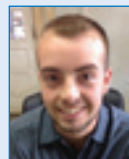
Q: What potential future event, that could but may never happen, terrifies you most?

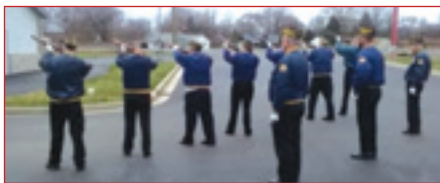
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Greenwood & Whiteland Honor Guard complete 121st funeral

Johnson County delegation to meet Japanese Company Executives

BUSINESS – Five Johnson County representatives will travel to Japan Sept. 24-30 on an economic development mission. Coordinated by the Johnson County Development Corporation, the group will call on Japanese companies that have invested and expanded in the county.

“Relationships are a critical part of doing business with the Japanese,” said Cheryl Morphew, President and CEO of the Johnson County Development Corporation. “We have worked over the years to build and maintain relationships with our local Japanese companies and their corporate offices in Japan.”

Johnson County has 14 Japanese companies that employ nearly 1,900 people. The trip will focus on discussions with representatives from some of the county’s larg-

est employers, including: KYB, Mitsubishi Heavy Industries, Mitsubishi Turbo Engine America, Nacho and NSK. The county representatives also will meet with officials from Takenaka - one of Japan’s largest construction companies that has been involved in the expansion of some of local Japanese companies - and Toyota Tsusho - one of the largest holding companies. Besides Morphew, the delegation includes: Mark Myers, Mayor of Greenwood; Julia Saltgaver, Executive Director of Quality Connection; Pat Sherman, Partner of Sherman and Armbruster and Johnson County Development Corporation chairman; and Chris King, Executive Vice President of Runnebohm Construction and Johnson County Development Corporation board member.

Franciscan Health is new name for hospital system

HEALTH – Franciscan Alliance announced on Sept. 6 that its healthcare system, one of the largest Catholic healthcare systems in the Midwest, will now be known as Franciscan Health, effective Sept. 12, 2016. While the parent organization will remain Franciscan Alliance, 12 of the 14 system hospitals will be renamed, including Franciscan St. Francis Health – Indianapolis which will become Franciscan Health Indianapolis. Franciscan Health serves more than 1.3 million patients throughout Indiana, Illinois and Michigan each year. For more information, visit FranciscanHealth.org.

Southport Branch to temporarily close for renovation

LIBRARY – As major renovation to the Southport Branch of The Indianapolis Public Library nears completion, a number of construction activities will necessitate its closing from Monday, Sept. 12 through Thursday, Sept. 15.

Activities include moving computers for staff and patrons to permanent locations, installation of a media lounge in the new marketplace, removal of a temporary construction wall, returning parts of the collection to permanent locations, removing shelving from the community room, and preparing the community room for final work. Exterior landscaping also will be accomplished during this period.

The Southport Branch, 2630 E. Stop 11 Road, will reopen to the public on Friday, Sept. 16, with remaining renovation activities continuing until Saturday, Oct. 15 when the branch will celebrate its community grand reopening. The \$1.1 million renovation to the 16,000-square-foot Southport Branch is the first since its opening in 1974. For more information, visit indypl.org.

BEHIND the BADGE

Cory Berkebile had never heard of Beech Grove before applying to the Beech Grove Fire Department. Hired in January, 2007, he said he's come to enjoy the small-town atmosphere with big-town amenities nearby, and getting to serve the citizens in what is often their greatest time of need.

"This isn't just a job to anybody that takes it," he said. "It's something we look forward to. I don't have to go to work. I get to go to work. It's a privilege to come here. I like to put the uniform on. I couldn't do a desk job for very long. This gets me outside and serving people. The fact that the citizens give me money to do this is a bonus."

