## Greenwood fireman returns to the department which gave him a start in the career field

Although he already had a full-time job as a firefighter in Carmel, Justin Laraway made the decision to come to the Greenwood Fire Department in 2013. After all, it's where he got his start and not too far from home.

Laraway is a graduate of Whiteland Community High School. At 18, he was hired part-time for GFD. He took a leave of absence in 2003 to join the Air Force as a fire-fighter. Stationed in South Carolina, Laraway became a fire instructor for the South Carolina State Fire Academy, helping in the aircraft fire division for a year before the end of his four-year term.

He returned to working part-time for-Greenwood. While applying for a full-time position at many fire departments, he also took a job with Central Nine as a fire instructor with the adult education night school. He became full-time for the Carmel Fire Department in 2012, staying there a year and a half.

Currently an engineer for Greenwood

Fire Station 92 and Perry Township resident, Laraway is also a member of Indiana Task Force 1 as a rescue specialist. That group, through FEMA, responds to natural disasters or terrorist event.

### What was your inspiration to become a firefighter?

I was looking to find something I was interested in once I got out of high school. Central Nine was putting together their first adult education firefighter one and two course. I thought that was something I'd like to do. I went through it. I fell in love with it all. As soon as I got out of the night class at the school, I got on Greenwood Fire Department in 2000.

### What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

I have three and six year old daughters. When the oldest introduced me to her class she said 'this is my dad and he's a firefighter.' She was quick to get that out.

It makes you feel pretty special when kids look at you coming off the truck like you're some sort of superhero as a firefighter. As a professional, it's neat to have a fire department ball cap on and someone seeing that and saying thank you for your service. You know that people still care about what we do. Even if we never got noticed, I'd still love it every day.

### What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

Being in this line of work, you always have a plan a-z aspect - if this doesn't work then you try the next thing. When you have your hands tied and there's nothing you can do about a situation, that's the hardest part. We're here to fix things, to make something better than how we found it.

#### What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

My daughters and I love going horse-back riding, as much as we can. We enjoy fishing together. Anything to do with water, jet skiing and stuff, we do a lot of when we can. When I'm not doing that, I'm working. I have part time work on the side.

### What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

Professionally, one day I'll hopefully be in a leadership position. Also, not get hurt. Personally to continue working on supporting my family and watch my girls grow up.

### What would you have done if you hadn't become a firefighter?

I would probably have been in some type of construction.

## Westwood Elementary donates scarves and hats

Westwood Elementary students took time before their winter break to make blankets and scarves. For the second year, these items will be donated to the homeless.

"It's great to show kids that though we have a lot of blessings and a lot to offer others," said Lauren Kibbe, teacher. "Not necessarily everyone else has the same blessings we do. To be able to help others is really fortunate for us and our society."

The project started last year when then media specialist Susan Kinkade and Kibbe organized the donation. Then fifth grader and student council president Chase Stanger, inspired by the giving, was encouraged to apply for a grant through the Johnson County Community Foundation. He was granted \$400, which allowed the school to continue the program this year. To earn the grant, Chase had to give a presentation by himself to the JCCF board.


"Most of who I was competing against were college students," he said. "I was just a fifth grader so I was shaking and stuff. I talked about how many blankets and scarves we made, the notes that we wrote on them. I talked about how a lot of the younger kids got to participate in it and were happy about it. I

told them that doing this and knowing it could help makes someone's day, warm them so they can have a better life, is awesome."

Now in 6th grade, Chase wasn't able to participate this year, but that's okay because he knows "that when I was there, the younger kids and everyone got to help in every single grade, it made them have this huge smile. Everyone will have a huge smile."

Instead, he and his mom are talking about trying to do something similar at the middle school level like start a club that would allow them to give back.

As part of its Core Essential Values program, Kibbe incorporated the lesson of the month on honor into the project, describing how the students can honor the homeless.








### **UNCOVERING LOVE THROUGH LOSS**

Franklin Township's Zoeller family experiences kindness from the community after their horse barn is destroyed in fire.

