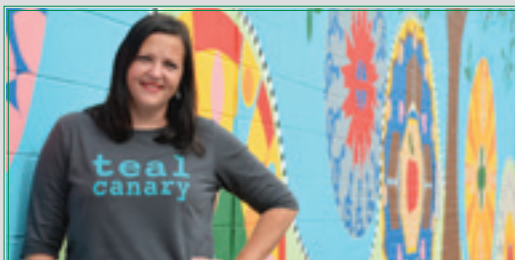

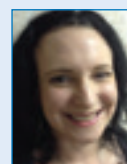

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# Ray Denson

White River Township firefighter

## BEHIND the BADGE

After nearly 13 years serving part time with the White River Township Fire Department, Ray Denson was hired full time as a firefighter in July. It's the only fire department he's ever served - and wants to serve, he says.

"The community is great," he said. "They support us and everything we do. The people that I work with, they love being firemen. They love taking care of people. We're all out here to achieve the same goal and that's serving the public. You really can't beat that."

Denson grew up on the Southside of Indianapolis, moving around the Southside before graduating from Center Grove High School. He was hired part time to WRTFD in 2003, and is also certified as an EMT. While working part time for WRTFD, he worked 11 years in the automotive industry and still owns a small landscaping company.

Here, learn more about Denson:

### What was your inspiration to become a firefighter?

Just out of high school, I went from job to job. I wanted to do something I felt good about at the end of the day. So 13 years ago, I filled out an application and here I am today. At the end of the day I get to go home feeling good about what I did, making a difference in the community and helping people.

### What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

It all boils down to being there for the community and being a public servant... Four years ago we went on a run and I assisted delivering a baby. I was the first person to hold the baby, next to the mother. That makes up for all of the bad things that happen. Sometimes things don't work out the way we want them to. When you can help bring in a life, it makes a difference.

### What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

Everybody looks up to firemen as heroes. Sometimes people forget we're human, too. We have feelings and emotions. The most challenging is not being that expectation. Sometimes we can't do it all. Having to explain to family members what's going on in a time of need and not being able to do more than we've already done, that's challenging for me.

### What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

I have a wife and three boys. We're a big hockey family. We spend a lot of time in the winter at the hockey rink. I coach my son's hockey team at Perry Park, the 10 and under. We own a boat, so in the summer time we're on the lake.

### What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

Professionally, I've been here 13 years. I've surrounded myself with a group of people who have helped me succeed, become successful and educate me. I'd like to think here in the future I can be that person to help educate people.

### What would you have done if you hadn't become a firefighter?

I can't see myself doing anything else. I hit the lottery when I got this job. It's the best job in the world. I worked in the automotive industry for awhile, so that may have been it.

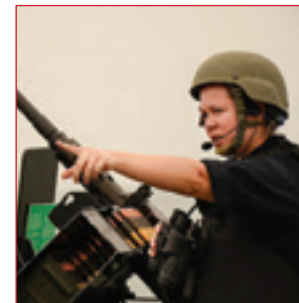

## Center Grove dedicates new bleachers, press box

Center Grove Community Schools dedicated its new bleachers and press box at the Center Grove High School (CGHS) Football Stadium at halftime of the varsity football home opener against Warren Central HS this Aug. 19. Center Grove honored Ray Skillman Automotive for the donation to pay for the cost of the new home and visitor bleachers and Mr. and Mrs. Ray and Ann Skillman for their personal donation to pay for the new press box at the stadium. The stadium's old bleachers, which were originally installed 40 years ago, were closed in February and torn down in March after two structural engineers reported they failed load tests and lacked structural integrity. The new bleachers are secure structures that increase the seating capacity of the home bleachers by 1,033 seats and of the visitor bleachers by 840 seats for a total seating capacity of 5,886.