Berkebile is from Anderson, Ind. He joined the Army out of high school, spending seven years active duty and traveling to Kuwait, Bosnia and South Korea. He and his wife, Amanda, have been married for five years in October. They have three children, Matthew, Allyson and Olivia, with a baby due in October.

Berkebile was recruited to BGFDF while attending the Methodist paramedics program. He was hired in January 2007. He was a civil-

ian paramedic the first year before becoming a firefighter. He now serves as a lieutenant.

What was your inspiration to become a firefighter?

I always wanted to be one since I was 5. The deputy chief of the Anderson Fire Department came to my kindergarten class, showed us the fire truck and all of the tools. From that point on, the interest continued to grow.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

During one of my shifts on the ambulance, my partner and another engine company from Indianapolis were sent for a child struck by a vehicle. The engine arrived first and I could tell by the way everyone was moving and the police waving us in that this one was going to be bad. The child was hit by a car going at a high rate of speed. He was thrown a distance and was unconscious but breathing. Lots of gruesome injuries to say the least. In my mind I was thinking that this child needs a miracle if he's going to survive. We all treated him to the best of our abilities and turned him over to the Trauma doctors at Riley hospital. I went home and I remember confiding to my wife that I didn't think he would survive very long and that I was sad over this run. We continued

to stay in contact with the doctors and the family to see how he was doing. A year later that boy came to the fire station with his family to say thanks and that he was recovering slowly, but surely. I was just so happy to see him doing so well after such a tragedy.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

I'm a new lieutenant. People in our larger brother departments probably don't look at getting promoted to that until the 15, 20 years mark, so I'm early. Sometimes I wonder if I stepped into it too soon, but I have a really good crew and we all work together. It's probably just me being hard on myself.

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

I like to fish. I like to make furniture out of wood. I spend a lot of time with my kids. I don't have any part-time jobs so I do a lot of stay-at-home dad stuff.

What are your future goals, professionally

or personally?

Personally, I'd like to gain some formal business knowledge and start my own furniture-making business. Professionally, I'd like to gain more certification and experience. I'm content with my job professionally right now.

What would you have done if you hadn't become a firefighter?

I probably would have been a policeman. It's my family's line of work.

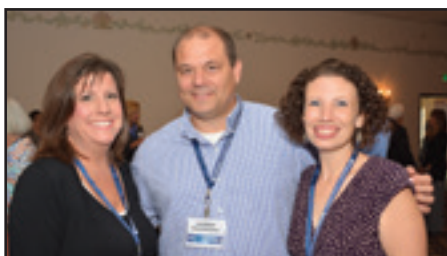

Jim has received love, support, and encouragement from friends and family. It helps, but will never completely take away the void he's now experiencing. His beacon of light has been extinguished. And the world is a little emptier. Tammy Myers commented:

"The Universe expressed itself for a brief time by manifesting in the form of this re-

markable young man. It's like we never really die. He will always be around in some way."

Well said, Tammy!

Next year's Boy Scout ritual will be different. As we walk the Mystic Trail, the Jim Fisher of 2016 will not be the same one in 2017. But...I have confidence my friend will carry on. Fathers go on to survive. God's speed my comrade!

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GOVERNMENT WATCHDOG

BEECH GROVE CITY COUNCIL

Meeting, Sept. 6

■ **What happened:** Ordinances 13, 15 and 16 were approved on third and final reading. Ordinances 18, 19 and 20 were approved on second reading.

■ **What it means:** Ordinance 13 establishes fees for building permits.

Ordinance 15 has to do with fee structures in the City Court. There were fines that were too small to act as a deterrent to violators. The fees were already set by the city in previous ordinances.

Ordinance 16 repeals an old ordinance pertaining to massage parlors. The ordinance was rewritten to pertain to massage therapy, requiring these businesses to obtain a yearly license and be subject to inspection. There are three massage therapy businesses in Beech Grove.

