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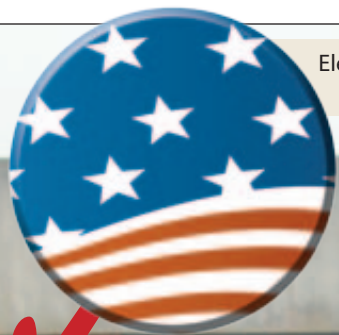

# A plasma proposal

## Perry Township town hall meeting addresses concerns of CSL Plasma's interest in rezoning to build new facility

Perry Township and Southport residents and stakeholders filed into the Perry Township Government Center on April 23 to express their concerns and to learn more about a proposed plasma donation center at the southwest corner of Southport Road and Madison Avenue.

Don Tharp has owned most of the land since 1998, building the Advance Auto Parts in 2001. The 12,000 square foot plot of land has remained vacant for years, which is where CSL Plasma is looking to construct a new plasma donation center and needs the area to get rezoned in order to build. Tharp is also the landowner for CSL Plasma's facility in Irvington.

"Our company is about improving and saving lives," said Sonya Williams, manager of corporate communications with CSL Plasma for more than 30 years. She gave the first presentation at the meeting. "I am here tonight to give you some good information about who can and can't donate plasma. There has been some misinformation out there and stereotypes that aren't true. Already in this area we already have over 500 people that donate at our center on Washington (Street)."

Williams said that CSL Plasma will initially hire 25 employees and by year three, will expand to nearly 60 employees. She said they hire people locally, not just to be employed by them, but to work on landscaping, check on their freezers and alarms. The center would eventually be open seven days a week, serving more than 200 donors per day. She said that's a lot of tax dollars that come into the community; but dollars aside, plasma can help save lives as it's used to make products that treat a large number of illnesses including bleeding disorders, burns, shock, trauma, and more. She said that people who donate plasma are very healthy, and every donor is screened before they are permitted to donate.

"We are one of the most heavily regulat-

ed companies out there, which is good," Williams said. "We should be... We also do a lot of things that are more than required. We look at a person to see how they look and talk, look for needle and track marks, for tattoos that symbolize gangs."

Williams said the company also works within the community to give back, and have an open door policy for anyone with questions. Donors are compensated in the form of a prepaid debit card, which Williams said they

My concern is where are those people going to go when they walk out the door? I have over 500 children at an elementary school (Homecroft Elementary) right across the street and that has me concerned and has my parents concerned. I'd like you to consider that before you consider putting something like this in our community."

Homecroft Elementary School Principal Jody Matthews, spoke after Dr. Little.

"We are very much within walking distance of the site we are talking about," Matthews said. "We have more walkers and bikers coming to Homecroft than any other area in Perry Township... I am very concerned about keeping my kids safe. I have a lot of concerns. I am here to listen. I am here with an open mind. There are just some things that concern me."

Officials from Southport, a city which has a boundary line across the street from the proposed center, also spoke to explain the work they've done to try to redevelop the area. Russell McClure, president of the Redevelopment Commission, said they are look-

ing for more of a village-mix use – the type of businesses people will find on Massachusetts Avenue near downtown Indianapolis. He said they want to minimize "seas of asphalt" around buildings, avoiding buildings that look like a typical strip mall.

"This is absolutely the opposite of what we want to do in Southport and what we want envision..." said Duane Langreck, building commissioner and vice president of the Southport Redevelopment Commission. "We'd be happy to look for some other development and something that aligns with what we want to do."

Washington St., St. 311, Indianapolis.

will usually spend right after leaving.

"When you look at what we compensate our donors with, when they leave this facility and spend it, you are looking at 2-3 million dollars that are staying in this community," Williams said. "We work with local merchants for a merchant partnership program where we encourage our donors to buy local."

After Williams' initial presentation, those in the audience were permitted to ask questions and express their concerns. A mixture of area residents and community stakeholders volunteered to speak.

