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Topics in History: History through Film

A Southport student review of the 2016 movie Hacksaw Ridge

Topics is a course at Southport High School, taught by Kevin Sanders, that analyzes major events from United States and world history through Hollywood films that attempt to portray those events. Students investigate historical documents and other sources to determine if a film is historically accurate.

The goal is for students to develop deeper understandings of the historical discipline while generating questions about the way the world is around them, along with watching classical films that have graced American and international screens. This week, student Evan Scott reviews the 2016 film Hacksaw Ridge.

The legendary story of Desmond Doss is nothing short of unbelievable. In fact, the film Hacksaw Ridge chose to leave out parts of his story because they are nearly impossible to believe. The film has powerful storytelling that fully captivates the audience and captures the heroism of Doss. However, the film is not historically accurate.

Unfortunately, like most films, Hacksaw Ridge is "Hollywooded" and there are times when events don't line up with the true historical events. For example, the film leaves out the fact that with his platoon Doss served first at Guam, then at Leyte in the Philippines, and finally partook in the Allied invasion of Okinawa. The film never mentions these first battles and portrays Hacksaw Ridge as Doss's first battle when in fact he's experienced war before this. The film is meant to focus on Doss and his actions at Hacksaw Ridge but fails to mention these other battles that paint Doss as a different soldier. Doss wasn't new to the battlefield. However, the choice to not present those first battles helps present Doss as a bigger and greater hero. Portraying Hacksaw Ridge as his first battle makes Doss look extremely calm and collected. Then he goes on to save so many people which leaves the viewer awestruck.

Another major part of the film that was changed was Doss's torment from other soldiers and officers. The fact that Doss is able to overcome these challenges in the film and still continues to fight for his beliefs truly builds his character into the legendary hero he is known as. Unsurprisingly, these events in the film are dramatized. In the film, Doss was awakened one night by his bunkmates throwing him out of bed and then beating him. Doss is bloodied and bruised. However, according to records there is no evidence of this ever occurring. Doss would have shoes and tools thrown at him but nothing to the point of what is shown. While something like this is smaller than an actual beating, it shows his willpower. Doss is able to shrug off being beaten for his beliefs. He continues to follow them and even forgives his attackers. Now when it becomes overly dramatic the events take away from the true story and even undermines the true events. It makes them seem less impactful than they really were. Now there is some power in showing Doss beaten up by the ones he is supposed to trust and protect. Doss needs these men to protect him while he is out saving lives; how is it that he can trust them when he is beaten by them? Doss is able to move past the event and continues to collaborate with his attackers. The dramatized events once again show this real-life saint.

Doss and his platoon reach the Hacksaw Ridge and start their assault. They make progress in pushing the Japanese back but get counter attacked. Many Allied soldiers fall. It is estimated that Doss saved over 70 soldiers who otherwise would have been left for dead and forgotten. This is accurately portrayed in the film. He dragged them to the edge of the cliff and attempted to lower them down the ridge. An interesting event that was not mentioned in the film was a time where Doss was lowering a soldier down, and a Japanese soldier had him in his sights. However, every time the Japanese soldier tried to fire his gun would jam. This event was nothing short of extraordinary. The scene of Doss rescuing so many people is dramatized but it actually happened.

The film Hacksaw Ridge is historically inaccurate in the Hollywood details added to the story but also by the shockingly true details that the film doesn't include. The fact that there are real events that had to be removed just shows how great Doss's story truly is. At one point during the final assault of the Ridge, Doss is hit by a grenade and ends up with shrapnel in him. As they were carrying him, he saw a guy on the ground badly wounded. Desmond rolled off the stretcher and crawled over to patch the man up. Doss is once again doing the unthinkable and making his story even more unbelievable.

While having good historical accuracy Hacksaw Ridge is lacking when it comes to telling the full unbelievable story of Desmond Doss. The film leaves events out that are needed to tell the whole story. However, the film does a spectacular job in portraying Doss as a hero. With the powerful storytelling the film does it would be impossible to see Doss as anything other than a real superhero.

