



"The video shows the camera stopping and flashing video for a second of my previously recorded living room. The focus goes in and out right before the cigarette moves. These two things cannot be explained. The camera was sitting on a ledge with

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

Center Grove High School graduate Emily Larmore will perform her clarinet with the Bands of America (BOA) Honor Band in the 2017 Tournament of Roses Parade, Jan. 2, 8 a.m. The 5.5-mile "Rose Bowl" parade will be broadcast on ABC, Hallmark Channel, HGTV, KTLA (Tribune), NBC, RFD-TV and Univision.

She will get to spend a week in California rehearsing, participating in special events and performing in the parade. The BOA Honor Band is a 300-piece national ensemble.

Emily grew up in Greenwood with her parents Jeff and Sue Larmore. A 2016 Center Grove High School graduate, she currently is a freshman at University of Indianapolis majoring in music education.

In high school, Emily was involved with the pep band, jazz band, wind ensemble and spent three years with the marching band. With the CGHS marching band, she attended the Macy's Thanksgiving Day parade in 2014. She participated in the Indiana Music Education Association (IMEA) Honor Band all four years of high school.

"Center Grove held me to a very high standard," she says. "They always demanded excellence, doing the best you possibly can do while also showing who I am through my performance. I really look up to my band directors: Joseph Lapka and Kevin Schuessler. I don't think I would be the person I am without them."


Emily is currently in UIndy's wind ensemble, pep band, woodwind quintets and National Association for Music Education (NAfME).

Stars: To the City of Greenwood for the launch of its new website, greenwood.in.gov. With a modern design featuring large-scale, captivating imagery, the new site showcases a variety of commu-

nity assets offered to residents, visitors and businesses. City officials say user experience and transparency were top priorities during the process. The project was spurred by city officials and Greenwood's Redevelopment Commission (RDC), charged with business growth and attraction.

Stars: To the Indianapolis Fire Department, which has worked hard this month to respond to 57 structure fires. As of Dec.28, IFD has responded on 57 working structure fires with only 7 of those being vacant or unoccupied. IFD stated this is an unprecedented number of working, occupied residence fires in a single month for the IFD and 100 percent of them were preventable, with causes such as overloaded extension cords, unattended food on the stove or unattended grease.

2016 SOUTHSIDE PERSON OF THE YEAR

Dr. David Wantz fills many roles, from community builder to mentor, throughout the Southside and greater Indianapolis area

Dr. David Wantz wants to be a good neighbor, to improve his community and get to know everyone personally. Be it at his workplace, a local nonprofit, his church or with his family, he has the ability to understand what his role is, bring everyone together and educate on what needs to be done.

Dr. David Wantz has been selected The Southside Times 2016 Person of the Year for his community contributions which extend beyond his full-time job at University of Indianapolis.

"Kindness and warmth radiate from Dr. Wantz, and he is quick with a heartfelt compliment for anyone who enters a conversation with him," wrote Katie Carlson, Garfield Park Neighbor and Public Information Officer with the Marion County Sheriff's Office, in her letter nominating him as Person of the Year. "He is the ultimate connector, who uses his impressive networks from years of service in Indianapolis to connect people with great ideas, talent, and generosity to each other, fostering growth and innovation

> throughout the community. A Perry Township resident, Dr. Wantz is an incredible asset to Indianapolis' Southside, not just for the positions that he holds and has held, but because of his ability to see the bigger picture, even beyond his areas of expertise, and how all the moving parts work together to drive Indianapolis, and the Southside, forward."

> > Wantz grew up in Maryland and attended college at Milligan College in Johnson

City, Tenn. After earning his bachelor's in sociology, he worked as a sheriff's deputy in Harford County. He moved to Indiana to work at the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy. There, he met Dr. Gene Sease, president of Central University - now University of Indianapolis.

