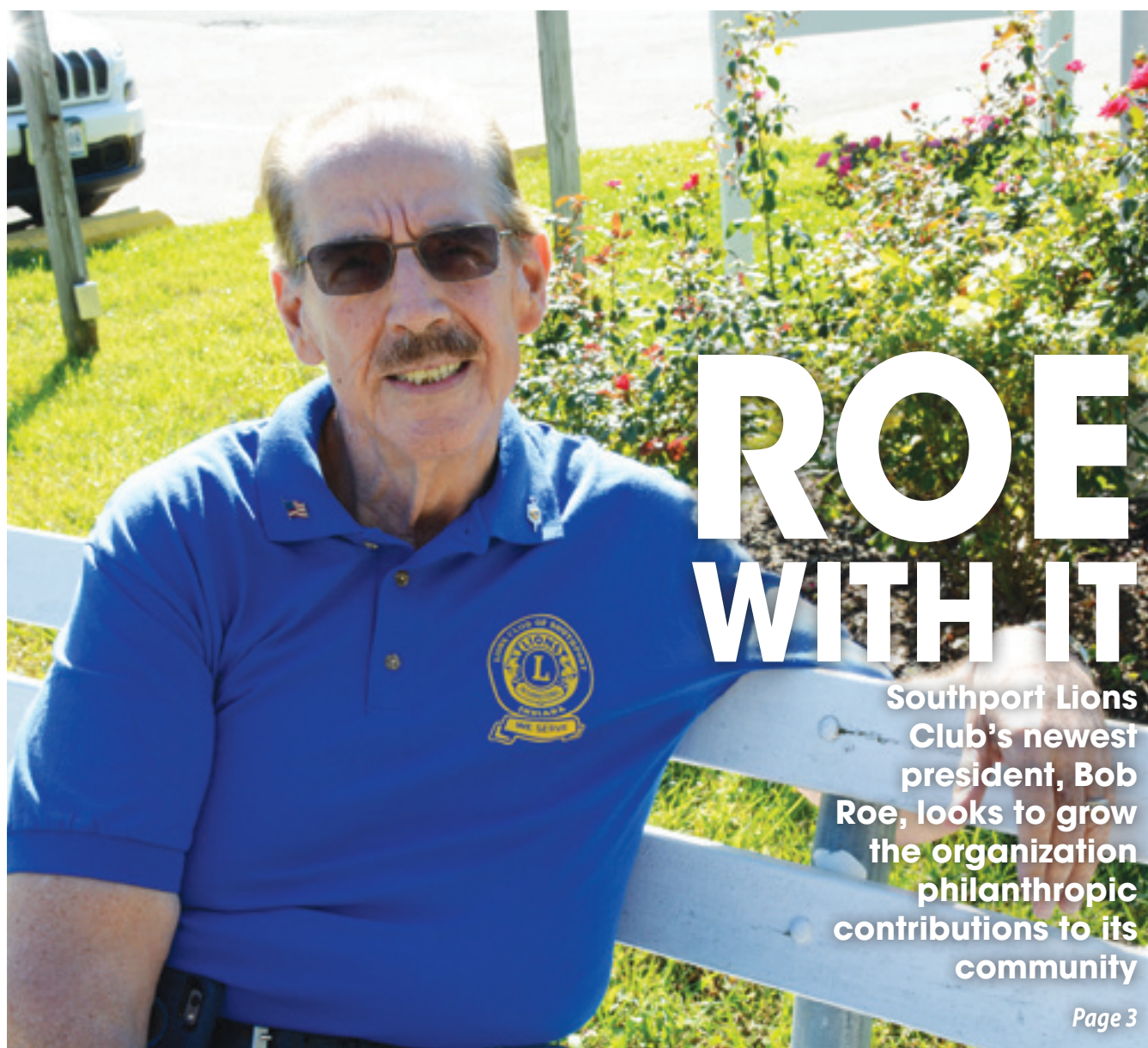

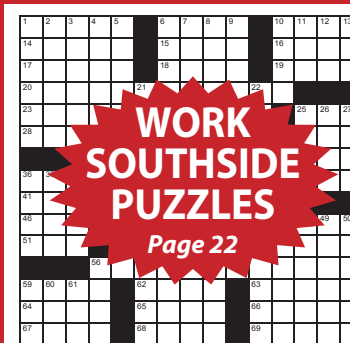

Roe with it

Southport Lions Club's newest president, Bob Roe, looks to grow the organizations philanthropic contributions to its community

As the newest president of the Lions Club of Southport, Bob Roe is looking to build on the efforts of past presidents and members. The ability to give back to his community and make lasting friendships not only attracted him to the club, but is what he looks forward to continuing to grow.

