Doug Collins began leather crafting five years ago when he needed armor for his medieval reenactment fighting. As the hobby evolved, Collin began creating everything from leather armor, wrist bands, drums, checkbook covers to roses.

"I love working with leather," says Collins, Indianapolis resident. "To me it's relaxing, until you come up to a problem and get frustrated. Sitting here tooling the leather is a relaxing process."

Working at a job which Collins says wasn't very fulfilling; he knew he'd rather make leather. He started his business, Celtic Leather-

works, small by making business cards and handing them out during his reenactment guild's demonstrations. He has learned how to make a large assortment of items through leather crafting classes throughout Indianapolis and the Southside. Everything from the cutting to the décor is all done by hand.

Collins began networking this summer, joining the Power Circle Network which meets at Jockamos Pizza in Greenwood. Since he began networking, his items have been placed in Funkyard coffee shop in Fountain Square, and he will have leather dog collars in Olive Branch Parke Veterinary Clinic.

"If it weren't for the Southside connections I wouldn't be doing what I am," Collins says. "These weren't selling much until the last

month. It's just keeping me motivated, on track and gives me ideas on how to sell the stuff. So that's been a huge help to me."

As business begins to pick up, Collins says he would like to eventually begin going to Renaissance Fairs to sell his products. He also enjoys sharing his knowledge, teaching others how to create pieces of art with leather.

"A lot of people think of leather crafting and think crafty items," Collins says. "It's really an art form. I've seen pictures done out of leather that would blow your mind away. Almost anything can be made out of leather."

UIndy President Robert Manuel works with Southside community to begin 32-step plan on economic revitalization

Since moving to Indianapolis, University of Indianapolis President Robert Manuel said he has observed a lot of strengths on the Southside – a potential to grow, a good location and strong spirit of the people that reside and work in the area. Seeing a genuine desire for economic and individual prosperity has been very influential as he spent the last 16 months working to create Vision 2030, a plan that will help grow not only UIndy, but the entire community.

“The most popular question when I moved was, ‘What’s your vision for the university?’” Manuel said. “My response up until about three months ago was ‘we’re creating it.’ It’s not my vision that matters. It’s the community’s vision that matters... It’s a question of saying what does the city need, what is the university good at, and what’s in the middle of those circles that we can work together on?...About 1,600 people led us to the point of saying, the University has to have a role in the Southside development or both of us will end up being less prominent, less powerful, than we could be together.”

Manuel started his career in administration and financial aid at Le Moyne College in Syracuse, N.Y. where he earned his Master’s degree. He received his Ph.D. from New York University, where he worked for 15 years learning to teach, researching and got into technology and business analytics. He was encouraged to take on a leadership role, and went to Georgetown University serving as dean of the School of Continuing Studies. Manuel said he knew if at some point there were an opportunity to take a leadership position with another institution, he wanted it to be one which connected with its community as well as its students. He moved to UIndy in July 2012.

“When I came here, I didn’t come with a list of things I wanted to do in the first 30, 90 days,” Manuel said. “I came with a process. I had no idea of the scope the job would entail. The process has created incredibly creative ideas that will continue the line of impactful, transforma-

tions education students have here, for years to come.”

Speaking with more than 1,600 individuals within the university and community, Manuel established Vision 2030, a master plan with 32 projects that will soon come to fruition. First on the agenda is a health and wellness center. UIndy would like to take its faculty and students that study health care and put them together in the same building, inviting community partners to come. The groups can work together to identify local health care disparities and create solutions.

“Challenges were to come up with the dream and the concepts now and to not limit ourselves by what the current situations are but rather to think of where can we be in 18 years and not be constrained by the limitations that we have at the moment; to really dream that big dream in the first place,” Manuel says. “If we don’t have the large ideas created now, we’ll never build any bigger.”

In four months of trying to bring in business to revitalize the area, UIndy has gotten one company to open on the Southside. HistoryIT digitizes archives and records. UIndy has a large collection of records from the past five Indianapolis mayors that need digitized, so the administration worked to bringing the company to Indianapolis. Manuel said if they can do this enough times, it will draw density, which will bring in more amenities, which leads to

better quality of life.

Manuel said the quality of life amenities that are important to growth and bringing people to the area are something that the Southside already has and can expand upon. The university holds more than 350 events on campus in a year’s time, many open to the community. As UIndy is in close proximity of Garfield Park and Fountain Square, he said combining the locations, there are always activities going on for Southsiders. For example, in the arts department, UIndy hosts student performances regu-

larly. Upcoming is Crimson Express, directed by Pete Schmutte, Nov. 20, 7:30 p.m.; UIndy Student Composers Forum I, directed by John Bemers, Nov. 21, 7:30 p.m.; and Voices of Worship directed by Geoffrey Kelsaw, Nov. 23, 7:30 p.m. all held at Christel DeHaan Fine Arts Center’s Ruth Lilly Performance Center.

