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



Marion County fireworks ordinance takes effect

FIREWORKS – The Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department Homeland Security Bureau reminds Marion County residents that the Marion County fireworks ordinance will be in effect starting June 28. Hours for fireworks use on and around July 4 in Marion County are: 5 p.m. until two hours after sunset June 28 through July 3; 10 a.m. to midnight on July 4; 5 p.m. until two hours after sunset July 5 through July 9. Under Indiana law, you must be at least 18-years-old to buy fireworks and someone who is 18 or older must be present when fireworks are being set off. Violators of the ordinance are subject to fines.

GREENWOOD COMMON COUNCIL

Meeting, June 20

- What happened: Resolution 16-09 passed second reading, Resolution 16-11 was introduced and passed first reading.
- What it means: Resolution 16-09 states that the City of Greenwood Police Department has applied for the Edward Bryne Justice Assistant Grant (JAG Grant). The Police Department will receive a federal grant of \$19,083 to be used towards the purchase of law enforcement equipment.

Resolution 16-11 will update the Johnson County Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan. This plan is updated every five years and is in place to help take action before a disaster occurs in order to reduce the harm to people and property.

■ What's next: Resolution 16-09 will go into effect. Resolution 16-11 will go for its second reading at the July 6th meeting.

SOUTHPORT CITY COUNCIL

Meeting, June 20

- What happened: The council passed Resolutions 2016-6 and 7, and Ordinances 16.06.01 and 16.06.02.
- What it means: Resolution 6 was in response to state legislation which requires government entities to establish internal control policies. This gives oversight to financial documents. Southport's Internal Control Oversight Committee will consist of the mayor, clerk-treasurer and a member of the common council.

Resolution 7 stated that after investigation, a new police station is needed and approved a form for lease for the acquisition, construction, installation and equipping of a new police station.

Ordinance 16.06.01 appropriated \$20,000 into the Law Enforcement Continuing Education Fund.

Ordinance 16.06.02 establishes the creation of LOIT (Local Option Income Tax) Special Distribution Fund. Monies in this fund are to be used on local roads and streets.

■ What's next: These resolutions and ordinances will go into effect.

Southport City Council looks to construct new police station

The Southport City Council approved a resolution on Monday, June 20 that would allow for the Southport Police Department to pursue the construction of a new police station.

The police station is currently located within the Southport Community Center at 6901 Derbyshire Rd.

"One of our goals is to build the new police department, not only for more space but for security reasons," said Southport Chief of Police, Thomas Vaughn. "We're up to about 40 guys right now with nine in the academy. We've outgrown the current police department. We want to make sure our employees are taken care of as well as our visitors."

In its June meeting, the Board of Public Works & Safety authorized the circulation of a petition allowing the City to begin the exploration process of building a new police station. In less than a week 65 signatures have been obtained.

The city will pay off a Redevelopment Commission bond Jan. 15, 2017, which would allow the city to lease-finance a new police station while maintaining the same tax rate for its taxpayers.

"We do need a new police station," said Diana Bossingham, Southport Clerk-Treasurer. "It's been a concern of every administration. It was time to explore building our own."

The city first looked at partnering with a business to relocate the police department to another building that exists within the city. Available locations either could not meet code or would be cost-prohibitive to renovate.

The city is looking to build the new facility on the former concrete plant property which it owns. A portion of this land was recently sold to Randy Faulkner & Associates for the construction of a parking lot for Southport Station, formerly the Gerdt building.

The new building would not only be the headquarters for the police department, but the training academy as well. The academy currently meets in Indianapolis on Brookville Road, in Hancock County for the shooting range and in Plainfield for the Emergency Vehicle Operator Course (EVOC). Having everything in-house in Southport would also allow for the department to host more community classes. The proposed space is 8,000 square feet. The city is looking to finance the project for under \$1 million.

"Yes, we're dreaming big," Bossingham said. "Maybe we don't get it all at once. But if you don't plan the entire thing, you could put the building in the wrong place and not be able to add onto it."