For eight straight hours after learning about the horse barn in Franklin Township which caught fire on Dec. 6, members of the horse community were showing up in the Zoeller family's driveway to drop off donations: truckloads of hay, horse blankets and food for both animals and people. Two weeks later, those donations haven't stopped coming.



The barn structure was a complete loss. Cause of the fire is unknown. Three full-size horses, four miniature horses, two goats, a donkey and one rooster escaped and survived. However, the ducks, chickens and (possibly) the rabbit died in the fire. There are still hopes that the barn cat escaped. The donkey, which the family rescued this year, is pregnant and due any day now.

The Zoeller family consists of Brian and Julie with their five children: Kaitlyn, Caleb and Jacob who no longer reside with their parents, and Garrett and Alec who attend Lutheran High School. Brian, an attorney, is a middle school football coach for Lutheran. He began coaching 13 years ago in Franklin Township.

The family moved to their current home five or six years ago, Julie said.

"We wanted property for the kids to run and play and maybe have a lake or a creek," she said. "One of my dreams as a little girl, my cousin and I would lay in bed at our grandma's house and talk about what we wanted; we both wanted horses. I drove onto this property and when we turned the corner before we even saw the house, we knew this is it. The owner said Harley (the horse) came with the house and I said 'I'm sold.' This was my dream come true."

Julie said she enjoyed decorating the barn, themed for the holidays. She even dresses up the horses, participating in costume contests with them. The family invites others onto the property such as the girl scouts which use the horses to earn an equestrian badge.

"It was an older barn but it had character," Julie said. "It held all of our memories. It wasn't just a barn to me. It was a friend. It held all of my secrets, my joy laughter and tears. But the new barn will, too."


Anytime there is a need in the community, the Zoeller family will volunteer, quietly.

"If you see a need, you step up and that's what we do," Julie said. "We've done it all in silence... You know you're doing it for the right reasons when you're not putting it out there. You don't realize that people see that until something happens and they say it's time for us to take care of you."

When they were the ones that needed help, before they even knew what their needs were, the community lined up to return the favor.

"We horse people, we try to stick together and help everyone," said Amy Shillkett, community member. "The person who lost the barn, I've never met her before. She just lives in my township. We tracked her down. I took over some blankets. While I was standing there, people were driving up one after another and bringing hay, buckets - that's just how the horse community is. We're in it for the animals."

Since the fire, Indiana Grand Casino has donated 60 bales of hay, 1,000 pounds of grain, buckets, new horse blankets and other supplies. Community members have donated buckets, hay, blankets, a semi truck to be used for storage, a pop-up shelter for the goats and even breakfast and lunch for the volunteers.

"When you have your own barn and you think it could happen to me, where would I go? Who would help me?" said Michelle Muller, Greenwood, of why she came to donate hay on Dec. 10.

A family has donated their empty barn to temporarily house the horses. Julie said the horses were traumatized at first, and they're still anxious while getting adjusted to their new temporary barn. Home Depot has offered the materials for a temporary structure for the horses to return home. Builders have offered to volunteer when the family does start rebuilding.

"We're just so grateful for everyone showing up in our time of need," Julie said. "We've been very blessed. We're tired and we're traumatized. We're all sick. But people have made it better by coming in and surrounding us with love."

Others have donated their time to begin cleaning up the debris, including Brian's current and former football players. There is so much to do, but at times Julie said it's hard to tell people what it is they need help with next. Cleanup began Dec. 9, with volunteers showing up on Dec. 10 to haul out the metal.

"It's Christmas time. People aren't out shopping today. They're here," Julie said. "I felt with everyone stepping up, I've already had my Christmas this year. I walked through the mall because my son needed a coat. You look at all of the things to buy, the presents, and I don't feel like I need

anything this year. People have been so gracious to me that Christmas has already come."

Julie's friend Alisha Caudell established an account at youcaring.com/juliezoeller-709062 for anyone to donate money. Julie says those funds will be used for verterinary bills. Two days after the fire, they discovered that Harley, their first horse, had stepped on a screw before she escaped the fire. That screw went into her hoof down to the bone which has become infected and her health is critical.