"I've never talked to parents more on an issue than this one," said Dr. Tom Little, superintendent of the Perry Township Schools. "They are concerned. When you talk about your need to check for needle marks on people before you bring them in, the fact that you're concerned about drug use for people coming to your organization. I'm concerned about your percentage of turn-down rate. [...]"

## Burial: the old and the new with a paranormal perspective

For the majority of the years there was quite a physical aspect to a funeral service, and something that went on quietly behind the scenes: graves were dug by hand. It was quite the challenge considering the sections of hardpan clay throughout the cemetery grounds. This requirement could explain the lapse of time between death and the actual burial. Before the use of burial vaults, bodies were placed in simple wooden caskets and lowered into the ground. Older cemeteries, Greenwood included, are a portrait of uneven ground—dips, sways, valleys and sunken depressions. The wooden caskets over time eventually gave way and collapsed. The ground at the gravesite visibly sank as a result.

Today, one can discern the original section of the Greenwood Cemetery from the newer addition to the north by the dividing point of a yellow bridge that separates the two. It is a startling contrast between the beginnings of a small town cemetery versus a progression of time marching forward. The newer has a more modern feel and is easily viewed from adjoining US 31 as traffic rolls steadily by. The ground is smoother and more uniform due to the advancements of burial sciences; the older section lies locked into the definite realm of the past.

Is the Greenwood Cemetery haunted? Or for that matter, are cemetery ghosts just a good story? You must pause to remember what a powerful and sometimes unpredictable tool the human mind can be in inciting 'activity' and fueling the adrenaline rush often associated with the creep factor of a cemetery in the darkness of night.

Do cars traveling west on Main Street with headlights bouncing off of reflective headstones in the older section resulting in a confusing configuration of shadows playing against the tree line cause one to question what their eyes are seeing and perhaps allow their imagination to take over?

Does the gentle rustling of wind through these trees imitate an unworldly voice and cause us to imagine something much more ominous?

We tend to believe what we want to believe. Visiting the Greenwood Cemetery is akin to touching base with the history of a community; those that have come before and moved on...others yet to make their mark. What do I feel while visiting these grounds? Peace...serenity...and a sense of awe and wonder in this journey through life.

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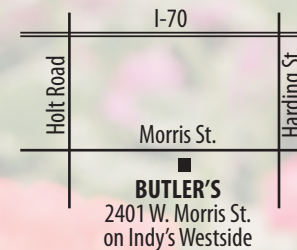

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## A blessing and a privilege

*Roncalli student shares of a faith-filled lesson learned in Rome for the canonization of Angelo Roncalli*

This last week I have had the incredible blessing and privilege to attend the canonization of my school's namesake, Angelo Roncalli, better known as Pope John XXIII, in Rome along with three other students. Despite our brief stay, my group experienced an incredible visit to Rome and Assisi.

Though the grandeur and history of the great cathedrals and Coliseum were suitably awe-inspiring, the memory that I will carry with me is of our Saturday night and early Sunday morning, leading into the Canonization Mass held in St. Peter's Square the following morning. After a late dinner, we departed for what was the longest, but also most rewarding, night of the trip.

Around 10 p.m., we brought ponchos and towels to camp out in the Via Conciliazioni, the road leading to the Vatican. The gates were set to open around five in the morning to allow flow into the square. Already, a few thousand people were camped out, sleeping in rows along the side streets or talking in small groups. Once we set up camp however, the gates were opened prematurely around eleven, and we were swept up into a massive flood of humanity, surging forward towards the basilica. We ended up standing, immobile and completely penned in for about eight hours straight as we awaited entrance into the square.

The night passed at an agonizingly slow

pace, for which I am grateful in hindsight as it afforded me the opportunity to meet my neighbors, people from a dizzying array of backgrounds. There was Pawel, a teenager from Poland who told me in halting English of his devotion to John Paul II, the man who led his country out of communism. There was Maria from Spain, and a group of students from Nairobi who saved for two years to travel to the seat of their faith. There was an elderly lady from Slovakia who communicated through smiles and prayers. There were Poles singing for hymns for hours and an

Italian priest who made the entire wait on his knees.

