

#### Southside construction update

Southside communities receive funding for road and bridge improvements

#### **Compiled by Nicole Davis**

Area lawmakers: State sends over \$5.8M to accelerate local road improvements

• Southside: More than \$5.8 million is headed to local communities to accelerate road and bridge improvements, according to Johnson County and Southside Indianapolis legislators. Local funding from the Community Crossings Matching Grant Program is for road and bridge preservation, road reconstruction, intersection improvements, guardrail replacements and signage, and can cover material costs for chip sealing and crack filling operations. State Rep. Michelle Davis (R-Whiteland)

said 229 towns, cities and counties will receive over \$119 million in state matching grants. Area grant recipients include: Johnson County, \$1 million; Greenwood, \$1 million; Homecroft, \$82,503; Marion County, \$1 million; and Southport; \$327,328. Smaller municipalities provide a 25% match in local funds, while large communities provide a 50% match. State law requires 50 percent of the available matching funds be awarded annually to communities within counties with a population of 50,000 or fewer. Awards are released two times a year. #### A TEACHER FOR LIFE

#### Linda Begley is doing what she was born to do, and you might want to listen

#### **Born to inform**

"My mother says that when I was a child, I started teaching my 2-year-old sister. I had never even heard of school, but here I was teaching," said Linda Begley, a longtime Southside resident and independent Medicare agent.

She would go on to make her teaching status official at Decatur Central High School as a business teacher and Greenwood Middle School as a counselor. After moving down to Florida for 10 years, Begley returned to Indiana and began to work in Medicare.

#### Helping other seniors

"I started doing Medicare and I found out how little seniors know about their benefits. It's confusing and TV is confusing more than anything," Begley stated.

Knowing there are people out there who make their living taking advantage of the senior population, she is careful to stay within the strict guidelines of her position. Unfortunately, with the noise people hear from TV advertisements and telemarketers, they find it hard to know where to turn for the right

"I've gotten just under a doctorate degree,

and I've never had to study as hard as I have for Medicare - there are so many rules and so much detail and so many different scenarios. Many people don't even realize what they're entitled to. That's where I can help them," said Begley.

For six months out of the year, Begley sets up a table at the Walmart in Beech Grove during the time period where you can either enroll for a plan or change it (Oct. 15-Dec. 7 and Jan. 1-March 31.) Her primary goal is to what she has always loved to do: teach, teach, teach. Otherwise you can call her for guestions about a plan or Medicare/Medicaid in general. Her phone number is: (317) 522-7230.

#### Finding someone

Begley warns seniors not to trust the phone or TV advertisements, which is partly why she sets up her table at Walmart. Medicare agents are not allowed to call without prior written permission. Plans are also based on the county that you are in so it is important to talk to someone local who is familiar with your county and can inform you on the benefits that actually apply to you. ment? With the plan I was able to help her find, she now has someone who will pick her up and bring her back under the plan. She said that has been the biggest Godsend for her," Begley shared.

#### **Key enrollment times**

Here are a few key times where people should consider talking with Begley about their Medicare/Medicaid options:

Oct. 15- Dec. 7: Annual Enrollment Period – Anyone can make changes to their plan.

Jan. 1 - March 31: Open Enrollment Period - Medicare Advantage plans can be changed.

Three months before or after turning 65: Eligibility begins (will kick in the month you turn 65).

Two years after getting on Medicare/ Medicaid (typically from disability): New benefits open up\*

\*Many people don't realize this option.

#### We deserve it

"IU came up with a Medicare plan where they pay \$100 of the part B cost which can really help a lot of people. I still need to look up their medications and their doctors and everything else. But with all plans being equal, it's a good plan to be able to take advantage of," Begley mentioned.

These organizations may also provide delivery of food and personal care items. The grant opportunity does not include organizations that provide prepared meals for consumption on site or via delivery.



Originally released in 1946, Frank Capra's It's a Wonderful Life is a holiday staple in houses across America and is widely celebrated as a classic. However, this was not always the case, in fact, when it originally released it only did moderately well, and did not garner much notice from critics of the time. So how did a supposedly mediocre film from the 1940s become a modern Christmas tradition? It all has to do with copyright laws.

