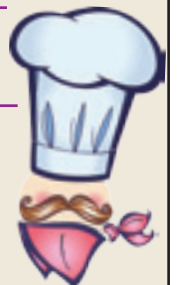

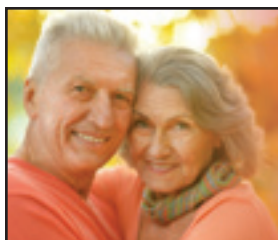

BEECH GROVE CITY COUNCIL

Meeting, Nov. 7

What happened: Ordinance 25 was tabled on second reading, until January.

What it means: Ordinance 25 creates a Department of Economic Development for Beech Grove. This is being done to attract new businesses and enhance present businesses in the city. Buddy Templin suggested tabling the ordinance, to do further research. "I'm not against this," said Councilman Chris Duffer, who seconded tabling. "I think we need to be careful what we're putting into the law and what we're allowing this group to do."

What happened: Ordinances 26, 27 and 28 were introduced and approved on first reading. Ordinance 28 was approved on all three readings.

What it means: Ordinance 26 relates to one-way streets and alleys, and sets a fee for not complying.

Ordinance 27 establishes a fee for heavy trash pickup of box springs and mattresses. There will be a minimum charge of \$20. Brad Meriwether, director of public works,

said beginning this year there were more calls related to mattresses containing bed bugs. "Not having the machinery and not wanting to tell people it's just a hard no, we reached out to Ray's (Trash Services) to see if there was something we could do to work together." Last month the department, with Ray's, picked up 55 mattresses.

Ordinance 28 creates a one-way street from Buffalo north to Cleveland, as a result of the construction that will be done on the former Beech Grove hospital. This will be returned to two-way once demolition has concluded.

In brief... Beech Grove Police Department needs to find a solution to the need for an IDACS coordinator. When the department disbanded its dispatch nine years ago, this position has been voluntarily filled by other departments. Speedway is currently handling this role, and has given notice that it will cease doing so beginning Jan. 1. State regulations state that someone needs to fill this role for the police department 24/7. Mayor Dennis Buckley suggests amending the salary ordinance in December to add a full-time position. Police Chief Mark Swarts said, "We're going to put a band-aid on it and maybe next year or the year after hire enough people to do it."

Würth Service Supply breaks ground on Greenwood headquarters

Coming soon – Würth Service Supply Inc., a distributor of assembly and fastening materials for manufacturers, announced plans to expand its headquarters in Greenwood, creating up to 60 new jobs by 2020. The company, which is part of Würth Industry North America (WINA) and owned by Germany-based Würth

Group, will invest \$11.5 million to construct and equip a 230,000-square-foot facility in Greenwood's Southpoint Business Park near I-65. Currently, Würth Service Supply employs 100 full-time Indiana associates and operates more than 15 facilities across the United States. The company expects the facility to be complete by September 2017 and plans to begin hiring for warehouse and administrative positions next year. Ground breaking was celebrated Oct. 24.

Beech Grove firefighter looks forward to helping the community with her firehouse family

Having grown up on the Southside of Indianapolis, Angie Lechtenberg drives back close to her hometown every third day to serve the community as a firefighter with the Beech Grove Police Department.

"I truly enjoy my job and I look forward to coming in and seeing the people that I work with," she said. "We really do get along like a family. We fight like brothers and sisters but we also love each other like brothers and sisters. There is nothing we wouldn't do for each other."

Lechtenberg was raised near Manual High School. She now resides in Martinsville with her husband and two children. After high school, she had decided to go into the medical field. While serving as an EMT for Rural/Metro in Perry Township, she said she was able to see the different aspects of being a firefighter and said that inspired her to further her own career. She was hired as a civilian paramedic for BGF in 2007 before transitioning to the fire side in January 2009. She currently serves the department as an EMS lieutenant.

"I enjoy the closeness and the family feel of a small department and a small community," she said. "The city itself has a nice, homey feeling. With a small department itself you feel really close to everybody."

What was your inspiration to become a firefighter?

