Southside construction update

Construction crews prepare to open new pieces of I-69 project before winter hits

- Indianapolis: As Citizens Energy
 Group continues to make progress on its
 DigIndy Tunnel System, upcoming construction will require the closure of E.
 Pleasant Run Parkway S. Drive between
 N. Webster Avenue and Sheridan Avenue.
 The closure is expected to last approximately eight months. Local access will
 remain open. For more information, visit
 CitizensEnergyGroup.com/Construction.
- I-69 Updates: Construction crews are opening new pieces of the I-69 Finish Line project to traffic before winter weather and cold temperatures limit the types of construction work that can be completed. Northbound State Road 37 traffic was shifted onto new pavement last week near County Line Road, and the interchange was fully opened with the new northbound on-ramp. The work zone speed limit remains 45 mph, and drivers
- should slow down for a temporary crossover to the north. Paving crews are completing the next segment of northbound pavement between Southport Road and Edgewood Avenue, which is expected to open before the holidays. Watch for nighttime lane closures and traffic stops for up to 20 minutes on northbound S.R. 37 near Banta Road.
- I-69 Johnson County: The S.R. 144 on-ramp to southbound I-69 is expected to open late next week or the following week. The first traffic signal north of Evansville is now at Smith Valley Road. Drivers should stay alert as other motorists adjust to the transition. Right turns will remain open but watch for daytime closures of the dedicated turn lane from northbound S.R. 37 to Smith Valley Road. Crews will be working on the future interchange bridge above. 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

When Margaret Burton took her truck to a mechanic earlier this year, she got much more than just her vehicle back. When she was talking with him, she shared her dream to open a thrift shop as a nonprofit. Upon returning, the mechanic offered her a lease on the space right there in that same building.

"I thought I was just going over there to get my vehicle fixed, but the Lord just laid it on that guy's heart to help. I just know all of it was God working. I've seen that this helps people and that's my heart's desire," Burton shared.

The thrift shop, God's Love Offerings and Donations Store is in the old Waterman Hardware store at 7006 Southeastern Ave., a historical building that Mr. Waterman built in 1859. Over the past 130+ years the building housed a blacksmith shop, a carriage factory, Model T shop, gas station, hardware store, mower shop and more, all under ownership of the Waterman family.

Customers choose their own price

God's Love Offerings opened its doors in September using clothing and other items collected from local churches and a few individual donations. Inside there are lots of different items you might find at any thrift

store, but there are no price tags on any of them.

"The things that I have in it, I just tell people to give whatever they think is fair for the stuff. Some people come in and they're in real bad need for stuff and they can have clothes or something if they really need it, or they just give me a love offering to help me to keep the store open. God just impressed to me that there's just so much stuff and it can help people and so I've been trying that," Burton explained.

Before opening the store, Burton worked in ministry outreach with her husband, who passed away about three years ago. He pastored two different churches and as part of their outreach, they took food and clothing to the Appalachians in sev-

eral different states. That work helped get Burton connected with the people who helped her collect the items that she'd used to open the store. She took the step of faith to open the store and now hopes that it will grow, and more people will get involved.

"I'm just doing it by myself. I just started out – I'm on social security and I'm up in my years. I just started this out of my own pocket, but I do have it incorporated as the church. Mainly, I just started this out on my

own and I'm hoping to get it built up to where it gets a lot of people involved," Burton mentioned.

Helping their community

Burton has already seen how this store is helping people in the community.

"We had a grandfather who came in with his son and a 5-year-old boy. All that boy had was the clothes on his back because his mother had put him on the street. CPS had gotten him, and they let the dad get him back, but they didn't have any clothes for him. So they came in and got a couple jackets and a coat and some shoes and clothes. I thought that was pretty outstanding to be here and to be able to help," she said.

Burton had help from family to get the space set up and stocked. The place needed painting and tables set up as well as all items.

"That was a special thing, knowing that you can rely on your family to be there no matter what ideas you come up with to do," Burton laughed.

"I would just like to see people come together and be people. It's not about a church. It's about people and caring and helping and that's my biggest goal for the whole mission here is to do that" she concluded.



Home Alone A Christmas guilty pleasured turned classic

The John Hughes produced, and Christopher Columbus directed 1990 Christmas classic Home Alone has not always been regarded in that classic status. Critical reception for the film was mostly positive but ultimately consensus was lukewarm citing the implausible plot, mean-spiritedness of the family and especially the gratuitous slapstick violence unleashed on the two villains of the film. Despite these reservations from critics, the film was an instant box office smash hit, and it remained in theaters as late as June of the year after its initial November release. The reason for its massive popularity is immediately evident if you have ever seen the film, Home Alone is one of, if not the most fun films ever made.

