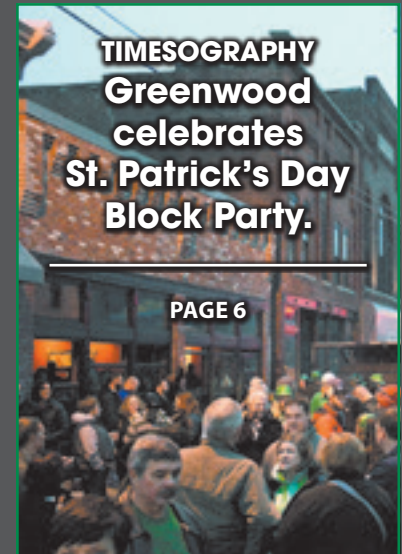

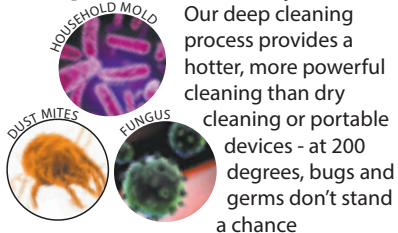

## The gift of discernment

### HAUNTS & JAUNTS

**Discernment:** *The quality of being able to grasp and comprehend what is obscure; a power to see what is not evident to the average mind.* (Merriam Webster's Collegiate Dictionary).

Catholic priests have a big job ahead of them when finding themselves in the dark Netherlands of determining if a person is truly possessed, and at a point where an exorcism is warranted. People can easily be deceived by their own imagination. Could it be that? Perhaps, a natural explanation that would explain the behavioral change of the individual? Or something darker that will take them down a road you and I would not want to travel? It can be a life altering decision.

It starts with an interview, the results of which will determine the route the priest will take. In the interview process discernment is one of the gifts God gives to the faithful. It's a good tool to have. A seasoned exorcist relies on it. What might be mistaken for demonic possession? In Matt Baglio's book *The Rite: The Making of a Modern Exorcist*, he lists a few examples:

- **Schizophrenia** (paranoia, delusions, hearing voices, hallucinations).
- **Hysteria** (a condition that can develop a host of physical ailments).
- **Bipolar disease** (fluctuating moods).
- **Obsessive Compulsive Disorder-OCD** (feeling tormented by obsessive thoughts and compulsive actions).
- **Epilepsy** (uncontrollable tics, move-

ments and speech).

- **Disassociation** (normal routines turn strange: "zoning" out while driving a car, consistently in a haze or feeling that you are located outside the physical body).

Discernment is also important for paranormal investigators during the beginning phase of a private investigation, also starting with an interview. The interview is crucial in determining whether you will say goodnight or return with a car full of teammates and equipment. If you go in to totally buying a story, then you are already predisposed as to the conclusions you will draw. A good interviewer will weed out the paranormal as opposed to the medical conditions mentioned above. There are, however, no interviews at the paranormal amusement parks (Pay & Plays), only a good story. You're along for the ride for a space of a few hours. I suppose, enjoy!

Many exorcists in training, serving an apprenticeship in learning the 'Ritual', are apprehensive they might get it wrong and misdiagnosis the true condition of their client. They should. And paranormal investigators should worry about the same thing. Nothing like giving a wrong call that will affect someone's life.

The exorcist must be the ultimate skeptic. In the realm of chasing ghosties, so should we.

Meeting, March 20

**What happened:**  
Ordinance 17-16 was brought before the council as a Notice of Intent to consider.

**What it means:**  
Ordinance 17-16 aims to rezoning of approximately 1.19 acres located at 1 East Main Street, 21 East Main Street, and 259 S. Meridian Street from the current zoning of R-2-Residential-Single Family use to C-2-Commercial-Tourist in order to provide for the construction of an indoor Mrs. Curl's. The Greenwood Advisory Plan Commission voted in favor of this change.

**What's next:**  
Ordinance 17-16 was tabled and will go before the council once Councilman Corey has provided the desired limitations to be placed on the ordinance.

#### Greenwood looks to build an Iceplex at Freedom Park

Resolution 17-04 brought many residents to the Common Council Meeting on March 20. This resolution seeks to create an Economic Redevelopment Area within Freedom Park in order to build two ice rinks and two turf fields within the park. These facilities will be a for-profit business and seeks to bring ice hockey to the Southside.

