## The Nicholson-Rand House #2

### HAUNTS & JAUNTS

When David Nicholson began building his Gothic-Revival home in the small settlement of Valley Mills on the southwest fringe of Indianapolis, he was also involved in the construction of the Marion County Courthouse in downtown Indianapolis. Many of the design features and construction materials from the courthouse happened to materialize in this home. Back in the day the journey from downtown to Valley Mills was an all day trek along a series of twisty dirt roads. Rumor was a constant caravan of horse drawn wagons delivered building materials to the house site. Colored tile in the home was the same as in the courthouse, as was interior woodwork. Was it leftover material? Regardless, Nicholson's home, and the courthouse, were both completed at practically the same time in 1876.

The home—with ties to the downtown courthouse and eventually DePauw University—weathered decades of history until it finally rested empty and abandoned. Saved for preservation, it was moved in 1997 to its present location at a corner lot on Southport and Mann Roads. The town of Valley Mills, once complete, with a post office, has faded from memory. Yet, the home that Nicholson built gained a new lease on life after the move—new ownership, with an eye towards bringing it back to its former glory. A photo taken during the move started tongues wagging about a “haunted” house. The rest, as they say, is history!

Mike Fender's photo of a young blond girl wearing a blue dress in an upstairs window during the move of the house garnered a lot of media attention. Fender felt that it was a natural anomaly, caused by a trick of the light on the window glass. He reasoned the blue dress could be explained away because the room itself was blue. However...it appears the figure is standing between the curtain and the window glass. And...when the photo is blown up, re-

gardless of the resolution, the figure does not distort. This photo became the birth of stories that would come soon after; and the evolution of an urban myth.

Forthcoming stories seem pulled out of the air. Who was the blond girl in the blue dress? Nicholson and his first wife's daughter? The ghost of a former tenant who had fallen out of that very window? A young girl accidentally killed by hunters in nearby woods? The ghost of a child buried in a nearby family cemetery? Then, came the tale of a former renter hanging himself in an upstairs bedroom; a kindly woman's spirit hanging around; blood dripping from the walls, muffled screams, and the odor of decaying flesh. My favorite is the home was a stop on the Underground Railroad where slaves perished in an accidental basement fire. (I believe they have this mixed up with the Hannah House)

None of these stories have been verified. However, through the years, and a turnover of occupants, events not reported, or else swept under the rug, could have most certainly contributed to this urban legend: unwanted pregnancies, a 'simple' minded child being hidden away, illness or a death within the house. There are always the possibilities.

One internet site proclaims that the Nicholson-Rand home is one of the most haunted sites in the country. Present owners have never reported any paranormal activity of any kind. I would imagine by now they are weary of sightseers parking in their drive to get a closer look at the home with the stories. I suppose owning it comes with the territory.

On June 22, 2003, the home was listed with the National Register of Historic Places.

# TAKING FLIGHT

Southport sophomore works to earn her pilot's license

Katie Essex sat in the left-hand seat of the Cessna 172 airplane with her hands in her lap, watching in total amazement as her instructor guided it off of the ground. It was only her second time in an airplane in her life, and seeing it from the cockpit was exhilarating.

Everything was going according to plan: She was in the plane, seeing the knowledge she had learned in ground school in use.

But that's where they diverged from the plan. Essex's flight instructor asked her a simple question.

"Do you want to take control?"

Of course, she did. She put both hands firmly on the yoke and started steering the plane. Everything she had learned in ground school came to life, and she was in control.

"My first flying experience was something that kind of changed my life," Essex said. "I really knew that this was something that I knew I was going to love and I knew that I could see myself doing."

Flying has been a part of her life from the beginning, and its impact on her life is immense.

Just as most people grow up wanting to learn to drive, Essex, now a sophomore, grew up wanting to fly.

She was surrounded by flying from a very early age. Her dad worked at an airport, and she had always had a fascination with planes.

