A funny thing happened during evidence review for a completed paranormal investigation. Playback of an audio recorder revealed my voice speaking—only it wasn't me!

Spiritual mimicry is not an unusual occurrence in the career of a paranormal investigator. Feelings on the subject are mixed, as are most paranormal topics. Another term for spirit mimics is Elementals. They can develop the ability to mimic voices, smells, and even visual manifestations. Just how many reports are out there when the voice of someone close has called their name and that someone is not even in the home? Or, catching a fleeting glimpse of a familiar person who is not physically there? We're not talking about departed souls here, but rather those who are very much still alive and having some sort of relationship with the witness.

Author Brad Steiger writes: "There is a shadow world that exists all around us, and when it impinges upon our ordinary plane of shared reality this dark dimension is sometimes frightening, but always worthy of cautious exploration."

2016 Beech Grove budget looks promising

At a special City Council meeting held on Monday, Sept. 14, the 2016 budget was introduced on first reading. The Police Chief, Fire Chief and Public Works Director enlightened the Council with an overview of their respective departments. Much has improved since we began in January of 2012. We still have a long way to go in our effort to provide the best services around.

As part of the budget presentation, the City Council relied on the City's financial consultant for comments on the state of our financial condition. The proposed budget must be balanced and revenue's are in place to adequately fund it.

In both cases, the 2016 budget will be balanced and is fully funded and then some. I think the most telling part of our financial consultant's presentation is the fact that the "assessed valuation" or net worth of our city has grown by 10.71 percent in 2015. What this means is that your property is worth more!

Another major point that needs to be delivered is that the 2015 tax rate for the City of Beech Grove dropped from 2014. In 2014,

the civil city tax rate was 1.4789 and the tax rate for 2015 is 1.4138. We have held the line on civil city taxes yet continue to invest in our city.

The proposed 2016 budget is expected to increase by over \$850,000.00 and our financial consultant advised us that the tax rate will remain close to the 2015 rate or may even come in reduced again. This is due to continued growth in our city.

Good news for our city government and excellent news for the residents and the people who conduct business in our city.

Highlights of the 2016 budget include a 2 percent raise for full time employees, an additional police officer and firefighter, added pick up trucks for DPW, three new police cars, \$1.00 per hour increase for part time employees, part time employees in the lobby of the police station from 4 p.m. to midnight every day, and a \$92,000.00 increase in the paving budget. It keeps getting better and better.

Pumpkin spice and everything nice

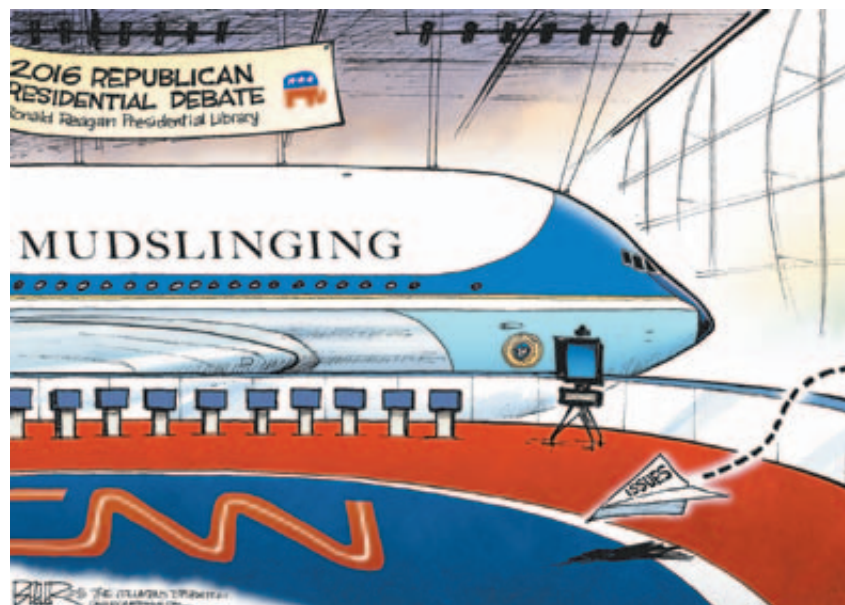

Michael Sutton said what he enjoys most about working as a paramedic for the White River Township Fire Department are the dynamics of the township and the department, such as the team effort to make the community a better place. He said White River Township has a good mix of residential, family housing and businesses along State Road 135, which means they encounter a large variety of calls.