"The first and best location we thought for this project was in Freedom Park," says Mayor Mark Myers. "We prepared Freedom Park for a secondary structure. Sports are very important to our community and the youth is very important to this community and with the hockey complex coming in it will fit perfectly within the Freedom Park area." The mayor's office believes that the addition of this complex will help boost the city's economy.

Many against the complex are not against the ice rink itself, but rather the location of the rink. "I have lived in Brighton Estates for three weeks now, said new resident Vince Matthews. "We moved here to be next to Freedom Park, and were surprised to hear that a big ice complex would potential trek in hundreds of thousands of people. We aren't sure that Freedom Park is the best location for this facility. I would respectfully ask the council to reconsider the proposed location for the Iceplex to a more appropriate area."

Those for the Iceplex see it as an added addition to the community. "I certainly respect the concerns of traffic," said resident Jeff Banner. "My home does not come up against where this rink will be, but my house is up against the soccer complex, the football complex, and the middle school in Greenwood. It makes such a community difference to see that gathering of people in our community, in our town and in our neighborhood. I wouldn't trade that."

Resolution 17-04 will go before the council for its first reading on April 3. Jessica Evans had no idea how a trip to Nepal in 2007 would change her life.

A couple of people in her church were involved with an organization called ServLife, which worked to establish churches, care for children and fight poverty in India and Nepal, according to its website. Evans' church sponsored the trip to Nepal through that organization.

Evans, an Indianapolis resident, said the group visited several ministries, some of which focused on helping human trafficking victims rebuild their lives. At those places, Evans watched young women make jewelry and soap to earn an income. Though she had been reading about human trafficking for at least a year before the trip, she said, seeing those young women made the issue personal. She described the girls as just like her: smart and funny and beautiful and wanting to hug.

She said she left the ministries, "understanding that they were helping that handful of girls there and that was really beautiful, but there were so many more that needed that type of support and love and opportunity."

An International Labour Organization report issued in 2014 estimated the annual profits from forced labor around the world to be \$150 billion. Of those profits, two-thirds were from sexual exploitation and one-third was from economic exploitation. The U.S. State Department estimated 27 million people were being exploited through human trafficking in a 2016 report.

After returning home, Evans—then a Pike Township kindergarten and first grade teacher—said she felt compelled to do something.

"We came back and no one knew about trafficking," she said.

Evans and some of her friends organized an awareness-building concert called "Purchased" in 2007, which she said she thought would be enough to satisfy her desire to do something. Then people started asking how they could learn more, what could they do

to help. The friends pushed forward, organizing more awareness-building and fundraising events until establishing Purchased as a permanent nonprofit in 2011.

According to the Purchased website, the organization's focus narrowed to state and local sex trafficking after Indianapolis hosted the Super Bowl in 2012.

A report issued on human trafficking by the Indiana Office of the Attorney General stated there were 178 cases of trafficked youth in Indiana during 2016 alone. The vast majority of victims—94 percent—were girls. Nearly one-third of the victims was 15 years old or younger. Some were as young as seven years old when the exploitation began. Nationwide, 83 percent of an estimated 300,000 trafficking victims were American citizens, according to U.S. Department of Justice statistics.

"For every number we have, there are more than likely a couple of others that aren't identified as tracking," Evans said.

By the end of 2016, close to 180 girls and women at risk of or having survived sexual exploitation had gone through Purchased's My Life, My Choice program—a 10-week course on prevention of sexual exploitation. The newer ALLIES mentorship program, which pairs survivors of sex trafficking and exploitation with a mentor for at least one year, has trained 15 mentors and placed five mentees. As that program develops, Evans said, it will become more clear where the girls and women served by Purchased still need help. Whatever that need is, it will be the next endeavor the organization undertakes, she said.

Purchased has two full-time staff members. According to Evans, everyone else is a contract worker, intern or dedicated volunteer. Total volunteers—including

one-timers—ranges from 100 to 150.

Purchased's sixth annual fundraising dinner, "Illuminate!" will be held March 31 at Indiana Landmarks, 1201 Central Ave., Indianapolis. An annual 5K will take place in the fall.

### Greenwood celebrates completion of downtown facade project to kick off St. Patrick's Day Block Party

A section of Madison Avenue was shut down in Greenwood on March 17 for the first annual St. Patrick's Day Block Party hosted by Planetary Brewing.

