## Conversations with my mother before she died

My mother died in 2015. I was responsible for her caregiving. Even to this day, there are still those moments when I ask myself—"Could I have done anything differently?"

Mom was a control freak and had always been, but I loved her regardless. In 1985 when my dad suddenly died her world went upside down...and into a direction no one ever wishes to go: dealing with suddenly being alone, insurance, finances, burial, and both my grandparents (my dad's parents) very much still alive. I was the one that awoke them at 5:30 AM to the news that their son, and my father, had died. It was a surreal experience that I never care to repeat! They both rapidly deteriorated after that morning and it was my mom that had to care for them!

My grandmother Bessie eased into dementia, closely followed by full blown Alzheimer's. We made the decision to remove her from my grandparent's home after she appeared over my Grandfather Rhee's bed several times in the early morning hours, holding a cast iron skillet and screaming, "Who are you!" My grandfather claimed he could take care of her, but he couldn't. She became a resident of the

Alzheimer's wing at Community Hospital South where wackiness soon ensued.

Rhee, although physically challenged with a bum hip, remained in the house for a while. We tried to make it work for him. We had Meals on Wheels delivered. He didn't go for that! "It tasted like cardboard," he said. He became defiant and appeared to be gradually easing into dementia himself. After a hip replacement, my mother placed him into a room at Community South for rehabilitation. He died shortly thereafter, 12/27/1993. He simply gave up. Grandmother Bessie didn't attend the funeral. Mentally she was already gone, living in another world of her own choosing. She died a few months later, 06/25/1994. My mother found her in her room with her mouth open and unfocused eyes directed towards the ceiling. No one should have to experience that, but my mother did!

A big chunk of my world abruptly slipped away. Rhee had taught me how to hunt, fish, drive a car, and harvest Ginseng. Bessie taught me about the virtues of Campbell's Bean w/ Bacon soup, set up my first bank savings account, gave me my first Bible and expounded the virtues of the Lord. I wasn't ready to let go, but then again, are we ever?

With the responsibility of my grandparents behind her my mom tried to move on, but she

couldn't. She was lonely. She made some bad decisions. One was remarrying. I didn't like it, but I wanted her to be happy. She retired from AT&T and decided to be closer to her family in Jamestown, Kentucky. My childhood home on South Post Road was sold and I helped them move to her new home on a bluff above Lake Cumberland. The marriage didn't last and once again she was alone. Her house, and nearby family, became her refuge. I visited often and loved the house and location. However, it gave off a weird vibe from day one. I always felt that there were more presences present there than just us. Mom would smile slightly and ask, "Do you think it's haunted?" Then I didn't know...

now I'm sure it is. My mother's house is now MY house.

Life moved forward and all was well, until my mom got sick and her life spiraled into a different direction. And the house got even weirder. But that's a story for another time...







# Bringing fiber internet to your neighborhood

## JC REMC expands fiber internet network

In the 1930s, electricity made its way gradually across our great nation. However, this progress was impeded by the fact many investor-owned utilities believed serving rural areas to be an unprofitable use of time and resources. It was foresight from the leaders of agricultural communities in rural America who knew that electricity was vital to the progress of our country.

With federal funding available through the newly created Rural Electrification Administration (REA), cooperatives began springing up across America. An REMC (Rural Electric Membership Cooperative) is a power option where those receiving service are a member-owner of a not-for-profit electric utility. The rates and charges of all Indiana REMCs are regulated at the local level rather than at the state level. Founded in 1935, the Johnson County Rural Electric Membership Cooperative began operations with 1,129 members. Today, the JC REMC serves over 21,000 members with over 1.650 miles of distribution line.

However, the JC REMC has not stopped looking for ways to service its rural community. In 2012, JC Fiber was launched as

a subsidiary to JC REMC with the installation of 180 miles of fiber optic cable. Fiber-optic internet, commonly called fi-

ber internet, or simply "fiber," is a broadband connection that can reach speeds of up to 940 Megabits per second, with low lag time. The technology uses fiber-optic cable, which can send data as fast as about 70% the speed of light. JC Fiber has recently announced that it is moving towards its third stage of expanding its broadband internet infrastructure.


John Sturm, president and CEO of JC REMC said, "It's the best available technology. It's fast, it's local, it's reliable, and you are going to get the same outstanding service you get with our electricity." Sturm continued, "It really enables people to educate at home, work at home, entertain at home, and do all the things people would like to do with

reliable internet while balancing a rural life. Especially as education, and even health-care, becomes more virtual. Reliable and fast internet has become more and more a

necessity."

Nick Stainbrook, director of fiber operations furthered Sturm's point.

