## Chris Harrell

**Battalion Chief originally joined Greenwood Fire for its professionalism**

### BEHIND the BADGE

As a battalion chief for the Greenwood Fire Department, Chris Harrell says he enjoys spending time with the firemen on his shift, learning about them and how to help them grow in their career.

Harrell grew up in Southeastern Kentucky, joining the Air Force at 18. He spent seven years as a firefighter for the Air Force, serving in Operation Desert Shield and Desert Storm. After returning to the U.S., he worked in California in the department of forestry, the department of defense as a firefighter and in Fayetteville, N.C. before coming to the Indianapolis Airport.

After taking a training class with some part-time Greenwood firemen, he was encouraged to apply to the department.

"Their professionalism – walking in and seeing the organization and how it ran," he says about why he chose to work for Greenwood. "Knowing that 80 percent at that time was part time, and how it still ran as a career department. Now that's probably 60/40."

He was hired part time at the Greenwood Fire Department in 1998. He was hired full time in 2005 as a captain. He was promoted to battalion chief in 2013. Harrell resides in the Center Grove area with his wife, Melissa, and four children.

#### What was your inspiration to become a firefighter?

I started in the Air Force as a firefighter... It was more of a desire of the unknown, something different. The best thing, for most everyone, is helping people.

#### What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

You're helping people at their worst times. Being able to help them when they're down is awesome. Helping them is the most gratifying... When I was at the airport, we went to New York on 9/11. To see how that all comes together, everyone helping each other, the citizens and everyone swarming into the different sites and making it work – America as it's supposed to be. But again, it's everyone's worst time.

#### What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

Managing day-to-day operations in the ever-changing fire service. When I came in 27 years ago to now, it's almost night and day. The generation that's coming up now is smarter, faster and do things better than my

generation. Technology is their forte. Managing the generations and making that blend and come together as one is a challenge.

#### What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

Baseball. I love spending time with family and going to baseball games, softball, basketball, sporting events.

#### What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

At this point as a battalion chief I've gone further than I thought I would. It just depends on the right opportunity at the right time. Personally, to be a better husband, father and follower. You can never learn enough.

#### What would you have done if you hadn't become a firefighter?

I would be in law enforcement.

# FACES *of* FREEDOM

## OUR ANNUAL SALUTE TO OUR VETERANS

### Southside residents Mike Earnest, Jim Girdley and Judd Green share experiences of their U.S. military service in the Middle East

The Fourth of July, as we all well know, is a celebration of this great nation's birth—240 years ago Congress adopted the Declaration of Independence. Since then, millions of citizens have donned the military uniform in service to protect the liberties and freedom of the United States. Countless souls have been lost, untold acts of heroism committed, all in the name of our country 'tis of thee.

"The reason you and I can sit here, in Bargersville, Indiana, in this free country, is because our men died so we can do this," said Judd Green, of Greenwood, who served in the Marine Corps. "We should never forget the sacrifices other people make for us so we can live the lives we're living. Along with that goes the responsibility to live the best lives we can."

The Southside has more than its share of U.S. veterans who risked their lives for those freedoms. Here, learn the stories of three residents: Mike Earnest, Jim Girdley and Judd Green.

### Mike Earnest

It's been 10 years since Mike Earnest was honorably discharged from the Army in 2006, yet he still wears his dog tags every day. Those two pieces of aluminum were with him through two tours in Iraq, a symbol of a turning point in his life.

"Before I went in, I was going nowhere fast," he said. "When I got out of the military, I had leadership skills, work ethic and strive to do good things."

Mike graduated from Beech Grove High School in 2000. He joined the National Guard in October of that year. He went active duty, 101st Airborne Division, after 9/11. In February 2003 he was sent to Kuwait, stationed near the Iraqi border for a month and a half.

"It was me and my fellow soldiers," he said. "We were excited. I know that sounds strange. We wanted to do that job. We were young with not a fear in the world."

He said, "We thought Saddam Hussein would back down and we could go home within a month. It never clicked in our brains that we would be doing so much. We saw the president give the 24-hour ultimatum to Saddam. Then we started to think this might be real. The next day we got the call that said we're going in. We were pretty nervous at that point. We were in Southern

Iraq and marched until the city of Mosul, the most northern part of Iraq. We were the only unit to go that far up into the country."

