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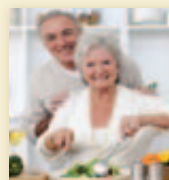

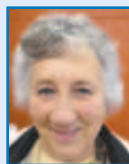

Karachi, Pakistan adventure (Part 1)

Have you ever been afraid to go somewhere because of the unknown? I was very fearful to go to Karachi, Pakistan for a Polio National Immunization Day in November 2015. Basically the irrational fears included exotic foods, hostile people angry at Americans, and being kidnapped or shot at. My fear began weeks before this trip and become somewhat debilitating for me at times. The day finally arrived and the journey began, but the three flights and over 27 hours of travel time did not help with most of the fears. We arrived in Karachi, Pakistan around 1 a.m. and we were greeted by a very nice man that escorted us to the front of the immigration line, to the baggage claim and then outside to meet our friend that would be our host for the next 10 days; the friend had arranged protocol and we were treated as celebrities. My fear began to subside as I had made it to Karachi without incident, but the sight of security guards and military police carrying AK-47s was quite unnerving.

The time came to participate in polio immunizations. We were driven an hour or so outside of the city to a health clinic. The term health clinic was a stretch for me upon seeing this facility. This is my first time to a third world country and I was expecting a medical facility; what I found was one small room with a chair for the parent to sit

in, while holding their child for the immunizations. In the picture (below) there were three Americans (myself, Tim Lee and Rotarian Brad Sackrider from Arizona) standing with our backs against a wall and the parent holding the baby sitting directly in front of us, while the health worker gave immunizations. There was no door on this room, he had no gloves on, he used no hand sanitizer prior to giving the immunizations and he let three Americans take pictures and discuss what was going on. There is apparently not a governing body such as HIPPA in Karachi, Pakistan.



Then it was my turn to give polio drops to the next children that arrived. I was so excited; I could not believe that I was finally going to be participating in helping to save a few innocent children from this dreadful disease. There were two mothers and three children, the three Americans and the Health worker so needless to say we did not all fit in the small little room. They sat on a bench outside of the small room and yes it was in the outdoors. I gave drops to the three children and then gave them some bubbles that I had brought along to pass out to any children that I encountered. This was just the beginning of what I would soon consider to be the best trip of my life and not the scariest.

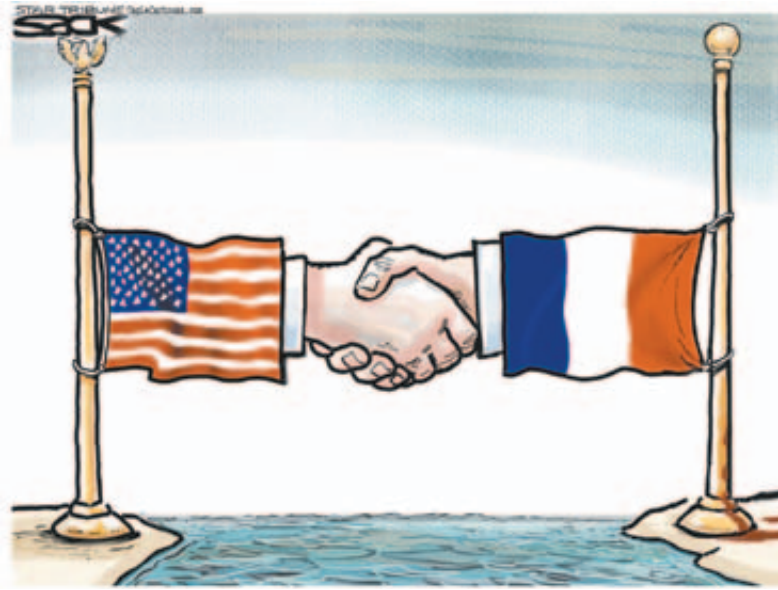

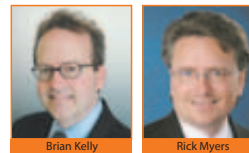
"I was shocked," she said a day after accepting the award in Indianapolis. Reynolds said she didn't know she was nominated and that she was "Humbled and honored."

Gene and Ione Thompson celebrate their 70th anniversary, married while serving in the Marines during WWII

Eugene and Ione Thompson were advised not to get married. Their friends told them that “war weddings” usually end in divorce. The couple had met while serving in the Marine Corps during WWII. They married on Nov. 24, 1945 and defeated those odds. The Thompsons will celebrate their 70th anniversary this week.

“We did it against their better wishes,” Ione said. “But it lasted. It took. We really loved each other.”

