### Southside construction update

New road closures begin along State Road 37

#### **Compiled by Nicole Davis**

• I-69 Indianapolis: Waterline work which started Oct. 10 will close lanes on northbound State Road 37/Harding Street and the I-465 interchange exit ramps between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. each day. One lane near the Pilot Travel Center will be closed through early November.

Bridge work on the future Southport Road over I-69 requires nighttime single lane closures on S.R. 37. Traffic signal construction west of S.R. 37 at Wellingshire Boulevard and the realigned Belmont Avenue will stop nighttime Southport Road traffic intermittently for up to 20 minutes.

Daily drainage pipe installation will restrict Wicker Road to one lane near S.R. 37. A temporary signal alternates two-way traffic between 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m.

• I-69 Johnson County: Bridge work on the future Smith Valley Road over I-69 will require single lane closures on S.R. 37 midweek between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Bluff Road near the former Bluffdale Road intersection with S.R. 37 is closed for a month for realignment. Drivers can access either end of the closure from Fairview Road to the north or Wakefield Road to the south. Steel posts are being delivered along Old S.R. 37 near the Oak Meadows Mobile Home Community ahead of noise barrier work that is expected to begin in the coming weeks. ### Beech Grove introduces balanced budget

**Aproaching Final Vote** - Beech Grove Mayor Dennis Buckley's 11th city budget invests in public safety and boosts pay for city employees, the City of Beech Grove announced. The \$14 million budget also boasts the highest fund balances in more than 42 years. The budget, which was introduced to the Beech Grove Common Council on Oct. 3, reflects an increase of \$340,000 in spending on public safety. Beech Grove Police officers will receive a 12% raise in 2023, while Emergency Management personnel will receive an 8% raise. The budget also includes five new police cars and one new state-of-the-art ambulance. The budget also invests in the city's human capital, with full-time city employees slated to receive between 3 to 5% raises. Department of Public Works employees are in line for 8% raises. Elected officials will not receive a pay increase. The budget also proposes new equipment to enhance city services, including one new vehicle for the Beech Grove Senior Citizens Center, two new dump trucks, and one utility bucket truck. The Common Council will have a final vote on the budget on Oct. 17. To learn more, go to beechgrove.com.

## Perseverance pays off for Greenwood teacher

### Andrice Tucker uses his experience to teach his students to never give up

#### **By Todd Travis**

### A big surprise

Last week Andrice Tucker, an automotive technology teacher at Central Nine Career Center, was surprised with the presentation of the 2022 Harbor Freight Tools for Schools Prize for Teaching Excellence – along with a \$50,000 check. Central Nine's high school skilled trades program will receive \$35,000, and Tucker will receive \$15,000. On what he thought was going to be a normal Tuesday, Andrice received an award he had been pursing for over two years.

"This year in particular, they had things set up for me. They even had my family there, and my wife kept it a secret because they all knew ahead of time. So they just told me they need a photo-op, which is pretty standard. But when I walked over, they had the balloons and cameras out there and everything," Tucker remembered.

### About the award

The Harbor Freight Tools for Schools Prize for Teaching Excellence was started in 2017 by Eric Smidt, the founder of national tool retailer Harbor Freight Tools, to recognize outstanding instruction in the skilled trades in U.S. public high schools and the teachers who inspire students to learn skills to prepare for life after graduation. The 2022 prize drew a record 768 applications from all 50 states and included three rounds of judging, each by an independent panel of experts from industry, education, trades, philanthropy and civic leadership.

Out of those applicants, Tucker was one of just 20 winners for this prize.

### Never giving up

"This award really meant something to me because to get it, I had to keep trying. I told my students that I didn't just get the award in one time, so it's important for them too to keep trying at whatever they're doing because eventually they can succeed," Tucker expressed.

### Returning to his roots

The Central Nine Ca-

reer Center means a lot to Tucker because he was also a student there himself growing up. After working with Firestone for 14 years he was given the opportunity to come back to Central Nine and teach. His goal upon returning was to try and help push the program to get even better. "I wanted to get away from the idea of just standing in front of the students and talking. I wanted to show them examples, get them up to be active and doing as many labs as possible to get those concepts down. I basically turned it into more of a 70/30 perspective as far as lab vs. class," Tucker explained. "I think some of the success of this con-

cept has shown itself by the number of interns we've had out and the amount of partners we have now in the industry all down US-31," he added.

### Making an impact

In addition to the different trades that students learn at Central Nine, part of the goal is to make students marketable and employable.

"We don't just teach them the programs – we teach them discipline, attendance, showing up on time. A lot of things that

help them out really in any trade they end up in. At the end, making them marketable and employable is what gives the big impact in this program,» Tucker described.