It was utterly beautiful in its expression; here we were, exhausted from the long night, grumpy from the constant shoving, yet at the same time, here we were: surrounded by millions of other believers. Despite language barriers, age gaps, ethnicity differences and even religious disagreements, we all had one desire and one connection more deep than any superficial similarity. In that moment, I felt the presence of Christ more clearly than in all of the gorgeous churches. Here was a real, tangible and human expression of love, a visible sign of devotion, and a breathing, vital Body of Christ. In that moment, I realized the real presence of Christ on this earth, the humble and passionate expression of faith on that road in the early Roman morning.

Changing but not gone  
Ginny Byrd ready to transform long-time Greenwood cafeteria

I am sure I was not the only one caught off-guard when I received an e-mail with an attached press release informing me that Jonathan Byrd's Cafeteria was repositioning itself in the market place.

Since then, I have had lunch there twice. You'd think I thought the place was closing forever – and, quite honestly that has been one of the biggest misnomers that Ginny Byrd has had to deal with since making the announcement. No, absolutely no, Jonathan Byrd's is not closing; it's just changing with the new consumer dining trends of 2014.

"I'm not going anywhere," she said a few days before closing on April 30. "I will be still serving through the new Jonathan Byrd's (what is now JB's Express) that I am developing. It will be a work in progress because this is new territory for us, too, to not have our full cafeteria line and dining room - this is a smaller condensed version of Jonathan Byrd's."

Also changing, Ginny said, will be the dessert selection. They will still offer their famous carrot cake, chocolate cake and white cake, as well as cream pies, but they will rotate them due to lack of space.

Ginny's husband, the late Jonathan Byrd, was the brainchild behind the cafeteria and its enor-

mity - 90-foot serving line and 400-seat dining room - which opened Nov. 7, 1988. She said he would have applauded the repositioning of the business.

"He would have said to me, 'Ginny what took you so long,'" she said. "He was very astute. He would have been probably the one, five or six years ago, saying we need to make some changes here."

Better late than never.

Ginny says she held on thinking she could change consumer attitudes, however, in the end that change was a bit delayed because of her devotion to those employees who had worked for Jonathan Byrd's since that opening night on Nov. 7

"I made it to the 25th anniversary just by gutting it out," she said. "I wanted to do it for my employees because they deserved that party... I wanted to make that milestone for the people who had been here"

No matter how the food at Jonathan Byrd's is served, the customer will always come first for Ginny.

"I've always appreciated every customer who came in the door and I still do, every day"

## Strawberry fields forever

### NUTRITION

Folks responding to a recent national survey dubbed strawberry lovers "health conscious, fun loving, intelligent and happy. Non-strawberry lovers were described as weird, boring, picky, eaters who reject the value of Creations glorious foods.

*The Journal of Agriculture and Food Chemistry* says the anthocyanins which create strawberry's color are powerful antioxidants that prevent damage to your temple. Strawberries are linked to lower rates of cancer deaths among seniors. Those eating the most strawberries

were three times less likely to develop cancer compared to those eating few or no strawberries. Strawberries are a source of manganese, colon cleansing fiber, folate and iodine. A cup of strawberries has more Vitamin C than an orange and a good source of B-vitamins, and Omega-3 fatty acid. Vitamin K supports bone health, magnesium and potassium support heart rhythm and its copper content supports proper growth, utilization of iron, enzymatic reactions, connective tissues, hair, eyes, and speed-bumps the ageing process.

Botanically, the low-cal, fat free strawberry is not a true berry. It's a member of the Rose Family. Blueberries and cranberries have seeds inside. The strawberry's "seeds" are on the outside and there's about 200 seeds coating every strawberry.

Strawberries are highly perishable and should be purchased only a few days prior to use. Don't wash them, though, till you're ready to eat or smoothie them. Alas, GMO

grocery berries lack flavor and healing nutritional mojo since they were mutated, picked prematurely then shipped 2,000 miles.