Mike was assigned to supply, serving as a gunner on convoys, transporting supplies to military bases. After his 13-month tour, Mike returned home for almost 10 months before being deployed for another 13 months in Iraq.

"The second time I was scared to death," he said. "I knew what I was going to go through, what I was going to see and didn't want to do that again. The first time we were just dealing with Saddam's army. The second time we were dealing with Al Qaeda. By that time Al Qaeda had gone into Iraq. That's when a lot of the roadside bombs and strategic operations from the bad guys were taking place. We knew it was going to be a bigger ball game."

He said, "The second time I was there, I was in a gun truck squad. Our mission was to escort and protect convoys all over the city of Baghdad. I was in the lead gun truck. I saw a lot more action my second time because I was on the road so much. We had 156 missions and never lost one guy. All missions were successfully completed."

When he returned home after his second tour, Mike says he knew he wanted to get a job right away.

"A lot of guys that saw a lot of action get into trouble with PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder), because they let their minds wander," he said. "I knew the best thing was to get a

job right away and focus on something... It's been about 12 years since a lot of that was going on. I'm happy to see a lot of veterans I served with doing good things with their lives. I had two buddies lose their lives because of PTSD. June 27 (was) national PTSD awareness day. There are 22 veterans that die of PTSD every day. As more time separates from the Iraq war to now, people should still focus on awareness. While I may be fine, the guy to my left or right might not be."

Mike initially worked as a corrections officer in Johnson County. With his son on the way, he got a job at Joe's Crab Shack. When the Southside Indianapolis restaurant closed, he was offered a position at Logan's Roadhouse in Greenwood, his favorite place to eat, where he currently works as a manager. Mike resides in Beech Grove with his wife, Mechelle, son, Tristan and daughter, Mia.

"I found that the restaurant business is what I was made to do," he said. "It's what I enjoy the most. I really flourished at it so I got into management. I take the things I learned in the military like hard work, discipline, how to follow orders. I wouldn't be here today if it wasn't for that."

### Jim Girdley

Although he realized how good American citizens have it before his deployment to Afghanistan, Jim Girdley said you recognize just how many luxuries of everyday life that we have after spending time in a war-torn country. He resided on a military base that is 5/8 of a squared mile with one place to eat, one coffee shop and dependent on aircraft to bring in fresh foods.

Jim has resided in Greenwood most of his life. A 1975 graduate of Center Grove High School, he was involved in athletics including football, wrestling and track. After graduation, he went to work in construction, a family business. The business closed in the early 80s. He joined the National Guard Reserve in 1984. In 1986 he went to officer candidate school and was commissioned as a lieutenant. He and his wife, Meresa, and three children moved to Ft. Milburn in Virginia for six months.

"My kids got to see Washington DC," he said. "Every weekend we went around to see another museum, another memorial, another battlefield. They got an early education in history, civics, and living with people from all over."

When they returned home to the Center Grove area, Jim remained in the military. In 2002, Jim went into the Guard full-time, stepping down from his 12-year position at Eli Lilly. In 2004, he was deployed to Bosnia for nine months. In 2009, he was deployed to Afghanistan for 10 months.

"The first time you're lying in bed and you hear a rocket go overhead and explode in the distance - that was a defining moment," Jim said. "I worked training Afghans in a headquarters, kind of like a corporate headquarters. It was very different. We weren't under fire often. You had to keep your guard up, for sure. There was always the question of when an Afghan might turn on you. That happened about two weeks after I was gone; an Afghan strapped a bomb on himself and killed four or five people."

Jim said he was fortunate with the people he was assigned to train. "The neatest thing was, I did get to work with an Afghan colonel who was very interested in improving himself and Afghanistan," he said. "There were many of my peers over there that had people who were very corrupt with no desire to make things better. I had one of my best jobs ever in the military,

working with this group of fairly young Afghans, learning how to do things better for them and their country."

While he was deployed in Afghanistan, Jim said his son was, too. Their tours overlapped for four months.