When I was two or three, I was in a car wreck. I remember all of the fire trucks and the lights being around me. We were in an El Camino and I hit my head. I was

put in the back of the ambulance with the firemen. Since then I was always intrigued with what was going on and I've wanted to help people.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

I've had people who call, you can tell are in pain and don't feel good. By the time I get them to the hospital, they're smiling and laughing. I can tell I've made a difference just by holding their hand or doing something to make them feel better. If I can see a change in how they feel from the time I get there to the time they arrive at the hospital that makes me feel really good.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

Being away from the family. Although being here is like having another family, it's still tough to do the balancing act of being a mom and coming here.

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

Spending time with the family and being outdoors, especially when the weather is good. I enjoy time with my little ones.

What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

Professionally, I would like to eventually become a ranking officer, move up and have my own crew. I would like to be able to teach new people coming into the career and watch them grow from starting out to moving up as well. I enjoy teaching people and helping people.

What would you have done if you hadn't become a firefighter?

Probably still working at a greenhouse or doing landscaping-type work.

Laura's story

An inner city haunting

"The house was unnerving... scary... I always felt uneasy," Laura Hinton states about her experience in an inner city house in Indianapolis during, not only her childhood years, but later as a teenager. "It started when you had your hand on the front doorknob and entered the house. It was in every nook and cranny. The stairways leading upstairs were utterly terrifying as was the basement. During my teenage years I felt it a lot stronger than my mom (Jennifer) who at the time seemed not to have a relationship with 'It' as she had in the past. Maybe she was blocking it out?"

What started in the 1960s as innocent game play with a Ouija board and seances soon transformed a house at 10th and Rural Street into something else. "People visiting the house for a short time noticed something was not quite right... but then they left," Laura declares. "Those living there full time continued to deal with what had been brought in. The house was alive and really intense!"

Laura lived in the house for eight months when she was 17 years old. She worked the graveyard shift at White Castle and returned to the upstairs apartment she shared with her mother in the morning. She would not however, sleep in the bedroom, choosing the sofa in the living room. Even then, sleep was fleeting. "It was never that deep relaxing sleep that I had when I was younger. I always felt something was watching me."

"Throughout the house there were 'pockets' that I felt uncomfortable with. These areas re-

ally radiated a bad feeling. In the apartment this included the bedroom, closet, and bathroom. These areas were really hot and radiated it! Yeah, I heard knocking and rappings, but by then that was rather common place and a yawner."

When Laura moved in during her late teens the activity originating from the 1960s had dissipated—somewhat. "Considering the past history, these people who had been a part of it seemed to be oblivious now. Whatever there was not completely gone, only retreated into the shadows. My mother included. They blocked it out," Laura says. "I discovered I was 'sensitive' and still detected a presence there. Others in the house seemed not aware... couldn't feel it."

During the Ouija board sessions in the dining room from years gone by family members stated they had seen faces in the bay window. Laura saw some for herself when she she was 15, but never afterwards. And the apartment? Before Laura and her mom, renters came and went on a regular basis. Usually with no explanation. However, one renter was quite vocal. She stated that a man had suddenly strolled through the apartment, leaned over a playpen that her baby was in, studied the child for a time, and then said "Boo!" before disappearing.

"That place just wasn't right!" Laura declares. And most likely... still isn't.

They saw another tomorrow

Southport alumni Bob Henry and Dan Skinner reflect on surviving the Korean War during the Battle of Chosin Reservoir

On Dec. 5, 1950, Robert Henry was bundled up and trying to stay warm in the 40 below zero degree Fahrenheit temperatures. War photographer David Douglas Duncan took a few steps back to look at the men, about to have lunch while in a valley.

Duncan asked the person in charge if he could take a photograph of one of the men - which one didn't matter. Henry turned around, and Duncan snapped his photograph. He asked Henry to put the can up to his mouth like he was about to eat, and snapped another.

He then asked, "if I were God, what would you want for Christmas?" To which, with persuasion from his sergeant whispering in his ear, Henry said, another day of life. (Duncan recounts him saying, "Give me tomorrow" in a TIME article published in 2011). Duncan walked away and the two never met again. He never got Henry's name.

The next day, Dec. 6, Henry was shot in the thigh.

That image of Henry eating was used on a special edition cover for LIFE Magazine on Dec. 25, 1950.

Henry, a 1950 Southport High School graduate, and his friend, Dan Skinner, a

1948 SHS graduate, were both in the Marine Reserves when they were activated on Aug. 28, 1950 and deployed for the Korean War. They were shipped to Kobe, Japan before going to Wonsan, Korea. They were stationed in different units at Yudamni, the furthest north that the Marines went at the Chosin Reservoir.