The succulent summer pleasure is listed on the governments "Dirty Dozen" most pesticide-polluted produce due to toxic chemicals are used in the growing process. Wash 'em folks as if your family's life depended on it. Score them from local U-Pick Em's or farmer's markets and support family farms.

Here's the dirty end of the stick: soon, the Department of Pesticide Regulation (DPR) will decide on the registration of a charming new pesticide called methyl iodide. It's

a common practice for huge producers to soaked field berries in snarky pesticides. Fruit is notoriously difficult to grow organically and without pesticides. Fruit is colorful and high in sugar. "Many insects love sugar. Because most fruits have soft skins, the pesticides used to kill those bugs, mold, and fungi

also love fruit. No amount of washing can remove them.

Fresh juice from sieved strawberry pulp has a cooling effect on feverish patients. For a cooling and purifying drink, either pour water on crushed berries or chop the berries roughly and whirl in a blender with a little water.

Don't let summer pass without savoring fresh berries. Taste the sunshine. After a heavy summer rain followed by abundant sun, grab the kids, a pale and head to the nearest 'u-pick-em' berry patch.

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# Structuring Synergy in Southport

## Marylynne Winslow brings excitement to Southport through her position as parks department president.

The Southport Street Fair on May 10 will reach a record number of vendors this year and hopefully a record amount of attendees, said Marylynne Winslow, president of the parks department. It comes with no surprise – Marylynne has worked hard to build onto the city's activities and increase excitement in Southport since she took the position on the parks board in January 2013.

"It's been 18 months of intense learning," Marylynne said. "Every day I learn something newer and more important than the last thing I learned... Our goal is to make the park and the events we have an opportunity to bring neighbors together to meet one another, just have fun together, to be a community and care about one another. So much anymore we don't get to see our neighbors and visit like we used to."

Marylynne grew up on the Southside of Indianapolis in the University Heights area, attending Manual High School. She said she can see the roof of the home she was raised in from the window of her office at the University of Indianapolis where she has worked since 1989. Before beginning her career with UIndy, Marylynne worked as a teacher's aide at Mary Bryan Elementary School, when it first opened. She married her husband, Kenneth Winslow, and the couple will celebrate their 40th anniversary next month. In 1999 she earned her degree in social work at UIndy. Marylynne will retire from her position as an administration assistant at the university on June 30.

"I absolutely love what I do and the people I work with," Marylynne said. "I couldn't have chosen a better place to have a professional career and enjoy what I do. We're really a community that cares about students and we care about one another. We're challenged to do everything we can to make higher educa-

tion a really good experience for students. We do a good job at that."

Marylynne said that she didn't expect to volunteer for the city until Southport Mayor Jesse Testruth approached her and asked her to be on the park board. She agreed to attend a meeting but said she'd be late due to an obligation with the university. When she walked in the door, 15-20 minutes late, everyone started clapping. Instead of just serving on the board, she learned she had been voted into the position of president.

"I really was dumbfounded," Marylynne said. "I thought they were kidding. I felt overwhelmed. I had never worked with any type of government agency. Public office was not something I was familiar with, but I appreciated the opportunity for a challenge. I knew I could learn. It was just a little scary."

The park board, consisting of five members, has aimed to increase the park's presence in the community through adding family-friendly,

free events. Second Saturdays in Southport was introduced so the city will have at least one event each month. January kicked off with a game night. UIndy students through their Imagination Emporium class helped to plan February's Silly Safari in Southport and March's Beach Party. When the annual Easter Egg Hunt took place on April 12, Marylynne said she was overwhelmed by the volume of attendance which she hopes shows the build-up in excitement as the community sees the value in these events.

"The city is so, so fortunate that (Marylynne) has stepped up and taken charge of the park board," said Joan Miller, president of the Southside Business Alliance who regularly volunteers to plan events such as the Street Fair. "She brings organizational skills from her many years of being an admissions administrator. She's outgoing, she's friendly. She just has so many positive qualities. She and her husband have a deep regard and love for the city of Southport which is very admirable."