One important message that Tucker is adamant about sharing is the need that exists in the job market for skills trade. Being in a program at Central Nine provides students with an opportunity to get into the job market and create an earlier income opportunity. In doing so, they are able to find out whether the skills trade is right for them while still having the opportunity to do more schooling while getting the experience of working in the job market.

"Just this past year I had a parent call me and tell me about how their kid was able to start working in the field and become successful. They didn't even realize they were going to be able to be that successful. Meanwhile, they were also still able to attend Ivy Tech while having that job and being able to provide for their family. That's the kind of experience that's so important for students to get," Tucker shared.

### Giving back to the students

Tucker plans to find creative ways to give some of the money he will be receiving back to the students.

"This may include helping students with tools, or whatever they need in the industry. And with \$35,000 of that money going to the program, I think for at least five years if not more we can put out a certain amount of money to give some of the top students that will help them get tools and help their careers," he said.

### Greenwood Mayor introduces ordinance directing \$1 million to local schools

**School Safety** – Today the city of Greenwood announced plans to direct \$1 million of federal funds to the city's three public school districts to enhance security efforts. Mayor Mark W. Myers introduced the ordinance, Ordinance No. 22-35, to the Greenwood Common Council at the Oct. 3 meeting. The funds from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) will be equally divided among the Clark-Pleasant Community School Corporation, Center Grove Community School Corporation and Greenwood Community Schools. Each district can be reimbursed for up to \$333,000 in security hard costs for items like cameras, system upgrades and physical security structures. "This funding will enhance our current safety efforts throughout our district and helps us move forward in big ways with providing additional school safety," said Terry Terhune, superintendent of Greenwood Community Schools. "Our daily goal is to make sure staff, students and parents feel safe in our schools, and we thank the City of Greenwood for investing in safety efforts for various school districts." The council unanimously approved the measure at its First Reading and will take it up for a public hearing and final approval on Oct. 17, after which the reimbursable grants will be immediately available to the schools.

Local income tax rates are determined by county officials and provided to DOR for review regarding compliance with Indiana law. Included, Johnson County will be 0.014, increased from 0.012. These tax rates affect businesses with employees who live or work in any of these counties and have income tax withholdings. For Indiana residents on Jan. 1, 2022, county tax rates for individuals are based on the employee's Indiana county of residence on that date. For individuals who are not Indiana residents on Jan. 1, 2022, county tax rates are based on the individual's county of principal business or employment on Jan. 1.



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

### **Malignant** A messy and confused thrill ride

Writer and director James Wan hardly needs an introduction these days. He's known for blockbuster horror franchises like Saw, Insidious and the most profitable horror franchise of all time, The Conjuring movies. He's made mainstream actions hits as well, with Aquaman under his belt, and with his unprecedented financial success comes more financial freedom. This leads us to his newest original horror concept, Malignant.

The film follows Madison as she begins to have visions of mysterious and violent murders that eventually are learned to be more than just visions. As Madison becomes implicated in these crimes, her sister Sydney begins to help Madison unravel the secret at the heart of these strange occurrences.

> The synopsis I provided is, of course, incredibly vague and that isn't an accident. Wan has crafted a film whose strength lies in shock and awe. It is rare that a film comes along that is so well made and so unique in its story. This of course only exists as a result of Wan making so much money for Warner Brothers, effectively giving him artistic license and financial freedom to make whatever weird idea he wanted.

This isn't to say the film is perfect; tonally, the film suffers from trying to be so many different movies. It starts as a

sort of sci-fi thriller, then morphs into a horror crime thriller, and then again shifts into a quasi-action movie. It's especially fun for trying so much and leans into its silliness often, but it is performed to various degrees of quality.

However, the biggest flaw in Wan's film is the performance from the lead actress, Anabelle Wallis. I would often find her line readings would be incredibly distracting from the movie because of how badly they stuck out from the rest of the cast. Certainly blame for this should be spread to the script and direction, but it's just a shame one performance holds this film back.

Thankfully, Malignant is still an enjoyable watch thanks to its high energy level and its "throw it all at the wall and see what sticks" attitude towards filmmaking. Malignant is available to stream on HBO Max.

### The Oxford comma debate: a grammar horror story

On days like this, kids in costumes aren't the only spooky things in the neighborhood. Did you know commas can save innocent lives? I wanted to avoid controversial subjects like killing in this column, but here we are discussing the only two certainties in life: death and punctuation.

In today's article, I'm going to settle the Oxford comma debate once and for all. How's that for a bold statement?

Suppose I wanted to list a few (three, to be precise) of my favorite things. I could say: I like eating, children and small animals. That was intended to read as a list of three things – not a list of one thing followed by examples (although I've heard squirrel bacon is excellent)! Most people

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think the Oxford comma (a.k.a. the serial, series or Harvard comma) is at odds with the AP Stylebook. This sentence doesn't need a comma after "Milky Ways" because it doesn't provide further clarity in the sentence's meaning, nor does it lead to misinterpretation.