At the time, the university was heavily involved in law enforcement training. Dr. Sease convinced Wantz to join the university board, in 1982. He earned a Master's degree in business in 1984. In 1989 he was appointed to the faculty, teaching and directing the counseling center. Dr. Sease advised him to pursue his doctorate if he intended to remain in higher education. He studied counseling psychology at Indiana University and then began teaching psychology classes and running the counseling center at UIndy.

Wantz transitioned to vice president of student affairs in 1999. He was appointed into community and government relations in 2009, when he really started to do outreach into the Southside community and downtown Indianapolis.

Seven months before the end of Indianapolis Mayor Greg Ballard's term, the administration needed to fill the director of public safety position. Ballard had met Wantz as a new mayor, visiting UIndy.

"There are certain people you remember because of who they are, their personality, how they treat people," Ballard said. "He represented UIndy to the city so much that I got to know him pretty well. When Troy Riggs left, those last few months of my administration, the name David Wantz came up. Even I was stunned at how universal the name was, how much he was liked on every level."

UIndy allowed Wantz to leave his position temporarily to serve the city in 2015. In his role as director of public safety, he administered police, fire and emergency medical services. When Mayor Joe Hogsett came into office, the position was eliminated, and Wantz assisted with that transition.

"It was a difficult role to walk into," Ballard said. "He kept the ship steady in a very difficult time. I thought he did that very well... I can't emphasize enough how I think he's a good representative everywhere. People remember him because of his optimism. He has a way of making people feel comfortable immediately. That's a rare skill. He brings credibility and trust to wherever he is."

When Wantz returned to UIndy, the university's provost had resigned. He is now serving in that role as interim provost.

"David knows how to do community building," said UIndy President Dr. Robert Manuel. "He knows how to motivate. He knows a lot about the University of Indianapolis and academic enterprises. He has the trust and respect of everyone in the university. He was the perfect provost, in the interim. As a faculty member, he knows how to move between the questions about university administration, classroom management and the delivery of education."

Wantz has become an integral part of the community, joining nonprofit boards and neighborhood associations. He served on the board of directors for Keep Indianapolis Beautiful, a nonprofit assisting in community improvement projects, starting approximately in 2008.

"At one point, we had some issues with Keep Indianapolis Beautiful with regard to a neighborhood specifically," said John Andrews, vice president in business development and marketing at Shiel Sexton, who served on the board at the same time. "It was a tough problem. He was the person who was able to come in and get everybody to sit down and work through the issues and make everyone happy. It was amazing

what he was able to do and help us navigate through an incredibly tough situation, make everyone happy and keep the peace. I will never forget how he was able to do that. He's incredibly good at not just pretending to listen to people but will actually sit here and listen to them, making everybody feel like they've been heard and walk away with some of that satisfaction."

Wantz has served on the board of the Indianapolis Public Library for three years, appointed by the Indianapolis Board of School Commissioners and is currently board president. He has been reappointed to serve four more years. The library is currently working on implementing its strategic plan. This includes the renovation of the Southport branch which was completed in October 2016, and the construction of a new branch in Perry Township which is still in the planning stages.

"David has just been that very gracious connector," said Jackie Nytes, CEO of Indy-PL. "He's been great in terms of improving our relationships with some of the councilors on the Southside, the business leaders down there and making the connections we needed as we've searched for a location in Perry Township. I remember him sitting me down with the school superintendent, talking over the map and things with him. We met with a city-county councilor and drove all over the area to look at land. As a board member for the library, he has not limited his engagement to the Southside. He's been very quick to understand the county-wide challenges and willing to speak to them. He has that bigger vision."

Wantz also serves on the Indiana Law Enforcement board, and the IMPD Merit Commission.

In 2015, The University of Indianapolis, Fifth Third Bank, Indianapolis Neighborhood Housing Partnership (INHP) and Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC) partnered to lead the Quality

of Life Plan. Committees formed to look into what the neighborhoods need to improve life for its residents, business owners and other stakeholders. Their plan was unveiled on Dec. 13. Wantz has been involved through the entire process, working behind the scenes.