"I was both proud and fearful," he said. "It was nerve-wracking knowing he was in harm's way every day."

When Jim returned to the U.S., he spent a year at Camp Atterbury before he retired from the Guard in 2011. He returned to Afghanistan for a year as a contractor.

Transitioning home, Jim said, is sometimes more difficult than leaving.

"Part of it is muscle memory and reacting to things in different ways, not liking loud noises, not liking crowds," Jim said. "I'm still very cautious. Your wife and family have learned to live without you for that long. When you come back, you don't just fit right in. You have to learn to live

together again. You have changed so much, though the person that left 12 months ago looks the same and sounds the same."

Jim currently works at Lowe's in Franklin and co-owns Rescue Duct. Jim also stays busy as a member of the Greenwood and Franklin Chambers of Commerce. He and his wife are members of Bluff Creek Christian Church and are involved at Center Grove High School where his wife works.

By the end of the summer, he said he plans to focus solely on Rescue Duct and will be happy to be down to a 40-hour work week.

"I had 27 years of (the military), more of a share than most," he said. "I truly enjoyed being a soldier and a leader, but now I enjoy being out of it completely and having my own business. I'm still organizing, still planning, still leading - just for myself."

## Judd Green

Judd Green says it was an honor to serve his country in uniform - an honor which he received twice. He not only served a tour overseas in Vietnam from 1966 to '67, but again 40 years later in Iraq.

Judd's father was career army, so the family moved around a lot. Judd graduated from Arlington High School and joined the Marine Corps. He went to boot camp in San Diego, infantry training. It wasn't long before he was sent to Vietnam for a 13-month deployment. He was in Vietnam from 1966 to '67, becoming a sergeant.

"I tried to serve honorably in Vietnam but it does change you," Judd said. "You're never the same as you were before. It gives you a magnificent appreciation for life - yours and other peoples. We should be thankful for that."

He continued, "I lost a number of friends

who were killed in action. One group of them was killed by what they called then a roadside bomb. It was an IED (Improvised Explosive Device). I stayed in country until my tour was over. I decided the best way I could honor their memories was to live a good, honorable life. That's what I've tried to do my whole life."

After he returned home, he joined the Indianapolis Police Department in 1969 where he retired in 2000. He ran a private detective agency after retirement from 2000 to 2009. He was then offered a position as a law enforcement advisor with the Marine Corps, so long as he would give a four-year commitment to go to either Afghanistan or Iraq.

"In 2009 when the Department of Defense said if you go to Iraq or Afghanistan for a year, you can save young soldiers from being killed from IEDs," he said, "I thought well, I couldn't save my friends who were killed in Vietnam but I might be able to go and save some other sons and daughters and send them back to their families."

He told his wife, Candee, that he was headed to his second war. He was leaving behind his wife, two children and seven grandchildren.

"Some of my family thought I was crazy," he said. "My wife kissed me goodbye and said nothing will happen to you that God doesn't allow to happen. She prayed for me

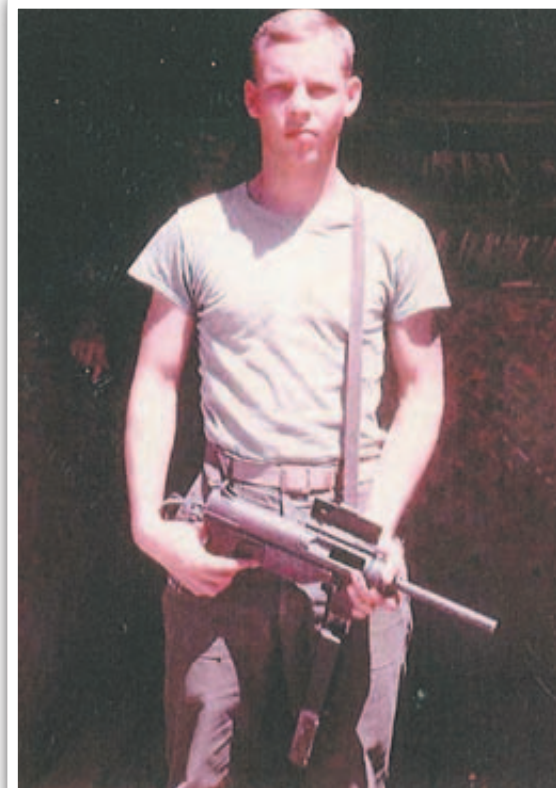
and I prayed for her while I was gone, that God would take care of her and my family. I thought it was the right thing. It was an honor to be able to serve America twice in one lifetime. I don't know how many people get that chance. People serve in more than one war, but maybe not so far apart."

