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
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## **Topics in History: History through Film** A Southport student review of the 1987 movie The Untouchables

Topics is a course at Southport High School, taught by Kevin Sanders, which analyzes major events from United States and world history through Hollywood films that attempt to portray those events. Students investigate historical documents and other sources to determine if a film is historically accurate.

The goal is for students to develop deeper understandings of the historical discipline while generating questions about the way the world is around them, along with watching classical films that have graced American and international screens. This week, David Johnson reviews the film, The Untouchables.

The Untouchables is a movie about the cops who took down notorious mobster Al Capone. It shows their story, tactics and the story of the crimes Al Capone committed. The story surrounds the Prohibition era when Capone was at his height and was the biggest criminal in the world. The story is seen as a great movie, but there is a lot that is lacking on Capone and his character that could've pushed this movie to legendary status.

Though Al Capone was not a person you would want your kids to look up to there is no doubt his story is legendary which is why it is very damaging to the movie that Capone is a very shallow character who is just seen as your average villain. Al Capone was a very critical thinker, and the movie does not acknowledge that. They use Capone more as a set piece than a character because he really only delivers big lines and has a big entrance, but the scenes he has are

was a borderline puppet master.



## Warm weather marks the beginning of farmers market season A Southside guide to local farmers markets

Franciscan Health Weight Loss Farmers Market 11 E Stop Eleven Road, Indianapolis, IN 46227 Begins June 1 and runs through September Runs Wednesdays from 11 a.m.-2 p.m. and 3-7 p.m.

Franciscan Health Weight Loss Center nurse and former ER nurse Amy Gillard didn't realize she was starting a full-blown farmers market when she asked a few local vendors to bring in fruits and vegetables for some of her weight-loss patients. "We started it five years ago just as something small to expose some of our patients who may not otherwise have access or knowledge about getting fresh fruits and vegetables," Gillard recalled. "Since then it's really grown. We're up to about 30-35 vendors this year with a variety of different foods and a bakery."

For Gillard, the farmers market has become a labor of love as it has grown in popularity. What started out as a small side project is quickly turning into a well-oiled machine and a valuable resource for the community. "I would joke with my vendors when they would ask me all these technical farmers market questions – I'd just say, I'm just an ER nurse. I have no clue!" As the market has taken shape over the years, Gillard has realized it has not only benefitted her clients but also the community around her. "Even though we started off with weight loss in mind, I've also seen how it has met a need for the local community and hospital employees that come and visit during their breaks," she mentioned. Before the market begins, Gillard volunteers her time to mark off the parking lot for the vendors to come and set up.

Before becoming a weight-loss nurse, Gillard was working full time as an ER nurse. Prior to that, she had been working with Channel 13 for about 10 years. After having her third son, she decided to go back to school and get her nursing degree. "I've always had that urge to try and make a difference somehow. I knew the ER was a place where people really needed help," she shared. She discovered the weight loss center after one of her co-workers began working there. She started off as a patient and did medical weight loss herself. Feeling a little burned out from the highly demanding ER work, she found out there was an opening at the weight loss center and took a job there. She still works weekends as an ER nurse but finds it much less stressful than doing that full time. "At the time, I thought I would only be taking a little break from the ER, but I've been working as a weight-loss nurse now for eight years," Gillard noted.

Gillard was born in Shelby County and

attended Triton Central Schools. Twenty years ago, she moved to Center Grove where she and her husband have raised their three boys. The youngest is now a senior at Center Grove High School. After having their third son, Gillard has just accepted that sports are going to be on her TV 24/7. Her husband jokingly used a sports metaphor when describing how life changed with their third child. He said, "We've now switched from man-to-man to zone defense," she recalled. Gillard was no stranger to sports though, even before having three boys. At Channel 13 she helped bring in "The Reggie Miller Show" and the Jim Harbaugh Show as well. "It was fun, but eventually, priorities just changed, and interest changed. I had my kids, and I felt the need to do more to help people. That's when I went back to school for nursing." Gillard explained.

Today, she finds a great amount of fulfillment helping people achieve their weight-loss and health goals. "Watching people be able to do little things that we sometimes take for granted is really rewarding. Patients will send updates on how weight loss has allowed them to do things they couldn't do before, and that feels really good." Gillard mentioned. The farmers market has just added another layer to the way Gillard is making a difference in peoples' lives. Last summer, Figlin saw an opportunity to combine his passion for cars with another lifelong love: art. "After acquiring the building for our ser-

Employees were asked to vote on designs emblematic of the organization's core values, including initiative, growth, integrity, transformation and resourcefulness.

#### Jason Brown sentenced to 55 years for murder of Southport Police Lt. Allan

**Trial conclusion** - On May 6, Jason Dane Brown was sentenced to 55 years in prison plus three years suspended to probation following a guilty verdict for the murder of Southport Police Lt. Aaron Allan in 2017. Brown was convicted in February of murder and marijuana possession in the killing of Allan. Allan was trying to help Brown after a car crash on the Southside when Brown fatally shot him.

**Southport Police Chief Thomas Vaughn issued this statement:** "First I want to personally thank each and everyone of you for all of the support, prayers, and encouragement we have received for the last 5 years. It has been a very long and frustrating road. Without a great community, friends, and supporters this road would have been impossible. You are truly our rock and appreciate everything you have done for us. Even though this is not the outcome we were hoping for, it is the end of a long road. Now it is time for us all to heal and work together to make our community even better. I know that's what Lt. Allan would want and expect us to do. Thank you from the bottom of my heart, and thank you for being a part of a community I am very proud to serve."