Ordinance 18 prohibits parking on Adelaide Street from Butler east to the dead end, on Butler Avenue from Elmwood north to the high school parking lot, and on Park Emerson from Emerson Avenue to Butler.

Ordinance 19 states stop signs will be placed at the Adelaide and Butler intersection, Butler and Park Emerson intersection and Feeder Drive at

Butler.

Ordinance 20 establishes guidelines for social media sites belonging to city entities such as the police department, fire department and parks department. The guidelines state that comments on these social media sites will be monitored. Comments will be removed if they are deemed unrelated to the page, obscenities, reveals personal information, containing fighting words, fraud, defamation, solicitation and more.

■ **What's next:** Ordinances 13, 15 and 16 will go into effect.

■ **What happened:** Ordinance 21 was approved on first reading. An additional appropriation was approved to transfer \$100,000 to the stormwater account.

■ **What it means:** Ordinance 21 amends the personnel manual. This manual was taken from old and newer ordinances, with a committee of approximately 20 helping to put this together.

■ **What's next:** Ordinance 21 will undergo second reading at the October meeting.

In brief...

Beech Grove will host a public meeting on Sept. 12, 7 p.m. as a native to taxpayers for the 2017 budget calendar in the City Hall Council Chambers. A special city council meeting is Sept. 26, 7 p.m. for the second and third readings of the budget in the council chambers.

We thank these brave men and women who sacrifice so much of their time, who dedicate their lives to protect and serve the citizens of our communities.

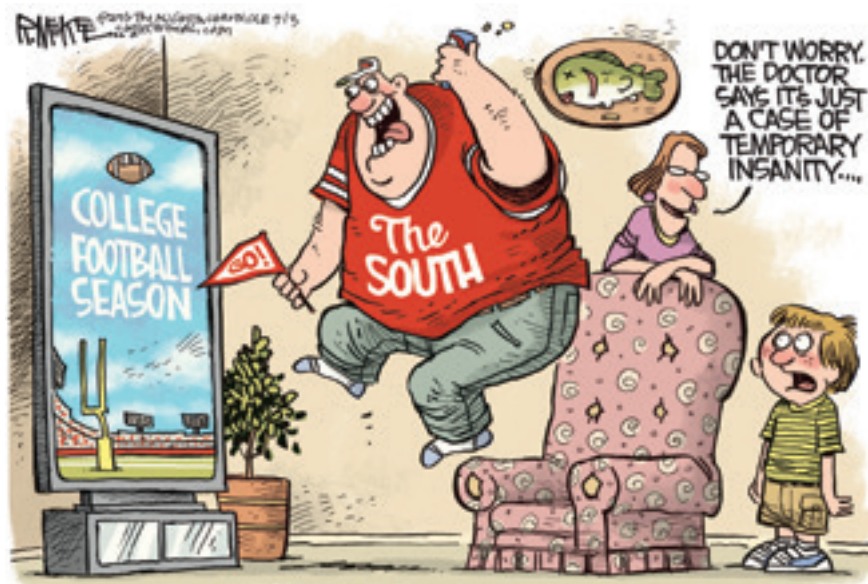

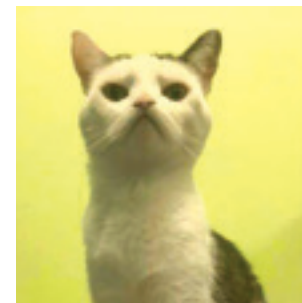

Thanks to your help, we have been able to accomplish just that.

On behalf of The Port Authority of New York and New Jersey, I thank you for your commitment to honoring these first responders and all the other lives that were lost on September 11 by accepting an artifact from the World Trade Center and creating a public display in your community or at your organization.

While the facts of that day have been well documented, many throughout the country are unaware of the health impacts still faced by thousands of responders and survivors who live not only in the region that we serve but also around the country.