"I've been involved in a number of community-based initiatives," said Andrews, who also serves on a committee for this plan. "He was really a different voice in this effort. He recognized things on a really granular level on the Southside of Indy. When it comes to planning and putting

together a program, you can't parachute someone in. You have to have someone who has spent time int he neighborhood, understands it and what it lacks. That's what he brought."

What you see is what you get. Outside of his professional relationships, Wantz is no different, said his wife, Susan Fleck. The couple met at UIndy and will have been married for 30 years this coming summer.

"I thought he smiled too much," Fleck said, about her first impression of her husband. "I thought nobody could be that happy. He still smiles all the time and he's genuinely happy to see people, to meet people, and people respond to that. He remembers names. He remembers how they met. When he sees people he knows, he lights up; it's just him. It wasn't fake at all. The warmth and enthusiasm he has in public is more prevalent at home."

Wantz and Fleck have two children: Ja-

cob, 35, of Indianapolis, and Annie (Mack), 32, of Greenwood. In his free time, Wantz enjoys camping and hiking with his family in their Airstream, especially Mt. Renier National Park in Washington.

"He's fun to be with," Fleck said. "He's inquisitive about everything. ... He's kind of a renaissance man. He can do anything. He has a wide range of interest from music, literature, art and history. I love that he's great to his family. Of all the groups of people he knows and is involved with, he would always choose his family first."

He also enjoys reading, traveling,

looking at art, woodworking, working on his Ford 8N tractor which he entered in the state fair and drove in the tractor parade.

"He's continually amazed me with his range of interests, his breadth of knowledge, his insights into people and organizations, his tirelessness, his work ethic, his enthusiasm for arts and culture, and his commitment to being both an academic and a crafts-

man, refusing to limit himself to the ivory tower," said Peter Noot, retired editor at UIndy, a colleague who has come to call Wantz a friend since meeting one another in the early '80s. "His interests are truly too many to name but include serious woodworking, cooking, all things Norway, all things Maryland, the English language, and vast quantities of fiction and nonfiction. Don't ask him about basketball. But he can talk the physics of baseball and the glories of the late Baltimore Colts. All who know David, though, know him first for his warm and ebullient nature and

his explosive laugh."

Wantz and Fleck attend Resurrection Lutheran Church on the Southside of Indianapolis and have been active members there. Wantz has served as a church counselor, treasurer, lecturer and mentor.

"He's the real deal when it comes to somebody who has obvious leadership gifts, intellect and talent but as a pastor I'm more impressed with his innate humility, his deep faith and a faith that above all spurs him to be a servant in the community," said Rev. David Schreiber, lead pastor. "His leadership and service is never about him. It's about the institution he serves. As a Christian he asks himself how do I use my influence, my place in life, as calling to serve and especially to serve my community."

People tend to call on Wantz when there is a problem, to ask for his wisdom and guidance.

"He really does a great job of seeing things from the big picture, not getting caught up in the minutia of things, but looking at the processes of things from the 20,000-foot level," Fleck said.

Ballard has dubbed Wantz as "Mr. Interim," a nickname for his his most recent job titles, and his willingness to step up, adjust to each individual situation and fill in exactly as needed.

As far as his work at UIndy goes Manuel said, "David will always be part of how the university connects with the community and how the university defines its connection with the community, until he decides to retire. He's good at mediation and negotiation, and does so at the heart of somebody that really cares about people which I would think would be his biggest strength."







Top 10 films of '16


MOVIE REVIEW

To say 2016 has been an odd year would be a severe understatement. - **10.** *Don't Breathe* Well written, genuinely creepy and chilling horror flick that will stay with you long after viewing. Easily the best horror film 2016 provided.
- Bad Moms Plenty of laughs, most of which comes via the hilarious Kathryn Hahn, makes this comedy one of the year's best. The best female-led comedy since 2011's Bridesmaids.



