Southport Police officer develops new program to give back to his community

After finishing his training at the Southport Police Academy, Officer Cameron Ellis said he wanted to find a way to give back and have a positive outreach on a person or organization. He developed the program, Police Officers Giving Back, with the idea of collecting supplies to donate to organizations/people in need twice a year.

The police department jumped on board to contribute. Ellis made the first donation in March, with four truckloads of items for The Julian Center, a nonprofit which supports victims of domestic violence, sexual assault and other crises. The Julian Center volunteers to help the Southport Police Department train its recruits and officers on how to identify victims and how to help them.

"It was something we could do to help them out, as a thank you for donating their time and effort to properly educate us and bring awareness to the bigger picture," Ellis said.

He is collecting again for The Julian Center for fall/winter donations. Those interested can contact him at cellis@southport-police.org or The Julian Center at info@juliancenter.org.

Ellis, 22, graduated from Southport High School. He played football for three years in college, in Texas, the University of Indianapolis and then in Kansas. He studied criminal law and criminal deviance. He left college after obtaining a job at the Marion County Sheriff's Department in 2015.

Ellis, who resides in Greenwood, began training at the Southport Police Academy in July 2015. He was the class captain, and finished his field training in April.

What was your inspiration to become a police officer?

I like knowing I can make an impact on someone. I like knowing I can turn someone's bad day into a good day. I like knowing that when someone needs help, when they see my car, for the most part, they instantly feel safe and trust me.

What has been one of the most gratifying aspects of the job?

By far the most gratifying part of my job is the interaction I have with the community. I'm able to hand out stickers, let little ones hop in the squad car and allow them to turn on and off the lights. Handing out stuffed animals and seeing their eyes light up when they see me. Everyone wants to smile and

wave. To me it's all about showing children at a young age that police officers are good people. Police officers are people you can trust. So by handing out stickers and taking an extra five minutes to let them operate the lights, I've had a positive impact on them.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

The most challenging part of the job is it takes away so much time from your family. You work a full-time job, then show up here as a reserve and come to events, it can take its toll on you and your family. My family supports it. The most challenging part is just finding the time to do this.

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

Camping is one of my favorite things to do. It gets us away from everything out here. I enjoy fishing, spending time with family, catching up with old buddies from high school, working out.

What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

I would like to land a job as a full-time police officer. I would love the opportunity to work for Southport Police Department if they ever offer the opportunity to go full time. Personally, I want to be more involved with the academy as an instructor, maybe an FTO (Field Training Officer) one day.

What would you have done if you hadn't become a police officer?

I'd still be working at the Marion County Jail.

Community gathers to honor and pray for their law enforcement officers after national tragedy

PRAYER VIGIL

Five police officers were killed in a shooting in Dallas, Texas, on July 7, with seven more wounded after being ambushed by a lone attacker.

In wake of this news, the Bargserville community gathered to demonstrate its support for their law enforcement officers. They organized a prayer vigil on July 8.

"We've had pastors come by and pray for us, spend a few moments with our police officers and we appreciate that," said Bargserville Police Chief and Greenwood resident Judd Green. "In this case, it's a national tragedy. There are five police officers that won't come home again... When something like this happens, it injures your soul. That's why things like this are important. They are saying here, you have our support."

With everyone standing in a circle, holding hands, each took their turn to pray for the safety of everyone who protects and serves.

"I'm out here today because these men and women that wear these uniforms go out every day to protect our communities," said Christopher Holland, pastor of The Father's House in Indianapolis, Franklin Township. "They stand for righteousness, no matter what happens. Any community or society that allows those that stands for righteousness to be ambushed, sniped, killed in the line of duty, is a society that will not have very much peace for too long. These are peace officers. I'm here today to pray and not only honor the job they do but ask our God, Jesus the Christ, to bless them, strengthen them and grace them with the ability to stand in the job their doing."

It's been said that—when one paranormal investigative group begins its maiden voyage into the exploration of the unknown, another is ending their journey. This is pretty much true. It has over the years been a continuous cycle of beginnings and endings. Maybe those involved did not get what they wanted out of the experience? Perhaps their aspirations from watching paranormal television fell short? Or, was there serious omens that this 'hobby' might be on the tad side dangerous? Possibly these folks found a better (and cheaper) way to spend their time?