The Southport Street Fair on May 10, 11 a.m. – 5 p.m. at 6901 Derbyshire Rd. will

consist of nearly 60 vendors and a full day of local entertainment. Southport Elementary will create an art walk, running from the Southport Antique Mall (which is also having an event that day) to the Community Center. Having limited city parking, Southport Heights Christian Church will provide free shuttle services, with departures every 15 minutes from Southport United Methodist Church, 1947 E. Southport Rd.; Southport Heights Christian Church, 7415 McFarland Rd.; Bethel Memorial Church, 2810 E. Southport Rd. Parking is free at the churches.

"The city of Southport, we have good leadership, good volunteers already in place," Marylynne said. "We're trying our best to be fiscally responsible, follow the rules of small town government, communicate between departments and different officials in the community so we can support one another and do what's best for our citizens. This is an important time for our city. The Redevelopment Commission, there's not a group of men and women that work harder than they do."

Marylynne said she has seen the RDC aiming to change the landscape of the city, transforming it into an area of destination. Through the park board, she says she creates additional reasons people would want to come to the city. They are currently in the process of restoring the playground equipment in the park. They installed a new swing set. The remaining equipment will be stripped of its paint and restored to the way it was 35 – 40 years ago.

"I cannot wait for that to happen," Marylynne said. "As a young mom, I took my children to the playground and now I want to be able to take my grandchildren to that park. It's really in need of repair. Eventually we hope to purchase another piece of equipment that's newer for the kids to play on. We just want people to come and enjoy the park. We want it to be safer, to be a nicer environment for them to play in."

Marylynne says in a way, her work for the city has mirrored what she does at UIndy. Her career has entailed a lot of planning and customer service. She says the biggest challenge to being the park's president, though, has been having a full-time job. When she retires in two months, she said she hopes to give more by not being so rushed. She said she will stay involved with the park board at least until they complete the 5-year master plan introduced by former mayor, Rob Thoman's administration. The plan included changes to the park such as moving the basketball court, building a gazebo and a walking trail. Marylynne said

they are working with the city engineer to re-design the plan some, asking that they be held accountable so they can finish the project in a timely manner.

"She's really established the park board to be meaningful," Miller said. "Up to this point, it really hadn't been. It's because she's taken it upon herself to educate herself and spent time doing it. I think there will be lots and lots of great things coming out of the parks department in the foreseeable future with Marylynne in charge."

Marylynne is retiring early to spend more time with her family, creating good memories with the people she loves, which she can't do by working all of the time. Although, she won't stop giving back; along with her work with the city, she is a trained Red Cross volunteer. She said she has not gone to a disaster since Hurricane Katrina and hopes to get recertified. She also stays involved at University Heights Methodist Church, where she attended as a child. This August, she will oversee a role on the committee there that will look at ways to strengthen the church, reach out to the neighborhood and get them connected.

"It's a part of who I am," Marylynne said. "Almost selfishly, I am motivated by enjoyment. I don't do it for me, but in a sense I do because I love to volunteer."

The Other Woman... Unbearable characters, predictable plot

From *30 Rock* to *Parks and Recreation* to the release of *Bridesmaids* several years ago, and to the HBO show, *Veep*, the funny women have outshined the funny men. People like Fey, Poehler, Wiig, Rudolph, and to a lesser extent, Melissa McCarthy, have consistently brought the funny. The latest film to showcase the talents of funny women is the new release, *The Other Woman*, starring Cameron Diaz and Leslie Mann.

*The Other Woman* is about a philandering, cheating, conniving and all-around bad guy, as he romances three women at one time without any of them suspecting a thing. *The Other Woman* is considered a comedy and being categorized as such, you would think the story might contain some slightly funny material. However, you'd be very, very wrong. The film may elicit a smirk or two, but that is the closest you ever get to emitting anything close to a laugh. Except for one twist, the entire story is also fairly predictable.