## You might think I'm crazy, but....

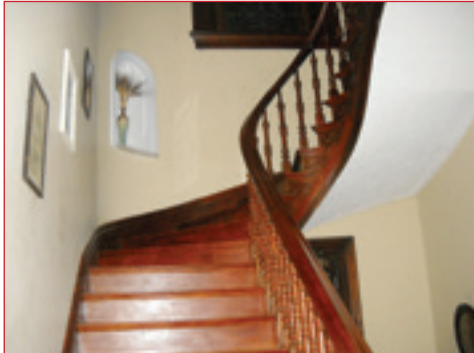
### HAUNTS & JAUNTS

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# Magic in the making

**Perry Township's  
Caleb Wiles aims to  
fool CW Network TV  
hosts in *Penn & Teller:  
Fool Us***

Magic offers an interaction with people and gives them a feeling that they don't get from anywhere else - a feeling of wonder and astonishment they might remember from their childhood.

That's what Perry Township resident Caleb Wiles said he enjoys about performing. Using regular objects such as playing cards, Rubik's cubes and currency, he aims to puzzle his audience with his tricks.

Having written two books, produced his own magic tricks and instructional DVDs, Wiles will now appear on the CW Network on Sept. 2, 9 p.m. on an episode of *Pen & Teller: Fool Us*. The show is hosted by American magician-comedian duo, Penn & Teller, who try to figure out how a trick is done. If they cannot, the magician wins a trip to Las Vegas to perform as the opening act in Penn & Teller's show at the Rio Hotel & Casino. The hour-long show features four or five performers on average.

"I was flattered by the fact that I was chosen," Wiles said. "It's a trick I created. I had to redesign aspects of it for the show, so the trick is customized for the show."

Wiles grew up in Indianapolis, moving to the Southside in seventh grade. He graduated from Perry Meridian High School, where he started gaining an interest in learning magic tricks.

"I saw an infomercial on television that promised to teach you magic tricks," he said. "I couldn't afford the VHS tapes back then. So, I went to the (Southport) library, read everything they had and ordered books from their sister branches. I devoured everything I could. I collect a lot of hobbies. Any hobby I get into, I dive deep into it. I sort of became obsessed."

The books encouraged readers to find local magicians to further their skills. Wiles found The International Brotherhood of Magicians and The Society of American Magicians, where he interacted with hobbyists and professionals.

"I learned there are conventions you can travel to and that's when it really took off," he said. "As I played around with that in college, I started doing shows at a restaurant, two or three times a week.... I started getting outside work and have kept that going."

Wiles earned a teaching and math degree from Franklin College. He taught at PMHS for three years.

"I didn't hate it, but I didn't love it as much as I thought I would," he said. "By that time, I did have corporate clients I would perform magic

for. I had that as a back up plan. I had started writing magic books and had some magic tricks I had put on the market."

Wiles remained in education, working on the assessment side of McGraw-Hill. He then worked in a similar role. He was recently hired to ETS (Educational Testing Service).

"I like having magic as my side job," Wiles said. "I would never want to do it full time. I never do anything I think won't be fun. I enjoy doing corporate events and private parties, for adults."

Wiles is now working on building a one-man show with a director in Bloomington, a new challenge for him.

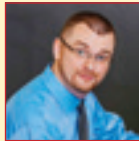

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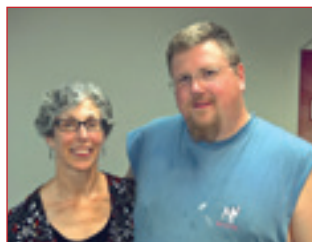

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# GIBBONS' GOODWILL

**Goodwill CEO Jim Gibbons says his family and Roncalli roots set the foundation for his lifelong success**

As CEO of Goodwill Industries International, Jim Gibbons says his life today is a role of service: leading the global organization which serves local communities by providing jobs, education opportunities and a hand up through difficult times.

Though he now resides in Virginia, the Perry Township native has never forgotten his roots, often returning to the Southside of Indianapolis to visit family and old friends.

