# Stigmatized properties: A retread from an article published June 22, 2017

Are you thinking about buying a house? Perhaps it will be a starter home or a forever home. It may be an older home or a newer one just starting its history. Buying your own home is an exciting journey that results in placing down permanent roots. As long as you ask the right questions, you might not end up with a stigmatized property.

Stigmatized properties have a past, and sometimes not a nice one. It might involve things that happened within its walls: murder, suicide, Aids, cult activity, drugs or prostitution. Also included in the mix could be phenomena – ghosts!

Caveat emptor (let the buyer beware) is in play with real estate transactions, with most states (Indiana included) not requiring notification of certain stigma attached to a property. The National Association of Realtor's code of ethics mandates its agents to avoid "exaggeration, misrepresentation or concealment of pertinent facts." The sellers, or Realtor, may not necessarily volunteer information yet have a duty to reply truthfully when asked direct questions. A lie constitutes misrepresentation.

The Residential Real Estate Sales Disclosure Form informs potential buyers about material defects: foundation, heating & cooling, termites, moisture, rodents, mold, appliances etc. What this form leaves out is any stigma attached to the property.

Many will not think twice about buying a

stigmatized property, especially at cost savings. Presently, Indiana law requires a seller to inform a buyer if a property was used as a methamphetamine lab; and disclose if any death occurred in the house if the sellers are aware of it. I believe the matter of ghostly shenanigans also must be disclosed.

Two stigmatized properties in Indianapolis come to mind:

For example, the yellow house that formerly sat on the corner of Meridian and Main St. in downtown Greenwood. A daughter, in a drug haze, bludgeoned her mother with a hammer and dragged her lifeless body to the garage right across from Mrs. Curl's Ice Cream. The house was for sale afterward with no takers.

Then, there is the Sylvia Likens murder house on East New York St. After the murder, the home went through a steady procession of being for sale, and on the off times, a rental unit. Nobody ever lasted long in the house.

Both properties were stigmatized and eventually demolished because of reports of paranormal activity. If this kind of property remains standing, it can take years — and hoping people forget — for them to sell.

Two Roncalli seniors recently received acceptance into military academies. Matthew Croddy will attend the Naval Academy in Maryland, which has an 8.3 percent acceptance rate. Ryan Henry is heading to West Point in New York, which has an acceptance rate of 12 percent.

The seniors both had to be nominated to attend their future academies. Croddy was nominated by the United States Senator Mike Braun, and Henry received his nomination from United States senator Todd Young.

# A new journey for Croddy

If asked a few years ago, Croddy would have said he planned to go to a college such as Wabash or the University of Indianapolis. It was two years ago when his focus shifted to the Naval Academy.

"I wanted to do something different from the average college experience. A friend of mine was attending the academy, and I went to visit her my sophomore year. I loved the atmosphere and the professors I had the chance to meet," Croddy explained. "Visiting the campus sparked my interest more than ever before. If I went to a normal college, I would have participated in ROTC, so the Naval Academy is the perfect fit for me."

Many of Croddy's family members have served in the military, so he had an understanding of the application process when he began sending in information near the end of 2020.

"I sent in my main application around Au-

gust of 2020 and my nomination in October of that year. It was a bit of a rolling thing; as I finished documents, I sent them in," he said.

The Roncalli senior found out he was appointed in January 2021.

"I was scrolling through my phone when I saw that my status had been updated. I was actually sitting in my seventh-period class and just happened to check," Croddy explained. "I was speechless when I saw that I had been accepted. It felt so good, and it was such a big relief to know that I had an official plan. It had been a few

months since I sent everything in, so I was on edge."

Croddy's parents have been fully supportive of his decision. When they found out he had been accepted, they told everyone they possibly could.

"I think they were more excited than I was," said Croddy as he chuckled. "They have been

by my side the entire time.

He explained that his goals for the future are to serve his country in any way he can.

"Ideally, I would like to become a nucle-

ar engineer for a ship," Croddy said. "If that does not work out, I hope to be able to serve my country however I can. That is my number one goal here."

Croddy leaves for the Naval Academy on June 29.

# A new addition to Henry's family history

With a history of military background, Ryan Henry knew he wanted to follow in the footsteps of those before him.

"Although a lot of my family members have a military background, none

of them have been to an academy before," explained Henry. "I am excited to create my own path while still sticking to family roots."

Henry has never been interested in a typical college campus. He wants to go to school to improve himself mentally and physically. His original plans were to major in something involving math, such as chemical engineering

or applied statistics. He made the decision just over a year ago to apply to West Point.

"I really want to challenge myself to do something different and find my way in a new atmosphere. I do not want to go to college to party like some other kids," said Henry. "I had to start my application process and get everything quickly since I made my decision on such short notice."

When Henry found out he had been accepted to West Point in February of this year, he says it was relieving, and his family showered him in support.

"I think my acceptance to West Point is my greatest accomplishment thus far," Henry said. "I have so much thanks to giving to my parents for being supportive and proud of me. They have always pushed me to be the best that I can be and have challenged me to overcome any obstacles that come my way. It was a happy moment."

As far as his time at the academy goes, Henry wants to be involved in extracurriculars while challenging himself mentally and physically.

"I anticipate that this will be the hardest thing I have ever done," he said." I am excited about the challenge. I hope to make good friends and play football when I get to the academy. I also cannot wait to graduate and serve my country for five-plus years."



