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## Betty and Kitt Collins share of their life-long history with Beech Grove

Kitt Collins is retiring from Beech Grove City Schools after 46 years of service. His mother, Betty Collins, has reached 22 years of volunteering in the school system and spent 15 years of her career teaching there. Spending their whole lives in or near the city, Beech Grove certainly is home to them both.

Betty, now 91, grew up in Beech Grove, graduating from the high school in 1940. When she attended the school, all grades were located where Central Elementary is now. She had to walk a mile through the woods to get to 13th Street to get to school. She said her older sister would run ahead and she would cry the entire way to keep up with her. After the first year, her mother decided they would have to move to town to fix the problem. Betty gradu-

ated in 1940 with a class of 40.

During WWII, Betty served as a Navy Wave for two years, going to the University of Wisconsin to be trained as a radio operator. She was stationed in Miami, Fla., on watch while U-boats went up and down the coast.

Betty graduated from Indiana University and received her Master's degree from Butler University, teaching at the same time. She taught for six years in Indianapolis, 15 years in Beech Grove teaching 5th, 4th and 3rd grades and 20 years at the University of Indianapolis as director of teacher education.

"Beech Grove is a wonderful place to work," Betty said. "All you have to do is go to a retired teachers meeting and everyone has been there 20 years, 30 years, 40 years. A lot of them volunteer the same as I do."

Betty and her husband, who was on the school board, worked to get the current high

school built. It was a huge controversy because residents didn't like that the school would be in the "country."

"I always say our blood is in this building because we had to fight so hard to get this built," Betty said.

Betty volunteers for her church, Methodist in Beech Grove teaching a Sunday School class, and at the Beech Grove Public Library telling the history of Sarah T. Bolton. Betty began volunteering for Beech Grove schools in 1992, while her son, Kitt, was working as principal at Central Elementary. He wanted to start a phonics program using their Atari lab, called Writing to Read. She currently works at Hornet Park Elementary with the accelerated reading group.

"I believe so much in reading and that every child should learn to read and we should do all we can to help them learn... I would say I do this because I can. As long as I have good health, then I'm blessed."

Kitt moved into the Beech Grove School system in 5th grade, when his parents bought their first house. He graduated in 1963 and went to Hanover College for psychology. He went for a semester at University of Akron in

Ohio. His mother, Betty was taking a job at University of Indianapolis and said they wanted a male teacher at an elementary school level. This was during the Vietnam War so there was a shortage of teachers. He taught half of the fifth grade at South Grove, with an agreement that he'd get his Master's in education. He attended Butler University while teaching.

He accepted a position as assistant principal at Central, also teaching full-time. He became principal and was there 20 years before taking the position as director of curriculum. Through his time, he was instrumental in many programs, including TAP which is still used. This program trains teachers for an hour a week and evaluates them in the classrooms.

Kitt will spend the next year transitioning, helping train replacements. He will return one day a week to help with the TAP program.

"What I'm looking forward to, is not shopping on weekends," Kitt said. "That's when the crowds are. I have to figure out when people don't shop. We can go to a show. Instead of eating dinners, we go out at lunch time. People who retire, it's your own time. You decide when you want to go someplace and do something."

# License for lodging

## The City of Beech Grove looks to alleviate the crime problem within its motels with proposed ordinance

In 2012, the Beech Grove Police Department went on 318 runs to the three motels in Beech Grove. Last year they had 451 runs. This year they have been on 88 runs in the first three months.

“The 451 runs— that’s more than one run a day,” said Police Chief Mark Swartz. “If we went to a house that much or a school, people would want to know why we don’t resolve the problem. People don’t see it sometimes or they hear about the call and think it’s just the motel, that’s what happened yesterday. It’s every day.”

While this covers all three motels, the large majority has been to the Motel 6, at 5151 Elmwood Ave. Swartz said at \$39 a night and located right off the interstate, it makes it affordable and accessible for this type of activity.

At the May 5 meeting, Mayor Dennis Buckley proposed an ordinance to the Beech Grove City Council, which would require places of lodging within the city to obtain a license. This ordinance was passed on its second reading at the June 2 council meeting. It will be up for the third and final reading on July 7, 7 p.m. at the City Council Chambers, 806 Main St. The ordinance will go into effect 90 days after it’s passed.

“They’re not licensed by anybody right now,” Buckley said. “They’re out there on their

own without monitoring. We need to be a better steward of monitoring those motels. It will give us leverage to close the motels if they can’t be a good neighbor.”

