GOVERNMENT WATCHDOG

BEECH GROVE CITY COUNCIL

Meeting, December 5

What happened: Ordinances 26 and 27 were approved on second reading. Ordinance 29 was approved on second and third/final reading. Ordinance 21 was approved on third/final reading.

What it means: Ordinance 26 relates to one-way streets and alleys, and sets a fee for not complying.

Ordinance 27 establishes a fee for heavy trash pickup of box springs and mattresses. There will be a minimum charge of \$20. Brad Meriwether, director of public works, said beginning this year there were more calls related to mattresses containing bed bugs. "Not having the machinery and not wanting to tell people it's just a hard no, we reached out to Ray's (Trash Services) to see if there was something we could do to work together."

Ordinance 21 establishes a new employee manual. The manual was discussed at length, with numerous amendments made. Mayor Dennis Buckley stated that this document is to be a work in progress and will be amended as time goes by.

Ordinance 22 establishes a salary for an Indiana Data and Communications System (IDACS) coordinator. It is required for police departments to have this position covered 24 hours a day. When the city ceased operation of its dispatch center, this position was covered by another agency. That agency will not cover the department's IDACS needs as of Jan. 1. Hiring a full-time coordinator is the first step for the department to fill this void.

In brief... 2017 RDC Budget was presented and approved by the council. RDC President Donald Webb gave a recap of 2016. The RDC put \$30,000 this fall to environmental studies, seeing as the Greenway project was approved this year. They are working on a bond refinance to be able to pay them off, getting a lower interest rate at 2.4 percent.

GREENWOOD **COMMON COUNCIL**

Meeting, December 5

What happened: Ordinance 16-74 passes first reading and Resolution 16-24 passes first reading 5-4.

What it means: Ordinance 16-74 will increase the cash change fund for the aquatic center, community center, and parks special events. The new aquatic center has multiple front counters and concession stand counters demanding the need for a greater amount of cash change funds.

Resolution 16-24 declares an area within Greenwood as a Economic Revitalization Area. VanTrust Real Estate intends to construct an approximately 500,000 square foot shell building at 800 N. Graham Road to be used as a logistics and distribution facility.

What's next: Ordinance 16-74 will go for second reading in the next meeting and Resolution 16-24 is set to have a public hearing the first meeting in January, 2017

Johnson County Sheriff reserve deputy puts energy into enforcing the law and serving her community

Having gone into law enforcement in her late 30s, Ramona Jackson may have gotten a late start in the field but says she can't imagine having to give up her badge now. Serving as a reserve deputy for the Johnson County Sheriff's Office for nearly 11 years, she said she loves being on the road, taking calls and working with everyone in the department.

"I have lots of energy," she said. "That's a good thing because I stay very busy. It's rewarding because you know you are going out there to hopefully do good every day."

Jackson is a graduate of Perry Meridian High School, growing up near Southern Plaza. She has worked as a sales operator for Ray Skillman for 28 years. She has lived in Greenwood for 16 years, and said she can see that the people in Johnson County do generally love and appreciate their Sheriff's department.

"We have a great group of people," she said. "We're out here to do the best that we can." In addition to her volunteer service as a deputy, Jackson can also be found working security at places such as Banker's Life Fieldhouse or directing traffic locally.

What was your inspiration to become go into law enforcement?

In January, I have been doing this for 11 years. I was 38. I had a friend who said they were going to get an application to be a reserve. I always loved police stuff. I always thought, it's not a good time in my life, I'm getting into my late 30s. I was talking to my friend that day and thought I want to do this finally. It was spur of the moment. I said, "pick me up one, too."

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

I like helping people. It's not always getting the bad guy. It's when you know you've done something good to make someone's day better or make them feel better. You have people thanking you. It's not even for the thank you but when they do you highly appreciate it.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

When you do go in a home and there isn't anything you can do. It's a bad situation and you have to leave hoping that something will help that family. The challenging part is if you've left wondering if these kids are going to be okay or if they are going to work this out.

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

Exercising and hanging with my boyfriend and my son.

What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

I would like to do this until I am retirement age. It would be so hard to give up my badge. My goal is to do this as long as I can. Personally, I want to get better and do better every time I come into work.

What would you have done if you hadn't become a deputy?

I would still be working my regular, full time job.