Seeing how beneficial the Cultural Trail was for Indianapolis in Fountain Square, Manuel said they are interested in talking with Central Indiana Community Foundation (CICF), which was involved in the development of the trail, to bring it further into the Southside. He said transit is an important key in a city’s growth, which is why he has taken interest in the Rapid Transit proposed by Indy Connect. One of the major hubs on the plan would be at Hanna Ave. and Shelby Street, which is the corner of the UIndy campus.

Manuel credits much of what he’s accomplished to the community and everyone’s willingness to embrace the concept of development with open arms.

“The truth is, everyone thinks 18 years down the road, we are going to look so different and be so different because of this master plan,” Manuel said. “But my hope is we will still look like and feel pretty much the same as we do now; we will just be relevant for the time. Our students will continue to be productive members of a competitive economic system that exists in Indiana.”

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Don't 'dis' the egg

Eggs-istentist Foghorn Leghorn, president of the LLU, (Local Layers Union) sputtered, "Well, I say, I say, this is great news for America's 240 million exhausted layers producing 5.5 billion dozen eggs per year."

I'd enjoy shaking the courageous hand of the first hungry human who, after observing a chicken squirting out beige objects, remarked, "Hey, let's eat one of those!" Egyptian legend says the egg was created from the sun and the moon. In mid-19th century, chickens became popular in Europe and America. In China, the barn fowl is described as "the domestic animal who knows time."

It's a fowl proposition, but are eggs all they're cracked up to be? As a survivor of heart disease, I've avoided eggs, the symbol of life, since eggs contain cholesterol. Whoa, let's back up the old egg cart. Do eggs build up excess cholesterol, or is inflammation to blame. Inflammation from American's hog-wild consumption of biscuits and gravy, white flour pancakes, maple flavored high fructose corn syrup, unctuous bacon, salty ham, Trans-Fat-o-licious hash browns and 'the powdered coffee creamers of death' accompanying your eggs that stimulate cholesterol production? 911! Thud!

Our intelligent Holy Temple produces the cholesterol it needs, so we needn't intake additional. That's where things get scrambled. Despite its bad rap, Cholesterol is essential

to many important functions of the temple. The American Heart Association amended its guidelines on eggs. There is "no longer a specific recommendation on the number of egg yolks a person may consume in a week." In the other nesting box, if your cholesterol is high, you have other risk factors for heart disease, or already have heart disease, prudently drop the egg. Prepare Steele cut oats cooked in apple cider or local, protein-rich egg whites and Ezekiel bread for breakfast. I was a dumb cluck for 'dising' Creation's nutritious gift. Sandi and I eat Local eggs. They're infinitely more nutritious and clean.

The 70-calorie "cackleberry," restaurant jargon for the sound of a frying egg, is rich in protein, riboflavin, niacin, iron, and vitamins D, A, B12, and K. Eggs also contain lutein and zeaxanthin, required for healthy eyesight. Eggs contain biotin, a member of the vitamin B complex (vitamin H). A deficiency of H can cause dermatitis, dementia, loss of hair and occasionally, brittle nails.

Don't get pecked to death with outdated egg science. Add local eggs to your diet and you'll cluck with delight. So, "Go suck an egg," but cook it first. Salmonella lurks in a small but unpredictable percentage of raw eggs and can be fatal to infants and those older than 65. Plus, grocery eggs can stay in a warehouse up to six weeks and longer. Respect the Egg.

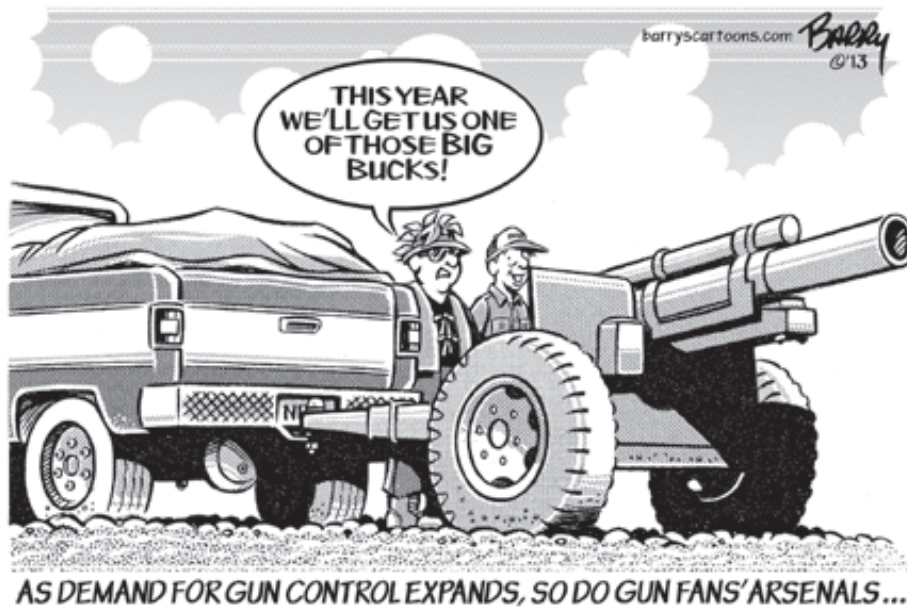

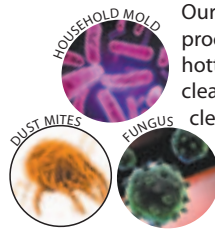

Answer:

Thank you for writing in, Liz. Hopefully I can clear up your argument without causing any lingering marital strife.