Since Vaughn became chief in 2012, the police department has added more officers to its reserve department, leased/purchased four new police vehicles and began a certified police academy to train new recruits. The department has obtained body cameras, Tasers, and bikes thanks to donations to the department. They are in the process of fundraising for ballistic vests which they will purchase in October.

"One of our goals is how do we lower cost for the citizens and still get the stuff we need?" Vaughn said. "We started off with baby steps. We now have the equipment we need. The next step is this. Our goal is to build something that the city is proud of, is functional for the police department and will last for years down the road at the least cost possible. Doing it right and having the citizens' input in it is important."

The city will host public meetings regarding the police station beginning in July. The target date to close on the bond is Sept. 29, 2016.

"It's exciting as a fiscal officer to look at something like this and say we can do this," Bossingham said. "We can support it. It makes sense."

After positive interactions with another law enforcement officer at the Johnson County Sheriff's Department, Joseph Pierce decided to switch careers and become a deputy in 2013.

"I pictured myself working with these types of people," he said. "The guys on my shift, they make it fun to do the job."

As a former mechanic, the job was a big change, but one that he said he always dreamed about.

"I can't imagine doing anything else," he said. "You have this idea that you want to do it because you want to help people. But when you do the job, you realize how many facets of the job there actually are. You get home so mentally drained, but there are so many things you get to do that make it worth it."

Pierce was born and raised in Germany, where his dad served in the Air Force. The family moved to Greenwood when he was in the 8th grade. He now lives in the Center Grove area with his wife, two daughters and one son.

What was your inspiration to go into law enforcement?

To help other people and serve the public. I'm from a military family so service is in the blood. I was never in the military but this was a dream and I finally pursued it.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

Finding a lost child that was reported missing. They had gone off with some friends. The parents were scared to death, terrified that they didn't know where their child was. When you return them home, the parents are grateful and it's a pretty proud moment doing the job.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

Bad accidents, notifications, having to let families know people have been hurt or worse. Dealing with distressed individuals because every case is different. You can't apply the same tactics to one as you can the other.

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

I have three children. I spend a lot of time with them. I love cars and going to the drag strip.

What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

Immediate goals are to keep learning, keep getting better at the job. It's ever changing. Eventually I'd like to try out for the SWAT team or scuba team and one day test for sergeant or lieutenant. Right now my goal is to become a better officer... I like that we aren't held to a certain location. We can assist all the different agencies. It's nice because you can learn from them when you're backing them up, too

What would you have done if you hadn't become a deputy?

I was a mechanic for 10 years before I did this, so I'd probably be fixing vehicles, working on engines.



TWACE IN CHACU

Tennis was about more than the triumph for Mary Grace (Lauck) Lawler of Perry Township

Tennis was never about victory for Mary Grace (Lauck) Lawler, Perry Township resident. If she lost, she said "the world didn't crash." Competing was about the fellowship, interaction with people and getting to see new places.

Yet, she did win - a lot. She used to have a garage full of trophies, with more in the attic and throughout the house. Though she's given most of the trophies away, she hasn't lost interest in the sport.

Grace, who celebrated her 96th birthday on

June 19, was born and raised on the Southside of Indianapolis, attending Sacred Heart High School. Her father built a tennis court at their family home, where Grace practiced the sport in her early years.

"I had seven brothers and sisters, so I had a lot of competition," she said. "You could get a match about any day of the week."

Residing close to Garfield Park, she would play tennis there, and said they had a lot of good players. She would compete in small city tournaments that were held at each park.

Among the trophies she has kept is the first one she won in 1939 and the last one she won in 1969 as Doubles

Champion at the Glenns Valley Invitational. Her favorite is from the Indianapolis Women's Singles. Players had to win that championship three times to bring home the trophy. Grace won the championship in 1946 and 1948 under her maiden name, Lauck. She married her husband Jack before winning again in 1949, under Lawler. She said she was told, jokingly, that she couldn't bring it home because her name wasn't on it three times.

Grace said she was best at returning a serve, placing the ball out of reach of her opponent. Serving was more challenging for her – noting her height, 5-feet, could be a factor.