The U.S. troops had a peaceful Thanksgiving dinner that year, complete with minced meat pie, and even cigars, which both men say they didn't smoke.

On Nov. 27, approximately 120,000 members of the Chinese 9th Army surrounded the 15,000 Marines at Yudam-ni.

"They hit at night," Skinner said. "Most of us were asleep. We weren't used to night fighting... When you wake up and you're in an artillery outfit, there's six guns to a battery and you see two pointed this way, that way, that way - it's not a good feeling. You know you're surrounded. They're firing high angle fire. The Chinese just did mass attacks. The first wave would be armed. When they would fall, the second wave would pick up their guns. The third wave, the machine gun stopped them from retreating if

they were going to retreat."

The Battle of Chosin Reservoir included three basic towns each approximately 13 miles apart. General Oliver P. Smith placed a regiment at each town to keep the roads open. Skinner said it was 87 miles back to the coast. He started heading that way on Nov. 27 and arrived Dec. 12.

"The main problem was the weather," he said. "We had many, many frostbite cases. The shoes they gave us, they use them in the arctic. They had a rubber bottom, a felt innersole. You'd be on the move and get pinned down on a road block. You'd sweat while you were marching and then get frozen when you stopped."

Soldiers were bundled up in layers of clothing: long johns covered by green dress pants, covered by dungarees, covered by duck pants. Skinner said they looked felt like children dressed in snow suits, barely able to walk.

"You just can't imagine trying to spend 14 days in 40 below," he said. "You were so tired because you didn't get any sleep. You'd lean against each other and fall asleep standing up"

On Dec. 6, Henry was walking down a hill and kept being told to lie down. As the guns fired back and forth, it was his buddy that got hit first (and later survived the war).

"We were sitting around," he said. "I said let's get him and get out of here. The snow blew up on that side and that side. The next one was me. I laid down in the weeds for awhile and hid. I can hear shooting. I said I better get back up and catch up or I will be

here the rest of my life which isn't going to be too long. So I got up and hobbled on down the rest of the mountain."

He was almost caught up when two Marines and two South Koreans helped carry him the rest of the way on a stretcher, putting him in a hospital truck. He was driven to the airport and flew to a hospital ship where they did the first operation. He was flown to an army hospital in Japan where they did surgery on his leg again. He was sent to Hawaii to recuperate.

Through the entire two weeks of fighting, Skinner said he saw his share of mishaps and amazing accomplishments. He recalls hiding behind a jeep when the jeep took off, leaving him to roll over into a ditch. Or the time one man was hit with a bad head wound. The Corpsmen told them to keep his head elevated, so they carried the man like that for six hours.

"I was going to try to get him down the road to get him on an ambulance," Skinner said. "I was in a dry creek bed. A sniper kept firing at me. He finally stopped. I look back up the hill and here's one guy with the stretcher over his shoulder. The guy that was wounded was the first one down the hill. They were so frustrated after carrying him that long and here he is off the stretcher and leading them down the hill."

After returning home, both men settled back down in Perry Township. They are both members of the Chosin Few, a group of veterans who served in that battle. Skinner is president of the local chapter.

Skinner retired after 42 years from the telephone company. He had been married 17 days when he was activated in the Marines. He has three children, three grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Henry started Robert F. Henry Contractors, a masonry company he still runs with his son. He has five children. He has been a member of the American Legion Post 355 in Perry Township for more than 30 years. He had earned a Purple Heart for his service in Korea.

Years later, his grandson was touring a Korean War memorial in D.C. when he spotted a picture that looked like his grandfather. He snapped a picture through the glass to show Henry. Sure enough, the second image Duncan took of Henry, with the cup up to his mouth, is hanging in that memorial, a reminder of the sacrifices he and the other Marines made for their country while braving the cold and overrun by enemy troops during the Battle of Chosin Reservoir in 1950.