Gene is a Southport High School graduate who went to work at Allison Transmission at the age of 19, not long before he was called to the war.

Ione grew up in St. Paul, Minnesota. Her brothers had joined the Marines. She was a sophomore at the University of Minnesota, almost at the end of the school year, when she decided to enlist in the Marines.

“By that time my dearest friend of the time had been killed and three other kids in our class had been killed; I said to myself, ‘what am I doing here doing nothing? I ought to go down and join.’ So I did,” she said. “My parents had to sign for me. They were reluctant but it was the war, so they did. I hardly got

home and they called me up.”

Ione went through boot camp with a drill sergeant who just returned from overseas.

“He was furious that they gave him these women Marines,” she said, noting that he really challenged them. “Some just collapsed, but I never did. All you did was step over them and keep going on... My son joined the Marines in the Vietnam War. I said when you go through boot camp you can never complain because I did it and you could do it.”

Ione was stationed at a base in San Diego, Calif., part of an Air Base Group. She was a clerk there, where she said she got to read log books that came with the planes, showing where it had been and what happened. Gene was stationed at that same base in engine installation. He was a member of a bowling team with the Marines. He waited for the right time to ask Ione on a date. He took her bowling; she beat him. The couple dated for about a year before the war ended.

“When the war was over, you got discharged according to points,” Ione said. “If you were married, the women, you could get out. I’d still be in the Marine Corps over points. (Gene) had already asked me to marry him. He said when we got home. I said no, you’ll go home and I will still be here. We need to get married now.”

Ione was discharged in December 1945. They stayed at a small apartment on the base until Gene was discharged in 1946. By the time they left for their Southside Indianapolis home, Ione was pregnant with their first child. Gene returned to work at Allison and retired in 1988 after 47 years. Ione returned to work as a secretary for a few companies after their youngest child went to school. They have resided on the Southside of Indianapolis, in Perry Township, since 1946: 26 of those years at Banta and U.S. 31 where Forrest Creek Commons now stands.

The couple has three children, Andrew, Jayne and Sue; two grandchildren, Josh and Sarah; and four great-grandchildren, Derek, Hannah, Gabe and Reid.

"We have a nice family with good kids," Gene said, smiling. "It's worked out alright."

Gene and Ione will celebrate their 70th anniversary with family and friends.

"We're very excited about it," Sue, their youngest daughter, said. "There's not very many people married 70 years. As my mother says, that's a long time isn't it? They were great parents. We had a wonderful life growing up, a nice five acres there on the Southside. It's just fantastic that they can be together that long, both still be in good shape."

Ione said they were fortunate to have even met, being from two different states and stationed away from home.

"It's unbelievable that we are here with not much going wrong," Ione said. "We both have our own things that we like to do. He gives when he has to and I give when I have to. We like the same things and want the same things and that's what we worked for... It's natural getting here. It's not much that we did; it's just life going on."

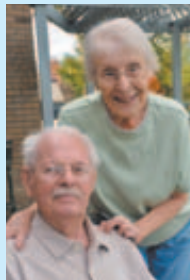
What's the secret a long, happy marriage?

"Not to make a big deal of some paltry thing that doesn't go how you want it. You don't have to be really picky. What's the use of adding to any problems you might have? Just do what you can to make it better. When we first married, we had this little apartment and I wanted a Christmas tree. I wanted a big one. He gave in and got it home, when it hit me that I don't have a darn thing to put on it. I got paper and cut out paper ornaments like a kindergartner. But we loved it. I say not to make a big deal out of something; just do the best you can."

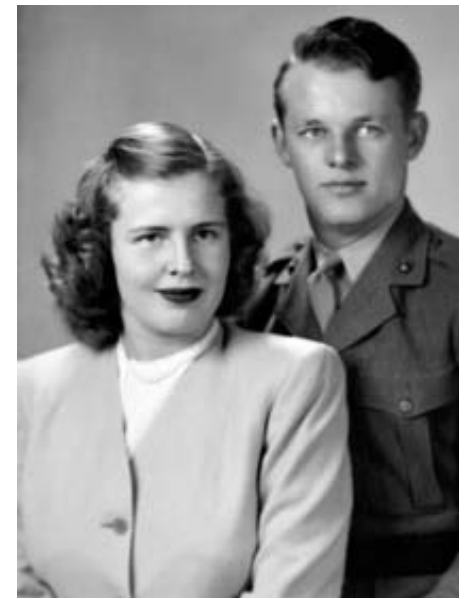

White River Township's first full-time female firefighter has big goals for her career

BEHIND the BADGE

When Sasha Davis started working for the White River Township Fire Department (WRTFD) as a cadet her junior year of high school through Central Nine's public safety program, it became her goal to get hired to the department as its first full-time female firefighter. She was hired part-time right out of high school, and accomplished that goal when she was hired full-time in 2012.