Although all of her victories were local to Indianapolis, she said she did have the opportunity to travel and play in other parts of the country. She moved to California for a few years during WWII, where she worked in the accounting department for Lockheed. While there, she and a friend entered the mixed doubles competition at the Pacific Southwest Championships.

"What a place!" she said, "I was there rubbing elbows with the champs and future champs. We were low man on the totem pole. We lost first round, but I got to see some world-ranked players — men and women. That was our reason for entering."

She and her sister returned to Indianapolis after the war. Grace and her late husband have four children, seven grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

"We all played tennis," said her son, Dan Lawler. "We always played ping pong in the garage...She was better than all of us until she was about 60. She would go out and hit the ball until she was 82, 83. She was good even then."

While she doesn't play anymore, it's likely that when she's at home, her television is turned to a tennis match – such as The Championships and Wimbledon, which will take place on June 27 to July 10. She keeps up to date with the current

scores through the newspaper and TV. She said she enjoys watching youth start out and follow them as they progress. She knows first-hand the opportunities playing the sport can give a young person – even at a local level.

"It was a lot of fun and a lot of nice places and people," she said. "It opened the door to a lot of long-lasting friendships. It added much to my life – not only sportsmanship but making new friends, traveling, countless experiences."

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
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'Happy & hopeful'

Relay for Life of Southeast Indy brings the community together for remembrance and friendship

Relay for Life of Southeast Indy brought together 1,200 people throughout the 24-hour period on June 17 and 18.

The event fundraises for the American Cancer Society and brings awareness to the effects of all types of cancer.

"I can't believe how many people come together here," said Dan Jones, of Irvington. He and his wife were team captains for their first year at the Southeast Indy Event. It was their seventh year participating in Relay. "It's such an awesome community. Everyone is so supportive of everyone."

Southeast Indy raised \$53,000 this year, exceeding the goal of \$50,000.

Participants form teams, with one person from each team walking around Beech Grove Middle School's track at all times during the event. This year's event also included themed laps, a luminary ceremony to remember those who have lost the fight to cancer, a Glow Run 5k and survivor's ceremony.

"I felt that we had an amazing event," said event leader, Millie Sowers, of Perry Township. She continued, "The Survivor Ceremony is always touching. There are survivors in wheelchairs, some who are suffering side effects of treatment and they never let on. The perseverance of those who struggle with this dreaded disease is unbelievable."

Beech Grove High School Coach Matt English, who not only survived brain cancer, but has had numerous close family members affected by cancer, has been participating in the Southeast Indy Relay for four years. His family has volunteered for it for three years.

"Our daughter loves it - our 7 year old. She's been walking the whole time," he said. "All these people make this a happy, hopeful event. There are a lot of great stories and great people out here. Even though it's about cancer, it's uplifting."



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
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Greenwood's Dr. Liechty obtains optometry fellowship

Central Intelligence... forgettable and unoriginal

In the world of comedy and really entertainment in general, there likely aren't any bigger names right now than Kevin Hart. Hollywood has stuck the funnyman in nearly every conceivable comedic situation and

story. In what seems like every few months a new film starring the comedian pops up at the theater. Hoping to continue to reap the benefits of Hart's current immense popularity, another film starring the standup comic recently hit theaters, Central Intelligence.

Central Intelligence is the story of Calvin Joyner (Hart), a mild-mannered accountant who has recently become dissatisfied with

his middle class life. Calvin's upcoming 20year high school reunion only helps further exacerbate the problem as he looks back on his life and wonders what could have been. Detecting Calvin's frustration and unhappiness with life, his wife suggests they start seeing a marriage counselor. However, an out of the blue Facebook friend request changes Calvin's outlook on life forever.

The request is from the former morbidly obese laughing stock of Calvin's high school class, Bob Stone (Dwayne Johnson). Seconds after accepting his request, Stone suggests going out for drinks that night. However, Bob is nothing like what Calvin remembers: he's fit, trim, has women fawning all over him and an ability to physically overpower and out muscle most men. Little does Calvin know Bob has other reasons for their spontaneous meet up. Hours after getting reacquainted with Bob, the CIA shows up at Calvin's door. Calvin's once boring and uneventful life is turned upside down as he's dodging bullets while in the middle of international espionage.

