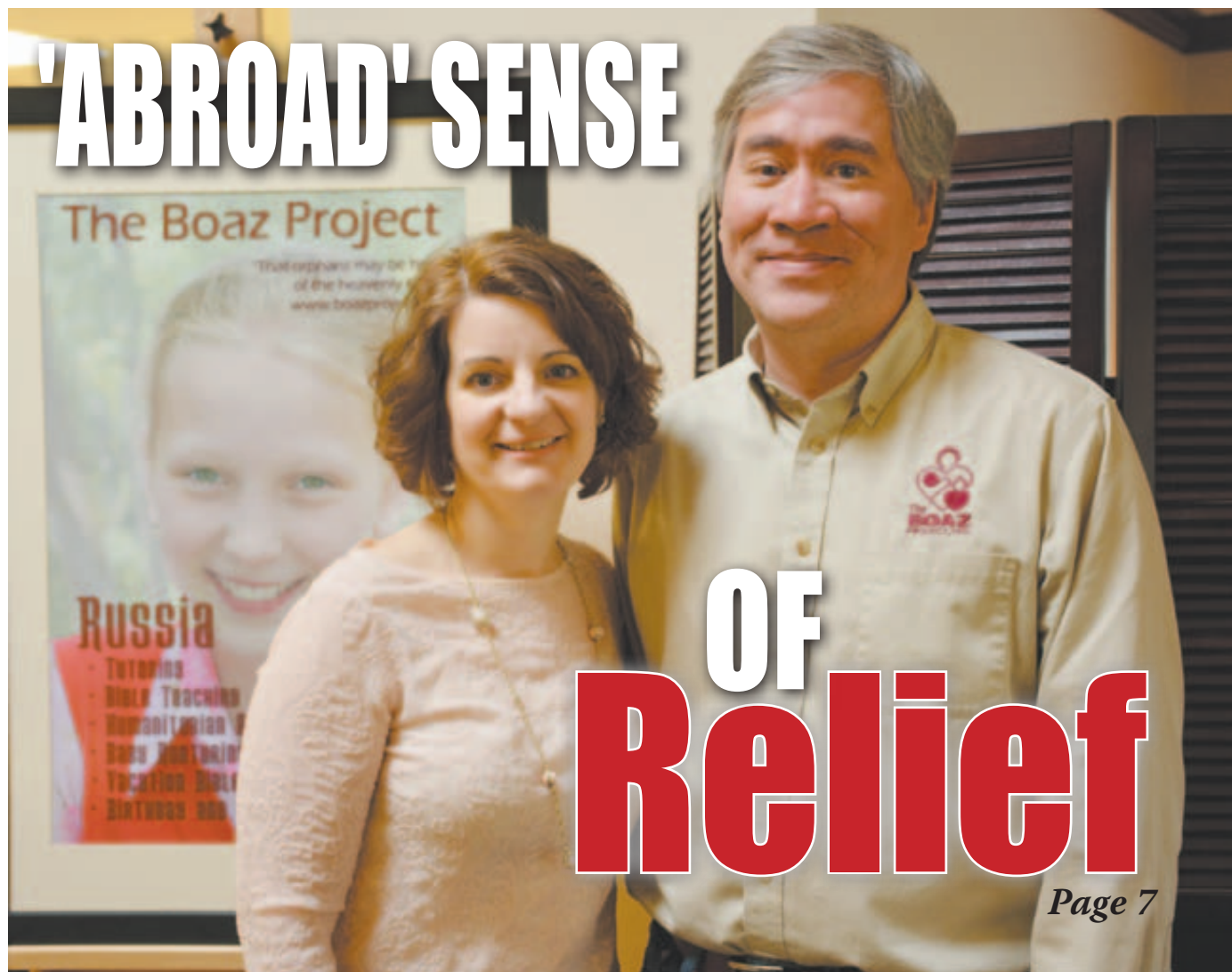

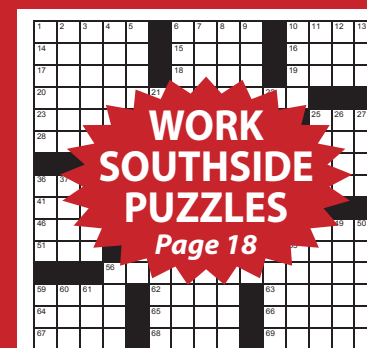

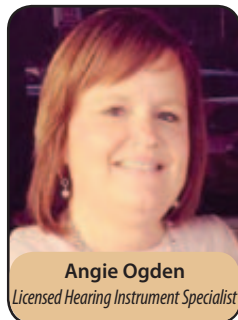

AROUND TOWN

Rep. Kirchhofer sponsors bills combating drug abuse

Gov. Mike Pence signed three bills sponsored by State Rep. Cindy Kirchhofer (R-Beech Grove) into law to combat Indiana's illegal drug epidemic. Senate Enrolled Act (SEA) 187 could help reduce fatal drug overdoses by permitting pharmacies to sell overdose intervention drugs. Narcan is a safe, non-addictive medication that reverses the effects of drug overdoses. This law requires pharmacies and emergency ambulance services to submit to the Indiana State Department of Health an annual report of the dates and number of times the drug is sold and administered.

Also signed into law was SEA 271, which develops the Indiana Commission to Combat Drug Abuse (ICCCA) and requires the taskforce to identify ways for state agencies and local programs to coordinate and create a comprehensive plan to address substance abuse through treatment, prevention and law enforcement. Another piece of legislation signed into law was SEA 297, which requires Medicaid coverage for inpatient detoxification for the treatment of opioid or alcohol dependence.

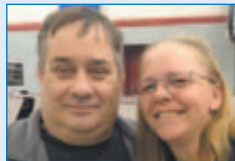
Larry Hovee of Perry Township

The Red Line has been a topic of discussion with Indiana residents for years. With recent debate as to whether or not residents truly want this form of rapid transportation that would span across central Indiana, we feel the overwhelming consensus of the Southside is yes – and the sooner the better.

Not only would it increase IndyGo's services with shorter wait times and additional hours of operation, but it gives easier access to the many neighborhoods and communities. The Red Line would span from Broad Ripple to south of the University of Indianapolis with talks of spanning to Greenwood at Smith Valley Road.

The Greater Southside Business Alliance will host a public meeting on the Marion County Transit Plan, a long-range transportation vision for Central Indiana that will impact Perry Township, on April 5, 6 – 8 p.m. at the Perry Township Education Center, 6548 Orinoco Ave. Residents can learn about this project and get answers to any questions or concerns.

