

Beech Grove city park improvements continue

Earlier this year we made additional improvements in our park system by installing storm water drains and paving the parking lot at Hartman Field. I wanted to update everyone on some additional improvements that have occurred and will occur very soon.

Recently, a new water line was installed serving the Little League diamonds on South Ninth. Within the next week new water lines will be ran to better accommodate the Creekside Shelters in the Sarah T. Bolton Park. This will allow parks crews to better clean the shelter area. A new restroom building has been installed in the Hilltop Shelter at Sarah T. Bolton Park. This investment was paid for by the Redevelopment Commission. The above ground fuel tanks located in Sarah T. Bolton Park are in the process of being removed so we can minimize our risk for an environmental spill.

Recently security cameras were installed in Sarah T. Bolton Park, Challis Park on South Ninth, and at Hartman Field. This investment is being paid for by the Redevelopment Commission as well. Soon, we will apply for funding for the Greenway project that will connect our park system with Main Street and all of our school buildings and become one of our focal points of the city.

Southport mayor's response to Oct. 22 letter to the editor

This is in response to an article in the Oct. 22-28, 2015 edition of The Southside Times entitled "Southport is fortunate to have experienced building Commissioner."

In the article Mrs. Bossingham indicated we had received a letter from the State of Indiana Fire Prevention and Building Safety Commission dated July 5, 2013 endorsing our ordinance No. 13.04. This office never received a copy until October 22, 2015. It does not indicate that Mr. Langreck is Certified or approved.

It is my job as Mayor of this city to investigate inquiries this office receives. I had my Assistant send an email to Mrs. Bossingham and Mr. Langreck requesting his certificates or evidence that he was up to date and certified. After the third request (three weeks later) the information was received in our office.

Since we had not received the requested information on time I went downtown to check on his credentials, and was told his Architect license had expired December 31, 2011. I notified our City's Attorney, and upon his advice, we proceeded to stop all actions until the city had the documentation of his authority to be qualified as a Building Inspector or

Commissioner. I promised him, if unfounded, he would be reinstated as both the Building Commissioner and member of the Board of the Public Works. It took a total of three weeks for this information to be received in this office. (Public Access Laws time period for response is seven days for electronic mail)

After hearing from our Attorney that everything was okay, I did apologize to Mr. Langreck, He accepted my apology, we shook hands and it is business as usual.

As Mayor I will continue to protect this city whenever challenged.

Happenings of the BG clerk-treasurer's office through the past four years

When I ran for office in 2011, I promised to serve the Citizens of Beech Grove, and not fold under pressure. I have done that and I have served this city with honesty, integrity and transparency, always keeping in mind that it is the people's money we have been charged to manage. I realize this, because before taking office in 2012, I had never worked in or for government, but had been self-employed for over 30 years. I never had set hours, but worked whatever hours the job demanded of me, usually 60 or 70 hours a week, that was my choice to be self-employed and I did what I needed to in order to take care of my family and business. I run this office the same way. The ladies have set hours as it should be, but I work until my work is finished and as the Clerk-Treasurer that is how it should be. The financial well-being of the city lies in this office.

Another promise I made was to create a city website that was transparent and honest with government finances. Something that could show us the citizens how our taxpayer dollars are being spent. I took office on January 1, 2012 and with the assistance of volunteers we had that up and running by January 15, 2012. I know not everyone looks at it, but the point is that it is available to you if you want to review it, including the monthly bank statements and it is all a matter of public record.

I have updated computers and software programs in the Office of Clerk-Treasurer. We have cleaned up the State Board of Accounts City Audits and we have created four balance budgets that has allowed the City to move forward with paving projects, new equipment, and employee raises for ALL employees and much more.

The city corporate bank account had a balance of \$220,000.00 ending in 2011. Ending September 2015 we had a balance of over \$3.2 Million in that same account. This is not done by just creating balanced budgets, but by monitoring the revenues and expenses daily to insure that the budget is not overspent,

and obtaining financing (when necessary) that offers the best possible interest rate that the market has to offer. Paying bills on time and avoiding late charges, negotiating bank charges, and monitoring prices set forth by vendors, including insurance, is the responsibility of this office too.