Not only has this amount of crime increased, but so have ambulance runs in response to medical issues that arise with that.

up finding approximately 20 lbs. of marijuana, two handguns and a shotgun, which is one of the bigger busts they’ve had at the Motel 6. Though the number of runs is down slightly this year, Assistant Police Chief Michael Maurice said that is mostly because of the harsh winter weather in January and February.

“There’s been significant increase of overdose runs at these motels,” said Fire Chief Robert Cheshire at the May council meeting. “These are very labor-intensive runs because you are dealing with overdose. When we have to transport the overdose patient to the hospital, it takes extra manpower so basically we are sending an ambulance and engine out of service... It is a burden on us, also.”

Swartz said most of their calls are related to drugs or prostitution. Three weeks ago the police responded to an anonymous tip, taking a police dog to check it out. They ended

Maurice said the motels do a good job of assisting the police whenever there is a problem, and they do kick the tenants out.

## In need of emergency service people

Mayor Greg Ballard helped swear in 58 new law enforcement recruits earlier this week as a part of Indy's new plan to add 80 new IMPD officers by the end of 2014.

The influx of recruits comes after a decision to increase the allotted budget for law enforcement personnel by the Indianapolis City-County Council in late 2013.

We see these new recruits as a welcome addition to our current law enforcement agencies and emergency service personnel here on the Southside. Indianapolis and surrounding neighborhoods have seen a terrible and tragic increase in violent crimes this year—the death toll for Marion County is now over 60—and it seems there is no end in sight.

The City of Greenwood is also hiring; the Fire Department is taking applications for a part-time firefighter or EMP/EMP-T. Applications may be picked up at Greenwood Fire Headquarters Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. Applications are due no later than June 30.

Beech Grove, on the other hand, stated at its city council meeting on June 2 that it would love to have more Fire Department personnel as they are currently shorthanded with three firefighters pulling double duty and serving on the ambulance, but do not yet have available funds. This is something we are sure we will hear more about in the future.

These servicemen and women are the backbones of grounded, safe communities. Let us thank them for the sacrifices they make each and every day—let us also thank and celebrate the bravery these new recruits and applicants show by stepping up to serve their communities. All together, we can build a safer Southside.

**Sugar Grove's Jodi Barth discovers the positive impact miming can have for adults and children alike**

Whether she's at a child's birthday party or a corporate event, Jodi Barth intends to make people think through her work as a mime. Without saying a word, Barth can portray anything from finding a soul mate and getting your heart broken to what it's like to transition from childhood to adulthood.

"I knew the impact it could have because I experienced it as a high school student," Barth said. "I experienced a youth conference for leaders, when I first saw Christian mime. I got some training in mime/clown school at a conference in Nashville, Tenn.... I knew what I wanted it to look like and I couldn't get enough information on how to really do it."

Barth, a fifth grade teacher at Sugar Grove Elementary in Center Grove, became interested in mime as a junior in high school. After the training in Tennessee, she took another course in Ohio. While attending Indiana University, she searched for some sort of class on mime. There was none, but she did meet a man named Reed Steel who gave her lessons and they started performing together. What started as a hobby turned into people requesting her to attend birthday parties and church gatherings. The Children's Museum of Indianapolis contracted her to do some shows. She paid most of her way through college with her

performances.

"What I love about mime is we all can relate," Barth said. "It's a certain amount of (my experiences) but it's very generalized so people can take away from it their own experiences... I always enjoy working with people and seeing their reactions."

While in school, she said she spent two summers in Virginia, performing at the amusement park, Kings Dominion. It was her first time doing improvisation instead of just stage performances that she had written in advance. She said her second year there, she was voted 'atmosphere act' by her peers.

"That's probably the hardest, the improvisation, because you're putting yourself out there and not everybody may be into it," Barth said. "It's how to work with people so they are encouraged and have fun. There's a whole park there, why would they want to watch me? It was a real process figuring out what works and what doesn't.

I have a real appreciation for people who perform and do stand up, working the crowds....The improvisation is always very uncomfortable for me because I never know but it's also very exhilarating because it usually works. Usually, people are afraid to feel foolish and after they see me work then they'll warm up. One of the coolest things is when you see a person that's very standoffish start to feel okay."