Whether you plan to use the rapid transit or not, this is an issue that will impact everyone in the community. Become knowledgeable and have an input on the future of our public transportation – the benefits, the cost, the need for this amenity. We're excited to see the continued progression of this idea until it becomes a reality!

Combs grew up in Bartholomew County and joined the Marine Corps after high school. He went to school in Ohio for welding, met his wife and moved to Johnson County. He lives in Franklin with his wife and two step-children. He said he has been fortunate to find his career in Johnson County, a place with strong supporters of law enforcement and a tight-knit group of deputies.

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

I like to shoot guns, golf and do a lot of stuff with family. I like home improvement projects, to work on things and build things.

What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

I've tried not to think too far ahead this early in my career. I am still trying to find my groove on different aspects of the job, trying to find my niche and best way to do things.

What would you have done if you hadn't become a deputy?

I'd still be in construction. Now that I'm doing this, I can't imagine going back to anything I used to do. It would be tough, losing this job.

What was your inspiration to go into law enforcement?

My older brother became a reserve deputy for a different county. We both were in the military. I said that sounds like something that might be interesting. That's all it took.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

Recently, this gentleman had his stolen vehicle and trailer recovered. I took the initial theft report. To see how devastated he was and to know within a couple of weeks, those two pieces of sentimental value were returned to him. I didn't talk to him after, but knowing he was excited to have his truck back, it was cool that it happened for him. That doesn't happen all of the time.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

Always staying focused. Everyone has their good and bad days, but in this job if you have a bad day it could be your last day. It's also challenging coping with the stress. Certain calls are more stressful than others so I find different ways to cope with it and move on to the next day.

