Franciscan Health study connects herbicide exposure to infant health risks

Nearly 99% of pregnant patients in Indiana observed in a study were exposed to a pesticide linked to premature births and lower birth weights. Paul Winchester, MD, neonatologist with Franciscan Health Indianapolis and principal author of the study, found that exposure to glyphosate – a commonly used pesticide used to kill weeds - may also increase the risk of neonatal intensive care unit admissions.

Southside construction update

New northbound S.R. 37 off-ramp to S.R. 144 expected to open to traffic

• I-69 Indianapolis: Southport Road traffic will shift onto the new bridge over future I-69. The southbound S.R. 37 exit ramp to Southport Road will also open. The existing S.R. 37 traffic signal and Southport Road to the east will remain open for all other traffic movements. The first changes drivers may see are activation of traffic signals that will control Southport Road at local roads east and west of the highway. Drivers should expect several traffic changes in the next month as additional ramp movements come online. Stay alert for a changing traffic pattern for Mann Road at Thompson Road and the on-ramp to eastbound I-465. The signal will give both directions of Mann Road a green light at the same time, requiring left-turning traffic to vield to oncoming traffic. Crews have fully removed the old I-465 center median between Mann Road and Harding Street and are beginning to repave the area. Expect nighttime left lane closures with construction trucks entering and exiting the traffic from the left lane. Trucks will

also be entering and exiting S.R. 37 traffic at Southport Road and Banta Road as paving of the future I-69 lanes continues in the area. Road crews are making progress in repaving Wicker Road following drainage structure installation near S.R. 37. Expect the temporary traffic signal to be removed by next week.

• I-69 Johnson County: The new northbound S.R. 37 off-ramp to S.R. 144 is expected to open to traffic this week. The S.R. 144 on-ramp to southbound S.R. 37 is expected to open before the end of the year. Expect the southbound S.R. 37 exit to S.R. 144 to shift slightly onto new pavement as early as this week. The new pattern will allow more room for traffic to decelerate. Bluff Road reopened late last week with temporary pavement markings. It was realigned near the former Bluffdale Road intersection. Ongoing bridgework for the future Smith Valley Road overpass will require daytime single-lane closures on S.R. 37. Work will move into the northbound S.R. 37 lanes after crews complete the southbound lanes.

Franciscan Health offers free outreach program to reduce risks of diabetes

Diabetes Prevention – Franciscan Health is reaching out to those who may be at risk of diabetes through its Diabetes Prevention Program. The initiative provides a supportive environment where participants work together in small groups to learn about healthier eating and boosting their physical activity to reduce their chances of contracting diabetes. The program is led by a trained lifestyle coach in a classroom setting, delivered over a 12-month period. It begins with weekly sessions for the first six months, followed by six monthly maintenance sessions. To be eligible to participate: must be at least 18 years old; overweight (Body Mass Index over 25) and at high risk of developing type 2 diabetes; diagnosed with prediabetic conditions; diagnosed with gestational diabetes at any time. Qualified participants can reach out to CIRFranciscanWellCare@franciscanalliance.org or call (317)-528-4962 to inquire about the program and to register. Individuals with type 1 or type 2 diabetes do not qualify for the program. The informational session is scheduled for 5 p.m. on Thursday, November 10th at South Emerson Church of God, 3939 S. Emerson Ave., Indianapolis. The first class for the 2022-23 class schedule is slated for 5-6:30 p.m. on Thursday, Dec. 1, at the same location.

A Patriotic vision

The Southport Flag Project was started by George Julius, a war veteran serving on the Southport City Council at the time. The idea came from the town of Wanamaker that had been doing a similar project for a number of years. His idea was to have a flag flown on every utility pole in Southport. Today that has amounted to over 270 flags flying throughout the area.

Julius was an ambulance driver in WWII and went in on the second wave to the beach of Normandy. He was the recipient of the Purple Heart. He passed away in 2011 but the Southport Flag Project has continued to fly and maintain the flags all around town. John Wombles joined the project from the start and welded all the brackets that secured the flags to the utility poles. Jack Harmon was the original treasurer of the project. Greg Dant was one of the original members and continues to be a member today.

Raising the funds in record time

When the project began, Ken Winslow

was asked to help raise money to the tune of about \$10,000.

"In 2002, George told me it was going to cost \$10,000 or more and that he thought

it might take up to four years to raise all the funds. So my brazen response to him was to prepare for May 2003. We'll have the money, you can buy the equipment and start putting things up – and that was achieved," Winslow stated

"The mayor at the time was Nanette Tunget, and she used to kid with people that if they didn't give \$20 to Kenny he'd camp out in your front porch," he laughed.

Flag upkeep and maintenance

Thomas Quinn, current chairman of the project, is responsible for getting the flags up each year and taking them down at the end of the year. He begins putting flags up

the last week in April so they're ready the first week in May. The flags are then taken down after 9/11 for the winter. Plaques can also be purchased to put up on the poles to

honor veterans and flag project members who have passed away. Those stay up all year round.