For the first half of the film, Leslie Mann, in long, drawn out, extended scenes, goes from laughing like an idiot to crying like a baby. 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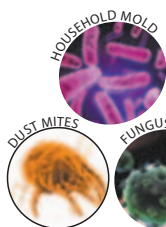

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# Principal vs. principle

## GRAMMAR GUY

**Question: "I get e-mails all the time in which people mix up the words 'principle' and 'principal.' I even see them misused on the news! Maybe you can write a column to clear up some of the confusion."**

Answer: What an apropos question – I just spent the entire day with the word "principal" on the tip of my tongue after a phone call from my car dealership (They offered me the opportunity to keep my same monthly payments, but on a larger loan. What a deal!)

We'll look at "principle" first, since it is the simpler of the two.

"Principle" derives from the Latin principium, meaning "source," and it has maintained that definition in English. We use "principle" to mean "a fundamental source or basis of something" or "a fundamental truth or proposition." For example, free speech is a principle of American democracy.

"Principle" is also always a noun – thus being (slightly) simpler than "principal."

When I was in elementary school, we had a little mnemonic to help us remember the spelling of "principal:" "The principal is always

your 'pal.'" This didn't turn out to be true, necessarily, for all of my classmates, but its usefulness as a grammar tool holds up.

"Principal" derives from the Latin principalis, or "first; original." From there we end up with our modern definitions in the adjectival form: "first in order of importance" or, in economics, "denoting an original sum invested or lent." As an extension of the former definition, we get "principal" as a noun meaning "the most important or senior person in an organization or group;" "the head of a school, college or other education institution;" or "the leading player in each section of an orchestra" –

the "first" person, more or less. From the latter definition we get "principal" as a noun meaning, as you may have guessed, "an original sum invested or lent."

The thing to take away from this is that if you are talking about the source of something, or a fundamental truth, you want "principle." Otherwise, you want "principal" – and whether you use it as an adjective or noun should come naturally based on the context.

In mixing bowl, combine cooked and shredded chicken with 1/2 cup salsa verde.



Warm tortillas in slow oven, or wrapped in dishtowel in microwave. Warmed tortillas fold and roll better when making enchiladas.

Spoon a thin line of chicken-salsa verde mixture into a corn tortilla and wrap tightly. Place seam side down in baking dish. Repeat until chicken and tortillas are used up and baking dish is packed full of enchiladas. Pour remaining salsa verde sauce over top and sprinkle about 1 to 1 1/2 cup shredded cheese on top.

Bake in preheated oven for about 20 minutes, or until cheese has melted and salsa verde is bubbling.

Serve warm with side of rice and refried beans.

Tip: Prepare shredded chicken on Sunday to save time. Throw 1 pound of boneless skinless chicken thighs and 1 pound of boneless skinless chicken breast in a slow cooker and cook on low for 8 hours.



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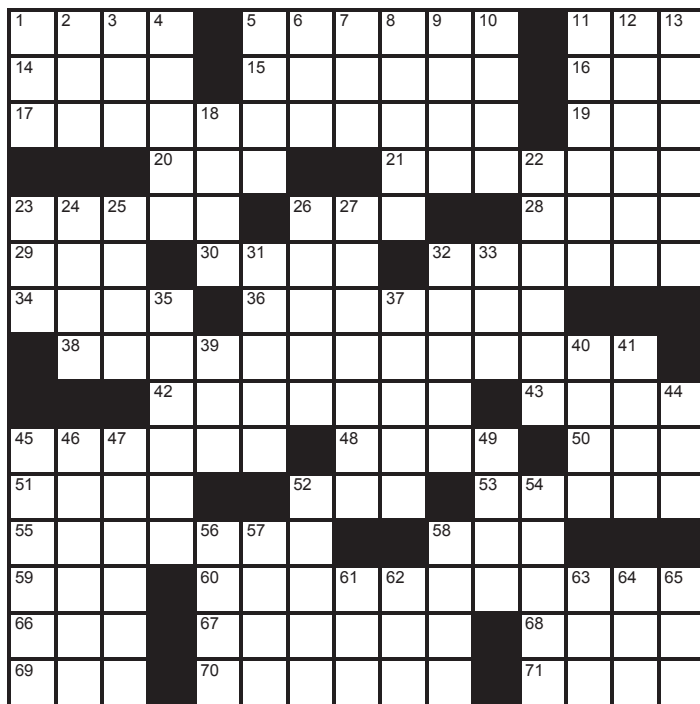

