Southside construction update

Indianapolis breaks ground on South Meridian Street project in Old Southside

• **Indianapolis:** Mayor Joe Hogsett joined the City of Indianapolis Department of Metropolitan Development, Indianapolis Department of Public Works, Indianapolis City-County Council, Old Southside Neighborhood Association, Stadium Village Business Association, and TWG Development, management and construction on Sept. 7 to break ground on the South Meridian Street Lift Indy infrastructure improvements. In 2018, Mayor Hogsett announced the Old Southside as the second neighborhood for Lift Indy, the City of Indianapolis' signature community development program. In addition to infrastructure improvements, the Old Southside Lift Indy program supported the development of affordable housing, placemaking, and improvements to Indy Parks' Kelly Park. The \$6.8m infrastructure project along South Meridian Street is a project with a community-driven vision for one of Indy's oldest neighborhoods. Project highlights include:

- Pedestrian focused upgrades with a multi-use path
- ADA sidewalks + ramps
- Upgraded traffic signals for cyclists, cars
- Bump outs
- Bike racks, benches, trash receptacles
- Stormwater inlet spacing + stormwater pipes
- PaveDrain for stormwater infiltration

• **I-69 - Johnson County:** Old S.R. 37/ Waverly Park Road north of S.R. 144 is expected to reopen at the traffic signal when traffic is shifted to the new pavement and the new bridge.

Southbound S.R. 37 traffic is expected to shift onto new pavement south of Fairview Road next week. This is the third of four traffic switches allowing crews to complete the mainline I-69 pavement and bridges.

Doubling down

Center Grove's Dirk Cushing bikes 1,000 miles in September to raise funds for children's cancer research

For the past six years, Dirk Cushing has biked an average of 600 miles in the month of September (previously June) for the Great Cycle Challenge, a fundraiser benefiting the Children's Cancer Research Fund. This year, he's nearly doubling that – and his fundraising goal.

Cushing will ride 1,000 miles this month in an effort to raise \$12,000 in the names of two young boys, Lucas Barrett, 14, and his brother Samuel Barrett, 6. He typically fundraises in honor of one child but this year there are two, so he decided he needed to increase his mileage and fundraising goal as well. Rain or shine – and there's been plenty of rainy days already – he intends to ride every single day to meet that goal.

"There's a country song that talks about you know what you were feeling then but what were you thinking," he said. "I felt I needed to double this because I am biking for two kids. This, I knew would be tough. We're into it five days and I have 200 miles. It's one of those, I knew what I was feeling but what was I thinking? But when you look at Lucas and Samuel, it's easy. You just have

to get it done."

Cushing, a Greenwood resident and a deputy prosecuting attorney with the Marion County Prosecutor's Office, began biking approximately eight years ago, after an injury made it more difficult to run. He was previously a track and cross country runner through high school at Lawrence North and college at Ball State University.

"I wanted to exercise, started biking and fell in love with it," he said. "Now, I bike more than I run."

He joined the Great Cycle Challenge six years ago, this year making his seventh challenge. Since the Great Cycle Challenge began in 2015, riders have completed 25,647,476 miles and raised more than \$52 million for the Children's Cancer Research Fund, a nonprofit dedicated to generating funding to find new treatments and cures to pediatric cancer. Cushing has ridden 4,778

miles and raised \$34,150 in that time.

Cushing heard about Samuel through a former coworker. Samuel had been diagnosed with leukemia at the age of 3. Cushing decided to bike this year with Samuel as his inspiration, when he got a call that his brother

Lucas just received a diagnosis of Hodgkin lymphoma.

"I thought well, time to ride for two," Cushing said. "Two kids from the same family. I can't even imagine the devastation that would have on a family. Maybe in some little way, I can do something to help."

The Barrett brothers are from Valparaiso, Ind. Cushing was able to meet with them and get to know them a little better prior to taking on this year's challenge.

There, he learned that Lucas enjoys fishing and wrestling. Samuel is in a Little Ninja class and desires to be a blackbelt.

"These are tough kids," Cushing said.

"They're excited about (this fundraiser). And their mother has been wonderful to work with. She's wonderful about getting the word out about pediatric cancers."

