Beech Grove Main Street revisited

It has been a little over two years since the Main Street reconstruction project was completed. What a difference it has made. No longer are businesses subject to placing sand bags in front of doors when we have a rain event and flooding of side streets has been mitigated. The installation of a new storm sewer drainage system as part of this project has finally corrected the drainage issues that have been around longer than all of us. We all can take pride in this beautiful project and what it has done for our city. We can also look back at all the vacant store fronts prior to the reconstruction and look at where we are now, a vibrant Main Street.

I have been informed that work will begin around the 19th of October to take the concrete out in these areas and replaced. We have invested millions of dollars in infrastructure improvements over the past four years and it shows. Quality workmanship is essential and desired.




QUOTE OF THE WEEK



Kyle Vaughn says he always looks forward to any event that the community can come out and intermingle with the Southport Police Department. As a newly-promoted lieutenant over special programs, which have an ultimate goal of strengthening that relationship with the residents of Southport, he says it's what makes the small city feel like a big family.

"I love the interaction I have with the community," Vaughn said. "It's a family feeling – from Annie Singleton (Southport resident) picking on me to me picking on Diana Bossingham (clerk/treasurer). It's why I come here every day. I truly work in the best city in Indiana."

Vaughn is a Southport High School graduate. Out of high school he worked with the YMCA in an after school program at Homecroft Elementary. He was hired onto the Southport Police Department in 2012.

He was promoted in August to lieutenant over training and special services. Special Services includes the Explorer Program for youth ages 14 - 20 and teaches them about law enforcement, helping them learn about responsibility for themselves and other life skills. It also includes the bike program where officers patrol the city on bicycles and allows residents to get out and talk one-onone with the officers.


"Southport seemed like the best place to start and it truly has been," he said. "I've learned a lot since I've been here. I live just down the street from the police station. I can take care of my home."

One of the best parts about the job is you get to help people. It's a job you're born to do. You don't just roll out of bed one day and say I think I'm going to be a police officer. You get to go help people. You're in it because you truly enjoy helping people.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

I'm the mascot for Southport Police Department. I wear the Justice outfit. I can get away and interact with the kids. They love Justice. Just watching their faces light up and their excitement is the best part about

it. That's probably the most gratifying part of my job – putting on that dog outfit.

Southport Middle School math teacher Chuck Welch has pumpkin supply and demand down to a science after 24 years with Welch's Pumpkins

How many pumpkins can be sold in one season in a business off of U.S. 31 S.? Chuck Welch has it down to a science. This year Welch will sell approximately 80 tons of pumpkins from 511 U.S. 31 S. in Whiteland.

Welch's Pumpkins is in its 24th season. Welch, who works full-time as an eighth grade algebra teacher for Southport Middle School, is in his 22nd year of teaching. His business, Cutting Edge Lawn Service, is in its 30th year. If that isn't enough, Welch will begin his third season with Welch's Christmas Trees in November, selling 400 Christmas trees from the same Whiteland location.

"I have four kids in high school," Welch said. "They know dad's a workaholic. I'm not much of a TV guy, not much of a computer guy. I like being outside, talking to people and being busy."

Welch, currently a Shelbyville resident, grew up in Franklin and attended Franklin College. He started Cutting Edge Lawn Service to pay his way through college. He went on a date with his to-be wife, Jenny, in 1992 and they got a couple of pumpkins.

"That's what gave me the pumpkin idea and I've been selling pumpkins ever since," Welch said. "I've been doing business with the same Amish farm in Rockville for 20 years. I have several farmers that supply me."

It's not just another job for Welch, but his friends and family as well. His wife and children help with the businesses. Welch's father, Albert Bailey, and third grade friend, Chris Dorris, have worked at Welch's Pumpkins for a large majority of the years - along with other family/friends.

Welch and his team begin to set up a large display of mums on Labor Day weekend. The last week of September, they begin selling pumpkins. He orders a small amount in the beginning and reorders for after the first week of October, giving him time to predict how many pumpkins will sell. He said about 50 percent of the time, they sell all of their

pumpkins.

They take a couple of weeks off in November, and set up for Welch's Christmas Trees opening on Thanksgiving weekend. Every tree they sell, they put a dollar in what they call their needy bucket. With that money, they helped 38 families in need get Christmas trees last year.

"It's just fun," Welch said. "I see a lot of friends, family. I've gotten to know people over the years. Building relationships makes it fun. Even high school friends, I see them once a year when they come get pumpkins. They try to make sure I'm here when they come. We always have current students... I have former students that come around all the time," he pauses after that statement to direct a question at a former student who was shopping for a pumpkin, "The craziest, best teacher they ever had, right?"