"Bob is easy to work with," said Southport Chief of Police, Thomas Vaughn. "He wants to help. He's in the right spot as president of the Lions Club. That's his passion. The Lions are huge supporters of the Southport Police Department. Without them, we'd still be struggling to get to where we are today."

Bob grew up on the Eastside of Indianapolis. He was drafted into the army on his honeymoon in 1964, during the Vietnam War, serving stateside.

"When I went in the army, I was unhappy," he said. "When I finally got over my mad spell, I went for anything that would better me. I went in as a 9th grade drop out. I finished high school while I was in and took every course that could help me. I made E5, the equivalent to a sergeant, in 17 months. It was rare to make rank that fast."

Getting to know Bob...

- I'm an avid cook. I don't have all the credentials but I love to cook gourmet food and try different things. My specialty, according to my family is Italian Stuffed Shells. My favorite is a chicken stew that I invented.

- I'd like to play golf.

- I've been on a blind bowling league for 47 years and I enjoy that. I'm not a great bowler but I have a good time. My one partner is totally blind. The other partners are partially-sighted and mentally challenged.

- I adopted an 85 year-old man, Harry. When I worked for the independent living center, I was sent to help this guy who was legally blind... In WWII his job was to pull pilots out of burning airplanes. He didn't have any family... When I found out he was a veteran, that got to me. I got him signed up at the VA Hospital. I've been his power of attorney and have been taking care of him a little over 10 years now. Veterans have to stick together.

Bob resides in Perry Township with his wife of 51 years, Carolyn. They have three sons.

He had entered the printing business while serving in the Army. After 9/11, the business fell through. A friend suggested that Bob pursue a job working with the blind and visually-impaired at an independent living center, teaching clients how to get by on their own. He now has his own business, Your Personal Safety Company, which sells products for blind and visually-impaired people.

Bob joined the Southport Lions Club almost four years ago, encouraged by his friend and fellow member, Pauline Ulrey. He would have joined sooner, but its meetings had conflicted with his hobby, as a member of the Indianapolis Bowling League for the Blind.

While the Southport Lions Club contributes to its community in numerous ways, such as testing children's eyesight in schools, furnishing dictionaries to third graders and taking trips and donating to Leader Dogs for the Blind, its largest efforts the past few years has been through its partnership with the Southport Police Department. The 38-member club has helped raise enough money to donate five defibrillators, five Narcan kits and body cameras for Southport police.

"The first time Tom approached us and needed defibrillators for the cars, they needed five of them," Bob said. "AJ (Johnson, past president of the Southport Lions) said maybe we can get one of them. I said no, we're going to get them all. And we did... You take a bunch of guys like that will go out and risk their life for you and I, and don't even get paid for it, I believe they deserve to have the best equipment they can. I'm hard headed and when we decide we'll do a project, I'll go all out. I'm a firm believer of go big or stay home."

The Narcan kits donated last year have already been used once, helping an officer save two people who were overdosing. Vaughn said the the body cameras have been used approximately 10 times in the past year and a half, assisting in law suits and complaints.

"When I first started as police chief, most of our equipment was outdated," Vaughn said. "Without the Lions Club, we would never have been able to get that equipment, but it also got the word out and inspired others to help as well."

Lions International turns 100 years old in 2017. Clubs are encouraged to complete a Centennial Community Legacy Project, or give visible gifts to the community. Again, the Southport club turned to the police department. They discovered SPD's mascot, Justice was in

dire need of a facelift. The mask was too hot for the officers to wear, and worn down.

"About a year ago at Christmas time we went to the hospital to give toys to kids," Roe said. "Justice went with us. Justice looked like he was about to pass out because the mask was so hot, even in winter time."

The Lions are raising \$2,100 for the mascot through its Spaghetti Dinner fundraiser on Oct. 1, 4 to 8 p.m. at the Southport Community Center.

"It's an icon for the Southport Police Department, which I feel is one of the better police departments around," Bob said. "I know the good that they do. I think this will help draw kids closer to the police, which is one of the things that we need. Any time we can draw attention to law enforcement and let people know law enforcement are not the bad guys, I think it will help."

The police have already received the new Justice, a crime-fighting bull dog, but are working on getting a badge on the uniform to state the Southport Lions Club's involvement as its legacy project.