With the 15th anniversary of September 11 approaching, you or your organization may be having memorial events in the coming days. These events present an opportunity to raise awareness about the continuing health impacts to responders and survivors. The information below conveys the scale of the issue and comes from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's World Trade Center Health Program, which was established by the Zadroga 9/11 Health and Compensation Act:

- There are more than 71,000 responders and survivors receiving medical monitoring and/or medical treatment for their September 11 injuries. In the past year, more than 3,600 responders and survivors enrolled in the WTC Health Program.
- September 11 responders and survivors enrolled in the program are in every state and in 429 of 435 Congressional districts. Approximately 8,000 responders enrolled in the WTC Health Program reside outside of the NYC Metropolitan Area.
- More than 33,000 responders and survivors have at least one injury or illness related to September 11 - more than 22,000 have two or more. More than 3,700 responders and survivors have cancer related to the events of September 11.

We thought it important that you and your organization know about the scope and magnitude of the health issues faced by September 11 responders and survivors across our country.

Southport Police Academy graduates nine recruits from its second class

Nine recruits will graduate from the Southport Police Academy on Sept. 24 at the Life Center of Southport. Having spent the last six months training in everything from handguns, physical fitness, traffic stops and how to communicate with people, these recruits will soon continue their training on the road and earn first-hand experience.

"We really focus on the service part of it," said Southport Chief of Police Thomas Vaughn. "This group got it. They understand the community policing side. They have that even keel where they can go talk to somebody and then go to the policing side, which is what we try to find but it's hard to find people who can do that. We got really lucky."

The Southport Police Academy began in 2015, receiving a Tier II certification from the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy. This allows Southport to not only train its own reserve officers, but officers for other small agencies as well. Of this current graduating class, eight of those officers will serve the Southport Police Department and one will serve the Homecroft Police Department. This will bring Southport up to 40 reserve of-

ficers.

This second time around, Vaughn said they made changes such as adding more first responder training since the city has a large elderly population. Southport Police often arrives in under two minutes, before first responders, which is why this training is valuable.

"They're really young this time," Vaughn said. "We only have one with police experience. It was a challenge getting them to understand the seriousness in how things can go bad really fast, but teaching them was easier because they didn't have any bad habits either. You can talk about something and get that deer in the headlights look until you physically do it. It was unique this time, trying to get them to understand the real life portion of it."

The academy trains recruits at Harrison College in Indianapolis, in Hancock County to practice firearms and defensive tactics at Warren schools. SPD is currently working on constructing a new police station. Vaughn said they will wait to hold another police academy until they can use their own space in Southport.

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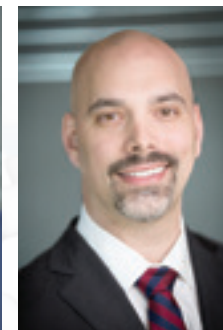

Hands Of Stone ... terribly written and directed

As many already know, life is not fair and in some instances, can seem downright cruel. Whether it's an unexpected expense that comes along when money is already tight, losing a much-needed job or being denied an opportunity of which we felt completely deserving, life isn't fun at times. However, ironically, it's usually those periods of adversity that are remembered with a fondness and sense of accomplishment. Not that any enjoy hardship or punishment, but it's normally the idea that 'I've endured and that I'm better for having gone through it.' One new film, *Hands of Stone*, showcases a life peppered with hardship and dismay.

Hands of Stone is the story of legendary Panamanian boxer Roberto Duran. The film follows Duran's life as a child living in poverty, his illustrious career as a welterweight and lightweight boxer, and his, at times, tumultuous personal life. However, while his boxing career may be impressive, Duran is most recognized for, as the film mentions during its end credits, as the only person to defeat another boxing legend, Sugar Ray Leonard.

As the film begins, we see Duran's childhood, marked by abject poverty and political unrest caused by the United States and Panama's tussle over the Panama Canal. Through, what are referred to as his "hands

of stone," Duran pulls himself up into a life of wealth and fame and becomes a national symbol for the people of Panama in the process. The film also spends a fair amount of time focusing on his relationship with his trainer, Ray Arcel (Robert De Niro) and his wife, Felicidad.

