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

## Polk Place: A rebirth

n 1977 local developer Merrill Jones purchased and converted the former 65,000

sq. ft. canning complex into a series of office spaces. Despite Jones' initial restoration efforts, Polk Place began a slow decline over the decades and the remaining buildings ultimately faced demolition. Enter husband and wife team Randy & Julie Faulkner and their company Peak Home Improvements, purchasing the buildings in December of 2008 and beginning renovations little over a year later. The Faulkner's have been steadfast about retaining the building's original design and

integrity during the process: roughly 80 percent of the 1907 brick has been retained. Leasing of office space in the facility is almost complete. Presently one former building is now home for the Cornerstone Autism Center. The Faulkner's—and Greenwood for that matter—are excited about what will result in the rebirth of a pivotal landmark in Greenwood's early beginnings. But, as with most things, it takes time.

Polk Place in early 2000 was a popular hangout destination for the teenage crowd. Any element of folklore has to have its origins. Did it begin with these teenage urban explorers, on those nights when the silent buildings seemed to resonate with something unworldly? Reports of tall shadows shifting in the darkness, voices without a source and the general creepy feeling of being watched—all unnerving, and quite possibly manufactured by an over active imagination—originated in this era. Or not... who's to say? Folks associated with the Polk

Cannery have come and gone into the capsule of the past, yet remnants of the Polk era still remain and carry on, locked in a time capsule of brick, wood and mortar. Possibly some of the remnants of these folks also still remain?

The remaining buildings today once held court to a different place and time when the work was hard, yet there was a particular sense of innocence and wonder for the period. Some claim these types of

locations—buildings and the surrounding grounds—can soak in the past like a sponge. That's a theory anyway.

People who have invested a part of themselves in a location will sometimes leave an imprint behind...to be replayed at a later time of their choosing. With the blood, sweat, and toil that was a daily part of the Polk canning operation, there was certainly that investment! There is the possibility that some never entirely go away.

So they say....

Southport High School graduate Casey Domek said he can see himself running his own business one day, and he's starting now by acting as branch manager for Student Painters, an exterior paint company.

"It's going to be a challenge," Domek said.
"I'm looking forward to doing something a lot of 20 year olds don't normally get to do and help other college students."

Student Painters gives full-time students the opportunity to earn tuition and expenses for the following school year. The students receive all training needed, and can learn leadership skills by running their own businesses. Domek said they will paint exteriors or vacant interiors by brushing and rolling, with Sherman Williams paint. Domek is a sophomore at Indiana University earning a degree in health administration. He said he began working to gain clients early this year, though the actual painting doesn't begin until May when school lets out.

"The goal right now is to get the name out there," Domek said. "I don't know if anyone has done student painters on this side of town. With it being spring, now people are there are people thinking about painting. I come home every weekend so I can provide a free estimate."

As a branch manager, Domek will oversee a crew of 12-15 employees in the Indianapolis area, including Beech Grove, Southport and Greenwood. Painting will wrap up in August. Domek said he has been challenging himself to see just how well he can do this summer.

"I've been hard working since a young age," Domek said. "Any team I've been on, coaches




## Franklin Central ladies named basketball sectional champions




## The terrors of bank transactions and trickery










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

## It's all Goodrum

## The Social of Greenwood has grown and changed over the past two years under the direction of Bob Goodrum...with more to come

There has been a lot of change at The Social of Greenwood, formerly the Greenwood Senior Center, since Bob Goodrum came on as executive director two years ago, including new programming, new technology and transitions in staff. So far, Bob said those changes are reflected in the Social's membership. When he arrived in March 2012 membership had declined to 317 members, the same amount they had in 1989. It's now "knocking on 600."

"Now we're looking at the renovation of the facility because those changes have brought new members," Goodrum said. "We say this isn't your grandma's senior center. We're seeing adults wanting to be active longer and living longer. Sitting around and telling tall tales doesn't really appeal to them. When we become more active in our programs, our membership expands and we're looking to be able to accommodate that with a new parking lot and facilities."

Goodrum came to the Social with no background in working with older adults. After graduating from St. Paul Christian University, he began working as a teacher, coach and youth pastor. He then worked with the homeless in Indianapolis for 14 years and then for

six years in youth mentoring organizations, more recently as chief program officer with Big Brothers and Big Sisters of Central Indiana. With budget cuts, that position was eliminated and Goodrum began searching for a new career. He said when he applied for the executive director po-

sition at the Social, he never expected to get it.

"They asked me, with seniors and youth, how that transition would work," Goodrum said. "I said I think whether you're a young kid in the inner city needing a mentor or you're 70, we're all looking for the same thing - love, acceptance and forgiveness. If you just give those, you'll probably do okay no matter where you are. I guess they thought the same thing."

Goodrum took over for Betty Davis, found-

ing director. She stayed on part-time for a year before retiring, allowing Goodrum to learn from her. Once Davis left, Goodrum said there was another period of transition. They went from three part-time staff to one full-time staff, hiring Liz McKinley. He said even though they've reduced staff hours, their productivity has increased with McKinley's background coming from the Indianapolis Senior Center.

When he first came to the Social, Goodrum said technology was a large focus. They were working with Radio Shack-brand cordless residential phones, but have since switched to a business phone system. The database was still in DOS, a program Goodrum said he hadn't used since college. They switched to a database called My Senior Center, allowing them to connect with senior centers nationwide. The computer system was upgraded, Web site further developed and social media sites like Facebook, Twitter and Instagram were introduced.

"If you look at the number of seniors living in Greenwood, we've only tapped 5 percent of the senior population in Greenwood," Goodrum said. "So there are plenty of ways to grow. So we're looking for new ways to market ourselves and social media is a part of that."

