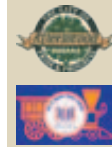

Bum-rushed by shadows

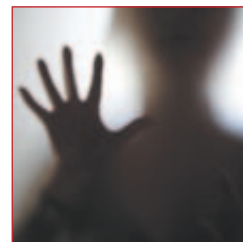
Paranormal investigators, in nightly excursions, have one goal in mind. There are audio, temperature fluctuations and photo/video abnormalities gathered as evidence, yet, one grand experience remains—the sighting of a ghostly apparition.

Physical apparitions are rare, and the Holy Grail of paranormal investigations (one may never experience this throughout their entire career). However, shadow figures seem to be the dominant thread as investigators spin their web through the darkness of night. And...when bum-rushed by a shadow, darker than the night and seemingly as tall as a house, it becomes an exciting venture!

Shadow figures can be the size of a softball, or as tall as a grizzly bear. They appear at floor level, along a wall or even on the ceiling. They are blacker than the surrounding darkness, and appear without notice. Paranormal investigators have varied reactions to these sudden intrusions:

You will have to show me something much more intimidating than that to send me packing into a cold Indiana winter night!



What did I feel as it passed through me? It was a cold air mass. Others have reported the same, in addition to the sensation of a tingling like an electrical surge. The hairs on their arms stood up!

My wife, Laura, has experienced one of these shadow figures recently in the early morning hours, and in our bedroom on the Southside of Indianapolis. It moved about my side of the bed as I snored oblivious to paranormal ramifications. She experienced it while I slept like a baby.

Shadow figures....Some feel they are apparitions not completely developed. Others feel they are evil nasties with an agenda all their own. And in the general scheme of paranormal investigations, will be the most likely experience you will encounter. Your reaction to these will depend upon your level of experience.

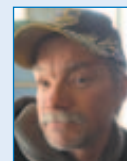

There are several ways you can register to vote in Indiana. You can go online by visiting <http://www.indianavoters.com>. This site lets you check the status of your registration. Indiana residents with a valid Indiana Driver's License or an Indiana State Issued ID Card can use this tool to submit either an application to register or to update an existing voter registration record.

You can also register to vote or update your registration by going to any Bureau of Motor Vehicle License Branch or visiting the Marion County Voter Registration Office in the City-County Building or sending questions to VoterReg@Indy.Gov

GOVERNMENT WATCHDOG



BEECH GROVE CITY COUNCIL

Meeting, March 7

■ **What happened?** Ordinances 1 and 2-2016 were approved on third and final reading. Ordinances 3, 4 and 5 were approved on second reading.

■ **What it means:** Ordinance 1 would adjust rates for ambulance responses outside of the city of Beech Grove.

Ordinance 2 relates to food vehicles and food cart licensing. Vendors must purchase a license annually, unless they operate on private property or "under a master vendor" such as the Fall Festival.

Ordinance 3 would allow the city's compliance officers to tag abandoned vehicles, helping the police department which currently handles this task.

Ordinance 4 requires that pawn shops be licensed annually. All pawn shops and all pawnbrokers must register with and report their transactions to an on-line investigation and retail tracking system.

Ordinance 5 aims to reduce exposure to employees of the Department of Public Works. All trash will be required to be placed in the approved blue container labeled "City of Beech Grove." All other containers will not be picked up.

■ **What's next?** Ordinances 1 and 2 will go into effect. Ordinances 3 - 5 will go for third and final reading at the April 4 council meeting.

■ **What happened?** Ordinances 6 and 7 and Resolution 7 was approved on first reading.

■ **What it means:** Ordinance 6 began with a public hearing, with Mayor Dennis Buckley explaining that the city was awarded a \$237,500 HUD Grant for at-risk children nearly six years ago, that the current administration was not aware of. Those funds will expire in September if not used. The city must first spend the funding, then will be fully reimbursed. The money will be used to upgrade space in the community center. The ordinance is the additional appropriation of those funds from the Rainy Day Fund which will be paid back after receiving the grant money.

Ordinance 7 updates the Code of Ordinances relating to Public Peace, Morals and Safety to allow for quicker enforcement of those in violation. Councilor Dave Harrison said residents in his district approached him about a house many consider a drug house, and this ordinance would allow the city to speed up the process for correcting issues such as those.

Resolution 7 approved a FEMA, Flood Insurance Rate map, which ensures continued eligibility in the National Flood Insurance Rate Program.

■ **What's next?** The ordinances will go for second reading at the April 4 meeting.

In brief...