As president of the Southport Lions, Bob said he's instilled a process of voting on every issue, to include all Lions in the activities of the club. He said they're always looking for additional projects and causes in the community in which they can have an impact.

Greenwood investigator aspires to become more active in his community

Doug Wood says he found the perfect career fit when he was hired to the Investigations Division of the Greenwood Police Department in 2012. Investigating crimes against children and sexually-based offenses, Wood says he can see the direct impact he and the team of officers have in their work.

Wood grew up on the Eastside of Indianapolis, later finishing college at Indiana University Purdue University Indianapolis. He was hired to the Greenwood Police Department in April 2000, serving in the uniform division, specializing as a field training officer, fatal crash reconstructionist and drug recognition expert until 2012 when he moved to investigations. Wood was named Officer of the Year in 2004, Detective of the Year in 2013 and MADD Officer of the Year in 2006. He resides in Perry Township with his wife and two teenage sons.

What was your inspiration to become a police officer?

My inspiration for becoming a police officer is deeply rooted in family tradition and an admiration for my father. I am a third generation police officer, dating back to the 1950's, where honor and commitment to service were the motivating factors in several successful police careers.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

In 2001, with less than one year on the department, and a new father of a 19 month old and a 1 month old, I responded to a report of an unresponsive infant. When I ar-

rived, the Greenwood Fire department and medical personnel were performing extraordinary methods in an attempt to revive a small infant. While this was taking place, the infant's mother arrived and I was directed to transport her to the hospital. Upon arriving at the hospital the mother and I were met by a chaplain and advised that the infant had not survived.

The following day the mother reached out and asked to meet with me. I met with the mother and she provided me a picture of the infant and told me she appreciated me being there for her. I still have the picture she provided me and think of this mother and infant often.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

The most challenging part of police work for me is trying to separate the personal and professional perspectives. Maybe that is more appropriately stated as leaving work at work. Sometimes, I think people outside of police work overlook the fact this is not just a job but a passion for public service. And, the men and women you see every day are human and the things they see and at times are forced to do, become part of not only them but their family. It is difficult to walk away from serious incidents, horrific vehicle crashes and crime scenes without it lingering in your heart and mind.

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

I most enjoy my family time. With two teenage sons who are very active, that time is limited but important to my wife and me nonetheless. My wife and I spend time attending marching band, robotics and drumline events and will spend most of this coming fall break participating in college visits. We are fortunate that our extended family is very close knit, that vacation together, spend holidays together and talk and visit as often as our schedules allow.

What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

My future professional goals include growing and maturing in my current capacity of investigating crimes against children and sexually-based offenses. I would like to learn more about the psychology and behavior as it relates to interview and interrogation. Another professional goal of mine is to become more active in my newly appointed position to the Youth Connections, Inc. Advisory Board. I would like to assist Youth Connections, Inc. in their goal of establishing Johnson County's first family and youth shelter.

When Southport teacher Megan Woodward first started a gofundme.com page to benefit her student, Ethan Knox, a goal was set for \$1,000. In 11 days, as of Sept. 29, more than \$38,000 was raised to help the high school senior.

"I used go fund me for my Eagle Scout project," Knox said. "I was familiar with the process. I made exactly the amount I needed for that. I thought this would be something that would cover a month or two of bills. When it started taking off, I was increasingly more surprised and humbled at the amount that was coming in."

Nearly three weeks ago, Knox's mother, Laura, who was reported missing two days prior, was found deceased. Knox will now take on the adult responsibilities of paying the household bills, buying groceries, car insurance, etc, all the while planning for college. He has been accepted to Purdue University to major in Honors Applied Physics.

"He plans to be an astrophysicist - and trust me, if anyone can, it's Ethan," wrote Woodward in the gofundme page. "He loves math and science, invents ideas quickly while sitting in a classroom, enjoys weightlifting, and has a lovely personality."

Local businesses and organizations have since jumped in to help. A fundraiser was held at Stacked Pickle in Southport on Sept. 26, with 15 percent of proceeds going to Knox.

Knox said he is feels thankful for the support that his Southport community has shown for him.

"I was speechless when it hit \$12-13,000," he said. "Now I can't come up with words, other than thank you over and over again. I plan to use it to cover bills, put it into savings, use it for unexpected costs, save it up while I'm in college or start a trust or something for my sister."