The conceit of the film, being left alone without any parental supervision, is a universal power fantasy every child can immediately relate to, and any adult can remember fondly longing for: complete freedom and zero responsibilities. That coupled with the second half's idea of rising to the occasion and bravely defending yourself from unambiguously terrible goons in spectacular fashion makes for comedic and narrative gold. But the concept alone is not what makes Home Alone so beloved and rewatchable. The true magic behind Home Alone is solid technical filmmaking and profound levels of creative artistry. No, seriously.

The editing in Home Alone by Raja Gosnell has the pinpoint precision of a well-timed stand-up comedian. Apart from the inherently hilarious sight of grown men being outsmarted and beat up by a small child, the jokes throughout are aided by perfect comedic timing in each of the cuts. To use an example from an iconic scene, the wide over-the-shoulder shot of Kevin getting ready in the mirror reveals the setup that he's about to put aftershave on his face, then slightly before he applies it, it cuts to a close-up to juxtapose his cool collected speech to himself with the joke that he's a 9-year-old and most definitely did not expect the acholic burn on his face leading to his now iconic scream.

There's a near infinite number of positives I could mention when discussing why the film works as well as it does (Macaulay Culkin's charismatic performance, the inspired use of extreme slapstick, the endlessly quotable script or the "don't judge a book by its cover" messaging) but I want to hone in on one often overlooked aspect of the film's greatness, its score. Composed by the legendary John Williams, his

score for this film is particularly impressive because it seamlessly blends itself in with the classic Christmas tunes worked into the film. It would then be easy for the score to get lost in the timeless songs we already know, but it toes a perfect line between not clashing with the Christmas standards while asserting itself as instantly classic and memorable.

Home Alone is an endlessly enjoyable Christmas classic thanks to great film-making, a million-dollar idea and unforgettable performances and is currently available to stream on Disney Plus.



The term "gaslighting" comes from a 1938 play called "Gas Light" by British novelist and playwright Patrick Hamilton. In the play, a man tries to convince his wife that she is becoming insane. He blames her for the belongings disappearing, although he is secretly hiding them.

Additionally, the husband is searching for some hidden jewels in the attic late at night. As he turns on the gas-fueled lights in the attic, the lights in the rest of the house dim. The husband convinces his wife that she is merely imagining things. "Gas Light" was adapted into a 1944 film called "Gaslight" (all one word). I find it interesting that the term "gas light" quickly evolved into a verb.

According to Merriam-Webster, gaslighting had a 1740% increase in web searches for the term this year. What is it

that has made gaslighting emerge as such a common word in our cultural vernacular?

Many attribute the rise of gaslighting to former president Donald Trump's claims that often did not line up with reality. President Trump's advisor Kellyanne Conway famously referred to the then White House Press Secretary Sean Spicer's multiple false claims about the 2017 presidential inauguration as "alternative facts."


This subjectification of measurable truth and confirmable facts in order to gain power, reputation or favorable optics is a great example of gaslighting. We saw this with scientific facts being questioned during the Covid-19 pandemic as well. Now U.S. politics and cultural wedge issues are riddled with gaslighting – facts be damned.

Hospitals in Marion County begin visitor restrictions due to rising flu rates

Healthcare - In response to a concerning increase in flu activity locally, Marion County Public Health Department Director and Chief Medical Officer Virginia A. Caine, M.D. has requested that hospitals in Marion County begin temporary restrictions for visitors. As part of a policy developed by the Indianapolis Coalition for Patient Safety, hospitals of all health systems in Marion County agreed to implement Tier 1 of the coalition's Patient Visitor Policy beginning Dec. 5. The Tier 1 option of temporary visitor restrictions at hospitals includes: No visitors with symptoms of influenza; no visitors under the age of 18; visitors limited to two immediate family members as identified by the patient. The wearing of masks by hospital visitors will also be required. Marion County hospitals participating in the temporary visitor restrictions include hospitals within Community Health Network, Franciscan Health Indianapolis, Ascension St. Vincent, Indiana University Health, and Eskenazi Health. I found the man passed out drunk, but otherwise he was perfectly fine. That day my fear was great, but my faith in God's protection and my love for my brother in need was even greater!
