



He was a man of few words. I seem to remember him more talkative during my childhood years. After my grandmother passed, Lewis remained in the house. It became his abode and his sanctuary; and the very house of my childhood that ignited the paranormal fire that continues today.

Lewis once admitted that he watched the TV paranormal shows. When he discovered I did those things he asked, "You have all of that equipment?" I had always planned to ask him about any experiences he may have encountered in that house, but never did. And it won't happen now. I ran out of time, as did my uncle.


When Uncle Lewis was younger he made the move to the Southside of Indianapolis to

a couple of those runs I made the trip with him. It was a high speed run on narrow and twisty back roads south of Elizabethtown, Ky., where I contemplated my mortality as Lewis guided his car through the darkness of a Kentucky night. The tires hissed across the pavement as the curves became a medley of Detroit iron in motion. Finally, Lake Cumberland and Jamestown lay before us. Lewis had just wanted to get home. In time he returned and stayed, never to make that trip from Indianapolis again.

When his sister (my mother) became a stroke victim, Lewis visited daily. He and my mom would sit in silence, watch TV, and contemplate their own mortality. Talk was not necessary.

The night (July 31, 2014) when my mother died, Lewis was in the room during her last breath. When I told him she was gone, Lewis had that little boy's glazed look of lost across his face. He left the room, went to his car and cried.

I did not see Lewis the last few visits. That was my fault... I should have made the effort, but didn't. Maybe I didn't always see Lewis on every visit, but there was some comfort in knowing that he was there, just out of reach. And maybe some childhood semblance those things don't change and remain as the days of our youth. Future visits will be lonelier with his passing.

While sitting at a local meeting or event, Duane King has his sketchbook out, or a scratch piece of paper, with his hands busily sketching an image of someone from across the room. The subjects of his sketches are usually unaware of his artwork.

Whether he's sketching, illustrating or sculpting, King said that people are one of his favorite subjects – next to animals. As director for SoArts (Southport Artistry Committee) and president for the Southside Art League, Duane said people are also his inspiration to continue to lead within these art organizations and help oth-

er artists become successful in their own careers.

"I would (encourage) artists to seek out and join other art groups like ours to get with other artists so you can get on a path and see what needs to be done," King said. "If you go on your own, it's a long trek of learning things the hard way."

Duane said his interest in art grew from the time he was a child, playing with Play-Doh and drawing all of the time. He'd draw in class to help him remember his notes. In his freshman year at Southport High School, he met art teacher, Roger Gale.

"He really encouraged me to stay with art," King said. "I was going to be a mechanic. He encouraged me to take art so I changed my major."

King went on to major in visual communications at Herron School of Art and Design. He has worked 30 years in the graphic design field, 25 of those years with FC Tucker Company where he is the senior art director. He joined SoArts in 2011 and the Southside Art League in 2012, although he had been a member in the past. He is also a vice president and board member for Herron Alumni Association and of Hoosier Salon. He resides in Perry Township with his wife, Carol.

Between his full-time job, his commission work, involvement with SoArts and Southside Art League and spending time with his family, there is not much time for King to focus on his own, personal artwork. When he has the time, he said that he likes to go to musical performances and sketch there.

"People interest me," King says. "I watch from a distance. Usually when I sketch people, they don't usually know I'm doing it. Sometimes they figure it out. But usually I do it anonymously."

Some of King's work will be exhibited in June at the Southside Art League. He will celebrate with the opening reception on June 12, 6-8 p.m.

This spring, he was selected as one of 15 artists to participate in the Indianapolis Zoo's Naturally Inspired Paint Out. Artists create a piece of artwork in one day. The art is on display all summer and will be auctioned off on Aug. 27. This year, King made a sculpture of the orangutan, Rocky.

Through SoArts, King and other leaders of the group are currently looking for submissions for designs for a mural on the side of the Southport Community Center. The mural will be painted Aug. 8 with help from the community.