"I absolutely loved being around them,

seeing what people did," Essex said.

The seed was planted early, but it wasn't until last year that she acted on her interest.

Mark Snodgrass, computer science teacher at Southport, pushed her to pursue aviation after meeting her during student council.

During that meeting, Snodgrass asked her an important question.

"I asked her what she wants to do when she leaves this place," Snodgrass said. "And she said she wanted to be a pilot. So I said, 'Let's go be a pilot.'"

Snodgrass was the perfect person to aid Essex on her journey, given that he has connections to many pilots. His own son flies planes, so he was familiar with the process.

He is currently working on a partnership with Greenwood Airport that will allow students to take night classes to earn their license. These classes would also count for high school graduation credits.

Snodgrass hopes that this partnership will make becoming a pilot more accessible to students.

Essex credits Snodgrass with getting her to apply for ground school at Greenwood Airport.

"He is definitely the person who has

sparked a lot of this for me," Essex said. "Just getting to meet him and learn about what he does and planes, was something that was really important for me."

Snodgrass, however, remains humble and gives her the credit.

"All I can do is provide the opportunity," Snodgrass said. "She grabbed it and ran."

And run she did. She applied for ground school, and eventually got accepted. Ground school is like the flying version of driver's ed.

It's where people are taught all of the important background information necessary to fly a plane.

The day after Essex was accepted to ground school, she went to class.

"We walked around the airport and we got to see all the planes and they told us about the structure of the planes, what's kind of in planes and a little bit about how they fly," Essex said.

Ground school was not easy. The same course that she took is also offered at C9, but there, it is a two-year class. Her ground school program at Greenwood Airport fit that all into four months, from January to April 2021.

During this time, Essex went to the airport three times a week for two hours. Outside of class, she had to read her textbook

and studied all things flying.

During her time in ground school, she was also keeping up with her school work at SHS and had to balance the numerous aspects of her life. Many students struggled to keep up with school work during last year's COVID-19 environment, and adding in ground school only made it harder.

"It was a lot. I'm not gonna lie to you," Essex said.

But, this busy schedule allowed her to obtain many valuable skills the majority of people don't learn until adulthood.

She learned what studying methods worked best for her, how to apply textbook information in the real world and most importantly how mental health fits into a professional life.

"I have begun to learn how to balance a career with regular life, with my mental health," Essex said. "As you start to get into anything huge, like this is, it's important to keep your own mental health in mind."

Even now that Essex is done with ground school, her schedule remains packed. Currently, she goes to the airport two times per week, looking at and talking about different planes with the instructors. This is all part of her preparation for the Federal Aviation Administration Written Exam.

This test consists of 60 questions, taken from a bank of over 750 possible questions. To pass, she must receive 70% or higher.

This test is extremely challenging according to Roger Tomey, Essex's ground school instructor.

"The questions are not usually easy to understand..." Tomey said. "You've got to read them very carefully. One word can change what the answer is."

But, he believes that Essex is well prepared for it and will succeed. Passing this exam allows her to start in-air training, the next section of her flying journey.

Normally, flight training is very expensive, at around \$200 per hour between the instructor and plane rental. But, she has that taken care of.

Essex applied for, and won, a \$10,000 scholarship through Greenwood Airport's chapter of the Experimental Aircraft Association. They give out a scholarship like this once every two years, and though there were other applicants, she had many qualities that earned her the scholarship.

"What made her stand out was her enthusiasm," Tomey said. "The way she filled out the application, she was very detailed. In that, she did a great job on the essay."

This scholarship will cover the cost of the 50 hours of in-plane training that Essex will need to complete in order to get her private-pilot license.

After she officially receives the scholarship (which she was scheduled to receive yesterday), she plans to start her training.

This means completing three hours of in-plane training each week. As has been the case with her entire journey, she won't be wasting any time getting started. Her first flight hour was scheduled for Monday, Sept. 13.