'ABROAD' SENSE OF Relief

April and Jim Jurgensen help improve quality of life for hundreds of orphans in Russia, India and Kenya through The Boaz Project in Greenwood

When April Jurgensen left for a trip to Russia in 1999, she knew she wanted to do something to improve the orphan problem in the country, but had no idea what or how to help.

Sixteen years later, April and Jim Jurgensen are playing a large role in improving the quality of life at 15 orphanages in Russia, India and Kenya through the Boaz Project, headquartered in Greenwood.

"We tell everyone we get front row seats at what God is doing," April said. "This is not what I set out to do in my life. Anything good that comes from it has to be from Him. It's humbling to see how far the impact has reached, to know orphans whose lives have literally changed because of the influence of the organization."

Jim and April lived in Russia for two years after the fall of the Soviet Union, teaching

Christian morals and ethics curriculum to public school teachers.

"We fell in love with the culture and the people," April said. "We were newlyweds at the time, so that is where we formed our marriage."

Getting to know April...

- We spend a lot of time at our children's sports tournaments, and really enjoy that.
- I'm very into health food, raw food and alternative medicine.
- I'm a bit of a research nerd. If my interest is peaked on any topic, I'll dive in and try to learn as much as I can about it.
- We live in Perry Township. We're in the process of selling our house and we're looking forward to remodeling something.

After the two-year term, they returned to the Southside of Indianapolis. When their two children, Berea and Noah, were still young, they were taking a nap when April said she received a phone call from a friend, wanting to talk about a news story on 20/20, about the poor living conditions of orphanages in Russia.

The following day, another friend called to discuss the same news story. The third day, another friend called, same story.

"That day when I hung up the phone, I thought 'God is that you calling?' It was bi-

zarre," she said. "I was preparing to take a trip back to Russia. People started handing me money to donate to an orphanage while I was there. I had said nothing about any of this. I was reading through the new testament at the time and came across James 1:27, which says 'Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world.'"

April took the money she had been given, went to Walmart and purchased items children could use. She packed two suitcases full of donations. Before her plane took off, she learned the family in front of her was returning to work at an orphanage in Moscow, one of the locations featured in the 20/20 story. She was told many donated items never made it to the children at the orphanages, and were instead sold on the streets. Wanting to ensure that didn't happen with the two suitcases full of items she packed, she began asking for contacts and made time to visit two orphanages during that trip.

"I liked one more than the other," April said. "She called the children in and gave them the gifts. I was headed back to Moscow and got this sinking feeling. I had given a Band-Aid for a huge, gaping wound. This last night in Russia, I thought and prayed."

April worked out a deal with a friend in Russia, that if they could get support back home, they would hire him to bring donations to the orphanages and ensure that the children receive everything. April and Jim founded The Boaz Project in 1999, a nonprofit that has grown to now caring for 589 children in three countries.

"Once my eyes were open to the needs and we learned about the psychology of orphans, statistics about what happens to them, how many are sold on the street or can't cope with life after, we have added programming to combat those statistics like job training, house parent training," April said. "In India, we work with wonderful people who open their doors and take these kids in but they have no training with children who have dealt with trauma. They'll see signs and

symptoms but don't know why a child is doing that or how to help them overcome. So we added training for them to help the child grow and change those patterns."

Most of The Boaz Project's funds are donor-based. The nonprofit hosts two fundraising events annually. The next one is the 9th Annual Race for an Orphan 5K on April 30, 9:30 a.m. at Craig Park in Greenwood. There will be a Family Fun Zone starting at 9 a.m. with face painting, bounce house, balloon animals, corn hole and a fire truck. Cost of registration is \$35 for individuals or \$70 for families. Those interested can visit boazproject.com/race for more information.