From Yellowstone to your backyard A local naturalist offers springtime tips for your first (or growing) garden

As the birds chirp and the weather turns, you may think this is the year to finally start that garden. Or you may wonder how to attract birds to your backyard. Jessica Helmbold, a naturalist from Garfield Park Conservatory, offers a few tips to help you get started this spring. She also shares her experiences at Yellowstone National Park that impacted her life and view of nature.

So, what is a naturalist anyway? By definition, it is a person who studies nature, especially plants and animals as they live in nature. Helmbold added, "It's about the way people, plants and nature are all connected and how we should live in order to preserve life."

Helmbold has always been interested in science and nature; she credits her parents who grew up spending time in the outdoors and shared that interest with her when she was young. An experience that impacted her life was a visit she made to Yellowstone National Park with her dad when she was 9. "Being in the expanse of nature that is almost untouched by human development was a fascinating experience for me. It was amazing to see how beautiful the area was and how the natural systems operated on their own," she remembered.

After graduating high school, she took an-

other trip to Yellowstone, which inspired a career choice. "Going back to Yellowstone the second time really reminded me how much I enjoy interacting with nature and spending time in it. I knew that I wanted to be able to teach while interacting with nature at the same time," Helmbold said.

She majored in biology at Franklin College, then went on to get her master's in environmental science at Taylor University. During this time, Helmbold found that she could have a sustainable career teaching in an outdoor setting. She specifically wanted to work in botanical gardens. Years later, she accomplished that goal and now works as a naturalist at Garfield Park Conservatory. "Part of what I do is educate and inspire the public about nature and the environment," she explained.

Helmbold has discovered that nature is very interconnected across the world. "What happens in Yellowstone Park or in the rainforests will impact my daily life," she stated. "It's important to pay attention to our daily habits and how our consumption affects the rest of nature."

Helmbold recommends buying things that are fair trade or bird friendly. In addition, people may provide habitats for birds and other animals near their homes by planting native plants and keeping lawns free of chemicals. "Doing some of the small things can really make a big difference," she said. For those interested in starting a garden

or attracting birds to their backyard, Helmbold recommends the following:

Birds/butterflies:

- Put out a bird feeder or a hummingbird feeder. For hummingbird feeders, don't use red dye.
- Plant native plants (available at the Indiana Native Plant Society).
- -Milkweed attracts monarch butterflies.
- Purple coneflowers attract goldfinches.
- Serviceberry or juneberry trees attract waxwings and other berry-eating birds.
- Cardinal flowers attract hummingbirds.

Gardening:

- Wait for consistent warm weather before cleaning the leaves out of your garden beds. Resist the itch to spring clean on the first warm day in March.
- Plant seeds now for vegetables that take longer to reach maturity (tomatoes and peppers).
- Plant seeds for carrots, beets, peas and spinach.
- For a cute tradition, plant lettuce seed on Valentine's Day (save that for next year).

- Use the Garfield Park Conservatory as a resource.
- Visit your local farmers markets for vegetable plants if you don't start from seed.

Even if you don't have a chance to do much when it comes to your yard, Jessica encourages people to stop and smell the roses. "A lot of people don't realize how much nature is all around them because they just don't pay attention," she noted. "Whether you're in an apartment or a home with a lot of land, you will find that nature still surrounds you and you can be connected with it."

Visit Garfield Park Conservatory to enjoy the gardens inside and out (including a children's garden for kids to explore nature in its various forms). "It's a sensory garden, but it's also a learning tool as well," Helmbold said.

The conservatory has monthly gardening programs to help answer questions regardless of skill level or space limitations. "We all have a passion for nature, and we want to share that with others." she shared. For more information, go to garfieldgardensconservatory.org.