"If I can relate my life and my Southside experience to my Goodwill experience, it's that my family, friends and the community I grew up with had high expectations of me and surrounded me with the tools, support and love for me to find my way to success," Gibbons said. "That's what Goodwill really stands for, is high expectations of a team member and people who serve and surrounding them with the tools and love to find them success in their journey."

Gibbons grew up on St. Jude Drive, a block away from Roncalli High School. The youngest of eight siblings, he attended St. Jude Catholic Church and School as a child before going to Roncalli. He was always active in sports, playing baseball at Edgewood Little League. In high school, he played football his freshman year, wrestled through his junior year, did track and field, shot put and was involved in school plays and musicals. By living so close, he said he was able to walk to every practice.

"It was a pretty brilliant move on my mom and dad's part to live so close to both schools," he said. "I have older kids now and remember those days of getting them everywhere."

Gibbons began losing his eyesight in third grade. He was completely blind by the half-way through his undergraduate program at Purdue University.

"It certainly had its obstacles but my classmates, teachers, parents, everybody was pretty awesome," he said. "As you lose your vision, you want to be treated 'normal' and people treated me pretty normally. They busted my chops when I needed my chops busted. They held me accountable when I needed to be held accountable. They offered support when I needed support."

Gibbons graduated from Roncalli in 1981.

"He got a standing ovation when he walked across the stage at our high school because he was an inspiration," said Bart Brown, Gibbons' classmate and friend since first grade. "He was always outgoing and positive. We always thought Jim would do something big. We thought it would be an engineer, an attorney, someone that worked in an office. Jim was always in plays and never shy about speaking. He just kept amazing us. He went to Harvard and got his MBA. It almost puts us to shame for not achieving more. When we get together, we don't talk about that. We just talk about growing up together and being friends. He's the same person."

Gibbons met his wife, Tami, while attending Purdue, where he graduated with a B.S. in industrial engineering. He then became the first blind person to graduate with a Master's in Business Administration from Harvard Graduate School. Before Goodwill, Gibbons was the president and CEO of Campus Wide Access Solutions, a subsidiary of AT&T and was later CEO of National Industries for the Blind. He became CEO of Goodwill in 2008.

"I joined Goodwill right at the start of the Great Recession," he said. "During the downturn of the economy, Goodwills get called to the needs of their communities. The social enterprise, or the thrift stores that people are familiar with, really continued to grow. ... That continued to fuel great programming and incremental opportunities throughout

the Great Recession. For me, it was an honor to be a part of an organization that was having such an impact through a tough time."

With his mother residing in Beech Grove, Gibbons returns to Indianapolis for family as well as work. This past spring, he attended Goodwill's national conference in Indianapolis.

"Goodwill of Central Indiana is really a role model organization," he said. "We're fortunate to host a lot of national meetings. They not only get the benefits of the conference but can see the Goodwills in Indianapolis. Kent Kramer is the CEO here; I'm really excited about his vision and the work he's doing."

When he looks back at his hometown, Gibbons said can't forget the time with good friends, a great community and incredible teachers.

"I think the foundation that my parents gave me in terms of a Catholic education,

especially the Roncalli experience, has been critical to my life, both from a faith perspective and from always striving to overcome obstacles perspective," Gibbons said. "It was not only a strong academic and educational foundation but a set of values to fall back on and a faith to rely on - all of which as your journey through life get challenged and all of which those foundations play a key role in whether you fall down and get back up again, stumble or get lifted up. 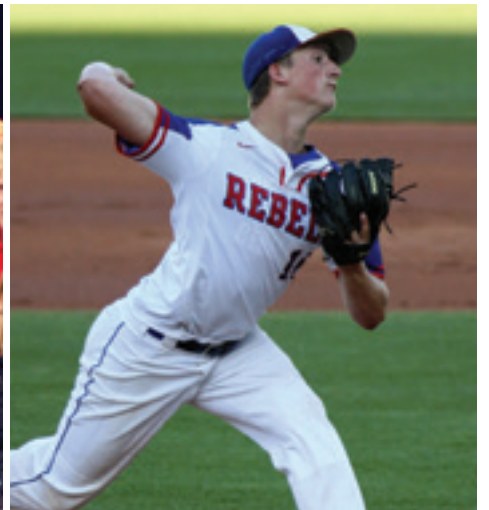