"It was a huge celebration," Davis says. "I always felt like (WRTFD) was kind of home. Everyone trained me here. I grew up here. I know the family here. It's my community that I'm protecting."

Davis grew up in Perry Township, graduating from Perry Meridian High School in 2008. Currently residing in Center Grove, she also works part-time with the Bargersville Fire Department and part-time with D's Taps in Beech Grove. She says she enjoys working for the smaller department, and looks forward to a long career with WRTFD.

"With this job you see people at their best and at their worst," Davis says. "You want to help them regardless in the situation. I would not have as many life experiences, seeing so much compassion and also brutality. It's definitely made me more mature and expanded my horizons more than a normal job would have."

What was your inspiration to become a firefighter?

I grew up around it my whole life. My best friend, her whole family, her mother and father, are both chiefs at IFD. I was always over at her house. They would take us to the fire house and let us see everything. They let us see the life they lived and the comradery. That really inspired me to want to be part of something tight-knit that helps the community.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

I get gratification from any positive run. The most gratifying type of run is a cardiac arrest where you can actually save them. You see the family go from being distraught to grateful. They can't thank you enough for helping save a family member.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

The biggest challenge is the scheduling, the time away from home and missing family time. Also, the sleep deprivation sometimes.

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

My boyfriend and I love to travel on our time off. We just came back from New Orleans. We spent Halloween there. We like to go on mini two or three day trips across the country, try the food, see local drinks and the local culture wherever we go.

What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

I would love to be in an officer role one day. This would be way down the road. I would like maybe a captain or battalion chief position. I would also like to finish my paramedic associates degree.

What would you have done if you hadn't become a firefighter?

A party planner. That's pretty much my main role in our group of friends right now. I love to throw parties, decorate for them and bake the cake: all that crazy, hectic work that most people hate. I love seeing people's faces as they come over, celebrating and having a good time.

Their presentation, "Twenty-five years of the MAA student chapters," highlighted their independent study of the new trends and positive changes that might have been introduced and implemented in STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) fields, particularly in mathematics, from 25 years ago until now. They conducted research by contacting and collecting responses from almost all of the student MAA chapters. Their faculty advisor was Haseeb Kazi, Ph.D., associate professor of mathematics.

GOVERNMENT WATCHDOG

SOUTHPORT CITY COUNCIL



Meeting, Nov. 16

■ **What happened?** Ordinance 15.10.06 was approved on second reading.

■ **What it means:** The ordinance would allow the City of Southport to withdraw from the Marion County Storm Water Management District and form the City of Southport Storm Water Management District. The council would be responsible for management of this system and fun management activities by charging user fees to the user of each property. The fee for one Equivalent Residential Unit, or average amount of impervious surface, would be \$5.

■ **What's next?** The ordinance will undergo final vote on Dec. 21, 7 p.m.

■ **What happened?** The council approved the Southport Police Departments Standard Operating Procedure for the use and storage of its body cameras.

■ **What it means:** The police department has established procedures as to when and how the cameras will be used and how the footage will be securely stored.

■ **What's next?** The police department expects to begin using the body cameras beginning Dec. 1

Meeting, Nov. 16

■ **What happened?** What Happened: Ordinance Notice of Intent Ordinances 15-73, 15-81 and 15-82 passed. First Reading Ordinances 15-74 through 15-77 all passed. Second Reading Ordinances 15-67, 15-69, 15-70 and 15-80 all passed. New Ordinances 15-83 through 15-85 all passed.

■ **What it means:** Ordinance 15-73 was largely discussed. In this Ordinance, the proposed rezoning of approximately 7.3 acres located at W. Stones Crossing road to construct an events barn at Bay Horse Stables. The goal of the event venue is to ensure growth in the City's planning area, develop a strong identity for the City of Greenwood and protect and preserve existing open space and environment areas on the 7.3 acres of land.

■ **What's next?** All ordinances will go into effect. In regards to Ordinance 15-73, the event venue is planned to be completed August 2016.

"It's getting jump rope shown on national tv," Taylor says. "Then there's the atmosphere. A lot of us have never been to New York and to jump in the Macy's Parade is really cool."