"I can't imagine doing anything else," Sutton said. "There's not a day goes by that we don't do something new. It's the people that I work with that really put the fun in what we do. Every three days we are with the same group of guys for 24 hours. It's kind of like our second family."

Sutton grew up in Southern Indiana and went to college at Indiana University – Bloomington where he majored in telecommunications. He left Indiana for a semester to attend film school in San Francisco, and took his first EMT class when he moved back to Bloomington. He was hired to WRTFD in 2010.

Sutton also works part-time for Community Hospital South in the Emergency Room. He continues to reside in Bloomington with his sons, Aiden, 5, and Dawson, 3.

He said he looks forward to his continued service with WRTFD, and "seeing what the future holds as far as medicine goes on the ambulance."

What was your inspiration to become a paramedic?

I've always had a desire to help people, from early on. I took my first EMT class right after I got out of college and just kept going from there.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

Going on a run like we had this morning, being able to help someone who is in a lot of pain due to things beyond their control and just make their day better.

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Some smiling is required

Jack Pain aims to bring the kid out in everyone as he chairs the Saints Francis & Clare Fall Festival

Everyone should come to the Saints Francis & Clare Fall Festival on Sept. 25 and 26 expecting to have a good time. Two days are filled with live music, kids games, teen games, a Monte Carlo, Art After Dark, food, drinks, silent auction and \$10,000 raffle – and festival chairman Jack Pain says everyone is encouraged to act like a child for at least a little while.

“The festival is 19 hours of pure fun,” Pain says. “This festival allows us to invite everyone in to share some laughs, try to bring the kid out of everyone. Even 60 years old and up, we all turn into high school kids, doing silly things out there. When you walk through all that and everyone’s having a ball, it’s just really great to see. That’s the reason I do it. It’s some of the best fellowship I can do. In the end, we hope you have fun and people can say those Catholics aren’t so bad.”

Pain, who was born in Marion, Ind., lived in Arizona for many years, graduating from Arizona State University in ’79. He moved to Greenwood in 2000, from Carmel. He says he chose the Center Grove area because of the 5-star school system. He and his wife, Maryanne, have five children. The family joined Saints Francis & Clare Catholic Church and where Pain began serving as a youth minister and has helped with the festival since its inception. He says he loved be-

ing on the committee, being the “jack of all trades” during the festival and fixing things as they broke. Last year he was approached six times, being asked to chair the festival and working with the 12-person committee. He finally said yes, and says he had no idea how much there was to do.

Last year, the festival had more than 700 volunteers in the two-day period, with an estimated 11,000 guests. It is the church’s only fundraiser, with proceeds benefitting its ministries.

“If someone had told me we’d be this size 10 years ago, I’d say no, we’re going to grow a little slower than that,” Pain says. “It’s just a great thing. It shows me about this community is it’s a caring community.”

This year’s festival is Sept. 25, 5 p.m. to midnight and Sept. 26, noon to midnight. Friday’s events include live music by So They Say and Sax Guy, a Monte Carlo from 6 p.m. – midnight, Art After Dark from 5 to 9 p.m. and a Fish Fry from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. Saturday includes live music by Greenwood Community Band, Sand Dragons and Seldom Surreal, Art After Dark from noon to 9 p.m., and a Fried Chicken Dinner from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Both days include a silent auction, 50/50 drawings, raffle tickets, kid’s games, teen games, dunk tank, a petting zoo, food, drinks, beer, wine and more. Wabash Valley Rides will provide amusement rides. Pain

says they also have the best elephant ears around – the same ones served at the Indiana State Fair. Pain says the festival is geared toward families, so they have tried to keep the costs low so that everyone can come out and have a good time on a small budget.