We also take sewer payments and issue permits. While it is important, it is a small portion of the responsibility of duties charged with the Clerk-Treasurer's Office.

If elected, I will continue to serve the citizens with honesty, transparency and integrity, never forgetting that I work for the citizens and it is their money that we are managing. I further promise to be responsible and accessible, while upholding the laws of the State of Indiana. I have proven results!



Irvington Ghost Tour guide Al Hunter, dressed in a black full length coat and matching wide brimmed hat, holding a lantern and walking stick, leads a troop through the maze of Irvington streets telling stories of this haunted inner city eastside neighborhood. It's a quiet neighborhood, but not without dark secrets. It would appear that the past often transitions into the present, often with ramifications! Hunter knows what the crowd is there for as a devilish smile plays across his lips.

Halloween comes but once a year. People tend to focus at this time upon the supernatural, then after it is over return to other areas of interest. Yet, this "focus" has been known to ignite and fuel paranormal realities. For paranormal investigators the sentiment of Halloween is not just confined to the month of October, but rather 365 days a year. For us, every month contains Halloween overtones. It's a given!

The Irvington Ghost Walks started with only 30 attendees in the past. Since, those numbers have increased. On Friday Oct. 11, some 320 folks made the stroll. The following Saturday it was well over 300. And all there for a Hunter history lesson on how a seemingly normal cycle of life can harbor misty things just below the surface. From all indications Irvington is a concentrated area of paranormal activity.

It is cold on that Saturday; much too cold to be wearing shorts on this hike. Fallen autumn leaves rustle on the sidewalk as a diverse representation of houses passes by in the darkness. Some are decorated for Halloween. Many others sit back from the narrow streets—silent in the shadows and quiet in their secrets. Tour helpers guide the throng, waving flashlights from the street as the masses pass by in silent formation. A passing car occasionally honks its horn.

Two children, dressed in sheets, stand on the front porch of their home and moan like mournful ghosts as the group passes. Curious homeowners peer out their windows. The group stands on the lawn of the Children's Guardian Home, then pivot to look across the street to the former home of Madge Oberholtzer, hearing the tragic tale of her fate and how she brought down D.C. Stephenson and the Indiana chapter of the K.K.K.

There's a lot of history in the small community of Irvington, just south of busy Washington Street. And a large chunk of it is dark. Al Hunter would have it no other way.


Southport celebrates its Halloween Parade and Party

David Gard

IMPD sergeant splits his time with community relations and as a field training officer

BEHIND the BADGE

When Sgt. David Gard went into law enforcement, he did it to have the opportunity to spend his career helping people. Through the different roles he's had with the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department, that's still the aspect he says he enjoys most.

Gard grew up on the Eastside of Indianapolis, enlisting in the military out of high school. When he returned home, he worked in security at Methodist Hospital while he pursued his goal of becoming a police officer. He was hired to IMPD in 1999. He has served in the Southeast district throughout his career.

Gard says he spent his three or four years jumping from shift to shift while working toward another goal of becoming part of a proactive tactical unit which would go into troubled areas trying to solve the crime issues. He served with that unit until he was promoted to sergeant in 2010. He is currently the community relations/day tac supervisor

What was your inspiration to become a police officer?

I've always been service inspired. I went into the military straight out of high school. I did seven and a half years there, did a couple of tours in Korea. My brother was a police officer and when I was getting out of the service, I knew that's what I wanted to do. I really wanted to come back and help my community. I was born and raised here on the Eastside.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

I've had quite a few. I've been involved in the rescue of individuals... Even arresting someone in a lot of cases is gratifying. I mean that twofold. You're helping the victim but you're also helping that individual that you're arresting by sending a clear message that what they're done is not only illegal but it's just not morally right. I've had individuals that I've arrested come back years later and shake my hand. That feels pretty good. I've had a wonderful career.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

The mental aspect of this job is definitely the hardest. You can get past the physical. The mental part of this job, it's one of the hardest things to teach the new recruits. It's hard to teach them that this job is going to be very mentally taxing. The things we see over and over again wear on you. You're constantly seeing the worst part of society.