"I do too much," King said. "I do sketch-

ing, illustration, sculpture. I enjoy everything so much. I like the variety of it. One day you're creating a logo for someone and the next day you're sculpting a face out of clay. The things I don't enjoy, I've dropped off my list of things I do... It's great to see somebody enjoy your artwork. They see an illustration and they just love it or see a sculpture. That makes it worth it."

King said while he'd like to make a living from his artwork or retire and just have fun creating art someday, he enjoys helping other people

achieve that same goal in the meantime. He said that's his inspiration with SoArts, where he sends weekly newsletters to artists with links to opportunities and additional resources for them. The group, which was created in 2010 by Southport resident Melodie Yvonne Ramey, is active in the community, participating at many Southport and Garfield Park events. King said while the group has good leaders, they aim to continue to grow.

"It's a long term goal of mine to help bring up the arts profile on the Southside," King said. "Not everything will come right away. It's a long term investment. I'd love to focus on my own work a little more, but something needs to be down here."



Ryan Bowersox reached a year of serving for the Southport Police Department in May. At 22-years-old, he said his time with Southport has taught him a lot, grown his passion for law enforcement and encouraged him to continue pursuing it as a long-term career.

Bowersox is a junior at IUPUI studying public safety management with minors in criminal justice and sociology. He serves for the Indiana National Guard. He plans on working with SPD until at least the end of the year, when he said he hopes to find a fulltime job for another department - although he said he's like to stay in touch with Southport and help in any way he can.

"It's really taught me how mature I've become, how I can handle myself in stressful situations," Bowersox said. "It's helped me springboard into almost getting on other departments. This department being here has been a really good thing for me. It allows me to come out and do what I love to do. All I can think about is the next time I can come into work."

What was your inspiration to become a police officer?

I went to school for elementary education on a full-ride scholarship at Marian University. I left there and went to IUPUI and throughout I had no idea what I wanted to do. My old football coach at Warren Central was an IMPD officer and took me on a ridealong. I knew then that this is what I wanted to do. It clicked instantly.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

I received a certificate of commendation for an incident. I was sitting with an officer doing paperwork and the call came that another officer saw a homicide suspect in a parking lot. We did a traffic stop. We made the woman get out of the vehicle. Once she

was out, we took the kids out of a vehicle... For us to find her and those kids six hours after the original incident, that's very good. Being a part of saving those kids' lives and helping get that homicide suspect was one of the key points of being in law enforcement. I always strive to find what my calling for this job was. Having moments like that, that was why I do this, why I'm so passionate and why I want to keep pursuing law enforcement.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

For me being young, having to deal with people twice my age who have been through a lot more than I have is challenging, but it's something that keeps drawing me in. It's something different every day.



San Andreas... a fun, loud and destructive way to spend two hours

Every summer there are bound to be those films which are well received by audiences, coming in number one at the box office for two to three consecutive weekends as

it rakes in a cool couple hundred million dollars. Those films allow an audience to come in for two hours, turn their brains off and just enjoy the entertainment in front of them no matter how ludicrous and absurd the plot. However, more times than not and usually for the reasons mentioned, those same movies endure a nasty beating critically. Well, one

film destined to do very well at the box office is the new disaster film, *San Andreas*.

San Andreas is the aptly titled film about the San Andreas Fault and the destruction that follows when the plate becomes a tad bit active. The film stars Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson as a recently divorced member of the L.A. Fire and Rescue Department who attempts to save those suffering from the devastation caused by the mammoth earthquake and its deadly after effects. The only other really recognizable face is Paul Giamatti who plays a college professor who forewarns the public about the impending deadly future facing the citizens of San Francisco.

Fittingly enough, through an odd, but predictable sequence of events, Johnson's character is teamed up with his soon-to-be exwife as they race across San Francisco to save their daughter. Just as the pair conquers one hurdle an even bigger, more asinine obstacle is put before them. This pattern continues for the next hour and a half or so until the film's unsurprising conclusion.

There really is no other way to accurately describe the film's plot than "insane". Characters are separated and then reunited at just the right time. Skyscrapers are destroyed, national landmarks are demolished, and just when you think the film cannot possibly get any more outlandish and ridiculous, it goes and outdoes itself.