Hands of Stone is a film that suffers from a number of problems, most notably its script. The film is poorly written and enlists a number of clichés in the process. For starters, the film begins with Duran as a child and then just seven years later Duran is a full-grown man fighting at Madison Square Garden; the timeline doesn't make any sense. Then there are the out-of-nowhere attempts to delve into the lives of his trainer Arcel, and opponent, Leonard. These instances feel very forced and awkward.

The direction and pacing is also poor. The entire film feels incredibly rushed, trying to fit as much content in as little amount of time as possible.

With a much better script and more disciplined direction, *Hands of Stone* probably could have been a very good film, but instead it's a pretty poor one. The entire film feels like a parody of a similar film, one of the worst of the year. 1.5 out of 5.

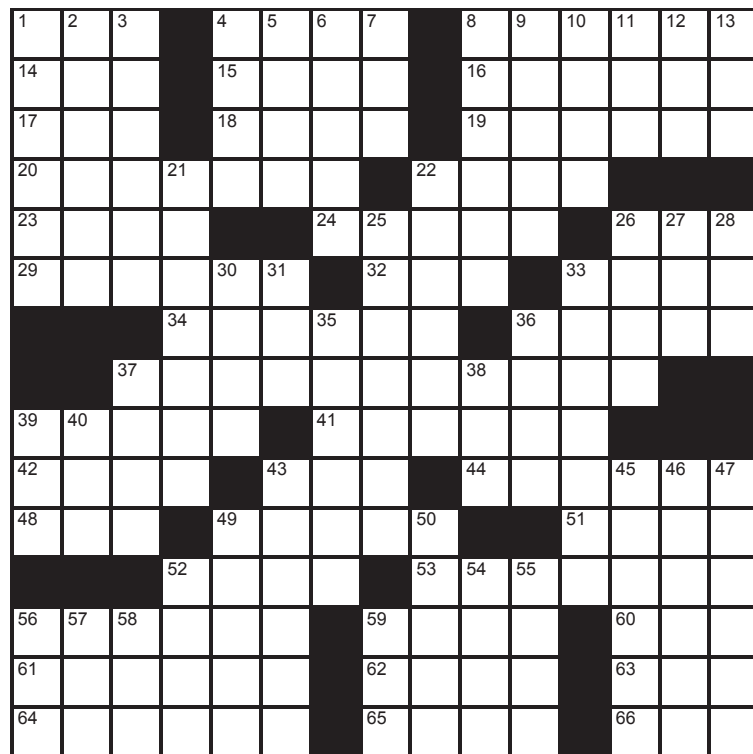

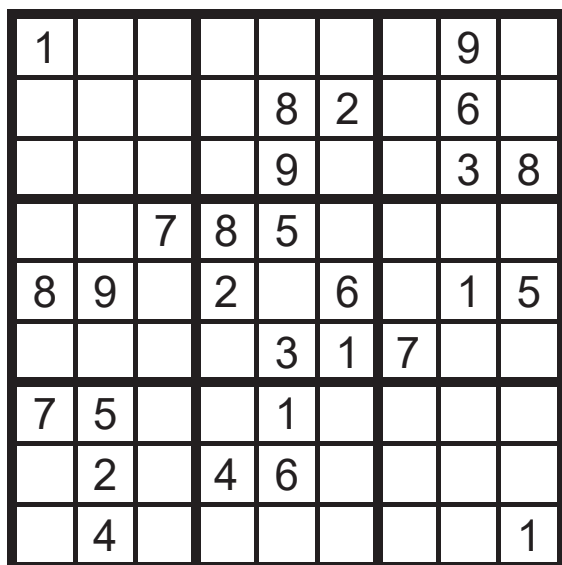