Organized by the Heartbeats Jump Rope Team in Cleveland, Ohio, the group will appear under the acronym J.U.M.P. (Jumpers United for Macy's Parade).

The teammates will arrive in New York the Monday before Thanksgiving, leaving them plenty of time to do some sightseeing while they perfect their performance. They say they're not really nervous about it, as they're used to the attention, but they are getting excited.

"We're all more anxious about the distance of the actual parade route," Tyson. "Three miles is a long time to jump, so just training for it has been difficult."

This is the third time that J.U.M.P. will be in the Macy's parade, which has 108 jumpers this year.

"They'll be the only team represented in Indiana," says Niki Glover, coach. "I think it's a great honor that they got selected."

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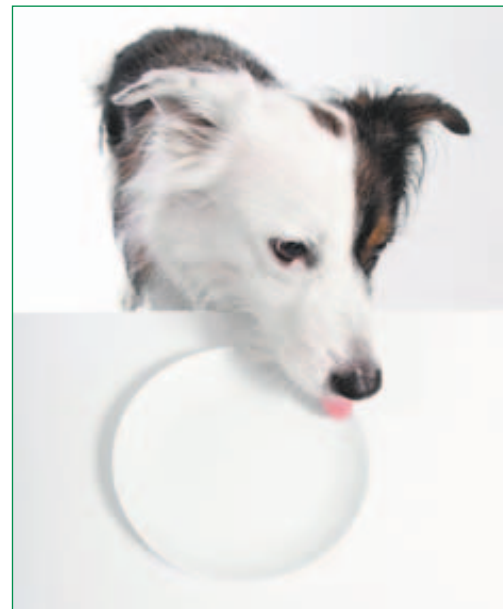

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Thanksgiving dinner and your pet

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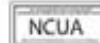

Suggesting folks change their hallowed traditions, is like asking them to change religions-even if it means glowing health, joy, happiness plus lower healthcare costs. We're an odd species, indeed. Clearly, there's a subpersonality within each person that has a self-destruct theme.

While planning your turkey feast, think on this: the shiny, scarlet red berry belongs to the blueberry family. Native Americans, reverent to earth's divine gifts, were privy to the heavenly magic of cranberries long before arrogant, contemporary scientist took credit for discovering cranberries health benefits. dinner table by showing love to your holy temple. Instead of bullying someone into 'another helping' of traditional foods detrimental to health and wellbeing, give your guests a loving hug and then a side dish using real, fresh, nourishing cranberries from Mother Nature, not a silly tin can.

'A' or 'an?'

GRAMMAR GUY

Question: Dear Grammar Guy, I'm constantly worried I'm not using "an" correctly, or not using it when I should be. The only word I feel really sure about using it before is "honor." Does it matter if the word starts with a vowel or not? Please help!

Answer: That is an excellent question. Shall we commence an article about articles?

It would be great if "a" was the article for words starting with consonants and "an" the article for words starting with vowels. That would be a nice, simple rule we could all follow – although it wouldn't leave me with much of a column. As it happens, that's not the case.

For this one we have to go back to our first grade phonetics lessons. That's right, folks: We're sounding it out.

"An" is use before words beginning with a vowel "sound" -- whether or not the first letter is actually a vowel. You've got "honor" already ("on-er"). "Only" gets an "an" (as in, "an only child"), but "once" doesn't (ex: "a once-in-a-lifetime experience"). Though both start with "O," only one begins with a vowel sound. Say "once" in your head: "wონse." The rule for "an" applies to single letters and numbers too: an "F;" an "8;" etc.

Now I'm sure you've deduced "A" is used for words beginning with consonant sounds, so I'll save the ink. The big one you're probably wondering about here is the word "historic" – does it get an "A" or an "An?" Unless you're affecting an 18th century dialect, you probably say words like "historic" and "hotel" with a hard "H." That means they get an "A" before them.

The secret here is something that's been in your grammar toolbox since you were a kid: when in doubt, sound it out. If the word begins with a vowel sound, give it an "An" before it. Otherwise, it gets an "A."