Over the years, Barth has been invited to perform as a large variety of events, including birth-

day parties, wedding ceremonies and receptions, the Indy 500 Porche international event, corporate events, church events, school carnivals and libraries. She worked at Culvers for a while and every fall she incorporates balloons at Apple Works in Trafalgar. Many of the performances have a Christian focus. Her church, Stones Crossing Church, has invited her to perform later in the year. She said she will perform a message of youth through adulthood and how to navigate through today's world. She said miming has been a great way to also break the language barrier. She has visited Africa through a ministry and brought



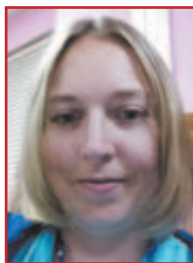

balloons along, allowing her to communicate with the students without the need to talk.

"In class, when they do a good job being quiet and focusing, when they reach a certain goal I will take some time and teach them some mime," Barth said. "It's neat to go to a football game and see kids going 'hey, Mrs. Barth' and do the 'lean', that sort of thing. It's interesting to see what they remember"

To help children feel more comfortable, she said she will come without her make-up on and start the show with a puppet. She'll then put the make-up on. From children to adults, Barth said she enjoys helping people work past themselves, growing and feeling comfortable. Barth said something she never expected to have the opportunities she's had to perform, getting invited to places she never would have otherwise. She said one of her favorite opportunities was auditioning and getting to do an instructional video and handbook on mime.

"I'm always just looking for new ideas, new show ideas, new costumes, new audiences, thinking of ways to sharpen (my skills)," Barth said. "I'd love if there'd be a mime that's more experienced that I could talk to but there really aren't a lot of mimes around."

**Southport's Natalie Hendrix-Evans teaches American Sign Language in and out of the school**

Natalie Hendrix-Evans, an American Sign Language (ASL) teacher at Southport High School, doesn't stop teaching when she goes home – the teaching is simply directed at a different age group. Outside of school and during the summer, Hendrix-Evans has a deaf mentoring job, visiting with hearing families who have deaf babies and teaching them sign language so they can all communicate.

"I thought this was something I could enjoy doing. I like working with both hearing and deaf people. I enjoy seeing the deaf child growing and start to sign, start to communicate back with me. I really enjoy that part."

Hendrix-Evans, who grew up deaf, worked at the Indiana School for the Deaf for eight years before transferring to Southport High School, where she just completed her first year. She said working with high school students has been different – they are very curious and want to learn.

"I have always wanted to become a teacher," Hendrix-Evans said. "I went to college and studied elementary school education. I was frustrated because I couldn't find a job."

For the last two years, while working at the school for the deaf, she has been a deaf mentor.

"I've learned a lot," she said "I've learned that every baby is different. They don't always follow what our expectations are. Some may

pick things up very quickly. Others require more time. It doesn't matter if they're a fast learner or slow learner, they will still be able to pick it up."

As she continues in both jobs, she said she is looking forward to trying to start an ASL club for people interested in learning sign language. The focus would be for high school students, but anyone in the community would be welcome to come.

"(Signing is) a really cool way to communicate," Hendrix-Evans said. "If you're in a room and it's really loud and you can't talk to each other but you can sign to each other easily. You can communicate across a large room and it's really great."

Now that Greenwood Middle School is on summer break, physical education teacher Jackie Ferguson will spend most of her summer days at Golden Post Kennels, a boarding facility for animals which will also take in rescues. She works full-time during the break, arriving at 6 a.m. to clean the kennels, feed and give water to the animals, walk the dogs and spend some time playing with them.

"You get paid for hanging out with puppies," Ferguson said. "It's awesome."

Ferguson has taught at the middle school for 29 years, holding a variety of part-time jobs throughout that time. She began working for Golden Post Kennels off State Rd. 135 in Bargersville more than six years ago. She runs Four Paws Club, an after school club that will go to the humane society and the kennel.

"I can use the job to help teach the kids the

proper way to care for animals and educate them on spay and neutering,” Ferguson said. “Whatever I learn, I can teach that to the kids. I was able to take members down there and socialize the dogs they have for adoption. It’s just been a great relationship all around.”

Ferguson said that she believes her passion for her work outside of school has had an impact on her students at the middle school level. One former student is now attending veterinarian school and interning at an animal hospital.

Ferguson said working at the kennels is also great exercise and many people don’t realize the hard work involved – like when you have a large Mastiff pulling you out to play and you “have to hunker down” to get it slow down. She said teaching is a stressful job, and it’s nice to be able to go to the kennels where she finds the work relaxing.

“Going down there and having a dog or cat come up to you and wag their tail with unconditional love – that’s a great day,” Ferguson said.