Welch said each business goes hand-inhand. He also does a lot of commercial sales. decorating homes or businesses for the holiday seasons.

Their biggest challenge is the weather. The nicer the weather, the more they sell. Frost poses the biggest threat. A pumpkin will freeze at 26 degrees. He said there have been times they needed to cover the pumpkins to protect them - and have even used the signs that usually go on billboards as tarps to protect the produce.

He said they pride themselves on having such a large variety of pumpkins and gourds, from the ever-popular Jack-O-Lantern to white pumpkins, 'snake' gourds, or giant pumpkins that can weigh more than 350 pounds. The best part of each year, Chuck said, is "watching all of the pumpkins disappear and go to happy homes."

"Our biggest compliment is how well our place it set up and our quality," Welch said. "Good quality will keep the customer coming back year after year."

Ulndy senior and Roncalli graduate Joey Mulinaro produces Late Night Indy radio show with a local emphasis

As the operations manager for a radio station reaching 63,000 people in Indianapolis on a weekly basis, Joey Mulinaro has a vision of producing content to draw in an even larger audience. As a senior at the University of Indianapolis, Mulinaro works for the university's radio station, 88.7, WICR FM and has taken pride in helping to grow its student-run productions.

"With my interest in late night television, I figured there is an untapped market for that in Indianapolis," Mulinaro said. "This year I've tried to use my passion and interest in entertainment and comedy which is where I came up with the idea for *Late Night Indy* that I'm doing right now... This is my hometown. It means a lot to me so I wanted to do something special for that. That's why I'm doing it."

Mulinaro, of Perry Township, graduated from Roncalli High School in 2012. He was a member of the Rebel Media Network, broadcasting football and basketball games. He would make youtube videos with his friends, calling it Baby Kangaroo Productions – the start of his interest in entertainment.

Mulinaro said that he didn't know much about UIndy's communications department or that it had a radio station until he enrolled during his sophomore year of college. He joined WICR and has been on the management staff for two years, beginning his role as operations manager this year. The station has four student-run shows.

"I wouldn't be nearly what I am today without UIndy," Mulinaro said. "They do a great job of immersing you into the fields, whether that be TV, radio or journalism right away, but they don't just throw you in the fire. So if you come out of high school and have no experience, they don't hold that against you. They hold your hand just long enough to teach you everything you need. It's a balance they've really mastered."

Mulinaro premiered the weekly *Late Night Indy* show on Sept. 11. The fifth show will air on Friday, Oct. 9 11 p.m. It can also be streamed online at WICRonline.org.

"I go after people that are local comedians at the university or around Indianapolis," Mulinaro said. "I want somewhere for them to promote themselves and have a platform as well. I just interviewed the president of the university today. They think it's cool because they've never done something like this. They appreciate it, too. It's a local platform for people to be able to come on, have some fun and get their name out there in Indianapolis. People have enjoyed it."

Mulinaro said while he's happy with the response so far, there's always room for improvement and he looks forward to continue to better the production. He said his long-term vision for *Late Night Indy* is to gain the interest of a local TV channel, maybe even have it air before a large show such as *The Tonight Show* or *Late Night with Jimmy Fallon*.

"You can have a vision but you have to hit those little milestones along the way," Mulinaro said. "I'm just trying to produce solid entertainment and shows for WICR and be a program people can follow on a nightly basis... At the end of the day, what my show is really about is making sure that there's people out there who maybe had a rough day at their job; they can sit down with *Late Night Indy* and get a kick out of it."

Meeting, Oct. 5

■ What happened? Ordinances 18 and 19 were approved on third reading. Ordinances 20, 22, 23, 24 and 25 were approved on second and third readings.

■ What it means: Ordinance 18 adjusts speed limits. Ordinance 19 states that addresses on public buildings must meet the set criteria.

Ordinance 20 would establish a street sign at 4th and Buffalo.

Ordinance 22 approves salary for appointed and elected officials. Full-time employees receive a two percent increase. Elected officials remain the same. It also establishes that parttime employees can earn up to \$13 per hour. Pension rates for retirees increase by two percent.

Ordinance 23 approves the appropriated budget for expenditures.

Ordinance 24 approves the appropriation of money to the parks board.

Ordinance 25 approves the budget for the Beech Grove Public Library.

■ What's next? These ordinances will go into effect 30 days after passing.

■ What happened? Ordinance 26 was approved on first reading. Resolution #8 was approved.