As with any comedy, the jokes in Central Intelligence come fast and furious, taking every opportunity possible for a laugh.

And also like a lot of comedies, not all of the jokes land. However, the average number of jokes connecting in Central Intelligence is much, much lower than most. Most of the gags are either unoriginal or just aren't even funny at all. Sure there's one or two relatively funny moments, usually courtesy of Johnson, but that's basically it. When some of the funniest material is part of the outtakes,

something is very wrong.

Central Intelligence's story is actually better than expected, especially considering Hart's past film ventures. Unfortunately, the story too is just average and nothing that couldn't be seen in any other comedic buddy cop movie.

Central Intelligence isn't a terrible film, but it's definitely a forgetful one. It's unlikely to be remembered by anyone much past opening weekend. 2.5 out of 5.



Greenwood seeks additional downtown trail connectivity

REVITALIZATION OF DOWNTOWN - The Greenwood Redevelopment Commission (RDC) has given approval for City officials to place purchase offers on two properties in downtown Greenwood: 301 S. Meridian St. (Appraised value: \$86,500) - The purchase of this property will allow Greenwood to extend Pleasant Creek Trail from Craig Park to South Meridian Street, providing connectivity between Old City Park and the Greenwood Amphitheater. The trail would also provide needed pedestrian access between Old City Park and the Greenwood Community Center; 21 E. Main St. (Appraised value: \$91,500) – Purchasing this property, located just north of Greenwood's famous Mrs. Curl Ice Cream Shop, will allow the City to make a variety of site improvements to the area, including widened sidewalks and additional parking.

Greenwood Mayor Mark W. Myers says the purchases and proposed projects will continue the City's downtown revitalization and enhance the quality of life for Greenwood citizens.

"Downtown Greenwood is experiencing a significant transformation," said Myers. "We're working to create a vibrant, walkable, aesthetically pleasing destination for both residents and visitors. Pedestrian access and connectivity between parks, event venues and other popular Greenwood businesses and destinations in the area are major components of this process."

RDC President Brent Tilson says the approvals continue efforts by the commission and City to support downtown businesses.

"The primary function of the RDC is to support current business activity and attract new businesses to Greenwood," said Tilson. "Downtown is a significant area of focus in this regard. In addition to these projects, we're in the midst of restoring more than 20 downtown building facades, and we're in the planning stages for significant downtown corridor enhancements. We've created some really good momentum and will continue to build on that moving forward."

Mrs. Curl Ice Cream Shop, a Greenwood icon for more than 50 years, continues to attract large crowds daily. Given the popularity of Mrs. Curl and other businesses in the area, the City believes additional parking, wider sidewalks and other site improvements are welcome additions for both business owners and their patrons. City officials have worked closely with Mrs. Curl, consulting owners throughout the planning process.

"This project addresses a short-term need but also fits into our vision for the future for downtown Greenwood," said Myers. "Walkability, safe pedestrian access and congregation, connectivity – this is the formula for a successful downtown, and we're going to keep identifying and pursuing opportunities to revitalize the heart of Greenwood."

The RDC's approval allows City officials to begin negotiations for the two properties, which share an owner. That process will begin immediately, and the City hopes for final agreements in the next month or two.



There is tap water, bottled water, mineral water, rain water, distilled water, soda water, seltzer water, branch water, ditch water, Holy Water, sugar water, oxygen water, caffeine water, vitamin-fortified water, rose water, and the proverbial bridge over troubled waters. Whatever you call it, water is a requirement of all life. Most people believe they drink enough but a majority live in the state of mild dehydration.

Flushed your pipes recently? You're a system of plumbing and drains that need regular flushing or they'll clog and back up. A charming thought. Water helps rid your temple of waste and toxins via the liver and kidneys. What if at your home you're allowed to throw away only part of your garbage daily? After a few weeks, your home would be pretty snarky.
