Southside construction update

Southbound State Road 37 drivers to detour from State Road 144

• I-69 Johnson County: The last bridge beams over the future I-69 will be delivered and staged early this week. Motorists should expect short stoppages on northbound S.R. 37 between Fairview Road and Bluffdale Drive as large trucks are brought into the work zone. Bridge crews plan to set the beams following the holiday weekend. Road crews expect to cease operations by noon on Wednesday for Thanksgiving. Motorists should watch for clean-up work on the shoulder when traveling for the holidays.

• I-69 Johnson County: Construc-

tion crews expect to remove the signal and close the intersection of Banta Road at S.R. 37 in early December to allow for the completion of the S.R. 144 interchange. The Banta Road closure will occur before the southbound on ramp from S.R. 144 is connected, requiring southbound motorists to use the official detour of S.R. 37 to County Line Road or local access roads to Smith Valley Road or the Henderson Ford interchange.

* Safety Tip: With the temperature beginning to drop, there is an increase in deer and wildlife activity. Drivers are encouraged to stay alert during the early morning or evening hours.

Shop small on the Southside to support local small businesses

Restore Old Town Greenwood and Delta Theta Tau organize events to help small businesses and support other local nonprofits

On Nov. 26, small businesses will be celebrated and highlighted as we begin to approach the end of the year and continue in the holiday season. Restore Old Town Greenwood will be hosting "Small Business Saturday" and Delta Theta Tau will join the Beech Grove Chamber to host "Shop Small Saturday" with its annual artisan fair. Both events are designed to boost local businesses and support the hard-working people of Johnson County while enjoying community fellowship.

Delta Theta Tau

In 1903, a community-based sorority called Delta Theta Tau was founded in Muncie, Ind. Since then, it has grown into a national organization dedicated to philanthropic projects. A chapter in Johnson County was formed in 1973, and they introduced their first craft fair in 1975. The craft fair has continued to be held annually throughout the years and serves as a means to support local small charities and, with the help of the Beech Grove chamber, small businesses.

"Our chapter alone has averaged \$20,000-\$25,000 per year benefitting Johnson County, the Greenwood area, and the local smaller charities that we contribute to. We've never fell below that, even when times are tough and we've done it all through this craft fair – Artisan Holiday Market," shared Helen Fisher, member of Delta Theta Tau and chairperson of the fair.

"We have about 23 charities that we contribute to including Better Indy Babies, Eleanor Skillen School 34, Fletcher Place Community Center, several senior community centers and Servant's Heart in Beech Grove," Fisher continued.

Over the last four years, the Greater Beech Grove Chamber of Commerce has teamed up with Delta Theta Tau to include Shop Small Saturday with the Artisan Holiday Market, held at Beech Grove High School. The chamber stepped in to provide

bags to the attendants of the fair that include coupons and materials from local businesses which encourage people to head to Main Street in Beech Grove after the fair.

"We don't want to be categorized as a big

show. We have maintained a small, homespun, strictly juried hand-crafted fair and we've never wavered from that," Fisher emphasized.

it organization dedicated to supporting local businesses in Greenwood and keeping the history intact in Old Town Greenwood. Small Business Saturday is one of the ways they put small, local businesses in the spotlight. Every year they ask a local business to host the event and this year it will be held at Take Root Country Store.

The organization invites as many small businesses as possible in the

area to participate and get some extra recognition by local residents. A tote bag is passed out at the beginning of the event that includes information, coupons and promotional materials from the local business-

es. As an incentive, the totes are filled with "Old Town Dollars" which can be redeemed at participating shops and used as cash. Restore Old Town puts in \$500 of cash spread throughout the tote bags ranging from \$5 to \$35. Once the "Old Town Dollars" are redeemed, the shops are then reimbursed for those coupons by Restore Old Town.

"There's usually a line to get the totes because everyone wants the bag with the \$35 coupon of Old Town Dollars," Darcy Miles, board member at Restore Old Town Greenwood, said with a laugh.

"We do a lot of other things in addition to Small Business Saturday that are intended to help the community and local small businesses. They're what keep things going and we want to do what we can to support," Miles added.



'Is There a Santa Claus?'

Editor's note: The following editorial is reprinted from the Sept. 21, 1897 edition of The New York Sun. It was written by American publisher and editor, Francis Pharcellus Church (Feb. 22, 1839 – April 11, 1906).

