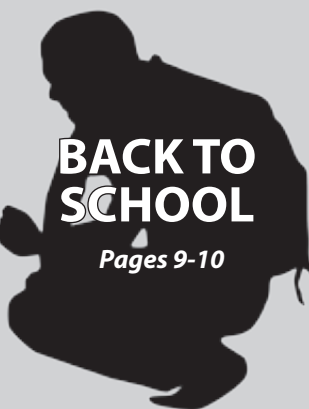

This writer, residing on the fringes of Southport, has had it all hit home in the past couple of years as family (including his mother) have taken a permanent leave of absence from a small town in Kentucky. This location is where the interest in the paranormal began.

Jamestown lies in the southern fringe of Kentucky, sitting upon the massive expanse of Lake Cumberland. It has remained timeless through the years, changing very little since the days of my youth when my grandmother worked as a cook. It is large, deep, and a beckoning playground for those visiting from out of state seeking lakefront adventures. Yet...in time they go home, and Jamestown remains as it has always been—locked into a past of its own making.

Grandmother Lucille worked as a cook at a restaurant in Russell Springs in those summers of my youth. She was a southern chef on a level all her own! Many of those summers I would spend a couple of weeks at her home in Jamestown, going to work with her at the restaurant. She would plant me at a table with an endless supply of Mountain Dew (the original, with pure cane sugar) as she prepped and

cooked for the noontime lunch crowd. And there was the jukebox! It was tall, lighted, and sat in a corner by the front door. This front door was always opened (from the heat of the kitchen and no air conditioning), and in 1964 the music from this magic box would feed out onto the sidewalk as a result of my grandmother's nickels. Dusty Springfield's *Wishin' and Hopin'* and the Drifter's *Under the Boardwalk* made an imprint on my psyche, never failing in later years to associate those memories with the smell of diner cheeseburgers and French fries. And those songs!

We would return home at the end of her shift. Grandfather Arnold would eventually arrive from his job at the Jamestown Boat Marina. He would light a cigarette and watch the TV news as my grandmother prepared dinner. Afterwards, I would sit on the porch and contemplate the day, the music from the jukebox, and the paranormal. This is where it all began....

Beech Grove sewer work continues

With the recent rain (over 15 inches in the last 2 months) we have found ourselves wishing for some dry hot weather. With all of this rain we have found on numerous occasions our sanitary sewer interceptors running at full capacity as water is leaving our city. The interceptors are located on the outskirts of our city and that is where we measure the amount of waste water being discharged. Often through these heavy rains, the sewer covers were lifted into the air as a result of the amount of pressure of the water being discharged.

Often with heavy rain, sewer will back up into basements of residential properties. This is very unfortunate and these occurrences have happened for years and we are working to minimize these occurrences. I remember growing up on Churchman Avenue and I dreaded rain because I knew that our basement would be full of water or sewage.

Much work has been done to minimize drainage issues and we can all agree that much more work still needs to be done. Projects such as Main Street, the Lick Creek Stabilization program, 9th and Buffalo project, Royal Road reconstruction, Detroit Street improvements, Hartman Park, and the Ticen and Main Street project have all helped to reduce the amount of flooding and backups that used to occur throughout our city. On the radar for drainage improvements include Grovewood Drive, Killian Drive at Redfern, Buffalo from 5th to 7th, Mann Drive, Clark

Avenue, Gilbert Drive and Sumner Avenue. All of these locations have terrible drainage problems and we just have to work through these issues until we can properly fix these chronic problems.

The systematic problem with our sanitary sewer system is that for years ground water penetrates and enters the sanitary sewer system. When this occurs the sanitary sewer system becomes full and waste water will back up where ever it can including basements. We have completed some extensive rehab of our sanitary sewer system but we have much more work to do. Soon another rehab project will begin to further reduce the chance of ground water entering our sanitary sewer system. These types of projects have to continue but it will take years to finally correct the sanitary sewer issues that have plagued this city for as long as I can remember.

Another problem that has occurred is that some property owners have tied their downspouts, perimeter drains and sump pumps into the sanitary sewer system which helps to contribute to back ups. This is a practice that needs to discontinue and I would speculate that legislation may be drafted through ordinances to discontinue this practice in the near future.