At the same time as improving its technology, the Social was engaging more with its members, with new classes in everything from

exercise to education. This summer they plan to introduce two new classes – walking and gardening.

"Seniors and kids are a lot alike in the way you have to approach some things with them," Goodrum said. "Change is not something many of them readily embrace. What I've been

blessed with is, when you take the time to explain the change, that the change is for their benefit and they clearly understand that, they are incredibly supportive. But don't change it without talking to them first."

Goodrum said their mission is to enhance the quality of life for older adults in the community, and he feels the new changes are helping fulfill that. Now, the facility needs to reflect it.

"We thought we were going to move, even

got an acceptable offer on the purchase of this building but finding what we needed squarefootage wise and with parking at a price we could afford just didn't exist in the Greenwood market," Goodrum said.

They recently began fundraising to upgrade the facility at 550 Polk St., participating in Brackets for Good, a tournament for non-profits taking place each March. The Social made it three rounds before losing to Southeast Community Services, Inc. Goodrum said through that, they raised 10 percent of what they needed to redo the parking lot. They will continue to raise money, offering a parking space sponsorship. He said they will add 10 new parking spaces and repave, completing the project by fall.

In addition to the parking lot, construction will take place inside. He said they will get both restrooms to ADA compliance by fall. For some of the renovations, he said it's just about utilizing the space they have in a more productive manner.

The Social's 2014 Senior Expo is coming May 8, 9 a.m. – noon at The Gathering Place, 1495 W. Main St., Greenwood. Goodrum said

even that fundraiser has increased in attendance, sponsors and vendors — with offerings attendees won't find at every senior fair. Along those same lines, he said he tells everyone the Social has things they won't find at every senior center.

"With the Social, I would like to invite people to move beyond their perceptions of a senior center and just come down and visit," Goodrum said. "If folks would come and see yes, we do bingo and things you would typically see in a senior center, but we also do things you wouldn't expect. We offer everything from a chair exercise and you use resistance bands and are seated the whole time to a NIA class for folks who are more mobile and more fit."

After two years at the Social, Goodrum said the future is looking bright. He said he has enjoyed spending time with the members. The downside to that, he laughs, is he's put on some weight because everyone bakes so well and is happy

to share with him.

"I probably get more hugs per day than I ever have in my life," Goodrum said. "Everyone wants a hug and that's cool. I actually had a hug therapy class in college, talking about all the benefits, the endorphins it releases, how it leads to longevity of life and all that. Now I'm seeing those folks it really affects."





## Bad Words... Spells F-U-N





s a lad, at Mom's request, my brother and I picked fresh asparagus from a patch in the corner of the back yard that grew larger, hardier and more bountiful with

each return of spring. Obediently, we carefully harvest spears, playfully jabbing at each other, imitating swashbuckling pirates. Mom would cook them to oblivion; flaccid, faded green and nutritionally DOA. The remainder of the year we ate it out of the can. To this day, when I see limp, overcooked asparagus, I'm grossed out. However, it was the norm.

You have every reason to add fresh asparagus to your diet and here's why. Asparagus is a rich source of glutathione - ("gloota-

This quite possibly can be an auto correct that made an incorrect change or a typo, but it should read "short shrift," which means to make short work of or dismiss summarily. According to my dictionary, it originally meant a very brief period of confession and absolution before death." (Joy Shepherd, Hendricks County)

Question: "Dear Jordan, did you perhaps mean 'short shrift' [in your column]? I enjoy your column. English was one of my favorite subjects to teach." (Marcia Lehrman)

**Answer:** Oh, I do love you, dear readers, especially when you teach me new things (and find polite ways to say, "Uh, Jordan, I think you're wrong here").

A few weeks ago I used the phrase "short thrift" in a column. It seems the phrase is in fact "short shrift," and I've been using it wrong for all these years. I'm pretty sure I still sing "Stairway to Heaven" wrong too, though, so it's in good company.

The phrase I wanted, "short shrift," means "little or no attention or thought" – as in, "I gave my younger brother short shrift when we were kids."

As Joy accurately mentioned, the phrase derives from an archaic word which is itself no longer used – "shrift" – meaning a confession or absolution given by a priest. According to the American Heritage Dictionary of the English Language, the phrase "short shrift" came about meaning a "brief penance given to a person condemned to death so that absolution could be granted before execution."

While "shrift" has more or less died off as a word on its own, the

phrase "short shrift" has lived on with a decidedly less morbid meaning. So, never fear, older siblings of the world: We can continue ignoring the younger ones without portending their imminent demise!

"No man putteth a piece of new cloth unto an old garment, for that which is put in to fill it up taketh from the garment, and the rent is made worse. Neither do men put new wine into old bottles: else the bottles break, and the wine runneth out, and the bottles perish: but they put new wine into new bottles, and both are preserved." ~ Matthew 9:16-17

So, what is this all about? Is Jesus giving sewing lessons now or is He giving lessons on how to preserve and bottle new and old wine? No, not at all. What this is about is the fact that He has not come to repair the religions of man but to present to us a new thing packaged in a new way. The Old Covenant that God made with the Old Covenant people wasn't working. Man just was not capable of keeping it completely no matter how hard he attempted to do so. Man is flesh and flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God. That being the case, Christ came to make a way by a new covenant relationship with man whereby man could win the long desired victory over the flesh and become a spiritual being capable of living sinless in this life and forever in eternity. The new covenant is in the blood of Jesus Christ. Matthew 26:28 "28 For this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins." Without the blood of Christ the New Covenant cannot be established. This is new. The old covenant required the shedding of the blood of bulls and goats but the new covenant requires the one-time shedding of the blood of the Son of God for everyone and for all time. No more will any substitute be asked for because the blood that makes a difference has been shed.