The old barn was built on a flood plain, so Brian is working on the permit side to see what they need to rebuild. Julie intends to research barn layouts and other needs. Working with the insurance company will take time, and Julie said she's dreaming of the day when her horses can be back at home, she can decorate her new barn and in-

vite the community to create new memories along with the family.

"There will be a new barn," Julie said. "We will rebuild. We have a donkey with a baby on the way. We will have a new life soon. That's something to celebrate as well. It's going to move forward and it gives you hope."

## **Drumming up history**

## Laura VanArendonk Baugh to discuss her book, So To Honor Him, at the Franklin Road library

"I played my drum for Him, pa rum pum pum pum

I played my best for Him, pa rum pum pum pum"

The Little Drummer Boy is a song based on Matthew 2 - 9 in the Bible, when the Magi followed a star to find newborn baby Jesus. But who was this little boy playing for the infant?

"Little Drummer boy is one of those carols that people either love or hate," said Laura VanArendonk Baugh, author of *So To Honor Him.* "It makes absolutely no sense if you think about the lyrics. Why would these guys pick up a kid and why would you play a drum for a baby? So I fixed it."

So To Honor Him is a book which anyone of any faith can enjoy, Laura said, and for those who are Christian it could help them make connections they might not have thought about before. The Bible only dedicates nine verses to this piece of history, so there is little people actually know about that journey, and little people know about the Magi.

Laura researched the history of the era and introduced some plausible ideas of who these people were, why this boy was traveling to find baby Jesus and the events surrounding the Nativity. She will speak on *So To Honor Him* on Jan. 9, 6:30 p.m. at the Franklin Road branch of the Indianapolis Public Library. The library, 5550 S. Franklin Rd., has copies available to in-

terested patrons.

"It's going to be fun," she said. "You can talk with an author about the process and the research. Feel free to agree or disagree with my suggestions."

Laura is a graduate of Franklin Central High School and Taylor University. A Franklin Township resident, she is a self-employed author and owner of Canines in Action, for which she travels the country speaking on animal behavior and positive reinforcement.

Laura has sold articles to local magazines and newspapers for years. In 2008, she had her first story sold to a a small press. That being a bad year economically, the business fell through. When the contract expired, she figured if it was good enough to sell to a publisher, it was good enough to self publish. She now has had a mix of self-published and traditionally-published materials.

So To Honor Him is different from the books Laura usually writes, which are speculative fiction such as fantasy or mystery. Her most popular novel is titled Con Job, a "geeky murder mystery" set at a Comic Con or Gen Con-style event.

She has books set for release early in 2017, including *The Song Weaver's Vow*, a blend of Greek and Norse mythologies; *Covalent Bonds* to be released on Valentine's Day; and she contributed to D is for Dinosaur, a book in which 26 authors were given the letter of the alphabet and use it to write about dinosaurs. 

## Collateral Beauty Smith good in flawed film

Life can throw some real curveballs at times, events that absolutely turn your entire world upside down that come without any prior notice. Whether it's the loss of a job, the death of a family member or any other life-changing occurrence, life can be downright cruel. Unfortunately, loss is a part of life and each will have his or her way of dealing with those instances when life delivers an unforeseen punch to the gut. These periods can lead to tears, anger and a lot of questions. One new film looks at how sometimes the answer to those difficult questions can come from unexpected sources.

Collateral Beauty is the story of Howard (Will Smith), a successful New York City advertising executive who, with his business partner and best friend, has just launched his own firm. The future certainly looks bright for Howard and his young firm, but flash forward three years and things have changed dramatically.


Following the unexpected loss of his daughter, Howard essentially spends his days in solitude. He still comes into the office, but doesn't talk to a soul; instead he spends his days building big, elaborate displays out of dominoes. He spends his nights completely alone, but does write and mail letters to Love, Death and Time. Like, Howard, his firm isn't doing well, it's on the brink of bankruptcy and his partners are obviously worried. A business, is offering to buy their firm out, but Howard, who holds controlling stake refuses to sell. However, Howard has some unexpected visitors that cause him to change the way he looks at life.