# Nativity sends comfort and love to foster care students



You should also give your dog a heart-worm preventative. Heartworms are fairly common in the area and can be a big problem if your dog becomes infected with them. Since heartworms are spread by mosquito bites, any dog will be at risk in the park, on the sidewalk, or in your own yard.

Fleas and ticks are also a common problem in central Indiana. These pests can not only cause problems directly from their bites, but they can also spread other diseases and worms.



# Hunger

# A stark, probing rumination on violence and humanity

British director Steve McQueen has garnered nothing but praise since his work made a splash in the mainstream U.S. with "12 Years a Slave." Known for his probing dissections of humanity involved with injustice, his continuation of this theme can be seen in his awardwinning Amazon Prime mini-series, "Small Axe." But before "Small Axe" and "12 Years a Slave," McQueen would point his lens toward his home country and their brutal treatment of Irish Republican prisoners during the Troubles in 1980s England.

Set in 1981, "Hunger" is, in the most basic terms, the story of IRA leader Bobby Sands hunger strike to grant IRA prisoners political status by British law. However, while the bulk of the storyline focuses on contemplating the efficacy of this action, McQueen pays special attention to the suffering and brutality caused by other people on a personal level. He shows you the humanity of guards, only to violently strip it away when they beat, sexually violate and humiliate other humans in the most inhuman of

ways.

As you can probably tell, "Hunger" is an intense film. It deals explicitly with the torture of IRA prisoners and the asymmetric warfare engaged in by the IRA outside of prison. Famously the IRA used targeted killings, car bombs and other terrorist attacks to fight against British oppression. It asks you to consider the brutality of the guards oppressing the prisoners and the unorthodox violence caused in the name of Irish independence. The movie invites you into the humanity hidden within both sides of the conflict.

Frequently throughout the film, the disembodied voice of past British Prime Minister Margret Thatcher gives speeches about the violence and savagery of the IRA. In prison, the prisoners talk about the IRA as a system working towards a goal. The point of the film is found within the subtext of these two key inclusions. By highlighting the details of the people involved in the conflict and only hinting at the political turmoil, McQueen demonstrates that humans set against one another would never dream of such heinous violence without the power structures that employ them pushing them against one another.

A key distinction, however, is that McQueen picks a side to tell the story. The perspective is a distinctly Irish point of view. Signaling that one side is fighting against systematic oppression, while the other works for the structures that oppress their fellow humans. These competing themes culminate in one of the most tragic and powerful final acts I have ever seen, leaving you only with tragedy and ethical questions to answer for yourself.

The highest recommendation I can give "Hunger" is that I am sure you will walk away with different answers to the questions posed by the film than I had. It is dense with philosophical and moral dilemmas that will be determined by your own experiences and beliefs. It is my favorite type of film, one that challenges you to think long after the credits have rolled. "Hunger" is available to watch on HBO Max as a part of Turner Classic Movies' film festival event.

Let's start with "kook" and "coot." As a grammar columnist, I've been bestowed with both monikers from avid readers. But beware: these words aren't the same. In general usage, a "kook" is an unrestrained eccentric person. In surfing terminology,

a "kook" is a poser who has no idea what he's doing and shouldn't even be allowed on the beach. A "coot," on the other hand, is a foolish person and usually an older foolish person. A "coot" is also a type of dark gray aquatic bird.

When I think of a "kook," I think of a free-spirited eccentric person, while I consider a "coot" an elderly eccentric person. See the difference?

Now I want to tackle "gamut" and "gambit." A "gamut" is a complete range of musical notes, or, more broadly, the entire range or scope of something. Someone who "runs the gamut" experiences the entire range of whatever they're experiencing (e.g., emotions). In general, a "gambit" is a calculated move. The term comes from chess for making a deliberately risky opening move intended to give a player a strategic advantage.

How do you know if something is "hardy" or "hearty"? If you're involved in a fictional mystery being solved by a pair of brothers, you're in a "Hardy Boys" book. If you're

looking for a plant that is difficult to kill, you want a "hardy" plant. "Hardy" means tough and capable of enduring hardship. If I want a warm meal that will satisfy my hunger, I might opt for a "hearty" soup. Something is "hearty" if it is flavorful and satisfying. "Hearty" is also when someone gives enthusiastic support to a person or endeavor.



# 2 TIMOTHY 1.5

Paul has found in Timothy a young man who may not have every dot of an i or the cross of a t about the holy Scriptures correctly, but this young man has a faith that is unfeigned. What does this mean? It means that his faith is in God and i the Son of God, Jesus Christ. If Christ said it, it is the truth and the only issue now is to understand the truth as spoken by Him. That is the same thing we are faced with today. There are many understandings but only one of them is right. Our struggle with the many understandings is to come to the one that is correct and to stand on it and live by it because living by it is the way that Christ spoke of.

Christ understood what our struggle would be. and He spoke often of it. He told us to be careful because the wolf would come amongst the sheep

to destroy the sheep fold. This is a problem that is multiplied many times today over the times of the past. It is a very personal thing to know Christ personally and to know Him that way to the point that you cannot be led astray by the most recent religious star on the horizon. There are many of those. I trust Christ to be honest with me and to lead me into all truth. He said He would if I wanted to know it badly enough so that I could live by it even if it demanded that I live knowing something a little different from what I have been taught in the past. I search daily for God's truth in matters of the Christian life. I want to be His and His alone. So far as I know I am that and I intend to stay that so like Timothy people can say that I have been and am a man of unfeigned faith which, by the way, means unpretentious faith.