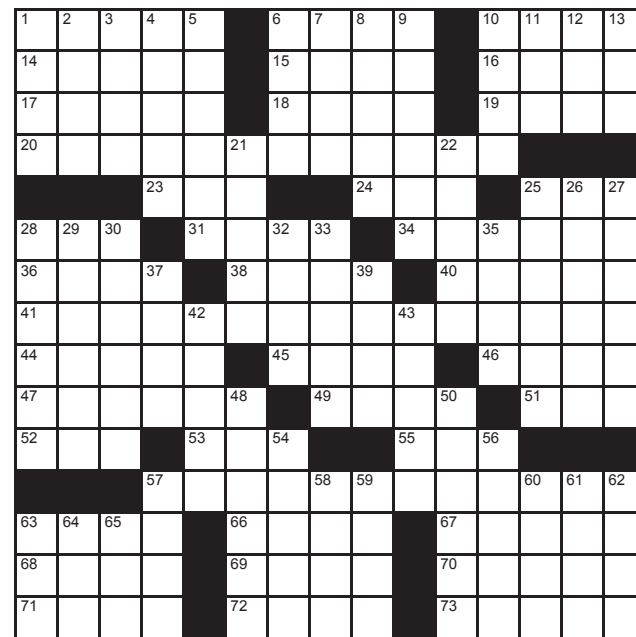

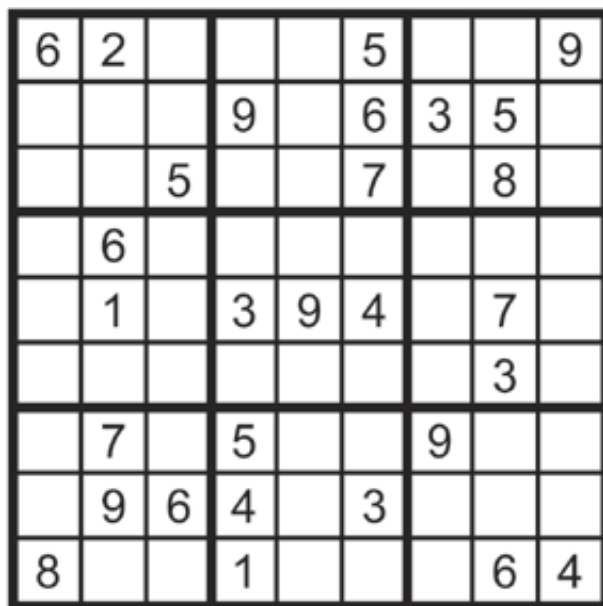

Spotlight... gripping and riveting

MOVIE REVIEW

There probably isn't anything worse in the world than learning about the abuse, neglect or mistreatment of an innocent child. Add in that the abuse is coming courtesy of a highly respected member of society who is using their position of power to prey upon children, and you've got a tale that could turn even the strongest of stomachs. The new film, *Spotlight*, starring Michael Keaton and Rachel McAdams, looks at a fairly recent revelation that went on to rock the very foundation of one of our culture's preeminent organizations: The Catholic Church.

Spotlight is about the Boston Globe investigative reporters who slowly and meticulously uncovered the mental and sexual abuse of children by Catholic priests and the decades-long cover up that ensued. In addition to chronicling the activities of the team of four reporters as they put pieces of the puzzle together, the film also spends time with each individual team member. Each of the four have a uniquely different connection to the Catholic church and shows them as they grapple with the gravity of what they have stumbled upon and ultimately reveal to the world.

While the film's run time totals a little more than two hours, it's such an enormously entertaining and suspense-filled time frame that you will not mind one bit. The

film is so expertly written and aptly directed that despite knowing the outcome, the film manages to keep you thoroughly engaged and engrossed in the story and characters unlike most films in recent memory. Literally, no scene or line of dialogue in the entire film is wasted. No scene lasts any longer than what is needed and no character provides any superfluous or unnecessary information. *Spotlight* truly is a masterfully constructed film, from everything to its direction to its screenplay.

In addition to the expert-level work behind the camera, the effort seen on camera is not too shabby either. There honestly is not a weak performance from the entire cast. While everyone shines in their role, Keaton and Ruffalo certainly glow brightest. Both give such terrific performances that selecting someone else for the top actor Oscars would be difficult to justify.

Spotlight is a captivating piece of film with little to point to in terms of flaws. The directing, writing, and acting are all award-winning. Thanks to *Spotlight*, the race for the Best Picture Oscar may be over before it even began. The year's best.

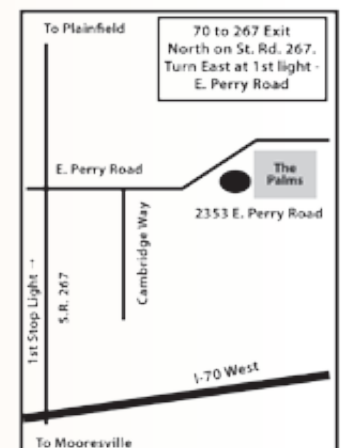