About halfway through her training, she

will be able to begin soloing and control the plane unaccompanied from takeoff to landing. If everything goes as planned, she will begin soloing in late November or early December, before she'll have her driver's license.

"It's always been so funny to me thinking about the legalities," Essex said. "The government will legally allow me to fly a plane before I can drive a car by myself."

When she reaches the end of her 50 in-plane training hours and turns 17 years old, she will be able to take the checkride, which when passed, will allow her to get her private pilot's license. This license enables her to fly with passengers, like her friends and family.

While Essex hasn't completely decided on what she wants to do in the future, she knows that it will be connected to flying.

"I want to double major in aerospace or aeronautical engineering as well as aviation because that'll build up flight hours through the aviation degree," Essex said.

Right now, she thinks that she either wants to become an Airline Transport Pilot, flying passengers commercially, or go into the Air Force, protecting U.S. citizens by flying in high-risk situations.

But, whatever she ends up doing, she knows one thing for sure. Essex wants her life to leave an impact. When she was younger, she wasn't sure how this would play out. But now, it's clear. Flying.

"I had always grown up and wondered, what was my passion? Where was I gonna fit into the world? And then there was flying," Essex said. "And now I can't see myself doing anything else."

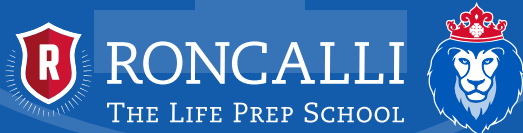
# Roncalli Salutes Our National Merit Semifinalists

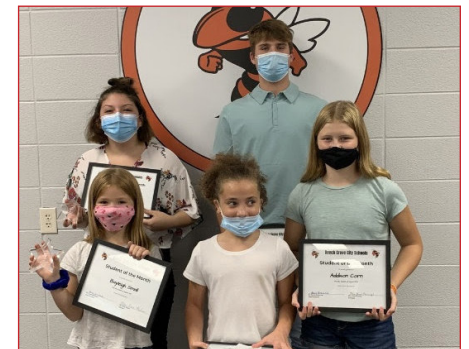

### Octagon shelves make a new way to show off family photos

In addition to being a writer and photographer, I've also become quite the do-it-yourselfer (DIYer) and the majority of that is because of Hannah, my girlfriend. When we first moved into our house, we were obsessed with making things to make it our own even though we're renting our house. The first project we did was making these octagon shelves.

Now, let me tell you, if you are going to tackle this for your first project, I would say one thing... Stay away!!! Although this project seems simple, it's not. Still being so new at house projects, we didn't have a lot of the tools needed to complete this project so we went ahead and bought them thinking we could use them for future projects so if you don't have some of the tools listed, that's okay, there are ways around them.

#### Items needed:

- Miter saw
- Stain / paint color of your choice
- Wood glue
- Staple gun (Optional)
- Sandpaper/ sander
- Step by step

1. Cut six pieces of 1 in x 3 in or 1 in x 4 in size wood the same length depending on how big you want

your hexagon shelves. (I recommend getting the ten foot board and having the employees cut it in half if you have a small car.)

2. Using a miter saw, take your equal pieces and cut a 30 degree angle into each side of the board.
3. Line up boards in a straight line and tape the flat ends together.
4. Flip pieces over and tape along the back ends of the pieces.
5. Put glue in between each piece, make sure to wipe the extra glue away. (If you don't wipe away the glue, your stain won't take to the wood.
6. Being careful not to break the tape, fold up pieces and glue the final piece, wipe glue clean again then hold for a few minutes and let sit overnight.
7. (Optional) Staple gun the back side of the boards for extra strength.
8. Using your choice of stain or paint, apply multiple coats to your wood and let dry overnight to make sure it is fully completed.
9. Hammer a nail into the spots where you want your shelves, then center the L-bracket inside the top of the shelf and screw in, then hang on the nail.
10. Show off your new shelves and marvel at your new home decor.