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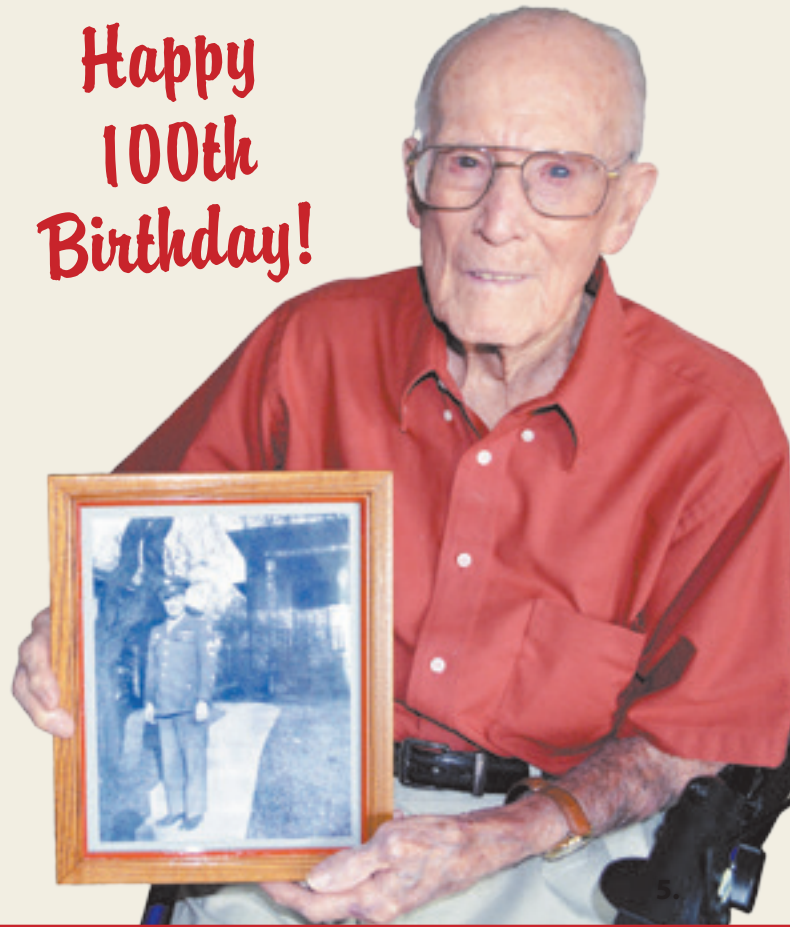

Living a good life

Longtime Southport area resident Cedric Fowler celebrates his 100th birthday at Rosegate

A month before his 100th birthday, Cedric Fowler began counting down the days with his daughter, Cathy Midendorf. The day arrived - Nov. 8 - and Cedric was able to celebrate a century of living with his family and friends at Rosegate Senior Living.

"Now he's the oldest person in the family," Cathy said. "It's pretty neat to celebrate that with him."

Born Nov. 8, 1916, Cedric grew up in Waynetown, Ind., where he graduated from high school in 1934. He mar-

ried his late wife, Dorothy, in 1938. They moved to Indianapolis, the Southport area, in 1941. Cedric was taking electronic classes at Purdue University while working at Allison's until he knew his "number was getting close" for the draft. He enlisted in the Army Air Corps on Nov. 20, 1942, in the Pacific as a radar mechanic for a B-29 Bomber.

"Recently I flew in an airplane like what I did in the war," he said. "They pushed and squeezed and got me in the plane. They took me for a ride around a lake somewhere."

Cedric spent the rest of his career installing organs in churches and homes. He's always enjoyed listening to music, especially love songs. He enjoyed playing

softball, among other sports, and traveling with his family. He is a longtime member of Southport Baptist Church and had served on the building committee.

Cedric celebrated his birthday on election day - and yes, he voted. Southport Mayor Russell McClure joined the birthday party to declare Nov. 8 as Cedric Fowler Day in Southport. Indianapolis Mayor Joe Hogsett also sent a proclamation.

Cedric watched closely as his 100th birthday cake was cut, enjoying the action taking place around him. As guests asked him his secret to living a long life, he humbly replies, "just living a good life, I suppose."

