

Bridging the gap

Ashley Davis is the Southside's new community liaison while former liaison Gary Loveless switches districts

Community liaison Gary Loveless has been the link between the Southside Indianapolis community and its government for more than five years, driving back and forth across Indianapolis from his Northside home. With four of nine Indianapolis liaisons traveling across the city to and from work, a change was made so that those who serve a community live in that community. Loveless now serves the Northside. Perry Township resident Ashley Davis took over the Southside, Perry and Franklin Townships, on Oct. 21.

"I am going to miss the people," Loveless said. "I have great friends all through here. The one thing my wife has said is everyone is nice on the Southside. She said that's what she will miss. The people down here are great, but getting to see my wife more has an appeal to it. She is a fabulous woman."

Loveless will still visit the Southside periodically to maintain his contacts with the Chin community, which he says is the "economic engine for Perry Township."

"It's taken years to get that connection," Loveless said. "I want to keep them and they want me around."

Davis is a graduate of Perry Meridian High School. She started her career in cosmetology school, and then went for business. She worked for SecurPros Inc. for 11 years before being asked to serve on the campaign for Jana Scott for Marion County Clerk. She has worked on other political campaigns since, and says the only difference between her work with that and being a liaison is the ability to take action and help more than simply telling people which resources could help them.

"It's more the behind the scenes," Davis said. "I never knew the department of pub-

lic development and their roles, public works, parks department. There are just so many departments we have to work with...There would be a huge disconnect without community liaisons. The mayor, deputy mayor would not have the eyes and ears out there."

Though she is new to the position, Davis has been "looping in" for more than a month, getting to know residents and how the Southside government and community work. She will maintain office hours on Mondays in both Perry and Franklin Townships, and says she would encourage residents to visit.

"Right now it's a really good time because I have two hours to sit here, e-mail constituents

and talk to people about their problems," Davis said. "I can coordinate with the councilors and have them come in to talk on a special issue. It's a way to bridge that gap (between the community and government)."


decision to begin or to stop eating.





It's about recognizing the brotherhood of those who served, appreciating freedoms and those who fought and died for them. Veterans Day has maintained its meaning and significance since it was recognized by President Woodrow Wilson on Armistice Day Nov. 11, 1919. On the Southside, veterans, regardless of age or time period in military service, have a common bond during Nov. 11 commemorations.

"I try to honor everyone that I find," said Clyde Kerr, member of the Beech Grove VFW and American Legion. "I just extend my hand and say 'welcome home brother.' We need to honor our military and people who have served, because they stepped forward and did it."

Kerr served for 26 years in Army National Guard, rising to the rank of staff sergeant. Growing up in the WWII era, Kerr said he was seven years old when Pearl Harbor was attacked. He had brothers and other family who joined the military, serving in WWII, and it eventually led to Kerr wanting to join.

"I remember the outpouring of people (after Pearl Harbor)," Kerr said. "... I wasn't drafted. When it came for Vietnam, I volunteered to go."

While in Vietnam, Kerr was in six major battles, including the Battle of Hue during the Tet offensive in January and February 1968.

He said he got to 54 combat operations in Vietnam before he stopped counting. He retired as a Captain in October 1994 with numerous medals and decorations, including Armed Forces Reserve Medal, Bronze Star medal, Vietnamese Cross-of Gallantry with Silver Star, Cold War Defense Medal and Vietnamese Armor Badge.

"I'm actually proud of the service I gave to my country," Kerr said. "I felt ever since I was a kid, if the only thing I owed to my country was a time of my life being in the military, it's a small price to pay for the freedoms I enjoy."

Nearly 35 years old during his service in Vietnam, Kerr said his views on the war and how he handled the conflict was likely different than those who are younger and serve, not fully grasping why they are there – and that aspect of war remains the same today.

This Veterans Day, Kerr will travel to Kentucky to visit his family and speak at his grandson's school. Nov. 11 will be a day of reflection for himself, and other veterans around him. Regardless of age and service, Veterans day is a day of remembrance and paying respects to those that served.

"Veterans Day already meant a lot, before I served, considering my father was a Marine in Vietnam," said Joe Lohman, Beech Grove resident and veteran. "It means a lot to me to have served in our military. For me, it's a day of reflection, thought and prayer and giving thanks to those who have served. Anytime I see a veteran, I still shake their hand and tell them I ap-

Lohman served in the Marines Special Op Command from 2008-12. While training in the Mountains in 29 Palms Calif., he fell 30 feet. Within four to six months of the fall, he developed kidney problems, back problems, nerve problems, and more. Before the fall, he had been promoted to Lance Corporal, picking up Corporal while working through his injuries. In 2010 the Marine Corps took him out of training operations to focus on getting better. After surgeries and spinal injections, a medical board said he was no longer fit for active duty.