## The Card Counter

### A gambler's struggle against his past

Paul Schrader as a writer and director, has a trope of focusing on characters outside of the mainstream of their culture. People with darkness inside of them, hidden behind their work, coined by the first film to feature this trope as, "God's lonely man". In *First Reformed* it was a priest, in *Mishima* it was a poet, and now in *The Card Counter* Oscar Isaac plays a professional poker player. For Schrader it's a natural fit because as a professional bluffer, Isaac's character is always hiding and trying to gauge the intentions of others around him. However, what's strikingly different about *The Card Counter* is the main character's resistance towards his dark past overtaking his life. It's a welcome variance in the Schrader formula that makes for another satisfying addition to Schrader's lonely man canon.

William Tell (Oscar Isaac) is a character who survives through routine.

The first lines of dialogue in the film are explaining how well Tell adjusted to incarceration. Giving his life rhythm and structure gave him stability after a history of horrors threatens to constantly overtake his mind. Hiding away as a small-time poker player, his routine quickly becomes disrupted by a young man named Cirk (Tye Sheridan) seeking revenge on behalf of his father and in turn Tell as well. Tell believes that he can find absolution in convincing Cirk to drop his quest for revenge, while Cirk believes he can tap into Tell's trauma to convince him to aid in his violent ambitions.

Schrader's strengths have always lied in theme and tone, and this film is no exception. Each scene oozes with a quiet tension between William Tell and the world around him. This tension becomes explicit as Tell's past is revealed to the audience and it becomes clear that he could never comfortably exist side by side with everyday people.

The filmography of Paul Schrader has always been indebted to the great for-

malists of arthouse cinema like Ozu and Dryer, but especially here Schrader is channeling Robert Bresson. Interpolating scenes from his seminal work *Pickpocket*, and beautifully borrowing his tight camerawork, *The Card Counter* is a decidedly slow but intentionally paced film.

Unfortunately, despite the film working at a macro level, the film does suffer moment to moment. Some dialogue can seem unbalanced or tonally at odds, but ultimately this doesn't account for much of the runtime. As one of my favorite filmmakers ever, Schrader has constructed a genre all his own and *The Card Counter* is a worthy addition to his already legendary career. *The Card Counter* is currently showing in theaters.

## Unlikely to wince at minced oaths

I grew up in the buckle of the Bible Belt. Although Norman, Oklahoma is home to a large state school (Boomer Sooner!), the area is steeped in religious tradition. As a child, I wasn't allowed to cuss, curse, swear or otherwise utter profanity. For that reason, I collected bad words like baseball cards. I'd privately trade them with friends at recess but wouldn't dare say them aloud in front of family or grownups.

In the place of off-limits words, we had what I called "substitute swears." As it turns out, there's a term for this type of euphemism: minced oaths.

I should share some examples to jog your memory. Have you heard anyone yell, "Fudge!" That's a minced oath. If someone blurts "sugar," "shucks" or "shoot" as an interjection, they're likely using those words in the place of a different word with the same starting sound of "sh-"

Minced oaths aren't new. In fact, we can trace them in English back to the 14th century, where we see the words "gog" and "kokk" pop up as euphemisms for "God." Saying God's name in vain, after all, breaks one of the Ten Commandments. I know this because, as a Southern Baptist in Oklahoma, I excelled at saying "gosh" and "golly."

In popular culture, my favorite minced oaths show up in the recently-ended NBC comedy "The Good Place." The show takes place in a heaven-like afterlife where the characters' profanities are automatically changed to other words, including "fork," "shirt," "ash" and "bench."

In my opinion, minced oaths are the off-brand cereals of cuss words. The words don't hold the same power as a well-placed four-letter word. Although I wouldn't consider myself a potty mouth, sometimes the occasion calls for a word that packs a profane punch.