The city took the opportunity to also celebrate the facade project completion, which has fueled the future growth of downtown Greenwood, with a ribbon cutting. The city, along with Restore Old Town Greenwood, received an Indiana Main Street facade grant to revitalize the historic portion of downtown Greenwood in 2015.

"Eighteen of the 33 downtown businesses bought in to help us," said Greenwood Mayor Mark Myers. "They wanted to see these buildings revitalized. We have buildings that are over 130 years old that have been all redone and brought to what they look like today. I'm here to tell you that this is just the first step in the transformation you will see in downtown Greenwood. We have a lot of great things on the shelf we are bringing out, where we will see downtown get revitalized even more to make it a bigger, better, a more livable, walkable community for you and your families to enjoy for years to come."

After the ribbon cutting, party-goers filled Planetary Brewing and The Blind Pig for the party; each business had standing room only with guests also celebrating outside on the shut-down section of Madison Avenue.

"Downtown Greenwood is on fire," said council member Ezra Hill to the crowd. "There's a spark that's been ignited and it's growing. I'm very happy and proud that all of you are here to be a part of that."

## Center Grove Junior Olivia Wright organizes Shootout Cancer basketball fundraiser to benefit Lenglade family

It didn't take Center Grove High School Junior Olivia Wright long to think of a topic when she was assigned to create a research project and do something with that research for her dual-credit English Composition class.

Her brother's friend, sixth grader Jasper Lenglade, had been diagnosed with leukemia a year ago and is currently undergoing treatment. Upon receiving permission from the Lenglade family, Olivia began to organize the Jasperstrong Shootout Cancer 3V3 event that will take place April 14, 5 to 9 p.m. and April 15, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. at the Center Grove Middle School North gymnasium.

"Ever since I learned what happened, I always wanted to do something," Olivia said. "This is what I decided to do to finally get to help Jasper."

The Lenglade family came to the Center Grove area, from Indianapolis, when Jasper was just a year and a half old. His mom, Jennifer, said the family is very close-knit and enjoys spending time together, especially riding roller coasters at Cedar Point or sharing their love for hard rock music. At 11 years old, Jasper enjoys playing acoustic and electric guitar, building with Legos and anything to do with food.

Jasper is a member of the Bantambasketball and football teams, and though he still attends practices and games, he hasn't been able to play in the past year.

"On March 1, (2016) he got up and was about incoherent," Jennifer said. "He couldn't put a sentence together, couldn't talk. He had been complaining of headaches beforehand. He was clammy. We thought it was a diabetic episode so we decided to take him to Riley."

Upon checking his blood work, the family was told that Jasper has leukemia. He was officially diagnosed

March 3 and received his first chemo treatment March 4.

Jasper is now in the maintenance stage of his treatment, which will last two and a half years. He is back to school, attending half days when his health allows. He's building up to going full days, and although he misses getting to do some things, "there's no point moaning and complaining because it's not going to get anywhere," he said.

Ever since his diagnosis, Jennifer said the community hasn't hesitated to show their support. The Wright family would bring them dinners for the first few weeks when they returned home. CGMSN held a bracelet fundraiser. The football league did a cancer awareness day.

"You can see how much people want to help," Jennifer said. "It really is a tight-knit community. He appreciates everything, certainly, and we're grateful for everything. At the same time, you wish the reason he's getting all of the attention wasn't there."

Jasper concurred, saying, "I'd rather have landed on the moon or something... or broken the world cheeseburger-eating record."

As Olivia organizes the Jasperstrong Shootout, she said she has seen firsthand that support for Jasper. She has far exceeded her initial goal of raising \$2,500 from the event after receiving a \$2,500 match from The Garrett Companies. The new goal is \$10,000.

Local businesses from all around the community have chosen to sponsor, or even approached Olivia about sponsoring the event. The primary sponsor is Chick-fil-A of Greenwood on State Road 135, while many other local business have also contributed.

"She took on a big project," said Olivia's mom, Amy Ford. "I'm really proud of her. Both of my kids were so sad when they found out Jasper had

leukemia. (This event) has been a good way to redirect some of that energy and put it to good use for the community... Already, a lot of community members have come to us and said this is really amazing. A lot of people who wanted to be involved and couldn't, this opened the door for them."