Cushing resides near Center Grove High School and can often be spotted riding along Mullinix or Smokey Row Road, heading further out of the town where there's less traffic. On occasion, he'll ride special, often flatter, courses such as the Cardinal Greenway, the longest Greenway in the state of Indiana at 62 miles long from Richmond, through Muncie and to Marion, Ind.

If he exceeds his goal by 50%, or \$18,000, Cushing will hand over the hair clippers to Lucas and Samuel and they can take turns shaving his head.

As of Sept. 10, Cushing raised \$672.76 toward his goal and had ridden 342.1 miles.

"The first kid I (biked for), he's married now," he said. "It's wonderful to see that. And the idea that no one else has to go through this one day, it'll keep anyone going."

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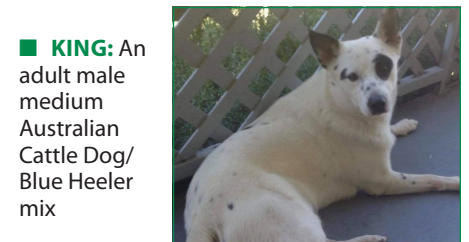

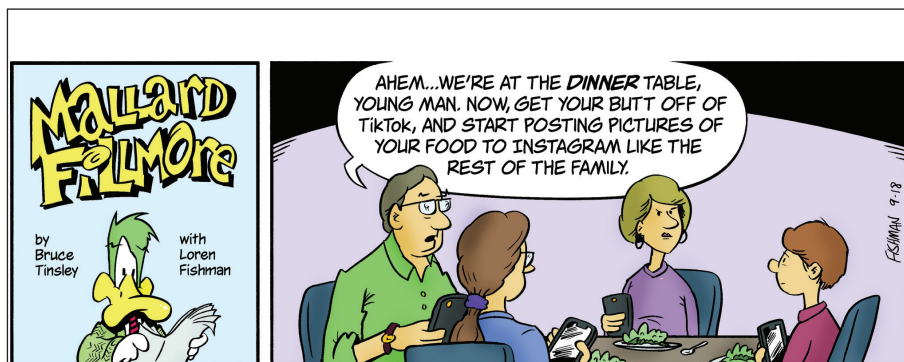

Barbarian

A smart, shocking and surprising horror gem

The trailer for *Barbarian* might be the best of the year. It is a textbook example of showing only enough footage to attract a crowd and not a second more. What was marketed as a thriller about a double-booked rental home and the tension of sharing a space with a complete stranger, is actually something entirely different and much, much weirder. Much like modern horror auteur Jordan Peele, writer and director of *Barbarian* Zach Cregger made a name for himself in sketch comedy before making the jump to horror filmmaking. With any luck Cregger will continue working in horror, because he is a filmmaker unafraid to take risks and if *Barbarian* is any indication, he seemingly has a lot to say.

The unassumingly simple setup for the wild ride to follow is that Tess, played by

Georgina Campbell, arrives at her Detroit Airbnb to discover Keith, played by Bill Skarsgård, is already staying in the house via a different booking app. The first awkward coincidence gives way to a tense exploration of gender roles as Tess and Keith discuss the potential danger he poses to her if she decides to accept Keith's offer to share the house for the night. However, while this setup maintains a sense of unease, it just serves to open the story up into something much more dangerous and wildly more depraved.

No film in recent memory has had my jaw

so consistently glued to the floor, as my theater experience with *Barbarian*. Just when you think you are tuned into his tricks, Cregger hits the audience with a subversive, yet thematically consistent left hook. It would be impressive enough to have made a purely thrilling cinematic experience, but *Barbarian* is also a dense, thoughtful exploration of power, American economic decline, and especially gender dynamics.

Cregger here has written a layered and thoughtful critique on the near invisible, gendered expectations of women and how men enforce these unseen standards onto women without ever considering

it themselves. No man in the film escapes Cregger's critique, not even the progressive, charming, and self-aware male character can move out of himself fully to consider Tess's perspective outside of a patriarchal framework. This feminism coming from a male writer might seem like lip service if it wasn't so impassioned, intricate and layered into each piece of the narrative.

Barbarian is without a doubt one of the best horror films of the year, and certainly the most surprising. Original filmmaking like this deserves audience support and is best experienced with a crowd in a packed theater. *Barbarian* is only in theaters.

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Don't let social media ruin your home sale

A few years ago we wrote a piece describing how social media posts can impact the buying or selling of a home. There's been several changes to social media since 2019, and we thought it would be beneficial to update potential sellers and buyers about the impact personal social posts can have on a real estate transaction.