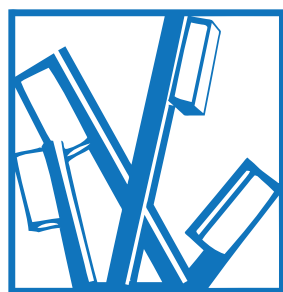


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## Start strong to end strong

Why do I love the start of a new school year? It is the promise of new opportunities and personal growth when one starts strong on the very first days of school.

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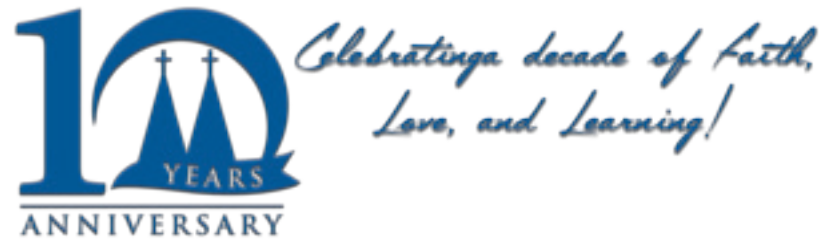

# Growing gains

## Saints Francis & Clare Catholic School celebrates 10 years of tremendous growth

When her first son was preparing to enter first grade, Lorianne Meek said that because she wasn't going to be with him all day, she wanted him to be in a school where he could have God in his life while receiving an education.

Lorianne's son, Bryson, was one of the first 34 children to attend Saints Francis & Clare (SSFC) Catholic School when it began in 2006. The school ministry began with two classes: kindergarten and first grade.

"We've had tremendous growth in both the student and staff population," said Rebecca Stone, vice principal and parent. "I love to see the growth in our kids: faith, academic growth and social growth. Our first graduating eighth graders are now freshman in college. It's exciting to see the fruits of our labors and see how it's all turning out."

SSFC celebrated the school's 10th anniversary during Mass on Aug. 14. The school which now has more than 560 students serves infants through eighth grade.

"The changes have been wonderful. I have to be honest to say that starting a new school, there were a lot of growing pains," Lorianne said. "The first year there were a lot

of new teachers. I'm a teacher by trade so I know it takes a few years to get good. When Mrs. Popp (the principal) came, she made sure the teachers were trained. We had a lot of seasoned teachers and expert teachers."

The priests have held a weekly all-school Mass since the ministry began.

"When they first started, Father Vince would have all of the students come up and sit around the altar when he did his homily," Lorianne said. "He did that for two years until it got to be too much of a distraction. They stay in their seats now. Those were special times when they were up on the altar with him, him sharing about the gospel with them and sharing God's word with them, right there, personal. It was so one-on-one."

As the size of the school population grew, SSFC leadership saw a need for the school ministry to expand. The Early Childhood Learning Center opened in September 2015, a facility for Pre-K and kindergarten students.

"Last year we added infants, so we're serving infants through eighth grade," Stone said. "It's that family atmosphere of pairing older students with younger students that we hope to continue this year. It's amazing to see what

the school has done in just 10 years."

The school has three main events through the year: an adult trivia night in the fall, a chili supper in the winter and a 5k fun run in the spring. The events not only raise funds for the school, but offer fun and fellowship for the church congregation, Stone said.

Lorianne, who serves on the school commission, now has her first two children, Bryson and Garrett, at Roncalli High School and her other two children, Kaden and Ella, attending SSFC.

"It makes me sad because I have two that are gone already," Lorianne said. "Next year I will have three at Roncalli. I can't imagine having more of my kids away from here. It's where we spend our time. It's hard to leave once you're here because you're still part of the family. I'm emotionally tied to this place. It will always be home to us."

