Seven years ago, racecar driver Larry Dixon, Jr. was diagnosed with atrial fibrillation (AFib). Last summer, after continued health problems, he was referred to Franciscan Health and Indiana Heart Physicians, where he was implanted with a new device, the WATCHMAN, by an interventional cardiologist, Saeed Shaikh, MD. After just one night in the hospital, Dixon, Jr. was back to work less than a week later. Dr. Shaikh recently implanted the 200th WATCHMAN, the most of any physician in Indiana.



Center Grove High School seniors earn college degrees, certificates

Graduation – Center Grove High School (CGHS) honored 119 seniors for earning college degrees or certificates through the school's Early College (EC) program during a ceremony on Thursday, May 19. Through the EC program, students can take courses that earn credit toward both high school and college at the same time. Center Grove High School's commencement ceremony is scheduled for Sunday, June 5 at 1 p.m. in the CGHS Ray Skillman Football Stadium. Forty-three EC seniors will receive an associate degree in General Studies from Vincennes University, along with their high school diploma. Thirty-one of those seniors have earned college honors. Seventy-six students will receive a 30-hour Indiana College Core certificate, which means they have met all requirements for general education courses at all state universities in Indiana. Every member of this year's class of 125 earned more than 15 college credits. In total, this year's EC seniors earned 6,543 college credit hours, which is a savings of approximately \$1,072,659 in college tuition. The Early College program is open to all CGHS students. Students are selected for the program based on their reading level, grades, and recommendations. The program admits approximately 110 students per year.



Top Gun: Maverick A feat of modern action filmmaking

Tony Scott's original Top Gun (1986) is an OK film. The scope of the film is very limited by the technology of the era in which it was made, and despite its attempts at genuine emotion, falls short of creating an affecting throughline for its characters. However, thanks to the referential culture of modern cinema Top Gun has been given new life in the form of Joseph Kosinski's new film Top Gun: Maverick. In this new iteration, I am happy to report that in every way, the 2022 film is an improvement. Kosinski's film lends emotional weight to the source material, gives life to the original vision of fighter jet action with new technology, and pays homage without ever feeling stale or repetitious.

Top Gun: Maverick is still very much a story about Tom Cruise's titular character. In an homage to the original, Maverick is still making the upper brass in the Navy upset with his reckless

high-flying antics. For an especially egregious transgression Maverick is sent back to the Top Gun flight school to train an elite group of pilots for an extremely dangerous mission, in his final assignment before being permanently grounded. This accomplished group includes Rooster (Miles Teller) the son of Maverick's deceased flight partner, Goose. Through the tumultuous training period Maverick is forced to grow both emotionally and as a fighter pilot.



In many ways Kosinski was ahead of the curve in modern cinema, having directed

one of the first legacy sequels, 2010's TRON: Legacy. In his TRON sequel Kosinski smartly updated the look of the original film with modern technology and built small aspects of the original into the major plot points. In many ways he used the same approach to long awaited sequels in the execution of Top Gun: Maverick. While this is effective toward the updated narrative, it does end up leaving the film feeling slightly formulaic.

Fortunately, the action in Maverick is so next level that the predictable story is hardly a problem.

Utilizing real fighter jets for all its stunts, the action set pieces are utterly jaw dropping. The climactic scene that the training leads into is one of the most impressive feats of modern filmmaking I've ever seen. It takes its place next to Mad Max: Fury Road and Mission Impossible: Fallout as one of the most innovative and awe-inspiring action films of recent memory.

Top Gun: Maverick utilizes heartfelt emotion and modern filmmaking magic to create a product that is an improvement on the original on all fronts. It demands to be seen on the largest screen possible and is exclusively in theaters now.

Circling back to the meaning of squares

Do you have a favorite shape? Many people prefer the infinite loop of a circle. Others find triangles to be a cute shape. Me? I like squares. There's just something about four 90-degree angles with four lines of the same length. It's symmetrical poetry.

Today I'm tackling "square" phrases. What do they mean, and how did we get them?

If I had a nickel for every time someone called me "square," I'd be able to retire from being a part-time columnist. "He's such a square." 

The term "square deal" first shows up in print in the "New York Times" in the 1870s and 1880s to refer to a fair arrangement. As good writers are wont to do, Teddy stole "square deal" and made it his own.


What is a square meal? Is it a lunch comprised of bouillon cubes and saltine crackers? Don't be ridiculous! A square meal means "a healthy, nourishing meal." So where does the "square" part come in? Legend has it that we get "square meal" from the square-shaped trays used by England's Royal Navy. While it is true that the navy's trays were square, the phrase doesn't originate there. In fact, the term "square meal" shows up in U.S. newspapers in the mid-19th century, although it's hard to tell who used it first.

Have you ever heard someone use the term "square the circle"? It means someone is attempting to complete a seemingly impossible task. It could also mean someone is trying to bring together two parties who are completely different. Oil and water. Democrat and Republican. Shark and Jet. "Square the circle" is a phrase we get from geometry; in fact, Greek mathematicians posed the problem of constructing a square with the area of a circle with only a compass and a straightedge. What does that mean? I'm not sure; I don't let things like this get me bent out of shape.





Years ago I went mushroom hunting with a friend. We decided to go to Camp Atterbury. We ventured into an area where we were sure others would not hunt because the area was posted "Danger! Keep Out! Live Artillery Range." To cover more ground we split up and agreed to meet up again just before dark. The funny thing about the hills of Southern Indiana is that it is easy to find yourself lost when each hill and valley look much like the ones before. This is what happened to me. As the sun set it dawned on me that I might not find my way back to safety. The thought of early morning artillery practice added to my anxiety. I prayed to God for help and then I ran up and down every hill yelling for help. After a few hours of panic I heard the faint sound of my friend yelling back to me. I would vell, "help" and then I would hear a distant, "over here!" I was smiling from ear to ear when I greeted him. He smiled back at me, but his reply left me speechless. He said that he was relieved to find me because he had also been lost for hours with no idea of where we were or how to get back! We ruled out the directions from which we had come, and just before dark we found our way. As we drove home an awesome thought crossed my mind. Maybe God allowed me to remain lost a little bit longer so that my brother might also be saved.