Videos and reels have become a major player in social media since the pandemic started in 2020. People want to see what others are doing, learn new skills and explore new places. However, what happens when those images reach a potential buyer?

It's not really private

There is no such thing as private in the world of social media. Even if a social media account is set to private, it does not stop followers, friends or family from taking a screenshot or talking about the information posted. A homeowner may think it's cute dog-shaming their pet for chewing the door or a cabinet, but if one of the owner's friends or followers knows the potential buyer, it could lead to trouble. If that damage takes place after the property is under contract, it could lay the groundwork for the buyer

to back out of the sale. It is not uncommon for a buyer to research the sellers of a property, which makes it important for sellers to have their social media accounts cleaned up when the listing goes live.

Kids follow other kids

Anyone with kids knows that kids talk to other kids and follow them socially. If a kid is moving, he or she is going to tell their friends and those friends may know members of the family purchasing the home. Teenagers are more likely to post images to TikTok or Snapchat that could negatively impact a real estate sale. For example, our agency represented a buyer that backed out of a sale because their kids saw a video of the sellers' kids throwing objects onto the roof. Closing was coming up and the home inspection was already done, at which time the roof was in good shape. The buyers didn't want to risk buying a home with new roof damage, and other unseen damages, so they backed out.

Social media is not the place for negotiations

In an effort to reach more potential buyers, many sellers share their house's listing on their private pages, and in some cases a friend ends up purchasing the home. While it's great that a friend or colleague wants to

buy the property, negotiations should not take place via social messages. Trying to negotiate pricing, changes or updates directly, instead of through the listing agent, can put the sellers in an uncomfortable position.

Sharing a home's details on social media has become common for many sellers, and viewing pictures and listings is common for buyers. Some buyers even follow hashtags to stay current on what's happening in a specific region or a type of architecture. Experienced realtors are familiar with the pros and cons of social media when it comes to real estate, but as a buyer, it's important to remember that once the listing is live, any photos shared online have potential to reach the buyer. Remind children to not share images of them doing things in the home or the yard while the house is for sale or pending. There are numerous ways for a buyer to research a homeowner and the property, so don't make a mistake that could put a sale at risk. We suggest sellers make two posts about their property. The first is when it's live and people can view it, and the second is on closing day.

JCBank breaks ground in Greenwood

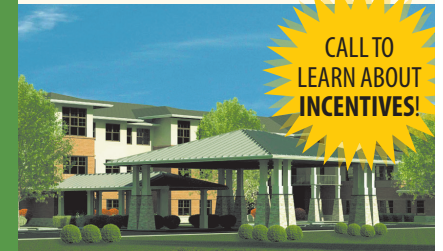

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Weekly Devotion



For verily I say unto you, If ye have faith as a grain of mustard seed, ye shall say unto this mountain, Remove hence to yonder place; and it shall remove; and nothing shall be impossible unto you.

MATTHEW 17:20

One of the most well-known scriptures is the verse that states faith as small as a mustard seed can move mountains. I felt challenged to answer a question many of us have asked ourselves. How do we know which mountains we are to climb, and which we are to ask God to move out of our way? On one hand, scripture tells us to be still and know He is God. God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in times of trouble. And on the other hand, scripture tells us that those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will mount up on wings as eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint. Then how do we know when we are to climb the mountains of life and when we are to ask God

to move the mountains out of our path? The answer had to be to pray and listen for God's answer. But what do we do when we don't hear God's answer? Are we wasting time climbing the wrong mountains? I tossed and turned, unable to sleep as I racked my brain to find a definitive answer to share with the congregation. Then God spoke to my heart and told me that I was asking the wrong question. Victory is not found at the top of the mountain, and failure is not found in the valleys below. God is found in the climb! God's presence is the victory. Trust in God and embrace the climb!

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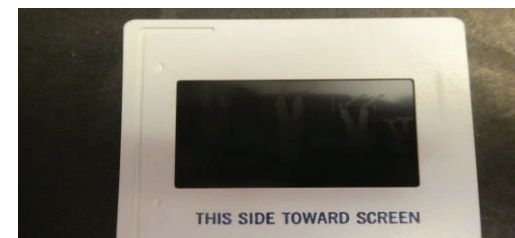