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

I'm a homebody. I love being with my wife, Deborah. All of my kids are grown and I have grandbabies (four children and two grandchildren) I love being with my family. I work out. My wife and I ride motorcycles. We try to get to the beach when we can. Mostly, I just like lying around the house, relaxing.

What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

I'm pretty happy with what I'm doing now. I have the job here in the community relations section so we do a lot of community work. I also have the split duties with being a field sergeant so I get to be out on the street. I teach survival tactics instruction at the academy. I'm pretty satisfied. I have eight or nine years before I retire and then I just plan on relaxing.

What would you have done if you hadn't of became a police officer?

I would have been in some type of service, maybe a firefighter. I would have done something service-oriented.

City Councilor Jeff Miller is proponent of legal businesses

The headline in last week's letter to the editor found in the Times ("Garfield Park area closed for business") was just the start of a pathetic attempt by failed business owner Craig Triscari to "explain" the reasons for his failure. The history and facts surrounding this issue, detailed below, are clear, as is the motive behind the timing of the letter. The writer's purposes were to attack city councilman Jeff Miller, who is standing for reelection in District 19 and spoke in opposition to the operation, and in the process portraying our neighbors as anti-business. The motive is borne out by the fact that this issue was not decided recently, but eight months ago, by the city of Indianapolis Zoning Board in a 5-0 unanimous vote that required only minutes to decide. The election was less than two weeks away at the time of printing when Mr. Triscari decided to attack Mr. Miller in this publication and others.

The irony is that Mr. Miller, a Republican, is viewed as a proponent of legal businesses (which is why he is endorsed by the Indy Chamber of Commerce and many unions) and is widely-respected by his peers for his ability to form consensus on so many critical issues. As evidence, we were supported at the hearing in person and via correspondence by Democrat city councilman Frank

Mascari, Republican councilman Jefferson Shreve and Democrat state representative Justin Moed. History and facts were the two reasons for their unilateral support on this

Initially, Mr. Triscari was invited to speak to the Garfield Park Neighbors Association (GPNA), as is our custom, to explain his business and the need for a variance to operate at his rented location. He had a pending license when he opened the business but not the necessary variance to operate. His explanation for opening prematurely was that he wasn't aware that a variance was required, in spite of the fact that he had been involved in two prior scrapping businesses, also located in the city, which opened without variances and eventually closed. That statement, along with others, led to further investigation by neighbors.

It was soon discovered by the neighbors that the history of the former businesses Mr. Triscari was involved with was littered with code violations and repeated delays in obtaining variances, along with negative input from the leaders of those communities. The three code violations imposed on the new Shelby/Troy location, even before the variance request could be heard, were part of a clear pattern and only solidified neighbor

opposition, resulting in a 13-0 vote by our non-profit Board to oppose.

Finally, regarding the specific attack on Mr. Miller: (1) He did not say it was a "privilege not a right to do business in Indianapolis" but did correctly state that "the granting of a variance to allow unpermitted usage at a given location is a privilege, not a right". (2) He didn't say "it is not the fault of the (Zoning) Board to destroy jobs in Indianapolis" but did testify that it "was the responsibility of the company not to have opened prematurely and that if they did, if the company was denied variance approval the responsibility was on the company, not the Board". None of this factual history is found in any of Mr. Triscari's recent negative attacks.

There was nothing "inexplicable" about the closing of this business and Mr. Triscari knows that. The four new legally-licensed businesses that have recently opened and are about to open in our neighborhood can attest to the welcoming nature of our neighbors.

The race is on

Beech Grove mayoral candidates take a look at public safety and city improvements

Colorful campaign signs sprouting in the neatly kept lawns of Beech Grove look like the Nov. 3 municipal election is an uncomplicated contest of Republicans and Democrats.

The headline race is the run for mayor of the city of 13,000 on the Southside of Marion County. One candidate talks about leadership styles; the other claims deeper roots in the community.

The incumbent mayor cites a list of accomplishments. The \$5.4 million renovation of Main Street done in 2013. About 80 new businesses have come to the city. There are two new fire trucks and 23 new police cars. There's a 10 percent increase in the city's assessed value and \$75

His opponent asks how can Beech Grove deal with drug houses and crime? Can the vacant St. Francis hospital be saved or demolished? And can Beech Grove maintain its small-town, family-friendly lifestyle?

million worth of new investments.