Stone said the school's mission statement is the driving force of everything they do: "... Our Catholic identity and academic excellence are the core of our 21st Century curriculum that prepares our students to be leaders and innovators in a global society." She said students and staff put their faith into action locally and globally throughout

the year, taking pride in offering academic excellence to students while maintaining their Catholic identity.

"It's the reason I sent them there in the first place," Lorianne said. "I still think it was an important enough choice to send them there to have God as the center of their day. It isn't a just class on religion. It's the basis of everything. Especially when you're raising children, God needs to be the focus and SSFC meets those needs."

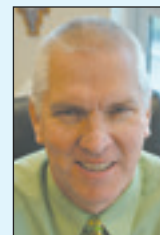

So often in modern society, people get to be in such a hurry. By taking the time to ensure Teal Canary is clean, organized and dedicated to its customers, owner Amy Hommell said she hopes everyone who walks into the art studio has a positive experience.

"Teal Canary is a representation of purposeful time," she said. "Paint your life. Be purposeful and intentional with what you're doing."

Teal Canary opened in Greenwood on Nov. 3, 2013, offering private and group lessons in a variety of art mediums.

"It was busy the minute I opened the door," Hommell said. "It has always been consistently busy so now I am adding visiting artists to classes I can't be at. There's such a demand. We're still doing the same things, just more of it. The classes are the same, just more of them. If you have someone in your life that is struggling and needs a creative outlet, we are your resource."

Hommell was born in Illinois, moving to Plainfield, Ind., in the 80s. She graduated from Plainfield High School, then Indiana State University in 1997. She married to her husband, Phil in 2000. The couple has three children, Luke, Lily and Benjamin.

Having painted since she was 6 years old, Hommell said she wants her shop to represent her as an artist. Teal Canary is her art

studio, as well as the location for art classes.

"Some of the best advice I can give is to be you," she said. "Don't do what other people are doing. Keep your specific look and feel. I'm a type A personality. It's really important to me that all my materials are clean and things like that because we're looking at consumers that aren't artists every day. It will hopefully help me in the long run. We're targeting a market of people that need to feel comfortable. If someone is struggling, I want that person to know that I'm not going to pack up and leave. I'm not leaving until you feel good. That's huge for customer service."

Hommell said owning Teal Canary is not about making money or beating the competition.

"The main reason I have this place is to have a home as an artist," she said. "The income I receive from these classes, I get to choose to pour into my community. I do work with CYO (Catholic Youth Organization), Damar and an Explorer's Program at Northeast Elementary. I get to be a little profitable, but I also get to give."

As an artist, Hommell was recently chosen as the winner of the Johnson County Community Foundation's Color the County mural program. She designed and painted the mural at 189 W. Main St., Greenwood. The theme of the mural was supposed to reflect "connecting communities to causes that matter." Hommell's design depicts a tree and beside it, six circles with images which

represent the fields of interest of JCCF.

"The visuals became what we give our money to," Hommell said. "We're giving it to kids to go to college, educators, education foundations, free concerts and things. We're bringing color downtown. Each color has a specific reason I chose it, a representation of what brings me joy and what I think brings other people joy. The black and white checkers is what brings it all together. The last element was the finish line."

The mural was painted in August. Hommell put the \$1,000 prize money to philanthropic use. She had previously traveled to Nicaragua to teach art with children, many who had never held a paint brush. She used her prize money toward a second trip to Nicaragua in late August, volunteering with a women's conference and teaching art to the pastors' wives there.

Teal Canary, a member of the Greater Greenwood Chamber of Commerce, will celebrate its third anniversary in November. While the business has grown, Hommell said she doesn't want it to grow too fast.

"I want to balance family and work," she said. "I'm by appointment only. This gives me flexibility to be a mom, a wife and have a family but fulfill a dream. This is a dream come true for me."

