Baxter YMCA to host first Aloha Family Fun Run

Aloha, Hello: Welcoming words for an event inviting the community to gather for a health and wellness event which benefits local families.

The Arthur R. Baxter YMCA, 7900 Shelby St., Indianapolis, will host its first-ever Aloha Family Fun Run on June 11.

"It's a special event to raise money for our annual campaign, which provides scholarships for families in need," said John Schwentker, executive director. "We want it to be family-oriented. It's a great, healthy activity. It's going to be a great day for all levels of fitness. Just do what you can."

The day begins with a 5K run/walk at 8 a.m., followed by a 1-mile run/walk at 8:45 a.m. Registration is \$20 for the 5k, \$10 for the one-mile. Children five and younger are free. Those who register for the 5K can do the 1-mile for free. Chick-fil-A will provide

food for participants. An award ceremony will be held for the top male and female. Top three finishers of the one-mile walk/run will

be awarded, and all children finishing the one-mile race will receive a finisher's medallion.

The Y will offer post-race activities for families, such as a bounce house, an obstacle course or games for children old-

er than 10. There will be food trucks on site. The pool opens at 10 a.m. for all participants.

"I'm really looking forward to the start of the race, getting it off the ground," Schwentker said. "To me, when we have the event start is the exciting part. We want to thank all of the sponsors for making the event possible, the volunteers and staff."


There are paranormal groups that use dogs to enhance their investigations. I haven't heard of any that use







Bill Pang has gotten to serve his hometown of Franklin Township for 30 years. As a patrolman for Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department, Southeast District, his zone consists of everything from Emerson Avenue to Carroll Road and County Line to Brookville Roads.

"If I was going to make a difference, I wanted to do it where I am from," Pang said, adding he also enjoys "the comradery of the guys and gals I get to work with every day. They are all really good people here on Southeast."

Graduating from Franklin Central High School in 1985, Pang joined the Franklin Township Volunteer Fire Department after graduation. He did that and, beginning 1992, served with the Marion County Sheriff's Reserves until 1995. He left for one year while he worked for the Evansville Police Department. He returned to Franklin Township in 1997 where he still resides with his wife, Lisa. Since then, he has served with IMPD, patrolling the streets.

What was your inspiration to become a police officer?

It was something I wanted to do since I was a little kid. Growing up, some of my friends' fathers were policemen so I got to see them all of the time.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

If you can make the arrest, get the bad guy off of the street and then tell someone who just had the worst day of their life that we've got them. I like anything where you can do something to help somebody.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

Dealing with juvenile system that seems like it needs repair because we can arrest someone and before we've finished the paperwork, they're sending us to go tell their parents to pick them up. That and some of the negative things we hear in the press.

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?


Going to concerts – country. I scuba dive. I like to go on vacations, preferably anywhere with a beach. I like photography, fishing.

What are your future goals, professionally or personally?


Hopefully to get promoted off the sergeants list sometime in the near future. Personally, to prepare for retirement sometime in the future and try to make more time to do things out of work.

Beech Grove Brooks/Ogden family prepares for their sixth Relay for Life of Southeast Indy, an event which has helped them to heal in their time of loss

People might not know they're looking for Relay for Life, but it might be just what they need. Angie Ogden says she was one of those people.

In September 2010, Angie's husband, Kris, passed away of cancer. In February, a friend invited her to a chili cook-off for Relay for Life.

"I didn't think I was going to go," she said. "It was pretty new to losing my husband. My dad talked me into going and seeing what it was all about."

Relay for Life is an event for communities to join together, celebrate cancer survivors or remember those who have lost the fight and raise money to fund research and support programs for all types of cancer. Participants can form teams, with members taking turns to walk or run around a track. The event is 24 hours long, and someone must be on the track at all times. Relay of Southeast Indy includes food, games, live music, and activities such as Zumba, a Luminaria

Ceremony to remember loved ones who are gone, a Survivor Ceremony and a Glow Run 5k.

While her son's best friend had passed away with cancer and Angie's family had donated to Relay before, they had never been involved.

Her father, Jim Brooks, suggested they do a team that year.

"We didn't know what we were getting into," Angie said. "We started going to the meetings. We really felt it was healing. I'm around all of these people that know what I was going through. We as a family had nev-

er experienced a loss like that before. To know there are others out there that have or are anticipating that they are going to lose somebody, it became our support group. We went there for the event and had a blast. I realized that just because I lost my husband didn't mean that I couldn't have fun and celebrate him."

