
Beech Grove Middle School students make the school festive


Southside Pastor Bill Jenkins holds signing for second book release

Beech Grove Firearms reaches one year in new facility, now focusing on perfecting its operations

When Greg and Michelle Burge opened Beech Grove Firearms in May 2008, it was a small shop with three employees off of Main Street, Beech Grove. Throughout the last five years, what Michelle used to jokingly call the gun boutique has grown to a much larger facility at 3020 Emerson Ave., and is home to Indiana's largest indoor shooting range, which opened a year ago on Dec. 15.

"Sometimes I can't believe it," Michelle says. "It's a huge compliment when people walk up to me, see my shirt and say 'I love what you've done; it's really improved the look of the community."

The business started as a hobby for Greg. When Michelle suggested she return to work when their youngest child was set to be in first grade the following year, he suggested that they open a gun store. She said she would be happy to, with just a couple of stipulations: that they have a clean shop and a nonsmoking environment. Since the shop opened, Michelle said she's been hands-on, learning as much as she can about guns, ammunition and other weaponry. She is in the shop, usually 50 hours a week, working with purchasing, sales, receiving and everywhere else she is needed.

"I'm a very hands-on type of person," Michelle says. "When I'm faced with something I jump in and learn as much as I can. Nothing is more aggravating than when you go somewhere and you ask something and the person who should know, doesn't. I like to make sure that a customer leaves with an answer."

As business increased, there was a need to expand. The current facility opened Oct. 15, 2012. The indoor shooting range opened Dec. 15, 2012. Beech Grove Firearms now has 12 employees, with Greg's parents also working in the shop. Michelle says the 12,500 square foot range has been their largest investment, with 20 lanes at a 25 yard distance. The majority of the money spent on constructing it went into having clean air quality. The building is zoned so that it can have further expansion, though Michelle says they are now concentrating on perfecting the business.

Supply and demand has been the largest challenge since the store opened. Most re-

cently, after the Sandy Hook tragedy, an assault weapon ban scare led to more demand than most places had supply.

"It was scary at times," Michelle says. "There were times we couldn't get any product at all. Luckily we made a wise investment. Last July we made a big ammo purchase and that's what got us through the beginning of the year when no one could get ammo. Because unfortunately if you don't have any ammo no one will come and shoot at your range."

Beech Grove Firearms also offers educational classes for those in the community to learn to use firearms and how to use them for personal protection. They offer the NRA basic pistol course and NRA personal protection course at \$150. Michelle says they will also begin hosting a Well-Armed Woman group, meeting one Sunday of the month, for all ages and experience levels. They will meet for one hour and shoot at the range for another hour.

"I feel that a gun is like a car, lawn mower, tractor; you need to educate yourself and your child about it," Michelle says. "...I think everybody should be educated."

In January, Michelle says they will partner with the Marion County Police Department and the Special Olympics to host a competitive shoot fundraiser. The store is involved with funding and sponsoring many community initiatives. Michelle collects pop tabs for Riley Children's Hospital. She has also chosen to sponsor many students in local schools, such as a kid in the Franklin Central High School show choir, Beech Grove choir and for Roncalli's performing arts.

"The neatest thing about this is all of the people I have met over the years," Michelle says. "I normally work back in my office Tuesday through Friday but on Saturday, I make it a point to work out the front meet people and get to know what the public is wanting. To stay successful you need to stay connected to your customers."



hether you're a dedicated cinephile, who practically lives at the theater,

or just the casual film viewer, there are just some films that are universally loved. Chances are that no matter what your level of interest in film may be, you can probably rattle off quite a few Disney films without investing a great deal of thought. The latest film from the house of mouse is the animated feature Frozen.

Frozen is the story of princesses Anna (Kristen Bell), Elsa and the love between two sisters. The story begins with the two sisters as chil-

dren. We quickly learn Elsa is much different than other children. Everything Elsa touches immediately turns to ice, henceforth the title of the film. Realizing her special ability, Elsa's parents keep her isolated from society and unfortunately from her sister Anna. Due to a set of unforeseen cir-

The vocal performances and the singing here are both top notch. Even though you

may be able to recognize the actors voicing the characters, it never distracts from the film. The singing and the songs, like everything else in the film, fit perfectly. Not once does the singing feel forced and out of sync with the rest of the story.