"It's something that's easy for the community to get behind," April said. "It doesn't require a special skill. It's a lot of fun. You're involved; you're not just sending a check. It builds that community to be together in support of a cause that matters to them."

The Boaz Project has grown and evolved through the years, and April said it's been humbling to see the results. They keep in touch with many of the children, some of which even return to work in the orphanages in which they grew up.

"One of the things that drives us is taking children from an institutional setting and creating a family environment with house parents that are trained to help kids overcome the trauma they've been through," April said. "It looks a little different from culture to culture, but it's still going back to the family model. To have the staff that we do that is so passionate about what they do, that is also very humbling."

Fundamentals in farming

Distelrath Farms offers hands-on, nontraditional learning through school for preschool and high school students

There are gardens to tend to and chickens, pigs and sheep to feed. It's not a typical school setting, but that's the idea. Students can get hands-on education while taking in the fresh air and experiencing real-life situations.

"Agriculture is what we're using as the backbone of the school," Andrew Distelrath said. "Just about any direction that a student and family want their educational path to take, we can take that path. We teach agriculture, finance, marketing, anatomy, construction, law, automotive mechanics, teaching, writing... We take the structure of the farm and build the education from there."

Andrew and Sarah Distelrath bought the property at 6302 E. Raymond St. in Indianapolis, six years ago while they were looking to start their family. The Distelraths, who have two children, both have backgrounds in various public and private school settings.

"We realized what we wanted for our kids is not out there," Andrew said.

The Distelraths started a school for full-day high school students on their 7 ½ acre property in June 2015. They also operate a co-op on the property, where Ashley Shufflebarger was first introduced to the Distelraths. She is the program director and an educator at the school. The School at Distelrath Farms is now enrolling preschool students, with classes starting the first week of May. They are looking for families interested in year-round, nontraditional education for their children. Tuition for preschool is \$40 a day, and high

school is \$25 a day per student.

"It's not a finished product by any means," Andrew said. "There is so much to do. I look around here and I'm almost giddy because I see the potential. The opportunities are limitless for students."

Students will have opportunities to do everything that relates to taking care of a farm, from construction projects to helping grow and harvest the food they use in their lunches. Andrew said the farm setting teaches students about long-term consequences to their actions, and gives them skills to help them decide what they would like to pursue in their careers when they're older.

"The potential for kids to grow, become lifelong learners is right here," Shufflebarger said. "Teachers in a classroom setting, they'll all tell you their favorite moments are

those light bulb moments, when a student finally grasps a concept. Here at the farm, we are seeing that happen all of the time."

The school currently has 15 students enrolled between the preschool and high school program. Andrew said they would like to have 32. They will have an open house on April 15, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. to tour interested families around the farm and answer questions.

"The next year will be very interesting, having our first full-time students, adjusting," Andrew said. "It keeps growing, taking shape. We keep getting better. We're excited to work with a group of committed families and exploring this developmental journey with their children."