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor-

I am 8 years old. Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says, "If you see it in The Sun, it's so." Please tell me the truth, is there a Santa Claus?

Virginia O'Hanlon 115 West Ninety Fifth Street

Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours, man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus! It would be as dreary as if there were

no Virginias. There would be no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence.

We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The external light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

Not believe in Santa Claus! You might as well not believe in fairies. You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas Eve to catch Santa Claus, but even if you did not see Santa Claus coming down, what would that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign that there is no Santa Claus. The most real things in the world are those that neither children nor men can see. Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? Of course not, but that's no proof that they are not there. Nobody can conceive or imagine all the world.

You tear apart the baby's rattle and see what makes the noise inside, but there is a veil covering the unseen world which not the strongest man, nor even the united strength of all the strongest men that ever lived could tear apart. Only faith, poetry, love, romance, can push aside that curtain and view and picture the supernal beauty and glory beyond. Is it all real? Ah, Virginia, in all this world there is nothing else real and abiding.

No Santa Claus! Thank God! He lives and lives forever. A thousand years from now, Virginia, nay 10 times 10,000 years from now, he will continue to make glad the heart of childhood.

gal Partnership (MLP) has enhanced health outcomes by helping patients manage civil legal issues that affect their health. Eskenazi Health MLP partners include Indiana Legal Services, Faegre Drinker, and the Joseph Maley Foundation, along with new partner, Taft Stettinius & Hollister.

When Eskenazi Health patients need legal assistance, clinical staff can refer them directly to legal services. Similar to other members of the health care team, our attorneys are available to consult with clinical and nonclinical staff about system and policy barriers to care. A number of these partnerships go further, leveraging their considerable knowledge and expertise to advance local and state policies that lead to safer and healthier environments.

Unlike many similar programs around the United States, the Eskenazi Health MLP partnership has no socioeconomic requirement for service and is funded internally. MLPs provide pro bono legal services to patients based on referrals from the program coordinator, who is also a lawyer.

A person's health is determined by a whole lot more than just high-quality health care services and personal behavior; it's shaped by environment – where someone lives, works, plays, and learns. Here's an example of how the Eskenazi Health MLP program works: A child with chronic asthma may come in for treatment, only to

return to an environment filled

with conditions that make his or her asthma worse. Thanks to Eskenazi Health's MLP, the child's physician may call upon an attorney to intervene with the landlord and get the substandard conditions upgraded, which in turn, leads to improvement in the child's health.

Eskenazi Health's MLP also offers assistance with housing, consumer rights, immigration, family and stability, government benefits, education law, decision making, gender marker changes/name changes and expungement (setting aside a criminal conviction). MLP assistance is also provided in the following area:

Advanced care and end-of-life planning services for patients in Eskenazi Health Oncology and preparation of advanced planning documents at an annual wills clinic held each summer for all Eskenazi Health patients.

Legal guidance related to domestic and sexual assault concerns for patients seen in the Eskenazi Center of Hope (supported by the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute STOP program).

Guardianship of incapacitated adults seen at the Center for Youth & Adults with Conditions of Childhood (CYACC) when a family member or friend is available to become the guardian.

According to the National Center for Medical Legal Partnerships, last year, MLPs helped more than 75,000 patients resolve legal issues that were impeding good health, trained more than 11,000 health care providers to better understand and screen patients for health-related social needs and engaged in clinic- and policy-level projects designed to improve health and health equity for entire communities.

Patients interested in MLP services may speak with their nurse, provider or social worker at an Eskenazi Health Center or Sandra Eskenazi Mental Health



Lutheran High School senior running back Joe Davis is a man of few words.

"He's definitely a lead by example guy," Saints football coach Dave Pasch said "He shows up and he works. He doesn't say a whole lot to anybody. He's a good student and a really nice kid. He's very humble. He's not a kid that boasts about himself and not a kid that complains when he's not getting the ball. He embraces his role. He's the ultimate teammate. He's always prepared. He isn't concerned when he isn't getting touches and yards. That's really the culture this group of seniors has helped build."

The 5-foot-10, 190-pound Davis has rushed for 1,769 yards on 229 carries with 28 touchdowns for the Saints (14-0), who will play Adams Central (14-0) at 11 a.m. Nov. 26 in the Class A state championship. The Saints are looking to repeat as unbeaten state champions.