"Every year we put new flags on the exterior of the city. We go through all the flags and inspect their condition. When a flag begins to get faded and no longer looks respectful, we will retire those flags. The ones that are still in good condition, we will continue to fly them within the city," Quinn explained.

"It's really amazing to think how the project began. All of the brackets were welded and

made by hand, and everything was put up using a ladder. Today, when I put the flags up, I'm thankful to be able to use a bucket truck that the city has generously allowed us to use," he continued.

Retiring the flags

The Southport Flag Project holds a retirement ceremony where they can properly retire flags. This last year the ceremony was cancelled due to high temperatures, but the Boy Scouts were given the flags to retire. The boys can earn a badge for learning to properly fold and retire flags.

"We had some help from the son of one of our former members and his friends who are NASA engineers. A few of the brackets were needing to be replaced so we sent one of the brackets over to them and they made 10 exact replicas that we are now able to use to replace some of the damaged ones," Quinn mentioned.

"It's nice to have some of that outside support to keep this project going."

Servant's Heart Thanksgiving drive looks to fill the biggest need ever

Donations and volunteers needed to help feed families

This month, Servant's Heart of Indy is offering a turkey drive-through for the 20th consecutive year. The nonprofit has already seen a record year to serve over 25,000 lives so far through October. That trend is continuing as they have received a record request for 685 meals to be provided for families this Thanksgiving.

"In a normal year, we usually see about 500 requests for meals. This year, we blew right past that 500 all the way to 685. So I expanded to buy more gift certificates and more food to do at least 600, but 85 of these families are going to be on the waiting list," said Bill Boone, founder of Servant's Heart.

The Thanksgiving meals consist of green beans, corn, yams, mashed potatoes, stuffing, gravy, cranberries, a turkey gift certificate and sugar cream pies. Volunteers have a packing party on Friday night at Hornet Park Community Center. They set up all the products that have been received in stages. The

next morning, they build the boxes, fill them and distribute in the afternoon.

"We usually do three cars at a time in the drive through and we get through 500 families in two to three hours, so it's become a well-oiled machine," Boone mentioned.

By Nov. 16, all products must be received by Servant's Heart. A spreadsheet of the current need is listed on Servant's Heart Facebook page (facebook.com/profile. php?id=100064761576241) To donate food, please check the spreadsheet to see what is still needed. Servant's Heart is also looking for about 100 volunteers for Nov. 19 to assist with the drive. If interested in volunteering, email info@servantsheartindy.org and you will be sent a link to a signup genius where you can choose to join.

"We're also looking for food to feed the volunteers. We don't want to take food away from the drive, so we ask for donations to help feed the volunteers as well," Boone explained.





Greenwood resident David Craggs writes about his time in the A Shau Valley

Veteran's Memoir - David Craggs was drafted into the U.S. Army on Nov. 7, 1968. When he finally arrived in South Vietnam, on April 21, 1969, he was assigned to the 2/327th Infantry of the 101st Airborne Division. It was a total of five months from the time he was drafted until he received an "early out" and arrived home on June 14, 1970. It all started on Oct. 28, 1968, when he received a letter from the Department of the U.S. Army. David had decided that the U.S. Army could not win the war in Vietnam without his help. He said, "The Yellow Brick Road is now full of potholes." David completed his basic training at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo. and then on to Fort Ord, Calif. for Advanced Individual Training. He arrived in Anderson, Ind. on April 1 and then to Beardstown, Ill. to visit with family and friends. On April 16 he was at Ft. Lewis, Wash. with the next stop in Vietnam. After 156 days in the field with 12 helicopter combat assaults David was offered a job as a company clerk. Someone in his unit had mentioned to the company commander that he could type. He got the job. Plan to purchase his book, "Road to A Shau Valley" which came about after a reunion in Branson. The book is ISBN 9798848518092 and is available through Amazon. LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Let's honor those who have served our nation

As we approach Veterans Day, Friday, Nov. 11, 2022, please keep in mind the millions of young men and women who have served our nation since 1776 - 246 years ago. It is extremely important that we do not forget those individuals who wore the uniform, and some paid the ultimate sacrifices of their life, to keep the rest of us free.

I am sure that those of us who served in a combat zone, or an imminent danger area were always concerned if they were going to make it home. In Vietnam there were over 350,000 military individuals who were wounded and even lost an arm, leg, eyesight, hearing, etc. In all of the wars we have served in, there were those who were wounded and/or killed in action. These people should be kept in our thoughts as we enjoy the everyday freedom that they preserved for us. All we need to do is make sure that we honor our deceased military men and women.

Many Americans take for granted that they live in a nation with freedom, that we are not under military control, and that we can enjoy life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. This phrase comes from the United States Declaration of Independence which was adopted on July 4, 1776.

Veterans Day (originally known as Armistice Day) is a federal holiday in the U.S. observed annually on November 11, for honoring military veterans of the United States Armed Forces (who were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable).