Mike Combs

WRTFD Engineer finds his passion for firefighting as a young child

BEHIND the BADGE

Firefighter/paramedic Mike Combs works throughout the year to preserve memories of the work done by other personnel from the White River Township Fire Department. Since 2000, he's done marketing for the department by filming, now using GoPro cameras, and putting together a Year in Review video for the Employee Recognition Banquet.

Combs, who resides in New Whiteland, grew up in Greenwood and attended Greenwood Community schools. He became a cadet with the Greenwood Fire Department at 15 years old and served there until age 19. He pursued a career in radio broadcasting, leaving Indiana in 1992 to work in radio, moving to North Dakota then Michigan. He continued to work as a firefighter in each place he moved. He moved back to Indiana in 1997 and became a full-time dispatcher for the Johnson County Sheriff Department. He was hired part-time to the WRTFD in 1997 and became full-time in 2004. He is an engineer, driving the truck at Station 53.

"There's the excitement of not knowing what you're getting into but the excitement that you're going to help someone every day," Combs says. "It's an area that I grew up in. It's always nice to serve where you grew up because you know the people that work with you and know the outlying areas because you've been there all the time. It makes your day go a lot better."

Combs and his wife, Amy, have two children, Braedon and Madison.

What was your inspiration to become a firefighter?

Watching Emergency growing up, a TV show from the 1970s that a lot of guys watched about the first paramedics in Los Angeles County and the struggle they had to get the legislature to allow firefighters to do paramedicine. Being 6, 7 years old, it kind of gets your blood pumping, and I kept that (interest) up until I graduated high school.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

There are a lot of moments that are all gratifying. Every run that we do is gratifying. The most gratifying would be someone that has cardiac arrest, we bring them back and they leave the hospital and continue a great life. You get to meet them a month or so afterwards. We don't have a chance to see a lot of the people that we help but when we do it makes us feel good, like we were a part of that.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

The most challenging is the not knowing what's happening every day. When the alarm goes off and we're called somewhere, we don't know what we will encounter. Sometimes, if it's a call for a fire it will say the fire is out and it may not be out. Sometimes we get different information than what we see or more information than what it really is. We're always thinking ahead and figuring out what is going to happen.

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

Being with my family is the biggest thing in the world. My son is 7 and my daughter is 2. Watching them grow up and make sure they grow up right is my number one. I like to bowl. I fly airplanes and try to get up in the air as much as I can.

What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

I've got 27 years in the fire service, with almost 16 here. In the next 15 years, I want to continue growing with this department. I want to eventually become a lieutenant, climb the ranks and hopefully battalion chief by the time I retire. I also work for the Indiana Task Force One, the urban search and rescue team in Indianapolis, in their communications division. I want to continue with them as well.

What would you have done if you hadn't of become a firefighter?

Probably I would have gotten a degree in communications and would have liked to have commanded a 911 center. I do that part-time now. My other love is 911 dispatching.

Mind over Muscle

Greenwood resident Paula Hornback competed in her first figure completion in 2011, winning overall champion in Ms. Great Northern in Kankakee, Ill. – at 43 years old. Through the past four years, she's continued to not only improve upon her own fitness transformation, but train others in their health and fitness goals as well.

Now 48, Paula recently completed her last contest for 2015, the Indiana State Championship in Anderson. This competition is a qualifier to be as a national level figure competitor, a title she had already earned.

"I have a lot of people ask me how I do what I do, how do you work out and eat right all the time?" Paula said, "I say it's the discipline muscle, which develops with time and consistency. When people fall off the wagon on their diet or fitness program, as long as they get back up and on that wagon they will grow that discipline muscle. It's harder to get back up on the wagon than it is to fall."

Paula, who was born in California and grew up in Fishers, Ind., started a fitness spa in 2006 in Brownsburg. She had to close it in 2008, calling her longtime friend, Jerry, to help her. The two married a year later, moving to the Center Grove area in 2009. She started her health and fitness transformation in 2010 after being inspired by another person at the gym who was very fit.

"I started wondering if I could do that myself," she said. "It's never too late. Age is just a number. We have one life to live. It's just making the choice."

Paula said that she has enjoyed the transformation of both her physical and mental self. She has two children and one grandbaby. She said she can remember a time that she and her daughter would be excited for a Friday night when they'd watch TV and eat

a pound of M&Ms. Her outlook has changed to see food as fuel and not as a treat.