### Center Grove High School’s Kraig Kitts travels to Tanzania to teach science for the summer

This summer, Kraig Kitts’ passion for science will travel further than Center Grove High School where he teaches. He’s been fundraising since January to take a trip to Tanzania, Africa to teach science to children in a public school there.

Kitts transitioned into teaching from his background as a chemical engineer. He said it seemed like the perfect timing to volunteer out of the country and after doing some research he decided on Tanzania. He will travel through Tanzanian Youth Cultural Exchange Network (TYCEN), an organization that brings in volunteers to teach. The school averages 300-400 students with about 10-15 teachers per school.

“I’m really passionate about science,” Kitts said. “That’s the biggest reason I went into teaching is I want kids to be excited about science. I want to go in (the school in Tanzania)

and teach these kids because it’s the only way they can get secondary education.”

Needing to raise \$4,000 for the trip, Kitts began selling ‘Teach for Tanzania’ t-shirts. He said the students and teachers at CGHS bought more than he expected. He said he is also going to have a yard sale and his wife, Nikki, will have a bake sale to help them reach their goal. Anything raised in excess will go to TYCEN.

Kitts said he’s excited to go, but he’s never traveled internationally and knows that there will be a lot of culture shock. Fortunately, the students speak English which he said will make the transition go smoother. He hasn’t been told yet which area of science he will instruct. Regardless, he said he’s looking forward to seeing a part of the world that’s so different from what he’s experienced.

“Everything I’ve read said the kids are excited about learning,” Kitts said. “There, up to third grade is all that’s required. I couldn’t imagine for them, they choose to be there. They hang onto every word. That speaks to the power of education.”

Kitts will leave June 27 and return July 27 – two days before Center Grove students return to school. He said he intends to blog about his experience throughout the summer, but how much he can write will depend on internet accessibility. ### Center Grove Elementary’s Katie McAtee advocates for victims of human trafficking in Southeast Asia

It was monsoon season in Southeast Asia – with rain, rain and more rain. Through the gray and brown colors, happiness was found when Katie McAtee spotted some young girls playing in the rain. Having seen so much innocence taken away from children in the country she was visiting, it was a moment McAtee said when she saw some of that restored.

Center Grove Elementary art teacher McAtee has spent her last four summers in Southeast Asia, a trip structured through an organization called Rapha House, a not-for-profit that provides after care for survivors of trafficking and sexual exploitation. Though she won’t travel this summer, she will paint images representing her experiences there.

“I’m really sad not to go this year,” McAtee said. “There are a few girls I really connected with. It’s had an impact in my life, the way I behave and what I do by reaching out to these girls. Trafficking is not just in developing countries. It’s bad, it’s everywhere. There are girls and boys... It was time to be an advocate from this side of the world.”

McAtee began teaching art for Center Grove Elementary in 2010. She took her first trip to Southeast Asia the summer before that, spending two weeks there. She said families in the area often times can’t afford to pay for their children and will send them off to work, where they end up being placed in a brothel and the family can’t find them. Rapha House offers training and education programs. McA-

tee said there are two cities that have kids clubs so children can attend school. They have preschool four days a week. They make sure the family is healthy, fed and the kids are in school. If the family sells their child, they no longer receive aid.

“Last year when I was there I saw a lot of trafficking situations,” McAtee said. “Driving down the road and you look and you see girls outside, scantily dressed. I think I was more aware of it. When you walk in the safe house the youngest girl is four years old. That’s very startling. They’re there for a reason. I’m stunned by their age. It’s not just teens or older. The median age is 10 – really young girls.”

The previous three summers, McAtee has taught art at one of the safe houses. Last year she also taught English courses. In the art classes, she meets the students on a boat, sitting on mats on the floor. When they need water, they get it out of the pond.

“When I’m with the girls ... they don’t have the resources we have here,” McAtee said. “There they just want to make art and they never get to do that so it’s exciting for them when they get the opportunity. They would wait and peek in the window and wait for me. It was always something simple like coloring with crayons or painting.”

This year, McAtee said she felt it was time to pause. Since the summer is shorter now because of the balanced calendar, she said last year was hard for her, emotionally, returning from her seven-week trip two days before school started. This summer, she has even had a member of her church, Indian Creek Church, ask if she could paint about her experiences.

“If I could meet the me of five years ago, I would never have thought I’d have this experience,” McAtee said. “I think I would have missed out on a lot of really good blessings.”