"In one way, it's just sad that I can't do my job anymore," Lohman said. "The Marine Corp put all this money and time into training me. But apparently my destiny wasn't to be in the Marine Corps anymore."

Since he returned home, his wife Julianne has been his caregiver, helping drive him to the VA for additional treatments. He says the community has helped him through the experience, including Beech Grove Mayor Buckley and other politicians who have listened to his story. This November, Lohman said he will stay busy, attending many Marine birthday and Veterans Day events with his father and other veterans.


"For Veterans Day, people should stop to reflect on Nov. 11, 11 a.m," Lohman said. "Just that people give respect to their veterans."

Our vets continue to serve us still







MOVIE REVIEW

Ever come across an unconventional, weird or just out-right bizarre product or idea?

Something at first glance that seems almost stupid either because of its simplicity or for its off-the-wall combination of ingredients or features, but for some reason, it works. Peanut butter and jelly. IcyHot. Unfortunately, we've also experienced the other side. Those combinations that don't work out; the Chicago Cubs and baseball. Britney Spears and music. Any food with the word "diet." Luckily, the new film,

About Time, starring Rachel McAdams, is one of those rare opportunities to witness two very differing film genres blended into one expertly woven, beautiful story.

About Time combines science fiction, time travel with romantic comedy. The film is about a young English man, Tim, who is about to leave

for his first real job since graduating law school. But before he ventures out into the world, his father lets him in on a family secret; all the men in his family can travel back in time. All that's required is an enclosed area and for

the participant to close their eyes, clinch their teeth and ball their fists and think of a desired place in time and voila, there they are.

Like most men his age, Tim begins looking around at all the beautiful women that inhabit his city. Tim has never been the best guy with women, but Mary (McAdams) catches his eye. Soon, the two begin seeing each other, it escalates pretty fast, and we stay with these characters several years into their relationship as they experience, joy, pain, love, hate and every other emotion.

About Time really is oddly written and have to admit that going in, the idea of a romantic comedy/ love story and time travel seemed to be more than a tad absurd. But, if you're able to put your initial apprehensions about the film's premise behind you, you're likely to see the best written film this year. It's written in such a way that you're immediately drawn into the lives of these characters.

The chemistry between all the actors radiates off the

screen and you feel as though you're peering into the lives of an actual family. Domhnall Gleeson (Tim) and Mc-Adams are terrific.





Is "these ones" okay?

Grammar Guy

GRAMMAR GUY

Question:

"I ran across an article that you had written in *The Southside Times* about grammar. Grammar was not (and still is not)

one of my strong points, but in today's world I constantly hear people using the term 'these ones' instead of just 'these'. Is there any way this is correct grammar? It's not really a major concern in the whole scheme of things, but it just rubs me the wrong way." (Ed)



Consider, if you will, a bakery counter full of donuts.

The counter has four types of donuts – chocolate, glazed, raspberry and cream cheese – arranged in groups from left to right. The clerk behind the counter is ready to sell you as many donuts as you would like, and, being a good and decent person, you're ready to oblige her.

Let's look at the ways this transaction could occur:

"I want one." You haven't provided the clerk with much information. You're still getting a donut, but it could be any of the four types.

"I want this one." Now, the clerk knows exactly which type of donut you would like and,

in fact, exactly which donut of out that group you would like. "This" acts as a determiner to the pronoun, "one," signifying an individual item within a group. When a pronoun like "one" is paired with a determiner, it forms a

pronominal – or a pronoun phrase, more or less.

"I want five of these ones." Here, we still have a pronominal. But is it necessary? Does it function any better than "these" – acting as a pronoun – would alone?

If we were to say, "I want five of these," the clerk would have just as much information as the previous phrase. "These" and "these ones" both serve to indicate a subset of a group of donuts. And while "one" in the pronominal "this one" does double duty by indicating the quantity of donuts desired, it does not in "these ones," instead acting as an indefinite pronoun.

I was unable to find a hard-and-fast rule prohibiting the use of "these ones." However, it seems to me a redundant and inelegant-sounding phrase, and that alone should be cause to avoid it. If you do come across a rule about this phrase in your travels, I'd love to read it, though. As for me ... I'm suddenly craving donuts.