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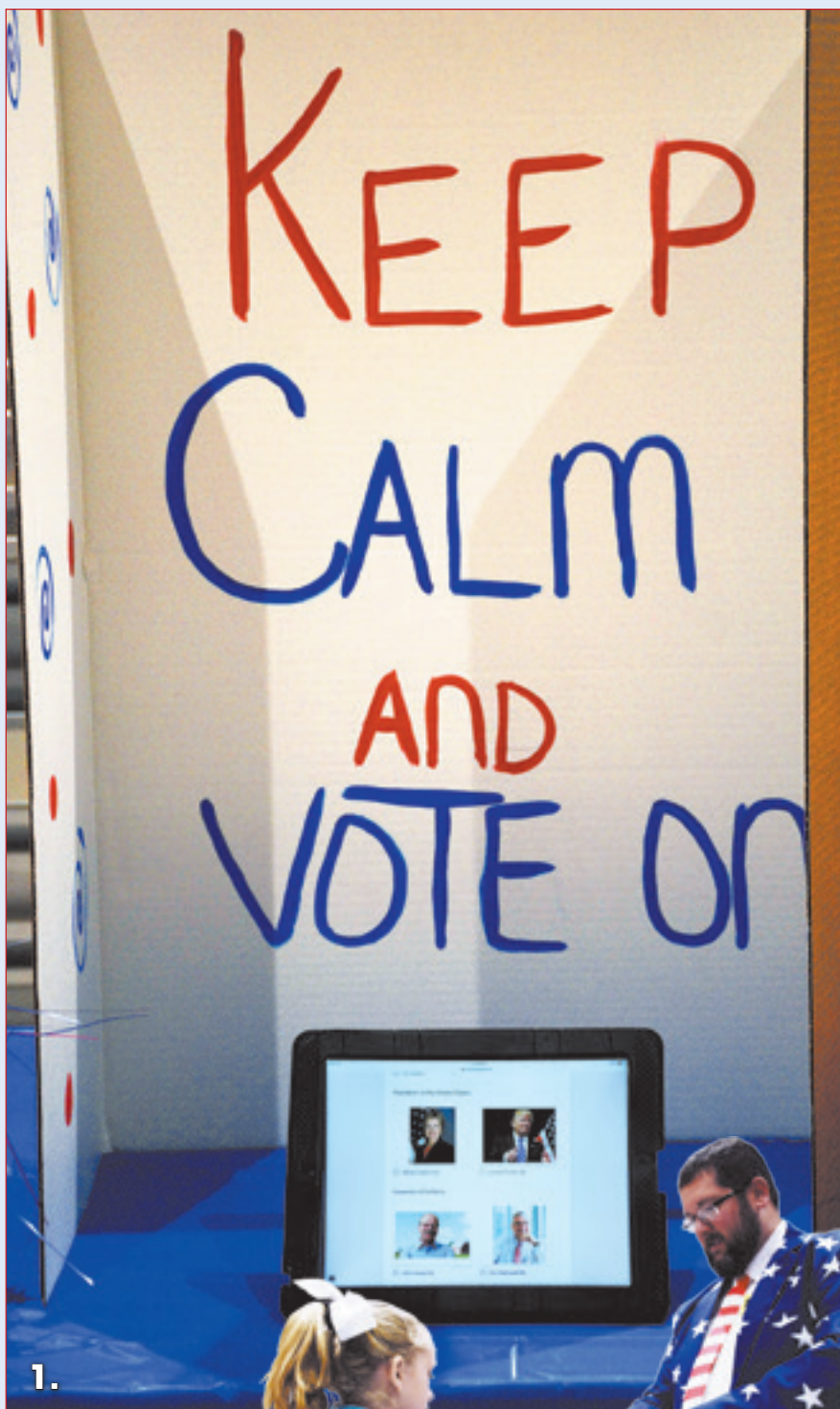

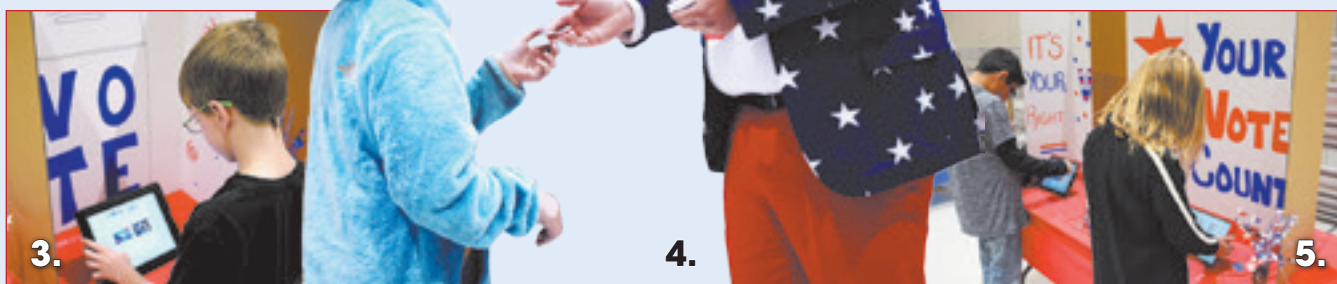
Donald Trump took victory with an overwhelming 66.5 percent - 419