## Google watches viewers

The other day I turned on the TV and watched a 1950s rerun with George Burns and Gracie. The 50's were an amazing time when the older generation of audiences was still somewhat amazed by the concept that pictures could actually move. Everyone was fascinated by having a radio contraption that included moving pictures.

On screen advertising was so primitive. Network television had the main program's actors on stage-shifting housewife mode to deliver QVC infomercial style pitches for refrigerators, soap, and snake oil elixirs. It cheapened the program and weakened the believability of the pitch.

The advent of online video brought about a similar phenomenon adapted to modern day attention spans.

These days I'm working on video. I upgraded my computer a couple weeks ago with the intent of putting my digital marketing efforts into techniques that make the greatest impact. You know those really short videos clips that are so common on social media, with catchy images and meme-style text overlaid so you don't need to have the volume turned up? Well, that's what I'm getting into. It's the

quickest way to show the value of your offer before the impatient reader scrolls down to the next post in the feed.

Producing video is much more complicated and costly than writing text. That means it needs a higher investment from the advertiser, but the return on the investment is what matter. Right now, video is where it's at, and here's how the investment yields compound returns: Increases visitor's time on page; Gives something to click on so they don't "bounce" out; Increases conversions and Google rankings.

Everybody wants the visible spots in the results. Google tends to rank search results based upon user engagement. I have observed that the search results sometimes get shuffled. That tests visitor engagement. To be prepared for that "first impression" I'm making sure my sites deliver video to cast that impression.

*Laura McPhee gives new life to antiques through Pen and Pink Vintage in Garfield Park*

When a book is ripped or the spine is broken, many owners throw it in the garbage, not to be thought about again. Laura McPhee found a way to bring new life to vintage paper materials through her business, Pen and Pink.

"I've always done art on the side," she said. "I love paper, so I have done a lot of collages and journals... The catalyst, I was at Goodwill about three years ago looking at old records. I thought there had to be something you can do with old album covers. The artwork is so great. We don't see that anymore. The album cover was as important as the album back in the day."

McPhee is originally from the Southside of Indianapolis, graduating from Perry Meridian High School. She's enjoyed traveling around the world since then. She taught at IUPUI, then worked at Nuvo. She returned to Indianapolis, the Garfield Park area, three years ago to be closer to her two children, Ian and Samantha.

McPhee began creating notebooks, bookmarks and other items out of the artwork from antique books and records three years ago. She binds the notebooks together, using the art as the cover, with a label inside telling where that art came from.

"All of the books are one of a kind," she said. "Each book has its own history. For example, all of this sheet music came from this woman who was 80 and it came from her mother who lived to be 100. She was from Indianapolis. I pieced together this music history of the people who made the product... The way I cut (the paper) or glue them, it's meant to do tell that story. People can take those notebooks and create whatever they want, but I'm still telling a story."

McPhee opened Pen and Pink on July 1, selling her handmade products as well as vintage books and artwork. She said response has been wonderful, with many neighbors stopping by to welcome her to the area.

"I think (the notebooks are) beautiful," she said. "I love them. I think they're quirky and funny, too. When other people respond to them in that way, it's nice. It's been a pleasant surprise."

I have been making handmade books about there years and selling them at art shows, vintage fairs and other shops. This was a way for me to have studio space and sales room. When this space became available, it was easy for me to say yes to be a part of that change.

#### What did you do to prepare for opening your business?

I have had a business plan for a shop like this for at least 10 years. I was looking for the perfect space. I took a couple of courses on how to run your own business. I did it as a home-based business first for about two years. I was selling at other places. All of that gave me a good preparation for how people react to my books, what they like, what they don't like.

## Don't Breathe... well-crafted, gripping horror, suspense film

There are just some things in life that just don't go together, no matter how much you may try. For instance, Kanye West and humility, Hillary Clinton and electronic communication, and the Indianapolis Colts and blocking for Andrew Luck, all sound like great combinations, but in reality just don't work out for anyone involved. Another combo usually leading to disastrous results is an August release date and horror films. *Don't Breathe* opened in theaters last week-end.