"Back in 1935 when JC REMC was starting there was this great need for rural electricity. Over the course of time we have built up a great reputation by providing just that. Our company saw our members' needs now more than ever with the pandemic. Fast internet is lacking in these Johnson County rural areas, and our members need this service. We are proud to be taking the next step on expansion."

Stainbrook feels confident in the direction the fiber internet plan has taken,

"We were hearing so many cries for help

from our members asking when they would be able to receive our fiber internet. People were telling us that they can not get anything done efficiently from home until our fiber gets out here. This really is a community service project."

The JCREMC Board of Directors took action in December 2020 to expand JC-Fiber's network to reach 5,000 additional members over four years. Currently, approximately 950 residents and 150 businesses receive JC Fiber. This expansion plan will cover approximately 940 residents and businesses.

Sturm concluded, "It's time to bridge the digital divide separating rural and urban America, and JC Fiber is focused on bringing the absolute best technology available to our members in underserved areas. If we don't provide that high speed connection, nobody else will."

Sign up will begin in early 2022, and eligible residents and businesses in all newly served areas will be notified when service becomes available. Additional expansion zones will be announced in 2022. Learn more about JCFiber at jcfiber.com.

#### **Salvation Army starts** up Coats for Kids in Central Indiana this year

Coats - The Salvation Army is hosting Coats for Kids again this year at the Indiana State Fairgrounds on October 16. This year marks a return to in-person shopping experiences for families after a drive-thru model was used during the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020. In order to maintain social distancing and eliminate lines, parents will need to register their children in advance and choose an appointment time. Registration opens online September 27and will remain open until all time slots are filled. Parents are encouraged to register their children early before space runs out. It is anticipated that around 2,500 children will be served this fall through the annual Coats for Kids program. Coats for Kids serves any school-aged children in Central Indiana in need of a warm winter gear. In order to register, parents and guardians will need to visit salarmy.org and provide information about the number, size, and gender of coats their children will be shopping for on distribution day. Once submitted, parents will receive a confirmation via email, which will need to receive their time ticket when they arrive at the fairgrounds on October 16. Children will need to be present in order to receive a coat on distribution day. For 35 years the Coats for Kids program has helped families in need keep their children warm and safe through the long winter months. The event officially kicked off on Aug. 30 with the start of coat collections at seventeen central Indiana Classic Cleaners locations. Locations can be found at ClassicCleaners. net. Bins will remain out through October 8. Volunteers are still needed for Coats for Kids set-up week (Oct. 11-15) and distribution day (Oct. 16). If you are unable to drop off a coat at Classic Cleaners, The Salvation Army's "Online Coat Shop"makes it easy to donate cash to support the program. "We've all been super dedicated to our goals this season and that's really helped us succeed," said Halter, who has committed to play for the University of Texas next year.

The Royals finished 22-9 in 2020.

"Last year we only had two seniors," Halter said. "This year, in my opinion, having six seniors has been

one of our strengths. Our outside hitters and my set hitters have been super helpful in serve receive and defense, which has really given us huge advantages on the court."

Roncalli has lost in the Class 4A regional each of Halter's first three years. The Royals lost in the regional opener last year and in the final in 2019 and 2018.

"This year the goal is get out of regionals and win state," Halter said. "As a team, we believe we can."

Halter has been a libero since she was

"I like the physical aspect and being on the court 99 percent of the time," she said. "As a short person, I obviously can't be an outside or right-side (hitter), being able to be on the court and be a leader through the entire game is my favorite part. As I've grown in my role, I've

gained confidence, which helped me to be a leader. I just make sure I'm there for my teammates on and

off the court. If they know they can trust me off the court, they know they can trust me on the court, too."

Erzamus, who spent three years as Royals assistant coach before becoming head coach in 2020, said it has been joy coaching Halter.

> "She brings so much to the table and is a great teammate on and off the court," Erzamus said.

"It is no wonder she is a great kid, her

mom Kathy is the program's team mom, her sister Courtney, a Roncalli alumni is our freshman head coach and assists with varsity, and her dad Gary is the nicest guy who gets pumped up for the matches more than the players do."

Courtney played volleyball for IUPUI. In addition to volleyball, Halter is a guard for the Roncall's basketball team.

"I grew up playing everything," Halter said. "I played travel softball for years. I ran track and cross country. But volleyball has always been my favorite."

Halter, who plans to compete in unified track and field this season, chose Texas over Indiana University and Purdue University prior to her junior season.

"I visited multiple schools but visited Texas and fell in love with the environment, the school itself," Halter said. "I went to a game and I was like this is where I need to be. The coaches are amazing. The girls all seem to get along super well. I talked to the girls and they told me their experience and that helped me as well."

