# Southside construction update

I-465 to experience nighttime closures for demolition of Carson Avenue overpass

• Greenwood: Work began on the intersection of Honey Creek and Demaree Roads on Aug. 8 through Aug. 22. Residents in the area will still have access to their homes throughout the duration of this project.

• I-69 Indianapolis: On going demolition of the Carson Avenue overpass for replacement will close the southbound I-65 ramp to westbound I-465 at night between

11 p.m. and 5 a.m.

• 1-69 Johnson County: Expect S.R. 37 lane closures this week for mowing between S.R. 144 and Smith Valley Road. Slow down and watch for flaggers on Mullinix Road south of Smith Valley Road for ongoing waterline installation work. Crews expect to shift Smith Valley Road traffic east of S.R. 37 next week and restore a dedicated left-turn lane to southbound S.R. 37.

# Beech Grove Police Department brings people behind the badge with "On Patrol: Live"

The Beech Grove Police Department has agreed to let their community in on the ins and outs of their service to local citizens. With "On Patrol: Live", the officers give a firsthand look at the daily events they encounter while on patrol. "We're a little department with big city problems," said Deputy Chief Robert Mercuri. "One of the reasons we wanted to be on "On Patrol: Live" is to legitimize who we are. We're often asked to do a lot more with less. We don't have the luxury of specializing in any one thing, we have to do everything."

Mercuri has been with BGPD for 31 years. Even though the department hasn't change drastically in size, they have encountered all the same challenges that the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department has faced. They operate as their own entity – maintaining their autonomy as a separate, but smaller police department. When Mercuri started, he was one of 31 officers. Today, the department is allotted for 38 officers serving more than 14,000 town residents and others outside of city limits.

"We have a load patrol, investigations, a couple guys detailed to a drug task force, we have four general detectives, we have two canines, we have a special response team that has done multiple federal warrants throughout Marion County as part of task force and to assist in things utilized by the FBI, we have three administrators – myself, Chief Michael Maurice and Deputy Chief of Operations Tom Hurrle," Mercuri explained.

In addition to legitimizing the department, Mercuri hopes the show will also connect the department with the community. "The main reasons (why we're doing the show) are to connect with people in Beech Grove, show them where their tax dollars are going, show them who these people are who we think are some of the

best police officers in the state of Indiana," Mercuri said. "So far, the response has been overwhelmingly positive."

Sgt. Tyler Frankel is one of the officers who has had the film crew join him in his patrol car. He's been with BGPD for seven years. He spent about eight years in the in-

ternational guard coming out of high school and went to college for law enforcement. "I like the smaller town feel and the family aspect of this department. Everyone takes care of each other. That's one of the reasons I wanted to be part of this department," Fran-

kel shared.

"To be honest, I was pretty nervous about doing the show at first. Police officers like having the car to themselves and I think pretty much every police officer you talk to would say the car is their office," Frankel stated. "After the first run or two, I saw that they just stand back and let you do your normal job and I felt much better about it." Frankel had the film crew

ride with him during the week when the show was not live and then he had his first live run last Friday. "It's kind of fun because the things that we do on a normal basis are things that the film crew doesn't usually experience. So when we get back to the car, we talk about what happened and it's interesting

to see what their take on everything is."

Both Mercuri and Frankel have emphasized the importance of having community support. "We have a lot of people stop by and thank us while we're eating or stopped and you might not think it means much, but it does to everybody," Frankel mentioned. The support of the city is equally important. "We have a very supportive mayor and city council and clerk treasurer as well. Without them doing their job, we wouldn't have the ability to do ours. It's really up to them to make Beech Grove stand out. A lot of people want the small-town feel, but when you're competing against statewide agencies, it helps to have competitive compensation and benefits."

# JCFiber's fourth zone to expand into southeastern Johnson County

JCREMC subsidiary JCFiber has announced its fourth zone of fiber internet expansion to underserved areas in JCREMC's electric service territory.

Zone 4 follows the eastern Johnson County Line and encompasses an area east, southeast, and south of Franklin. Mainline construction is under way, and residents within this zone should be eligible to sign up during the first and second quarter of 2023. Residents will be notified by postcard when they are eligible to sign up.


The expansion is part of a 4-year plan that kicked off in December 2020 to take broadband internet service to residents who don't currently have true high-speed internet access through another provider.

"We are excited to continue expanding the best available technology to members of our community who don't currently have access to true high-speed internet," said John Sturm, JCREMC CEO and JCFiber President. "Fiber-to-the-home can be life-changing for rural residents who have previously struggled to work, learn, stream, and game from home."