It coincides with other holidays including Armistice Day and Remembrance Day which are celebrated in other countries that mark the anniversary of the end of World War I. Major hostilities of World War I were formally ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918 when the Armistice with Germany went into effect. At the urging of U.S. veteran organizations, Armistice Day was renamed Veterans Day in 1954.

Veterans Day, observed annually on Nov. 11, is a tribute to military veterans who have served in the U.S. Armed Forces. Not to be confused with Memorial Day, which honors those who died while in service, Veterans Day honors all military veterans, including those still with us.



The Banshees of Inisherin A darkly comic fable gets lost in allegory

Martin McDonagh is known for his witty black comedies. McDonagh made a name for himself as a playwright before making the transition to the screen with 2008's In Bruges, for which he won immediate critical and audience acclaim. Since then he has developed a signature style marked by clever word play, dark subject matter, and strong Irish accents. All of which showed up in force in his newest film, The Banshees of Inisherin.

Colum and Pádraic have been friends for as long as the inhabitants of Inisherin can remember. A sleepy rural island off the coast of Ireland, Inisherin seems to exist outside of the turmoil of the mainland civil war, which is still raging during our story set in 1923. One spring day however, Colum decides he needs to spend his

time more intentionally. As a consequence of this he wants to end his friendship with the friendly but dull Pádraic. When Colum's

wishes go ignored by Pádraic, in a desperate act of self-sabotage, Colum threatens to cut off one of his own fingers every time Pádraic chooses to talk to him.

To get the obvious out of the way, yes, the film is very funny and yes, the film is very dark. It functions both as a portrait of two characters working through their worst tendencies and a larger allegory for Irish culture. As a character drama the film works remarkably well. It balances laughs

and drama deftly, and its cast of characters are drawn with very thoughtful detail which

makes them all feel three-dimensional and realistic.

Helping to realize these characters are

an absolutely stacked cast of returning McDonagh regulars, Colin Farrell and Brendan Gleeson, and new players, Kerry Condon and Barry Keoghan. All of whom turn in excellent work, with my particular standout being the town fool played expertly by Keoghan. In order for his character to work he needs to walk a tightrope, being likable enough to be tragically misunderstood and enough of a scumbag that it makes sense why the island's residents hate him.

As for the allegorical level of the film, I imagine many

audiences will have a harder time connecting to the film. The conclusions that the film

draws on Irish infighting and their struggles against the British are readable, but muddy to say the least. It felt as though McDonagh might have sacrificed the larger meaning of the film to indulge in the character drama more and as a result the film does leave me feeling somewhat forgettable, if still a very well-made picture.

Despite being thematically confused, The Banshees of Inisherin is still a crowd pleaser that lends itself to the theater, if for nothing else to find an audience to share in uncomfortable laughter with. The Banshees of Inisherin is currently only in theaters. - 3.5/5 stars

Taylor Swift's 'Midnights' combines old-school lyrics, poetry, to go deep

If there is one thing I love more than grammar, it's The Beatles. In April 1964, the Fab Four held all five songs in the top five songs on the Billboard Hot 100 charts. This record held until Drake occupied nine out of the top 10 songs in 2021 when his album "Certified Lover Boy" dominated streaming services.

Now with Taylor Swift's "Midnights" and "Midnights (3am Edition)" albums, she's accomplished a first in music history – her hits occupy all of the top 10 songs on Billboard's list. The only caveat I'll bring to this accomplishment is that The Beatles didn't have the same streaming opportunities available to them back in the days of Beatlemania.

When I encounter a challenge to The Beatles' chart dominance, I have to check it out. And when I began listening to Swift's

"Midnights," I was struck by her lyrics.

Sure, she uses terms such as "ghosting" and her fair share of profanity, but I want to suggest that Swift's "Midnights" achieves poetry whose lyrical evolution has brought back lesser-used words and intricately weaves them into her modern experience.

Take the album's opening track "Lavender Haze." Not only does the title evoke parallels to Hendrix's "Purple Haze," but Swift's use of the word "melancholia" evokes a deeper emotion than a word as common as "depression."

In "Snow on the Beach," Swift breaks out "unbeknownst" and "'til" in a song that describes the strange experience of falling in love. Incorporating these lesser-used words gives her songs a sense of weightiness and importance that I think hold up alongside the stylistic diversity of "Midnights."

While Swift continues to pen deeply personal songs, many directed at one man who has wronged her in some way, her star singer/songwriter experience combines the loneliness of Elvis (who didn't write most

of his songs) with the pensiveness of Bob Dylan. All the while she enjoys the commercial success of The Beatles, who, like Swift, also fell victim to losing the rights to their music.

I know Grammar Guy doesn't usually cover music, but I'm suggesting poetry and language from a bygone era contribute to Swift's pensive pop music.

If you're unwilling to hear four-letter words, then this isn't the album for you; however, if you want to hear an exploration of "would've," "could've" and "should've" (and who doesn't?), then check out Swift's exceptional lyrical exploration in "Midnights."