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On the subject of Exorcists

Thus comes the opening: the haunting piano from Michael Oldfield's Tubular Bells, a thick curtain of fog, a darkly silhouetted priest, and a sense of urgency. Modern day Exorcists-a present day occurrence or a legend seeped in folklore? How does this translate into paranormal investigations? Is it something to be laughed away? Or, is there credence that demonic activity holds court here in the present? I believe that it does...that evil has the capacity to be the great imitator, sometimes steering us down a path we don't want or need to walk down. Exorcism? Paranormal investigation? Between the two, it's a whole different realm! And... not one to be taken lightly.

Media is the illumination of the demonic and exorcism, whether it be books, movies or television. Currently one show-The Exorcist-is a revamping of the original 1970s movie. Reagan has grown up with a family of her own. However, it would seem the forces of darkness never relinquished their hold upon her. Is it a good show? Concerning the realm of demonic influence, I feel it is spot on and somewhat disturbing. There are, however, those moments of soap opera I would suppose every show needs to survive. Its moody, dark, and yes-in the first episode-contains that music, fog, and the silhouette of the priest about to do battle as he stands outside the house.

Is it all real? Yes, very much so. The Catholic Church has long recognized the reality of demonic possession, and even though it is not something they will advertise, they've put men in place to deal with this. Indianapolis had one of these. Father Vincent Lampert resided at the Saints Francis and Clare Catholic Church in Greenwood. He was one of about 50 working exorcists in the United States. His official title was "designated exorcist for the Archdiocese of Indianapolis." During his initial three months of training in Rome in 2006 Lampert assisted in over 40 exorcisms.

"I saw someone levitate once. I saw foaming at the mouth, bodily contortions, superhuman strength, speaking in a strange language and howling like wild animals!"

Regardless, he held to faith, believing that evil was no match against the power that resides in the Church founded by Jesus Christ. He was an adamant student in dissecting evil from the grace that Christ provides. To witness a possession he equated to visual shows or "parlor tricks," meant to scare or distract from the business at hand.

"I think there are a lot of people who think that exorcism is a throwback to the Middle Ages," Father Lampert stated. "But, lots of times, it's because they don't want to think about it. They don't want to think about the reality of evil, or what that means or entails. Evil IS a reality, but that doesn't mean we should be afraid of it!"

Yet... what of the paranormal groups that find themselves in this situation?

89-year-old Norbert Diekhoff looks forward to singing in Holy Name's Christmas Concert on Dec. 11

What do Amy Grant, Avril Lavigne and Norbert Diekhoff have in common? They all started singing in church.

For Diekhoff, it was about 65 years ago. "I started singing before they had a choir director," said the 89-year-old tenor. Since then, Diekhoff has enjoyed singing for each of the three choir directors at Holy Name of Jesus Catholic Church in Beech Grove.

"In March I'll be 90," he said proudly, "and I'm singing in the Christmas Concert."

The jubilant concert of celebration he is referring to is the annual Holy Name Christmas Concert which has been a tradition at the church for 53 years. This year's concert is Dec. 11, 5 p.m. and features more than 90 voices ranging in age from 10 to nearly 90, with more than a dozen instrumentalists.

Joseph Chrisman, pastoral associate and the concert's musical director said, "Norb has a dedication to and love for Holy Name and the Christmas Concert that is second to none. Norb lights up when he sings, especially these familiar tunes and his demeanor is infectious. He is a joy to have in the choir and offers valuable experience."

According to Chrisman, Diekhoff has been providing valuable tips since he started. "One of my favorite memories of Norb happened when I first arrived at Holy Name. We had finished a song at mass and afterward Norb said to me, 'Well, that was too slow, but you'll learn."

Diekhoff honed his singing skills for decades under the direction of Jerry Craney, the iconic music director who taught generations of families at Holy Name. He remembers auditioning for the choir. "Where've you been?" he said Craney asked him. Craney directed Holy Name's Christmas Concert for 48 years. Since his arrival in 2014, Chrisman has added his own touch to the annual event in a notable way. Craney's influence, however, is ever present. "There are some little things called 'Craney-isms' that longtime choir members like Norb continue to teach me and help me to remember as we rehearse," said Chrisman.

"The problem I have now is that there are steep stairs to the choir loft and climbing those stairs at 89 is difficult." Diekhoff said. But as long as he is physically able, he will continue to participate in the choir. In preparation for the Christmas Concert, Diekhoff and other members of the choir attend practice for several hours per week.

"I have lots of special memories," he says of his years in the choir, but not a favorite Christmas song, "I like them all." His favorite song is Shubert's *Ave Maria*.