■ What it means: Ordinance 26 states the city's desire to adopt a storm water standards manual. This would allow Beech Grove to enforce standards that fit Beech Grove, so new construction wouldn't need to get approval from Indianapolis like they do currently. The manual establishes procedures for treatment of storm water and penalties for not adhering to the standards. Resolution 8 states that the city of Beech Grove objects to the tax adjustments board with any changes in its adopted tax levies. This resolution has been adopted in previous years. It ensures that if the State submits the incorrect tax information, it reverts back to what the council approved.

■ What's next? Ordinance 26 will go for second reading at the November council meeting.



GREENWOOD COMMON COUNCIL

Meeting, Oct. 5

■ What happened? Second Reading Ordinance 15-39, an ordinance of great discussion in the past few weeks, was discussed once more. Steve Rhoades, a local pastor at The Point Church, was at the meeting to speak against the ordinance. The council finally ruled voted no, ruling in favor with the pastor and all those against the ordinance.

■ What it means: Ordinance 15-39 was going to prohibit tax-exempt use of real estate within the district in the City of Greenwood, unless agreements for payments were put into place in lieu of the taxes. With the council voting against this, religious organizations and other nonprofit organization will receive tax exemption on real estate. All 50 States provide for tax exemptions for religious organizations so the City of Greenwood is now among those who favor it. The exemption isn't for special favor to the religious organizations, but for all nonprofit organizations that provide betterment for the community.

■ What's next? Nonprofit organizations, including religious, will be able to file tax exemptions next year on their real estate.





Fibrous Flax: Everyone evacuate

Sandi and I recently invited our meat and potato friends over for a dinner party. I enthusiastically prepared plant-based vegetarian entrees from my new cookbook release. The next day I got a courtesy call thanking us for the lovely dinner, but "What was in it?" I asked why, and he graphically elucidated, "This morning things came out of me I ate 10 years ago."

À fiberless, meat and potato, low veggie diet can loiter way too long in the colon, break down and decay in the warmth of your inner ecology. If you watch my weekly segment on WISH TV, then you know the fiber bell rings each time we say 'fiber'. Here's why.

Place a meal of meat and potatoes, veggie, dessert and salad inside a 98.6 air-tight container for 53 hours. The average time Mayo clinic says you needed for normal digestion and elimination. The food will be decomposing, rotting, toxic and foul-smelling. This is your innards on a meat and potato, low fiber diet. Hence, the sooner digested food leaves the colon, the better.

On the other hand, another friend took my advice and began sprinkling fibrous, ground flax seed on everything. He shared that as soon as he gets out of bed in the morning gravity happens and he has an expeditious moving experience. Not 15 straining, hemorrhoid-producing minutes. "I don't even have time to read the sports and comics," he blushed.

Motioned in Exodus 9 and Joshua 2, gluten-free flax seed flax also contains potassium and Omega-3 for heart and brain health. Flax's fiber and Omega-3 become available for your temple to profit from after grinding. Flax seed is a complete protein too. Sandi and I use a Krupp's-style, hand-held coffee grinder.

Flax is very durable and unleashes more nutritional benefits than whole seed. If seeds remain unbroken, they may pass undigested, reducing the nutritional benefit. Upon ingestion your system cannot break it down and when excreted and then planted, the seed would grow. Grind the seeds in small batches in the coffee grinder to unleash the power of Omega-3 and fiber.

Once ground, the seeds quickly lose their oomph, so process and store the ground seeds in an airtight container and store un-ground seeds in the freezer for up to 3 months to prevent rancidity. Now, stop loitering and get moving.

They even hope to have a couple of voting machines at the event for the students to get a feel for what it's like to cast a ballot. The students have produced short videos to promote the event.

As Hollywood continues to search for source material for their films, they have

once again turned to the written word. As a result and due to the mammoth success of the book, The Martian is one of fall's most anticipated films. The new movie, starring Matt Damon, hit theaters this past weekend.

The Martian, based on the best-selling book of the same name, is a science-fiction thriller. During the opening scenes we meet the members

of the NASA space crew as they explore the surface of Mars. Unfortunately, their stay on the new planet is cut short. An extremely intense storm forces the crew to grab their gear and high tail it back to their spacecraft. The only problem being one member of the team, Mark Watney, didn't make it back to the ship. once thought impossible. However, there is still one major obstacle that remains: communicating with those back home. From this point on, the film becomes a race against the clock in order to find the safest and most ef-


ficient way possible to bring Watney home alive.

Even though The Martian features an all-star cast, it's Matt Damon's show. A good majority of the film is simply Damon trying to find out a solution to a problem and him recording his thoughts on a camera.