The project's progress has been spurred on by an April investment of \$1 million from Johnson County's American Rescue Plan Act funds.

"Investments from our local officials have played an integral role in helping us keep our momentum on this expansion," Sturm said. "One of our priorities is affordability. This investment from the county and any future investments or grants will help us complete this expansion and lower our prices as soon as possible, which has always been our goal."

JCFiber offers a no-gimmick pricing model. Monthly prices are as stated for all

consumers, and the company's only price changes have been reductions that were immediately extended to all customers-not just new sign-ups. JCFiber also participates in the federal government's Affordable Connectivity Program. Qualifying consumers can enroll at fcc.gov/affordable-connectivity-program-providers.

The company offers short 12-month contracts as part of a recent update, as well.

Expansion zones 1-3 of are nearing completion. All residents in Zone 1 are eligible to sign up for service. In Zone 2, 90 percent are eligible, and in Zone 3, 40 percent. All residents in zones 2 and 3 will be eligible to sign up by the end of 2022. Households are notified by postcard when service becomes

Future zones will be announced in 2023.

# The Northman A brutal Viking revenge tale

Robert Eggers cut his teeth on ultra-historically accurate low-budget genre art films. A ridiculously specific niche if ever there was one, now Eggers is at the helm of a \$90 million historical Viking epic. Given his historian like obsession with the past and previous critical acclaim, Eggers seems to be an obvious choice to a film like this, but his artistic eccentricities create a great quandary for The Northman. Can an auteur like Eggers make a film artistic enough to satiate his core fanbase of indie cinema lovers and a film crowd pleasing enough to keep general audiences entertained for its over two-hour runtime?

Like all of Eggers' previous work, the initial idea for The Northman comes from historical texts of the time and place of the setting and in this case, it was a 10th-century Norse saga that would serve as the jumping-off point for the story. If that sounds intimidating, fear not, this saga also served as a basis of Shakespeare's Hamlet which has been adapted over and over until the narrative has essentially been im-

printed into the collective modern consciousness. If you've ever seen The Lion King the story will be familiar to you: a young prince loses a father figure through a betrayal and then seeks revenge to claim his kingdom back from the betrayer.

Where The Northman seeks to separate itself then is in its presentation of a well-trodden plot. Eggers' previous two films were celebrated so much because of their extreme artistic integrity, even going so far as to recreate historically accurate dialects for the dialogue. Despite its wider release and big monetary backing The Northman continues this tradition as the film is practically stuffed full of era accurate, costumes, sets and props creating a wonderfully tactile texture. This base of an incredibly well realized setting provides an immersive platform for the cast to deliver uniformly excellent performances, with standout roles from Nicole Kidman and Alexander Skarsgård.

Where an issue begins to arise is who exactly the film is for; and more importantly for Eggers, can it make money? The nature of adapting a 10th century saga is that the context of the story is rooted in the values and conventions of the era. Eggers makes some attempt to modernize the story with a hypnotic

editing technique and visceral action set pieces, but I worry general audiences might still feel alienated by the pacing and arthouse fans might not find enough narrative depth to resonate with their expectations. Despite this, I find myself in a unique position of enjoying both sides of this cinematic push and pull between art cinema and a crowd-pleasing blockbuster.

With the caveat that audiences need to prepare themselves for a less than modern narrative experience, I think The Northman is an effort worth celebrating. The fact that this movie even exists is exciting. To think a filmmaker as weird as Robert Eggers can be given a big budget and an A-list cast to make a summer blockbuster is a hopeful sign from Hollywood that risks are still worth taking in an increasingly homogenized film landscape. The Northman is currently available to watch only in theaters.







I last saw my grandmother 12 years ago when she visited from Maine. She was troubled and had something she needed to tell me. She had a vision, a sort of premonition, that I had fallen to my knees and was sweating profusely and clutching my chest during her stay. She thought I was having a heart attack, but in her vision, I told her it would be OK because "it happens to me all the time." After a week's stay I took her to the airport to return home. I told her I was glad her vision didn't come true. In the parking lot I prayed that somehow I might get to visit with her again before her life was through. Then she unexpectedly called me. Her flight was postponed due to an electrical fire. We went out to celebrate God's immediate answer to my prayer! On the way home from the Mexican restaurant I experienced the worst case of acid indigestion of my life. I began to sweat profusely and as I pulled into my driveway I fell to my knees and couldn't even make it up my steps. My wife ran ahead to get antacids. My grandmother begged me to go to the hospital because she was certain I was having a heart attack. I assured her that I would be fine, and as I took the antacids, I told her not to worry because "it happens to me all the time." This month at 95 she went home to be with Jesus.