Judd was sent to Washington DC on April 30, 2010 then to Al Anbar Province, Iraq. He worked in counter insurgency.

"Iraq was like Vietnam in that the enemy many times didn't wear uniforms," he said. "My biggest challenge as an instructor for the Marine Corps, I was teaching Marines about finding IEDs, how to locate weapon caches, how to identify bomb builders... I gave the best training I could to our Marines. I always felt very responsible for the young Marines and they watched over me, too."

When he returned home to Greenwood, Judd served on the Marion County Sheriff's Department for two years. He then accepted the chief's position at the Bargersville Police Department, where he still works.

"I just want to continue to be of service," he said. "In America today, there are too many people that don't have a purpose in life. They just seem to be wandering through their lives. I'm in the last few chapters of my book of life. I would say to those young people, make your life worth it. Do something that feeds your soul and give you purpose in life."

## Longtime resident Pete Hildebrand to serve as grand marshal of Southport July 4th Parade

Pete Hildebrand says an old story goes that if you've ever gotten your feet wet in Buck Creek, you'd come back to Southport. That was true for his parents and that was true for him.

With his long family history in the city, Pete was chosen as the grand marshal in the 5th Annual Southport July 4th Parade & Festival on July 4th, parade beginning 10:30 a.m.

Pete was nominated by Southport resident, Dan Shine.

"Pete has to be one of the oldest residents in the (city) of Southport," Dan wrote. "Pete has served on the Parks Board, he was Santa Claus, and he has volunteered for several different civic events through the years including our Car Shows. He has always been loyal to the (city) of Southport. As a young boy, I always looked up to Pete as a protector."

Pete's grandfather, Fred J. Bradley, bought a house in Southport in 1902 – the house in which Pete currently lives with his wife, Margo, children, Charles and Cathy and granddaughter.

His grandfather lost the house in 1938 after losing his business near the end of the Great Depression. Pete's dad, Oral, graduated from Southport High School in 1926, going to Butler University on a scholarship to play baseball.

"We lived on an apartment on 10th street until I was 8 in 1949, all the while looking for property in Southport," he said. "My dad immediately got involved in all kinds of stuff. He became president of the town board. He was president from the '50s to mid '60s."

After graduating from Southport High School, Pete went into the Marine Corps. He served from 1960 to '64. He moved to the Eastside of Indianapolis where he opened a Shell gas station and later worked for

the phone company. Wanting to return to Southport, he discovered the man who lived in his grandpa's former house was interested in selling.

"I was disappointed at first," Pete said. "I thought Southport would be like the Southport it had always been. It wasn't. There were a lot more people. They added Crossgate to the city in order to be a city... My first political fight I did was fight the stoplight at Southport and McFarland. They took down my mom's house and beautiful stone wall in front of it. We had a lot of meetings. The Gerdt and Davidson boys called me Mr. Remonstrator."