"You have to experience it and do it in order to help someone else," Paula said. "I love helping people hit their fitness goals."

In addition to working as-needed as a respiratory therapist, Paula has a home gym where she works out and trains clients in her business Body Design by Paula, bodydesignbypaula.com. She customizes plans to help her clients meet their individual goals and holding them accountable.

"People tend to give up too soon," she

said. "I'm not a counselor, but with my experience with life and all of the struggles I had to go through to where now I'm a national figure competitor, I take all of that experience and motivate them. A lot of time it's not about the food. It's about the emotions behind the food and why we eat. It's getting them to appreciate their bodies; they can move and get in shape. There is no cookie cutter program. Everyone is different. It's about finding what works for them."

Part of Paula's plan for herself includes meal prepping. She uses ADVOCARE supplements and makes sure to eat six to seven meals per day. She lifts weights five days of the week, does cardio three to four days a week and she and Jerry will go on an eight to 10-mile bike ride around their neighborhood each night.

"Many people that don't even know her come up to her and tell her she is an inspiration to them to be disciplined, work hard and achieve personal goals," Jerry wrote in an email. "I think many more people can be inspired by her story and the way she lives her life if more people knew about her. She is an avid believer in church, health, fitness and nutrition."

Time and consistency is the key. Paula said she realizes it that the results she wants will not come easy. Her goal is to continue building her figure, so she has no current plans as for her next competition – although she said a pro-qualifying competition could be in the near future.

"At this point in time, I decided to take some time off, continue to build the areas that I need to build," Paula said. "It goes back to time, consistency and patience, not getting too excited too quickly. We'll see what happens in the next couple of years. I'll be 50, so I'll be excited to see how I look in two years."

Greenwood City Council

Meeting, July 20

■ **What happened?** Ordinances 15-29, 15-33 and 15-37 were approved.

■ **What it means:** Ordinance No. 15-29 approves a petition filed with the Greenwood City Clerk on behalf of Endress + Hauser Wetzer (USA), Inc. to vacate a cul-de-sac public right-of-way contiguous to Endress + Hauser Wetzer (USA), Inc. at 2340 Endress Place, Greenwood.

Ordinance No. 15-32 removes the Stormwater regulations from Chapter 10 of the City's Municipal Code, and Ordinance No. 15-33 will revise the regulations and move them to Chapter 9.

Ordinance No. 15-33 revises storm water regulations. There shall be no plants or structures built around any drainage easement. An inspection conducted by the Stormwater Department and/or Department of Community Development Services may be conducted following notification of the property owner.

Ordinance No. 15-37 is a rezoning ordinance for the "17.0 acres located approximately 2,030 feet east of the intersection of Honey Creek Road with Cutsinger Road on the north side of Cutsinger Road within the City of Greenwood, from the current zoning of R-2B - Residential-Single Family to R-2A - Residential - Single Family to require lower density single-family residential development."

■ **What's next?** The ordinances need no further reading and will go into effect.

■ **What happened?** Ordinance 15-38 and Resolution 15-07 were introduced and approved on first reading. Ordinance 15-39 was introduced and will be up for first reading at the next meeting.

■ **What it means:** Ordinance No. 15-38 approved the appropriation of funds for the Fire Department to complete maintenance and upgrades to Fire Station 91, 155 E. Main St.

Ordinance 15-39 would prohibit tax-exempt uses of real estate within the districts in Greenwood unless agreements for payments in lieu of taxes are in place.

■ **What's next?** These ordinances will be voted on at the Aug. 3 common council meeting.