There is no right or wrong approach, rather an individual decision. The way it should be. Paranormal investigations are not for everyone. Groups come and go on a frequent basis, as do members of these groups. Television makes it all seem so glamorous and mysterious. It becomes addictive in the sense it transcends the routine of day to day existence of what we consider normal. "My goodness...did you see/or hear that!" Yes...it can get in your blood, but the question is—should it? It becomes a question of why exactly you're doing it.

Is it to help others in their time of need or just a thrill ride for the participant? Is it the adrenaline rush that accompanies an encounter with the unknown? Is it possibly answers to questions harbored since child-

hood? Is it the pursuit of fame, to be the next paranormal celebrity? A history lesson for many of the locations? Or...a combination of all of the above? We have to be honest with ourselves before moving forward on this path. How far do you want to go? And for how long?

If you're someone wanting to get their feet wet to see where your interests lie, you might be best served in a hobbyist type group (Indiana Ghost Trackers, for example). These groups host what are termed "ghost hunts," usually offered to the public at large, and most likely on a monthly basis. It's a venue to meet others with similar interests, be introduced to purported haunted locations, and play with a variety of equipment used in paranormal investigations. Will you get evidence of a true haunting? Most of the time not, but it gives you a platform to decide if you

want to go into something more of a serious nature. Every paranormal investigator starts somewhere....

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Beech Grove Little League entrance named after long-time coach and president, Ron Eck

Ron Eck went by the book. That's what he credits to his 15-year success in serving as president of the Beech Grove Little League and 10 years as a coach. He never went to the little league diamonds without his rules and regulations book in hand.

"Ron did everything the way the Little League wanted it done," said Beech Grove City Councilor Dave Harrison, who had served on the little league board with Ron. "He made no exceptions. His own son came through it. His boy was one of the better pitchers in the league. People said, 'why don't you trade him to another team?' He said 'no, that's the person that picked him.' That's the way Ron did it... There was a lot of respect for him. It was a mutual thing."

Ron Eck lived in Beech Grove most all of his life, except a short time when he and his wife, Linda, were first married. He and Linda had five children. Ron became involved in coaching at Beech Grove Little League in 1966, the year after his son was born. Back then, the league was located by Beech Grove Middle School.

"We were in the process of making ball diamonds on 9th Street," Ron said. "I got on the board, somehow. At

that time, Bob Kroening was the president."

In 1971, Beech Grove opened its Little League at 724 S. 9th Ave. Ten years after he began coaching, Ron became president of the league.

"It appealed to me so much that I just kept doing it for 15 years," he said. "When I first got involved, I could see nothing was going to get done if someone did not start it. We had one little tractor, trying to cut five diamonds with. By the time I was done we had a big Kubota and an International. We kept the ground in pretty good shape. I had some very fine guys who already passed, Bob Laker and John Spitz, help with the grounds."

Ron estimates that he coached at least 500 children during his time at the league.

"I had a lot of respect, the way people listened to what I had to say," he said. "I just listened to the Little League book. They have the right rules. If you can show people what you have to do, they'll go along with it. Other little leagues in our district gave us more respect than any other league. District 7 tried to get me on the board. I said one board is enough for me."

He also coached booster basketball for a few years during the little league's off season.

"I liked the people; I still do. Every time I see someone from the past, they say they wish I was down there. Some of the old players will message me, keep in contact."

Ron says he always thought the Little League was improving every year, with better attendance, grounds and board members. (Continued on page 7)



“He did the sign-ups in those days; it was \$15,” Harrison said. “If there were kids that couldn’t pay it, it was a known fact that Ron would pay it himself. Today, and even in those days, the little league season runs the end of April to end of June or July. You would see Ron there August, October, December. It didn’t matter. Ron put a lot of time down there even when Little League wasn’t going on. He was a hard working individual and he loved doing it.”

Ron said the only reason he stepped down as president, in 1999, is because his wife was getting sick, and he wanted to spend more time with her while saving for a better retirement.

“Most men would only stay really involved as long as their kids were in it,” he said. “My son was married when I quit.”

He worked as a job setter at Ford. He retired early from Ford to take care of Linda, who passed away in 2013.

“One of my favorite memories is winning that Division Championship,” Ron said, of being a coach. “As far as being president, I loved every minute of that. If things had worked out right, if my wife had stayed healthy, I’d be the oldest person there. I’d still be there. I loved it that much.”