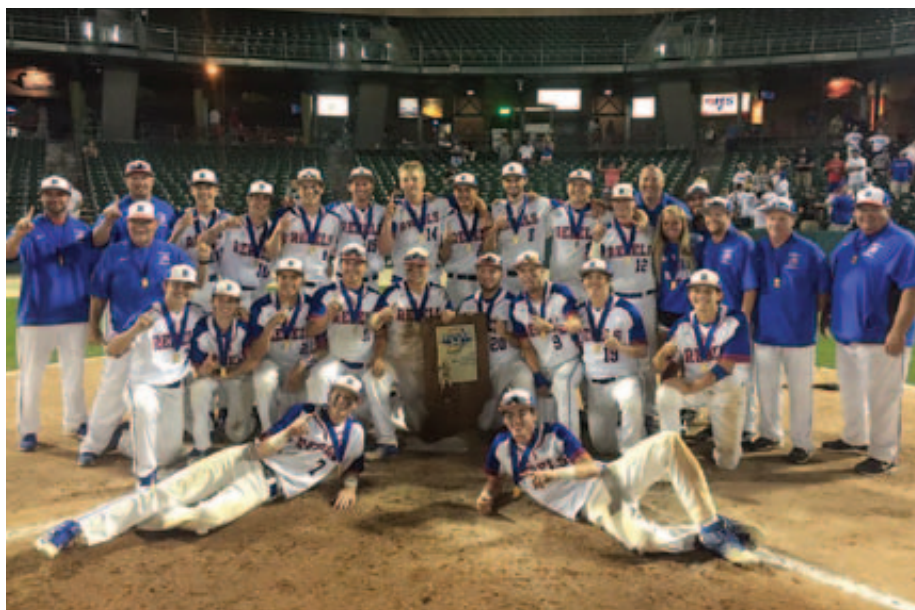
The stoplight went in and Pete says he took a break from the politics. He became involved again helping Rob Thomlin (mayor from 2008-11) with his mayoral campaign and helping form a parks committee from 2010 to '11. Southport continues to grow, and Pete says he's beginning to understand the benefits of that change.

"I'm enjoying now watching this growth take place," he said. "For years and years I was against it. I wanted Southport to be the Southport from the '50s. I've come to grounds that it isn't going to happen. I'm really enthused about some of the things that are happening."

Pete said he looks forward to events such as the July 4th Parade & Festival every year. This year, instead of watching the parade from his front porch, he'll be in the front of the line.

"I'm really surprised that I was asked to do this," he said. "There are so many people that are deserving. Dan Shine and I have always had a good relationship. He ran around with my little brother. I used to protect them when they were little kids and I was a not so little kid. I appreciate the honor."

## Constant care and comfort

Perry Township's Right at Home partners with Philips to offer technology-based in-home care for senior citizens

### IN-HOME SENIOR CARE

Right at Home, 5602 Madison Ave., has partnered with Philips for a new way of providing in-home senior care. The Remote Care program,

which began in June, pairs advanced technology and a personal touch to allow seniors to continue living in their own home.

“One of the biggest issues is people say they don't have a lot of money to dedicate towards care,” said John Kindred, Right at Home owner. “This is a way to provide some care and oversight and to reduce cost. The other aspect is people are hesitant to have someone in their homes, so this is a way to provide care for them.”

The new program has two parts to it. First, caregivers will routinely check in with the senior client once or twice a day through an iPad, used solely for video chat purposes.

“It's set up so we call them, they swipe the screen and we start talking to them,” Kindred said. “When we talk to them; we're checking in with them. It can help with someone who happens to be lonely or needs someone looking in on them. We can see if they look disheveled, if they appear to be disoriented, those sorts of things.”

Second is the CareSensus technology. Motion sensors are installed in the bedroom, bathroom and hallways. Door switches are placed on the inside/outside doors and on the refrigerator.

“Between the motion and door sensors, we can sort of tell what's going on in the home,” Kindred said. “There will be a two-

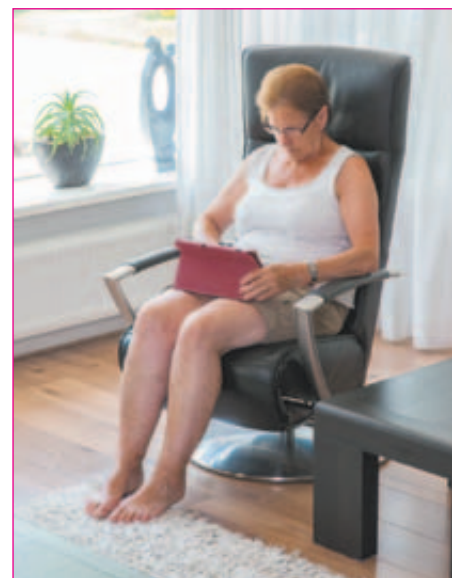
week period where we develop a baseline for what's normal with this person. When they start going outside the norm, we can talk to them and find out what's going on. If the refrigerator isn't opening like it should, we can ask about their eating habits.”