• The council discussed the matter of 18 acres of landfill property which they currently own, expressing interest in selling it. The landfill has been closed since 1993. The city acquired the land in 2004 for the purposed of building a park. That project cannot be completed for environmental reasons. Craig Wiley, city attorney,

said the city needs more detail on what an interested buyer would want to do with the property. It was recommended the council put an environmental restriction on the use of the property before selling it.



GREENWOOD COMMON COUNCIL

Meeting, March 7

■ **What happened?** Ordinance 16-11 passed first reading and Ordinance 16-09 passed second reading. An amendment was discussed for Ordinance 16-10 and failed to pass, with the ordinance passes as in on the second reading. Ordinance 16-12 passed on the second reading as amended, along with Ordinance 16-13 passing on second reading.

■ **What it means:** New Business Ordinance 16-14 and Ordinance 16-17 were carefully evaluated for specifications, with both being in regards to nuisance laws and animal regulations. There will be further research into what exactly both means in regards to the ordinance specifications and will be discussed when the information is obtained to clarify.

■ **What's next?** New Business Ordinances were all discussed in full detail and will be revisited in the next meeting once more information is obtained.

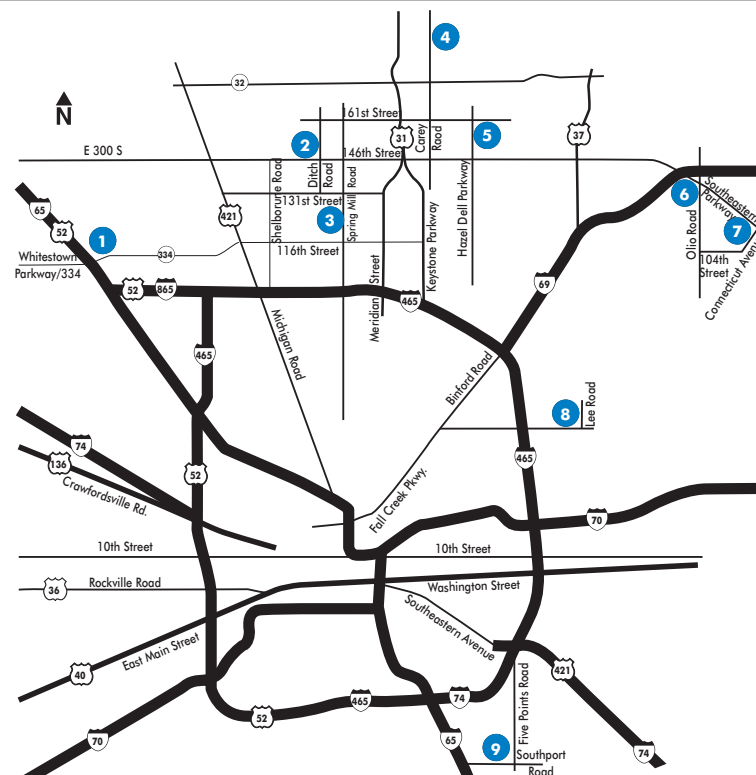

Mayo family credits Lutheran High School for children's successes through hardship as LHS prepares for its annual LuFest

As organizers get ready for the annual LuFest to raise money for Lutheran High School, a truck driver who recently spent a weekend with his son at Harvard has no regrets about the tuition he paid for his children to have a Lutheran education.

Indeed, the Lutheran community supported him when his wife died, leaving him a widower with two children in elementary school. When classmates filed into the funeral service, adults had to look away while six- and seven-year-olds hugged and cried.

After a "glimpse of Heaven" during 11 years of marriage, Wayne Mayo faced raising his children, Andrew and Sarah, without their mother, Amy Miller Mayo.

"My wife is the reason my children are very bright," Wayne said. "I was a truck driver and she was a college-educated girl.

Andrew is now a junior at Harvard, and Sarah is out on her own, working in Indianapolis. Wayne calls himself an empty-nester on his farm in rural Bargersville, where he owns 100 acres. Another farmer sharecrops the land while Wayne drives a dump truck.

He met Amy in his early 30s. Wayne was living with his father and trimming expenses. Though prosperous and investing in farm land, Wayne prayed for more, asking for a wife. About two weeks later, he was introduced to Amy, and they married within a year.

Amy was from Center Grove and graduated from Indiana University. "She had a good job. She worked for the government," Wayne said. But she wanted to stop working and raise the children.

"After she did this for about three or four years, I remember one time I came home – I said, 'Amy, have you ever thought about taking some classes?'

"She jumped all over that." Amy started pursuing a master's in Library Science from Indiana University in Bloomington. "It took her five years, but the kids saw their mother graduate. She graduated in May and was killed in December."

The fatal traffic accident was in 2002. Wayne had learned to help with housework while his wife attended graduate school. "She would leave me detailed notes. God was giving me a quick course. I thought she was going to school, but it turned out it was me.