“If I can get all of the people to come to the festival and have a good time, I feel like I’ve won; I do my happy dance,” Pain says.

Pain owned a business making dry ice for 17 states and sold it a couple of years ago. Since then he’s concentrated on reaching out and helping in his community. He helps with the Center Grove lacrosse team, Banta football league and Fellowship of Christian Athletes which will have 90 kids gathering together at 6:45 in the morning.

“I’m known for teaching out of the box, being an out of the box kind of guy, but I don’t think it’s that out of the box,” Pain says. “I think it’s letting the kid come out. People get so caught up in the daily grind, they forget about all of the fun they should be having.”

Most of Pain’s volunteer work centers on leading and guiding children, and he says working with them is so much fun because they don’t perceive things in the same way adults do.

“I want to set the example for the kids today,” Pain says. “I’m still a dad, I still have to do these other things, but when you stop to help people, you feel better in the heart and soul. I feel it’s my job to bring the joy out. Set the best example you can and anyone around you will have a great time.”

Getting to know Jack...

- I love animals. I have a Saint Bernard. She and I are always together. I think half of the people in Greenwood know me because of that big Saint Bernard’s head peeking out of the side of my truck.
- I love hiking, camping, boating. I have a place in Kentucky we go to on Del Hollow Lake. I’ll teach people how to ski. You’ll find me outdoors more than you’ll find me indoors.
- Everything I do tends to be orientated towards kids time-wise. I love the sports that we have down here – middle school, high school, the Banta leagues.
- I’m a heck of a Girl Scout leader. My daughter was in girl scouts and they have this group called the Tagalongs, which are boys. My nephew was in the group. At the time, they had all these kids doing girl stuff. So I said I’ll volunteer to take care of the tags. I’ve been doing it 11, 12 years now. We just have a ball. This year I had 20 kids. We made boats out of plastic bottles, caught crawdads.

SOUTHPORT CITY COUNCIL

Meeting, Sept. 21

■ **What happened?** Ordinance 15.08.03 was approved. Ordinance 15.09.01 was approved on both first and second readings.

■ **What it means:** Ordinance 15.08.03 establishes "no parking" for two streets in Southport: on the Northside of Lotus Lane from Marywood Drive to Partridge Road and on either side of Walnut Street from Anniston Drive to Stop 10 Road to give school buses and emergency vehicles full unrestricted access.

Ordinance 15.09.01 states Southport's intent to elect to withdraw from the Marion County Storm Water Management District to establish the City of Southport Storm Water management District. Currently, the city pays storm water management fees to Marion County. Excluded cities can withdraw from the district and adopt their own district. Residences will receive a notice 30 days prior to the change. The ordinance will take effect 60 days after passage. Funds will come to Southport and can only be used for storm water projects. "Bottom line here folks is this will make Southport more self-sufficient," said Southport Mayor Jesse Testruth.

■ **What's next?** A special meeting will be held Oct. 28, 7 p.m. to discuss the plan deriving from Ordinance 15.09.01.

• Southport Police Chief Thomas Vaughn said recent threats to local law enforcement agencies, including Southport and IMPD, has created a need to double up on officers in the

police cars.

• Chief Vaughn also announced that Point of Hope Apostolic Church donated \$1,200 toward the purchase of bulletproof vests for the officers. The Lions Club of Southport Inc. will hold a spaghetti dinner on Oct. 3, 4 – 8 p.m. at the Community Center with proceeds to go to body cameras for the department.

