

More Beech Grove infrastructure work coming

Finally after all this rain it has dried up enough to finally allow contractors to get caught up so some much needed infrastructure work can begin. Work has begun on repairing the parking lots behind the Senior Citizens Center and at the Hornet Park Community Center. Work has also begun on the reconstruction of Bellefontaine Street from Emerson Avenue west to 8th Avenue. This project was set to begin in mid May but the weather really put a damper on things.

Sanitary sewer work will soon begin on Cherry Street, Hornet Avenue, 6th, 7th, and 8th Streets between Main Street and Albany, 8th Avenue at Bellefontaine and Byland between 9th and 12th Streets. This is a major sewer lining project that will help reduce the amount of ground water infiltrating the sanitary sewer system and provide better flows for the removal of waste water. The quotes for this project should be opened at the August 3rd. Board of Works meeting.

On a footnote to all of this, Bellefontaine Street between Schaff and Garstang has been vacated and the physical road will be removed very soon. This is a result of the new Beech Grove Station senior community being built. Work is well on the way which will result in a much more desirable look than what we viewed for years. This is a much needed improvement to our city.

National Night Out







- · The album, Mr. Turkey, features three main characters: "The character I've done the longest is my Uncle Frank. Everybody knows an Uncle Frank, he's a 40 year old guy who still lives in his mom's basement and hasn't quite mastered getting and keeping a job. Jonathan Peepers is a blind and grumpy comedian from Las Vegas. Coney Danza is probably my favorite because he's so over the top. Coney is a hotdog comedian (making hot dog-related puns) and I actually wear a hotdog suit when I do the character.

You can do comedy anywhere. Whether or not the jokes go well is a different story, says Perry Township resident Brent Terhune, who has toured the country doing stand-up at comedy clubs or, sometimes, more unique venues like yachts, a prison, a wrestling ring or Comic Con.

Well, the jokes are going well for Terhune, as he will release his first stand-up comedy album, Mr. Turkey, on Aug. 7. He will celebrate with an album release show at The White Rabbit Caberet in Fountain Square on Aug. 5, 9 p.m. with a \$10 cost of admission that includes a copy of the album. The album can be purchased on iTunes, Spotify or Pandora.

"One of my college professors said that you've found your passion if you know you would do it for free," Terhune said. "I'm lucky to get to do what I like and they give me a check at the end."

Terhune grew up in Indianapolis, attending St. Roch Catholic School and graduating from Roncalli High School in 2008. His interest in comedy sparked in high school, when he decided to do stand-up at a Roncalli Coffee House event. He hosted battle of the bands and some talent shows. He's done stand-up now for nine years, starting with three to five-minute shows during open mic nights at local comedy clubs to his routine now averaging 45-minutes as he travels across the country.

He graduated from the University of Indianapolis in 2012 with a degree in communications. While in college, he interned for the Bob & Tom Show, a radio show which plays across the nation including 94.7 FM in Indianapolis. After four months, he was hired to write for the show. He says he searches news sites to find topics for the monologue-type jokes, and loves writing for radio because it can be done from anywhere at any time the inspiration hits.

"You come across stories that the mixture of events you would never have thought to happen," Terhune said. "There was a story that 50,000 gallons of diary product was spilt. My joke was the odds of that driver getting fired were about half and half. It's real life events and it's a challenge to see if there's something funny about that situation."

With his own stand-up, Terhune is on the road about 40 weeks out of the year. He said he's happy to get the chance to work with other comedians, traveling and making a living doing what he loves.

"With my own stand-up, I can talk about whatever I want," Terhune said. "I can talk about anything so I better make it good. If it's not good, it better still be funny... The kind of jokes I like are funny but clever. I like to show that I'm smart but I'm also goofy at the same time because I don't take myself too seriously."

Inspiration for his jokes comes from a variety of sources: from his family, his interest and criticism of ghost hunting shows or jokes about interactions on Facebook. The title of the album, Mr. Turkey, comes from when he did substitute teaching.

"I'd notice (the kids) couldn't really say my last name since it's not very common," Terhune said. "A lot of the kids ended up calling me Mr. Turtle or Mr. Turkey, hence, my album title."

The album is a culmination of Terhune's best jokes through the past nine years. He's in the process of writing new jokes for his shows, and is already planning on creating another album in a few years.

"I love when a new joke works. I already liked stand-up, but I learn to like it all over again for the same reasons I got into it in the first place. When the audience laughs, it's a way to agree that what they thought was funny or what I'm saying happens in their own life."

For now, he said that he looks forward to headlining more shows and would like to do an animated cartoon. He already designs a comic strip which is posted to his Website, brentcomedy. com. For more information, visit his site or ontourrecords.com/brentterhune.html.

Paranormal musings can have humble beginnings, especially when originating so far south from a naive youth's Southside Indianapolis home.