McAtee said she encourages people to help by being aware; it’s not just a third world issue. People can also donate money, which helps because the number of girls rescued continues to increase while funding doesn’t. For more information, visit [Raphahouse.org](http://Raphahouse.org).

### Rosa Parks-Edison Elementary teacher Melissa Pawley takes flight in her out-of-school hobby

Melissa Pawley, a Rosa Parks-Edison Elementary media specialist, marked an item off of her bucket list on her spring break in 2009 when she began taking flying lessons, earning her pilot license in the first year.

“There’s a certain freedom when you’re flying,” Pawley said. “You have a whole new perspective on what’s beneath you – it’s the feeling of ‘oh my gosh, I’m actually flying an airplane.’ There’s a tremendous freedom in having that bird’s eye view.”

Pawley rents a plane and is a student pilot with Jeff Air in Greenwood. She received a Lilly Endowment Creativity Fellowship grant last year which is helping her work toward getting her instrument rating. The bad weather this year has slowed that achievement down a little bit and she said she should earn that in the first couple weeks of June.

“There will be a sense of relief that I’m finished and it gives me more freedom that I can fly in situations I couldn’t before – when it’s foggy, when it’s cloudy,” Pawley said.

Pawley said being a pilot has been a topic of interest at the elementary school, as students want to hear about the experience. She said she will teach them things about flying. For example, this year she taught second graders how to make radio calls and said they loved the activity. The transition from school to the airport is a very different change in atmosphere, Pawley said.

“There are very few women in aviation,” she said. “It’s been interesting coming from the elementary school where it’s almost all women to the airport where it’s almost all men. It’s a very interesting change of pace. I enjoy it... Aviation is sort of scripted. There are rules and you have to follow those rules. I do what I have to do there. There’s not a lot of room for

creativity. I find it relaxing.”

Plus, she said not a lot of librarians fly.

“At the airport when I was doing my training, they thought it was pretty cool that I am a librarian,” Pawley said. “It goes both ways, the student think I’m cool but when I go to the airport pilots think it’s pretty cool that I fly.”

So long as she’s able, Pawley said it’s not a hobby she plans to quit.

**Kitley Elementary’s Christina Zier is a role model for all children, in and out of school**

Christina Zier, first grade teacher at Kitley Elementary in Franklin Township, is reminded through her summer volunteer work that she doesn’t know where her students are coming from. It has taught her that children need people there that care about them, and she tries to ensure that all of her students know that she does. As a volunteer for Royal Family Kids of Indianapolis, a nonprofit organization

for youth in foster care, Zier volunteers for the week-long summer camp where the children get a chance to make positive memories.

“I kind of fell in love with it,” Zier said. “This has become my passion. Just being able to be a role model in a kid’s life, and give them a chance to be a kid and let them be a kid.”

Zier said typically the children have been abused or molested and the idea of the camp is create positive memories by treating them royally. This will be her eighth year volunteering. This summer, she will serve as the camp director for the 24 children enrolled.

Zier said she’s seen the camp having an impact in a variety of ways. Her first year there, participating after learning of the program at her church, she said there was one boy she couldn’t tell if he liked her or not. At the end of the week, he introduced her to his foster parents, telling them about how she was his favorite person.

“It gives you a perspective,” Zier said. “As much as we help the kids it also has changed my life completely. I know a lot of people question it, but I think it makes a huge difference. Small world that it is, one of the campers ended up being in my classroom. I got to watch him grow throughout the year, and see that it made a difference.”

### HAUNTS & JAUNTS

In 1987 my father, Robert Hinton, unexpectedly died at our weekend home on Princes Lake just outside of Camp Atterbury in Johnson County. Stroke or heart attack; did it really matter? My mother was a basket case and I had to pull my big boy pants on and take over. I didn't wish to burden her with the ordeal of an autopsy to find out the cause, so we just accepted the fact that he was gone and moved forward.

I had returned from Oregon just a few years before and had the opportunity to work with him once more in his business—auto body repair—consequently developing more of a mature relationship with a father who had in the past been extremely critical of my long hair and rebellious views. At his passing and taking charge of the arrangements I had felt this would be the hardest thing I would ever have to deal with in life, including telling my father's parents (my grandparents) that their son had died that following morning when I woke them out of their sleep at 5:30 a.m. It was hard...but I was wrong. It has not been the hardest thing that I've ever had to do. There have been several of them throughout the years. But it's what's currently happening with

my mother and all that entails which seems to take the prize.

My mother never quite got over or accepted my father's sudden passing. It changed the direction of her life. And when you are hurting, there's no place like home!