■ **What happened?** First reading ordinances 15-48 through 15-54, 15-56 and 15-10 were all passed 9. Ordinance 15-61 was voted on on immediately, as well as ordinance 15-62. New business ordinances 15-55, 15-60, 15-63 and 15-12 were initially discussed. Focus was on ordinance 15-63.

■ **What it means:** Ordinance 15-63 is in reference to the fire bond ordinance, which is currently on the books but is due to roll off soon. This ordinance is reutilizing the tax rate that is currently applied to the bond by issuing new money that is already under the debt. The new money is needed for replacement of two pieces of equipment in particular, an engine and rescue, that are three years past due for their intended usage.

■ **What's next?** Ordinance 15-63 will be discussed in the next council meeting on October 5, 2015, along with ordinances 15-55, 15-60 and 15-12.

Pumpkins also are necessary for good eyesight due to their content of lutein and zeaxanthin that can help prevent age-related macular disease. Pumpkin nutrition can help control cholesterol and digestion, protects against cancer of the lung and oral cavities, and maintains skin and mucus membranes. Use small one to two-pound "pie pumpkins" in a savory appetizer, raw in a smoothie, added to soup, mashed with honey and cinnamon to accompany entrées, or a dessert other than loveless sugary assembly line pie, industrial versions seasoned with health diminishing chemical preservatives. Cut them in half and roast them for 20 minutes at 350 degrees. The skin pulls off effortlessly.

Are you beginning to see how your wacky fears of what should be as natural as breathing are the genesis of disease? I honestly hope so. Our survival and ultimate happiness depends on you placing processed, dead food-like substances in context with today's proliferation of chronic disease before it is too late. God's food is perfect medicine. What's at the end of your fork?

CarDon and Community Hospital

"In the crowded and competitive world of extended care facilities, we have been very blessed to work with an outstanding partner like CarDon," said Kevin Neese, M.D., M.B.A. "They have made what is a highly-regulated environment an easy transition for our group of hospitalists."

Dr. Neese is part of Post-Acute Care Specialists, LLC, (PACS), a group of hospitalists offering integrated and longitudinal health-care solutions for the medical complexities of today's patients. He is the director of the hospitalist program at Community Hospital South — he is also the medical director overseeing all hospitalists at the four southside CarDon communities partnering with Community Hospital South on an expansive hospitalist program.

CarDon & Associates Director of Business Development Jill Rusk has dialogue with the hospitalists from Community South as much as she does with the staff at the CarDon communities — and she said that's how it needs to be.

"As cliché as it might seem, there is a communication breakdown in the healthcare system as it is today," she said. "We look at ourselves as separate entities, but care doesn't end for patients when they leave the hospital or a senior living community. At CarDon, we want to be a community resource to care for people, and with this hospitalist program we are now able to treat patients in place here."

Often, when patients make the transition out of the hospital setting, they don't see a doctor or have any kind of management of their care services in a post-acute care facility. With CarDon, they do.

"Jill has been a listening pole and rudder, guiding our group to make the CarDon facilities 'mini' medical and surgical units for the transition of our complicated and seriously ill patients from Community South Hospital," Dr. Neese said.

"We have a very positive, long-standing relationship with Community Hospital," Rusk said. "They are so forward thinking and share our commitment to do something different and take care of the people in our community. Our cultures go together, and when you have like-minded groups of people working

together, you can get a lot more movement and have a lot more success."

And success there has been indeed. With the first two CarDon communities involved in this program, University Heights and Aspen Trace, the readmission rates of patients returning to the hospital have been down and are considerably lower than the state average.

"This program has drastically reduced patient readmission rates back to the hospital or into the emergency room for a condition that may have changed or gotten worse," Rusk said. "We are now able to treat them in their CarDon community instead of sending them back to the hospital — and they are therefore able to recover more quickly."

With the program's success, it's being considered in partnership with other CarDon communities and Community Hospital locations around the area. It definitely has the attention of the Community Hospital system as a way to do things better.