*Don't Breathe* is a new horror, suspense/thriller that tells the story of three teenage thieves. The three hoodlums' specialty is breaking into houses, stealing expensive merchandise and then pocketing the profits after selling to other morally questionable individuals. While planning their next target, they learn about a house to be a sure, easy thing, right?

One of them hears about a decrepit, old house where an older gentleman lives alone with hundreds of thousands of dollars just ripe for the plucking. If the man's advanced age and living situation aren't enough convincing for the teen's evil enterprise to proceed, the occupant of the residence is also blind. However, as the three mischievous adolescents find out, the man is more than ca-

pable of protecting himself. They soon find themselves fighting for their lives.

*Don't Breathe* is a film with a story that is much, much darker than the trailers and commercials portray. The story is also equipped with a number of twists and turns that are unexpected but aren't wholly unbelievable and completely out of left field. Just when you think you have a character's motive figured out, the story takes a completely different and usually, darker direction.

In addition to the strong writing on display, *Don't Breathe* is also well directed. There is never a noticeable lull in the film, not a wasted scene or any other extemporaneous moment in the film. Everything that appears on camera is crucial to telling the story. And once the action gets underway, the film never loosens its grip on you, not even for a moment.

*Don't Breathe* is easily the biggest surprise of 2016. Given its genre and the time of year of its release, it more than entertains. It's a well-crafted horror/suspense/thriller that keeps you on the edge of your seat for the entire 90 minutes. A 3.5 out of 5.