Diekhoff was born in Beech Grove and attended Holy Name School and Beech Grove High School. When he married in 1971, he and his wife, Rosemary, decided to settle there. Today, they are still part of the community and doing their part to encourage the next generation, "I have a son and he has two boys, eight and 11. The 11-year-old is learning piano," he said with enthusiasm. He would like to see his love for music continue on in his grandsons for a while – perhaps the next 90 years.



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Just say yes

Johnson County Sheriff Detective Cochran to be honored in Rose Parade and shares his story of organ donation

It is an emotional time of year for Johnson County Sheriff's detective Kirby Cochran, of Franklin. As he travels the state speaking about organ donation, it has been nearly three years since he received his kidney transplant from Tracy Driscoll of Wabash, Ind.

Cochran and Driscoll have been selected as this year's honorees on the Indiana Donor Network and Donate Life Indiana's Donate Life Rose Parade Float for the Tournament of Roses Parade in California on Jan. 2, 8 a.m. Cochran will ride on the float which depicts Driscoll's image with a floragraph, a piece of artwork made from natural materials.

Driscoll, along with representatives from Franciscan Health and Indiana Donor Network, spoke on Dec. 2 at the Indianapolis hospital campus.

^aI hope that after today, everyone in this room and everyone who sees the news of this will feel inspired to think about your personal decision, tell your family to watch the float as it is presented in the beginning of the new year and finally talk to your family about donation," said Heather Pease of Indiana Donor Network.

Cochran, a 24-year deputy, was diagnosed with liver disease at 44 years old, in June of 2012, at Franciscan Health. He was added to the transplant list in November and received the call Jan. 8, 2013.

"I traveled to IU Health with my wife," he said. "The ride to the hospital is a ride I will never forget. We were both very thankful. It was kind of a quiet ride in the car, a lot of tears, a lot of emotion... Our thoughts were basically for Tracy's family. We didn't know who she was, but we knew someone had to pass for me to survive." Twenty-two people die daily in the U.S. from not receiving the organ they need to survive.

"Tracy chose at the license branch to say yes," Cochran said. "That's a nice, short bumper sticker: Just say yes. If we can just work together to cut the number from 22, that would be my message today."

Cochran said the thing that got to him most about needing the transplant was thinking about his wife and three children he would otherwise leave behind. After his transplant, he learned that Driscoll had left behind three teenage to young adult children. Cochran made the decision to meet her family and has since formed a close bond.

"I have a picture of Tracy in my office," he said. "I have no pictures of my family in my office. I work on child abuse and sex crimes. I have no pictures of my family in my office for a reason. But I have a picture of Tracy across from my desk. It's a great opportunity to talk to folks, even at a bad time, about organ donation and the fact that we've built a relationship. I have to thank Tracy's family for sharing Tracy with me and other folks."

Cochran said it an honor and humbling to be selected as a rider on the float in one of the most well-known parades in the country.

"It's a blessing for me to be able to honor Tracy and share the message about Tracy," he said. "Without her, it would not be possible. She's a part of me now. To be able to speak for her, chase my

dreams, help her children when they need help, there's nothing better than that."

Check the box Save a life

The Indiana Donor Network in partnership with Franciscan Health held a wonderful and moving presentation on Dec. 2, highlighting Greenwood resident Kirby Cochran, a transplant recipient, and Tracy Driscoll, his donor. The two will be featured in the Tournament of Roses Parade in California in January. As Cochran shared his story of what it meant to him to receive that transplant at the unfortunate consequence of someone else losing their life, some in the audience stated the need for a tissue to dry their eyes.

In 2015, 629 people received organ transplants from 175 donors in Indiana. Yet there are 22 people that die every day in the United States from the lack of available organs.

As uncomfortable as it may be to think about, the process of signing up to be an organ donor is so simple. Check a box on your paperwork at the license branch and voila, you're an organ donor. If something should happen to one of us - perish the thought - at least some good can come from it.

Meeting someone who has gone through this process really puts that into perspective. Putting a face to an issue not only helps to make the topic seem more real, but gives all the more reason to take the extra time (and it's really not that much time) to sign up and discuss your wishes with your relatives. 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Celebrating Southern Plaza

TAKE A LOOK BACK AT THE FIRST SHOPPING CENTER ON THE SOUTHSIDE HOSTING ITS GRAND OPENING IN 1961

With individual stores scattered along the Southside, if residents wanted a big shopping trip with everything in one place then they would need to get dressed up and drive downtown. That is, until Southern Plaza came along.

As the first shopping center on the Southside, if Southern Plaza didn't have what you were looking for, you probably didn't need it anyway.