The school's PTA decorated the gymnasium with patriotic decor and designed the voting booths. 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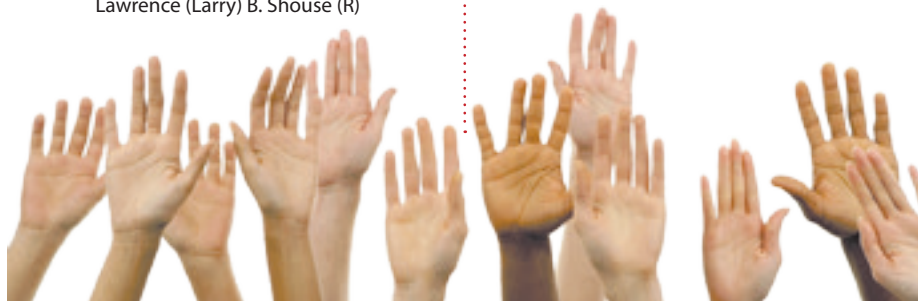

Southside bicycle ride pays tribute to Indianapolis cyclist and teacher

Bicyclists gathered in the parking lot of Glens Valley Elementary in Perry Township on Nov. 6 to begin a bike ride in honor of Erika Wells.

Erika, an experienced cyclist and Wayne Township kindergarten teacher, was riding her bike on the shoulder of State Road 37 on Oct. 12 when she was struck by a box truck, resulting in her death. Bicycle Indiana organized the Nov. 6 memorial ride in her honor. Glens Valley Elementary offered snacks to participants and the school's bible club said a prayer before the ride.

"This is very thoughtful, to remember Erika in this way and honor her in this way," said Diane Wells, Erika's mother, of Spencer, Ind. "I'm humbled by the power of her life."

Erika was 38 years old when she passed away. Diane said bicycling was a part of her daughter's life that she wasn't much a part of, so it was nice to meet some of those friends.

"I am not a rider, except years ago Erika wanted to ride The Hilly (Hundred)," Diane said. "I said I will ride it with you. It was more than I expected. For about three years, I rode the Saturday Hilly with her. We had special memories there. We got to ride together on one of the prettiest days they had there. Then the next year it was the rainiest day they had. It was cold. The last time we did The Hilly, we were literally the last ones to finish. I had given her my bike to share with a friend. I went back and got it so I could ride today."

Approximately 50 cyclists signed up for Sunday's memorial ride. A ghost bike was also placed along State Road 37 in her memory and to remind drivers to be aware of bicyclists and pedestrians.

Amy Dillman Black enjoyed running 5k events, always searching for events with a philanthropic aspect to it. Now the 5k is being held in her honor.

The second annual Running for Amy 5k run/walk will benefit the Amy Dillman Black Memorial Scholarship with the Center Grove Education Foundation. The event is Nov. 12, 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. at Freedom Park in Greenwood.

A 1999 graduate of Center Grove High School, Amy earned a scholarship to pursue nursing school. She would go on to become a registered nurse working for Riley Hospital for Children, then St. Vincent Hospital in the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU).

Carissa Young, who became a friend of Amy's during nursing school and through their work at Riley and St. Vincent Hospitals, says there was no other nurse she would rather have had by her side.

"We went through a lot together," she says. "We saved babies together. We lost babies together. There was no one else I love more to have with me. She was a very trustworthy and knowledgeable nurse to have around."

Amy passed away in July 2014 of an undiagnosed blood clot.

With first Running for Amy 5k in 2015, 149 registered participants helped to raise

\$5,000. A \$1,000 scholarship was given to Center Grove senior, Isabel Pick who was senior class secretary and plans to attend Purdue University to study nursing. The scholarship will be awarded this year, again to a high school senior who is pursuing a nursing degree.

Young says the event is a good way to carry on her memory, representing who she was and giving back.