Roncalli High School launches German American Partnership program

Eleven students from Germany have been visiting Indianapolis from Sept. 18 to Sept. 30. The 11th graders have come to practice their English skills and experience American culture. It's spirit week at Roncalli High School, which has added to their experience as they have also traveled around Indianapolis and visited landmarks.

"They can truly dive in and become part of the school culture during the two weeks they are here," said Tabitha Zimmermann, German teacher. "I've noticed that all of my students, even the ones that are not in the program going abroad, they are so excited to come to class the last two weeks. The whole culture, everyone is so welcoming."

Roncalli High School is now an official member of the German American Partnership Program, entering into an exchange program with Rudolph-Hildebrand Schulz (School) in Leipzig, Germany.

"So far, it's gone great," Zimmermann said. "The German students have gone above and

beyond. They have definitely jumped into the school culture, seeing that this week is spirit week. Some of the German students have participated in this week, which is cool because they don't have that in Germany."

Zimmermann said one of the best American experiences they've had is learning about American football from the Roncalli coach, touring Lucas Oil stadium and watching a Roncalli football game. The students have also had the opportunity to tour the statehouse, Indianapolis Motor Speedway, Indiana State Museum, Greenwood Fire Department and meet Greenwood Mayor Mark Myers.

The German students leave on Friday. Currently, 14 Roncalli students are signed up to visit Germany in June.

"I'm really excited to see this program blossom," Zimmermann said. "I'm excited to be part of introducing it to the school. It allows us to feel like we're more global citizens, a global community. I think it will increase numbers for German. I think that it's helping the school discuss things and learn things about different cultures along the way."

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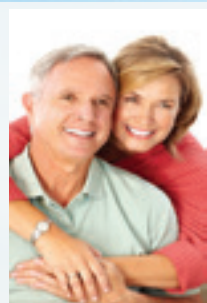

Way too many good souls suffer from Obnoxious Personality Disorder (OPD): overbearing, angry, judgmental, aggressive social behavior, hot temper, edginess, or depression bordering suicide. If you believe God created you to be anything but the light of love, find a new god.

America's a little freaked out and confused regarding eggs and high cholesterol levels. According to the Harvard School of Public Health, "while eggs may increase LDL cholesterol, there is no clearly established link between that and increased risk of heart disease." Deemed vital for older folks, more heart disease related deaths occur among people with low levels than people with high cholesterol levels.

Cholesterol is your temple's friend, not the foe you're misled to believe. January 2009 American Heart Journal: almost 75 percent of heart attack patients fell within recommended targets for "bad" LDL cholesterol. Shocking research by Mayo Clinic, Lancet, Phycology Today, the British Medical Journal, The American Journal of Psychiatry Yale school of Medicine and dozens of other studies claim something you might find disturbing: low cholesterol levels are associated with aggressive and violent tendencies, depression and suicide. Hum, take a look around you at today's statin- drenched, hate-filled, violent society. Do I have your attention?

September 1996 British Medical Journal published that those with low cholesterol

are three times more likely than the other men to commit suicide. A study published in American Journal of Psychiatry: Researchers found that the men with the rock-bottom cholesterol levels were twice as likely as those in the other three ranges to commit suicide. Yale University School of Medicine, "association between low cholesterol levels aggressive behavior, violent tendencies, depression and suicide. At least a dozen reports show the risk of suicide may be substantially higher in people with low cholesterol. (Psychosom Med 1994 Nov-Dec; 56:479-84)

When eaten in moderation, vitamin and protein-packed eggs are quite healthy. Eggs are an excellent source of choline, a macro-nutrient important for liver function, brain development, nerve function, muscle movement and healthy metabolism. Eggs with 6 grams of high-quality protein help sustain mental and physical energy throughout the day. The nutritious orbs are good source of vitamin B12, phosphorus and riboflavin, iodine, selenium and D, the sunshine vitamin that nourishes your immune system.

Cheer up, chill out and eat 'local' eggs. Your holy temple needs cholesterol my friends. It's the 'Poop' tarts, gobs-o-cheese, bacon, sausage gravy, hash browns that'll dim you. Don't hide your light under a bushel of needless OPD; let it shine.

Beech Grove City Council passes its 2017 budget ordinances

After hearing questions and concerns from Beech Grove residents and employees, the City Council approved its salary and budget ordinances for 2017 at its special meeting on Sept. 26.

Residents signed up to speak at the meeting, both in support of and opposition of the salary ordinance.