Disney has a hit with Frozen; it has cute characters, a relevant story, and just enough humor to keep the kiddies attention. While it may not be Wreck-It Ralph good, Frozen is still one of the best things Disney has released in the last decade.

You'll need 4-inch skewers to make this appetizer. If you can't find them, long toothpicks will be fine, as will larger skewers cut to size. Be sure to soak them for 15-20 minutes before cooking to avoid burning. Because this is holiday time, it's nice to use a higher quality meat like filet mignon, but you can use whatever steak you like.



Aioli:1/2 cup mayonnaise

- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon smoked paprika
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- Kosher salt and ground black pepper, to taste

Skewers:

- 3/4 pound filet mignon, cut into 3/4inch squares (should get 30-36)
- 1/2 small red pepper, cut into 3/4-inch squares (should get 20-22)
- Kosher salt and ground
- black pepper, to taste
- Olive oil, for greasing the pan or grill

To make aioli, mix mayonnaise, lemon juice, paprika, garlic and olive oil in small bowl until well blended. Season to taste with salt and pepper and set aside. This can be done up to 24 hours in advance.

To make skewers, thread one piece of steak onto skewer, followed by a pepper, another piece of steak, one more pepper, and one more piece of steak. You should have three squares of beef and 2 pepper squares on each skewer. Repeat until all beef and peppers are used. Season generously with salt and pepper on all sides.

Set grill pan over high heat, or preheat grill to medium-high. Rub oil onto surface of pan or grates. Place skewers on pan or grill. If using pan, cook for about 8 minutes for medium steak, turning during cooking so all sides have grill marks. If using grill, cook for 6-8 minutes for medium, keeping lid closed as much as possible, turning throughout, until cooked to your liking. Alternatively, you can broil skewers for 6-8 minutes, turning once halfway through.

Serve with aioli on the side for dipping.





Out-of-place pronouns

Question: Will you please address the use of the following: "The President he is giving a speech," as opposed to what I was taught -

"The President is giving a speech." I've noticed lately that news anchors/readers on both local and national/cable broadcasts are using the first example, and it drives me crazy! THANKS! (Susie)

Answer: Susie, I don't have an explanation for why newscasters would construct their sentences this way other than – if I may take the liberty of inventing a phrase – a case of "stumbly mouth." We all re-

member the trials of high school speech class, and I, for one, am prone to forgive the occasional on-camera tongue slip. I mean, I can barely manage talking to myself.

That being said, we certainly can take a look at why the above construction is wrong. It boils down to pronouns and the rules for their use.

First: What is a pronoun? A pronoun is a word that takes the place of a noun or a noun phrase. The noun being substituted for is called the "antecedent."

To quickly illustrate the point, an example: "Ann grabbed the ball and then quickly ran it in for a touchdown." The pronoun "it" takes the place of its antecedent "ball."

Pronouns have a lot of uses, but the most common one is to avoid repetition. This is the case in our example sentence. Without a pronoun, we would have: "Ann grabbed the ball and then quickly ran the ball in for a touchdown." Is it grammatically incorrect? No. Does

it sound awkward and repetitive? You betcha. Pronouns come into play when we want to refer back to a noun in a later clause or phrase. I'm having trouble coming up with an occasion in which it would be appropriate to use

a subject pronoun like "he" to refer back to an antecedent within the same phrase, i.e. "the president he is..." Why is this? Because the pronoun can effectively be read as its antecedent, meaning the sentence would be, "The president the president is giving a speech." That takes repetition to a whole new level.

You might see a noun and a pronoun right next to each other if they are separated by a comma, though, again, they would not be part of the same phrase or clause. Example:

"Ann, she is my friend, scored a touchdown." The main clause is "Ann scored a touchdown." "She is my friend" serves as a parenthetical dependent clause.

In conclusion: Is, "The president he is giving a speech," correct? No. Do I think it's a case of "stumbly mouth?" Yes. Am I overly enthusiastic about using the phrase "stumbly mouth?" Possibly.

Williams said the church seats 800 people and he hopes to have it full every night.

"One of the things about a parish mission is the large presence," said Sheryl Babb, director of religious education. "We may have some parishioners that aren't as active as we want them to be, or Catholics that have fallen out. We want to welcome them all. For those adults interested in becoming Catholic, it's good for them. It's open to everybody."

Today, I am so glad that I have chosen to believe in Christ Who was and is the gift of God to us. He is God's gift of goodness and grace in physical form.