My dear Millennials and X-Generation-trust me on this. There was a time, a long time ago, when we actually made heavenly hot chocolate memories from scratch not a pouch or tin. And it didn't contain a crap storm of nasty chemical additives. The bogus packages you are accustomed overflow with health-trashing, age-accelerating monstrously artificially ingredients that add up to '0' nutrition. You are so special, so gifted, organically beautiful, and capable of greatness. So why trash yourself like a rock star a hotel room and then expect your temple to remain young, beautiful and full of energy?

Raw, un-stepped on cacao and cocoa contain antioxidant, flavonoids and magnesium that assist heart function, lower blood pressure and improve mood. Antioxidants may improve blood flow to the heart and brain, prevent clots, improve cardiac health, and act as anti-inflammatories. - 2-3 tsp. 'sugar': coconut sugar, Sucanat, maple syrup or stevia powder*
- 1-2 tbsp. cacao or cocoa powder (I recommend cacao for its health mojo)
- 1 tsp. cinnamon powder

(*Stevia---Not Stevia in the Raw or Truvia)

- Whisk together the cocoa, sugar, salt, and about 2 tablespoons milk in a small saucepan over medium-low heat until cocoa and sugar are dissolved.
- Whisk in the rest of the milk and heat it over medium heat, whisking occasionally, until it is hot.
- Stir in the vanilla and serve.

Sister Mary Bede Betz

Sister Mary Bede Betz wasn't alone when she passed away Dec. 12. Another sister was with her.

It was the end of a journey that began when she entered the habit in 1943 at Monastery Immaculate Conception in Ferdinand, Ind. She was 18 years old. Seventeen years later, she moved with 112 other nuns to Beech Grove to help establish Our Lady of Grace Monastery.

She taught elementary school — between first and sixth grade — for 52 years.

Sister Bernardine Ludwig recalls teaching with her in a public school in southern Indiana. The school's open floor plan meant teachers could hear each other over the wheeled bulletin boards that divided the classrooms.

"Any teacher that has ever taught and had to do traditional teaching in a wall-less class area — they'd be the first ones I'd canonize,"

Ludwig lasted two years before moving to another school. Betz stayed for decades.

"The fact that she had the patience and the love to put up with that for all those years, to me, was pretty heroic," she said.

After Betz retired, she remained at the monastery in Beech Grove. She turned her attention to helping the homeless and poor. Between 2008 and 2014, she sewed 692 quilts from "scraps of material people gave her," according to Sister Mary Luke Jones. Betz kept a record of the quilts with the date each was completed and a short description.

St. Vincent de Paul distributed the guilts. She never knew who they went to in the end, but she sewed a blessed medal into each one. The medal, Jones says, was intended to protect those who used them.

Both Jones and Ludwig describe her as "prayerful." Ludwig says she could spend an hour in prayer at times.

"I wasn't there when she took her last breath, but I was there shortly after," Ludwig says. "When I walked in, the first thing I noticed was that she had a smile on her face."

It wasn't a common sight, but Ludwig calls it an appropriate one. "She brought a lot of happiness to a lot of people."



Dan Challis

When Beech Grove police officers remember former chief Dan Challis, they remember an even-tempered professional.

Challis served as Beech Grove's police chief for 11 years. He also served as a member of the department's pension board. One of the people he hired was current chief Mark Swartz.

"He never raised his voice or yelled at anybody that I ever heard of," Swartz says.

Beech Grove officers Lt. Mike Treat and Maj. Tom Eagan, each of whom knew Challis for more than a decade, echo the sentiment. They call Challis easy to talk to, down to earth.

Challis was an avid golfer. Eagan recalls the worst thing about playing with him was the practice swings. He'd take seven or 10 before hitting the ball. He says he used to joke with Challis that he was wasting all his energy on them.