Registration is currently open for the tournament and will run through the first week of April or until they sell out. The tournament is open to all ages, from first grade to adults. Olivia is looking for at least 50 teams of three to participate. Many items have been donated for a raffle, and food, refreshments, T-shirts and bracelets will be available for purchase. Be the Match, national bone marrow registry, will have a donor drive, while The Leukemia and Lymphoma Society will have a booth there for awareness. The event details have been posted to Facebook, Twitter and Instagram, and are regularly updated as Olivia gets more sponsors.

Olivia said she's looking forward to the day of, watching the sixth graders play, while Jasper said he's anticipating watching his dad play.

"I'm really excited," Olivia said. "I'm looking forward to seeing everybody there and helping to support them. I'm looking forward to what the T-shirts are going to look like. I'd love if we could do this annually."

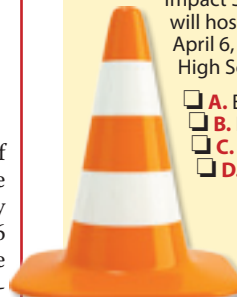

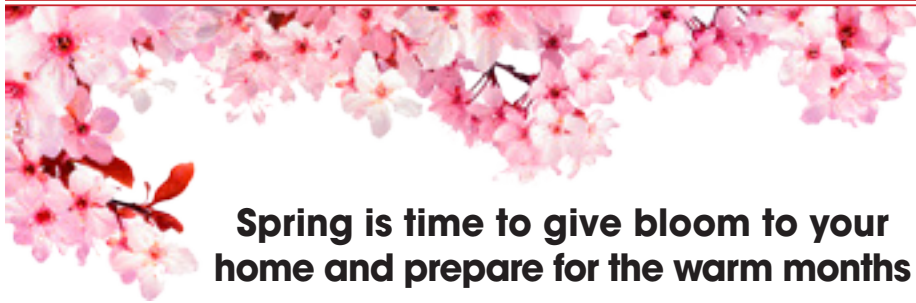

**Spring is time to give bloom to your home and prepare for the warm months**

Spring is here and so is the season for spring cleaning and spring renovations to prepare for the coming warmer months.

At home, you may move between heating, air conditioning and opening up your window. Joe Anne of Anne and Matry noted the importance of having a functioning furnace even though the temperatures are starting to warm up. He suggests that homeowners have their furnace and air conditioning checked during the spring.

*"We are going to have some cold weather through May so it still needs to work properly on the heating cycle but the blower runs constantly on the air conditioning cycle and so it is important to have that running properly also," Annee said.*

Chris Huser of Lamping/Huser Heating and Cooling said maintaining filters in your unit is another necessary aspect of keeping the home properly heated and cooled.

*"First and foremost always make sure your furnace filter is cleaned as well as your outdoor condenser coil which can get clogged up with cottonwood and other debris. Also have a professional check the Freon and controls in your air conditioner to ensure proper operation," Huser said.*

Kelly Bowling of Indy Rental and Sales said they have the equipment to help homeowners with any number of spring projects whether that be preparing their lawns, or putting up a new fence or patio. Among the

most popular items are seeders, aerators, and dethatchers to keep lawns healthy. Other useful items include ladders, scissor lifts, skid steers, and mini excavators. Paver patios are especially popular right now.

Anyone who has thought about replacing their dingy carpets, Dan Hornaday of Flooring by Stretch Rite said the trend for floors is hard surfacing, especially in the spring.

*"Hard surfaces are very popular," Hornaday said. "Many consider replacing carpet in large room areas, (since) hard surfaces are more durable in high-traffic areas, especially after winter with salt and snow being tracked in."*

Easter is later this year and Heidenreich added Easter Lillies, hydrangeas, pansy bowls and azaleas are popular Easter flowers that will be available soon after Heidenreich Greenhouses opens approximately April 7.

## Beauty and the Beast wholly unnecessary, nothing to see here

### MOVIE REVIEW

Sequels and remakes, for an extended period of time, have been a popular default for Hollywood to turn to when running low on ideas, but still hoping to generate as much money as possible. In recent years, another trend, courtesy primarily of those fine folks at Walt Disney, has emerged: live-action retellings of beloved fairy tales. In the last couple of years we've been provided with such versions of *Cinderella*, *Alice in Wonderland*, and *The Jungle Book*. This past weekend gave us yet another live-action adaptation of another fairy tale.