In the early 1990s my mother remarried. She thought that would make her happy and take away the pain. It did not. The family house on Post Road on the far eastside of Indianapolis was sold, and they packed up and moved to the town of her youth—Jamestown, Ky. My mother had purchased a large brick ranch home in a private community just a ridge over from Jamestown. Her new husband was intrigued with the large expanse of lake to run

his boat on. I helped with the move, and having a wife and young son, promised to visit as often as possible. Life, however, has a way of holding back good intentions.

The Kentucky paranormal meanderings of a young child's mind were replaced by obligations in Indiana. Life inched forward. Until, once again, it spiraled out of control....

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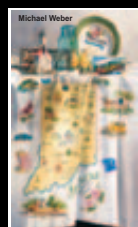
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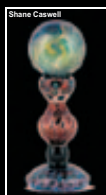


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# Probiotics: No guts, no glory

The GI tract, the width and length of a tennis court, is a universe inhabited by trillions of friendly and not-so-friendly microbes that must co-exist in balanced symbiosis. When bad bacteria get the upper hand things like candida's takes over, as well as a weakened immune system, constipation, urinary tract infections, IBS, Crohn's, gas, diarrhea, fatigue, chronic inflammation, autoimmune disease, and much more. 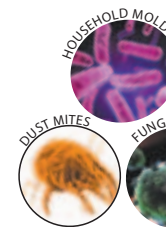

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# Community Funfest celebrates its 32nd year

The St. Mark Community Funfest is an annual tradition celebrating its 32nd year this June. According to Ann Berkemeier, this is the very first Southside parish to hold an annual festival. This year's celebration will showcase Instant Bingo, local music groups, food trucks, and even raffles and prizes. This year's main raffle grand prize is \$2,500 cash or \$3,400 credit toward one year of tuition at St. Mark grade school or Roncalli High School. Musical groups include Ray & Friends from 7 - 10 p.m. on June 13, Train Wreck from 8 - 11 p.m. on Friday and Tastes Like Chicken from 8 - 11:30 p.m. on Saturday.

This year's Funfest will also feature a double zipline available only on Friday and Saturday. It will stretch the length of U.S. 31 in front of the former church and should provide zipliners with quite a view and quite a thrill.

### History

Thirty-two years ago, the festival began as a way for St. Mark to raise funds for the church and school. Now, though, Berkemeier said, it's more about bringing in the community.

As you approach the end of your high school journey, take some time to reflect through the

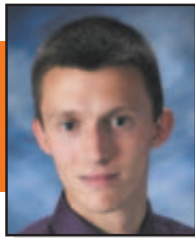
years and hold onto the positive experiences, relationships and situations you have had that have influenced you up to this point in your life. Stand tall, and be proud of who you are.

### BEECH GROVE CITY COUNCIL

#### Beech Grove City Council Meeting June 2, 2014

■ **What happened?**  
Old news; Ordinances 3, 4 and 5 had their third readings. Ordinance 6 and 7-2014 passed onto the next readings. Ordinance 4 was not passed. The council tabled ordinance three to be able to conduct more research.

■ **What it means:**  
Ordinance 3 makes it “unlawful for any person to harbor upon his or her premises within the corporate limits of the city of Beech” any cattle, hog, swine, poultry or domestic farm animal with exception of a potbelly pig as they are considered a nuisance. One resident stood up to voice his objection, asking for a way to keep the chickens he has in his yard. Ordinance #4 2014 addresses “an ordinance that amends chapter 98” in reference to public and environmental nuisances. Ordinance #5 2014 addresses that “it is necessary to appropriate more money than is appropriated in the annual budget.” Money will be transferred from local funds. Ordinance 6 2014 would amend the employee handbook to state that the city supports a drug-free workplace. Ordinance 7 2014 proposed a licensing ordinance that would pertain to hotels, motels and places of lodging. Beech Grove has three hotels and there is no governing body that oversees these businesses. This is to address the problem of an influx of crime at the Motel 6 in Beech Grove. The purpose behind it is to help decrease the amount of runs emergency personnel make to these businesses.

■ **What’s next:**  
Ordinances 3, 6 and 7 will be read again at the July 7 meeting.

■ **What happened?**  
Ordinances 8 and 9 – 2014 were introduced to the council. They passed onto their second readings in July.

■ **What it means:**  
Ordinance 8 updates fair housing rules. Ordinance 9 amends a code of ordinances pursuant to the parks department. Funds earned from the telephone pole in the park will go to the parks and recreation department.