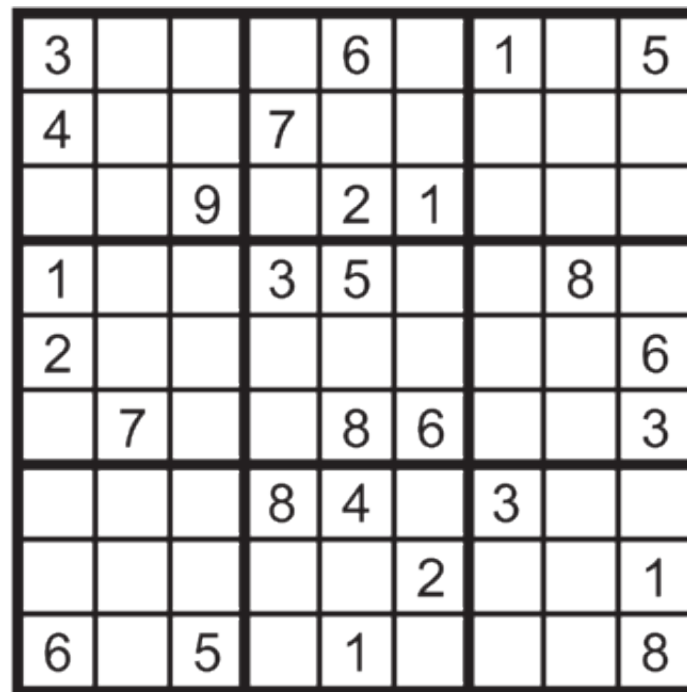

"It didn't take us long to feel at home here," Ron says. "The desire is not to see the building grow, not to see the building busting at the seams; it's to establish relationships. The desire is to see the church being used more than just Sundays."

The couple has attended New Hope for 19 years now. Ron, a retired math teacher, has been involved with the council, teaching Sunday school classes for 16 of the 19 years and helping with youth and men's groups. Kim, a retired systems analyst, has helped with the nursery and still helps coordinate meals for funerals. Through the years, they say the premise behind why they began attending the church has not changed.

"It's always been a place of support," Kim says. "You go to learn, but it's also a family to me. The hard times I've been through, I couldn't have gotten through that without my

husband and my church family as well. People that don't have a relationship with God and Christian friends, I don't know how they do it. They really support us and get us through it. I think that is what having a church family is about."

#### What is it about your place of worship that helps you grow spiritually?

"Our church gives us a body of Christians to study the Bible with, to reach out to the community with, and to live our Christian lives with. These people become family and as we study together we can't help but grow spiritually. It isn't so much the Sunday morning worship service that helps us grow, although it can. It's more the feeling of community and

that we are part of the Body of Christ as we live our lives together." – Kim

"New Hope provides more than just a place of worship for me. By becoming involved I am enabled to grow spiritually through Hope Group (Small Home Groups), Men's Group, Church Council (serving two separate terms) and Sunday school (teaching an adult group). If all it took to grow spiritually was to listen and obtain knowledge then I could attend one of any number of Southside churches. To grow spiritually, I need to be able to see God working in every facet of the church, which I see at New Hope." – Ron

#### What is it about your place of worship that helps you feel connected to your spouse, children, parents or family?

"The reason Kim and I first attended New Hope was for our children to be in youth group. Through the youth leader visiting their school, they became interested in attending. Thus, we attended originally because our children who are now adults and moved away. But as for myself and my wife, our place of worship is an integral part of our relationship. In order for our love to grow for each other, we must have a foundation built on God's love." – Ron