Democratic Mayor Dennis B. Buckley, 60, a retired Beech Grove firefighter of 30 years and the ultimate insider, is seeking a second four-year term in City Hall. The challenger is Republican Edward A. Mc-

Donald, 58, retired as a Lt. Col. after 30 years as a U.S. Army attorney. He's traveled the world and used his retirement nest egg four years ago to buy a home in Beech Grove, then became involved in improving the city.

McDonald was born into a well-traveled military family so he's been educated in Maryland, Germany and France, and in California for a law degree. His last posting in the judge advocate corps was five years at Camp Atterbury in Johnson County. Among his duties was teaching the laws of war to men and women heading to the Middle East.

"Four years ago, I choose Beech Grove to buy a home because I like the small town atmosphere. And I like the great respect that is shown toward men and women in uniform," McDonald said.

"The GOP came to me and said they wanted somebody new," he said. His most recent campaign finance report filed in October shows he's raised roughly \$17,000 this year. About \$1,000 of that was donations from close friends. Nearly all of the rest is his own money. "I broke into my retirement savings to do this, so I won't feel obligated to anyone."

Buckley has four years of publicly filed campaign finance reports including the most recent report Oct. 13, which show he's raised about twice as much as McDonald for this election. Buckley acknowledges that much of it comes from contractors, vendors, labor unions, attorneys and others who have business with the city or would like to get the government's business.

Beech Grove businessman Joe Wolfla, once a frequent contributor to Buckley's campaigns, has vocally split with the mayor. He recently sent a four-page registered letter to Buckley questioning many details in the mayor's campaign finance reports going back four years. He questioned \$2,000 dinners and other entertainment at restaurants outside the city. He questioned campaign contributions to the Beautify Beech Grove organization that is to be non-partisan.

To all of that, the mayor replies "Joe's letter is vindictive, opportunistic and in poor taste. I take exception to everything. He supports my opponent."

Buckley says all of his campaign contributions and spend-

ing are legal and above board. He said Beautify Beech Grove, as a not-for-profit, may receive contributions but not make them.

The St. Francis hospital property remains the biggest redevelopment opportunity in Beech Grove, which has no land to expand. So the mayor would like it to be torn down and cleared for something new. "There have been three or four developers, including Joe (Wolfla.) None have worked out," Buckley said. "The process (for demolition) has started but I guess it's on hold again because another developer is interested."

Then there's the Beech Grove Walmart, a Motel 6 and sev-

eral houses in the city that are central to another key issue for the candidates.

In June, an internet video showed two women scuffling on the floor of the shampoo aisle in the Walmart. In another incident, a man caught shoplifting fought with police in the store and shot himself. Buckley said those incidents were the last straw for him so the city took steps to declare Walmart a public nuisance.

A month later, Buckley was so irritated by the large number of police runs to the

Motel 6 that he threatened to erect signs saying: "Warning: Prostitution and drug area."

"Since then, they are both much better," he said. Walmart hired off-duty police officers, improved fencing, stopped truck parking in their lot and began a diversion program for shoplifting under \$50. Instead of five emergency runs a day, police were called 64 times in the last 90 days.

McDonald, who has a career in military law, said the retailer and motel are not the only crime problems in the city. "The mayor has done practically nothing about the drug houses," McDonald asserted.

McDonald added, "there is no citizen police academy. I started a crime watch that has nearly 1,000 members, so far."

Merger of the city's police and fire operations with the Indianapolis departments remains a hot rumor in the city's smoke-filled taverns. (Beech Grove is the last corner within Marion County where smoking isn't banned.)

Buckley and McDonald both oppose a merger even though it might save millions in operation costs.

McDonald said, "it is important to our town to keep our own police and fire department. Beech Grove has been independent since 1906."

Buckley, who was a firefighter 30 years including 12 years as chief, said "I would never surrender our police or fire departments or their equipment. We have our own identity."

Members of the police department, who voted to endorse Buckley, received written answers to questions asked of both of the candidates.