■ **What’s next:**  
These will be voted on again on July 7.

■ **In brief:**

- Beech Grove resident Bruce Bye spoke at the meeting, requesting the council to split costs with the Beech Grove Redevelopment Commission to work with Indiana University Professor Frank Nierzwicki on a consulting agreement that will go from mid-June to Sept. 1. This will allow a plan to be drawn which will explain what can and cannot be done in Beech Grove concerning redevelopment, serving as a “blueprint” to enhance local planning cooperation. The City Council approved the spending of \$2,650, half of this cost, for the project.
- The City Council approved the appointment of Mac Bellner to serve on the Redevelopment Commission.

### GREENWOOD COMMON COUNCIL

#### Greenwood Common Council Meeting June 2, 2014

■ **What happened?**  
Greenwood citizen brought up an excessive noise complaint and asked that laws already in place be better enforced to reduce the noise caused by vehicles along S. Emerson Ave.

■ **What it means:**  
Greenwood Municipal Code 6-277 as well as Indiana Code 9-19-8 speak explicitly about prohibited noises that are “loud, raucous, unreasonable or disturbing.”

■ **What’s next:**  
While the noise may be an annoyance to some citizens, these kinds of ordinances are difficult to enforce because, according to Greenwood Police present at the meeting, “officers have to be present at the location at the time of the disturbance.”

■ **What happened?**  
Ordinance No. 14-26 was again debated at length, amended several times, and ultimately voted down 6-2 in its first reading.

■ **What it means:**  
The ordinance, which would have allowed permit owners overnight parking on city property, was hotly debated at the previous meeting as well. The councilmembers discussed the various benefits and drawbacks to allowing permits for Greenwood residents—a growing trend in dissent rose out of the council after several amendments had been made. Allowing overnight parking on city properties would be too big of a risk, too difficult to enforce and too troublesome to be worth the time and effort.

■ **What’s next:**  
Parking permits for Greenwood city properties may a consideration for future councils, but for now, there is still no overnight parking on city property.

## Why does 'canceled' only have one 'L'?

**Question: "Dear Grammar Guy: I've noticed that words like 'cancel' and 'travel' only have one 'L' when the '-ed' suffix is added to them, but other words like 'stopped' and 'dropped' double the final consonant for a suffix. How do you know when to do one, and when to do the other?"**

Answer: Learning when to double the final consonant can be a tricky thing for non-native English speakers (and native speakers, too). Fortunately, there are a few general rules you can follow almost all of the time.

**Rule No. 1:** Double the final consonant in a one-syllable word that ends in a single consonant when adding a suffix that begins with a vowel. For example, "trap" becomes "trapping," rather than "traping;" "bar" becomes "barring;" "sit" becomes "sitting;" etc.

An exception to this rule is one-syllable words with a long vowel sound (i.e. "sleep" becomes "sleeping," rather than "sleeping.')

**Rule No. 2:** In a multi-syllable word, double the final consonant if the last syllable is stressed. Examples include "referring," "com-

mitted" and "admitting." An exception is words where two vowels come before the final consonant, like "contain" or "bespeak."

**Rule No. 3:** In American English, verbs ending in a vowel + "L" are not doubled when a suffix beginning with a vowel is added. Examples include "traveling," "canceling," "fueling," "dueling," etc. In British English, the "L" would be doubled.

Worth noting here: While a single "L" is the "American" spelling of words like "canceling," the British version "cancelling" is still grammatically correct and acceptable. You will get flak from American editors about it, however.

This is a subject where there are more rules than I can cover in a single column. You probably learned most of them in school (words that end in "Y," words that end in "E," etc.), so hopefully these three rules augment the knowledge you already have. And if you really want to spell "canceled" the British way, I suppose it's fine ... although you may be stepping into an intercontinental grammar grudge match.

#### Grill up goodness

Chef Amy Riolo provides these tips for serving up scrumptious, savory lamb on the grill.

- Grilling lamb with garlic, mint and olive oil is a great way to introduce lamb for first-timers. Cut slits into the lamb meat and insert pieces of garlic cloves, then rub with oil and dried mint.

- Use a meat thermometer to measure the internal temperature. Lamb will continue cooking after you pull it off the grill, so it's best to remove it about 10 degrees lower than your target temperature.

- Lamb is best served medium rare (145°F) or medium (160°F). All ground lamb should be cooked to 160°F.