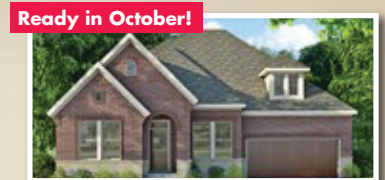

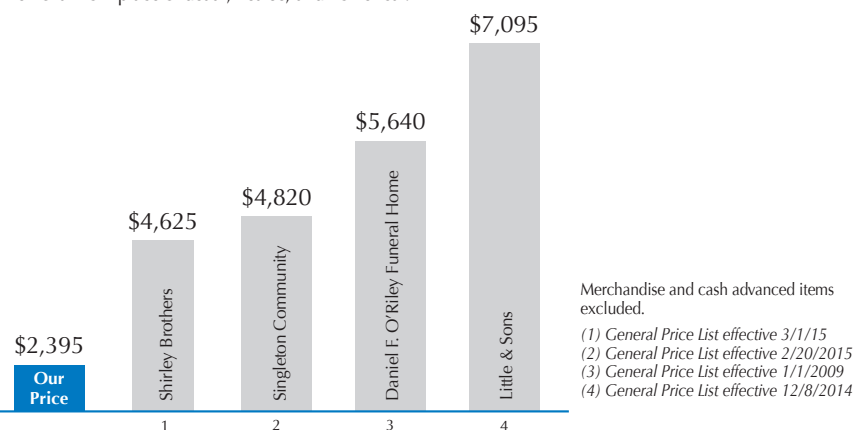

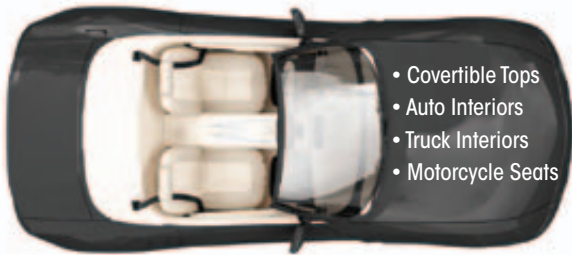

## Chance vs. opportunity

**Question: "Dear Grammar Guy, I would like to take this 'chance' to ask you about the use of 'chance & opportunity'.**

**I see this as a real 'opportunity' to clear up the proper time to use each word.**

**Thank you for the 'chance' to write you. I can't wait for the 'opportunity' to read your reply." -- (David Stratton)**

Answer: This is a tricky one, David. We'll see why in a moment.

Consider this example: Every child born in the United States has a chance of becoming president. Few of us, however, will have the opportunity.

In many circumstances, "chance" and "opportunity" are interchangeable. Merriam-Webster lists a primary definition for both of them of "an amount of time or a situation in which something can be done."

Fortunately, our friends at the dictionary also offer a few more elucidative definitions for each. "Chance," they say, is "the way that events happen when they are not planned or controlled by people" – or, more simply put, "the possibility that something will happen."

An "opportunity" according to Merriam-Webster, is "a favorable juncture of circumstances" or "a good chance for advancement or progress." That last definition – "a good chance" – is the key here.

A "chance" is broad and undirected, like, for example, a job listing in a newspaper. Anyone can see the listing. Anyone can apply. An "opportunity" is specific and, importantly, positive. Continuing with our job listing, the "opportunity" is when they call you to offer you a trial run at the position.

"Opportunity" comes from "opportune," meaning "suitable or convenient for a particular occurrence." The "particular occurrence" part of that is your takeaway this week. A "chance" is a nebulous possibility that something might or might not happen. An "opportunity" is a good possibility of some particular, positive thing happening or being made to happen.

