

Death: Will we know when it is our time to go?

Death will claim us all at some point. It will be the end of one journey and the start of the next. We may have regrets over a seemingly life-less-lived, or have none at all. Each person is different. Some may pass quickly and unexpectedly, while others become hostages to their bodies as they linger with illnesses that deteriorate the person they once were. Dementia and Alzheimer's bring forth a new personality that is ultimately devastating in the end. Those lucid moments become few and far between, but they do come.

Southsider Jerry Bennett dealt with the decline of his wife Winona's health. As her home caregiver he ultimately had to place her in several facilities beginning in 2012. Winona, a long time advocate of nursing home reform, where residents are left in the shadows rather than being stimulated and challenged, had in the past put together an army of volunteers and organizations to support this endeavor. Now, however, she became a resident herself, and with a mind-set as Jerry states, "one to give care and not to receive it." For the next three years Jerry was a daily fixture at his wife's bedside. There

were good days and days not so good. And then a few months back, those lucid moments transcending any illness, acknowledging a historical passage as husband and wife and reinforcing what one has stated—"Jerry and Winona were the cutest couple." On that day Winona simply stated to her husband, "You know, being married to you has been fun." Jerry will always treasure that statement. On July 10, 2015 at 6:26 p.m. Winona passed on.

When it is our time...we know! On that evening Jerry was preparing for his evening walk when Winona told him, "Don't leave right now, stay with me just a little longer." He did. Winona knew it was her time. Shortly thereafter she was gone. My own mother, though unconscious, waited for my brother to arrive from Florida.

A couple of weeks after Winona's passing Jerry had a dream. They say that dreams are answers to questions yet asked. In the dream was Winona and references to not only

their life together, but also her recent illness and decline. Jerry feels it was a personal message: there would be no more nursing home, wheelchair, no restrictions.... She was free of all that and beginning her next journey. Jerry states, "She looked good," and of the finality of it all—"She was there to let me go."

Coffman announces run for Beech Grove clerk-treasurer

As I have decided to run for the position of Clerk Treasurer for Beech Grove, I'd like to introduce myself and provide some information regarding the position I'm seeking. I was raised on Sumner Avenue, graduated from Roncalli High School, and earned my bachelor's degree from Indiana University. My family owns and operates Eckstein Shoe Store on Main Street.

Since I started knocking on doors a few weeks ago, I've found that many people are unsure what the Clerk Treasurer does. Open, efficient and honest communication is important to me — it's essential that voters know who they're choosing. In the interest of getting us all on the same page, based on Indiana state code, here are some duties of the Clerk Treasurer:

It is the responsibility of the Clerk Treasurer to collect fines and fees as ordered by the governing body as addressed in IC 36-4-10-4.5. The money collected has been set forth by ordinance by the Common Council, and the Clerk Treasurer has no say on what is collected or mandated by the governing body. Therefore, the money in city bank accounts comes from fines, fees and taxes that you as a citizen have paid, and the Clerk Treasurer must efficiently distribute them.

Another task for the Clerk Treasurer, per IC 36-4-6-9, is to act as recording secretary and record keeper for the City Council and Board of Works. If meeting minutes are amended by the City Council or Board of Works, it is the job of the Clerk Treasurer to make the corrections public record.

It is also the responsibility of the Clerk Treasurer to work with the Mayor, the Council, and all city department heads to ensure the city successfully serves its citizens. This includes employing the best spending practices and uses for your taxpayer money.

When people work together, great things can happen. Let's work together to sustain our unique sense of community.

Life is easier when you love what you do—and Paul Cloyd always knew he had a passion for pursuing a career as a firefighter. More than nine years have passed since he hired into the career, and he says he still loves going to work and now serving the community in which he grew up.

"This is one of those jobs that you can get up and have a smile on your face every day coming in," Cloyd said. "I go to a place to be with my family... I know that bell could go off and I get to go to work because I know that bell can go off and I can touch someone's life in a significant way. Every day is different."

Cloyd, who now resides in Bargersville, was hired to the Beech Grove Fire Department on Jan. 1, 2013. He had started preparing for fire service while still in high school, going to Central Nine Career Center in Greenwood. After graduating from Beech Grove High School in 2008, he worked seven years part-time with the White River Township Fire Department and with Bargersville Fire. He said that he was given the opportunity to attend paramedic school through WRTFD, and was hired to the Beech Grove

"This has been such a big influence in my life, and shaped me as a person in so many ways," Cloyd said. "It's hard to imagine yourself without it."