Adopting too many minced oaths into your lexicon runs the risk of you sound-

ing like fictional characters Gomer Pyle or Ned Flanders. Some phrases are so tame that most people probably don't even realize they started life as substitutionary swear words. "My goodness" began as a way to dodge saying "My God." "Cheese and crackers," as well as "jeepers creepers" and "Jiminy Cricket" took the place of saying "Jesus Christ."

Whether you realize it or not, many of our phrases have roots in religious cursing or general profanity. In formal settings or with acquaintances, it's probably a good idea to water down harsh speech. After all, you don't want to end up in the H.R. director's office. I hear that guy's a real son of a gun.

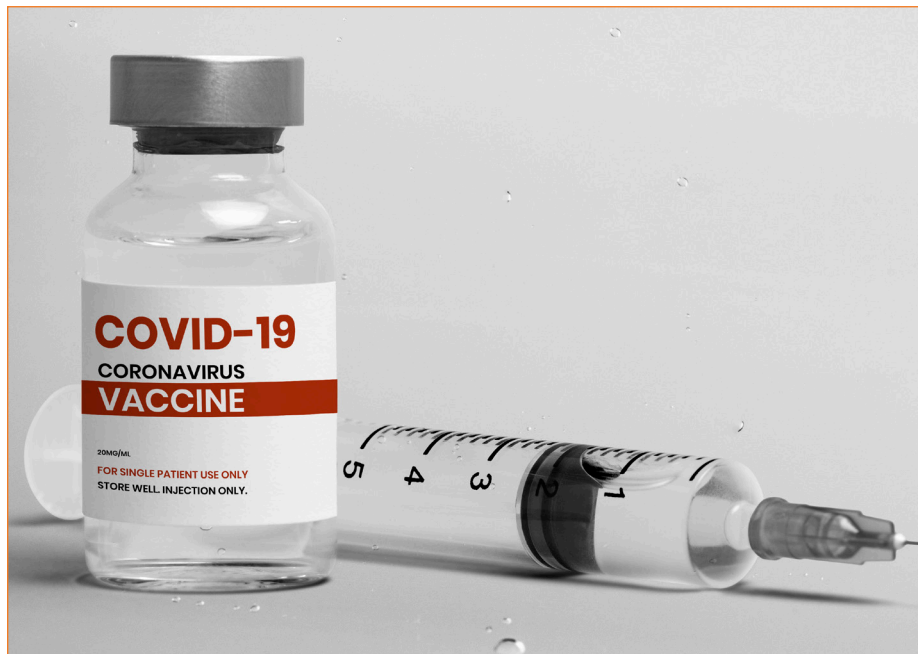

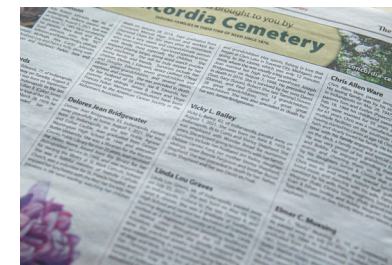

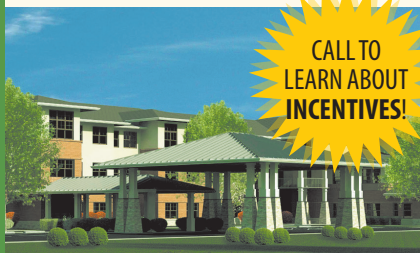

REVELATION 3:11-13

As I read this passage of Scripture I am brought to my spiritual knees in humble recognition of the power of Christ. First He tells us that "I come quickly" which does not mean soon but suddenly. It has been nearly two thousand years since He spoke these words to John and this being true, He has not come quickly, at least in man's calculation of time but, He will come suddenly and when He is least expected. He says that He personally will see to it that He will make those that He honors "pillars" in the temple of His God and write upon them the "name of His God" and "His new name" and they will be given permanent residence and citizenship in the "New Jerusalem" that comes directly down from heaven. The New Jerusalem is the church of God. Praise the Lord and to be accepted into it is the greatest privilege given to men and women of God.