"I kept her notes and put them in a scrapbook, and I look at them once in a while."

The children were attending Calvary Lutheran School, which offers K-8 education at the church campus on South Shelby Street. Amy had been a Lutheran, whereas Wayne couldn't count on his fingers and toes the number of times he'd been to church. However, the couple settled on church-run schools for their children, and Wayne was baptized along with them.

At home each night, Amy had read to the children, so after she died, Wayne picked up where she left off. Starting on page 80, he read Madeleine L'Engle's *A Wrinkle in Time*.

"I read to them every night into their high school years. We read all the Harry Potter books."

In those days, Andrew had already developed good study habits.

He did homework first and then went out to play. One day after school, Wayne heard about an unflattering picture that a little girl had drawn of Andrew, depicted as an eccentric Einstein-like figure. But Andrew brushed it off.

"Daddy," Andrew said, according to his father. "I know that what I'm doing is the right thing to do, and that's why I'm gonna keep doing it."

And he did, all the way through Lutheran High School on South Arlington Avenue. Now a member of the class of 2017 at Harvard, Andrew plans to graduate with a joint concentration in Physics and Astrophysics.

He remembers the high school faculty as having "the agility to teach us what we needed to know," while engaging students who were slacking off.

"The students that I encountered were good people," he said, describing a welcoming environment. "Not all of them were Lutheran or Christian, but there was nothing close to a stigma."

In college, Andrew has researched under the tutelage of personnel at the Harvard-Smithsonian Center for Astrophysics. His senior thesis will focus on some aspect of exoplanets. An exoplanet orbits around a star (other than the Sun). A NASA mission is counting these planets using equipment on the Kepler spacecraft, which was launched to survey a portion of our region of the Milky Way galaxy. The goal is to discover dozens of Earth-size planets in or near the habitable zone, and to find out just how many stars have exoplanets.

Andrew recently looked at secondary eclipse data for exoplanets and compiled a catalog. A secondary eclipse occurs when a planet goes behind its star, rather than in front of it. The measurement of the brightness of light emissions during these phenomena can enable scientists to study the atmospheres of exoplanets, and to detect the presence of water vapor, a clue to whether they have the essentials for supporting life.

Although his time at Harvard is rich with challenges, Andrew said he misses Indiana sunsets and the night skies over his farm home, relatively free of light pollution compared with Boston.

As for Wayne Mayo, getting ready for the March 18 LuFest gala, he is optimistic because of the talent he sees in people graduating from places like Lutheran High School. "These kids are going to be running things. We're gonna be OK."

Jack Powell, director of development at Lutheran High School since 2013, is coordinating the 34th Annual LuFest, supported by a steering committee and numerous corporate sponsors.



The fund-raising target for the March 18 event is \$100,000. The largest percentage of profits this year will be dedicated to the school's general fund, with about \$30,000 left over for special appeals. Though supported by 14,000 Lutherans among 16 churches, the school of 250 students receives most of its revenue from external benefactors. What was your inspiration to become a police officer/firefighter?

It all started when I was younger. I had some interaction with law enforcement officers at school. Watching TV and seeing it, I always had the ambition to become a police officer.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

When you interact with children. I've been a motorcycle officer and was on horse patrol. I did a lot of public interaction. Kids can come up to you, want to see the equipment and ask questions about the job. That is gratifying. When you solve a problem or a case and you see that someone's safe at the end of it, that gives gratification, too.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

Sometimes you have to set aside your personal beliefs or opinions and go into an unbiased mode.

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

Taking motorcycle trips. We have a Harley and like to travel. We'll go to Chicago or Gatlinburg and get away. We try to do things with the grandkids or kids that involve everybody and have a good, family time together.

What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

Professionally here at Southport, they are putting together a traffic unit with the motorcycles so we can work escorts, DUIs, accidents and speed intervention. Someday I'd like to hold a ranking position here at Southport. Personally I'd like to see myself retire somewhere down south and enjoy our life.

What would you have done if you hadn't become a police officer?

In my full-time job, I'm a firefighter for Eli Lilly, so I might have gone more into the fire world.