What was your inspiration to become a firefighter?

What inspired me the most, I had a series of role models growing up. I was mostly attracted to the character of the job. What inspired me to this profession is the ability to help people, the ability to work in my community with people that I grew up with... I get to see people at their worst, and I get to see people at

their best, that dichotomy. Every day I come in and get to work with some of the best people on the planet. I get to be the person they call to touch someone's lives for a moment. That's the biggest inspiration for me. I'm in love with the job.

Beech Grove firefighter/paramedic finds a love for serving in his hometown community

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

The most gratifying part of the job is to be able to go on calls and see a face that I know. They know it's not a stranger anymore coming into his house; it's a friendly face, someone that he can trust. That's a very big deal. You don't always have that connection to the community in an area you never lived.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

We work 24 hours on, 48 hours off. That schedule is different from your typical work schedule. Someone has to be on that truck. I've missed weddings, birthdays, tons of life things because every three days I'm here. The hardest part is sacrificing the time with family and friends. You miss a lot, but it's a fair trade because you gain a lot, too.

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

I'm a big fitness guy so I do like to work out a lot. I like to do those adventure races, mud races, etc. I have a lot of hobbies. Right now, I have been brewing my own beer at home. It's a nice stress reliever to sit down with my dog, cook beer for a couple of hours then give it out to my family and friends.

What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

Professionally, I like everyone says, eventually I'd like to be a company officer. It's something that I don't plan on doing for a long time. It's a big step. Profes-

sionally, short term, I'm a union member and I've been working within the union as an officer. I'm trying to learn as much about how things work and continue to serve for my own people.

What would you have done if you hadn't of became a firefighter?

I first started in the fire service as a cadet when I was a sophomore in high school. I think I would have gone into helping animals, but I can't imagine trying to do that now.



Tony Origer is out on the Greenwood trails, likely bicycling, at least weekly. When he and his wife, Brenda, moved to Greenwood in 2000, they enjoyed taking their three daughters out on the trails. Wanting to show their appreciation for the amenity and to help it grow, they started Greenwood Trail Trek, a 5k run/walk approaching its ninth event on Sept. 12.

"It's increased the awareness of the trail system," Tony said. "We're seeing more people using it on a daily basis. The city has done a great job of expanding their parks department with the new water park facility and the trail system at Freedom Park. The routes to get to and from the parks are all improving."

Tony and Brenda moved to Greenwood from Iowa in 2000 so that Tony could start his own chiropractic practice, Performance Chiropractic and Sports Rehab. He said that they both wanted to stay in a place with Midwest values, and Greenwood still had that small town feel. As they got more involved in the community, and being a family that likes to stay active, he said that they saw a way to give back.

"About nine years ago, my kids were smaller and we wanted to be able to take them on a bike ride in a safe setting, not worry about cars," Tony said. "We like to hike, cycle and do things with them. At that time, the city was looking to expand their trail system. I

was 100 percent in favor of developing a trail system in the city. It's a nice amenity for the city to be able to offer."

Tony and Brenda started Trail Trek more than eight years ago to not only increase awareness about the trail system in Greenwood, but to fundraise for additional amenities along the trail. It has since become a city event.

"Each year it's continually grown," Tony said. "We're raising more and more funds each year and get more and more involvement. Last year we had 400 people and we hope to double that this year."

This year's run/walk is Sept. 12, beginning 8 a.m. at Craig Park. Music will play at the start with a flag from the Greenwood Fire Department flying over the road. The timed race goes through Old Town Greenwood, the Smith Valley corridor and back to Craig Park. A celebration with food, drinks and music will take place at the Greenwood Community Center where prizes will be given for each age division and overall winners.

Last year, Trail Trek added a school challenge to benefit schools within the Greenwood parks area. The school with the highest percentage of participants wins money for physical education programming. Last year Westwood Elementary won \$1,000 which they used to install Frisbee golf at the school. Our Lady of Greenwood came in second, using the \$500 prize to update its softball equipment.

"The community has rallied behind this pretty well," Tony said. "The school challenge has made it fun in getting the kids involved. That is the most fun part about it. It's a fam-

ily event in the sense that you see a lot of moms, dads, kids doing it."

Tony merged his private practice in January 2015, joining Methodist Sports Medicine. The business is a partner for Trail Trek.