The acting on display here is nothing to write home

about either. To their credit, the actors are not helped out much by some really awkwardly written lines of dialogue. Some of the lines exchanged between Johnson and Carla Cugino, the actress playing his wife, is especially odd and feels very, very forced and unnatural.

San Andreas is an outrageous summertime disaster movie that will please audiences and make a fair amount of dough. It's not terrific by any means, but for what it is, a fun way to spend two hours, you could do much worse at the box office. 3 out of 5

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



Greenwood Common Council

Meeting, June 1

- What happened: Ordinance No. 15-23 was scheduled for its first reading, but after an amendment and suspension of the rules, the council pushed it to its second reading and the ordinance passed 6-2, with Mike Campbell (At Large) and Ezra Hill (Dist. 2) as the dissenting votes
- What it means: Ordinance No. 15-23 concerned the smoking regulations with regards to including e-cigarettes and other "vaping" devices, and banning use of such devices in restaurants, outdoor seating areas, city property or within 25 feet of a business entrance.

Several community members came to show their support or disapproval of the ban.

"A major concern of the FDA, regulatory agencies and other health experts is a lack of disclosure of all the ingredients used—as well as the... validity of health and safety claims by the manufacturers for their products," said Bob Smith, Environmentalist of the Johnson County Health Department.

Evan McMahon of Hoosier Vapers and several Greenwood citizens were also present to show opposition of the ban. McMahon cited an article that was published in the Nov. 2014 edition of *Environmental Research*.

"The amount of nicotine that you are actually exposed to through passive vaping is 1,200 times less than you would (be exposed to) from second-hand smoking," McMahon said. He went on to say that the vaping industry has taken steps to prevent minors from obtaining and using e-cigarette products.

"We do not want our products sold or marketed to teenagers or minors. We do not want these things showing up in our schools; we will do everything that we can to work with local communities and state legislators to prevent that from happening," McMahon said.

Despite the present opposition and dissenting votes from councilmembers Campbell and Hill, the ban was passed. Other Indy-metro municipalities and organizations (such as Southport Parks) are also considering similar bans.

■ What's next? The ordinance is now in full force in accordance with the law.

Meeting, June 1

- What happened: Ordinances 6, 7 and 8 were approved on third reading. Ordinances 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13 were approved on second reading.
- What it means: Ordinance 6 relates to special leave, concerning time off for bereavement. Full-time employees will be granted up to three days to attend the funeral of an immediate family member, as specified in the ordinance.

Ordinance 7 establishes residency requirements for full-time employees; they must reside in Marion County or a county surrounding (touching) Marion County.

Ordinance 8 establishes new minimum call-in standards. Full-time employees who are called into work in an emergency situation will receive at least three hours pay or time spent.

Ordinance 9 establishes pension plans for employees in the employee manual. Beech Grove chooses to be a participant in and contribute to the Indiana Public Retirement System. Full-time employees can enroll.

Ordinance 10 eliminates the Cumulative Capital Development Fund, which was established in 1985 to help improve the park, but is no longer necessary.

Ordinance 11 updates the extra duty compensation section in the personnel manual.

Ordinance 12 applies to the compliance division, adding "ice boxes" to the list of prohibited abandoned items on property.

Ordinance 13 amended Ordinance 28-2014 which the council approved in March regarding general offenses. Any business with more than 10 police runs for a theft of less than \$50 will be notified after the first violation, instead of the 10th.

■ What's next? Ordinances 6-8 will go into effect. Remaining ordinances will face final vote at the July city council meeting.

Beech Grove considers roundabout at Churchman and Arlington Avenues

The City of Beech Grove held a special Economic Development meeting on May 27 to inform the public about its interest in constructing a roundabout at Churchman and Arlington Avenues to divert heavy traffic off of Churchman.

Pete Sechler of GAI Consultants showed a drawing of what the potential round-about would look like in the area. The turning radius would allow for big trucks to turn smoothly, while the design would support the city's desired cultural trail.

"This is a really important intersection. It has to do a lot of things. It has to support economic development and connect all sorts of other user groups who need access to their community," Sechler said.