Still, Treat calls him a "dead-eye" on the golf course.

After retiring, he tended bar one day a week at O'Gara's Irish Pub and held a crew position on the Sarah Fisher Racing Team in the Indy Racing League.

Lifelong friend John O'Gara and his son, racing team manager Andy O'Gara, fondly remember spending time with Challis at the races. Especially after the team's first win in 2011 at the Kentucky Indy 300.

"We kind of took off running toward victory circle, but we didn't know where it was," John says. "We were jumping fences. It was crazy."

"I think he was probably happier for Sarah and me," Andy says, adding that it was special "to see how much joy that brought him and celebrating in victory lane and later at the team party.

Eagan says Challis was a "community-oriented chief." Among other things, he, along with John, helped with the Carz 'r' Us car show. It remains one of the largest funders for the police department's Shop with a Cop program.

It was the kind of community dedication, Eagan says, that comes from a hometown guy.

"He never asked for anything in return and would always help out someone in need," Treat says.



Kara A. Haynes

Though she only graced this earth for 17 years, Center Grove High School student Kara Haynes had a tremendous impact on her community and the lives of her peers. Her best friend, Ciara Phillips, describes her as genuine and says that even from the beginning of their friendship, the two were able to trust each other and talk about anything. In fact, Ciara says, if any of her friends were going through a difficult time, Kara would drop everything to serve as their support system.


One memory that Ciara says she will treasure is when Kara joined her family on a road trip to Florida and the two of them played the song "Walk of Shame" by Meghan Trainor over and over during the car ride. Kara had an inherent gift for working with children and people with special needs, and she interacted well with Ciara's older sister Kristin, who is autistic.

"She completely understands me and my family," Ciara says.

Over the past few years, Kara opened up about how personal struggles and a negative self-image had led her down an uncertain path. After receiving treatment for depression and self-harm, she started a non-profit called Project Hope. Her goal in establishing the organization was to erase the stigma that surrounds mental illness and to help fund counseling and rehabilitation for other young people who are affected by it. Kara recognized how many obstacles keep people from seeking treatment, and hoped that through her efforts she could at least remove the financial hurdle.

In her spare time, Kara became involved in her life group at Stones Crossing Church, and she partially attributed her recovery to a renewed relationship with God. She was also an avid reader and dedicated fan of the Divergent series by Veronica Roth. Ciara remembers that during Kara's funeral, or around that time, someone had said, "She didn't want to live one life, but many; that's why she read."

Kara passed away suddenly on Jan. 27, 2016 of natural causes. Her family and friends will carry on her legacy by continuing to raise money for young adults suffering from mental illness, whose voices seek to be heard. Bill Bowers

The word "passionate" comes up when Beech Grove Mayor Dennis Buckley describes his late friend, William J. "Bill" Bowers, who passed away in March.

Bowers was already serving on the Beech Grove Fire Department when Buckley joined in 1980. He called Bowers passionate about his family, and about public safety and fire prevention. "He would do whatever he could to help anybody."

"A lot of the young firemen looked up to him for guidance," Buckley said.

Bowers influenced untold numbers of elementary school children through the Learn Not to Burn programs. Throughout the community, Bowers was unstoppable in his pursuit of fire safety, especially in the business world.

"He taught me that if you lose a business, you lose tax dollars," Buckley said, noting that Bowers was aggressive in conducting annual inspections. His successors have carried on, according to an annual report by the BGFD, which said it completed 348 inspections in 2015.

After Bowers retired from the Beech Grove department, he worked as a deputy fire marshal for the Indianapolis Fire Department and also gave 20 years of service as a safety supervisor at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

Buckley would shoot pool at the department with Bowers, who would come in and assist with fires when he wasn't assigned to a shift. He rarely missed a day, Buckley said, praising his friend's work ethic. When Buckley was fire chief, he promoted Bowers to battalion chief.