The highlight of Collateral Beauty is the

performance of Will Smith. Smith plays a man just going through the motions of life and hating every minute of it. In emotional scenes, he's never over the top, even when it would have been easier to go for the big dramatic outburst. Smith portrays hurt and devastation in an extremely believable and convincing manner, one of his best performances in quite some time.

The issues in *Collateral Beauty* come the story itself. Without giving anything away, the film has a number of twists. Unfortunately, even with the subtle hints the film drops throughout, it does not add up. They are not set up in any logical way that would make sense to the rest of the story. The story does not follow the rules it sets up for itself, which ends up being just being pretty irritating.

Despite, a fairly obvious flaw in the structure of its story, *Collateral Beauty* is still worth a look if for nothing else but for the



### The Christmas Plum

#### **NUTRITION**

"Little Jack Horner sat in the corner, Eating his Christmas pie, He put in his thumb and pulled out a plum, And said "What a good boy am I!"

Tis' the season for visions of sugar plums to dance in your head. We'll never know why Jack plunged his thumb into a plum pie, but don't try that at home; the molten sugary 350 degree mixture would cause serious burns.

Dark, juicy plums originated and were cultivated in ancient China for millennia then brought to Japan 200-400 years ago where their notorious deliciousness spread around the world.

The George Mateljan Foundation explains plums and prunes make iron more available which may be related to their vitamin C. In addition, plums are a good source of soluble dietary fiber that helps normalize blood sugar levels by slowing the rate at which food leaves the stomach and by delaying the absorption of glucose following a meal. Soluble fiber also increases insulin sensitivity and can therefore play a helpful role in the prevention and treatment of type 2 diabetes. Prunes' soluble fibers also help lower cholesterol by binding to bile acids and removing them from the temple via elimination. The sweet maroon stone fruits are loaded with powerful antioxidants

Note: those with existing and untreated kidney or gallbladder problems may want to avoid eating plums contain oxalates, naturally-occurring substances found in plants, animals and human beings. When oxalates become concentrated in the Temple, they crystallize causing health problems. Laboratory studies have shown oxalates may also interfere with absorption of calcium from the body. Consult a naturopathic physician. Alas, to Hippocrates dismay, most mainstream doctors lack dietary knowledge-the crux of a much larger health problem in the US.

Try this Plum and Goat's Cheese treat with your New Year's Eve champagne. Cut plums in half from stem to stern and then twist to separate; remove the stone, then place them flesh side up and lightly warm the tasty gems at 375 degrees for 5 minutes. Place a generous tablespoon of goat's cheese in the center cavity and garnish with some Omega 3-rich walnuts. Return them to the oven long enough for the cheese to begin to melt.

The best gift of all is health and happiness and, as it turns out, it's one you can give yourself. A healthy, lovingly nourished, rested holy temple will make good times over the holidays even better. Peace (and Love) on Earth!

**What happened:** Ordinance 16-76 passes first reading and Resolution 16-25 passes second reading.

What it means: Ordinance 16-76 updates the City Municipal Code regarding peddlers, solicitors, street vendors, and food trucks to prevent fraud and crime and to protect the Greenwood citizens. A license will be required for all that are planning on selling as a peddler, street vendor, food truck, etc.. The new regulations will not apply to home grown produce, farmers markets, trade shows and conventions, fixed refreshment stands, or those holding a garage sale.

Resolution 16-25 will approve an interlocal agreement between the City of Greenwood and Pleasant Township in concerns with fire safety. Greenwood will continue to provide fire service within Pleasant Township.

**What's next:** Ordinance 16-76 will go for its second reading in the next council meeting; Resolution 16-25 will go into effect.

What happened: Ordinance 16.01.06 was approved on third and final reading. Ordinance 16.10.07 was approved on second reading.

What it means: Ordinance .06 establishes no parking in specified areas in the city. The council intends to amend the ordinance to establish a time period for these no parking regulations.

Ordinance .07 regards weeds and rank vegetation. The city will begin to educate citizens on what this means. Those not in compliance will be fined.

The story of Christmas is one of the most beautiful love stories ever written, ever told.

Joseph was a nobody carpenter living in a nowhere town called Nazareth. Later in His life this town will reject Him and some in it will try to kill Him.
