue watching the Colts this year

has been more painful for the fans than the participants. Regardless, the new film *Concussion*, starring Will Smith, tackles the subject of chronic head injuries in football.

Concussion is the fact-based story of a doctor who unknowingly stumbles upon a serious medical issue that could hurt the National Football League significantly. While conducting the autopsy of a retired NFL star, Dr. Bennet Omalu (Smith), discovers something unusual with the patient's brain. Upon further investigation, and after several other retired NFL players commit suicide; the good doctor comes to his conclusion. He finds that the men died as the result of a series of repeated concussions sustained during their playing days. Despite his findings, the NFL refuses to listen, turning a deaf ear to Dr. Omalu at his every attempt to get the word out, even threatening him with legal action at one point. Even though no one

wants to hear what he has to say, Dr. Omalu forges on his quest to make everyone aware of the monumental risks associated with football.

For his work in *Concussion*, Will Smith has received a Golden Globe nomination, and

rightfully so. His performance is certainly the highlight of this David and Goliath story. After several less-than-stellar box office showings, Smith rebounds well here with what may be the best performance of his career.

Despite the strong performance of the film's lead, there is not much else that would entice someone to fork over 10 bucks

for admission. Smith and his co-stars have absolutely no chemistry whatsoever, making any of the relationships amongst the characters feel unreal. However, *Concussion's* biggest flaw is its story. In addition to not being very entertaining, the story doesn't shed a light on anything that couldn't be gathered from viewing five seconds of an NFL game. Football is violent and beating your head against someone for 10-15 years could result in adverse side effects; who knew?

Will Smith is extremely good. Unfortunately, it's wasted on a story that's not entertaining and way too preachy. 2.5 out of 5.