"There is a lot of fragmentation from one healthcare facility to the next," Rusk said. "This creates redundancy with patient care and gaps in how we treat them. With this program, we are working together to keep better track of everything we do with the

patients and developing a union between acute care at the hospital and post-acute care at our CarDon communities. That way the patient doesn't experience that gap in care and makes a fluid transition from one location to the next."

"After all is said and done, all of this hard work is really for the patients and their families," Dr. Neese said. "The vision of the CarDon owners and CFO has helped make this work. On separate occasions, after we have reflected on our success, the owners have asked me, 'Are the patients getting better care?' That sounding principle has made this worthwhile for me and one that makes me look forward to a long and lasting relationship."

"I'm thoroughly impressed with the Community Hospital approach, care doesn't stop where the payment stops," Rusk said. "I've wanted something like this to happen for so long — and my hope is it can continue to grow and serve even more people in the future."

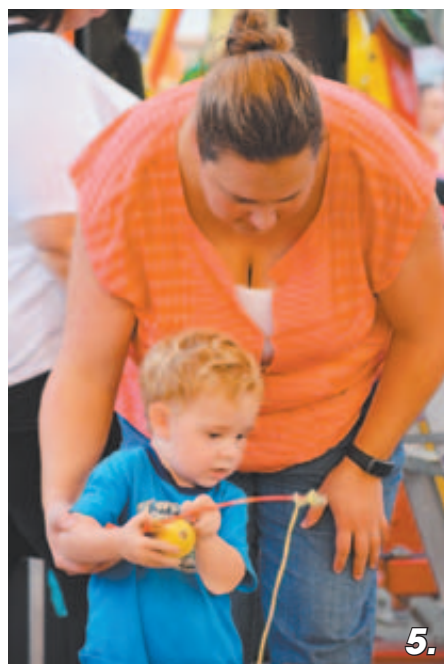

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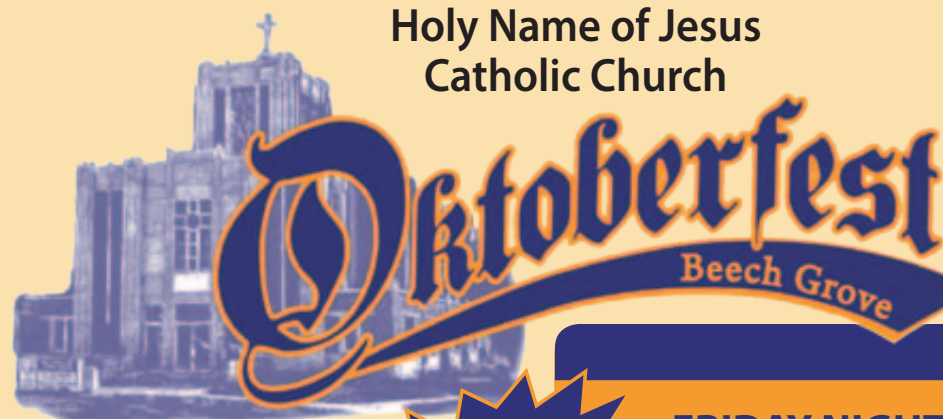

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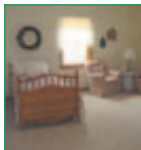

Using 'alright'

Look at the history of "alright." Our friend Merriam-Webster says it's been around for a while. Dating its first known use to 1887, Webster says, "The one-word spelling alright appeared some 75 years after all right itself had reappeared from a 400-year-long absence. Since the early 20th century some critics have insisted alright is wrong, but it has its defenders and its users." Webster goes on to say that, despite its detractors, "alright" is frequently used in journalistic and fictional writing (Note here: AP style says never to use "alright").

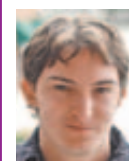
How about the Oxford English Dictionary? You might be surprised to find the esteemed publication is even more lenient toward "alright." The dictionary notes that, "Similar 'merged' words such as altogether and already have been accepted in Standard English for a very long time, so there is no logical reason to object to the one-word form alright."