Beech Grove Mayor Dennis Buckley said that the area is continuing to grow with businesses such as Alro Steel Corporation expanding its plant, which will cause increased traffic. He said the city desires to look into funding possibilities for the roundabout, which if approved, would ideally be in place by 2020.

"There is a lot going on in this area and we have to, in the next five years, accommodate that," Buckley said, later stating, "Today it's an idea. There's been no commitment by the city... Even though nothing has been finalized we want the public to be informed as much as they can."



Strawberry love

The sure signs of summer: luscious, sweet, fragrant and juicy crimson strawberries.

How long has it been since you devoured a heart-shaped strawberry that actually tasted like a strawberry – exploding with strawberry deliciousness? Today's bland "white shoulder" grocery versions were shipped 2,000 miles away, picked before they matured on the vine as nature intended.

White shoulders indicates they were unripe when they were picked; immature, then allowed to mature off the vine, away from the green umbilical cord of heavenly nourishment. "Strawberries don't ripen after harvest, so pass over berries that have white shoulders or if the entire berry is lighter in color. Also, skip strawberries that are wet or show signs of decay." (The California Giant Berry Farms website)

A Delaware family recently fell seriously ill while on a Caribbean vacation. Methyl bromide was allegedly used at their hotel and may be to blame. ABC news reports the EPA banned methyl bromide for indoor residential use in 1984, but the product is still on the market for agricultural use. Yes, it does increase the strawberry harvest significantly, but at whose immoral cost?

One cup of vine-ripened strawberries has more Vitamin C than an orange. Their manganese, copper and potassium support heart health and copper supports proper temple growth, your eyes, hair and speed-bumps aging. Strawberries contain fiber, B Vitamins, iodine, Omega 3 and vitamin K that support bone health. In one study, strawberries topped a list of eight foods most linked to lower rates of cancer deaths among a group of over 1,000 seniors. Those eating the most strawberries were three times less likely to develop cancer compared to those eating few or no strawberries. *The Journal of Agriculture and Food Chemistry* says anthocyanins which create their color are potent antioxidants that prevent oxygen damage to your temples cells and organs.

Strawberries are highly perishable and should be purchased only a few days prior to eating. Don't wash them till you're ready to eat the nourishing berry with its seeds on the outside.

The quenching flavor and delightful fragrance of strawberries have enchanted taste buds for generations, but you must wash, wash, and wash them! Why: field dirt, critter droppings, and manmade toxic chemicals. Grab the family and a bucket and visit your community "U-Pick-ems." Real, locally harvested, vine-ripe strawberries are a sweet, nourishing, and juicy gift of the generous divine.

'Lead' and 'led'

Question: "Dear Jordan, I look forward to your column in The Southside Times every week. I especially enjoy your sense of humor and the fact that you don't take grammar too seriously. Please do address the difference between the homonyms 'lead' and 'led.' They are used incorrectly more and more often, as you did in your May 7 - 13 column. You are so rarely, if ever, inaccurate, I forgive you!" – (Petra Ritchie)

Answer: You know, I put those mistakes in my columns just so clever readers like you will catch them and give me more fodder to write about.

(No, not really. Great catch, Petra!)

The mistake at hand here is mixing up the proper past tense of the verb "lead" – meaning to guide, especially by going in advance – with the element lead (which, incidentally, has the best Latin name: plumbum).

"Lead" is an irregular verb, so its past tense isn't "leaded," but "led." The trick isn't in remembering that it's irregular, though, but how it's irregular, because it conjugates differently than "read," which is spelled the same in the past tense, but pronounced differently.

Unfortunately, Word's little squiggly lines aren't much help here, because "leaded" is a word in its own right meaning "covered, weighted with or containing lead." Why they didn't go with "plumbumed," I'll never know.

So there's no trick on this one – you've just got to remember that "lead" becomes "led" in the past tense. Even your friendly neighborhood Grammar Guy needs a refresher on it from time to time, though, so you can rest easy knowing we're all in this together.

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