The salary ordinance will give all full-time city employees a two percent raise. Elected officials will also receive raises for the first time in an unknown amount of years. Included are the judge's salary from \$42,000 in 2016 to \$45,045 in 2017; clerk-treasurer from \$50,267 to \$60,267; mayor from \$52,450 to \$62,450; and city councilors from \$3,497 to \$4,500.

Kym Quick, Beech Grove resident, spoke in support of the pay increases.

"You guys deserve to have extra pay," Quick said. "I want better mayors in the future. I want better than just average

citizens. I want people that will take out city of the decline it's in and raise it to something great... Maybe the pay was okay back years ago, 10 years ago, 20 years ago, 30 years ago. But we don't have those same problems that we had all of those years ago. We have a lot of problems that we have to work on."

Donald Webb, Beech Grove resident who serves on the Redevelopment Commission addressed his concerns on a statement he heard that the salary increases are necessary to attract better candidates in the next election.

"I find the idea that money somehow creates better government laughable," Webb said. "If that's true, why do we have a \$19 trillion deficit and \$100 trillion in unfunded liability? Those folks on Washington are some of the best paid in the world. So the idea of tying money to performance of government, I don't know if that holds true. We're a small city and our employees have to be paid more because we have to compete with Indianapolis, Lawrence and Speedway. We don't have the resources that those cities do. I would hope that you guys would be good stewards and act morally and ethically."

Employees had a chance to speak after the citizens. The Beech Grove Police Department union representative and Beech Grove resident, Nathan Rinks discussed the department's dissatisfaction with not being included in the budget process, and learning that while the employees will get a two percent raise, the operating budget decreased.

"We can't go with a lack of communication like that," he said. "It's not good for us as employees, it's not a good look for elected officials and it doesn't help the citizens. In the last week and a half, as we're dealing with this and trying to figure out what it means and what the changes are in this bud-

get... it takes the focus away from what we should be doing, fighting crime. We're trying to find a way our property and violent crime stays low as we're surrounded by one of the 10 most violent cities in the country... There was a breakdown of communication that we can't have anymore."

Councillors addressed the issues and made a couple of amendments to the salary ordinance prior to passing it on second and third readings, with a vote of 5 - 2. They unanimously passed Ordinance 23, the operating budget, on second and third reading and Ordinance 24, additional appropriation for the Churchman Avenue Sidewalk Project, on second and third reading.

Deepwater Horizon; very average, forgettable film

In a world with an ever-increasing presence of screens combined with the pervasive nature of social media in our lives, we’re seemingly inundated with tragedy. Turn on your television, both the national and local news are retelling (again and again) the latest details of a horrific mass shooting or deadly natural disaster. Log into Twitter or Facebook and likely, you’ll find stories filled with death and destruction trending. However, even in the midst of pain and suffering, all is rarely lost. Stories of extreme bravery and courage during daunting circumstances normally emerge, restoring, at least for a while, faith in humanity. One new film looks at such a story during a relatively recent disaster.



Executives onboard are concerned about falling even further behind, as the rig is already more than 40 days behind schedule. Despite the pleading of the crew and alarming findings of several safety tests, the BP executives demand that the drilling for oil commence immediately. What follows puts the lives of everyone onboard at risk.

While Wahlberg and Russell give adequate performances in this fact-based story, Deepwater Horizon, the film’s biggest problem stems from its script. None of the characters feel fleshed out enough, the audience really isn’t given much of a sense of these characters. Instead, the film is more concerned on the disastrous series of events that follow. It moves with such a brisk pace that the entire film does have a rushed feel to it. At times the film feels more like a documentary than a dramatized version

of the explosion.

Some of the cinematography is questionable as well. It’s so fast paced, that it can be disorienting at times. Again, the camerawork adds to the documentary feel with angles and techniques likely to be seen in that style of film.

Deepwater Horizon is a film that could have and should have been much, much better. Instead, it’s just another average, forgettable action film. 2.5 out of 5.

Deepwater Horizon is the story of the offshore drilling rig, approximately 40 miles off the southeastern coast of Louisiana, which exploded in April of 2010. The mammoth explosion would lead to the worst oil spill in history, gushing oil into the ocean for 87 days. In all, 11 people lost their lives in the disaster.

The film follows Mike Williams (Mark Wahlberg) as he prepares to leave his family for a three-week stint aboard the offshore drilling rig. Once onboard, Williams and the head of the crew, Jimmy Harrell (Kurt Russell), encounter some rather disturbing news. They learn a number of routine safety tests and procedures have been completely discarded in the name of profit. The BP ex-