Kindred said if something takes place that is out of the norm for that client, they will learn about it fairly quickly and can work to remedy a potentially bad situation. If the client shows a need for additional in-home care, that can also be provided.

“The good news is that we can tie this together with the care we provide, and do blended care,” Kindred said. “We can furnish hands-on care which is what we do normally. You can use both systems concurrently. You can monitor them to find out through the remote-care system if things are deteriorating in their home. Maybe they're not remembering their medications or having trouble fixing their meals. You blend electronic care with hands-on care.”

Right at Home in Perry Township is one of 25 locations out of 500 national-

Rosegate resident Jean Magnant's 'dream comes true' when she receives a trip to visit her sister in Texas

Though they have resided in different states since they were young adults, sisters Jean Magnant and Mary Richards maintained their close bond through the years. Having turned 100 in January, Jean expressed her wish to visit her 93-year-old sister again. Although they talk on the phone daily, it had been four years since they last saw each other.

That wish was granted by the Twilight Wish Foundation Chapter of Indiana and American Senior Communities. Jean and two of her children, Paula Roessler, Southside resident, and Marilyn McKibben, of Pennsylvania, flew to Texas to visit Mary and her family on June 15 and 16.

"It was a complete surprise to me," Jean said. "There had been rumors for months. When they asked me what I want, I said I'd love to see my sister but never thought it would happen. When the wheels started to turn, they kept it a secret from me. I had only a week or two to prepare. I was happy to know that it was a reality."

A native of Hancock, Mich., Jean was one of four siblings. Jean moved to Indiana, the Irvington area, in 1947 with her late husband and two children. They had three more children while living in Indianapolis. After 40 years in Irvington, Jean moved to Beech Grove. She now resides at Rosegate. Jean is a member of St. Jude Parish and said she enjoys playing Words with Friends on her iPad and doing crossword puzzles.

Jean and her sister, Mary, met each other halfway while raising their children. Later, as widows, they would regularly travel hundreds of miles for those visits. Mary moved from the Midwest, to Texas in 2007 to be closer to her daughter. Jean was able to visit her in Texas two or three times.

The Twilight Wish Foundation and American Senior Communities paid for Jean and her daughters' flight to Texas. Jean had a send-off ceremony before leaving for the airport, with balloons and red carpet treatment. Jean decided to stay the night with her niece instead of at a hotel. Jean said she and her sister had a good time watching the young children play, and playing LCR, a dice game.

"The fact that we're together meant so much," Jean said. "I took a long a picture that she had not seen of our parent's home. We talked about that. But we didn't talk about the past very much. We were happy to be together and enjoy the activities of the young people... It was all very exciting. We're very grateful to the Twilight Foundation for their generosity. It was a dream come true."

## Now You See Me 2... entirely unnecessary sequel

The summer box office normally brings about an entire smorgasbord of different films intended to appeal to wide audiences and demographics. The most glaringly obvious type of these films is the big budget blockbuster. They are hard to miss, or at least the seemingly endless marketing of them is difficult to avoid. Next, animation is always popular, and with *Finding Dory's* box office returns, that trend is likely to continue. Next, sequels show up at theaters at what feels like a higher frequency in the summer than any other time. One sequel that could easily be called a blockbuster, *Now You See Me 2*, recently hit theaters.

*Now You See Me 2*, the follow up to 2013's *Now You See Me*, is the story of a group of world-class magicians, who use their talents in mystifying the masses in legally questionable ways. This time around the magicians, dubbed the 'horsemen,' have gone into hiding. It's been nearly a year since the last time any of them were spotted. However, the group's prolonged elusiveness has not deterred the FBI from devoting resources to their capture.