### Leading downtown development

City of Greenwood celebrates the opening of its multi-use sports complex, Greenwood Fieldhouse

The Greenwood Fieldhouse, a multi-use sports complex, officially opened to the public on May 6 following a ribbon cutting celebration. City officials expressed a great excitement for the completion of this project, which is the first of much-tocome downtown redevelopment.

"This is such a great thing for a community," said Mayor Mark Myers to the audience at the ribbon cutting. "We've been working on it for so long. And I've been looking so forward to this day, because this day was supposed to happen last Labor Day. We faced a lot of challenges as we've done this, with COVID with the setbacks with that, with the pandemic, with material shortages around the world. But it's exciting to see the facility happen today and it's for people of all ages, from the youngest to the oldest."

Greenwood Fieldhouse includes 65,000 square-feet of space dedicated to an indoor running and walking track, two multipurpose turf fields, golf simulators, basketball, volleyball and pickleball courts. There is also rental space for community use.

Formerly the site of the Greenwood Middle School, Greenwood Fieldhouse repurposes many elements of the old building including the former facade of the school and its gymnasium featured in the atrium. Lockers placed throughout the facility are from the original building. About 40% of the building is new construction.

The facility is open weekdays from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. and 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. on weekends. For more information, visit Greenwood.in.gov/Fieldhouse.

## **Doctor Strange in the Multiverse of Madness** The artistic oppression of the MCU

The Marvel Cinematic Universe is the most profitable film franchise in cinema history and for better or for worse, it is here to stay. So then, with the 10-year culmination of the MCU ending in 2019 with Avengers Endgame, the question becomes, where will they go from here? A noticeable trend in the MCU films released since Endgame is that a lot of them have come from previously acclaimed directors like the Oscar-winning Chloé Zhao and now with the Multiverse of Madness, horror auteur Sam Raimi. So, it seems, Disney is trying to lend the MCU some artistic and critical respect by looking to established directors for its newer films. Unfortunately, Doctor Strange in the Multiverse of Madness just serves to prove that even a stylistic powerhouse like Raimi can't break out of the MCU formula.

This particular film will be notable in the larger cannon of the MCU for its exploration of the titular multiverse, previously introduced with last year's Spider-Man: No Way Home. The events of the film begin when America Chavez, an interdimensional traveler, crash lands in the Marvel universe that all other films before this have taken place and meets Doctor Strange. Together Strange and America must team up to travel the multiverse in order to stop the demonic force that seeks to steal America's interdimensional powers and, in the process, kill her.

Sam Raimi made his name in horror directing such classics as The Evil Dead and The Evil Dead 2, Darkman, and more recently, Drag Me to Hell. Despite these dark violent horror films, it was Raimi that proved superhero films could be massively popular and profitable with his Spiderman trilogy in the mid-2000s. With this in mind he seems like an obvious choice for a modern superhero film, but what limits him most in the Multiverse of Madness is the long-standing formula each of the movies in the MCU must adhere to in order to sustain a franchise for an indefinite future. If you've ever seen an MCU film in the past 15 years you know exactly what to expect from Doctor Strange in the Multiverse of Madness.

The largest stamp Raimi puts on his outing in the Marvel film cannon is his over-the-top violence and visual experimentation. The violence is certainly the most pronounced of any Marvel film so far but never feels unnecessary and Raimi's use of compositing and slick editing feels fresh in a genre begging for new ideas. However, these moments of creativity feel locked in a story determined to sideline the only interesting aspects present. The fun uses of editing or unexpected character beats that make the film special are buried under a mountain of boring CGI ladened conflicts, obvious corporate mandated story beats and obligatory fan service cameos that only serve to distract from what make Raimi a special director to begin with.

In terms of superhero fare, you could do a lot worse than Doctor Strange in the Multiverse of Madness. However, if Marvel wants to remain relevant or get the critical approval they clearly desire, this film makes clear that they need to start taking real risks and letting the people behind the camera make their own movies without the weight of the Disney mega-corporation stifling their output. Doctor Strange in the Multiverse of Madness is currently only in theaters.





Weekly Devotion

Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds.

#### JAMES 1:2

What a blessing to be hands serving God's will, touching lives of those in need. One such army of God's soldiers is a local nonprofit pantry outreach called the Servant's Heart of Indy. Earlier this week I found myself in the company of William (Bill) Boone, chairman of Servant's Heart. In March of 2021 they served 362 families and touched 1,200 lives. In March of 2022, they served over 700 families and touched 2,775 lives in a single month! I was saddened to hear that last week somebody stole the truck they use to transport food donations. I told Bill how sad and angry I was to hear that someone could be so evil. Bill responded with a smile and told me that I need not be sad or mad. He told me that it's all part of the ride we call life. He went as far as to say that this theft was a reminder to him that God truly has a sense of humor. I asked him how someone stealing a truck so desperately needed by so many could possibly reflect God's sense of humor. His reply was priceless. He said that Thursday evening he shared a passage from the Book of James with volunteers. "Consider it joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance." Although he was fully prepared for the trials to come when he shared that passage Thursday evening, he said he never imagined the test of his faith would come so early the very next morning! God clearly placed Servant's Heart in Beech Grove to be a lighthouse beaconing out to the Southside of Indianapolis!