"I think she would be very honored," Young says. "She would be humbled. She didn't like to draw attention to herself but I know it would mean a lot to her. Since she passed away, I looked through my emails and found an email with her trying to get me to do a 5k with her. She had already looked up what the fundraising was for and found one for a good cause."

Tuition assistance
for tomorrow's teachers

Teachers play a vital role in helping students achieve success. Because of the impact quality educators have on the lives of our children, the Indiana General Assembly recently established The Next Generation Hoosier Educators Scholarship. The Indiana Commission for Higher Education launched the scholarship last month and is currently accepting applications. It is designed to incentivize our best and brightest high school graduates to pursue degrees in teaching and then work in Indiana's classrooms.

Both incoming and current college students studying education in Indiana are eligible. The scholarship awards up to \$7,500 per year toward college costs to those who commit to teaching in Indiana schools for five years upon graduating.

The scholarship is available to 200 students statewide each year who either graduate in the top 20 percent of their high school class or earn a score in the top 20th percentile on the SAT or ACT.

While in college, students must maintain a 3.0 cumulative GPA and complete at least 30 credit hours per year to continue receiving the grant. Graduates must obtain their teaching license and teach in Indiana for five consecutive years to meet their full obligation.

Students can visit www.LearnMore-Indiana.org/NextTeacher for more information and to submit an application before the Dec. 31 deadline.

Students interested in applying must be nominated by a teacher and submit their nomination form to the Indiana Commission for Higher Education.

Through this program, we can both encourage and enable our high-achieving students to enter the teaching field without the fear of heavy college debt. Our communities and classrooms will benefit greatly by keeping our top talent right here in Indiana.

Jack Reacher: Never Go Back

Stay away, save your time and money

The election is over. And now so much of our daily lives will soon change dramatically. Those newly elected officials will finally work together for the electorate, keeping every one of their campaign promises in the process. Social media will now become a civil environment for open, honest discussion where disagreement is perfectly acceptable. Sure, and burnt sienna is Donald Trump's natural skin color. Anyway, one thing you can actually count on is for Hollywood to continue churning out sequels, one of which recently hit theaters.

Jack Reacher: Never Go Back, based on the popular book series and the sequel to 2012's *Jack Reacher*, showcases the film's hero doing what he does best: dishing out swift, brutal and painful justice. The film opens as Reacher (Tom Cruise) takes down a corrupt sheriff and we soon learn that the isolated, nomadic Reacher has struck up a relationship with Major Susan Turner (Cobie Smulders). However, as he's on his way to meet up with Turner in D.C., he learns that she's been arrested, facing court marshal that most assuredly end with a lengthy prison sentence. However, things are not quite what they seem.

Turner is being framed as a part of a massive government conspiracy. After some quick thinking and a flurry of even faster paced punches and kicks, Reacher springs Turner from prison. The two are soon on the

run, dodging assassins and bullets all along the way as they try to figure who wants them both dead and why.

Those who absolutely loved 2012's very average *Jack Reacher* are likely to enjoy the sequel. However, while there is plenty of action to keep the film moderately entertaining, the story falls short of the mark. The entire story is generic, hollow and empty. Except for the fact that Tom Cruise is the lead, everything else about it screams straight-to-video. All of the twists and turns are right on cue and expected, not leaving a lot of room for actual, genuine suspense. There is absolutely nothing to keep it from drowning in the sea of the dozens of forgettable action films that Hollywood turns out every year.

Some of the dialogue is absolutely cringe worthy bad. There is one line spoken by Turner in the waning minutes about grabbing a character by his hair plugs that is particularly laugh out loud funny and not in a good way.

While Cruise gives a valiant effort and despite the nearly constant action, *Jack Reacher: Never Go Back* fails to even come close to meeting the mark of it's average 2012 predecessor. 2 out of 5.

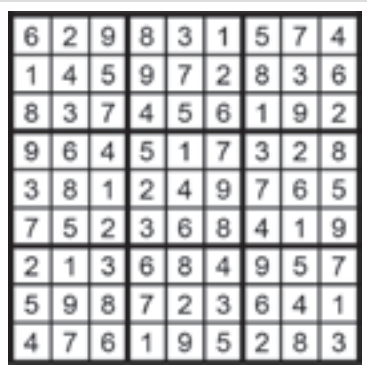