#### What is one meaningful event that has taken place at your place of worship?

"About 16 or 17 years ago, Darrel Riley, our church pastor at the time, set up a series of

small groups within the church body. We were given the names of the couples who were supposed to be in our group and we were to meet in our homes during the Lenten season. We didn't know the couples we were put with very well, but we came to know them and we continue to meet in our homes today. Our small group has grown and split off several times, which is the nature and expectation of small groups. The Lenten experiment that Darrel Riley initiated so long ago has enriched our lives tremendously. The people in our original group are some of the closest friends I have today and I'm so grateful for them." – Kim

#### Why would you recommend your place of worship to someone?

"You can come to worship service on Sunday morning, but your life will be changed when you get involved with the people. We offer a lot of ways to do that and it's the involvement in the community of New Hope that will enrich your life." – Kim

"If you are looking for a place of worship to attend and participate, then I would say New Hope is the place for you. Our theme is BE-COME (Biblically Equipped Community on Mission Everywhere). There is so much to do for all. God expects us to be doers of His word and I would encourage anyone to be a part of that here." – Ron

### DEVOTIONAL

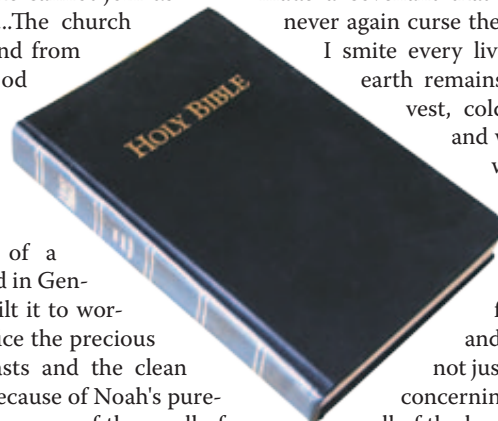

*"And Noah built an altar unto the Lord; and took of every clean beast, and of every clean fowl, and offered burnt offerings on the altar. And the Lord smelled a sweet savour; and the Lord said in His heart, I will not again curse the ground any more for man's sake; for the imagination of man's heart is evil from his youth; neither will I again smite any more everything living, as I have done. While the earth remaineth, seedtime and harvest, and cold and heat, and summer and winter, and day and night shall not cease." ~ Genesis 8:20-22*

I want to quote from something that is recorded that Dietrich Bonhoeffer said: "The church has only ONE altar, the altar of the

Almighty...before which all creatures must kneel...Whoever seeks something other than this must keep away; he cannot join us in the house of God...The church has only one pulpit, and from that pulpit, faith in God will be preached and no other faith and no other will than the will of God, however well-intentioned."

The first mention of a man-built altar is found in Genesis 8:20 and Noah built it to worship God and to sacrifice the precious lives of the clean beasts and the clean fowl upon it to Him. Because of Noah's pureness of heart and not because of the smell of burned flesh, God smell a "sweet savor" and was moved in His heart to make the declaration that was made toward mankind that



day. Please take note that it was not merely to Noah alone, but to all mankind that God made a covenant that day. He said, "I will never again curse the ground...neither will

I smite every living thing...While the earth remains, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, will not cease." He made the covenant with Himself and that covenant is based in His faithfulness and holiness and truthfulness. It was not just a covenant He made concerning Noah, it concerned all of the human race from Noah's day to this. Since that time, God has been most patient and longsuffering.

Let us make the altar where we worship

God a most sacred thing. Let us sacrifice on that altar. Let that sacrifice not be the flesh of animals or other earthly beasts, let it be the sacrifice of self which Paul writes is our "reasonable worship." In a world where self is adulated to the heavens above the earth, let us live lives of humble service to God on the earth and let it be "in the earth" where the kingdom of our God resides. In us, the flesh of us that is from the earth, has its origin from the dust of the earth is where the kingdom of God is and where the true altar is to be found. Let us worship God from the heart and not just the head.