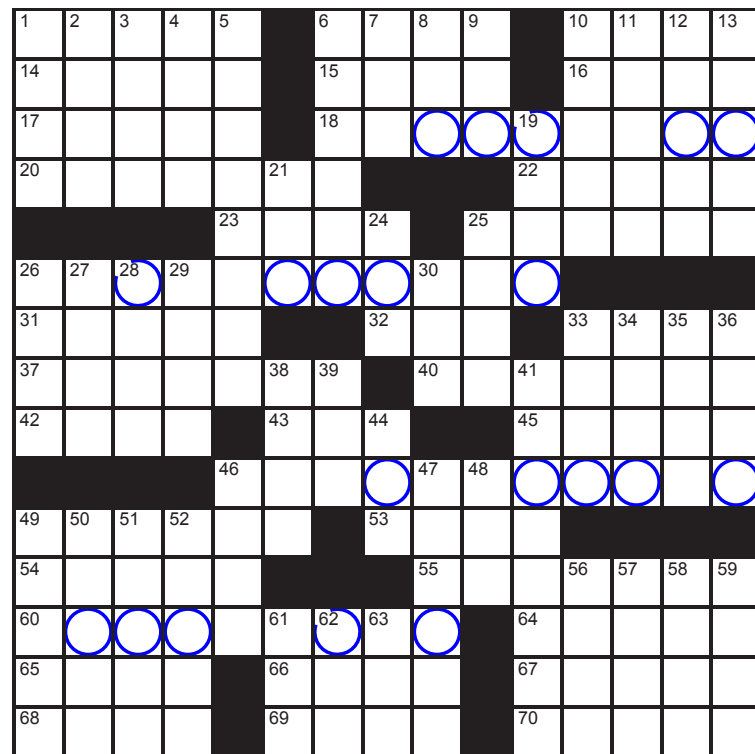

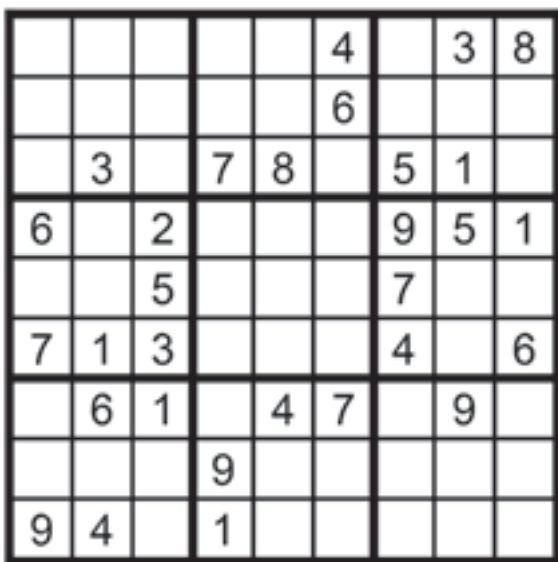

# Dietary stewardship

## NUTRITION

We were created in God's image. If you believe in a God that creates life, gives it a miserable existence and then destroys it, then perhaps you're worshipping the wrong god. Everything we need is on and in earth, ready to harvest and eat. But no; man in false hubris, naively thinks he can improve on God's perfect creations.

There's a fire down below. Just like inhaling invisible, odorless poison gas, inflammation surreptitiously reduces your odds of living a long, disease-free life. Mayo says Chronic Inflammation, linked to about 80 percent of modern man's casseroles of chronic disease, is nature's way of telling you something's wrong my sweet, loveable friends. Inflammation is the temple's first defense against infection, but when it goes haywire due to alien attack; it can lead to a flaming world of preventable misery.

Your sacred temple speaks the language of source. Man and earth were created from the same chemical and mineral elements formed at the heart of a star. When consumed, nearly everything outside of nature is perceived as an irritant, alien invader; unable to be understood in the holy temple's language of biochemistry. Air pollution, tobacco smoke, alcohol, junk food, Excessive vegetable oils (Omega-6) and manmade chemicals were not intended to be ingested and have potential to produce chronic inflammatory disease.

Anti-inflammatory foods include organic whole grains, beets, green leafy vegetables; onions and garlic, turmeric and fresh ginger; wild salmon, sardines, chia, flaxseed, Brazil nuts, and walnuts with their rich content of omega-3s.

*"Our body is a temple because we are made in God's image and likeness. So glorify God in your body." ~ 1 Corinthians 6:19-20.*



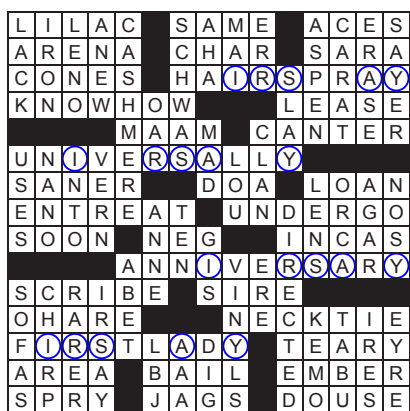

## Weekly Devotion

"Now there was a day when the sons of God came to present themselves before the Lord, and Satan came also among them." ~ Job 1:6

There was a day when the sons of God came to present themselves before the Lord, and Satan came also among them. This is likely one of the most difficult passages in the Bible. It presents us with a dilemma that many and a variety of theologians have wrestled with for centuries. We are discussing Job. That is the context. So, what does this event have to do with him? If we are not careful we will arrive at the false conclusion that God and Satan are playing games with our lives and that we are mere pawns on their spiritual chess board. This is, of course, not the case.



Let's investigate that term "sons of God" a little bit. This term is first found in Genesis the sixth chapter. It is in reference to those who had not yet apostated or had not fallen away from the Lord. In this same chapter we read about the "daughters of men" which refers to the daughters of those who had transgressed against God. In other words the saints began to marry the sinners and this created a generation of evil men and women on the earth who did not fear God and who did as they pleased.

Paul tells us that those that are led by the Spirit of the Lord, these are the sons of God. John 1:11-13 explains how we become one of God's sons: "11 He came unto His own, and His own received him not. 12 But as many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on His name: 13 Which were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God."

This makes the term "sons of God" a relational thing. We become sons of God by the redemptive power of the Son of God. Even Job was a son of God by the power of the blood of Jesus Christ and his faith in God's desire to save him by the blood. Praise the Lord.