McDonald was asked about the city's economy and how to resolve conflicts. He said, "Beech Grove is on a precipice. Fountain Square to the north and Greenwood to the south are gentrifying. This will cause an influx of individuals looking for cheap housing in Beech Grove. Our public safety problems will magnify if we don't encourage stable families."

"I will always be respectful to others. I will not prevent council members from calendaring a proposal at City Hall meetings; nor will I fire anyone because of political criticism," he wrote.

Courting the police endorsement, the mayor had a slightly

mixed message about a public safety merger. He wrote to the police department, "It's OK to think out of the box. One option the council may consider is to enter into an agreement with the city of Indianapolis for fire protection. No, I would not consider a consolidated fire department, but should the council do this it would open up an opportunity for the city to invest another \$750,000 into the Police Department. More police officers, more pay and better working conditions..."



'Sweat Equity' pays off for local homeowners

Fuller Center for Housing partners with Sacred Heart of Jesus and Old Southside groups for revitalization project

A new home at 26 E. Caven St., Indianapolis, is the first completed project in what many Old Southside community members

and advocates hope for in redevelopment of the neighborhood.

"This project has probably been in the works for a little over a year," said Heather Rayka, chapter president of the Fuller Center. "Some members of the Sacred Heart parish were interested in doing some revitalization along with the Old Southside Neighborhood Association and Southside Business Association, so they

came to one of our builds last year. We kept meeting with them. They were all interested in coming up with a way to start the revitalization of the neighborhood. We said yes, we'll partner with you to build this house."

Fuller Center for Housing of Central Indiana, Inc. is a Christian-based nonprofit which repairs and builds affordable homes for people in need. It is all volunteer and everything donated goes to the houses. Recipients must put in "sweat equity," or volunteer hours, for the home.

The house on Caven Street is going to a mother, Veronica, and her four children, who have lived in Indianapolis for five years.

The build took three weeks, with a dedication held on Oct. 23. This is the Fuller Center's first home built in the Old Southside neighborhood, although there are still open lots that Rayka said can be used for future projects.

"We look to build at least one home a year and build momentum from there," Rayka said. "Fuller Center builds between two to five houses a year depending on volun-

teers, sponsors, donors... I think the enthusiasm is here (in the Old Southside neighborhood) to continue partnering with these organizations and churches."



Crimson Peak... horrifying film

Before we say goodbye to October 2015, millions of children will inevitably go from door to door asking complete strangers for

candy. Another predictable occurrence around this time of year is that the number of horror films at theaters start increasing, hoping to put fear into audiences everywhere. One film looking scare filmgoers is the new Guillermo del Toro horror film, *Crimson Peak*.

Crimson Peak is about a young, naïve 20-something as-

piring author, who has never quite recovered from losing her mother as child. In the years following her mother's death, the girl has attempted to lead as normal a life as possible. However, from time to time the girl encounters a dark black shadowy entity that somewhat resembles her mother's likeness.

Instead of crying out for help, the girl tolerates her from sporadic visitor. But lately the ghost-like creature delivers a message as it faintly says, "avoid Crimson Peak." Not long after, the young woman becomes enamored with a traveling businessman and they are quickly married. The young man takes her away to live in his family's old, decrepit mansion where a mysterious woman also resides. What the young wannabe author discovers is a horrifying situation filled with murder, deceit and large amounts of tea.

Crimson Peak may have been promoted as a ghost horror film, but that could not be further from the truth. Rather it is a horror film and ghosts just happened to be around, never really interacting with the characters. Deceptive marketing aside, the story is intrigu-

ing, keeping you invested and interested even when the lead actress cannot. *Crimson Peak* is creatively written as it eerily lulls you into a state of self-assuredness and then springs several very big reveals. The script also very neatly ties together any and every remaining loose ends by film's conclusion.

While the script and the directing are well done, the cin-

ematography is outstanding. The film ingeniously incorporates shades of dark greens, reds, and black into nearly every single shot, making for an aesthetically pleasing feast for the eyes.

While not necessarily my cup of tea, *Crimson Peak* is a well-written film with expert direction, featuring some solid performances, particularly from Jessica Chastain. *Crimson Peak* is a horrifying horror film.