Southern Plaza was developed by siblings, Frank and George Jr. Bixler, Emma Meadows and Ruth Hoffmann. Frank and George handled the daily operations.

The Bixler family has a long history in development. Their father, George M. Bixler, constructed most of the two-bedroom homes on Edwards, Mills, Markwood and Lawrence Avenues just before WWII. Frank and George operated Southern Circle and Southern Triangle restaurants.

The Bixler family farm was located on US 31, roughly between Thompson Road and Hanna Av-

enue. They had purchased more acreage with the idea to build a shopping complex.

"Shopping centers across the country were just becoming a thing," said David Bixler, Frank's son. "They looked around and saw there was no one place on the Southside to shop. Mom and dad went to at least one, if not two, shopping center trade shows. They realized it would be a great thing to build on that

piece of ground in that location. At that time, it was situated on US 31, a major thoroughfare. It's certainly not as big as it is today but in 1960 it was still well traveled. Given what they knew of the national trend, it seemed like a good idea at the time. It turned out to be a very good idea."

Southern Plaza celebrated its grand opening in April of 1961 with stores such as The Kroger Co., Hook Drugs Inc, Kay Jewelry, The Pet House, J.C. Penney Co., Kimmel Shoe Repair and many more. Advertisements boasted that there was ample parking for 2,000 cars and bus service that runs on the hour. All stores were ready for the opening except WM. H. Block Co. which insisted on buying its own land under the store and opened in the fall. Kroger now occupies that space.

Simultaneously, the state of Indiana was constructing Interstate-465. That project began in 1959, with the first section opening in 1961 and the final section in 1970.

"It was really fortuitous," David said. "There was a western entrance to Southern Plaza and the state didn't want them to put that in. They were able to work out some compromises for access to the shopping Center."

David was about 3 years old when Southern Plaza was built. He always had a summer job waiting for him - picking up trash, scrubbing

the sidewalks or mowing the fields surrounding Southern Plaza with their Ford tractor. David recalls his

father getting up at 6 a.m., out the door

by 7 and home by 5:20 p.m. every single day.

"It was so central to my life growing up," he said. "We never left that house that we didn't drive through the shopping center. If it was early evening we'd drive through and make sure all the lights had come on. If they didn't, dad would go to the light box and flip whatever switch was needed to make the parking lights come on. Did something need maintenance? Was everything in its place? Hardly a day went by that he wasn't doing something."

Frank would carry a massive key ring - about the size of a half dollar - and it was so full another key couldn't possibly fit on it.

"And he knew what every key went to!" David said

Frank and George sold Southern Plaza in 1978 to a real estate developer from Texas, which invested money into giving the center a facelift with new lighting, signage and changing the parking lot. In July 1994, Tri-Land Southern, Inc. acquired the center.

As most things do with time, the shopping center has gone through many changes through the years. Greenwood Park Mall was constructed in 1978, becoming the largest regional shopping center.

"Then over the last 10 years, as homes and development moved South around Greenwood, that had an impact on the area," David observes. "The change is not in the amount of business, but the types of stores that can do well in the shopping cen-

ter. It's still well occupied. The stores that are in there do good business. It's just a different mix of stores now."

Shops such as Harbor Freight Tools, Insure One, Goodwill, Mar-



ply, and more now occupy the space. Frank and George continued pursing commercial real estate long after selling Southern Plaza.

They had still owned Greenbriar apartments near the center, Green Tree Apartments on Madison Avenue and various other properties. They have both since passed away, and their family maintains much of their property ownership.

With a degree in economics and business, concentrating on real estate, from Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas, David followed close to his father and uncle's footsteps. A resident of New Palestine, Ind., he has worked as a registered investment advisor for more than 30 years and works in real estate development. In addition to his business, he is in charge of remaining familv business affairs.

Growing up with the Southern Plaza shopping center are memories that David still holds dear, with memorabilia of the business displayed in his household, such as the architect's first drawing center.

"I was two years old when it was built," he said, "I spent a lot of time there. I didn't know anything else." Though he was too young to remember what the Southside was like prior to this development, he said he's been told "it was the place to be. It really satisfied a strong need for the area."

Right before the finish line, the bank wanted to pull the financing. Because then, shopping centers were brand new. They had to convince them to not lose faith in the project. There was a last-minute meeting with the bank to encourage them to make the loan.

Once they got the shopping center done, they needed tenants. They worked with a leasing company run by a man named Al Frankel. Al had just recently hired a young man from New York that had moved to town. That leasing agent signed that first lease for

the first store. That turned out to be Mel Simon (co-founder of Simon Property Group which constructed Greenwood Park Mall in 1978), My recollection was that it was for the pet store.