"I feel more confident than I did last year," Davis said. "I've increased my size and strength. My expectations were to have better stats than I did last year."

As a junior, Davis rushed for 1,298 yards on 191 carries with 11 TDs.

"His numbers are a product of the system," Pasch said. "If he was the feature guy in our system, he would be capable of having a 2,000 or 2,500-yard season. We're so balanced. There are weeks he has seven or eight carries and then you go back to the game against Providence, he had 33 carries for 259 yards."

Davis had 207 yards on 31 carries in the 28-7 victory over host North Decatur Nov. 18 in the Class A semistate.

Sophomore quarterback Jackson Willis has completed 198 of 286 passes for 3,890 yards and 51 touchdowns.

"He's a great pass blocker," Pasch said. "He does whatever is required of him for us to have success."

Pasch said Davis has the ability to play at the Division III level in college.

Davis said the team has even stronger chemistry than last season.

"We are more connected through each grade," Davis said.

Davis started playing football and wrestling at 8 years old. Davis reached the regional in wrestling last season.

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

In elementary school, we learn a noun is a "person, place or thing." Rabbit. Cereal. Toilet. Especially toilet. Words like "toilet" make Mad Libs a hit with my kids when we take road trips.

However, at some point down the line, we learn that an "idea" is also a noun. I don't know which governing English language body decided this or at what point it became part of the school curriculum, but I'll bet it was met with the same backlash as Pluto being relegated to a lower-level planet.

Yes, ideas are nouns, and they're my favorite types of nouns. These ideas were the ones the Founding Fathers often capitalized, and that the Bible extols: joy, honesty, freedom, loyalty, wisdom, truth and friendship. Sam the Eagle would be proud. Pride – there's another one.

The above examples were all positive words (except "pride," depending on

You can't touch "peace," but you can experience it. You can't lick "sorrow," but somehow you can still taste it. Pain and pleasure are both fleeting and impossible to capture in a jar. And I've yet

to see "faith" with my own eyes, but I suppose that's kind of the point.

I like ideas. I'm an idea guy. I think our language and culture would be incredibly pointless without the abstract concepts we wrestle with in idea nouns. Along with patience, perseverance and potential, we have to deal with anxiety, chaos and death. These are all idea nouns!

After a few drinks, philosophical Mad Libs would be hilarious. In this version, you wouldn't change any of the subjects: T.V. shows, president for a day, the recipe for a perfect great clam chowder. Instead, you'd have to pepper in a constant flow of ideas, concepts and belief systems. Who wants to get a kick out of disappointment with me?

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Beech Grove Mayor's Office requests ending delay in delivering settlement funds to political subdivisions

Dear State Legislator,

I am requesting an immediate end to the state's ongoing delay in distributing this year's opioid settlement payments owed to Indiana political subdivisions from the nationwide opioid settlements with McKesson Corporation, Cardinal Health, inc., and AmerisourceBergen (collectively "the Distributors") and the Johnson & Johnson entities ("J&J). The payments to each political subdivision under Indiana Code 4-6-15-4 are set forth in a spreadsheet on the attorney general's website: in.gov/attorneygeneral/about-the-office/complexIitigation/opoid-settlement/.

As you know, earlier this year, the state received the payments for the distributors' settlement. Unfortunately, the state chose to withhold distributions owed to Hoosier political subdivisions from those payments until after the state received the payments from the J&J settlement.

On or about Nov. 3, 2022, the state received the payments for the I&I settlement. Nonetheless, the state still has not moved forward with the distribution of settlement funds to Hoosier political subdivisions as required under IC 4-6-15-4, nor have political subdivisions been provided a firm timeline for when they can expect to receive their funds. There is no excuse for any delay in distributing the funds as the payment amounts to each political subdivisions have been publicly available on the attorney general's website for months.

In other states, there has not been this type of delay in delivering settlement funds to political subdivisions. As you know, these settlement funds are desperately needed to abate the opioids crisis which continues to plague local communities throughout Indiana. Hoosiers expect and deserve better from their elected officials' administration of these much-needed settlement funds. Accordingly, we urge the State of Indiana to distribute immediately the collected funds to its political subdivisions.