But not all was firefighting – Bowers slipped away every year to Daytona Beach around the Fourth of July. An avid auto racing fan, he joined friends each year in Daytona, and they posted messages on social media to comment on how they'll miss him.

Bowers was "old school," Buckley said. "Just a good guy."

His fellow firefighters thought so, too, and they sent an honor guard to the funeral home.



Rita Norwood

Rita Norwood was bold. When fire devastated her church in 1999, she told Pastor Wayne Murray that God had big plans for them. The refurbished building had represented progress, but a lightning strike challenged the roughly 150 members to persevere. They rebuilt the Grace Assembly of God in New Whiteland into a membership of 1300.

Rita, a Greenwood resident who died this year, and her husband, Jim, were lifelines to the sinking Pentecostal church when Murray arrived with his wife, Traci, in 1997. He called Rita the church's "primary spiritual leader."

A year or so after he took over, Rita told him that God had given her a vision of a home for young women with crisis pregnancies, and that she was to make the vision a reality. A compassionate nursing supervisor, "She'd seen a lot," Murray said.

According to friends, the instruction to build came after two weeks of Rita's private encounters with the Holy Spirit, who arrived in the form of a breeze. Moved to silent readiness, she eventually heard a voice tell her what to do, according to Yadi Garcia, her friend and protégé. Over the years, Rita fostered the creation of a non-profit board for Angelcare, Inc., which purchased land in Trafalgar and began to build the house, still under construction. Information about the nonprofit can be found at angelcare-inc.org.


The first move-ins will occur late next summer, but a pregnant teen who was beaten at home has already contacted Angelcare, Garcia said. In helping the broken 19-year-old, Garcia had a chance to practice what Rita preached – to express that each is loved by God.

Rita's "word for the Lord" could be loud, Murray said. Exhortations included requests for help to enable the long-childless Garcia to conceive. And a year later, she gave birth to twins, she said.

Garcia said if Rita could be here when the house is finally ready, her typical reaction would be to shout, "Wooooo-hoo!"

Joseph "Joe" Schaub

"Two years, six months, five days. Africa, Italy, France, Germany, Holland, Czechoslovakia, and parts of Austria. 79th Division, 313th Infantry, Charlie Company."

Ask Joseph Schaub about his military services, and that's what he would repeat. Proud of his military service, Joe once told The Southside Times that he was even more thankful to return home.

Born July 9, 1919, Joe grew up in Indianapolis and graduated from Cathedral High School. He passed away in April 2016. His obituary described him as "the kindest, most gracious, and generous gentleman that you ever met. He always had a smile and a twinkle in his blue eyes. His infectious laugh was truly one of a kind. If he sensed there was a need in someone's life, he would fill it."

Joe enlisted in the Army on May 13, 1942, serving during WWII in five invasions, three campaigns and spearheaded for the 9th Army at the Rhine River.

"There was a war coming up," he had said. "I decided that everyone else is going in there. I might as well give it a try myself. Boy, did I give it a try."

Upon returning home, Joe married Louise (Schniepp) Schaub who survives. He retired from Haag Drug Company in 1965. He lived near St. Roch Catholic Church, where he was a parishioner. He spent 31 years helping at his son, Gregory's business, EM Company in Southport. Joe said he was always a bit ornery, from playing pranks on his fellow soldiers, to telling jokes to employees and customers at EM Company. He would hand out his own business card, with the job title, "Registered Bullologist, President of the N.B.A.A. (National Bullologist Association of America)."



Jane McCarty Zimmer

Before Madison Avenue was the business destination it has grown to become today, it was a two-lane residential area, home to many longtime Greenwood families. Jane Zimmer and her late husband Bill purchased their house just behind Madison Avenue in 1956. Jane passed away at 91 years old in April of this year, and those who know her say Greenwood lost a lot of history along with her.

Jane opened the first business along that strip of Madison Avenue in 1966, Ms. Jane's School, a preschool where she taught for three years. La Trattoria Italian Restaurant is housed in that location today.