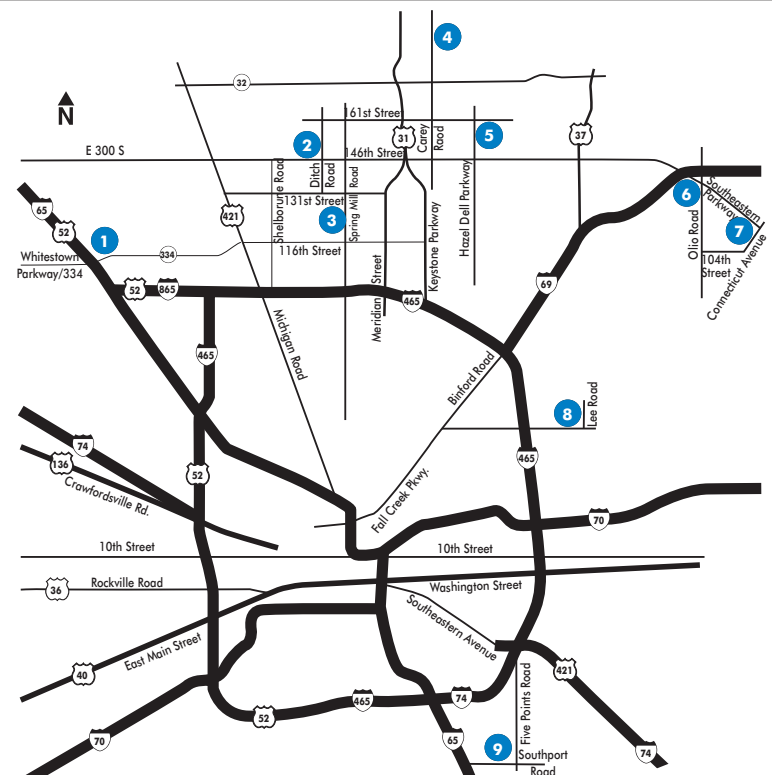

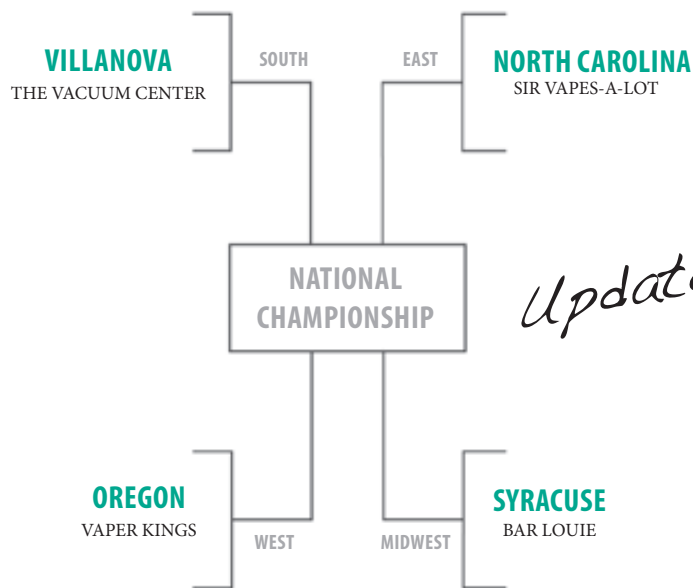

S.R. 37 chosen as Route for I-69 from Martinsville to Indy

The Indiana Department of Transportation announced that the route following State Road 37 between Martinsville and Indianapolis best meets the I-69 performance measures while minimizing cost and impacts to the human and natural environment.

INDOT will host public meetings April 4, at Perry Meridian High School, 401 W. Meridian School Rd. in Indianapolis. Doors will open at 6 p.m. with an open house session in the school gymnasium. Each open house will be followed with a formal presentation and public-comment session in the school auditorium at 7 p.m.

The recommendation follows consideration of public input voiced during public meetings in the spring and fall of 2015 and months of detailed analysis performed for five preliminary routes. The analysis found that State Road 37, avoids an estimated 1,379 crashes each year, reduces travel times from Martinsville to downtown Indianapolis by 11 minutes, reduces travel times from Martinsville to I-69 in northeast Indianapolis by 13 minutes, increases wages in the four-county study area by a total of \$1.7 billion over 20 years, and increases gross domestic product in the four-county study area by \$2.4 billion over 20 years.

Batman v. Superman: Dawn of Justice... Swings and misses more than it connects

It's unlikely there's a more committed fan base than superhero/comic book fans. Across the country, legions of admirers swarm conventions based entirely on comic books. And those are the same individuals shelling out hard-earned money for an autograph and picture with an actor on a show unfamiliar to 80 percent of the population. So far, Marvel has been milking this fanaticism with its endless lineup of films. Now, DC comics are getting in on the act in a big way with its release of *Batman v Superman: Dawn of Justice*.

Batman v Superman: Dawn of Justice, as can be deciphered from the title, pits Batman (Affleck) against the Man of Steel, or tries to anyway. Centered on the idea that Superman possesses entirely way too much power, simply acting on his own accord with no regard for law, the government and even the caped crusader are out to end Superman. Along the way, the real villain, whose intentions are much more sinister than either Superman or Batman, reveals himself. Expounding anymore on the film's plot would be to give away important points, but what follows is a story filled with significant collateral damage culminating in an epic duel between two legendary comic book characters, possibly to the death.