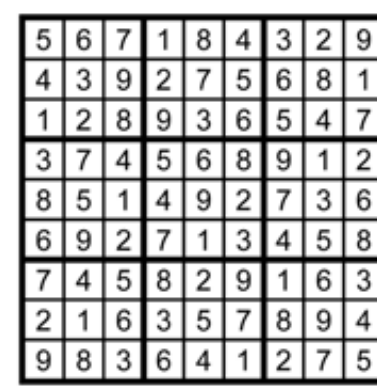

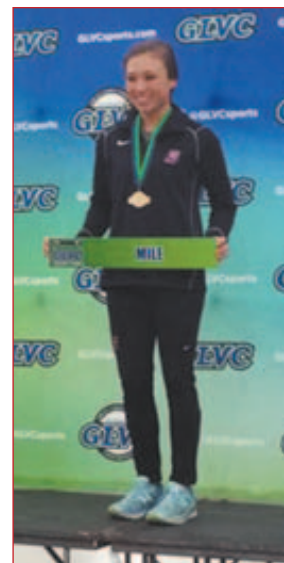

As winter fades and spring playfully beckons, blow off winter's dust, dance in the warm sun and eat lots of delicious green, temple-rejuvenating foods as creation intended. It is your destiny to come over to the green side. Leafy spring greens that symbolize rebirth and growth are full of the promise of good health.

Why then are we so terrified by green foods, the number one food you can eat regularly to help improve your temple's health? Just as we were not born to hate each other, we were not born to hate veggies. We are taught; encouraged by parents, role models and authorities to eat from a tin can rather than hunt and forage God's bountiful green earth. Eating green foods yanked from the warm



earth should be as instinctive as breathing. Cravable!

Leafy vegetables are full of vitamins, minerals, and miraculous plant-based substances that help protect your temple from the heartbreak of heart disease, stroke, diabetes, inflammation and even cancer. Even the USDA recommends adults consume at least three cups of dark green vegetables weekly.

Bright, crisp green plant foods that sprout from earth help us achieve peak health by fulfilling our cell's vitamin requirements. The majority of earth's green foods contain vitamin C and K to support your immune system. Vitamin K supports bone strength, too. Then there's vitamin E, folate, and quercetin. The lutein and zeaxanthin in greens protects against cataract and age-related macular degeneration.

Dark leafy spring and summer greens are a fiber fiesta. Fiber, the colon "Pow" of your di-

gestive system is important for weight loss and maintenance. Fiber lowers cholesterol, tempers blood-sugar swings, reduces blood pressure, improves intestinal health and lowers your risk of type 2 diabetes.

The act of eating, one of our most common activities, must be sacred. It must be God's will that we're so involved in eating. I believe there's an important spiritual purpose to it. Food must be the spiritual and ethical core of the family dinner table; the supper table an altar of gratitude. When you eat, you process and absorb the forces of the heavens embedded in your food; the universe on your dinner plate. You naturally become a better version of who you truly are at the core. Your temple tells you what it needs during each phase of the year. Listen. Your body is a precious temple. Treat it lovingly.

London has Fallen... terribly lazy and unoriginal

"If it ain't broke, don't fix it." Now, while this seems to be Hollywood's motto when looking at the weekly box office returns, that timeless adage can lead to disastrous results. For instance, it's this kind of thinking that allows morning radio shows to continue to infect the airwaves, and keeps Nicholas Sparks employed. It also produces sequels to films, some welcomed, but the vast majority are either unnecessary, awful or both, as is often the case. This weekend brought another film born out of the "if it ain't broke, don't fix it" line of reasoning: *London Has Fallen*.

London Has Fallen is the sequel to 2013's *Olympus has Fallen*. This time, instead of defending against terrorists wishing to inflict harm domestically, the film jumps across the pond, as you guessed, to London. In the film, the world's most powerful leaders all descend upon London to pay their respects after the British Prime Minister unexpectedly passes away. Unfortunately, none of the dignitaries set foot in the church before bullets start flying.

In just a matter of minutes, several prominent leaders are quickly and viciously murdered, often with bloody results. Mike Banning (Gerard Butler) and President Asher (Aaron Eckhart) survive the initial onslaught and are soon racing through the streets of foggy London town. What follows is a pre-

dictable sequence of events that leads to an even more foreseeable conclusion.

Everything starts with the script. If the script is good, chances are the final product will likely be something worth watching. On the flipside, if the script is less than stellar, you're likely to end up with a film to avoid. Unfortunately, like its predecessor, *London Has Fallen* has a bad, lazily written script. The story is a poorly constructed mish-mash of every action film ever made. It borrows heavily from much better films in the action genre. The script also shows its hand way too early, within the

first ten minutes of the film, giving away what is supposed to be a twist. The script is completely devoid of even one original thought or idea.

In what is a combination of problems with both writing and directing, *London Has Fallen* leaves you with a 'that's it?' feeling. It feels unfinished, as if the filmmakers said 'well, that's all we got.' The film's conclusion is incredibly abrupt.

London Has Fallen is better than *Olympus has Fallen*. However, that's like being the liveliest person in a graveyard, it doesn't mean much. 2 out of 5

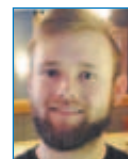