The family, including Jim and Deanna Brooks and their daughters, Angie and Andrea Brooks, have attended Relay for Life of Southeast Indy every year since and have even taken leadership roles for the event

"We never know what tomorrow is going to bring," Deanna said. "We never would have thought that Kris would be diagnosed at 45 and we'd lose him in three months. Up until that point, he was working, hunting,

ly talk to anyone without them telling you a story about cancer affecting someone they love and care about. We want more awareness about what can be done, to support caregivers or give money to research."

Beech Grove firefighter and current Beech Grove city councilor, helps with the event's logistics. Deanna, who is retired from JP Morgan Chase, helps organize the Survivor's Walk. "We walk away thankful, fulfilled," Angie said. "When you sit back and think what just happened, what we just did, I truly feel amazed when it's all over."

This year's Relay for Life of Southeast Indy, serving Beech Grove, Perry and Franklin Townships, will take place Friday, June 17 beginning 7 p.m. and lasting until Saturday, June 18 at 7 p.m. The Luminaria Ceremony is at 10 p.m. The Glow Run begins at midnight with registration (\$25) at 11 p.m., followed by an after party at 1 a.m. Zumba is Saturday at 10:30 a.m. The survivor ceremony is at 4 p.m. That's not all - for the entire event listing, visit relayforlife.org/southeast-indyin.

"I've called it a big party all along," Andrea said. "There is everything you could want there, just about. It's a lot of fun. Then there are others who are having a hard time be-

"The goal is to have someone on the track for 24 hours. Sometimes that's tough to do when it's 3 o'clock in the morning, it's been 90 degrees and you're exhausted. You still see people get up and go. You see a commitment. One of the girls that grew up with Angie is battling; she's a very integral part of the team and the whole event. One night I was sitting there thinking I can't do this anymore, I was exhausted, I turned around and see she was doing Zumba. That inspired me to keep going. That's what we inspire to do (for) each other."

Southeast Indy Relay for Life has a festival-like setting, and the family said they encourage everyone to come. There is no requirement to walk, it's free and there are popular bands and food.

"Please come," Jim said. "We want everyone to see what Relay is all about. A lot of people think Relay is a sad time but it's not; it's a fun time. There are times we reflect on the ones we lost. But it's a time to celebrate their life, celebrating what they have given to us in our lives. I'm a true believer in Relay. I know what it's done for people...The first year I walked around the track, I walked around with a guy who lost a son the same age as my son-in-law. I had never met the guy before. We walked around probably 10 times, talking about our loss. It was so healing."



Meeting, June 6

- What happened: Ordinances 8 through 12, 2016 were approved on third readings.
- What it means: Ordinances 8, 9, 10 and 11 update the employee manual, relating to sick leave procedures, how to terminate employment and how employees will be notified of sick and vacation time remaining.

Ord. 12: The state legislature now mandates that the clerk treasurer office adopt rules and procedures for everyone who handles money. The Beech Grove Clerk Dan McMillan will have to train all people who handle money and give documentation to the state board of accounts. This needed to be passed by June 30. Amendments were made before approval to better fit how Beech Grove operates.

- What's next: All of these ordinances will go into effect.
- What happened: Resolution 9 was approved. Ordinances 13 and 14 were passed on first reading.
- What it means: Resolution 9 would appropriate \$25,000 to help construct the Butler Avenue Connection Roadway from Hornet Avenue through the city of Beech Grove. This is an existing, dedicated but unconstructed roadway. The redevelopment commission has committed \$50,000 to the project, and Beech Grove City Schools will fund the remainder.

Ordinance 13 establishes fees for building permits. This ordinance was amended a few years ago, but Mayor Buckley stated that the city is still behind. Councilor Chris Duffer said he felt increase was too high. The city's Electrical Inspector Michael Hughes said the current fees are far too low. The council voted to approve the ordinance on first reading, but to form a commission and do further research on what the increase should be before the second reading.

Ordinance 14 would prohibit door-to-door sales and sales of second-hand goods, with exemptions such as protection of religious and political speech.

■ What's next: Ordinances 13 and 14 will undergo second readings at the Tuesday, July 5 council meeting.

In brief...

A roundabout project at Churchman and Arlington Avenues was discussed. GAI Consultants will do the design work. The roundabout will be constructed to accommodate semis, will have sidewalks built into the design with grass in the middle unless the city chooses otherwise. The \$2 million project was funded partially by a \$1.3 million federal loan, through the Surface Transportation Program Urban Program. A public hearing will be held in 2017. Construction is expected to start by Spring 2020.