For his years of dedication to Beech Grove and the little league, the Beech Grove City Council recognized Ron with a resolution at its July 5 meeting, stating that the entrance to the league would be named Ron Eck

Drive in his honor.

“I was really impressed,” Ron said. “I still don’t think I deserve anything more than anyone else. Only thing I did different is I was there year-round. Nine months out of the year I’d be there by myself, taking care of grounds work.”

The sign was put up at on July 6. Ron said his family had a party for him the following weekend to celebrate.


“Since I’ve been on the council, we recognized Dan Challis who for years he put in time at the parks Department,” Harrison said. “We recognized Dick Templin at the city ball diamond because he put in so many years as American Legion coach. Both of them passed away. They never knew it... I thought, why wait until they’re gone to do it? He was very grateful. He said it was not needed, but if we were going to do it he was very grateful. I thought it was a nice honor for him.”

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

At Center Grove, our vision is for all students to have an "exceptional educational experience." The 2015-2016 school year provided us with many experiences to celebrate. Our graduating seniors earned more than \$5 million dollars in scholarships. 


Southside community gathers to remember and honor fallen Beech Grove Lt. Thomas Kleis

On Tuesday, May 28, 1991 Beech Grove Police Lieutenant Thomas L. Kleis made the ultimate sacrifice when he was killed in the line of duty.

In recognition of Thomas' sacrifice, the Fraternal Order of Police #86 and Beech Grove Police Department gathered on July 7 for a Legacy Plaque Placement. A plaque with Thomas' photo has been placed on Shelbyville Road near E. Edgewood Ave., near where he lost his life.

"Today is my dad's birthday," said Lisa Blackwell, of Greenwood, to the crowd that gathered for the ceremony. "He would have been 69 years old. He made such an incredible impact on so many lives that he will continue to live on in their hearts. This beautiful plaque... will also help reinforce his legacy. When people drive by and see it, they will know of the day that Lt. Thomas L. Kleis made the ultimate sacrifice while serving the people and protecting the people of Beech Grove... Even after death, my dad has still taught me things. One of those important lessons is to always live, laugh and love with everything you have. Live life to the fullest because you never know when you or someone you love will be taken from you with no warning at all. You're never promised tomorrow so make today count."

Lt. Kleis was in pursuit of suspects in a stolen vehicle when his police vehicle left the roadway and crashed. He was killed in the motor vehicle crash. The two suspects were later apprehended and charged with involuntary manslaughter, reckless homicide, multiple vehicle thefts, and fleeing law enforcement.

"I'm so grateful for the honor bestowed on Tom today," said Marty Kleis-Iria, who was Thomas' wife. "I'm so grateful to see so many people that I haven't seen in a long time, on this special day, on his birthday."

Mike and Dave Need Wedding Dates... tired, overused jokes

As the beloved and often-quoted film, *Wedding Crashers* and a cadre of other similar films have shown, weddings can be an ideal place to meet someone or several someones. It's often the perfect combination of booze, partying and young, single individuals looking to have a good time. One new film takes a comedic look at what can happen when hard-partying people have too much fun too often. *Mike and Dave Need Wedding Dates*, starring Anna Kendrick and Zac Efron, opened in theaters this past weekend.

Mike and Dave Need Wedding Dates is, as you might have deciphered from the title, about Mike Stangle (Adam Devine) and Dave Stangle (Zac Efron) searching for wedding dates. The film begins with Mike and Dave's mother and father sitting the duo down and bluntly explaining their disappointment and utter dismay at Mike and Dave's behavior at past family get togethers. Mike and Dave are told they must find dates for their sister's Hawaiian destination wedding, a tactic meant to keep the two from hitting on every woman in attendance and making drunken fools of themselves.

On their quest to find dates Mike and Dave post an ad on Craigslist explaining their predicament and the included all expenses paid trip to Hawaii. Needless to say, the two get plenty of attention from women hoping to score a free trip to Hawaii. Two hard-partying women, Alice (Anna Kendrick) and Tatiana (Aubrey Plaza), who have recently had a string of bad luck, catch Mike

and Dave on TV talking about their need to find wedding dates. Alice and Tatiana soon hatch a plan to get the boys' attention. Soon enough, the four are headed to the Aloha state, but things don't go quite as Mike and Dave's parents had hoped.

