"Keep this store alive for as long as you absolutely can!"

Messages are scribed through a guest book that Michael Stafford has kept on his counter at Books Unlimited Indy for the past year and a half. These handwritten notes from customers of all ages and from areas across the U.S. represent the love the community has for the nearly 40-year-old bookstore.

Located next door to Garfield Eatery and Coffee, across the road from Big Car and on Shelby Street where the Red Line rapid transit system will soon come through, the store has the perfect location, Stafford said. Yet, competing with electronic books and larger sellers like Amazon in the digital world makes running a small, local bookstore tough.

Stafford almost had to sell the store in 2015 before deciding to hang on for anoth-

er year. Although things are looking up, it's not safe yet. He listed the store up for sale a month ago. After hearing the news, the community began rallying around him. A gofundme page was set up to help the store raise funds to stay open: gofundme.com/g3qprvuc. As community members ex-

pressed their wish for the store to remain in the Garfield Park area, the people behind Big Car, a nonprofit arts organization which is investing in the Garfield Park community to help it thrive, have been trying to help Stafford stay open.

"The minute I give up, the shop kicks back," Stafford said. "It's rough being a small, independent book dealer. But, we need places like this, mom and pops. The

values of this place go beyond dollars and cents. This shop needs to be here. It's got heart and soul. It's good for everybody."

Books Unlimited began on East Washington Street in 1978 by Stafford's father, James Ware.

"It was about half this size," Stafford said.
"It was a cinder block building, as bare as bare gets. You couldn't walk down an aisle if another person was there. Somebody had to back out. There were books all over the floor. It was a classic hole in the wall. It didn't look like much, but the books were

good and place was good. We had a good following."

Stafford was 20 years old when he first worked behind the counter. He even opened an offshoot of Books Unlimited, becoming a comic book dealer through Comics Unlimited. He purchased the bookstore from his father in 2011, relocating it to 2629 Shelby St. after their old building was bought out.

Stafford celebrated

five years of owning and operating Books Unlimited Indy on Nov. 21. The store sells used books, collectibles and other items. The store has fiction on one side, nonfiction on the other and is organized into categories such as Indiana history, US

history, war, politics, religion, psychology, nature, health, world history, movies, children and more.

Stafford said he's picky about the quality of books he brings into the store and is always on the lookout for unique items.

"Some of the things I find, the notes, the stamps of where they come from, who's read it, who has held it - they have soul," he said. That's the reason he believes a physical book can never be replaced by electronics. "Books just feel better. We're physical beings. We've developed the way we have to touch, feel, smell, see, hear. Books help to feed that part of us. It nurtures our inside. Digital world doesn't do that. Pick up a computer and press a few buttons; it's hollow."

Books Unlimited Indy is a hideaway for Stafford, who said he personally enjoys reading comics the most. His favorite part of the shop, though, is that guest log, which represents the "heart and soul" of his shop.

As the future of Books Unlimited Indy is unforeseen, he said he hopes the situation changes and he can remain open, offering the small bookstore experience on the Southside for everyone to enjoy.

"Places like this aren't around any more," Stafford said. "It's the last book store of its type in this town. There is no one to fill the void. We'll see where it leads."

Marion County Sheriff's Deputy enjoys daily interactions with people while working jail security

When Sam Karallus moved to Indianapolis he would see the sheriff's deputies and knew he wanted to be one of them. Having worked with the Marion County Sheriff's Office for the past two years, he said he's been fortunate to have supervisors and senior deputies who have taught him how to do the job well, answering questions and molding him into the person that he is today.

Karallus grew up in Leo, Ind., which is north of Ft. Wayne. After graduating from college with a degree in criminal justice, he took a position with the department of corrections in the prison. He worked there five years prior to being hired as a deputy for the Marion County Sheriff's Office in 2014. He now works jail security, running the front security desk.

"I love it," he said. "I'm a people person. I get to have the day-to-day interactions with all kinds of people."

Karallus resides in Perry Township.

What was your inspiration to go into law enforcement?

It started as a kid. I grew up in a small town. Being in a small town, you interact with mainly the sheriff's department. They put a smile on my face as a little kid. Continuing that friendship as I grew up, it got me hooked. Now I am able to (pass that along) to the younger generation.

What has been one of your most gratifying moments on the job?

There are so many things in my ca-

reer that have put a smile on my face and someone else's face. I can recall one time I caught a shoplifter. We had taken her back to the office and did paperwork. She didn't end up getting arrested. As I walked her out, she broke out into tears. She gave me a hug and expressed how sorry she was. You could feel the sincerity that she knew what she did was wrong. That's just one of many.

What aspect of the job do you find most challenging?

Dealing with so many different things at one time. If you're not a good multitasker, that is challenging. Dealing with all the different problems that people bring to you, being able to break those down and help them with each single problem. There is not one answer that will fix every problem.

What do you enjoy doing in your off-time?

I'm a big hunter and fisherman - any way to get outdoors and forget the stresses of the job.

What are your future goals, professionally or personally?

Professionally to move up with the sheriff's department, move up in rank and become one of those senior deputies that can help the younger deputies that come on and help them through their career. Personally, I recently got engaged, so building my family.

What would you have done if you hadn't become a deputy?

I probably would have been a fireman.

GREENWOOD COMMON COUNCIL

Meeting Nov. 21

What happened: Ordinance 16-72 passes first reading and Ordinance 16-66 passes second reading.

What it means: Ordinance 16-72 moves \$41,322 from the Parks funds to budget classification 336 in the Parks and Recreational Department Budget. This money will be spent on repairs and replacements.

Ordinance 16-66 revises the schedule of rates and charges collected by the sewage works department for those who are attached to the city's sewer system.

What's next: Ordinance 16-72 will go for its second reading in the next meeting and Ordinance 16-66 will go into effect.