*Beauty and the Beast*, set in France during the mid-1700s, is the story of an unlikely romance between a beautiful woman and a man who has been forced to spend his days as a monstrous, beastly creature. The once-handsome prince, as a result of his inability to look beyond the exterior of an individual, is cursed and turned into a hideous being. However, like most fairy tales, all is not lost. The miserable curse can be reversed, but only if he falls in love with someone and them with him, which is easier said than done.

Using a ticking clock of falling rose petals, the Beast and his collection of loyal servants are running out of time if they hope to return to human form. Once the final petal falls and hits the ground, the curse becomes permanent. However, Belle (Emma Watson) comes across the mysterious castle in search of her missing father. The astoundingly stunning Belle looks to be the Beast's last chance at true love and reversing the curse. Over the course of the next several days, something develops between the two, but is it simple feelings of infatuation or true love, capable of breaking the longstanding curse?

Anyone with even a passing familiarity of

the beloved fairy tale knows how this film plays out in the end, with a satisfying conclusion for all characters involved. And normally, a film sticking so closely to the original is a good thing, but in this instance that doesn't ring true. Those hoping for any kind of new or unique idea in this live-action re-invention will be sorely disappointed. The writing is completely, 100 percent devoid of anything original; the songs are the same and the characters essentially spout identical lines. There is absolutely nothing new the film brings to the table, with its lazy writing on display, front and center.

In addition to the film's less than stellar originality, a number of the performances are incredibly cartoony. The actor portraying Gaston, the man pining for Belle's love and affection, is notably bad. He's way over the top in every single painful scene in which he appears; it's almost as if he's mocking the character and the entire production with his terrible performance. The film is also about 20 minutes too long for a film of its ilk.

*Beauty and the Beast* will likely set box office records, but it's in no way deserving of such recognition. It's lazy, uninspired and at times, extremely hard to watch. 1.5 out of 5.