In 1974, 25 years after it initially released, due to a paperwork error, the copyright of the film expired, and it entered the public domain. Effectively, this meant that anyone could distribute the film without having to pay royalties to the studio that produced the film. Instantly, television studios across the U.S.

began broadcasting it every holiday season. It was this paperwork error that led

to a disappointment of a film to becoming what it is today, a critical and audience darling that has bonified classic status.

For the uninitiated, It's a Wonderful Life is a story about the life of George Bailey, played by the incomparable Jimmy Stewart. George is a lifelong resident of Bedford Falls, and throughout the first and second acts he is introduced as consistently selfless. Even going so far as to give up on his own goals and dreams to help others in his community. However, this be-

gins to wear on George in his middle age and he finds himself in a deep depression wishing to God that he'd never had been born. In response, an angel, played with

> timeless charm by Henry Travers, shows him what Bedford Falls would look like if he hadn't been born.

It's a Wonderful Life is my favorite Christmas film of all time despite being released more than 50 years before I was born. The reason being is that, unlike the yearly hallmark Christmas films or even theatrically released holiday films, It's a Wonderful Life goes beyond the platitudes and clichés that permeate the genre. The film explores themes of family, community, class struggle, and loss in a convincing and realis-

tic way. The pacing of the film reinforces these ideas by using the majority of

the film to tell the story of George's life. We have a deep appreciation for George and have even been exposed to his flaws. This means we too experience the disorientation and terror George feels when he wakes up in Pottersville and he loses everything.

Ultimately, the film is about more than a season, it's about the culmination of a life. The people we touch every day without even realizing it. So, remember this holiday season, "no man is a failure who has friends." It's a Wonderful Life is available to stream on Amazon Prime Video.





#### How higher interest rates are impacting real estate offers

A year ago, the average interest rate for a 30-year, fixed-rate mortgage was around 3.367 percent. Today that number stands at 7.32 percent. The doubling of interest rates over the past 12 months is having an impact on what homebuyers are asking for in their offers, and the expectations of sellers. The real estate market is currently in neutral territory, with neither side seeing large concessions or windfalls, but for potential homebuyers, there are a few trends that are making a comeback.

#### The return of closing costs

In the past few weeks, realtors have seen the return of a common request from buyers: closing costs. If a buyer had asked a seller to pay closing costs anytime over the last two years, the answer would have been a quick, "no." But, since the most recent interest rate hike, buyers are asking for it again and getting it. Buyers are paying more each month for their mortgage and in

an effort to try and hold onto a little bit more money, they're asking sellers to cover closing costs.

It's important to note that not all sellers are willing to entertain the idea of paying their buyer's closing costs, but it's definitely been a discussion point. There are two primary methods being used for buyers to entice sellers to pay closing costs: price and repairs. Few sellers are still receiving offers that are thousands over asking price, but if a buyer is willing to pay the listed amount, or close to it, then the seller may be more inclined to accept paying closing costs. Also, if the home inspection identifies areas that need to be addressed, and the buyer is willing to take on those repairs themselves, that may also encourage the seller to pay closing costs.

#### Pre-approval letters are important

Sellers are aware that the financial and real estate tides are changing, and as a result they're more cautious about the financial stability of the buyers. Sellers do not want to enter into negotiations with a buyer that does not have the financing available to move forward in a transaction. More so than in the past, sellers want to see a copy

of the pre-approval letter along with the buyer's offer.

The pre-approval letter tells all parties in the transaction that the buyer is strong financially and can afford to purchase the property, without any foreseeable delays or problems. Houses are staying on the market longer than last year, and fewer offers are coming to the table, which makes it important for sellers to work with buyers who are already pre-approved financially. Sellers do not want to work toward a closing date, only to find that financing fell through on the buyer's side. Buyers that include their letter with the offer are more likely to have their offer considered than those that do not include the pre-approval or promise to send it over later.

The increase in interest rates is having an impact on the real estate market, but not to the degree that one side has more of an advantage than the other. There is still inventory available and buyers willing to move.