Besides the actual storyline, the aspect sure to have most fans intrigued is the performance of Ben Affleck as the Dark Knight.

Affleck does manage to hold his own, he's neither terrible nor especially great and for a role as iconic as Batman, that's all you can really ask. Fans are still likely to wish Christian Bale were the man in the bat suit. However, the real standout is Jesse Eisenberg, who steals every scene as Lex Luthor. His manic, frenetic energy and demeanor in the film keeps things interesting and moving whenever it appears to be headed for a lull.

While Eisenberg and even Affleck put up capable performances, all is not good. The storyline is totally and utterly uneven, feeling at times that its two different films. The story cannot decide if it wants to be a dark, brooding philosophical tale, or a straight superhero film. It keeps trying to play this balance between the two that just doesn't work. It needed to go in one direction or another, but instead is a bad combination of both.

Batman v Superman: Dawn of Justice is just an ok first entry into what is likely to be a long line of Justice League films. However, it swings and misses more than it connects. 2.5 out of 5.

Looking for something new for breakfast? Make pancakes. But please, do yourself a solid: make them from scratch and back away from mixes and deceitful Aunt Jemima. A tasty plate of today's pancakes have a shocking lack of vitamins, intense refined carbohydrates, additives and HFCS; pancakes can cause cancer, devastate your pancreas, liver, waistline and heart. We can no longer believe what we've been led to believe.

Do you eat pancakes feloniously assaulted by fake syrup? Use a brand name dry mix? To me the word "additive" is a repulsive, contemptible word. The Environmental Working Group and many others warn the sodium aluminum phosphate in products like Bisquick, Eggo and most pre-made pancake mixes is linked to degenerative brain diseases such as Alzheimer's and Parkinson's. Autopsies on a



large amount of people who have died of Alzheimer's disease showed accumulations up to four times the normal amount of aluminum in the nerve cells in the brain, especially in the hippocampus which plays a central role in memory. The NYU Langone Medical Center reports although small amounts of aluminum usually cause no harm, prolonged exposure or exposure to high levels can cause serious medical problems.

Harmful exposure occurs over time, from eating foods that contain the food additive sodium aluminum phosphate.

It's long been recognized consumption of processed AP flour increases risk of diabetes, obesity, heart disease, Alzheimer's and malnutrition. The CDC says from 1995 to 2010, there was at least a 100 percent increase in the prevalence of diagnosed diabetes; a largely preventable tragedy. Book 'em Danno!

Do you eat pancakes asphyxiated from Aunt Jemima Original syrup made up of high fructose corn syrup (a major cause of heart disease, obesity, cancer dementia, liv-

er failure, tooth decay and more), corn syrup, water, salt, cellulose gum, molasses, artificial and natural flavoring (natural means absolutely nothing), sodium hexametaphosphate (chelating agent in cosmetic formulations), potassium sorbate, sodium benzoate (deprives cells of oxygen-breaks down the immune system and cause cancer), caramel color (carry a chemical that causes cancer in lab animals), and citric acid. Instead, spend a few more pennies for a jug of real maple syrup from nature. You'll make up the difference with reduced medical costs.

You can still enjoy pancakes without trashing your sacred temple home. Healthy pancake mixes and flour alternatives abound at most grocery stores. You're a brilliant miracle; the sole architect of your health. Get thee into thy kitchen and claim it.

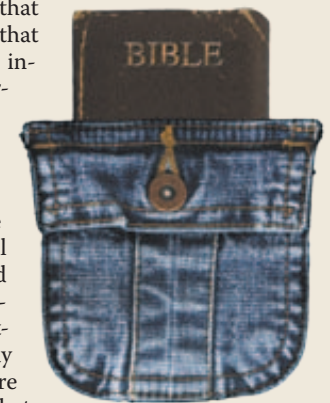