That's an interesting argument – though one might counter it by pointing out that "all ready" and "already" have two distinct meanings. Can the same be said for "all right" and "alright?"

"All ready" means exactly what you would expect: wholly equipped or prepared. "Already," on the other hand, is an adverb which signifies an action occurred "by or before a stated or implied time."

Now, do "all right" and "alright" have distinct meanings? Based upon examples I've found, and my own sense of how I would use it colloquially, I would have to say no. "All right" seems to be used in a literal sense – everything is completely fine – and "alright" seems to have developed as the more figurative form – everything is OK, but not great.

I'll finish today by saying I'm partial to "alright" when used colloquially. I think American speakers intuitively understand the difference between something being "all right" and being just "alright." That being said, I'm not sure "alright" passes muster to be used in formal writing... which is too bad, because it's really an all right word.

Black Mass... Depp is creepy good

As we start the fall season, the level of film quality should begin to increase steadily. While August was not as bad as years past, it did manage to provide us with the box office bomb *We Are Your Friends*. Fortunately, between now and the end of the year, Hollywood will start releasing movies that could receive attention just in time for award season. One of the films that could be in contention for a number of awards is Johnny Depp's latest project, *Black Mass*.

Black Mass is the story of the infamous criminal, James "Whitey" Bulger (Depp). Born and raised in south Boston, Bulger grew to become one of FBI's most wanted criminals, but not before becoming an FBI informant. Thanks to the pleading of a childhood friend, John Connolly, who worked with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Bulger agreed to cooperate with the governmental organization.

However, Bulger and his crime syndicate, the Winter Hill Gang, continued and increased their reign of terror. Bulger and his associates were involved in drugs, racketeering, gunrunning and even murder. Even with the state's most powerful politician as a brother and several FBI officials essentially in his pocket, Bulger's world soon comes crashing down around him.

Likely, anyone's first question about *Black*

Mass is going to be centered around the performance of Depp, so that's where I'll start my critique. After quite a few less than stellar films, this is just what Depp needed. His performance is so disturbingly good that for most of the film, you'll forget it's Depp behind the bald cap and blue contacts. His cold, bone-chilling demeanor mixed with frequent violent outbursts, makes this his best work in quite some time.

After getting past the spot-on performance of its star, that's where *Black Mass* begins to run in to problems. Bulger's story is really no different than any other gangster biopic. The only truly dif-

ferentiating aspect was the involvement of FBI officials, but anytime the film attempted to shine a light on that part of the story meant less time watching Depp do his thing.

After some really embarrassing and odd choices, *Black Mass* is just what the doctor ordered for Depp. His work here is more than likely to win him a couple of award nominations. However, because of the kind of been there done that story, *Black Mass* is not one you need to immediately run out in see. 3 out of 5.

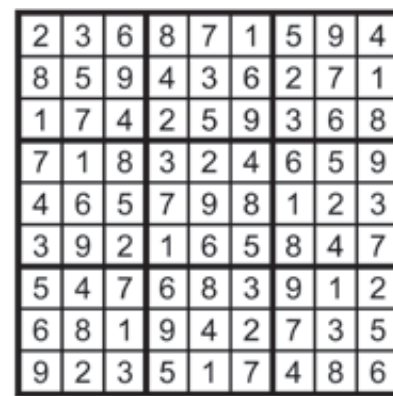
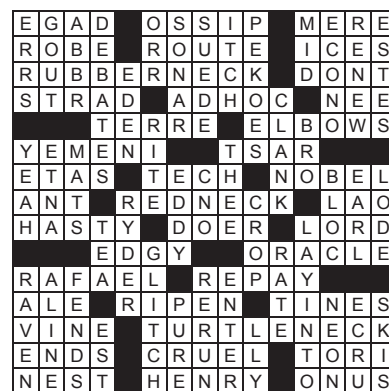