"We encourage our patients to be out, be active, you're going to heal quicker, you're going to do better," Tony said. "A good walking program is always good for the spine related injuries that I specialize in. Orthopedically, we like people to be active."

A committee of approximately 10 people helps organize the annual event with support from the fire, police and parks departments. Tony said it's been gratifying to see the event grow and watch as more people become active in it.

"It's just a fun event," he said. "You're supporting a community amenity that supports the city of Greenwood. It's neat that the Greenwood community businesses pull together to support an event like this."





Beech Grove City Schools' speech-language pathologist wants to help more preschoolers develop language skills

Does your child have trouble speaking or pronouncing certain sounds? Speech therapy can and does help preschool age students start kindergarten with a higher understanding of speech and language, says Joey Box, Beech Grove City Schools speech-language pathologist.

While Beech Grove's preschool speech therapy program has been around for a while, Box said it seems to be underutilized in the district, and early intervention is the key to continued educational success.

"If a child can't speak right, it can inhibit what they can learn," Box said. "They can have that vocabulary inside of them but if they can't say it, it's almost like they don't have that vocabulary. We want to get these kiddos on the right track from the very beginning so they can be as academically enhanced as they can be in kindergarten."

Box holds the preschool therapy twice a week, on Wednesdays and Fridays. He also works at South Grove Intermediate with fourth, fifth and sixth graders. For the preschoolers, the day will start out with a book. The kids get a chance to play with Play-Doh, bubbles, board games and more, all while using language skills.

It worked for Box, who took speech therapy as a young child, later going to Ball State University to earn his masters degree in speech language and pathology.

"I remember it really well," Box said. "The good thing is, we do a lot of fun games in speech therapy. I don't really remember learning sounds; I just remember playing. We usually do a nice job of infusing the therapy into a fun game, so the kids want to hang out with us. They are playing but they learn a lot of fun skills at the same time."

Currently Box is working with eight children at the preschool level, and would like to have closer to 20. The program is fully-fund-





ed and offered free of charge. Beech Grove schools goes through Southside Special Services, which will evaluate the children and send their information back to the school. Bountiful summer stone fruits

Nothing completes a hot summer day like the maddeningly, luscious juice of a ripe peach dripping down your chin. Single seed peaches, nectarines, plums, apricots, cherries, mangos and elderberries are members of the Stone fruit family, also known as drupe.

Peaches have potassium, which can help your muscles work properly and lower blood pressure. Vibrant orange color of Beta-carotene, Vitamin A, helps maintain eyesight, skin membranes and immune function. Stone fruits are excellent sources of niacin and vitamin B3.

Peaches and nectarines are nutritional apothecaries brimming with potassium that helps muscles work properly while lowering blood pressure. Two small peaches have slightly more potassium than a medium banana. Nectarines contain up to five times more anti-oxidants than previously believed since many antioxidants are only unlocked during the digestion process. Nectarines and peaches can keep you regular – don't peel them since the skin has all the fiber.

A cup of plums contains one-quarter of your daily vitamin C that helps your temple form collagen, the main protein of connective tissue in bones, cartilage, muscle and blood vessels. Seminars in Preventive and Alternative Medicine analyzed 100 studies over 10 years revealing the plethora of vitamin C's healthy deliciousness. Plums contain vitamin K, which helps maintain strong bones.

Low vitamin K levels are associated with increased incidence of osteoarthritis. Vitamin K helps maintain strong bones.

Apricots help maintain eyesight and their powerful yellow antioxidants protect your temple from cancerous free radical activity, damage to cells and DNA. Apricots help maintain eyesight.

Maroon cancer-fighting cherries contain cyanidin have one of nature's most powerful anti-inflammatories. I always end up eating the entire bag.

At the Farmers' Market, select summer's vibrantly nutritious orbs that have the richest color, if not the soft "give" of fully ripened fruit, and then take them home. If they're hard, let them soften at room temperature for a few days, wash them well and have at it. With a few obvious exceptions, don't peel fruit. The skin of the bulk of fruits provides fiber that helps prevent the growling logjam of constipation.

Fuel your temple with fruit from the trees as God intended. Add slices of stone fruit to salads, plain yoghurt, granola, smoothies or dessert. You can grill most stone fruits on the barbeque to be served as a dessert or accompaniment to fish. Eating healthy will add a new depth to life you've never experienced before.



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
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