### Lamb Loin Chops with Green Bean & Potato Salad

*Yield: 6 servings*

#### For salad:

- 1/2 cup fat free plain Greek yogurt
- 1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil
- 1 lemon, zested and juiced
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh dill
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh chives
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1 pint cherry tomatoes, cut in half
- 1 pound green beans, ends trimmed and cut in half
- 2 pounds small red new potatoes, larger potatoes cut in half

#### For lamb:

- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 2 1/2 pounds lamb loin chops (or 10 loin chops)

In large bowl, whisk together yogurt, olive oil, lemon juice and zest, dill, chives, salt, pepper and cherry tomatoes; set aside.

In large saucepan bring 6 cups water to a boil. Add green beans and cook until tender, 3 to 5 minutes. Remove with slotted spoon and add to bowl with dressing. Add potatoes to already simmering water and cook until tender, about 10 minutes. Drain potatoes and add to bowl. Toss to coat.

Combine garlic, olive oil, salt and pepper in small bowl. Place lamb chops on large tray and rub garlic oil mixture all over lamb loin chops; set aside while grill heats.

On gas grill, turn all burners to high, close lid and heat until grates are hot, about 15 minutes. Scrape grates clean. Grill lamb chops about 6 minutes per side or until cooked to 145°F for medium rare. Move to clean plate and let rest 5 minutes. Toss potato salad again and serve with lamb chops.

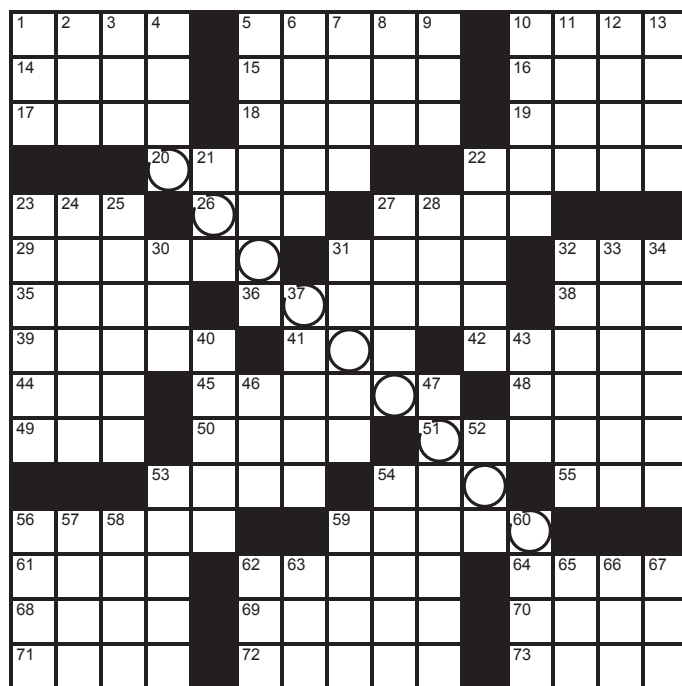

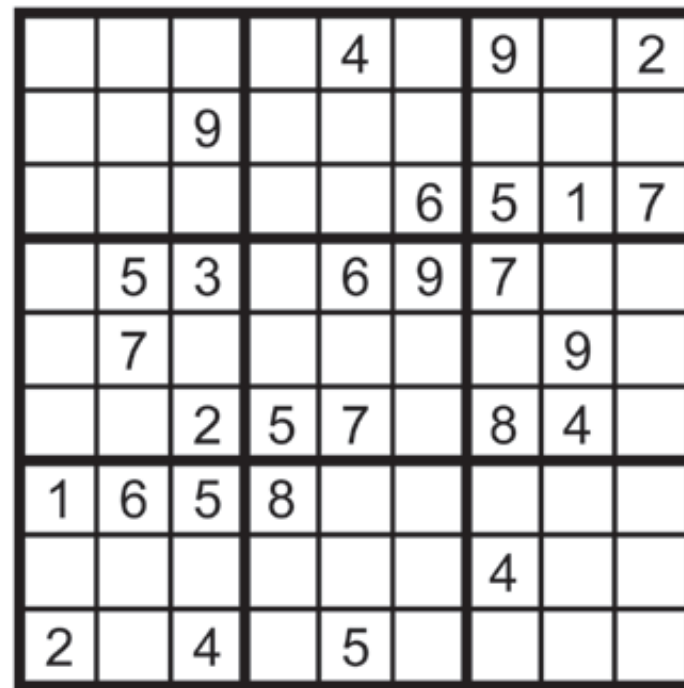