SOUTHPORT CITY COUNCIL

Meeting, Nov. 21

What happened: The council approved Ordinance 16.10.06 on second reading and Ordinance 16.10.07.

What it means: Ordinance 16.10.06 changes the parking ordinance. Ordinance 16.10.07 pertains to weeks and rank vegetation.

In brief...

-The city council approved for the police department to purchase a vehicle (\$26,583) for its first fill-time officer that it will hire in December. The officer will start Jan. 3. They also approved the purchase of five new tasers (\$5,214) and two new radar units (\$3,075).

-The Council approved the demolition, up to \$27,000, of the former concrete plant to be able to construct Southport Municipal Complex - the new police station, mayor and clerk/treasurer's office.

Spokesmen of a forgotten past

HAUNTS & JAUNTS

Indiana produces some fine writers and on a local level. It's always a jolt to remember the events they are writing about, with locations you have most likely passed through a hundred times. It doesn't get much closer than that! These are just a few authors in my personal library, exploring not only the paranormal, but also the dark underbelly of Indianapolis:

JOHN DEAN:

His book "The Indiana Torture Slaying: Sylvia Liken's Ordeal & Death" brought a grim chapter of Indianapolis' history to the public. The house—and neighborhood—never really recovered from the torture of a 16 year old girl in the mid 1960s. The house was torn down a few years ago, and seemingly full of ghostly activity (why wouldn't it!). For me personally, this is still a hard one to get past. Which brings about the next author directly related to the subject...

FOREST BOWMAN, JR.:

In 1965 he was counsel for 16 year old Coy Hubbard and 13 year old John Baniszewski for the trial involving Sylvia Liken's death. His book "Sylvia: The Likens Trial" covers every aspect of the proceedings closely followed by Indianapolis residents in the day. Court trials are not a consistent hotbed of adrenaline soaked activity—there are those lapses that can put you to sleep—however Bowman was there, and has recorded his perceptions and conclusions as a first observer. It wasn't a pretty trial!

JULIE YOUNG:

A local historian with an array of work covering an Indianapolis we may have forgotten: "Eastside Indianapolis," "Historic Irvington," "The Famous Faces of Indy's WTTV-4," to name just a few.

ROBERT SNOW:

This author served 38 years with IPD, retiring in 2007 with the rank of Captain. And he has some stories to tell: "Killers in the Family" (the 2008 murders involving the Reese family), "Slaughter on North LaSalle" (the 1971 murders of business entrepreneurs and playboys Robert Gierse, James Baker and Robert Hinson in their near east side home off of 10th Street).

ED WENCK:

"Hoosier Killers: Indiana's Darkest History." There are several variety's of killers in the landscape, and Indiana has had its mix.

MARK MARIMEN:

"Haunted Indiana" volumes 1-4, "Weird Indiana," "Haunted Travels of Indiana," and "School Spirits."

KAT KLOCKOW:

Paranormal author of "Haunted Hoosier Halls-Indiana University." Is there paranormal activity at IU? Apparently so!

ANDREW E. STONER:

"Wicked Indianapolis."

FRED CAVINDER:

"Historic Indianapolis Crimes."

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

It's easy to get stressed about the orange barrels lining the highways and byways of our daily commutes, but without the proper care, the streets cannot get us to our destinations.


What about advances in healthcare? Sure it costs a pretty penny, but we're alive to complain.







Virginia,

Your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus. It would be dreary as if there were no Virginias. There would be no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have

no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

Not believe in Santa Claus! You might as well not believe in fairies! You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas Eve to catch Santa Claus, but even if they did not see Santa Claus coming down, what would that prove? 

Hacksaw Ridge; Best film of 2016

MOVIE REVIEW

As 2016 quickly approaches its inevitable conclusion, the Thanksgiving and Christmas season are now upon us. This is generally the time of year when kindness, generosity and the best of humanity are on full display. However, despite anything that may happen now or in the immediate future, the world can often be a cold and cruel place. One recently released film depicts what is easily the most horrific act the human race has ever and will ever engage in, warfare.

Hacksaw Ridge is the true story of Desmond Doss, a World War II medic and conscientious objector, who saved the lives of dozens of men without ever firing a single shot. Despite his deep-seated belief that taking the life of another, no matter the circumstance, is a sin, Doss enlists in the Army. At basic training Doss consistently refuses to touch a gun, much less engage in any kind of target practice. Doss is ultimately court marshaled for his unwillingness to heed to his commanding officer's orders. However, it's eventually decided that Doss does in fact have the right to go into battle without any weapon to protect himself.

Doss and his platoon are soon deployed to Japan. After scaling the several hundred foot high wall that is Hacksaw Ridge, the soldiers are greeted by a battlefield lined with the rotting and maggot-field corpses of their predecessors. Minutes after surveying their bleak surroundings, bullets start flying. Doss then risks his life saving nearly 75 men injured and left for dead.

The way in which *Hacksaw Ridge* is written it's almost as if you're treated to two

separate films. The first half focuses on attempting to give the audience a sense of who Desmond is by focusing on his faith in God and his budding romantic relationship to his eventual wife Dorothy. Then almost halfway through, the film makes a noticeable and somewhat dramatic change and the rest of the film is nearly nonstop carnage. The story structure is somewhat distracting, but given the superb direction and strong performances all around, this is easily overlooked.

In addition to the direction and the performances, the cinematography on display in *Hacksaw Ridge* is spectacular. The beautiful shots of the dark, hazy battlefield and the quick, nearly nonstop sequences of graphic, bloody violence are expertly framed and put together.

While likely the most violent and bloody film of the year, *Hacksaw Ridge* is also the best film of the year. The strong visuals and the touching, moving story will stay with



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