Small town Kentucky is rather mum on the subject of the paranormal. If asked, you get not only a far-away look, but also the slight smile upon the lips that reveals nothing, but speaks volumes. Maybe there are things best not spoken of?

The small house on the outskirts of Jamestown where my Grandfather Arnold and Grandmother Lucille raised six children still stands. They were relocated there when Lake Cumberland was created. Their former homestead currently lies beneath its depths. How they pulled off raising a family in this tiny house is beyond my comprehension. Eventually the grandchildren came, and this is where it began for me.

The periodic invasion of myself, brother and cousins would be on hand to welcome in the night; we had to play outside. The darkness became our refuge, with lightening bugs put into mason jars and the darkness explored; yet within limits. We would terrorize Arnold's tobacco field, but would never... ever...go into the backyard that rolled into the field beyond. It was just too dark and beyond the streetlight's grasp. There was too much unknown back there!

Arnold and Lucille are long gone; as is uncles, aunts, and my mother. My uncle Lewis just passed and the future of the house is questionable. The restaurant where my grandmother once worked has been closed for many years, but still stands at the same corner; Lake Cumberland continues its mysterious endless journey. And the realization that someday we will all come back together. Family always remains family. What a celebration it will be!

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

Stepping into a CLEAN community

Beech Grove to begin city-wide recycling mid-August; residents can sign up for the free program now

Beech Grove is one step closer to becoming a CLEAN Community as more than 500 Beech Grove residents have signed up for the city-wide recycling program that is estimated to begin mid-August. The Department of Public Works is preparing to begin distribution of the 96-gallon bins to registered households the first of August.

"It's encouraging considering how little we've done so far to get the word out," said Department of Public Works Director, Brad Meriwether. "A lot of times the community will see you a big jumpstart in numbers when the totes come out. To have 500 already, we hope that's a good sign of things to come."

Beech Grove Mayor Dennis Buckley said they began thinking about starting a recycling program more than two years ago and were able to implement it after the city council passed a recycling ordinance earlier this year.

"Everything we pick up from a trash perspective goes to a landfill," Buckley said. "It's estimated about 40 percent of what we pick up doesn't need to be taken there. So we're trying to be better stewards of the environment."

Ray's Trash Service won the bid to manage the recycling program. They will offer biweekly collection free to all residents. The Department of Public Works will continue to handle trash pickup. Residents can place all recyclable items in the bins without needing to separate different materials. The city will provide continuous education on the recycling program. Residents can sign up by calling (317) 803-9092, (317) 803-9098, (317) 803-9120 or emailing compliance@ beechgrove.com.

The recycling program is just one piece of the city's goal to complete the Comprehensive Local Environmental Action Network (CLEAN) Community Challenge, a recognition program through the Indiana Department of Environmental Management which awards cities, towns and counties for

managing their environmental impact.

Beech Grove has outlined five required priorities to improve their environmental impact. They began offering quarterly shredding days this year, the first being held July 11. In the fall, the police department will begin offering a place in the lobby for the public to dispose of old medicines instead of throwing them in the trash or down the toilet. The municipal building will begin separating burnt-out light bulbs from the trash. They will do regular projects to replace foliage in the city. Beech Grove is slated to complete the challenge by the end of the year, which could make them the 18th Indiana city to earn the distinction.



The Grammar Guy column has been on a bit of a hiatus these last few weeks as I was in South Bend covering the Richmond Hills trial dealing with, of all things, murder and insurance fraud. I suppose it makes sense to resume my grammar musings where my trial coverage left off.


At any rate, what we have here are nearhomophones that both come to us from Latin. "Perpetrate" derives from the Latin perpetrare, or "to perform." On the other hand, "perpetuate" comes from perpetuare, meaning "to make permanent."

You can tell from those definitions, I imagine, that "perpetrate" is going to be the appropriate word generally when dealing with crime. You perpetrate a heist. You perpetrate identity theft. You might even perpetrate some jaywalking, if you're feeling really

Watercress is associated with snobby crust-less tea sandwiches. Society is finally discovering green foods from the Celestial Apothecary benefits Temple health, with emphasis on cruciferous vegetables such as broccoli, cabbage, arugula, cauliflower and kale. However, there are lesser-known green garden goodies equally as good, if not better.

cium-rich watercress is packed with manganese and magnesium which helps maintain strong bones and teeth. Calorie for calorie watercress has four times the amount of calcium as milk, meaning you can get help fighting osteoporosis, without the weight gain.

American Journal of Clinical Nutrition and the University of Ulster scientists claim eating watercress daily can significantly reduce DNA damage to blood cells, considered to be an important trigger in the development of cancer.

Hit the bottle last night? You might struggle getting it down, but juicing and then consuming leafy watercress juice will make you feel better since it activates detoxifying liver enzymes which help the Temple cleanse itself of the toxic after effects of too much booze. Watercress has lots of iodine that can strengthen the thyroid gland.