Early on as 31 was being expanded, because it wasn't always the six lane highway it is now, Frank and George wanted a left hand turn signal. The city said no. Us, being children, got pressed into service. We sat in the car, all day, and counted how many people turned left into the shopping center. Hours and hours of just sitting there and

every time the light turned green, we counted how many people turned left. We blew an entire Saturday doing that We had enough cars turning left. We got a left hand turn signal.

 Every summer they would have a summer shopping spree called Mardi Gras. They would bring in an amusement company. The rides would set up in the parking lot along 31. One particular year they were insistent that the operator not have the 'teddy bear stands,' the games where you try to win a teddy bear. They felt those games

weren't appropriate for a shopping center because those games aren't particularly fair. Bring the rides, bring the cotton candy, but leave the games out. The operator chose not to do that. My dad talked to him. He got the sheriff's department and made them close down. He got someone with more authority and opened it back up. It got pretty heated. But at the end they shook hands. The guys brought over a teddy bear for my dad and my uncle. Fortunately it ended well.



Arrival slow paced sci-fi flick is chore to get through

Time is the most valuable resource known to man. It's also the most fleeting thing in the world; one, which no one can ever recover once it's gone. Most primarily choose to divvy up their time between family, friends and a chosen occupation. It's likely that no matter how long an individual spends on Earth, it will never be sufficient. There will never be quite enough time. While time is generally thought of in a linear fashion, one recently released film looks at time from a slightly different point of view.

Arrival is a science-fiction tale about a linguistics professor, Louise (Amy Adams) who is recruited by the military following an alien landing. The extraterrestrial creatures have landed their elongated ships in 12 seemingly random locations around the world, one of which is in the United States. Due to the inability to communicate with the outer space visitors, the entire world is on edge, trying to figure out the reason for the aliens' visit.

Louise is brought in to try to establish and facilitate some kind of communication with the aliens. After a number of failed attempts, progress is made. Soon, Louise and her astrophysicist partner, Ian (Jeremy Renner), are able to translate the black circles emitted by the aliens into words and meaning. However, much later on in the film, Louise decodes what appears to be a threatening message from the extraterrestrial visitors. Louise is soon racing against the clock to prevent global war.

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

Pizza Pie, oh my!

All God's children love pizza. In an angry, nerve-wracking world, pizza pie triggers instant feel-good. It's the ultimate convenience food. But convenience carries a steep price tag. Classic pizza was created in 16th century Naples. Copied by American food cartels, pizza isn't bad eaten in moderation, but really, who eats pizza in moderation?

Because pizza gives us ephemeral feelgood due to cheese's addictive chemistry, it's the go-to food when we've got the blues, are smashed, too busy or hassled.

Americans eat approximately 100 acres of pizza a day or about 350 slices per second. About 1 in 5 children eat pizza on a given day. Original pizzas don't resemble Americanized versions that protest from the weight of extra cheese on and in the crust, Ranch, BBQ, hamburger, the kitchen sink and more globs of addictive cheese. Americans eat approximately 100 acres of pizza a day or about 350 slices per second.

The LA Times reported cheese is as addictive as drugs and linked to obesity and heart disease. There are about 4-5 ounces of cheese on an average 14-inch pizza. The NIH recommends 1.5 oz. and emphasizes cheese is bad for your temple's health and waistline. To worsen things, white flour spikes glucose (diabetes) and causes inflammation, the silent killer. The challenge: most consumers don't realize how many fat calories are in

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each slice. Combine that with a couple beers and watch your belly bloat.

The World Health Organization warns processed meats like pepperoni, sausage and bacon are the cancerous equivalent of smoking. I know this'll not prevent you from eating pizza, but at least I hope it makes you pause and reflect on your health and happiness.

Suggesting folks change their diet is like asking them to change religions. It's human that most folks don't have the willpower. If you're going to continue making pizza your food god, for goodness sake limit the number of slices you inhale. The take-home: enjoy the pizza in moderation. Don't order extra cheese, but ask for more veggies rather than processed meats. Sprinkle ground fibrous flax seed or chia onto the classic. You are a miracle! Awaken to the possibilities of being the best version of you. But don't kill the messenger. You can still enjoy pizza with restraint, but add a dark leafy-green salad with lots of veggies, sans Ranch dressing, say no to the bread sticks and explore new flavors and toppings. Pizza Margherita on whole wheat crust is my favorite.