If you were to look up the word “historic” in a dictionary, you’d see two entries. The first: “Having importance in or influence on history.” The second: “Historical.”

Helpful, isn’t it?

The situation with “historic” and “historical” is this: They mean the same thing ... except when they don’t.

To quote our aforementioned dictionary: “‘Historic’ refers to what is important in history ... also what is famous or interesting be-

cause of its association with persons or events in history. ‘Historical’ refers to whatever existed in the past, whether regarded as important or not ... also anything concerned with history or the study of the past.”

Let’s put those definitions to use. Abraham Lincoln gave a historic speech at Gettysburg, whereas my professor gave a historical lecture about the Civil War. December 7, 1941, was a historic day (“a date that will live in infamy”). John Hersey’s “Hiroshima” is a historical account of the first wartime detonation of an atomic bomb.

To boil it down: “Historic” should be used for important or influential aspects of history; “historical” should be used for everything else.

The Battle of the Bulge was a historic battle. A rifle used at the battle, however, is a historical weapon.

At the risk of offending the good people of Muncie, I would venture to say that Cammack Station is correctly identified as a “historical” location. But, with a 90 percent on UrbanSpoon, it does sound like a good place to grab lunch – “historic” or otherwise.

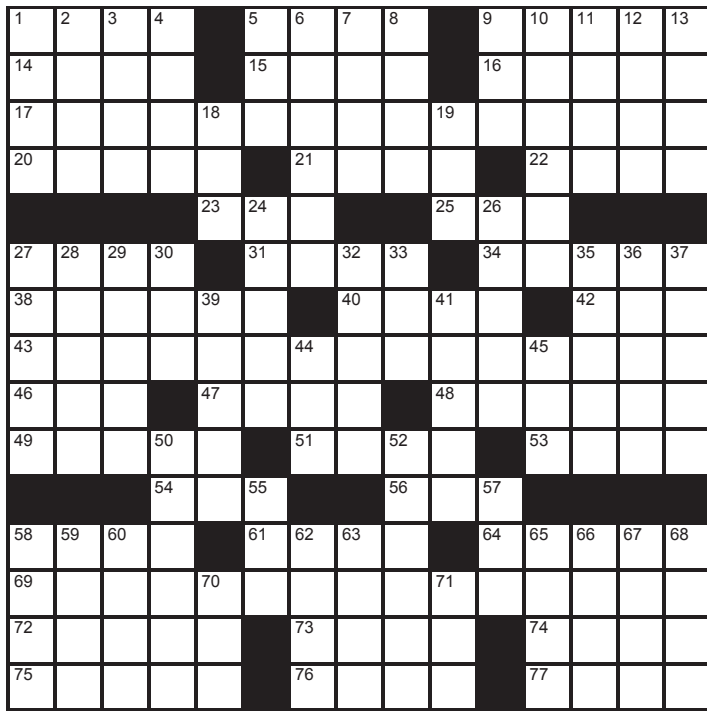

The sound of silence

Southside Pastor Paul Erny finds newer, deeper appreciation of God's love through time away

"A vow of silence for one week." Not the typical choice for beginning a sabbatical as Pastor of Community Church at Murphy's Landing. But that is what Rev. Paul Erny did recently as he celebrated 10 years as pastor of the Southside church.

"I really thought it wouldn't be that hard but by Wednesday, I had a real need to talk with someone," Erny said. "But it was the discipline and practice of the monks of the Gethsemane Abbey near Bardstown, Ky."

"It was time to have solitude and create space in my life to get rid of the noise in my life; a time to be still and draw near to God." And near, he did. One morning during the week, having arisen early for prayer with the monks and singing the Psalms, Pastor Paul stood on a hillside watching the sun rise when God gave him the deep realization that he is loved by God. "It's not dependent upon what I do, how I perform, or any success that I have. God's love is unconditional."

During the week, he read, wrote, journaled and prayed. "Be Still and Know..." A sabbatical

is a ceasing from all work and comes from the root Hebrew word "Sabbath."

This week was the first of five weeks given him by his church family.

Meals at the Abbey are eaten in verbal silence. "Silence is spoken here." is the sign on the table. His experience taught him several things: "Take time for solitude and rest in the normal rhythm of life; Pay attention to the warning signs of stress; Allow more people entry into my life," Erny said. "The rewards of relationships are to risk being hurt; Take a Sabbath day of rest; Make margins in your life having an hour here and there to relax."

The hardest part was driving back to Indianapolis on the Interstate in traffic after a week communing with God. The chaos of the real world is never as real as at the wheel of a car in heavy traffic. When he got home, wife Jenny says he never stopped talking for several hours.