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
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Roncalli Salutes Our 6x Grand Champion Show Choir

The Batman A gritty, more emotionally introspective Batman

Superheroes rule Hollywood. The biggest films released every year are comic book films and for better or worse they aren't going anywhere anytime soon. So the question then becomes, how will these films grow and evolve as the times change? The answer is by borrowing the aesthetics from other genres of film and applying them to the superhero framework. Jon Watts' previous three Spider-Man films borrowed heavily from the teen dramas of legendary 80s director John Hughes and his era defining run of teen film like The Breakfast Club and Sixteen Candles. Similarly, 2022's The Batman draws influence from the era of thrillers from the early 2000s, best described through the works of David Fincher like Se7en and Zodiac.

Like these films, the plot of The Batman concerns a series of violent murders revolving around a political conspiracy. But deeper, and what sets it apart most from previous incarnations of Batman films is how Bruce Wayne comes to grips with, not only his purpose for fighting, but the meaning of the Batman as a symbol to the people of Gotham. Of course Batman isn't alone in this fight against the mysterious Riddler; various series staples like Catwoman, Commissioner Gordon, and Alfred are all here and given new life thanks to great writing and stellar performances.

The real stand-out of the cast however is Robert Pattinson as Batman. Not only is the film focused on his growth just as much as the mystery at hand, but Pattinson is under a mask for a vast majority of the film, so he is forced to emote almost exclusively through his eyes. This gives way to jaw-dropping moments of performance that are just as technically impressive as they are emotionally moving. Pattinson's portrayal of an orphaned billionaire is more emotionally stunted than any other version we might have seen before which seems to be more in line of a person who thinks the best allocation of their time and resources is to dress like a bat and punch criminals. The broken character of Bruce Wayne looking for healing, or at least a reckoning with his past, is a large part of what motivates him throughout the film's threehour runtime.

This lengthy duration might be a turnoff for others, but the film was well structed and paced quickly enough that it was never a problem for me. This along with the film's ultra-stylized, gritty visual language made every scene a stand-out moment. Despite the overwhelming praise I have for the film, upon reflection the ambitious storytelling does leave some moments in the third act feeling underdeveloped or rushed.

That being said, I would much rather a film take risks and come up short of perfection than play it safe and regurgitate the same film over and over again with a shiny coat of paint on top of it. The Batman is a breath of fresh air in an increasingly homogenized genre and an experience well worth the trip to the theater.

Now that my son is in elementary school, he's coming home with a new vocabulary of slang. I've learned about "yeet," which means to throw something really hard. Now I know that to "oof" a sound you hear in a video game when a character dies ... they "oof."

Gone are the days of "cool" and "rad." Depending on the decade you came into early adolescent prominence, your words could be "far out," "marvy," "tubular," or "dynamite."

Today I'd like to look at English words whose definitions have changed drastically over the years. Some have taken a complete about-face.

Awful: This word now means something like "terrible, bad, horrible, or lousy." Originally, the word had the same association with the word "awesome," which meant deep reverence and respect for something or someone. **Cloud:** Back in the day, a cloud was down, while now it is up. In the 1300s, a "clud" was a mass of rock or a hill – think of a "clod" of dirt today. This was a mass of earth. Today, a "cloud" is something in the sky that sometimes drops precipitation. Apparently, it's also where all my passwords are stored. If anyone finds them, let me know.

Meat: In Old English, people distinguished solid food (meat) from drink (drink). Over time, "meat" evolved to mean only the flesh of animals that people eat. But, back in the day, an apple would have fallen into the meat category.

Literally: You'll be saddened to learn that a second definition has been added to the word literally: figuratively. Am I happy about this? No, I am not. However, dictionaries report popular usage, so "literally" can mean "exactly" or "kind of/about/approximately/figuratively." If you want to put a bee in my bonnet, use "literally" to mean "figuratively."

Nice: We get "nice" from the Latin word "nescious" (ignorant). Originally, "nice" meant "a stupid or ignorant person." Over

time, the word came to mean either "someone who is shy" or "someone who has a keen sense for fashion." Eventually, the word "nice" morphed into meaning "kind" or "agreeable."

Fantastic: We now know the word "fantastic" to be synonymous with "great." However, this wasn't always the case. "Fantastic" originally meant something that was "imaginary" or "made-up." Dragons and unicorns were fantastic creatures. This is from the same word as "fantasy."




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