Jane was born July 12, 1924 in White River Township and attended Center Grove Schools, later attending Indiana University. Jane told The Southside Times back in 2014, that the piece of property which now houses La Trattoria was wearing down, and if she wanted to remain in the area, she knew they had to purchase it, which they did in 1966. Not everyone was happy about having the school in the area, as it was primarily residential, but she had the backing of her students' parents.

In 1976, Jane and Bill purchased the property which is now The Flower Market and continued to buy a connecting piece of land each decade, forming The Village Shoppes. She, Bill and their sons worked on the houses to improve them.

Madison Avenue has continued to grow. Jane's son David is now the landowner for The Village Shoppes. David sets up a vegetable stand in front of The Flower Market each growing season, and Jane would often be found sitting on the front porch, enjoying the weather, visiting with friends and sharing stories. She remained an active member of the Greater Greenwood Chamber of Commerce, and attended city events as often as she could.

"Over a period of years, Madison Avenue has improved and I don't think it's through yet," Jane said, in 2014.

What she didn't emphasize, humbly, was the hand she played in helping it get that way.

Richmond Hill trial concludes

but the effects of the tragedy will never be forgotten

Marion County Prosecutor Terry Curry announced Dec. 20 that Monserrate Shirley was sentenced to 50 years in prison for her role in the Richmond Hill explosion. She was the fourth person involved to be convicted and sentenced.

Shirley, then-boyfriend Mark Leonard, his brother Bob Leonard, Jr., Gary Thompson and Glenn Hults conspired to and ultimately blew up the Shirley household on the Southside of Indianapolis in the Richmond Hill neighborhood on Nov. 10, 2012 in an attempt to claim insurance money.

The explosion injured seven and killed Jennifer and John "Dion" Longworth.

Back then, Roncalli High School history teacher Pat Crosley told the Southside Times he felt lucky to be alive. His home suffered severe damage, but no one was home at the time. He was at the St. Jude Reverse Raffle and his kids were away at sleepovers.

"Our kids were staying the night with friends, and I would have been in my recliner watching the news at the time of the explosion, so we were fortunate because it could have been worse," he said.

Two years later, Jennifer's father,

Don Buxton, told The Southside Times, "This is totally unbelievable. We'll wake up in the morning, we still can't believe it. You still expect a phone call, something. That first year we

went through in shock, just doing everything. Then you realize this is the way it is and you have to adjust to the new normal."

Soon after the explosion, Southwest Elementary School dedicated a new media center to Jennifer and placed a plaque at the site. She taught at the school for 12 years. It also established a scholarship in her honor.

Curry said he was aware that nothing his team could do, despite tens of thousands of hours of effort, would do away with the grief the victims felt.


"In spite of the fact that we talk to families constantly, I really acknowledge we can never begin to comprehend the grief and anger individuals must feel from experiencing a loss of a loved one in a violent crime like this," he said.

He added that he feels sorry for Shirley's daughter because she was a victim, too. Shirley's "horrible decisions" have led to her daughter losing her.

The last sentence in connection with the explosion was handed down to Hults on Dec. 28. Mark Leonard and Bob Leonard, Jr. each received life sentences without parole. Gary Thompson received 20 years.

"No one involved in this investi-

gation or prosecution will forget the stories of this tragedy and the continuing fear and trauma that it has caused survivors," Curry said.

From the time that I was 12 until I was about 20, I lived in rural Indiana. We lived in a small country home owned by my mom's brother. But, like the man who so wanted a fruit tree to bear fruit, we keep digging and applying the right nutrients to our field and pray that next year will be different.

In these times we must remain hopeful. God has a plan for even our failures, that we may learn something by it and grow as individuals, both in our personal strength and our faith. We pray that God will reveal His plan and guide us forward in bringing our garden to life. Pray with me to that end.