Meeting, June 6

- What happened: Ordinance 16-31 passed second reading and Ordinance 16-35 was introduced and passed first reading.
- What it means: Ordinance 16-31 provides funds from the general fund to be used for the police department and legal department for 2016 budget year. \$27,500 will be used by the Police Department and \$2,500 by the Legal Department.

Ordinance 16-35 will add crosswalks to Howard Road and Fry Road intersection as well as the Stop 18 and County Road 75 East intersection.

■ What's next: Ordinance 16-31 will go into effect. There will be a public hearing for Ordinance 16-35 on June 20 when it goes for its second reading.



Maggie's Plan... Moore impressive in bland film

Relationships, romantic and otherwise,

can be both rewarding and confounding. Spending time with others produces a closeness that usually leads to a happier and more fulfilling life. However, even the best relationship is not perfect and troubled and trying times are bound to occur. People are failed beings, so naturally how we relate to one another is unlikely to be without its blemishes. But

the question remains: how far are we willing to go to be happy in our relationships when things get confusing, difficult or otherwise unbearable? This is the question the new film, *Maggie's Plan*, attempts to answer.

Maggie's Plan is the story of 30-something Maggie, who is disillusioned with men and romantic relationships, yet still desires to be a mother. She decides to ask a "pickle entrepreneur" acquaintance that has a unique math fascination to be the sperm donor. Unfortunately, things go awry for Maggie fairly quickly.

Maggie encounters John (Ethan Hawke), a professor who teaches at the college at which they both work. John and Maggie soon begin meeting regularly to discuss a book John is working on, and like most films, romantic feelings develop. However, there is one big catch: John is married to the driven and narcissistic Georgette (Julianne Moore) and has two children with her. Flash forward three years; Maggie and John are married with a little one of their own. Unhappy with the state of her marriage and fearing John is as well, Maggie concocts and unleashes a plot

to put John and Georgette back together. Maggie soon learns that playing puppet master can have serious repercussions, both intended and not.

Easily the best aspect of Maggie's Plan is the strong performance turned in by the always-reliable Julianne Moore as the overbearing Georgette. Greta Gerwig as Maggie is good as well, but Moore steals every scene in which she appears. Moore keeps things interesting with her inspired and unpredictable performance even when the often boring and bland story fails to do so.

The two solid performances aside, there isn't much else to like here. Bill Hader appears in *Maggie's Plan* as well, but is so underutilized that it leaves you wondering why the filmmakers even bothered with his character. Hawke's character John is such an unlikable figure. He's a weak, whiney, put upon character who never takes responsibility for his actions or decisions. The ending of *Maggie's Plan* is also rather frustrating. In a matter of seconds, it seemingly undoes its entire premise of 'life and relationships are messy, unpredictable, and we're just trying to make the best of life.'

Despite a few bright points, namely Moore's performance, its bland story and other failings are too much to overlook. 3 out of 5.

Cheese: Addictive like a drug

"I love cheese-crave it; can't live without it!" Much has been writ-

ten recently regarding the addictive qualities of cheese containing casein. Researchers at the University of Michigan found cheese is way more addictive when compared to other foods, in part due to its processing. LA Times October 2015, headline blared, "Cheese is as addictive as drugs."

In 1909, the average American consumed only 3.8 pounds of cheese a year. Today it's 34 pounds per person. Hum? USDA: "The inclusion of cheese in time-saving convenience foods and in commercially manufactured and prepared foods such as frozen pizza, macaroni and cheese, and prepackaged cheese slices has increased consumption. The popularity of cheese-rich Italian and Tex-Mex cuisines has also contributed to increased cheese consumption."

T. Colin Campbell, author of "The China Study," and "Main Street Vegan" author Victoria Moran describes the science of how we become chemically and emotionally addicted to dairy: "Casein, one of the proteins in milk, crosses the bloodbrain barrier and becomes something called casomorphins. Yes'm, a lot like morphine—because casomorphin is an opioid. Nature designed it that way so young mammals would enjoy nursing, come back for more and live to reproduce. Human milk has only 2.7 grams of casein per liter. Cow's milk has 26. And because it takes, on average, 10 pounds of milk to make one pound of cheese or ice cream, you're looking at a lot of casein and resultant casomorphin. The result can be a major opiate addiction that can cause people to have serious withdrawal symptoms."

Don't kill the messenger, but eating too much fatty cheese is a drag on your health and waistline. Typical cheeses are 70 percent fats. Studies clearly show weight gain in the US in the past 30 years is almost entirely due to changing eating habits, not lack of physical activity.