The members of the Horsemen reconvene at a technology convention with a plan to make public the corruption of a company's CEO. However, their plan is quickly foiled as FBI agents storm the convention hall,

sending the renegade magicians scrambling. While evading the authorities, the magicians jump off a building in New York City, but upon landing they astoundingly find themselves in China. Their effortless continent jumping has all four of them baffled. Soon, they are forced into heisting a highly-coveted computer chip that would make financially ruining companies and spying on anyone in the world possible.

It's fitting that *Now You See Me 2* is about a group of magicians because like a magician's act, there's a lot of theatrics and flash, but not any substance. Despite all of the film's slick theatrical tricks and inventive camera work, it does nothing to help out the paper-thin story. The story is similar to that of an *Ocean's*

11 film, just not as funny and not nearly as good.

There really isn't much to like about *Now You See Me 2*; the story is extremely weak and the characters are entirely unlikable. However, its biggest problem is that it's a sequel to a bad film. It's a film that probably should have never even been made.

*Now You See Me 2* is a bad, unnecessary film that is all style and no substance. One of the worst of the year. 1.5 out of 5.

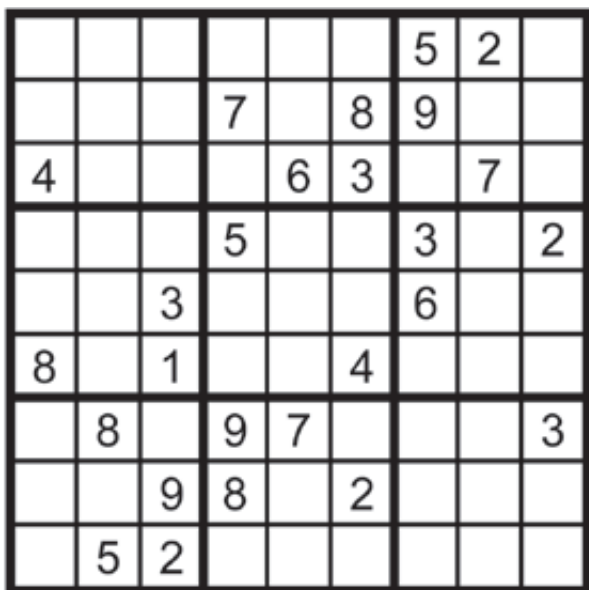
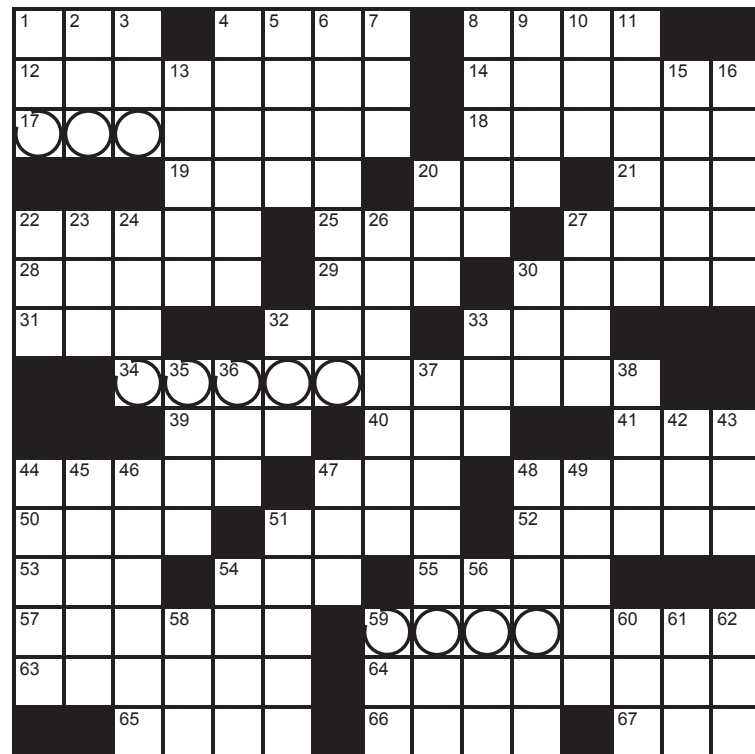

Hungry Americans eat about 28 pounds a year. Banana-ologists claim the tropical treat was the first fruit cultivated by humans. It's the only raw fruit that can be eaten without distress in over-chronicle cases. It also defuses over-acidity and reduces irritation by coating the stomach lining.