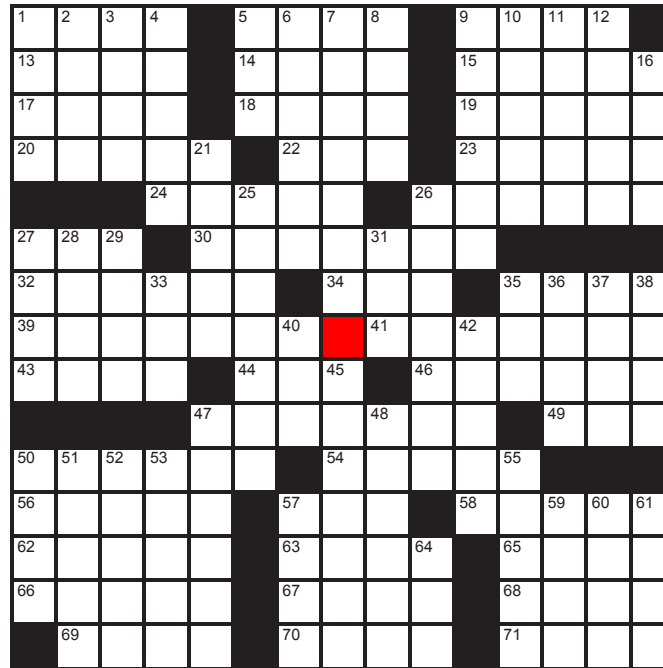

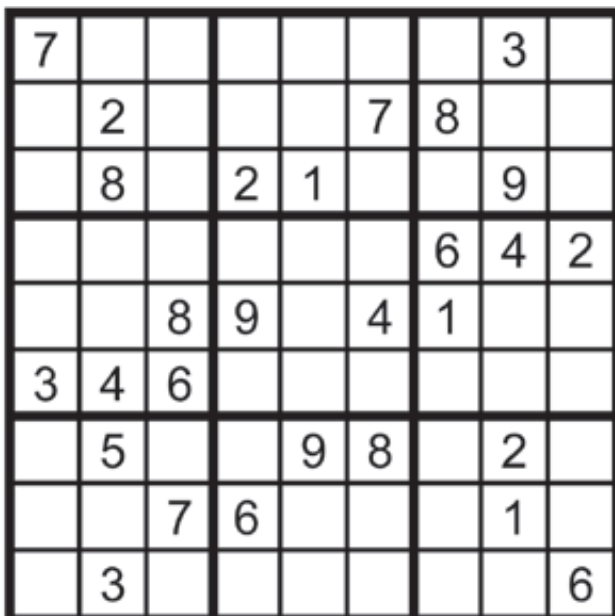

# Ant-man... One of Marvel's best

If the last five to seven years at the box office have taught us anything, it's that superhero movies seem to be just a tad bit popular. And with trailers for next year's *Deadpool*, *Batman v Superman: Dawn of Justice*, and *Suicide Squad* recently released, the steady onslaught of superhero films looks to continue for a while. The latest in the seemingly endless string of comic book based film comes courtesy of Marvel Entertainment. *Ant-man*, starring Paul Rudd, crawled into theaters this past weekend.

*Ant-man* is the story of Scott Lang, a highly intelligent modern day Robin Hood, whose well-intentioned, but illegal activities have landed him in prison. We first meet our protagonist as he's leaving prison, vowing to never return. As Scott soon learns, life on the outside proves to be tougher than he originally anticipated.

Unfortunately, his prison record keeps him from obtaining employment. Frustrated with his lack of success and being unable to provide for and see his daughter and thanks to encouragement from his rag-tag group of friends, Scott turns back to his criminal ways. Hearing about a house with a safe ripe for the taking, Scott breaks in through clever and ingenious methods only to find an odd suit. Little does he know, he's been chosen

to save the world, as he becomes Ant-man.

Like a lot of superhero films, *Ant-man* involves a highly coveted, top-secret formula that gives humans superhuman abilities. Dr. Hank Pym (Michael Douglas) has perfected a method that gives humans the capability to mimic the likeness of an ant. The first fourth to half of the film plays like every other Marvel film we seen. Everything goes as expected, nothing real surprising or really noteworthy. However, the immensely entertaining and often hilarious second half of the film more than makes up for the boring and tedious first half.

On the surface, Paul Rudd seemed to be an odd choice for a superhero, but he pulls it off convincingly. *Ant-man* is a film with an absurd plot, but Rudd's trademark sarcastic humor and wit keeps the film from taking itself too seriously. Paul Rudd's performance, as the leader of ants, is certainly the highlight of the film.

*Ant-man* could have easily been terrible, but with an ever-present self-deprecating tone, it's a fun two hours. Leaps and bounds better than the second Avengers film. 3.5 out of 5.

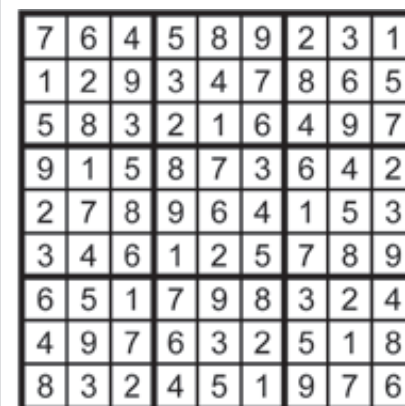

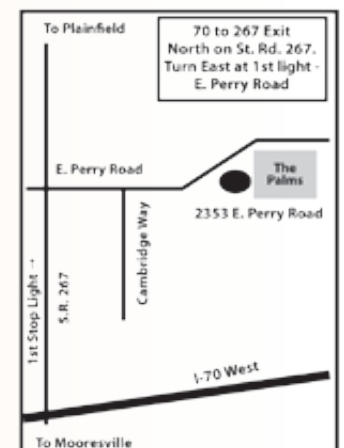