## **Eskenazi Health Provides Fall Burning Season Safety Tips**

The fall season is here and for many it's an exciting time to enjoy sitting around



bonfires with family and friends, taking in the wonderful seasonal aroma of burning leaves and many other outdoor activities. It's also a time to be aware that many enjoyable pastimes

of the season can result in dangerous fires brought on by the careless use of outdoor fire pits, grills and patio heaters.

Doctors with the Richard M. Fairbanks Burn Center at Eskenazi Health encourage everyone to take the utmost caution in pursuing traditional fall activities, particularly the one's where fire is used for any reason.

If you're considering lighting any kind of fire, it's wise to ensure that outdoor fires are legal in your community. If outdoor fires are permitted, only build them where they can be easily contained.

While starting your fire it's absolutely essential to resist the temptation to use accelerants such as lighter fluid to grow your fire in a hurry because it can be extremely unsafe. Not only can accelerants release toxic fumes, but they can start an explosion or cause your fire to grow too quickly and get out of control.

Before heading out to the fire pit or bonfire, check for restrictions or warnings issued by your local government's air quality department. When pollution levels are high, they may issue "no burn" restrictions to limit particulate matter and carbon dioxide levels

Safety is always the chief concern this time of year and we suggest that you never leave any fire unattended because a sudden slight gust of wind may blow sparks onto surrounding leaves, dry grass or brush, and the result could be a catastrophe causing personal injuries and damage to valuable property. To prevent that from happening it's always wise to have a garden hose and buckets of water nearby whenever you're dealing with fire.

Anytime you're finished with an outdoor fire, be sure to douse the flames with plenty of water and stir the ashes to make sure the fire is completely out, and you'll want to continue adding water until everything is cold to the touch. Another helpful safety tip is when using a patio heater, always remember to turn it off when you go inside.

It's also important to do everything you can to keep your roof clear of leaves and other debris, which will go a long way towards preventing sparks, power lines or lightning from starting a house fire.

While outside enjoying fall activities, remember that the COVID-19 virus is still a danger and we recommend everyone observe social distancing and remain six feet apart from other people. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), that's especially true for older adults who are more likely to get very sick from COVID-19, which means they may require hospitalization, intensive care, or a ventilator to help them breathe, or they might even die. The risk increases for people in their 50s and even more so for those in their 60s, 70s and 80s. People 85 and older are the most likely to get very sick.

The Richard M. Fairbanks Burn Center wants to decrease the number of burn injuries this fall by educating the community and encouraging everyone to be extra careful this time of year. The burn center



# A column about nothing

My daughter likes to ask me what my name is. I say "Dad." Pointing to her nose, she asks, "What's this?" I replied, "Nose." Then she opens her empty hands and asks, "What am I holding?" to which I say, "Nothing." Putting my answers together, she says, "See? Dad knows nothing." She's four.

This led me to thinking — I can rattle off several words that mean "nothing." Today I'd like to define variations and synonyms of "nothing."

"Bubkes" (or "bupkes", "bupkus") is the Yiddish word for "nothing" or "the least amount." If the local high school football team is lousy, you might say, "They won't win bubkes this season."

"Diddly-squat" means "the least amount" or "anything at all." If, in fact, dad knows nothing, diddly-squat is slightly more than absolute zero.

"Goose egg" is a sports term meaning "zero." It is a term taken from the shape of the numeral zero, which resembles an egg.

"Hill of beans" means the least important amount or value. If my debate opponent didn't look favorably on my argument, he might say, "Your unverifiable statistics about annual falling coconut deaths don't amount to a hill of beans!"

"Nada" is a Spanish word for "nothing." If you're looking for "nothing," you've found it.

"Nil" also means "nothing." We get it from the Latin word "nihil." If you're considering taking up nihilism as your guiding life philosophy, it won't amount to anything.

"Naught" (also "nought") is a flexible word that can mean "nothing, zero, or not much." The spelling variant "nought" was more popular than "naught" up until the late nineteenth century.

"Null" often takes on legal connotations, meaning "having no legal or binding force." We get it from the Latin word "nullus," which means "none."

"Zilch" means "nothing," but around the 1930s it meant "an insignificant person." The word's origins are early twentieth century, and in 1931 we find a character in the comic "Ballyhoo" called "Mr. Zilch."

"Zip," as a verb, can mean "fast." But, as a noun, "zip" means "zero" or "nothing." If your lousy hometown high school football team scores no points, you might say, "Those bums lost twentyseven to zip."

If you run into my daughter in the line for preschool pick up, you can tell her that, yes, her dad knows nothing. But he certainly knows quite a bit about nothing.