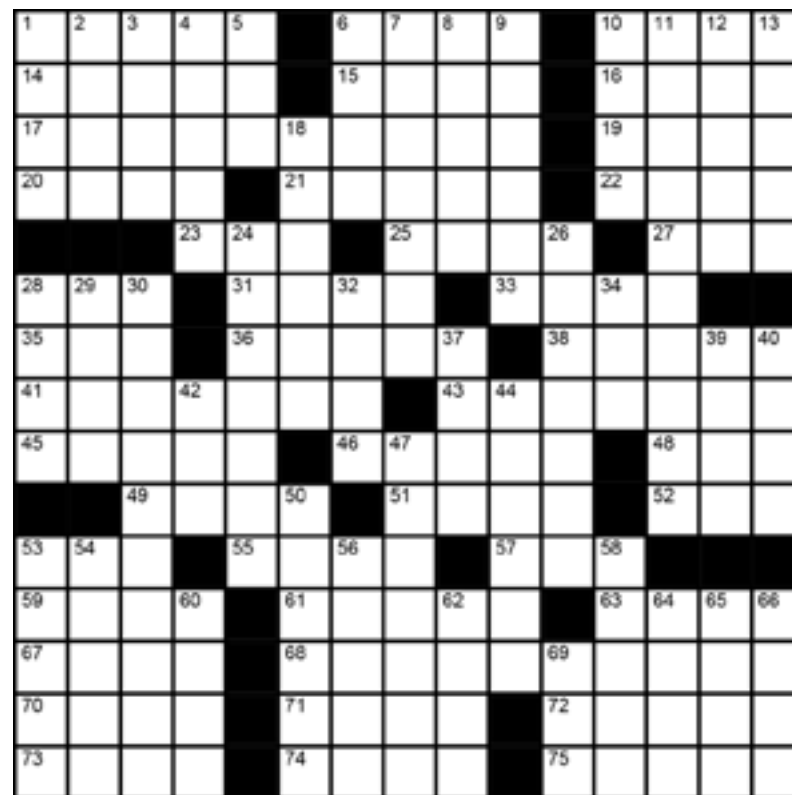

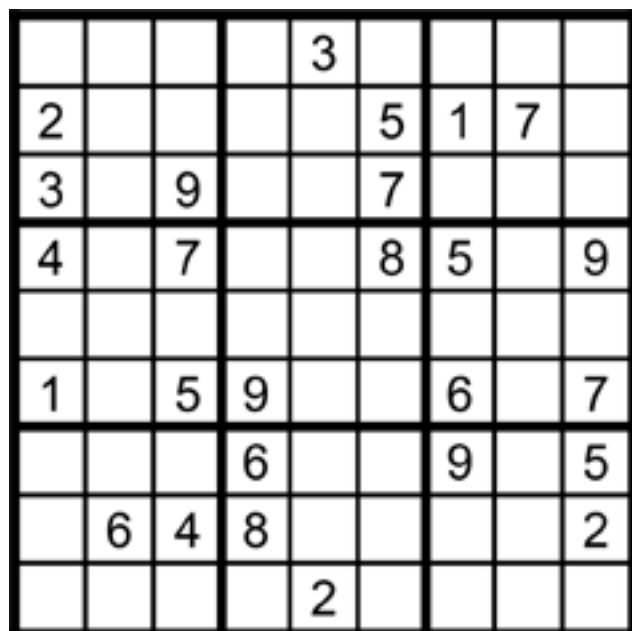

Why are rates of the many forms of dementia and Alzheimer's disease higher in the US than anywhere on earth: our American industrialized diet of fake food, the struggle to afford organics, disconnection from God's celestial apothecary, lack of untainted water (fluoride), air pollution and an expired gym membership? In other words, brain degeneration is avoidable.

Bacon, bologna, jerky, smoked fish, meats and ham from the deli contain nitrosamines, which cause the liver to produce fats toxic to the brain. Most beers contain nitrites linked to Alzheimer's. Pasta, cakes, white sugar, white rice and white bread causes a spike in insulin and sends toxins to the brain. Microwave popcorn contains diacetyl that may increase amyloid plaques in the brain [alzheimer.net](http://alzheimer.net)

The modern American diet has lost its soul. Everything we need to stay healthy, prevent and cure disease is already on earth. There's a healing within. You just need to eat from God's garden, not a soulless alchemist.

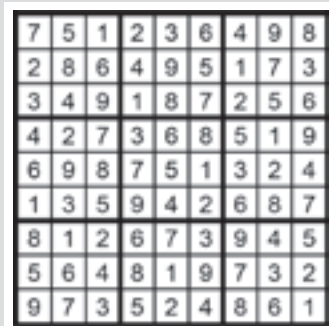

**FAMILY FEATURES** - Your washing machine suddenly breaks down, a child requires a laptop for school or your car needs new tires. Sometimes surprise bills can be difficult to cover.

financial mistakes that can hound you months, even years later."

Buying items on sub-prime credit or through high-interest vehicles like payday or title loans can be risky propositions, particularly if you have a low credit score to begin with. Understanding your options can help ensure you make the best choice to meet your short-term needs without compromising your long-term finances. Consider the following:

- **CASH:** Paying cash for a major purchase makes the most sense in terms of avoiding exorbitant fees and preventing credit dings from missed payments. However, cash may not always be readily available.

- **CREDIT CARDS:** Chances are, even with a shaky financial history, you can find a creditor willing to offer you a line of credit, but you'll likely have a steep annual percentage rate that accrues each month. - **EMPLOYEE PURCHASE PROGRAMS:** Research shows that financial stress at home regularly impacts employee productivity at work. This leads many employers to offer an employee purchase program such as Purchasing Power, which allows

you to buy what you need through automatic paycheck deductions over a 12-month period. There's no credit check, zero interest and no hidden fees. - **RENT TO OWN:** With rent-to-own products, you pay a monthly principal amount plus service fees and taxes for a period of time, up to completing the rental agreement and owning the item outright. While the monthly rate makes items like appliances and furniture immediately accessible, be wary of the long-term cost. Renters can end up paying as much as three times the retail value of an item before satisfying the terms for ownership.

- **PAYDAY/TITLE LOANS:** Essentially, these loans function as a loan against a future paycheck or your vehicle. They often come with high percentage rates and fees, as well as extremely short repayment schedules. Rely on these loans only if you are certain you can cover the entire loan and associated fees by the designated due date.

Whatever option you choose for emergency financing, understanding the repercussions can help you long-term.