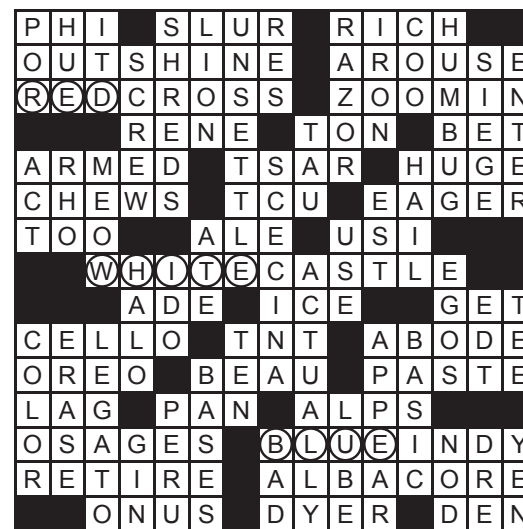

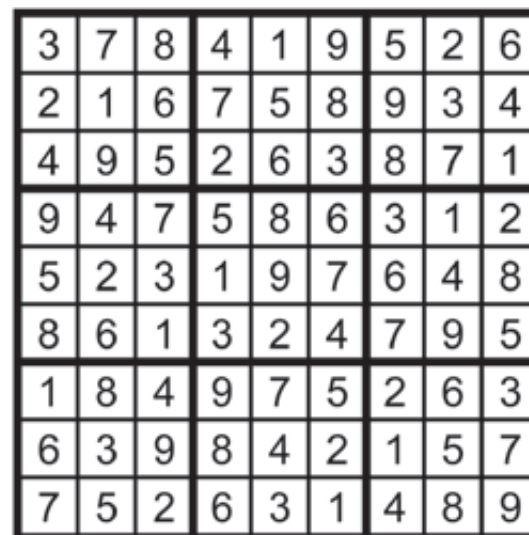

After Catharine Pollachek's mother died, her grave was decorated with an emblem to denote membership in the Daughters of the American Revolution.

"The DAR called and did a little service," Pollachek said, recalling her mother's many attempts to get her to join.

A retiree, Pollachek said she didn't join because she was too busy with her career in x-ray technology, and with family life in Osceola, Ind. Feeling guilty after her mother's passing, she joined the DAR and eventually moved to be near her own daughter and grandchildren on the Indianapolis Southside.

Pollachek recently attended the national DAR convention in Washington, D.C., where the women celebrated their 125th annual Continental Congress. The group is about historic preservation, so that nobody forgets how the country began.

"This is not your grandmother's DAR," she said, noting that actor Gary Sinise was honored for his work on behalf of veterans. The musical, "Hamilton," earned an award for its retelling of American history. And, the convention focused on genealogy with speakers from television's "Genealogy Roadshow," and the Website, Family Tree DNA.

For Pollachek, the greatest moment of the convention was when members found out they'd beaten a Guinness World Record for the number of letters collected in one month for active-duty military personnel. The goal was 10,000 letters, but the DAR collected 100,904.

To join the DAR, the candidate must prove she is descended from a patriot of the

American Revolution. Pollachek's ancestor was George Dieffenbach, who served in a Pennsylvania regiment. Joining was easy, because her mother had submitted the proof, but making membership worthwhile took effort.

"It's one thing to go to the meeting and then go home," Pollachek said. During her past tenure as regent of the Mary Bryan chapter, a role equivalent to president, she reached out to other groups involved in historic preservation and patriotic activities. On behalf of the DAR, she began appearing in federal court at naturalization ceremonies for immigrants.

"If the judge asks me to say a few words, I tell them. I represent the veterans who fought for the freedoms you are about to enjoy." After the ceremony, the new citizens receive American flags from the DAR.

The DAR holds workshops on how to research ancestry. The Mary Bryan chapter offered genealogy tips at the Freedom Festival last weekend. The public can sign up at the Greenwood Public Library for the DAR's upcoming genealogy classes on Aug. 18 and Sept. 15.