As far as the story goes, it really does not get much simpler or weaker than this one. The entire plot is essentially spelled out in the title of the film. It's basically a movie filled with as many raunchy, R-rated jokes and gags as possible, but with the tiniest smattering of a plot so that it can still be classified as a story.

While the film does have an exceedingly high number of jokes and gags in its hour and 38-minute runtime, the majority of them miss the mark. Due to the film's lazy writing, most of the jokes have been heard many times before. Adam Devine provides most of the laughs with his earnestness to seemingly try anything at any time, but that does get tiring after awhile.

The entire cast of *Mike and Dave Need Wedding Dates* genuinely seemed to have had a good time making the film. However, due to the lazy writing and tired jokes, the audience doesn't have nearly as much fun. 2 out 5.

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Why people should listen to me

How does one become a Grammar Guy? In my case, I graduated with honors (Latin honors!) with a dual-degree in journalism and English, I was the managing editor of a newspaper and I knew what an interrobang was. Also, when the job opened up I asked.

How does one establish ethos with their audience? See above.

Whatever I go on to say now – as long as it's about grammar – I've foregrounded a sense of expertise and authority on my part. That is what Aristotle dubbed ethos – one of the three modes of persuasion.

If you read last week's column, you know we're talking about rhetoric and the art of persuasion on the campaign trail. And in our (still presumptive, as of this writing) Democratic and Republican candidates, we see two very different methods of establishing ethos.

Hillary Clinton tends to lead first with her credentials and experience – what Aristotle called phronesis. Consider this passage from

his "Nicomachean Ethics:"

"...Prudence [phronesis] includes a knowledge of particular facts, and this is derived from experience, which a young man does not possess; for experience is the fruit of years."

In her opponent, Donald Trump, we see more of an emphasis on Aristotle's two other aspects of ethos: arete (excellence/virtue) and eunoia (goodwill).

Trump is, by nearly all accounts, a supremely gifted self-promoter, which is key to establishing ethos. Consider this quote from a speech in December:

"I went to an Ivy League school," Trump said, a point he frequently brings up to establish his excellence. "I'm very highly educated. I know words. I have the best words."

Trump also repeatedly points to his successful business ventures, his great personal fortune and his trouncing of his Republican rivals as proof of his virtue (arete). Ethos. Ethos.

In another skillful rhetorical move, the

New York real estate mogul in June both tried to damage Clinton's perceived goodwill with voters (eunoia) while building his own. Referencing Clinton's campaign slogan, "I'm with her," Trump told a crowd on June 22, "You know what my response to that is? I'm with you, the American people."

It's worth noting that establishing ethos doesn't happen just because you say you're great – there has to be some grounding in reality. Trump can promote his image as a deal-maker because of his successes in business. Clinton can frame herself as the foreign policy expert because of her vast experience as a

first lady, senator and secretary of state. Me claiming either of those things? Not as persuasive. That's why I stick to snarky grammar columns.

Zucchini's fiber aids digestion, prevents constipation, maintains low blood sugar, curbs overeating and helps prevent snarky carcinogenic toxins from homesteading in your colon. The squashes' C and A anti-inflammatory and antioxidant energy can prevent many types of cancer.

Weekly Devotion

"O Lord, correct me, but with judgment; not in thine anger, lest thou bring me to nothing." ~ Jeremiah 10:24

In today's Scripture, Jeremiah asks the Lord to correct him. Notice that he adds that he wanted to be corrected by God's judgment and not in His anger because His anger would reduce him to nothing. Jeremiah knows, as we all should, that God is right all the time. Being right all the time is a great thing but expecting us to be right all of the time and judging us for not being right every time and all of the time and being angry about it would be disastrous for us.

Isn't it a wonderful thing that God is compassionate toward us and that He loves us in spite of the fact that sometimes we do some things in our ignorance of His will? Who of us can say that we are perfect in the sense that we never make emotional, social, logical, mistakes? Lack of knowledge and wisdom gets all of us into trouble from time to time. It is not that we make these mistakes as rebels against God and His will; it is that sometimes we just don't know better. That is Jeremiah. The idea of asking God to correct him came out of a desire to be right with God and to know what being right with Him meant to Him. All of us should take that position as we begin our day and as continue on into the remainder of our lives. It is not how we see right or wrong that matters so much as God's way of seeing it. All of us should ask Him to let us see ourselves as He sees us and to ask Him to correct any wrong thing in us.

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
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
